DISPOSITIONS AND SENTENCES IN IOWA'S DISTRICT COURTS, FY 1985

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This publication examines dispositions and sentencing in Iowa's District Courts during State Fiscal Year 1985. This is the first publication to examine court dispositions in Iowa since Volume IV of the Statistical Analysis Center's series on Crime and Criminal Justice in Iowa, released in 1980.

This research has been made possible through the cooperation of the county clerks of court throughout lowa. The data presented here have been submitted by the clerks to the Statistical Analysis Center covering court dispositions and sentences between July 1, 1984 and June 30, 1985. Since that time, the clerks have been submitting monthly data, which should be available for analysis in future reports.

Being a first effort, this report is intended to provide readers with a broad overview of disposition and sentencing trends in lowa's district courts. To provide such an overview, this publication has been divided into nine chapters, eight of which include tables presenting disposition and sentencing data. Each of these chapters relies upon the same data, but presents the data in different ways:

Chapter II presents an overview of statewide patterns, and provides figures on felony dispositions by county.

Chapter III presents dispositions and sentences for each felony class (Class A, Class B, Class C against persons, Class C not against persons, Class D against persons, Class D not against persons, and OWI-3) by judicial district, permitting readers to examine differences among lowa's eight judicial districts.

Chapter IV presents statewide data for every offense more serious than simple misdemeanors, with offenses grouped according to their severity level.

Chapter V presents dispositions and sentences for urban and rural areas, again by offense severity, permitting an examination of rural/urban differences in dispositions and sentencing.

Chapter VI examines dispositions and sentencing according to <u>crime type</u> and severity level, breaking out crimes against persons, <u>sex crimes</u> against persons, drug and alcohol offenses, public order crimes, crimes against public justice or authority, property offenses, weapons offenses, operating while intoxicated, and other driving offenses.

Chapter VII contains the same data as Chapter VI, but looks at dispositions and sentencing first by severity level and then by type.

Chapter VIII looks at cases with and without multiple charges, to determine if there are differences in dispositions and sentencing when offenders are charged with more than one offense.

Chapter IX presents information, by judicial district, only for offenses not believed to involve multiple charges. The presentation here is

identical to that in Chapter III, but cases involving companion charges have been excluded.

Chapter X presents dispositions and sentences by the sex of the defendant for all felonies and aggravated and serious misdemeanors.

A synopsis of findings presented here is as follows:

- There were 6,712 felony cases reported disposed of during state FY85 in the 98 counties providing data for this report. Of these cases, 4,241 (63.2%) resulted in conviction, including 1,055 which were reduced.
- The bulk of felony charges in lowa were Class C and Class D felonies not against persons, as only 1,284 (19.1%) of the felonies disposed of were against persons.
- There was a strong relationship between offense severity and the likelihood of imprisonment. Overall, 38.9% of felony convictions resulted in imprisonment (including 100% of the Class A felonies and 92% of the Class B felonies). Felonies against persons were more likely to result in imprisonment than felonies not against persons, irrespective of severity level. Jail sentences and fines were much more commonly used for misdemeanors than for felonies.
- Felony convictions not resulting in imprisonment most often resulted in probation. Few felony convictions resulted in placement in residential facilities, jail commitments, or fines (although figures here for residential placement are incomplete).
- There was great variation in conviction rates from one judicial district to another. Conviction rates were the highest in the First Judicial District (Dubuque and Waterloo) and lowest in the Eighth (Burlington, Fort Madison, Keokuk, Ottumwa). Charge reduction was most frequent in the Fourth District (Council Bluffs) and least common in the Fifth (Des Moines).
- There were similar variations in imprisonment rates from one judicial district to another. The First Judicial District showed the lowest rate of imprisonment for felonies (31.3%), and the Eighth district reported the highest (46.9%). Conversely, the same two districts showed the highest and lowest rates of probation, respectively.
- of total convictions. (While these cases normally result in dismissal of charges, they are included here as convictions because they normally involve some sort of correctional intervention during the period of deferral, usually supervised probation).
- o Disposition and sentencing patterns for Operating While Intoxicated (OWI) were very different from those for other offenses. Conviction rates for OWI were very high (89.1%, versus 73.5% for all felonies and aggravated and serious misdemeanors). OWI also had a higher rate of conviction as charged (84.2% for OWI, vs. 65.4% for all offenses). Some form of sanc-

tion -- prison, probation, jail, or fine -- was also used in a high percentage of OWI cases, compared to other cases of similar severity.

