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#### **PREFACE**

The California Prisoners and Civil Narcotic Addicts has been restructured and renamed, California Prisoners and Parolees. This report will be published on an annual basis with a targeted release date of Autumn 1988 for the Calendar Year 1987 edition.

California Prisoners and Parolees, 1986, is a presentation of statistical data about felons and non felons under the jurisdiction of the California Department of Corrections (CDC). Statistical data on felons in CDC have been published since 1950 when the first issue of California Prisoners, covering the years 1945 through 1949, was released. Statistical data on civilly committed narcotic addicts have been published since 1967 when the first issue of Summary Statistics, Civil Commitment Program for Narcotic Addicts, covering the years 1961 through 1966, was published. Beginning in 1980 the two were combined into one publication. With the Civil Narcotic Addict Program decreasing in size and emphasis since the 1970's, and the felon institution population and parole population growing so fast, the publication has been changed to place more emphasis on felon inmates and parolees. The Civil Narcotic Addict Program is covered in the last chapter along with other CDC populations.

The first chapter is a summary of the total institution population and movements into and out of the institutions during calendar year 1986. The second chapter looks at felons newly received from court. The next chapter covers characteristics of the institution population on December 31, 1986. The fourth chapter looks at the behavior of inmates in the institutions, while the fifth chapter is a composite of parole characteristics and movements. Finally, the last chapter looks at other populations in CDC, the Civil Narcotic Addict Program, the Community Based (work furlough and local jails) Programs and the County Diagnostic Cases.


The Director of Corrections operated twelve institutions in 1986 and four parole regions. The types of commitments received by CDC are felons, civil narcotic addicts, county diagnostic cases (under Penal Code Section 1203.03), a few Youth Authority commitments, federal prisoners, and prisoners from other states.

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## INSTITUTION POPULATION, RECEIVED AND RELEASED

## HIGHLIGHTS

On December 31, 1986 the California Department of Corrections (CDC) institution population reached an all time high of 59,484.

There were 18,029 Parole Violators Returned to Custody (PV-RTC's) during Calendar Year 1986, the most ever in CDC for any given year.

The CDC institution population increased 18.7% since December 31, 1985.

The incarceration rate for CDC reached an all time high of 218 inmates per 100,000 California population.

The commitment rate for New Admissions From Court and Parole Violators with New Term (PV-WNT's) reached a high of 108.68 per 100,000 California population.

The number of releases to parole reached an all time high of 37,474.

Of the total releases to parole:

- 23,898 were first releases to parole.
- 13,576 were PV-RTC's being re-released from prison to parole.


#### INSTITUTION POPULATION

The California Department of Corrections (CDC) institution population reached an all time high of 59,484.

- The institution population increased 18.7% (9,373) from December 31, 1985.
- The incarceration rate increased to 218 per 100,000 California population. This was an all time high for CDC.
- The design capacity of CDC institutions was at 34,516.
- CDC institution population was 172.3% of the design capacity.

## The institution population consisted of:

- 40,003 (67.2%) new admissions from court.
- 9,762 (16.4%) parole violators returned with a new commitment from court (PV-WNT's).
- 8,704 (14.6%) parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTC's).
- 1,015 (1.8%) others, including escape returns, outpatient returns and psychiatric returns.

- 5,790 parole violators returned with a new commitment from court (PV-WNT's).
- 691 escape returns to CDC institutions.


- 37,474 parolees were released from CDC institutions and from temporary release status.
  - 23,898 were first releases to parole.
  - 13,576 were being re-released to parole.
- 2,672 county diagnostic cases were discharged from CDC institutions.
- 853 inmates escaped from CDC institutions and community based facilities. Of this total, 84 were from institutions and camps and 769 were from community based facilities.
- 102 inmates died in CDC institutions.
- 1,640 civil narcotic addicts were released to outpatient status.

### FELONS NEWLY RECEIVED FROM COURT

## **HIGHLIGHTS**

Felon New Admissions from Court reached 23,532, a high for the California Department of Corrections (CDC).

New Felon Admissions from Court increased 68.9% compared to Calendar Year 1981.

More than half (55.8%) of Felon New Admissions were between the ages of 20 and 29.

