Cover: KEEPING MANY BALLS IN THE AIR at the same time, the staff of the Law Library of Louisiana at the Supreme Court in New Orleans juggles a wide variety of functions to fulfill its mission. One major challenge is to "keep the home fires burning" — selecting, ordering and cataloging new titles; recording and processing the thousands of supplements and continuations that update the collection; and assisting patrons in the library and around the state in carrying on their legal research. At the same time the staff is constantly extending itself to learn about and introduce the latest innovations in legal publishing and research. The extremely popular Westlaw service, which provides every Louisiana judge and attorney with access to computer-assisted legal research, has now been joined by other on-line information services. Compact disk technology has arrived at the library in the form of a computer-searchable index of legal periodicals and newspapers. Many new CD-ROM products are on the threshold of publication. The library's new telefacsimile machine makes it possible to receive materials from other libraries and to send materials to patrons anywhere a FAX machine is located. Detailed statistical facts and recitation of the projects and programs of the Judicial Administrator's Office; the Law Library of Louisiana; the Judiciary Commission; the Judicial College; and the numerous activities of the Judicial Council itself are presented in this the 1988 Annual Report of the Judicial Council of the Louisiana Supreme Court.

Of major note in 1988 was the appointment of Dr. Hugh M. Collins as Judicial Administrator of the Louisiana Supreme Court. The court reached its decision following a nationwide search. The appointment of Timothy J. Palmatier as Chief Deputy Judicial Administrator was announced early in 1989. This appointment was also made following an extensive search.

Additionally, two attorneys, Nancy C. Chachere and Timothy F. Averill have joined the Judicial Administrator's staff as Deputy Judicial Administrators.

As in years past, the various elements of the judicial system in Louisiana continues to work for the improvement of the product: the delivery of justice to our citizens.

# The Judicial Council

One new judgeship for the Baton Rouge City Court was created as the result of investigation and recommendation by the Committee to Evaluate Requests for New Judgeships, chaired by Retired Judge Thomas W. Tanner. Two requests for additional judgeships and one request for the split of a judicial district were rejected by the Judicial Council following investigation by the Committee.

Judge Arthur J. Planchard's Committee to Study Adoption of Letter Size Paper as a Standard for Louisiana Courts, staffed by Ronald Wm. Stritzinger and Paulette H. Holahan researched and analyzed numerous reports; met with the National Center for States Courts' expert; and solicited widely for comment from the legal community relevant to this topic. Following open hearings, scheduled for early in 1989, the committee is expected to report its findings to the Judicial Council.

Judge Gerald P. Fedoroff, along with his Committee to Develop Time Standards for District Courts staffed by Dr. Hugh M. Collins, Judicial Administrator, conducted a training session for the team members of five pilot site courts involved in an attempt to apply the American Bar Association Standards for Civil Case Processing. Speakers were national experts in trial court delay reduction. Numerous stumbling blocks to implementation of the pilot projects, however, have been encountered. Assistance from the A.B.A. is anticipated in working through the difficulties.

The Committee to Develop Time Standards for the Courts of Appeal, chaired by Judge James C. Gulotta, added the Louisiana Supreme Court to the scope of its charge and a report has been submitted to the Supreme Court for study. Additionally, the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeal has been selected as one of five courts nationally to be part of a pilot project of the lawyers Conference of the A.B.A. Task Force on Cost and Delay Reduction. The results of this experience will be utilized by Judge Gulotta's committe in its work.

Following a year of adaptation, implementation of the procedures attendant on the passage of Amendment No. 1 to the Louisiana constitution has been accomplished. Justice Harry T. Lemmon chaired the Committee which developed this new procedure for the appointment of Ad Hoc Judges.

The Judicial Planning Committee component of the Judicial Council is chaired by Justice James L. Dennis and consists of several subcommittees, all of which have been extremely active during 1988.

The Science and Technology Committee, chaired by Judge Leon Ford, III, and staffed by Ronald Wm. Stritzinger prepared a program in cooperation with the Louisiana Court Administrators Association demonstrating three alternative methods of court reporting, each utilizing the latest technology: audio reporting; video reporting; and steno Computer Aided Transcription (CAT).

The Juvenile Court Subcommittee, chaired by Judge Salvadore T. Mulé is working with LSU Law School Prof. Lucy McGough to develop the Children's Code Project and has been cooperating with the Louisiana Law Institute on changes in the Code on Adoption of Children. Additionally, the committee is directing the update of the Juvenile Court Bench Book on an annual basis and continues with the process of developing a uniform system for reporting new filings.

Legislation providing for improvement in the appellate process was passed as the result of recommendations of the Appellate Court Delay/Court Reporting Subcommittee chaired by Retired Judge Cleveland J. Marcel, Sr., specifically: provision for appeal notification to the Courts of Appeal at all stages of the process, providing for efficient tracking and subsequent speeding up of the criminal appellate process;

# The Judicial Administrator Reports



HUGH M. COLLINS, Ph.D. Judicial Administrator

1988 was a year of dramatic changes. In April the Court appointed me Judicial Administrator. On June 15, Mr. Lansing L. Mitchell, Jr., was killed in a tragic automobile accident. Lance was a member of our staff for more than ten years. He was known throughout the state and will be missed by hundreds of friends and co-workers. In the fall of 1988, Ms. Nancy Chachere joined our staff to work with the Judiciary Commission and with Judicial Council committees. In addition, Mr. Claude Gasper joined the staff to

work on the preliminary stages of a new court information system, and early in 1989 Mr. Timothy F. Averill also began work with our office.

