SUMMARY: This data collection describes the volume of juvenile cases disposed during calendar year 1983 in courts having jurisdiction over juvenile matters (delinquency and dependency/neglect cases) in the fifty states, the District of Columbia, and the territories of the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico. This collection is the oldest continuous source of information on the processing of delinquent and dependent youth done by juvenile courts, a record inaugurated in 1926 to furnish an index of the general nature and extent of the problems brought before the juvenile courts. UNIVERSE: Delinquency and dependency/neglect cases disposed in 1983 by courts in the United States having jurisdiction over juvenile matters. NOTE: The "unit of count" varies across sources. Introduction

This data file is the basis of Juvenile Court Statistics: 1983. This series of reports, the oldest continuous source of information on juvenile courts' processing of delinquent and dependent youth, was inaugurated in 1926 by the Children's Bureau of the United States Department of Labor and is now maintained in the National Juvenile Court Data Archive by the National Center for Juvenile Justice under contract to the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, U.S. Department of Justice. The report describes in quantitative terms the volume of juvenile cases disposed by courts during the calendar year 1983. The data base contains all available summary information on children's cases disposed in courts having jurisdiction over juvenile matters—delinquency, status, and dependency/neglect—in the fifty states, the District of Columbia, and the territories of the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico.

During its history, the series has undergone modifications in objectives, reporting procedures, and content. In 1923, a committee of the National Probation Association outlined the early purposes of the Juvenile Court Statistics series, as follows:

- 1. To furnish an index of the general nature and extent of the problems brought before the juvenile courts;
- 2. To show the extent and nature of service given by courts in such a way that significant trends in methods of treatment and in scope and volume of juvenile court work would be brought out;
- 3. To point out significant factors contributing to the problems coming before the courts in order to throw light on possibilities of correction and prevention; and
- 4. To show the extent to which service given by courts has been effective in correcting social problems.

Initially, annual reports included information and analyzed trends on factors such as gender, race, home conditions, reason referred, place of detention care, and disposition. Beginning in 1952, the information requested from juvenile courts became limited to a summary count of delinquency, dependency/neglect, and special proceedings cases handled with or without the filing of a petition. These reports combined traffic cases with delinquency cases; not until 1958 were traffic cases identified separately. Later, variations in juvenile court jurisdiction over traffic cases and frequent changes in laws affecting this jurisdiction made it difficult to determine national trends. Therefore, beginning in 1970, the report excluded ordinary traffic cases and, for similar reasons, beginning in 1975, excluded special proceedings.

The aggregation of individual county caseload figures may encourage comparisons of the workloads of different jurisdictions for the reporting year and individual courts over time. However, for several reasons researchers are cautioned not to draw comparisons based on these summary figures alone. There are wide variations in the responsibilities

and problems faced by individual courts. For example, some courts have jurisdiction over all children below the age of 18, while in others some of these individuals may by law fall under the jurisdiction of the adult criminal justice system. In addition, individual jurisdictions because of their geographical, economic, sociological, and judicial characteristics may be faced with differing problems affecting the quantity and nature of cases coming to the juvenile courts' attention.

Another problem is the inconsistency in the units of count of the summary statistics. "Unit of count" is the standard of measurement by which summary data are reported. For this data base the preferred unit of count is the 'case disposed'. This represents a child referred to the juvenile court on a new referral for delinquency or dependency/neglect, regardless of the number of charges involved. A case is 'disposed' when, after assessing the situation, some definite action is taken or some treatment plan is decided upon or begun. It must be strongly emphasized that not all courts collect statistics using this unit of count. The National Juvenile Court Data Archive houses all juvenile court data regardless of the structure of the information and, therefore, not all figures contained in this data base represent a 'case disposed'. The data documentation for each data source specifies its unit(s) of count and should be consulted prior to any use of the data.

The following examples may help to clarify some of the distinctions captured by various units of count. Within a single referral a child can be charged with one or more offenses. For instance, a juvenile may be referred for trespassing, burglary and vandalism. The preferred unit of count would consider this as the beginning of a single case which would be tallied as a referral disposed when either the case is dismissed, handled informally without the filing of a petition, or, if petitioned, after the adjudicatory hearing or (if necessary) the disposition hearing is completed. However, in some jurisdictions, this example would be considered to be three cases because of the number of charges involved. Or it may be tallied at the time of referral and not at the time of disposition. In another situation a child may be referred to court more than once in a year. Assume a child is referred to juvenile court first for assault and again a week later for motor vehicle theft. Both incidents may be handled at one hearing, and the youth may be institutionalized. The preferred unit of count, the 'case disposed', would count this as two cases. This would not be considered a single case since two separate referrals were involved. However, some data collection procedures may count this as one case because there was only one dispositional hearing. Anyone using these data is urged to be familiar with the unit(s) of count (or any other qualifications) prior to analysis.

Methods

Most of the data in this base were originally compiled by state agencies responsible for the collection and dissemination of their state's juvenile court statistical information. Some individual jurisdictions which collected statistics on their juvenile court activity were contacted when the state level system was either less complete or non-

existent. With the exceptions of Alaska, Connecticut, Florida, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands, all data were aggregated in county units. Alaska reported data aggregated at the superior court level. Connecticut, which has a statewide juvenile court system, reported data aggregated in juvenile venue districts. Florida's data were reported in the districts utilized by the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services. Puerto Rico's data were aggregated at the district court level. The Virgin Islands reported the data in terms of the three major islands comprising the territory. Therefore, the level of data aggregation varied. For simplicity, the term 'county' will be used to identify the reporting unit, although users should be aware that in some instances this may be an imprecise designation.

