About the National Institute of Justice

The National Institute of Justice is a research branch of the U.S. Department of Justice. The Institute's mission is to develop knowledge about crime, its causes and control. Priority is given to policy-relevant research that can yield approaches and information that State and local agencies can use in preventing and reducing crime. The decisions made by criminal justice practitioners and policymakers affect millions of citizens, and crime affects almost all our public institutions and the private sector as well. Targeting resources, assuring their effective allocation, and developing new means of cooperation between the public and private sector are some of the emerging issues in law enforcement and criminal justice that research can help illuminate.

Carrying out the mandate assigned by Congress in the Justice Assistance Act of 1984, the National Institute of Justice:

- Sponsors research and development to improve and strengthen the criminal justice system and related civil aspects, with a balanced program of basic and applied research.
- Evaluates the effectiveness of justice improvement programs and identifies programs that promise to be successful if continued or repeated.
- Tests and demonstrates new and improved approaches to strengthen the justice system, and recommends actions that can be taken by Federal, State, and local governments, and private organizations and individuals to achieve this goal.
- Disseminates information from research, demonstrations, evaluations, and special programs to Federal, State, and local governments, and serves as an internationl clear-inghouse of justice information.
- Trains criminal justice practitioners in research and evaluation findings, and assists practitioners and researchers through fellowships and special seminars.

The Director of the Institute is appointed by the President of the United States, and upon confirmation by the Senate, serves at the President's pleasure. The Director establishes the research and development objectives of the Institute. The Director has final authority to approve grants, contracts, and cooperative agreements, and maintains responsibility for fiscal operations of the Attorney General and the needs of the criminal justice field. The Institute actively solicits the views of police, courts, and corrections practitioners as well as the private sector to identify the most critical problems and to plan research that can help resolve them.

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Introduction

The National Institute of Justice/NCJRS published the first edition of the <u>Directory of Criminal Justice Information Sources</u> in 1977. This seventh edition updates previous editions and is based on a 1988 survey of more than 400 criminal justice agencies. Questionnaires were mailed to all agencies listed in the sixth edition (1986) and to additional agencies identified by NCJRS staff.

Criteria for selection

The following guidelines were used to select entries for the <u>Directory</u>:

- The organization provides, as a major function, information services on a national, regional, or statewide basis.
- The organization provides criminal justice-related information as a major function.
- The organization's information services include one or more of the following: data base searches, document dissemination or delivery, practical information on setting up programs, reference services, and technical assistance.
- The organization answers telephone and mail requests.
- Costs for services or membership are not prohibitive or excessively restrictive.

The following types of organizations are not included in the Directory:

- Publishers and agencies that provide only consulting services, technical assistance, or training.
- All foreign-based organizations.

Although every effort was made to contact known criminal justice information sources, this <u>Directory</u> should not be considered exhaustive. Editorial selection requirements, unanswered inquiries, and lack of information may have excluded some sources.

The <u>Directory</u> contains information on 167 organizations. Information includes the following:
