- YOU CONSIDER THE NUMBER OF COMMON PROBLEMS WE CONFRONT ON INTERNATIONAL STAGE -- DRUG PRODUCTION AND TRAFFICKING; ORGANIZED CRIME; SMUGGLING;

HIJACKING AND TERRORISM.

II. NIJ RESEARCH INITIATIVES IN LAW ENFORCEMENT

A. I'D LIKE TO BRIEFLY REVIEW SOME NIJ RESEARCH INITIATIVES

IMPACTING LAW ENFORCEMENT TODAY AND IN THE FUTURE -
INITIATIVES WHICH HAVE IMPACTED LAW ENFORCEMENT IN U.S.

AND I HOPE ARE PERTINENT TO THE ISSUES YOU WILL BE

DISCUSSING AT THIS CONFERENCE.

1. PRIVATE SECURITY:

IN U.S. (HALLCREST) PRIVATE SECURITY PERSONNEL OUTNUMBER PUBLIC LAW ENFORCEMENT ABOUT 2 TO 1 -- PRIVATE SECURITY GROWING RAPIDLY.

- O IN 1980, \$22 BILLION FOR PRIVATE SECURITY

 EXPENDITURE -- ONLY \$14 FOR ALL PUBLIC LAW

 ENFORCEMENT -- FEDERAL, STATE AND LOCAL.
- RESEARCH SUGGESTS THAT COMBINED REVENUES FROM
 PRIVATE SECURITY FORCES AND MANUFACTURE OF

DEVICES LIKE ALARMS AND OTHER SECURITY
HARDWARE WILL REACH \$53 BILLION BY 1995.

- NEIGHBORHOODS ARE TURNING TO PRIVATE SECURITY

 SERVICES FOR "WATCHMAN" FUNCTIONS HARD-PRESSED

 POLICE CAN NO LONGER ROUTINELY PROVIDE -- NIJ

 STUDY INDICATES 1 IN 5 AMERICANS HAVE ACTED ON

 THEIR OWN INITIATIVE TO PROTECT THEMSELVES

 FROM CRIME -- WHETHER BY HIRING PRIVATE

 SECURITY -- OR INSTALLING ALARMS AND

 SOPHISTICATED LOCKS.
- O CHALLENGE FOR PUBLIC LAW ENFORCEMENT IS TO
 FORGE COOPERATIVE RELATIONS WITH PRIVATE

 SECURITY -- NOT COMPETING FOR SAME MARKET, BUT
 ADOPTING COMPLIMENTARY ROLES TO PROTECT PUBLIC
 AND MAKE BEST USE OF LIMITED POLICE RESOURCES.

2. CRIME ANALYSIS:

EXPERIMENT IN NEWPORT NEWS -- INNOVATIVE USE OF CRIME AMALYSIS TO REDUCE FEAR OF CRIME -- PROGRAM HAS POTENTIAL TO CHANGE POLICE THINKING ABOUT CRIME AND APPROPRIATE RESPONSES.

3. Domestic Violence:

EXPERIMENT IN MINNEAPOLIS -- EXAMINED EFFECTS OF ARREST AGAINST ORDERING OFFENDER TO LEAVE HOUSE OR COUNSELLING THOSE INVOLVED -- STUDY INDICATED POLICE COULD BE VERY EFFECTIVE IN REDUCING RECURRENCE OF VIOLENCE -- AND THAT ARREST WAS SUCCESSFUL STRATEGY -- (WHERE NO ARREST WAS MADE, THERE WAS A REPEAT OF VIOLENCE IN 35% OF CASES WITHIN A 6 MONTH PERIOD -- FELL TO 17% WHEN ARREST WAS MADE).

O CONDUCTING SIMILAR EXPERIMENT IN OMAHA,

NEBRASKA -- WILL REPLICATE IN SEVERAL

OTHER CITIES TO DEVELOP AND REFINE THIS

STRATEGY IN DEALING WITH DOMESTIC

VIOLENCE.

4. DIFFERENTIAL POLICE RESPONSE:

RESPONSE TIME STUDY CONDUCTED IN 1974 AND

REPLICATED IN '76-'78 -- INDICATED TRADITIONAL

ORGANIZATION AND DEPLOYMENT OF POLICE BASED ON

PREMISE THAT RESPONSE SHOULD ALWAYS BE AS RAPID AS

POSSIBLE WAS ILL-CONCEIVED.