The number of Felon Drug Admissions reached an all time high of 5,467. The commitment rate of 20.2 per 100,000 California population was the highest ever in CDC history.

The commitment rate for Felon New Admissions for Calendar Year 1986 was 87.2 admissions per 100,000 California population. This commitment rate was the highest ever experienced by CDC.

Madera county had a commitment rate of 203.3 per 100,000 county population, the highest of all California counties. Blacks, Whites, and Mexican /Americans represented approximately the same proportion of Felon New Admissions From Court.


#### **ADMISSIONS**

California Department of Corrrections (CDC) New Felon Admissions from Court reached an all time high of 23,532.


- There was an increase of 2,989 (14.5%) over admissions in 1985.
- Felon admissions have increased 68.9% since 1981 and 211.4% since 1977.
- The number of male admissions was 21,558.
- The number of female admissions was 1,974.
- The rate of commitment for felony new admissions reached a high of 87.2 per 100,000 California population.
- This rate compares to 34.6 during 1977, 57.5 during 1981 and 77.1 during 1985.

#### **OFFENSE CATEGORIES**

- Violent offenses accounted for 34.8% (8,133) of admissions.
- Property offenses accounted for 37.7% (8,798) of admissions.
- Drug offenses accounted for 23.4% (5,467) of admissions.
- Other offenses made up the remaining 4.1% (952) of admissions.



#### OFFENSE CATEGORIES CALENDAR YEAR 1986






### FELONS NEWLY RECEIVED FROM COURT

#### VIOLENT OFFENSE GROUPS

Violent offense admissions increased by 1,613 compared to 1981 but decreased 12.1% from 1981 to 1986 (from 46.9% to 34.8%) as a percentage of the admission population. This was mainly due to the large increase in drug admissions during 1986.

- Homicides accounted for 1,257 (5.4%) of new admissions from court. There were:
  - 279 (1.2%) Murder First admissions.
  - 265 (1.1%) Murder Second admissions.
  - 534 (2.3%) Manslaughter admissions.
  - 179 (0.8%) Manslaughter by Vehicle admissions.
- There were 2,951 (12.6%) Robbery admissions. This represented the largest group of violent crimes.
- Sex crimes accounted for 1,814 (7.8%) of new admissions from court. There were:
  - 551 (2.4%) admissions for Rape.
  - 956 (4.1%) admissions for Lewd Acts.
  - 307 (1.3%) admissions for other sex crimes.
- Assault with a Deadly Weapon accounted for 1,527 (6.5%) of new admissions.
- Kidnapping accounted for 193 (0.8%) of new admissions from court.








## FELONS NEWLY RECEIVED FROM COURT

#### PROPERTY OFFENSE GROUPS

Property offenses in 1986 (37.7%) decreased 2.4% since 1981 (40.1%) as a percentage of all admissions. Property offenses had an actual increase in number of 3,207 from 1981.

- Burglary accounted for 4,616 (19.8%) of new admissions from court. This was the largest of the property offense groups. There were:
  - 2,827 (12.1%) for Burglary First Degree.
  - 1,789 (7.7%) for Burglary Second Degree.
- Grand Theft was the next largest property offense group accounting for 965 (4.1%) of admissions.
- Receiving Stolen Property accounted for 800 (3.4%) of admissions.
- Petty Theft accounted for 756 (3.2%) of admissions.
- Auto Theft accounted for 878 (3.7%) of admissions. There were:
  - 235 (1.0%) admitted for Grand Theft Auto.
  - 643 (2.8%) admitted for Other Vehicle Theft.
- Forgery accounted for 644 (2.8%) of admissions.

#### **DRUG OFFENSE GROUPS**


Drug offenses accounted for 5,467 (23.4%) of new admissions to CDC. This represents the most drug commitments ever experienced by CDC. Drug commitments increased 362.5% since 1981 and 426.2% since 1977.

- CSS I&II (see note) accounted for 3,301 (14.1%) of admissions.
- CSS III,IV&V (see note) accounted for 1,331 (5.7%) of admissions.
- Marijuana accounted for 776 (3.3%) of admissions.
- Other Drugs accounted for 59 (0.3%) of admissions.





## RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS

Blacks, Whites and Mexican/Americans represented approximately the same proportion of New Admissions from Court.