- There was great variation in disposition and sentencing patterns for individual crimes within each severity level. Within Class B felonies, for example, the conviction rate for second-degree homicide was 100%, while the rate for first-degree burglary was only 58.6%. Similarly, there was great variation in rates of imprisonment within each level of severity. Among Class C felonies against persons, for example, the rate of imprisonment for second-degree arson was 40%, while the rate for second-degree robbery was 88.2%).
- Conviction rates for felonies in rural and urban areas showed few differences, although urban areas overall had slightly higher rates (64.3% to 61.9%). Rural areas showed a greater tendency toward charge reduction (20.3% vs. 11.9%). Deferred judgments were more common in urban areas (23.3% vs. 15.2%), while imprisonment was ordered more often in rural areas (40.4% vs. 37.8%).
- There were no clear relationships between crime type and conviction rates, with two exceptions. Conviction rates for OWI (at any level) were higher than for other types of crime. Conviction rates for public order crimes, on the other hand, were much lower than for other crimes types, although the number of public order crimes reported here was small.
- Cases known to involve multiple offenses showed patterns of dispositions and sentences different from those involving single charges. Conviction rates were higher for cases involving single charges, as prosecutors have more opportunity to drop charges (as opposed to reducing charges) when defendants are charged with multiple offenses. Charge reduction was more common when cases involved single charges. Not surprisingly, defendants charged with multiple offenses received more severe sentences, and were less likely to receive deferred judgments.
- Patterns of dispositions and sentencing vary considerably depending on the sex of the defendant. Cases involving women result in dismissal or acquittal slightly more often than those involving men, but result in reduced charges less often. The most interesting differences come in sentencing, as women receive deferred judgments for felonies more than twice as often as men, and are sent to prison less than half as often. Because women frequently do not possess the extensive criminal histories found for many men, one cannot necessarily say from these data that lowa judges sentence women more leniently than men, however. Curiously, women sentenced more OWI-3rd Offense are sentenced to prison more often than men.

I. INTRODUCTION

Clerks of court in lowa have submitted disposition and sentencing data to the State since the early years of this century, first to the Board of Parole under lowa Code section 247.29, and since July, 1985, to the Office for Planning and Programming under section 602.8102 (45). Originally, this information, in rough form, was included in the Biennial Report of the Board of Parole, providing county-based information on the frequency of prison and jail sentences, probation, fines, and deferred judgments.

With the increase in crime and arrests occurring since the 1960's, the task of compiling and analyzing court disposition data has become increasingly complicated. Having staff which had previous experience in working with large criminal justice data bases, the Statistical Analysis Center (SAC) in 1984 was sought out for assistance by the Department of Corrections, which was assisting the Board of Parole compile data for State Fiscal Year 1984. The Department and the SAC combined to enter over 36,000 cases onto computer files, and the SAC took responsibility for developing appropriate computer software to analyze and publish sentencing and disposition data covering SFY84.

With the repeal of lowa Code sections 247.29-32, the Office for Planning and Programming was made the agency responsible for data collection beginning July 1, 1985, and clerks of court were required to submit monthly data on court dispositions and sentences for all crimes more serious than simple misdemeanors. Having learned a great deal from collecting and analyzing the FY84 data, the SAC worked with clerks of court throughout the State to improve the validity and reliability of the information submitted.

The first step in this process was simply to provide clerks with a more complete understanding of what information was to be submitted. Data collection forms implemented by the Board of Parole provided little in the way of direction, listing columns only for an offender's name, the charged offense, and the sentence. Any attempt to be complete in providing sentencing information was very time consuming for clerks' offices, as every detail had to be written in longhand.

More important from an analytic standpoint, the information submitted on the original form was frequently of little use in determining statewide sentencing patterns. Some counties, for example, submitted information on deferred judgments at the end of the deferral period, when a case was dismissed, while the majority submitted deferred judgments at the time of the deferral. Other counties were not specific in indicating whether a suspended sentence was suspended from prison or jail. Still others failed to indicate if deferred judgments or suspended sentences resulted in a period of probation. There also was little consistency in reporting when charges were reduced.

To reduce the workload of clerks' offices in completing sentencing and disposition information, and to increase the accuracy and completeness of the information submitted, a new data collection form was implemented in July, 1985, for clerks' use in submitting monthly data. Because many clerks' offices compiled FY85 data in July, 1985, many of them submitted FY85 data on the new form, dramatically improving the accuracy and completeness of the FY85 data over

FY84. The data elements included on the new data collection form include the following:

A copy of the data collection form will be found in the Appendix.

In addition to these elements, collection of defendant names permits calculation of the number of original charges and the number of conviction offenses. With these elements, combined with information on charge reduction, a cursory examination of the extent of plea bargaining is permitted. Defendant names, incidentally, are not computerized, and are not used in any other portion of this research.

The data submitted by clerks' offices for FY85 are believed to be much more complete and accurate than information covering FY84, particularly information pertaining to charge reduction, the use of residential facilities and community service sentencing, the frequency of restitution and payment of attorney fees, drunken driving school, drug or alcohol treatment and/or diagnosis, and license revocation or suspension. Data on several of these elements, however, may yet be incomplete:

Residential facilities: Commitment to these facilities is sometimes a condition of probation, and may not specifically be included in the sentence order in the possession of clerks. Thus, the use of residential programs as a condition of probation will be underestimated by the FY85 data. Other elements which may be under-reported due to being conditions of probation include drunken driving school and drug or alcohol treatment or diagnosis.

Some variables may not have been reported in some counties be-

cause the old reporting form was used. These include <u>restitution</u>, attorney <u>fees</u>, <u>community service sentences</u>, <u>drunken driving school</u>, <u>drug or alcohol treatment and/or diagnosis</u>, and <u>license revocation or suspension</u>.

