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SECTION I

INTRODUCTION

MISSION STATEMENT

The primary functions of the Department of Parole and Probation are to protect the public, to enforce payment of restitution to victims when appropriate, and to assist in seeing that offenders are justly punished and/or receive appropriate treatment.

To achieve those ends the Department must:

- A. Assure its recommendations at the presentence level offer the courts sentencing alternatives which provide for protection of the community, appropriate punishment and/or treatment for the offender and, where applicable, victim compensation. Also, for purposes of accountability, the judgments made in these areas will be based as much as possible on overt objective factors.
- B. In the area of supervision our practices must be aimed at monitoring the behavior of offenders and taking an active role in enforcing the rules of parole/probation and the laws of Nevada, to control the risk of offenders committing further crimes. At the same time we must recognize that the greatest benefit to all parties would derive from the offender turning from crime and becoming a productive member of the community. Therefore, it is equally important for us to extend all efforts in assisting the offender in establishing and achieving legitimate goals. We should endeavor to establish clear behavioral expectations for the offender, while primarily concentrating on those areas most directly related to criminal behavior. Department policies and procedures as they relate to the offender should guarantee fair and consistent treatment, and should be aimed toward accomplishing objectives in the least restrictive fashion possible.
- C. Finally, the Department should establish internal systems to ensure its actions are consistent with the above description. We must continuously examine and assess our knowledge, techniques and procedures, while maintaining an awareness of our fiscal responsibility to the citizens of Nevada.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS WITHIN PAROLE AND PROBATION

Volunteers in Probation (VIP) Program

Nevada Adult Parole and Probation has long recognized the benefits of volunteers and student interns. We initially operated with the assistance of an LEAA Grant from 1975 to 1977. The grant was not renewed and the VIP Program existed on the "volunteer efforts" of Parole and Probation Officers until 1981 when the Legislature authorized a VIP Coordinator position, presently located in the Las Vegas office. During these times of restricted resources and increased offender caseload, VIP's enable the agency to continue with and supplement existing community services and other Department functions.

The VIP's perform a number of services under the supervision of a VIP Coordinator or officer. Individual district needs determine duties, i.e., clerical assistance, employment development, counseling, training and certified preliminary hearing officers, restitution technicians, assistance in presentence investigations, foreign language translators, etc. Our VIP's come from every strata of the community: students, housewives, professionals, retired individuals, handicapped, service organizations and law enforcement. Their abilities and time allow staff to supplement and enhance community supervision goals.

The Department is extremely proud of its core of volunteers who give so unselfishly for the benefit of our community. The fiscal savings they afford the taxpayer is significant and the assistance they lend to offenders in their various roles is immeasurable. Over the biennium a monthly average of 163 volunteers worked a total of more than 29,000 hours. The equivalent dollar value for this time is in excess of \$250,000.

Nevada Street Readiness Program

The Nevada Street Readiness Program was first instituted in March, 1981, in the Northern Nevada Correctional Center and is under the direction of the Department of Parole and Probation in cooperation with the Nevada Department of Prisons. The program's basic format consists of a classroom setting for those inmates about to be released back into the community on parole, and those committed for 120-day evaluations who are returning to the court for sentencing. inmates become students three hours a day for a period of three weeks, normally just prior to their release. They are instructed in the basic expectations of a parole of probation agreement, plus a variety of human relations and social skills, employment, citizenship and financial responsibility skills during this period of intensive The combined efforts of some 30 or 40 community voluninstruction. teers are aimed at motivating the inmate to "make it on the streets" rather than return to prison on a new conviction or parole or probation violation.

Thus far, the Street Readiness Program has graduated over to 2,800 offenders since March, 1981. The Department is continuing in its studies regarding recidivism and the inmates that graduated from the Street Readiness Program, as compared to those who did not.

Subsequent to its inception, the Department has instituted the program at the Women's Prison, the Southern Nevada Institutions, and is operating the program for individuals residing in the community who are presently under supervision.

Due to its almost total dependence on community volunteers, the program has received international attention and is considered to be on the forefront of meaningful and fiscally responsible rehabilitation efforts.

Intensive Supervision Program

In the Las Vegas and Reno offices Intensive Supervision Programs are in effect. They are designed to service those in the offender population designated either as career criminals, serious drug abusers/dealers, or those who have specialized dependent needs. Caseloads for officers in these units are reduced and expectations of supervision are increased. It is felt that through a more intensive involvement in the supervision of these cases, the needs of the community will be best met. This is done through intensive surveillance, enforcement practices, counseling and referral.