- Blacks accounted for 32.0% (7,506) of admissions.
- Whites accounted for 31.8% (7,463) of admissions.
- Mexican/Americans accounted for 30.8% (7,229) of admissions.
- Other racial/ethnic groups accounted for 5.4% (1,268) of admissions.

#### RACIAL/ETHNIC STATUS CALENDAR YEAR 1986





#### AGE GROUPS

The majority of admissions were between the ages of 20 and 29. This group represents 55.8% of admissions.

- The 20 to 24 year old age group accounted for 29.0% (6,798) of admissions.
- The 25 to 29 year old age group accounted for 26.8% (6,283) of admissions.
- The next largest age group was between the ages of 30 and 34, representing 18.1% (4,239) of admissions.
- The smallest age group was 60 years and older, or 0.9% (203). The next smallest group was between 55 and 59 years of age.
- The median age of new admissions was 25 years.

#### AGE GROUPS CALENDAR YEAR 1986




#### COUNTY AND AREA OF COMMITMENT

- 15,361 (65.5%) new admissions were committed from Southern California.
- 4,074 (17.3%) new admissions were committed from the San Francisco Bay Area.
- The commitment rate for Southern California was 56.9 per 100,000 California population while it was only 15.1 and 15.0 for the San Francisco Bay Area and the rest of the state, respectively.
- The commitment rate for felons admitted from Los Angeles County was 36.0 per 100,000 California population.
- Los Angeles County alone accounted for 9,723 (41.3%) of new admissions from court.
- San Diego was the next largest county of commitment, accounting for 1,534 (6.5%) of new admissions.
- Santa Clara County committed the most in the San Francisco Bay Area, accounting for 1,404 (6.0%) of new admissions.
- Mono County did not have any new admissions committed to CDC.


# TEN LARGEST COUNTIES OF COMMITMENT CALENDAR YEAR 1986




#### RATE OF COMMITMENT BY COUNTY





- Madera County had the highest rate of commitment at 203.3 per 100,000 county population.
- Modoc County had the second highest rate of commitment at 180.9 per 100,000 county population.
- Lake County had the next highest rate per county population at 144.9.
- Los Angeles County, which has the highest rate of commitment per state population, had a commitment rate of only 117.3 per county population.
- Mariposa County had the lowest commitment rate (except for Mono county which had no commitments) at 7.3 per 100,000 county population.

#### EDUCATIONAL GRADE PLACEMENT CALENDAR YEAR 1986



#### GRADE LEVEL PLACEMENT

Over 70% of new admissions were placed in the 7th grade or above during Calendar Year 1986.

- 3.0% (696) of new admissions were tested as being illiterate, that is, the second grade level or below.
- 12.3% (2,888) of new admissions tested at the twelfth grade level or above.
- The median grade level of new admissions was the tenth grade.

## **HIGHLIGHTS**

The California Department of Corrections (CDC) institution population reached an all time high of 59,484 on December 31, 1986.

The CDC institution population as of December 31, 1986 increased 203.1% from 1977 and 103.7% from 1981.

Blacks accounted for the largest racial/ethnic group in the institution population comprising 20,531 or 34.5% of the population.

Violent offenses accounted for almost half (49.8%) of the institution population on December 31, 1986.


As of the end of the 1986, 45.6% of the institution population had prior prison commitments.

On December 31, 1986 only 43.1% of the institution population had a high school diploma.


There were 59,484 inmates in California Department of Corrections (CDC) institutions.

This represents a 203.1% increase from 1977 and a 103.7% increase from 1981.

#### The population consisted of:

- 57,725 (97%) felon inmates.
- 1,394 (2.4%) civil narcotic addicts.
- 303 (0.5%) county diagnostic cases.
- 62 (0.1%) others.


### CHARACTERISTICS OF THE INSTITUTION POPULATION

#### VIOLENT OFFENSE GROUPS

Violent offenses represented almost half (49.8%) of those incarcerated in CDC institutions.

Violent offenses increased 12,281 from 1981 and increased 18,309 from 1977. Violent offenses decreased as a percentage of the total population since 1981.