In examining the information reported here, the reader should remember that the variables above may very well be under-reported. When data appeared incomplete, however, every effort was made to obtain complete and accurate information by contacting clerks' offices to verify data in cases in which sentences did not fit the normal pattern for the offense in question.

In publishing this information, specific mention must be made of the cooperation received from clerks of court throughout lowa. With few exceptions, clerks' offices have gone out of their way to comply with what may at first appear to be complex new reporting requirements. They have complied quickly when questions have arisen pertaining either to dispositions or sentences. Much of the credit for publication of this information belongs to the clerks.

Due, in part, to previous State failure to inform clerks' offices to the precise information required in each county's report of dispositions and sentences, data here are incomplete for the following offense levels for the following counties:

Woodbury County: No report received for any offenses until preparation of this report was almost complete. No Woodbury County data are included here except in Chapter X. The Appendix also contains complete Third District figures for all felonies. Otherwise, the data here do not include Woodbury County among the Third District figures.


Black Hawk, Dubuque, and Linn Counties: No reports for serious misdemeanors, (including OWI-first offense);

Marshall County: No report for either aggravated or serious misdemeanors (including OWI-first and OWI-second offense).

Each of these counties, however, is currently submitting complete information for FY86, and the omission of some data from these counties here should not be a problem in the future.

II. Felony Dispositions and Sentences

Table 1 presents summary data on felony dispositions and sentences for lowa during State fiscal year 1985. As shown in the table, there were 6,712 cases reported disposed of in the 98 counties submitting data, with 4,241 of those (63.2%) known to result in conviction.** As shown in Figure 1, the bulk of felony charges and convictions were for Class C and D felonies not against persons.*** See Figure 1.

^{***}Offenses here have been divided into several levels for purposes of analysis. They are as follows (with their abbreviations for graphs in parentheses): Class A Felonies (A), Class B Felonies (B), Class C Felonies Against Persons (CAP), Class C Felonies Not Against Persons (CAP), Class D Felonies Not Against Persons (DAP), Class D Felonies Not Against Persons (DAP), and OWI-3 (OWI-3).

DEFINITIONS:

CASES: Number of charges adjudicated in District or Associate District Court. One individual may account for more than one charge.

CONVICTIONS: Number of charges resulting in conviction, not necessarily at the same level of severity as the original charge.

CONVICTED AS CHARGED: Number of charges resulting in conviction with no charge reduction.

REDUCED: Number of charges known to be reduced. Almost all of these were convictions, save a few which were reduced to simple misdemeanors and remanded to magistrates. Conviction on these reduced charges is unknown.

DISMISSED/ACQUITTED: Number of charges resulting in dismissal or acquittal.

THE PERCENTAGES ON ALL OF THE ABOVE ARE BASED UPON THE NUMBER OF TOTAL CASES.

CONVICTIONS: Number of convictions for each particular level of The figure may differ from the conviction figure on the left of the page because the latter includes reduced charges. convictions in number of center is always equal to or greater than the number CONVICTED AS CHARGED on the left of the table. If it is greater, it is due more serious charges being reduced to the specific level or crime in question.

DEFERRED: Number of charges resulting in deferred judgment.

PRISON: Number of charges resulting in imprisonment. Includes shock probation commitments.

PROBATION: Number of charges resulting in SUPERVISED probation. Includes shock probation.

RESIDENTIAL: Number of charges resulting in placement in residential facilities operated by judicial district departments of correctional services. Figures are under-representations of actual placements because many placements come as the result of conditions of probation, and are not necessarily reported to clerks of court, who submitted these data.


JAIL: Number of charges resulting in commitment to jail. Does not include jail sentences which were completely suspended, but does include partial suspensions.

FINE: Number of charges resulting in payment of fines. Includes suspended fines, which are infrequent, but does not include cases in which community service was used in lieu of fines.

PERCENTAGES ON THE RIGHT SIDE OF THE PAGE ARE BASED UPON THE NUMBER OF CONVICTIONS REPORTED IN THE CENTER COLUMN OF THE PAGE.

There appears to be little relationship between charge severity and overall conviction rates, with the two highest rates being for OWI-3 (85.8%) and Class A felonies (74.4%). There was, however, a slight relationship between the seriousness of a charge and the likelihood of conviction as charged. If one excludes Class A felonies (which were few in number), the conviction rate as charged tends to increase as the severity of the crime decreases. Class B felonies have a lower rate than total Class C felonies. Total Class D felonies (including OWI-3) show a higher rate than total Class C felonies (although admittedly the rate for Class C felonies against persons is higher than total Class D felonies).


An opposing relationship is evident with charge reduction. With the exception of Class A felonies, the more serious the charge, the greater the likelihood of charge reduction. Disposition patterns are also shown in Figure 2.



The right half of the Table 1 presents data on convictions, and shows that there were 3,462 known convictions for felonies reported by District Court Clerks in lowa during FY 85. The bulk of these were for property offenses. Note that the number of convictions at each level is either equal to or roughly corresponds to the number of cases resulting in conviction as charged (on the left side of the table). The conviction number on the right generally is larger because it also includes convictions which have resulted from the reduction of more serious charges.