Job Developer Program

In 1976, pursuant to a Federal Grant, a full-time Job Developer position was created in District IV, Las Vegas. Operating under the philosophy that employment is a key to success and that the unemployed offenders are more prone to create problems within the community, it was that officer's full-time job to canvas community employers and, in effect, create a "job bank" from which supervising officers could draw to assist offenders with employment.

After the Federal Grant had expired, the position was rejuvenated in both the Reno and Las Vegas offices, being handled by Senior Officers in those districts. The Department continues to view the existence of Job Developer positions in Reno and Las Vegas as a high priority area. It is through a concerted effort on the part of dedicated professionals that jobs in the work place are generated for offenders under supervision.

Community Service as a Condition of Probation

The 1981 Legislature authorized the inclusion of community service as a condition of probation. This provides a probationer be ordered to complete a period of supervised community service work. Since then, each of the Department's districts have become deeply involved with the practice of community service as directed by the courts. The benefits to the community and the effect the work has on the offender are viewed as highly beneficial options in dealing with criminal justice sanctions.

The agency is very enthused about having this additional option available when making recommendations the the court, and in providing some return to the community by the offender in repayment for the offenses committed. On a statewide basis, community service offenders worked in excess of 54,000 hours, equaling a dollar amount of over \$190,000.

District Warrant Units

The Department has had a Special Services Unit in the Central Office for some time. In addition to the Central Officer operation, special warrant officer caseloads are in existence in Reno and Las Vegas, the purpose of which is to research fugitive files and select those cases in which it appeared reasonable to believe that they were still in Nevada, and then make extensive attempts to locate and arrest the violators.

Since the initiation of these district positions, a large number of absconders have been apprehended through the warrant officer/fugitive recovery units. It appears the continuation of the functions of these positions have proven to be of great value in protecting the community through fugitive apprehension.

Restitution

The repayment of restitution by offenders to the victims of crime has been a vital component of rehabilitation and compensation programming within the agency for many years. Special emphasis over the recent past has been given to the collection of restitution. Through efforts made by staff on behalf of victims, the Department continues to collect restitution where possible.

For the biennium, restitution collected statewide totaled 1.5 million dollars. The agency feels providing services to the victims through the collection of restitution is a crucial function within the Department.

Case Management System

Over the past biennium a Case Management System has been maintained. With the dedication and efforts of all staff, this Department now operates more effectively in several respects. Based on a proven model, a method was developed to measure and record the extent of 'risk and needs' each offender demonstrates. Predicated on these findings, the parolee or probationer is classified and treated accordingly in conjunction with several available treatment approaches. These treatment approaches are also developed from a formalized procedure known as Strategies for Case Supervision.

In conjunction with the Case Management System, a Management Information System was developed with funding from the Legislature. This is a computerized information system and, although it is still developing, it is assimilating an ever-increasing array of data regarding the criminal justice system in Nevada.

Fees Program

The Department collects supervision fees to help defray the cost of probation or parole supervision. These fees are paid by offenders at the rate of \$16 per month, with exceptions being made for financial hardship.

Since the inception of the program in May, 1983, more than \$1,107,000 has been collected (as of June 30, 1986).





TOTAL SENTENCINGS BY CRIME CATEGORY




TOTAL SENTENCINGS BY CRIME CATEGORY




TOTAL SENTENCINGS BY CRIME CATEGORY


CRIMES AGAINST PERSON




TOTAL SENTENCINGS BY CRIME CATEGORY NARCOTICS CRIMES




TOTAL SENTENCINGS BY CRIME CATEGORY TRAFFIC CRIMES

EXPLANATORY NOTES

The following sentencing and disposition data is based on Felony and Gross Misdemeanor <u>cases</u> processed by the District Courts and the Department of Parole and Probation.

An individual processed through the Judicial System with more than one Criminal Case Number would be counted more than once, while an individual with only one Criminal Case Number but several counts of the same or different crimes, would be counted only once. In the latter category, the most serious crime and/or disposition was recorded. In other words, the data represents criminal cases processed by District Courts, and not the number of defendants or crimes disposed of.

The data regarding sentencings by Judicial Districts and departments within those districts does not take into consideration other variables, such as seriousness of offense or offender characteristics.

As such, the Tables cannot be viewed as reflective of any individual judge's sentencing philosophy.