- Homicides accounted for 7,800 (13.3%) of those incarcerated. There were:
  - 3,655 (6.2%) Murder First inmates.
  - 2,417 (4.1%) Murder Second inmates.
  - 1,446 (2.5%) Manslaughter inmates.
  - 282 (0.5%) Manslaughter by Vehicle inmates.
- Robbery accounted for 9,842 (16.8%) of the population which represented the largest group of violent crimes.
- Assault With a Deadly Weapon accounted for 3,662 (6.2%) of the population.
- Sex crimes accounted for 6,288 (10.7%) of the CDC institution population. There were:
  - 2,570 (4.4%) Rapists in prison.
  - 2,536 (4.3%) incarcerated for Lewd Acts.
  - 1,182 (2.0%) incarcerated for other sex crimes.
- Kidnapping accounted for 1,151 (2.0%).






## CHARACTERISTICS OF THE INSTITUTION POPULATION

#### PROPERTY OFFENSE GROUPS

Property offenses in 1986 increased 10,704 from 1981 and 14,377 from 1977. As a percentage of the institution population, property offenses decreased only slightly since 1985.

- Burglary accounted for 11,652 (19.8%) of those in prison. This was the largest group of property offenses. There were:
  - 8,008 (13.6%) in prison for Burglary First Degree.
  - 3,644 (6.2%) in prison for Burglary Second Degree.
- Grand Theft was the next largest property offense group, accounting for 1,652 (2.8%) of those in prison.
- Auto Theft accounted for 1,582 (2.8%) of those in prison. There were:
  - 438 (0.8%) incarcerated for Grand Theft Auto.
  - 1,144 (2.0%) incarcerated for Vehicle Theft.
- Receiving Stolen Property accounted for 1,517 (2.6%) of those in prison.
- Petty Theft accounted for 1,455 (2.5%) of those in prison.
- Forgery accounted for 1,094 (1.9%) of those in prison.


#### OTHER OFFENSE GROUPS DECEMBER 31, 1986



#### RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS

- Blacks accounted for 34.5% (20,531) of the institution population. This represents the largest racial/ethnic group in the institution population.
- Whites accounted for 32.8% (19,499) of the institution population.
- Mexican/American inmates accounted for 28.3% (16,819) of the institution population.
- Other racial/ethnic groups accounted for 4.4% (2,635) of the institution population.

#### **AGE GROUPS**

- The largest age group in prison was 25 through 29 years old. This group represented 28.8% (17,158) of the institution population.
- The 20 to 24 year old group accounted for 22.5% (13,375) and was the second largest age group.
- The next largest age group, the 30 to 34 year old group, accounted for 20.9% (12,450) of the institution population.
- The smallest age group was 60 years or older, representing 0.9% (550) of the institution population.
- There were 700 (1.2%) inmates under the age of 20 years.
- The median age of the institution population was 29 years.


#### PRIOR COMMITMENT

- Those having prior prison commitments accounted for a total of 45.6% of the population. There were:
  - 25.3% with one prior prison commitment.
  - 11.2% with two prior prison commitments.
  - 9.1% with three or more prior prison commitments.
- Those with no prior commitments of any type accounted for 21.8% of the institution population.
- Those with only prior county jail or juvenile commitments accounted for 24.8% of the population.
- Those with only prior state juvenile commitments accounted for 7.9% of the institution population.

#### **EDUCATION**


- The percent of inmates in prison with high school degrees upon admission to CDC was 43.1%, leaving 56.9% of those in prison without a high school degree.
- The percent with a high school diploma represents a small increase of 1.2% since 1981.


## PERCENT OF HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES DECEMBER 31, 1986

## INMATE CLASSIFICATION SCORE LEVEL DECEMBER 31, 1986





- 20.6% of the institution population were scored as level three inmates.


#### **ESCAPE HISTORY**

- 84.6% of the institution population had no history of escape.
- 11.4% of the institution population had walked away from a minimum security CDC facility.
- 4.0% of the institution population had escaped from a CDC facility with a fenced or walled perimeter. This figure compares to 5.7% who had escaped from an institution with a fenced or walled perimeter in 1981.
  - 3.5% had breached the perimeter.
  - 0.5% had escaped with force.