According to these data, 20% of the convictions reported in FY85 were, in fact, deferred judgments, so they technically do not qualify as convictions. Deferred judgments generally result in some form of correctional intervention during the period of deferral, however, and for that reason they are included here as convictions. The majority of these deferred judgments will ultimately result in dismissals.

Commitment to prison obviously correlates very highly with the severity of the sentencing offense. These commitment figures provide much of the rationale for separating crimes against persons from crimes not against persons, however, as conviction for Class D felonies against persons results more often in prison commitment than Class C felonies not against persons. Note that the commitment rate for OWI-3, a Class D felony, closely approximates the rate for Class C felonies not against persons. This is illustrated in Figure 3.

Percentages for referral to probation are generally the inverse of the percentages for commitment to prison, with these two sentencing alternatives involved in 97.5% of the felony sentences in Iowa in FY85.

Felons in lowa are generally not referred either to county jails or to residential facilities, although the figures here for residential facilities are too low because referral to these is frequently a condition of probation and may not be indicated on data submitted by clerks of court.

Table 2 presents the number of felony charges and convictions in each county in the State, by Judicial District. It is presented here to provide some idea of the wide variation in the volume of felony cases from county to county in lowa, and also provide a flavor for the variation in prosecution practices and court operation in lowa's 99 counties.

There are several very important caveats which should be mentioned in conjunction with this table:

- o The table ignores felony charges which were reduced and resulted in misdemeanor convictions. There are many valid reasons for such reductions, but none of these are reflected in the table.
- o The possibility always exists that some of the data received by the Statistical Analysis Center were in error. While a conscientious effort was made to check with county clerks when data appeared suspicious, it is likely that some of the information in this table is incorrect.
- High and low conviction rates on the table should not necessarily be equated with "good" and "bad" conviction rates. There are many reasons for disparity in conviction rates shown here, many of which result from policy decisions made within a County Attorney's office. For example, if an offender breaks into a residence and steals or destroys goods worth over \$500, some county attorneys would simply charge the offender with burglary-2nd. In other counties, however, the policy might be to charge with both burglary-2 and theft-2, the burglary stemming from the breaking and entering and the theft from the loss of goods. In the first situation, the County Attorney might agree to reduce the burglary to theft-2 in exchange for a guilty plea, and the resulting conviction figures would show one case of a conviction at a reduced level. In the other county, the County Attorney might agree to drop the burglary charge in exchange for a guilty plea to theft-2. This county, then, would show a 50% conviction rate overall, with no charge reductions. Thus the policy decisions of the County Attorney in each of these situations has resulted in statistics which look quite different, although for practical purposes the same result has been achieved. Thus the conviction figures presented here may very well be misleading, and may not necessarily be good measures of a county attorney's performance.

Reading the table is relatively straightforward. The three columns on the left-hand side of the page show the number of felony charges disposed of in that county's court system during FY85, breaking out non-OWI felonies, OWI-third offense, and total felonies. The right-hand side of the page shows felony convictions, with the percentages based upon the raw number on the left-hand side of the page (e.g., if there were 30 OWI-3 charges and 20 OWI-3 convictions, the percentage in the conviction column would be 66.7%).

III. Judicial District Data

This chapter takes the statewide data presented in Chapter II and breaks them out by judicial district to provide comparisons in disposition and sentencing patterns from district to district. As in Table 1, offenses here have been broken out by their severity, permitting comparisons not only between and among judicial districts, but between and among judicial districts from one level of severity to another. While one might assume that a district which has high rates of conviction or imprisonment for one level of offense also exhibits similar tendencies for other levels, this is not always the case.

This chapter may be of particular note because it provides the first comparative data of this type in lowa since a 1980 report prepared by the SAC for the lowa Supreme Court. While the chapter is not capable of indicating how similar offenders are sentenced for similar cases from one district to another, it nonetheless can provide some rudimentary information pertaining to sentencing disparity in lowa.

As is evident on Table 3, there was wide variation in the number of cases dealt with in lowa's District Courts during FY85. Of the districts providing complete data (remember that Third District data exclude Woodbury County), the Fourth District (Council Bluffs) as posed of the fewest cases in FY85, with the Fifth District (Des Moines) disposing of the most. The Fourth District had the smallest number of felonies resulting in conviction, with the Fifth District reporting the most. This is illustrated in Figure 5.








There was a wide variation in conviction rates in the eight districts, as well, with the First District (Waterloo, Dubuque) reporting an 81.7% rate, and the Eighth District (Ottumwa, Burlington, Fort Madison) reporting the lowest rate (48.0%). Overall, the 6,712 felonies disposed of resulted in 4,241 known convictions, for a rate of 63.2%. This is illustrated in Figure 6.



The percentage of cases resulting in conviction as charged also varied considerably, with the First District reporting 70.7% of cases resulting with conviction as charged. The Third District, (Northwest lowa) with admittedly incomplete data, showed only 25.8% resulting in conviction as charged.

