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The District of Columbla work Lelease program for misdemeanant offonders was established in April, 9967 wner the provistons of Public Law 39-303. Judges of the U. S. District Court or the Count of General Sessions nay either ordex or recomend a misdemeanant for parcicipation in the progran. Also, a misdemeanant serving a sentence in etcher the sail or the boxkhouse may apply formanticipation. Mowever, becanse of linitationg in the slze of the staff of the progyan, internal mpitcations for particspation in the nrosxam teve not been proccssed since August, 1067

As of Movenbex 23,1567 , there mexe 24 misdomennants who had participated in the propran, as degctibed in Table 1 . The majority of these cases had boen dixoctly ordered into the prom gram by the jutges at the Court of General Sessions. As of the above date, there were $53,19.7$ percent, who were actlve and 236 , or 30.3 percent, who were inactive, of the 58 who were aetive, there were 39 tho vere employed, 14 who trexe available for mploymont, and five who hat ben temporaxily suphented for infeactions of the rules. Of the 236 who wore tnactive there wexe 124 who had partichpated in the program, who had completed their sentences
and who had been relcased from custody. There were 112 of the inactive group who had been revoked, including 36 who had abaconded. Of the 36 absconders 20 had returned, or had been retumed, and 16 were at liberty on the above date.

As noted above there were 236 parcicipants who were in an inactive status and of these $124,52.5$ percent, had completed the program and $112,47.5$ percent, had been revoked. ${ }^{1}$ Considered in this context this program may be seid to have a "success" rate of roughly 50 percent. The 112 tho had been revoked in cluded the 26 who had absconded.

The focus of this report is upon the 36 who had absconcied from the program. Of this group, 32 were Hegro and four were Thite. The median age of the group was 29.4 years. Of the 36, 12 wexe mamied, seven bore separated, 12 had never married, two vere divorced, me vas a widower, and information on the marital status of mo was not available.

The offenses for winch the 36 work release absconders had been sentenced are indicsted at Teble 2. A tabulation of the

offenses of all convicted'misdoneanants in custody was made on Apri1 30, 1967. Of the 760 there were 232 , or 30.6 percent, who had been convicted of violations of the drug laws. As noted in the Table there mas only one of the absconders from worl release who had been convicted of this offense. Apart from this rather simable discrepancy, the distribution of the offonses of the absconders vas roughly comparable to that of the other misdemeanants.

Table 3 indicates the maztman sontence catogory of the 36 work release absconders. As will be noted from the Table, none of the abscondere mas serving a sentence of less than 30 days. At the tine of the consus of miccobamames noted in the previous Dragraph thexe vere 277 , or 14.1 percent of the total, who yere An this sentonce category. Thene are at least two possible erdamations for this disazonee betioen the nusconders and the total popuiation. The first is that if an innate has only a short sentence to serve he tray not be involved in the misdemeanant work release mogran because of the period required to "process" the inate thich nay include the period requited to find employment. The recond explanation ts that the short-tern mfgdenemant may not be tenpted to abscond since his release date is comparatively choze at hand. hvidence in apport of this latter explanation is offered in the fact that alnost 70 percent of
the absconders axe serving sentences of 180. days or more.

The foregotig may be relatod to the data of Table 4 , that is, the period on work release before absconcling. As indieated more than half of the actions occuried during the finst 14 days that the thmote was on the prograra. Among those who absconded during the flest Eive days there mere foux who absconded on the fivst day ma before they wore ampoyed. Table 5 fndicates the prom Jected period until Lozal release of the aboconders. Then Jables 3, 4, and 5 axe melated to one movher, it is obvious thet most of those who obscond are gerving comparatively long misdeneanant gentences, abeond shority anter onterirg on the proyram, and While thoir zelease date is some Eina away. This io e genemal gattosh to whati there ase, of vowaso, ano excoptions.

The work release ocenpations of tie 50 abscondexs axe in dicated as Table 6. The eldilod rioun wheh incluaes peinters, carpenters, ohefs, and othex nxtumhe is constarably larger 28.8 percent, than io unual anons Inoate populations. For exmple, a recent stuty of koto relcoseas from the D. C. Refometory for ven in 1565, fomd ony 63, or 13.1 percont, who could be classified as slitiod. This sursests the posoibility chat a high enming potencial, that is usual anong gleilled woxivexs, may be a Sectox in selection Eor work relence. Also the problen of placemont in employment for skilled romers ic not so groat as for the unskilled.

The weekly income on work release for the 36 absconders is Indicated as Table 7. As noted above there wexe ten of the absconders who were employed in skilled occupations. All of these had weekly incones of more chan 90 dollars and ranging upward to 150 dollars. All money carned on wotk relense is deposlted with the staff. The staff malues disburcements to the inmate for such personal items as bus fares, lunches, and similar necessaxy oxvenses. The staft also nakea disourcements for the suport of dependents. Muther, those employed on worlt relose pay a maintenance fee to the Deparment of Corractions.

Table 8 deseribes the number of dopencones of the 36 abcenderg. The somec tron which the data of this report was then is a litele hay on the pont. Fox omole, sone of the wratcd aboconders vere rejorted ay inging no dependents while some of those who were umarried reported one or more dependents. The 41.7 wercent who rare reaoted as having no dopendents secns cothor large in vicw of the fact that a najor part of the rationale Guporting the work releuse mrogran is that it will provide the convicted misdemeanat with an oportmity to continue in the support of depondents. If ainost half of those involved in the pro-
 argment for the progran. Hovever, it could very well be that the
percentage of participants with one or more. denendents is much larger than is incifonted in Table 8 , and that this data simuly offers evidence to the point thet those with no dependents are the ones who are most not to abscond. This is a natecr which wextts fumther investigation.

As is indicaced in Table 1 , on hovember 23 , 1967 , of the 36 absconders, there were 20 who had retuxned and there were 16 at large. As is indicated in fable 9 the modian lengeh of the period of abonce of those 20 who rebumnct was four days. dight of these wemmed of thetr om volition and 12 vere returned by the police.

Whe length of tho period abwont of the 16 still at large on Novenber 28, 1567, is notad in Table 10. The median length of the period of absence ma that dete was 78 dayn.