## CHARACTERISTICS OF THE INSTITUTION POPULATION

#### **MILITARY HISTORY**

- 12.7% of the institution population were given an honorable discharge from the armed forces.
- The percent of males given an honorable discharge from the military has decreased 3.3% from December 31, 1981.
- 87.3% had no military experience or did not receive an honorable discharge.




#### **EMPLOYMENT HISTORY**

## BEHAVIOR OF INMATES IN CDC INSTITUTIONS

## **HIGHLIGHTS**

The number of incidents in the California Department of Corrections (CDC) institutions decreased to 5,087 in Calendar Year 1986 from 1985.

The incident rate per 100 average daily institution population decreased from 11.49 in 1985 to 9.57 during Calendar Year 1986.

The rate of escape per 100 average daily institution population was 0.16, the lowest escape rate CDC has ever experienced.

There were 765 assaults on staff during Calendar Year 1986, the highe 'ever in CDC. The rate of assaults on staff was the same as in 1981.

There were no fatal assaults against staff during Calendar Year 1986.

37.1% of all incidents in CDC involved assaults by inmates against staff or other inmates.

There were 21 fatal assaults against inmates during Calendar Year 1986.


Drug related incidents accounted for 31.5 % of all CDC incidents.


- The number of incidents in the California Department of Corrections (CDC) totaled 5,087. This represented a decrease of 134 (2.6%) from 1985.
- Calendar Year 1986 was the first year since 1970 that CDC experienced a decrease in total incidents.

#### RATE OF INCIDENTS AND ESCAPES

- The rate of incidents per 100 average daily institution population was 9.57. This represented a decrease from the 1985 rate of 11.49.
- The rate of incidents has gone down for the last two years since it reached an all time high of 12.73 in 1984.
- The rate of escapes from CDC institutions and camps was 0.16 per 100 average daily institution population. This rate was the lowest escape rate in CDC history.
- This represents a slight decrease of .02 from the 1985 rate and has decreased considerably from the rate of 2.48 that occurred in 1972.

#### TYPE OF INCIDENTS


Total assaults represented the largest proportion of incidents occurring in CDC institutions.

- Assaults without a weapon accounted for 19.6% (999) of total incidents.
- Assaults with a weapon represented 17.5% (890) of all incidents.
- Drug related incidents accounted for 31.5% (1,603) of all incidents.
- Possession of a weapon accounted for 22.4% (1,138) of all incidents.
- Sex related incidents accounted for 1.2% (62) of total incidents.
- Suicides accounted for 0.3% (13) of total incidents.

#### ASSAULTS ON STAFF


- The number of assaults by inmates on staff totaled 765, the largest number ever experienced by CDC.
- This represents an increase of 26 (3.5%) from 1985 and an increase of 396 (107.3%) from 1981.
- The number of staff assaulted by inmates was 986, again, the most ever assaulted.
- The rate of assaults on staff per 100 average daily institution population was 1.4.
- This rate was the same as it was during 1981 and an increase of 0.9 from 1977.

#### TYPE OF INCIDENTS CALENDAR YEAR 1986





### ASSAULT BY INMATES AGAINST STAFF AND NUMBER OF STAFF ASSAULTED





## ASSAULTS ON STAFF WITH AND WITHOUT WEAPONS

- There were 114 assaults against staff involving a weapon during 1986. This number accounted for 14.9% of total assaults on staff.
- This number represented a decrease of 45 from the all time high of 159 that occurred during 1985.
- The rate of assault against staff with a weapon was 0.2 per 100 average daily institution population.
- Assaults against staff without a weapon accounted for 85.1% (651) of total assaults.
- The rate of assault against staff without a weapon was 1.2 per 100 average daily institution population, the same rate of assault that occurred during 1981.

#### **FATAL ASSAULTS**

- No staff were killed by inmates during Calendar Year 1986.
- There have been 3 staff killed in assaults by inmates since 1977.
- There were a total of 21 fatal assaults on inmates in CDC institutions during 1986.
- This was an increase of 6 since 1985 and an increase of 4 from five years ago (1981).


#### BEHAVIOR OF INMATES IN CDC INSTITUTIONS

#### NUMBER OF ESCAPES

The rate of escape per 100 average daily institution population was 0.16, the lowest ever in CDC history.