The extent of plea negotiation, as represented by conviction of reduced charges, also varied widely, with 15.7% of the felony cases statewide resulting in reduced charges. The range of variation was between 9.2% in the Fifth District and 29.4% in the Fourth. This is also shown in Figure 6.

Looking at the right side of Table 3, the Fifth District again shows the highest number of felony convictions, with the Fourth District reporting the lowest of districts providing complete totals. According to these data, there were 3,462 felony convictions in lowa in FY 1985.

Rates of deferred judgment, like conviction rates, varied widely, ranging from 10% in the Third District to 29.0% in the Seventh. Overall, one-fifth of the felony convictions in lowa during this period resulted in deferred judgments (see p. 10 for an indication of why these are included here as convictions). Rates of deferred judgment are shown graphically in Figure 7.


Rates of imprisonment and probation were mirror images, with wide variation across the State. Imprisonment was highest and probation the lowest in the Eighth District, with almost as many going to prison as were placed on probation. In the First District, on the other hand, two cases resulted in probation for every case resulting in imprisonment. This variation is illustrated in Figure 8.

In examining rates of imprisonment and probation, the reader should take care not to read more into the figures than is warranted. The decision to imprison is one of the most awesome responsibilities of the judiciary, one which weighs heavily even on the most experienced jurist. In providing rates of imprisonment and probation here, the intent of this report is not to suggest that high or low rates are either good or bad, but rather simply to illustrate the extent to which sentences may vary from one jurisdiction to another. A host of factors go into a judge's sentencing decision, only one of which is the severity of the conviction offense; thus, the tables here which present rates of imprisonment and probation by offense severity are, by nature, superficial. While one may imply from these tables that judges in the Eighth Judicial District are more likely to imprison felons than are judges in the First District, the reasons for this difference in sentencing practices are not addressed at all It may be that judges in the Eighth District are following the wishes of a more conservative populace than the judges in the First. It may also be that the typical felon sentenced in the Eighth District possesses a lengthier record than the typical felon in other districts. It may be that cases in one district may involve more (or fewer) aggravating or mitigating circumstances than cases in another. Thus, the variation in sentencing shown on tables here should not be interpreted as either good or bad, and high or low rates of imprisonment and probation should not be interpreted as good or bad. Reaching these conclusions is not possible with the data included here.

Incomplete data on residential commitments showed that these were most common in the Fourth District, with only 4.3% of the felony convictions statewide resulting in referral to these facilities.

Jail and fines were also seldom-used for convicted felons, with less than 2% of convictions resulting in jail terms. (Data later in this report will show that these are much more common for misdemeanors). Fines were levied in less than 5% of the felony convictions, with a high figure (15.8%) in those counties in the Third District which reported data.


CONVICTIONS RESULTING IN DEFERRED JUDGMENTS

Table 4 examines all felonies against persons, regardless of felony class, by judicial district. As has been seen in earlier tables, there is a great variation among the districts in the number of felonies against persons disposed of during FY85, with a low of 104 in the Fourth District (excluding the incomplete Third District) and a high of 291 in the Fifth District. Conviction rates varied from 42.9% in the Eighth District to 78.4% in the First. Cases resulting in conviction of the original charge ranged between 10.4% in the Third District to 61.9% in the First. Charge reduction also varied widely.

As would be expected from the violent nature of these crimes against persons, rates of deferred judgment were low and rates of imprisonment were high. Only 6.2% of these convictions resulted in deferred judgments, with 67.4% resulting in imprisonment, more than two for each probation. It should be remembered that a number of these crimes are classified as forcible felonies by the Code of lowa, and may not result in probation unless judgment is deferred. The percentages of those granted probation or sent to prison for felonies against persons are shown in Figure 9.





Table 5 permits a look at the disposition and sentences of crimes not against persons, excluding OWI charges. A comparison between this table and Table 4 shows generally higher conviction rates, presumably due to the less serious nature of crimes not against persons, with rates of conviction ranging between 49.7% in the incomplete Third District and 81.3% in the First. These same two district had the low and high rates of conviction as charged. See Figure 10.

Charge reductions for crimes not against persons ranged from about one case in fourteen in the Seventh District (Davenport) to one in four in the Third.



Turning to convictions, one sees much higher rates of deferred judgment for crimes not against persons, with the state average being 25.9% of all convictions. Judges in the Third District gave the smallest percentage of deferred judgment (13%) and those in the Seventh District the most (36.5%). Rates of imprisonment tended to be slightly higher than rates of deferred judgments, but nothing like the 11:1 ratio seen for crimes against persons.

While crimes against persons were more likely to result in imprisonment than probation, the reverse was true for crimes not against persons, with about two probations for each prison sentence. Judges in the Eighth District were least likely to grant probation and most likely to imprison. The breakdown of prison sentences and probation for crimes not against persons is shown in Figure 11.

