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

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INTRODUCTION

This report is the fortieth in a series of Juvenile Court Statistics Reports for the State of Missouri. The report is published under the auspices of the Division of Youth Services in accordance with Missouri Statute R.S.Mo. - Sec. 219.016.3.

The information presented in this report was taken from data provided by the 44 juvenile courts of Missouri and was provided on the two-year old standard form titled "Missouri Statewide Juvenile Information System". This form provides detailed information about the reason for referral, pre-hearing placements, and the findings/outcomes of the child. Appendix A contains a copy of the form.

Before 1979, information was either received on a form or it was excluded from tables in the text of the report. After 1979, the tables included information received in annual reports and statistical summaries as well as on the form.

Many tables in this report are cross-tabulated by the three metropolitan counties of Jackson, St. Louis and St. Louis County vs. other counties. Several years ago the breakdown was done by Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA's) and other counties (non-SMSA).

In accordance with Missouri Statute R.S.Mo.-Sec 211.031 (2) (e), in August 1980 the Juvenile Courts ceased to have jurisdiction over youths sixteen years of age for non-felonious traffic violations. Thus, many fewer traffic violations have been referred to the Juvenile Courts. The change should be considered when evaluating tables that present historical information.

Table 1.1 shows the total number of reported juvenile court statistics from 1974 to 1984. The new breakdowns result from the new list of codes which coincide with the new form. A review of the yearly changes reveals the 1970's to be the end of a decade of uninterrupted increases in reported cases if you disregard the increase in 1976 of approximately 1,000 referrals. (Between

1974 and 1984, declines occurred four times. In 1981, the removal of non-felonious traffic referrals for 16 year olds resulted in a precipitous decline.)


FIGURE 1.1 REPORTED DISPOSITIONS MADE BY MISSOURI JUVENILE COURTS

Changes in the number and composition of reported referrals and dispositions are presented in Figures 1.1 and 1.2. The first figure shows dispositions from 1974 to 1984 and corresponds to the total shown in the previous table. With the metropolitan counties reporting more complete data, this year's total went up. Figure 1.2 shows the composition of reported referrals between 1980 and 1984. Over the 5 year period reported, status referrals have ranged from a low of 8,863 referrals in 1983 to a high of 14,991 referrals in 1980. Also, abuse and neglect referrals decreased 14 percent since 1983. Whether this is indicative of the fact that fewer abuse incidents actually occurred this year or if less incidents were reported is beyond the scope of this report.


The remainder of the report is organized into four major sections—all referrals broken down by demographics, Status, Abuse/Neglect and Permanency Planning Procedures. The section concerning breakdowns of all referrals, besides providing demographics, is organized into a discussion of findings/outcomes of the major allegation of each reported offense. The sections on Status and Abuse/Neglect, aside from displaying demographics, primarily deal with Prehearing Placements, sources of referrals, and findings/outcomes of major allegations. The section titled Permanency Planning Procedures treats the race and sex of Permanency Planning review and depositional review hearings. Appendix A displays the form from which the data in this book was obtained. For a breakdown of major categories and findings by county, refer to Appendix B. Appendix C provides a copy of the Fourth Quarterly Report which this book was based upon.

REFERRAL CATEGORIES AND FAMILY OF REFERRAL OFFENSES

Under Missouri law, a juvenile to the age of 17 years can be referred to juvenile court for offenses which range from minor infractions to those so seriously antisocial as to interfere with the rights of others or to menace the welfare of the youth himself or the community. The violations may be defined in the statutes of the state or in municipal ordinances. The definition of offense includes conduct which is a violation of law only when committed by a child and conduct which is in violation of law when committed by a person of any age. Also included are traffic violations over which the juvenile court has jurisdiction. The juvenile court also receives referrals where the child is the victim, such as in the cases of abused and homeless, dependent and neglected children.

For the purpose of this report, the categories of referrals will be law, abuse/neglect, status, and administrative proceedings. Administrative proceedings are any of the following referrals: violation of probation/supervision, violation of valid court order, motion to transfer to other jurisdiction, permanency planning dispositional review hearing, permanency planning review team meeting, motion to modify-other, capias, courtesy supervision, consent-other, and administrative-other.