- The number of escapes from CDC institutions and camps totaled 84.
- This was a decrease of 49 from 1981 and a decrease of 57 from 1977.
- There were 29 (34.5%) escapes from male institutions, the lowest number ever experienced by CDC.
- There were 50 (59.5%) escapes from male camps.


#### TIME CREDITS

Information presented below shows the average days lost by male felon inmates due to serious behavior reports (CDC 115, see note).

- The average number of days lost per male felon (based on the average daily institution population) was 28.1. This average includes both inmates who lost credits and those who did not lose credits.
- The average days lost decreased for the second year in a row following the large increase in 1983.

On January 1, 1983 legislation was implemented which increased the number of time credits lost for one offense from 45 to 180 days. This explains the large increase in credits lost since 1982.

### **HIGHLIGHTS**

On December 31, 1986 the California Department of Corrections (CDC) felon parole population reached an all time high of 31,730.

The CDC parole population increased 13.0% from December 31, 1985 and 139.3% from December 31, 1977.

The 1986 parole population reached a high of 116.26 parolees per 100,000 California population, the highest ever in CDC history.

There were 37,474 parole releases from CDC institutions and temporary release status during Calendar Year 1986. Of these:

- 23,898 were first releases to parole.
- 13,576 were being re-released to parole.

The majority (51.9%) of felon parolees were 25 through 34 years of age.

40.7% of the parole population were originally committed for Property Offenses.


The California Department of Corrections (CDC) felon parole population reached an all time high of 31,730.

- The parole population increased 13.0% (3,655) from December 31, 1985.
- The parole population increased 139.3% (18,472) from December 31, 1977.
- Male felon parolees numbered 29,317 (92.4%), while female felon parolees numbered 2,413 (7.6%).

#### **OFFENSE CATEGORIES**

- Violent offenses accounted for 35.2% (11,100) of the felon parole population.
- Property offenses accounted for 40.7% (12,841) of the felon parole population.
- Drug offenses accounted for 16.4% (5,187) of the felon parole population.
- Other offenses accounted for 7.7% (2,445) of the felon parole population.

#### **RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS**

The White racial/ethnic group has decreased from 45.4% of the parole population in 1977 to 33.3% in 1986, while the Mexican/American group has increased from 19.7% to 29.2% for the same time period.


- Whites accounted for 33.3% (10,577) of the parole population.



#### RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS DECEMBER 31, 1986





# AGE GROUPS DECEMBER 31, 1986



#### TIME SPENT ON PAROLE

Most (72.3%) felons had served less than two years on parole; however, the largest single group (37.4%) had spent one to two years on parole as of the end of 1986.

- 34.9% of the parolees had spent less than one year on parole, compared to 88.7% in 1981 and 65.9% in 1977.
- 53.2% of the parole population spent one to three years on parole as of the end of 1986.

Note: The determinate sentencing law went into effect on July 1, 1977, which may help explain the variation in time on parole during the last ten years.

#### RELEASES TO PAROLE

#### **During Calendar Year 1986:**

- There were 37,474 parole releases from CDC institutions and temporary release status. Of those:
  - 21,967 (58.6%) were first releases to parole from institutions.
  - 1,931 (5.2%) were first releases to parole from temporary release status.
  - 12,924 (34.5%) were being re-released to parole from institutions.
  - 652 (1.7%) were re-released to parole from temporary release status.

Note: First releases to parole include new admissions and PV-WNT's (parole violators with new term) being paroled for the first time on their new commitment. Re-released to parole are PV-RTC's (parole violators returned to custody) being paroled after their return to prison.

#### PAROLE POPULATION, RECEIVED AND RELEASED

#### **During Calendar Year 1986:**

#### TIME SERVED BY OFFENSE CATEGORY

The total average time served in prison before being first released to parole (see note) was 25.5 months, including preconfinement time.


- The violent offense category served an average of 35.8 months before being released to parole.
- The property offense category served an average of 19.8 months before being released to parole.
- The drug offense category served an average of 18.9 months before being released to parole.
- Other offenses served an average of 19.5 months before being released to parole.