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

Table 7 presents similar information for Class B felonies, and shows the dispositions of 253 Class B felony charges in lowa in FY 1985. While conviction rates for Class B felonies were not inconsistent with those for other felonies, the rate of conviction as charged was by far the lowest among all the felony classes. Only one-quarter of these charges resulted in conviction at the original level, while more than one-third of the cases were reduced. As seen previously, there was great variation from district to district in these rates, with the highest conviction rates in the Second (Ames) and First Districts, and the lowest in the Sixth District (Cedar Rapids) almost as low. The extent of charge reduction ranged from 22% in the Fifth and Sixth Districts to 68.8% in the Second.

Looking at convictions, the rate of imprisonment for Class B felonies, all of which are forcible felonies, was very high, as expected. Figure 12 shows the rate of imprisonment for each judicial district and statewide. Note that the only probations for Class B felonies came as the result of deferred judgments.

Table 8 shows data on Class C felonies against persons, 415 of which were disposed of in District Courts in Iowa during FY85. The conviction rate for these offenses was the lowest of any felony category, with only 55.5% resulting in conviction. Fewer of the Class C felonies against persons were reduced than was true for Class B felonies, however, so a higher percentage resulted in conviction as originally charged.

Conviction rates ranged from 35.0% in the portion of the Third District providing data, up to 72.5% in the Second District. The percentage convicted as charged varied similarly, ranging from 5.0% to 57.1%.

As was true for the Class A and Class B felonies, most of those convicted of Class C felonies against persons were committed to prison, with commitment rates ranging from 56.5% in the Seventh District to 100% in the Third and Fourth Districts (only one case, however in the Third District). Almost all of the remaining sentences involved probation.

Table 9 presents a similar data for Class C felonies not against persons. It is accompanied by Figure 13, which illustrates the rate of imprisonment for all Class C felonies.

The table shows a higher rate of convictions here than for all other felonies, with the exception of Class A felonies and OWI-3. Generally, the crimes not against persons have higher conviction rates than those against persons, and the Class C felonies are no exception. Also, a much higher percentage of these Class C felonies resulted in conviction as charged, with fewer charge reductions.

Again, however, we see great variation between judicial districts, as rates of conviction as charged ranged from 25.5% to 76.4%.

As would be expected, deferred judgments here were higher than for Class C felonies against persons, and incarceration rates were lower. About three convictions resulted in probation for every two leading to prison.



Tables 10 and 11 examine Class D felonies, and show the same types of variation evident on earlier tables. Great variation is present in conviction rates, charge reduction, and percentage convicted as charged. Great variation is also evident in rates of imprisonment and probation. Class D felonies are also more likely to result in placement in a residential facility than the more serious felonies.

One interesting contrast on the table is imprisonment and probation rates in the First and Second Judicial Districts. For every prison commitment, the First District reported more than two probations. In the Second District, these figures are reversed. The Second District shows by far the highest imprisonment rate for Class D felonies against persons, with the First showing the lowest.

These rankings are approximately the same for Class D felonies not against persons, with the First District imprisoning the least and the Second District the most. Rates of imprisonment for all Class D felonies are shown graphically in Figure 14.



Table 12 provides a comparison of Judicial District activity on third-offense drunken driving cases in lowa's district courts during FY 1985. The first item of note on the table is the conviction rate for this crime, which is considerably higher than for any other class of felonies. Almost two-thirds of those charged with OWI-3 are convicted of that offense, with another 19.5% being convicted of reduced charges.

Conviction rates were high in each judicial district, ranging from 75.8% in the Seventh District to 93.2% in the First. Three districts attained conviction rates in excess of 90%.

While there was consistency in overall conviction rates, there was considerable variation in the degree to which charges were reduced. Only 6.8% of the cases in the First District were reported reduced, while 37.1% were so reported in the Sixth District.

There was similar variation in the degree to which conviction for OWI-3 resulted in imprisonment. Statewide, 38.8% of the convictions resulted in imprisonment, but percentages in the judicial districts ranged from 23.5% in the First District to 61.0% in the Seventh. Looking at this variation in another way, while the First District had ten more convictions for OWI-3 than the Seventh, the latter imprisoned 13 more offenders. Imprisonment rates are shown in Figure 15.



IV. Disposition and Sentencing Data for Specific Offenses

This chapter presents disposition and sentencing data like those in the previous chapter, but provides this information on an offense-by-offense basis. Because of the smaller numbers of offenses dealt with here, figures are not broken down by judicial district, and only state totals are provided.

The data here are broken out in the same manner as Chapter III, with Class A Felonies grouped together, Class B Felonies grouped together, and so on. With this methodology, the reader can obtain an idea of differences in processing and sentencing within each felony class.

For reference purposes, a list of the tables in this chapter is as follows:

Table 13 includes all Class A felonies;

Table 14 includes all Class B felonies:

Table 15 includes Class C felonies against persons;

Table 16 includes Class C felonies not against persons;

Table 17 includes Class D felonies against persons;

Table 18 includes Class D felonies not against persons;

Table 19 includes Aggravated Misdemeanors against persons;

Table 20 includes Serious Misdemeanors against persons;

Table 21 includes Aggravated Misdemeanors not against persons;

Table 22 includes Serious Misdemeanors not against persons;

Table 23 includes misdemeanor OWI offenses;

Table 24 provides a summary on all misdemeanors.