Prior to filling the vacancies, all of our staff worked longer and harder than ever before due to increased workload. This hard work has resulted in professional recognition: Mrs. Paulette Holahan was elected President of the Louisiana Court Administrators Association, Mrs. Rose Marie Bye was elected Secretary of the Louisiana Shorthand Reporters Association, and Mrs. Michelle Speaser passed her C.P.A. exam.

Finances continued to be a problem for courts in Louisiana. Several parishes experienced grave problems in paying their mandated share of the costs of the courts. At the state level, the Judicial Budgetary Control Board prepared a lean and carefully scrutinized judicial appropriations bill. With the support of the Governor and of the leadership of the legislature, the bill was enacted into law.

Mr. Timothy Palmatier, Mrs. Speaser, and Mr. Ronnie Stritzinger of my office are involved in two major finance projects. The first is the acquisition and implementation of a new financial software system which will enable my office to continue to handle the ever increasing volume of demands upon the Finance Section. In addition, the Finance Section is actively involved in a study of the operation and financing of the Orleans Parish courts which was begun by the legislature and the Judicial Council. This study seeks to identify methods of increasing the efficiency of the Orleans Parish courts and alternative methods of financing these courts.

Perhaps the most dramatic development affecting Louisiana courts during 1988 was the appointment of the Governor's Special Task Force on Judicial Selection. This Task Force, created in the wake of several federal lawsuits and chaired by Judge Thomas W. Tanner, has been charged with reviewing and recommending changes in the method of selecting judges at all levels of the Louisiana judiciary. My office has monitored the progress of this Task Force and answered their requests for information. The Task Force expects to issue its final report in mid-March of 1989.

The Judicial Council has continued to work effectively to improve Louisiana's courts. My office has provided staff services to the various Judicial Council subcommittees: Mr. Stritzinger and I staff the Courts of Appeal Time Standards Committee which is chaired by Judge James Gulotta. Mr.

Palmatier and I staff the District Court Time Standards Committee, chaired by Judge Gerald Fedoroff. Mr. Stritzinger and Mrs. Bye provide staff assistance to the Appellate Court Delay/ Court Reporting Subcommittee, chaired by Judge Cleveland Marcel, Retired. Mrs. Holahan and Mr. Stritzinger provide staff support to the Committee to Consider the Adoption of Letter Size Paper as a Standard for Louisiana Courts, chaired by Judge A. J. Planchard. Mr. Stritzinger staffs the Science and Technology Committee, chaired by Judge Leon Ford. Prior to his death, Mr. Mitchell staffed the Juvenile Court Subcommittee. His responsibilities will be taken over by Ms. Chachere. Mrs. Holahan and I provide staff support to the Committee to Evaluate Requests for the Creation of New District Judgeships, chaired by Judge Thomas Tanner. Mrs. Holahan provides staff support to the Courts/Community Relations Subcommittee and has been assigned to staff the Judicial Council.

The Committee on Jury Standards, chaired by Judge Melvin A. Shortess and staffed by Ms. Nancy Chachere, is nearing completion of the commentary which will accompany the already completed draft of their proposed standards for juror use and management in Louisiana. Once the commentary is completed, the standards and commentary will be ready to be presented to the Judicial Council.

The 1988 Legislature appropriated money for the first two phases of the three-phase renovation of 400 Royal Street for use by the Supreme Court, the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeal, and the Attorney General. Bids were let and a contractor has been selected for phase one. Construction is scheduled to begin as soon as new quarters are found for state employees currently housed in the building.

1989 will be the 200th Anniversary of the French Revolution and the Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the drafting of the Bill of Rights. A committee, chaired by Justice James L. Dennis of the Louisiana Supreme Court, is preparing an international celebration of these anniversaries called the Contagion of Liberty or "Vent de la Liberte". Mrs. Holahan is serving as administrator for the program.

#### HUGH M. COLLINS, Ph.D.

Of major importance in 1988 was the appointment of Dr. Hugh M. Collins as Judicial Administrator of the Louisiana Supreme Court, by unanimous choice of the Court. Dr. Collins has served as Acting Judicial Administrator since the retirement of Eugene J. Murret in 1987.

Dr. Collins began working with the Judicial Administrator's office in 1974 developing management information systems. In 1980 he became Chief Deputy Judicial Administrator.

Collins, 44, is a native of Mobile, Alabama and has lived in New Orleans since 1960. He holds a B.S. in Mathematics from Boston College which he attended on a Presidential Scholarship; a Ph.D. in Mathematics from Tulane University; and is a Fellow of the Institute for Court Management. He is married to Sheila O'Donnell Collins, who chairs the Mathematics Department of Newman School in New Orleans.