#### TIME SERVED BY OFFENSE GROUP

- Murder First had the highest average time served of the offense groups, averaging 166.0 months.
- Murder Second had the second highest time served, averaging 76.3 months.
- Petty Theft had the lowest time served of all the offense groups, averaging 15.0 months.
- Marijuana offenses had the second lowest time served average, with 16.1 months.



#### TIME SERVED BY OFFENSE CATEGORY CALENDAR YEAR 1986





#### REGION OF PAROLE RELEASE CALENDAR YEAR 1986



#### REGION OF PAROLE RELEASE

- The region of parole for those first paroled and re-paroled for Calendar Year 1986 was as follows:
  - Region I had 7,770 releases to parole.
  - Region II had 8,496 releases to parole.
  - Region III had 10,068 releases to parole.
  - Region IV had 11,140 releases to parole.





  - 1,102 (72.9%) were males.
  - 292 (27.1%) were females.
- The CNA population reached an all time high of 5,642 on December 31, 1973.
- The CNA population decreased 71.9% (3,562) from December 31, 1977.





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#### GLOSSARY OF COMMONLY USED TERMS

**AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION:** The average population per day in a CDC facility for a given amount of time, usually one year.

**BOARD OF PRISON TERMS (BPT):** The state agency which has jurisdiction over the release to parole of inmates sentenced to indeterminate terms and parole revocation of all felons.

**BREACH OF PERIMETER:** Escape from a CDC facility which contains a fenced or walled perimeter.

CDC 115: A behavior report documenting an inmate's violation of California law or a serious rule of the Rules and Regulations of the Director of Corrections while incarcerated.

CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS (CDC): The state agency which has jurisdiction over the California prison and parole system and the California Rehabilitation Center.

CALIFORNIA REHABILITATION CENTER (CRC): An institution operated by the California Department of Corrections which is designated for the Civil Narcotic Addict (CNA) program.

CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY (CYA): The state agency which has jurisdiction over and maintains institutions as correctional schools for the reception of wards of the juvenile court and other persons committed from justice, municipal and superior courts.

CIVIL COMMITMENT: A type of commitment in which criminal proceedings are suspended while a defendant undergoes treatment at the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC) as a narcotic addict.

CIVIL NARCOTIC ADDICT: A commitment from court when one has been convicted of a crime but has been determined to be addicted to a dangerous drug. The sentencing of the crime has been suspended and the person is committed under a civil commitment and sent to the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC).

**COMMITMENT RATE:** The number of persons being committed to prison during a specified time period per 100,000 population, usually state or county population.

COMMUNITY BASED FACILITIES: County, state, and privately contracted facilities which are located in local communities; includes inmates in work furlough and prisoner-mother programs, and parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTC's) who are serving revocation time in county jails.

COUNTY DIAGNOSTIC CASE: A person who has been convicted of a felony and sent to prison by the court to receive a diagnostic evaluation (under Penal Code Section 1203.3) to determine whether he or she should be sentenced to state prison, or probation, and/or jail.

#### GLOSSARY OF COMMONLY USED TERMS

(CSS I,II,III, IV AND V) CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES SCHEDULE I, II, III, IV AND V: A drug, substance or immediate precursor which is set forth in Health and Safety Code Sections 11054 through 11058. These include heroin, marijuana, amphetamines, barbiturates and psychedelics. The schedules categorize substances according to their potential for abuse and set restrictions for their use.

- Schedule I: Severely addictive substances with absolutely no medical use; for research only.
- Schedule II: Highly addictive substances with restricted medical use in emergency cases only.
- Schedule III: Moderately addictive substances with medical use; doctor's prescription required.
- Schedule IV: Substances with medical use and low abuse potential; doctor's prescription required.
- Schedule V: Substances with medical use and low abuse potential; doctor's prescription not necessarily required.

COURT COMMITMENT: A person received by CDC from court to serve time on a conviction. A commitment can be as a felon, civil narcotic addict, county diagnostic case, or CYA commitment.