This chapter is intended as a source of comparative data on specific offenses in lowa, and, with four exceptions, the graphics seen in earlier chapters are not included here. The four bar graphs in this chapter present sentencing patterns for selected Class C and Class D felonies (Figures 16 and 17), sentences for Aggravated and Serious Misdemeanors (Figure 18), and sentences for all three levels of OWI (Figure 19). in Chapter III are not included here.

Patterns in the misdemeanor data show some similarities to those for felonies. Overall conviction rates are similar, with the OWI offenses showing much higher rates of conviction than other offenses. Crimes against persons typically showed slightly lower conviction rates than crimes not against persons, with more frequent charge reduction as well.

Sentences for misdemeanors, not surprisingly, showed little similarity with felony sentences. While probation is used frequently for misdemeanants, prison sentences are rare, even for those convicted of crimes against persons.

Probation figures here represent only <u>supervised</u> probation, and do not include unsupervised or "self" probation, probation to the court, or probation to the clerk of court (some districts use probation to the court or court clerk until a fine is paid). Such unsupervised probation is common for misdemeanants, but is not reflected in the figures shown here.

It is apparent that fines and jail sentences are much more common for misdemeanants than for felons, with the former used in more than half the misdemeanor cases, and the latter used in about four cases out of ten.









V. Disposition and Sentencing Patterns in Rural and Urban Areas

This brief chapter examines differences in rural and urban dispositions and sentences for all felony classes. For the purposes of this chapter, urban counties include Black Hawk, Dubuque, Woodbury (which did not report), Pottawattamie, Polk, Story, Linn, Johnson, and Scott. All other counties were included among the rural counties.

The data here show generally that conviction rates in lowa for felonies tend to be higher in the more urban counties (64.3% vs. 61.9%), with a much higher percentage in urban counties being convicted of the original charge (52.7% to 41.8%). Charge reduction was more common in the rural counties (20.3% to 11.9%).

Sentencing patterns also showed some differences, with the urban counties more likely to report deferred judgments than the rural counties, which reported a slightly higher rate of imprisonment. Because of more suspended sentences, urban counties tended to report higher rates of probation.

Use of residential facilities, fines, and jail terms for felons was low in both rural and urban areas, with the rural areas showing greater use of each of these sentencing alternatives. Remember, however, that figures here for residential facilities are underestimations because placements in such facilities are frequently conditions of probation, and are not necessarily reported to the clerk of court.










CLASS OF OFFENSE BY AREA

VI. Disposition and Sentencing Patterns by Offense Type and Severity

This chapter examines disposition and sentencing patterns in lowa in a different way, looking not only at the severity of crimes but also their type, as well. In looking at dispositions and sentences by type, we divide crimes into the following categories.

Crimes against persons
Sex crimes against persons
Drug and alcohol offenses
Crimes against public peace (public order crimes)
Crimes against justice
Crimes against morality
Property crimes
Weapons offenses
Operating While Intoxicated (OWI)
Driving offenses

Within each of these offense types, information here is presented for each level of crime (e.g., Class A felonies, Class B felonies, etc.). With this format, the reader can tell how offenses of each type vary in disposition and sentence as the severity of crime goes up or down.

In examining these tables, the reader should note that not all crime types have offenses in each severity level. Crimes against persons and sex crimes against persons are the only crime types that include Class A felonies, for example (first degree homicide, kidnapping, and sex abuse).

Examining sentencing patterns in this manner is particularly interesting, as it is clear within each type of crime that imprisonment rates drop with reduced severity as probation rates go up. The use of fines and jail also rises dramatically as offense severity decreases.

VII. Dispositions and Sentencing Patterns by Offense Severity and Type

These tables are similar to those in the previous chapter, examining dispositions and sentences by crime type and severity. In this chapter, however, offense severity is the independent variable, and dispositions and sentences are presented for each crime type within each level of severity. In theory, the type of crime should have little to do with dispositions and sentences within each severity level. Dispositions and sentences for Class C crimes against persons, for example, should differ little from dispositions and sentences for Class C sex crimes against persons. In fact, the former result much less in imprisonment (72.4% to 93.9%) and much more in probation (25.7% to 6.1%). Bar graphs showing differences in sentences are presented accompanying several of the tables here to assist the reader in identifying patterns in sentencing practices.

SENTENCING FOR SELECTED CLASS C FELONY TYPES




VIII. Disposition and Sentencing for Cases With and Without Multiple Charges

One of the factors coming into play during adjudication and sentencing of cases is whether offenders have been charged with multiple offenses. Obviously, defendants charged with multiple offenses are more likely to be viewed by both the prosecution and judiciary as being more of a threat to public safety than defendants charged with single offenses. The processing of those charged with multiple offenses may thus take a different complexion than the processing of single-charge cases. In instances of multiple charges, the prosecution also has additional leverage in the plea bargaining process, and may, for example, obtain higher rates of conviction on serious charges in exchange for dropping less serious charges.