To document the juvenile courts' volume of delinquency and dependency/neglect cases disposed, Juvenile Court Statistics data forms (JCS survey forms) and coding instructions were mailed to agencies in each of the 50 states (or individual jurisdictions), the District of Columbia, and the territories of Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Information was requested on the number of male and female delinquency and dependency/neglect cases disposed with and without the filing of a petition in each county (or reporting unit). Since state juvenile codes do not contain uniform definitions of the terms "delinquent," "dependency/neglect," and "case" the coding instructions emphasized the need to provide statistics consistent with the definitions provided (see definition of terms below). In those instances where the data suppliers were not able to report their data using the preferred unit of count, they were asked to indicate what their figures actually represented. Along with the completed JCS survey forms, data were abstracted from annual reports and, in a large number of instances, from data tapes generated by automated reporting systems. If questions arose concerning the data, the data supplier was contacted for further clarification.

Definitions

Listed below are terms and their definitions needed to understand the figures contained in the file. Although the terms are not unique to this data base, their definitions may be and, therefore, users are cautioned not to assume they understand the terms before carefully reading each definition.

DELINQUENCY CASES are referrals to juvenile court for acts defined in state statutes as violations of a state law or municipal ordinance by children or youth within the age of juvenile court jurisdiction or for conduct so seriously antisocial as to interfere with the rights of others or to menace the welfare of the delinquent child or the community. The aforementioned definition of delinquency includes status offenses, conduct which violates the law only when committed by a child (i.e., truancy, ungovernable behavior, running away, curfew and liquor law violations). Excluded from this report are the following: (1) ordinary traffic cases handled by juvenile courts, except those which are handled as "juvenile delinquency" cases because of their serious nature; (2) all adult cases in which the complaint is made against the adult, such as contributing to the delinquency of a minor, offenses

against children, nonsupport, and the establishment of paternity; and (3) aid-to-families-with-dependent-children cases in which the court's administration of funds for and to dependent children is the only reason for court referral.

DEPENDENCY/NEGLECT CASES are referrals for neglect or inadequate care on the part of the parents or guardians. This includes incidents of lack of adequate care or support resulting from death, absence, or physical or mental incapacity of the parents; abandonment or desertion; abuse or cruel treatment; and improper or inadequate conditions in the home.

MANNER OF HANDLING classifies the processing of the case through the court system into one of two general categories. "Petitioned" cases are those placed on the official court calendar for adjudication by a judge or referee through the filing of a petition, affidavit, or other legal instrument used to initiate court action. "Nonpetitioned" cases are those cases which are not placed on the official court calendar through the filing of a petition or affidavit but which are adjusted by a judge, referee, probation officer, other officer of the court, or agency statutorily designated to conduct petition screening for the juvenile court. Also included are those cases which were handled by the probation officer or were dropped or withdrawn without being placed on the calendar for hearing by the judge although petitions were filed.

UNIT OF COUNT (preferred) is the case which is defined as a referral disposed. Each case represents a child referred to the juvenile court on a new referral for delinquency or dependency/neglect. A case is disposed when, after assessing the situation, some definite action is taken or some treatment plan is decided upon or begun. The date of disposition determines in what calendar year the case is counted, not the date of referral. Therefore, a case can be referred in one calendar year but not disposed (and counted) until the next. Each referral may contain one or more charges (offenses). One child may be involved in a number of cases within a calendar year. Each child in a group is counted as a separate case even though they may be referred to the court as a group. However, it cannot be too strongly emphasized that the unit(s) of count of the data from a specific source may vary from the preferred unit of count. These differences are identified for the user in the footnotes associated with each data source.

For those jurisdictions which did not report in geographic units consistent with Census' boundaries, a County Number unique to this data base was assigned. See the Appendix for a complete list of reporting units and their FIPS Codes.

Data Documentation

This section lists by state (1) the source of the data, (2) the mode of transmission, and (3) the characteristics of the data reported. State and local agencies responsible for the collection of their juvenile court statistics compiled the data found in this file.

Agencies transmitted these juvenile court caseload data to the National Center for Juvenile Justice in one of three different modes. First, many jurisdictions were able to provide the project with an automated data file which contained a detailed description of each case processed by their juvenile courts. Next, some agencies completed a juvenile court statistics (JCS) survey form provided by the project which requested the number of male and female delinquency and dependency/ neglect cases disposed with and without the filing of a petition within each county. Finally, statistics for some jurisdictions were abstracted from their annual reports. In these instances, the name of the report and the page on which the information is found are listed.

The notes following each data source describe the nature of the "delinquency," "dependency/neglect," and/or "total" data found in the data file. For example, one agency may report delinquency data which contain the number of male petition, female petition, male nonpetition, and female nonpetition cases; another may report the number of petition and the number of nonpetition cases without a gender breakdown; and another may only report the total number of cases handled by the juvenile court. While many states reported their data using the "case disposed" unit of count, there are several which reported offenses (charges) referred, filings, arraignment or dispositional hearings, or youth. Consequently, the unit of count varies across sources and, therefore, the data notes for each source must be reviewed before any attempt is made to combine data across sources.