**CLASSIFICATION LEVEL:** Using a uniform classification scoring system developed by CDC, which includes items such as length of sentence, social stability factors, escape history, and prior prison performance, inmates are grouped into four levels to help determine the level of security and other needs. The score given an inmate can be reduced or increased depending on behavior in prison. The categories for 1986 are as follows:

- Level 1 = 0 to 23 points: Minimum Security
- Level 2 = 24 to 33 points: Minimum/Medium Security
- Level 3 = 34 to 55 points: Medium Security
- Level 4 = Over 55 points: Maximum Security

**DETERMINATE SENTENCING:** The sentencing structure which became effective in California July 1, 1977. Determinate sentencing requires imposition of a term of imprisonment proportionate to the seriousness of the crime, with uniform sentences for like crimes.

#### GLOSSARY OF COMMONLY USED TERMS

**ESCAPE RETURN:** When an inmate escapes from a CDC facility and is returned to prison either with or without a new term from court.

**FELONY:** A crime which is punishable by death or by imprisonment in state prison.

**GRADE LEVEL PLACEMENT:** The actual grade completed or the grade the inmate is placed in from testing upon entering a CDC reception center.

**INCARCERATION RATE:** The number of persons in prison per 100,000 population, usually state or county population.

**INCIDENT:** An event committed by an inmate in a CDC facility which is either against the law or a violation of the Rules and Regulations of the Director of Corrections.

INDETERMINATE SENTENCING: A type of sentencing structure used in California until July 1, 1977 where the purpose of sentencing was rehabilitation, and the parole authority, ather than the Legislature or the courts, determined the length of sentence. Under indeterminate sentencing, the commitment is not for a single specific period of time (such as three, five or seven years), but is instead for a range of time (such as fifteen years to life). Indeterminate sentences are still given for offenses committed before July 1, 1977 and for crimes which carry life sentences.

JAIL: A county or municipal facility for incarceration of sentenced and unsentenced persons.

JUVENILE: A person under the age of 18.

MISDEMEANOR: A crime punishable by imprisonment in a county jail, a fine or both. Under certain conditions defined in Section 17 of the Penal Code, a felony crime can be treated like a misdemeanor.

**NEW ADMISSION FROM COURT:** An original commitment from Superior Court where the inmate is given a new CDC identification number. A new admission from court can be for a felony conviction or a civil narcotic addict commitment.

OFFENDER BASED INFORMATION SYSTEM (OBIS): An automated computer system designed to track all movements of inmates committed to the California Department of Corrections from the time of their admission to their discharge from prison or parole.

OFFENSE: The principal or controlling offense for which the person was committed to prison.

OFFENSE CATEGORIES: The grouping of offense groups into four major categories.

**OFFENSE GROUPS:** The grouping of offenses into 31 offense groupings used for summary statistics.

#### **GLOSSARY OF COMMONLY USED TERMS**

**OUTPATIENT STATUS:** A civil narcotic addict released from the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC) to the jurisdiction of the Parole and Community Services Division.

**PAROLE:** A period of supervision in the community following completion of a prison sentence. The conditional release provides supervision and control over offenders after they return to society.

PAROLE VIOLATOR WITH A NEW TERM (PV-WNT): A parolee who has violated the terms of parole by committing a new crime and has been returned to prison with a new commitment from court.

PAROLE VIOLATOR RETURNED TO CUSTODY (PV-RTC): A parolee who has violated the terms of parole, been revoked from parole by the Board of Prison Terms (BPT), and returned to prison.

**PENDING REVOCATION:** One who has committed a violation of parole but has yet to have a parole revocation hearing and is being held either in county jail or a state prison facility.

**PRINCIPAL CONTROLLING OFFENSE:** The offense which usually has the greatest term of imprisonment imposed by the court, including enhancements. This offense is also used for statistical information for official publications put out by CDC.

**PRISON:** A state correctional facility where persons are confined following conviction of a felony offense.

**RATE:** As used in this publication, the ratio of the number of one specific group to a population base.

**REVOCATION:** Cancellation or suspension of parole by the Board of Prison Terms (BPT).

**REVOKE:** To withdraw, repeal, or cancel parole.

STATE JUVENILE COMMITMENT: Commitment to the California Youth Authority or equivalent in other states.

**TEMPORARY RELEASE STATUS:** An inmate released temporarily from a CDC institution to go back to court, jail, an outside hospital or medical facility, or on temporary community leave.

WALKAWAY: An inmate who escapes from, or fails to return to, prison, a community based facility, or correctional camp with no fenced or walled perimeter.