This chapter examines processing and sentencing by dividing cases into those known to have companion charges and those believed not to have companion charges. The distinction between the two here is clearly not precise, however, as there has been no specific requirement for clerks of court to identify defendants charged with more than one offense. Thus the identification of these charges was made by the Statistical Analysis Center and based upon a defendant's name; when, in a list of a county's cases, one defendant was named more than one time, and it appeared that the cases were adjudicated and/or sentenced at about the same time, the case was noted as involving multiple charges. While the SAC made every effort to identify all such cases, there is no doubt that some have escaped our attention. This chapter, then, is included here not to provide specific figures which differentiate single charge adjudication and multiple charge adjudication, but to give some indication of the tendencies in each situation.

As in previous chapters, cases here have been divided into level of severity, with figures provided separately for Class A Felonies, Class B Felonies, and so forth.

Several trends are apparent in the data presented here. First, it is evident that conviction rates are much higher when defendants are charged with single offenses (70.0% vs. 53.4%). This make some sense because when multiple charges are made, prosecutors are presented with the possibility of dropping some charges in exchange for guilty pleas on others.

Charge reduction was also more likely in cases involving only single charges. This is similarly not surprising, as when there is only a single charge, the prosecutor may be more likely to offer to reduce a charge to obtain a guilty plea than when there are multiple charges (when prosecutors would be more likely to drop charges than reduce them).

When it comes to sentencing, however, the pattern changes, and those charged with multiple offenses obviously are penalized. While the common knowledge among offenders may be that all offenses after the first are "freebies" (because charges are likely to be dropped), the data here do not support this position.

Offenders charged only with single offenses were almost four times more likely to obtain deferred judgments than those charged with multiple offenses, according to these data. They also are only about half as likely to be committed

to prison, and have almost twice the rate of probation. They have slightly higher rates of commitment to residential facilities and jail, and are fined almost twice as often, perhaps reflecting the greater likelihood of charge reduction (remember that fines and jail are used more often for those convicted of misdemeanors).

While the data here have not been broken out by judicial district, readers desiring such information can obtain it by contacting the Statistical Analysis Center.



IX. Disposition and Sentencing in Cases Involving only Single Charges

This chapter combines the features of Chapter III and Chapter VIII in presenting disposition and sentencing data only for cases not believed to involve multiple charges. Like Chapter III, it presents data by judicial district, by severity level. Like Chapter VIII, it examines dispositions and sentences for offenses not involving multiple charges or parole or probation revocation.

To some degree this chapter is an attempt to examine dispositions and sentences while restricting the influence of multiple charges or a defendant's status on probation or parole. The data here are, to some extent, the best data to examine "pure" disposition and sentencing patterns in each judicial district without the influence of external factors. In some instances, the data in Chapter III could be misleading, as one judicial district may have a higher percentage of cases involving multiple charges or probation or parole violations than another, and its disposition and sentencing practices may appear harsher or more lenient as a result. Such a possibility should not exist in the data presented here.

As noted in the last chapter, the distinction between cases involving multiple charges and those involving only single charges here is not absolute. The identification of cases involving multiple charges or probation or parole violation was made by the Statistical Analysis Center, as clerks of court were not required to make such identification when they submit data. While care has been taken to identify cases involving multiple charges, some undoubtedly have been missed, and the reader should take that into cognizance.

X. Disposition and Sentencing Patterns by Sex

This chapter presents dispositions and sentences for all felonies and aggravated and serious misdemeanors, by sex. Offenses are broken out as in previous chapters.

This chapter, unlike the others, includes data for the entire state, as Woodbury County data were received prior to the preparation of this chapter. The Woodbury County data, however, like the data of several other metropolitan counties, do not contain aggravated and serious misdemeanors except where felony charges have been reduced, so while the felony data here are complete, there remains an under-representation of data on misdemeanors.

There are several patterns which are clear in the data. First, it is evident that men are adjudicated in lowa's court system much more frequently than women, particularly when the charges involve crimes against persons. Conviction rates for men tend to be slightly higher than for women, although this is true primarily because of higher conviction rates for felonies against persons. For felonies not against persons, the conviction rate for women is slightly higher than for men. Cases involving men, however, result in charge reduction more often than cases involving women.

Women are much more likely to receive deferred judgments than men, and this is quite apparent when one examines the rate of commitment to prison, which was more than twice as high for men as for women. This was particularly true for felonies not against persons, as 35.5% of the cases involving men sentenced for these offenses resulted in commitment to prison, versus only 14.2% for women.

The pattern for OWI-3 was different than for other felonies, as the commitment rate for women was higher than for men. More men than women were jailed or placed in residential facilities, however, so the overall rate of incarceration was still slightly higher for men.

In the case of misdemeanors, while there were no clear differences in adjudication patterns for men and women, there remained some differences in sentencing practices. Women received probation more often than men when convicted of misdemeanors, partially a result of receiving more frequent deferred judgments. Men more often were jailed or fined when convicted of misdemeanors, although women convicted of OWI-2 were jailed or fined slightly more often than men. It is not clear why women convicted of OWI-3 or OWI-2 are apparently treated more harshly than men convicted of the same offenses. In other felonies and aggravated and serious misdemeanors, men generally are more likely to be imprisoned, jailed, or fined.