The abuse/neglect category and the status offense category will be discussed in detail in their respective sections. Law violations are any referrals that do not fall into any of the aforementioned referral categories, and therefore, present a wide spectrum of violations.

The number of children referred to juvenile court in 1984 was 55,315. The focus of analysis in this report is not on the number of children referred to the court but on the number of reported referrals. A referral is made each time a juvenile is apprehended for a delinquent act. If a child commits several delinquent acts at the same time, only one offense is recorded - that of the most serious offense committed.

A good overview of Missouri Juvenile Court referrals in 1984 is contained in Table 2.1.

Of the total number of referrals reported, 28,200 or 51 percent, come from metropolitan counties. Other counties account for 27,115 or 49 percent of the referrals.

In both areas law offenses dominate the total referrals with 43.1 percent of the metropolitan referrals and 46.5 percent of the other referrals. The most notable urban-rural difference is in status offenses, a difference of 12.5 percent. Abuse offenses differed by 9.1 percent. The distribution of law and administrative referrals is quite similar.

In Table 2.2, referrals are organized by sex.

For males, law offenses dominate. But, there is a 27 percent difference between law offenses for each sex. Males are referred for law offenses over four more times than they are for administrative offenses. Law offenses are second to status offenses among reasons for referral for females.

Table 2.3 crosstabulates family of referral offenses by race and sex. The family of referral offenses are the previously mentioned breakdowns for law offenses, plus abuse and neglect, status, and administrative proceedings.

While it is sometimes difficult to compare the seriousness of offenses, some distinctions can be drawn. Homicide, sexual assault, etc., are usually regarded as among the most serious. Status referrals, in which the youth is sometimes regarded as harmful only to himself, can be placed at the other end of a continuum showing the seriousness of offenses. When considering percentages for whites referred to juvenile court, status offenses prevail, accounting for 28.7 percent of white referrals. Next in line are abuse and neglect referrals which constitute 14.9 percent of these referrals.

Nearly twenty-eight percent of the youths referred are non-white. Of the referrals for non-white youths, 95.6 percent are black.

The number one reported offense for non-whites is status with 2,780 occurrences or 18.1 percent of the non-whites reported. Stealing offenses which total 2,590 or 16.9 percent of non-white referrals are second in line.

In regard to sex differences, status offenses are 22.5 percent of male referrals, or a total of 8,205 referrals. One child committed a gambling offense and one operated a boat improperly. Of the female offenders, 32.1 percent are status referrals. Abuse referrals represent 22.8 percent of female referrals. There is one obscenity offense.

A child's age is computed by subtracting his time of birth from his referral date. The total number of referrals increases from ages 12 through 16 years. The largest yearly increase occurs between 12 years and 13 years, an increase of 70.5 percent. The smallest yearly increase occurs between 15 and 16 years, an increase of 12.5 percent. The majority of the children referred to juvenile court this year are white status offenders, constituting 21.7 percent of all referrals.

Concerning the breakdown by age, the offense that occurs most frequently is 16 year old status offenders. This constitutes 8 percent of all referrals.

Table 2.5 displays the ten most frequently occurring offenses for each sex.

For females, status, abuse/neglect and administrative proceedings are the top three types of offenses. Status, stealing, and administrative proceedings are the primary three types of offenses for males.

Clay County's detention is not a part of the statewide computer file; therefore, it is not included in any statewide detention table. The number of Clay County juveniles detained is 96.

There are 845 cases in which the question as to whether or not detention occurred was recorded as no when the child, in fact, was detained. This becomes apparent in the following table.

Clay County is not included. The average length of stay for Clay County juveniles in prehearing placements is 4-9 days.

Almost 19 percent of the youth are held in a prehearing placement facility. A secure court run facility is number one in frequency and other

prehearing placements are number two in line. Jail is the least likely placement assigned to a youth.

The next two tables deal with the finding or disposition of youths who have been referred to court. Table 2.7 displays the category of referrals by the finding. Predictably, there is variation of dispositions among reason for referral. However, the majority of the categories of referrals falls in the combination of law/adjustment without supervision encompassing 13.4 percent of all referrals in the table. It is obvious that dispositions clearly reflect the type of referral.