O STUDIES LED TO BASIC CHANGES IN THINKING ABOUT POLICE RESPONSE TO CALLS FOR SERVICE -- MANY DEPARTMENTS NOW USE DPR (DIFFERENTIAL POLICE RESPONSE) TO ASSESS WHICH CALLS HAVE PRIORITY BASED ON SERIOUSNESS OF CRIME AND CHANCE OF IMMEDIATE ARREST.

MANY PROGRESSIVE DEPARTMENTS ARE USING TIME
AND RESOURCES SAVED THROUGH DPR TO MOUNT
PROACTIVE INITIATIVES TARGETED ON PRESSING
PROBLEMS SPECIFIC TO THEIR JURISDICTION.

5. VI-CAP:

NIJ (WITH OFFICE OF JUSTICE PROGRAMS AND FBI)

DEVELOPED INITIATIVE TO APPREHEND SERIAL MURDERERS

-- WENT INTO OPERATION THIS SUMMER AT COST OF \$3

MILLION.

USING LOCAL POLICE REPORTING OF UNSOLVED HOMICIDES, FOR ANALYSIS BY FBI COMPUTER EXPERTS -- TIE APPARENTLY UNRELATED KILLINGS TOGETHER -- ALLOW NETWORKING BETWEEN LOCAL POLICE AROUND COUNTRY TO MOUNT MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL EFFORTS TO IDENTIFY AND APPREHEND SERIAL MURDERERS.

6. CAREER CRIMINALS:

NIJ SPONSORED STUDY BY RAND -- IDENTIFIED HIGHLYACTIVE GROUP OF CRIMINALS WHO COMMIT
DISPROPORTIONATELY HIGH AMOUNT OF CRIME.

O INSTITUTE SEEKING TO DEVELOP AND REFINE MODELS
TO BETTER IDENTIFY SUCH OFFENDERS.

7. NIJ STANDARDS AND TESTING:

NIJ (WITH ARMY AND DUPONT) DEVELOPED KEVLAR SOFT-BODY ARMOR -- SAVED OVER 700 LAW ENFORCEMENT LIVES.

- O INSTITUTE ALSO CONDUCTS STANDARDS TESTING FOR POLICE HELMETS, CARS, TIRES, RADIOS, ETC.
- O DEVELOPED AND TESTED GUN DETECTION EQUIPMENT.

8. Public Service TV Announcements:

NIJ PRODUCED SERIES OF TV VIDEOS -- AIMED AT ENCOURAGING VICTIMS AND WITNESSES TO SUPPORT LAW ENFORCEMENT AND COURTS IN APPREHENDING AND PROSECUTING OFFENDERS -- SERIES AIRING NATIONWIDE UNDER TITLE: "REPORT, IDENTIFY, TESTIFY."

- Institute also produced videotape series

 called "Crime File" -- focuses on most critical

 crime issues and discusses important research

 findings -- aimed at researchers and academics

 -- criminal justice professionals -- policy

 makers and the public.
- 9. Institute co-sponsor of law enforcement seminars held at Harvard University in U.S. -- attended by U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese, Assistant Attorney General Lowell Jensen, your own Sir Kenneth Newman and Leading Police Chiefs.

- O AIM IS TO DEBATE ISSUES -- DEVELOP LAW ENFORCEMENT POLICY AND INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION.
- 10. NIJ ALSO FUNDING PMA IN DISSEMINATION EFFORTS -PMA UTILIZING BEST INSTITUTE RESEARCH IN LAW
 ENFORCEMENT AND MANAGEMENT ISSUES.
 - O SPREADING WORD TO PRACTITIONERS AND GATHERING VALUABLE FEEDBACK ON THEIR EXPERIENCES AND NEEDS.
- 11. FINALLY, IN RESPONSE TO LAW ENFORCEMENT NEEDS --NIJ

 UNDERTOOK EFFORT TO PULL TOGETHER THE LATEST

 RESEARCH FINDINGS AND INNOVATIVE PRACTICES IN THE

 FIELD -- UNDER TITLE: "ISSUES AND PRACTICES"

 SERIES OF REPORTS LOOKS AT:
