### Fiscal Year Summary Report of Population Movement 1987

The Division of Corrections is responsible for both the operation of Wisconsin's correctional facilities for adult and juvenile offenders and the supervision of offenders residing in the community under the terms and conditions of probation, parole, mandatory release, special action early release, and juvenile aftercare supervision. This publication provides summary information about the volume, movements, and average daily populations of such individuals during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1987. The information contained in Tables 1 through 4 is a compilation of data originally presented in the monthly publication Statistical Bulletin C-59, Report of Wisconsin Corrections Population. Table 1 provides information about average daily populations and the movements into and out of correctional institutions for adult offenders including the Wisconsin Resource Center, a facility operated by the Division of Care and Treatment Facilities. This table also includes data about individuals serving Wisconsin sentences under contractual agreements in institutions operated by the federal government, the state of Minnesota, and Dane County's Ferris Center, a Huber Law facility. (See columns labeled "Contr. fac.") Table 2 contains the same type of information for Ethan Allen and Lincoln Hills Schools, the state's institutions for juvenile offenders, while Table 2-A provides information about youth aids. Information about offenders under some type of supervision in the community; i. e., probation, parole, etc., in included in Table 3 while Table 4 provides fiscal year data about absconders from these types of community supervision. Institution and probation and parole average daily populations for the fiscal years 1983-1987 are included in Table A. This table does not, however, contain any data relating to absconders from field supervision. The figures in this table were obtained by computing monthly average daily populations, totaling the results, and dividing by 12 to obtain fiscal year figures.

A total of 36,046 offenders were under Division of Corrections supervision on June 30, 1987; an increase of 6.1 percent over the 33,973 reported on June 30, 1986. The population in residence in correctional institutions for adult offenders rose from 5,299 at the start to 5,836 at the end of fiscal year 1987; an increase of 10.1 percent, while juvenile institution resident populations decreased slightly, 2.1 percent, from 526 to 515 during the same time period. It should be noted that these resident population figures do not include adults and juveniles reported in the footnotes for Tables 1 and 2 as being absent from the facilities. The number of offenders under some type of community supervision increased 5.3 percent from 24,878 on July 1, 1986 to 26,197 on June 30, 1987. (See Table 3.) Table 4 indicates that the number of community supervision cases on absconder status rose from 3,270 at the beginning to 3,498 at the end of the fiscal year; an increase of 7.0 percent.

The Division of Corrections, during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1987, was responsible for the supervision of an average daily population of 31,277 offenders; an increase of 4.9 percent over the average daily

The average daily population for the fiscal year has risen steadily from 26,536 in fiscal year 1983 to 31,277 in fiscal year 1987; an overall increase of 17.9 percent during the five-year period. (See Table A.) During each of the years, offenders under some type of community as opposed to institution supervision made up four-fifths (80.0 percent of the caseload.

The average daily population of offenders under supervision in the community has risen steadily from 21,412 in fiscal year 1983 to 25,192 in fiscal year 1987; an increase of 17.7 percent during the five-year period. The probation caseload average daily population increased increased 17.8 percent from 18,241 in 1983 to 21,483 in fiscal year 1987. The largest increase during the five-year period was in the adult probation caseload which rose 18.2 percent from 17,718 in fiscal year 1983 to 20,933 in fiscal year 1987. The total parole caseload average daily population rose steadily from 3,171 in 1983 to 3,709 in 1987; an overall increase of 17.0 percent. The average daily population of adult offenders under parole supervision increased 17.3 percent from 2 809 in fiscal year 1983 to 3,295 in 1987. However, this population remained virtually unchanged between fiscal years 1985 (3,197) and 1986 (3,199) before again increasing 4.0 percent between the years 1986-1987. Juvenile aftercare average daily populations, which reached a low of 155 during fiscal year 1985, increased 22.6 percent to a high of 190 during fiscal year 1987. The absence of juvenile offender probation cases after fiscal year 1984 is due to a Department of Health and Social Services policy decision to discontinue providing supervisory services for juveniles placed on probation. The decline of youthful offender probation and parole populations is due to the repeal of the Youthful Offender Statute on July 1, 1978.

Institution average daily populations, which stood at 5,124 in fiscal year 1983, climbed steadily 6,085 in fiscal year 1987; an increase of 18.8 percent. The majority of the increase took place in adult institution populations which rose 20.4 percent from an average daily population of 4,634 in fiscal year 1983 to 5,580 in fiscal year 1987 with the largest increase (7.5 percent) occurring between fiscal years 1985 and 1986. Juvenile institution average daily populations were at a low of 445 during fiscal year 1984, increased 20.0 percent to a high of 534 during fiscal year 1986, and then decreased 5.4 percent to 505 in fiscal year 1987.