STATUS REFERRALS

Status offenses represent conduct which is a violation of law only when committed by a child. They include truancy, beyond parental control, habitually absent from home (runaways), behavior injurious to self and/or others, and other status offenses.

Tables 3.1 and 3.2 contain detailed information about status offenses. Table 3.1 summarizes the number of referrals broken down by metropolitan counties vs. other counties.

In reviewing Table 3.2, the reader should keep in mind that there are only 2,160 fewer female status referrals than male status referrals. When comparing this information to overall referrals reported, this fact becomes interesting because there are almost twice as many total male referrals as female referrals.

For females, other status offenses comprise the greatest number of status offenses with 43.3 percent. Runaways and beyond parental control are the second and third most frequent with 23.7 percent and 15.5 percent, respectively. These three kinds of violations account for 82.5 percent of all female status referrals.

The first three offenses for males are other status offenses, runaways and truancy. Their three most frequently reported reasons for referral comprise 78.5 percent of all status referrals for males.

Prehearing placements of status offense referrals are broken down by metropolitan counties vs. other counties in Table 3.3.

The majority of referrals fell in the secure court run facility placement, totaling 1,896 or 70.6 percent of the 2,687 status offenders who had prehearing placements. As can be expected, fewer children are jailed than kept in any of the other prehearing placements.

Concerning the type of facility that the miscellaneous prehearing placement youth are placed in, institutions prevailed in the metropolitan settings, as well as in other counties.

Status offense referrals are illustrated by race and age in Table 3.4.

Concerning race, white other status offenders occur most frequently. Sixteen year old other status offenders constitute the majority of status offenders when considering an age breakdown.

CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

Children are referred to the court for abuse or neglect when they are abandoned or abused, when they do not receive adequate care and support, or when they are subjected to conditions injurious to their morals. Abuse can be physical, sexual, or emotional. Neglect can be physical or emotional. After receiving abuse or neglect reports about children, the juvenile court either conducts a study of the situation or refers the case to a social agency for consideration.

The Division of Family Services maintains a statewide telephone reporting system for child abuse and neglect in Missouri. Any person can report suspected child abuse and neglect; persons in many occupations are required by law to report suspected child abuse and neglect. During 1984, the number of victims substantiated totaled 30,916. Only a small minority of these reports becomes referrals to the court.

All of the children in a family are often referred in neglect, and to a lesser extent, in abuse cases. In describing abuse and neglect referrals, each child is considered a separate referral, although several children from the same family may be called to the attention of the court by a single complaint. Some children may be referred more than once for abuse or neglect during a year.

In 1984, Missouri courts reported 8,362 referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of these referrals, 3,004 or 36 percent were from metropolitan counties and 5,358 or 64 percent were from other counties.

In Table 4.1, a breakdown of child abuse and neglect referrals is provided by metropolitan vs. other counties, and sex. Referrals for neglect occur much more often than do abuse referrals.

In both metropolitan and other counties, the Division of Family Services is the most frequent source of child abuse and neglect referrals. Very few individuals report themselves, whether they reside in metropolitan counties or not.

Concerning the 8,362 abuse/neglect referrals, 25.6 percent are held in one of the three types of prehearing placements. Therefore, 74.4 percent of the referrals receive no detention. The majority of metropolitan youngsters in detention are held in other facilities. When specifically analyzing other counties, foster homes prevail.

The findings for abuse and neglect referrals are based on the court's decision, after a detailed study of what will best meet the needs of the child or children. When legal custody is changed, it may be transferred to a public or private agency, an institution, or another individual. While some of these children may be removed from their homes, some remain in their homes under supervision. Many of the children removed from their homes are placed in foster homes.

The most prevalent finding, area, and sex is the true/outhome services/other female combination, at 11.7 percent. Second in line is the true/outhome services/ other male combination.

PERMANENCY PLANNING PROCEDURES

Recognizing the complexity of the responsibility of deciding who will be a child's temporary or permanent parents, the Missouri Supreme Court established a special Task Force on Permanent Planning for Abused and Neglected Children in May 1982. The problem of thousands of dependent children drifting in foster care prompted this task force to unite.

Review Team Meetings determine continuing necessity and appropriateness of placement. The Dispositional Review Hearings are held to determine the status of the child concerning his return home, placement for adoption, or the possibility of remaining in care for long-term placements.