# Law Library of Louisiana 1988 Annual Report

That the ability to obtain access to information frequently determines the success of endeavors in today's complex society is axiomatic. Whether the person requiring the information is a judge, court administrator, law clerk, practicing attorney or member of the general public, that person's job can be accomplished more efficiently and thoroughly if a wide range of both retrospective and current resources is readily available. It is the mission of the Law Library of Louisiana to provide the means of obtaining the desired material wherever and in what ever format it may be found. This may mean anything from a rare seventeenth-century volume to a computer printout-books, periodicals, unpublished documents, microforms, and compact disks in our own library, or information transmitted from other libraries, agencies, or vendors via computer, telefacsimile machine, or old-fashioned mail or telephone. During 1988 the law library staff has expanded existing services; added new services, materials and equipment, and acquired new skills in an effort to meet the growing demand for more varied and unusual information.

The library's dedicated staff remains its most valuable resource. In June reference librarian Randal Owen graduated from law school and moved to a new position in Los Angeles. His successor, Tina McLellan, who also holds a J.D. degree and has clerked, practiced and worked as a law firm librarian, is a great asset to the staff. Bringing the perspective of a practitioner to her duties as a Westlaw searcher, she with the able assistance of Janice Shull—has made the computer research service more popular than ever, with 539 searches having been conducted in 1988. During fiscal year 1987/88 profits reached an all-time high and usage thus far is running 13% higher.

Westlaw continues to add an increasing number of databases at a rapid pace, and several are of particular interest to Louisiana lawyers. The Louisiana statutes, annotations to the statues, and legislative acts are now online.

A new on-line service, Data Times now provides access to the full text of articles from wire services and major newspapers from around the world. Through Data Times, users may gain access to Dow Jones News/Retrieval databases, which contain information on American demographics and financial news worldwide. Legal Trac is our new system that accomplishes computer-assisted retrieval of references to law review articles and other legal publications. Monthly installation of a new compact disk keeps the index current.

Notwithstanding the increasing popularity of computer-based services, the library's traditional collection of books and serials grew significantly during 1987/88. Acquisitions librarian Betty Kern reported a net gain of 2,068 volumes, of which 500 constitute 267 brand new titles. Microforms assistant D. D. Thompson added 12,074 fiches, equivalent to 2,012 paper volumes, to our cabinets. Two major microfiche purchases enrich the library's historical research capabilities: reports and documents of the U. S. Congress from the early part of the century (extending our run backwards); and superseded state codes and statutes. This brings the library's volume count to 136,426. The cost of acquiring material during 1987/88 constitutes 53% of the year's total expenditures.

The library was particularly pleased to arrange to receive at no charge the slip opinions from the Louisiana first, second, and fifth appellate circuits. Third circuit opinions have been available for several years. A major accomplishment for the library was the completion of the retrospective conversion project which has been under way for several years. Although the library began cataloging all new acquisitions on the OCLC network's on-line cataloging system in 1982, all cataloging records prior to that date needed to be converted to machine-readable format. We contracted with OCLC to complete conversion of 6,000 titles. This benefits the library by laying the groundwork for advancing to the next stage of automation—the on-line local cataloging system. Our resource-sharing ability is also greatly enhanced since other libraries will now be able to recognize via computer that we own many older materials. An upgrading of the memory in our cataloging computers also prepares us to participate in our OCLC network's new on-line system.

Several other new pieces of equipment are also contributing to improved services. The new telefacsimile (FAX) machine makes it possible to transmit instantly via telephone lines copies of any library materials, as well as correspondence and reports. In an effort to eliminate the theft of books, the library has installed an electronic detection system at the exit, which sounds an alarm when specially-marked items are carried past it.

Our professional staff members continue to participate actively in continuing education programs offered by the American Association of Law Libraries and other institutions. All hold leadership positions in AALL at either the national, regional, or local levels and have served as speakers for educational meetings. Janice Shull and Tina McLellan are respectively president-elect and secretary of the New Orleans Chapter of AALL. Betty Kern was elected secretary of the Southeastern Chapter and of the Technical Services Special Interest Section. Carol Billings now serves as chair of the AALL Special Interest Section Council, and during 1987/88 was chair of the State, Court and County Law Libraries Section.

The Friends of the Library continue faithfully to contribute toward the purchase of much needed new materials and to support educational opportunities for the staff. — Carol Billings

# Louisiana Judicial College 1988 Annual Report

The addition of a highly successful Summer School for Judges was the highlight of the Judicial College's efforts in judicial education in 1988. The Summer School, held in conjunction with the State Bar's Summer School for Lawyers and State Bar Convention in Sandestin, Fla. in June attracted 135 judges.

Another major addition in the legal education of Louisiana judges was the Judicial College's New Judges' Seminar, conducted in New Orleans during December. Fourteen new judges received intensive training from a faculty composed of five experienced trial and appellate judges, and a law

professor.

As in past years, the major thrust of the Judicial College's efforts in judicial education has been the presentation of educational programs at judicial meetings. Educational programs were provided at these meetings: Joint Meeting of the City and Juvenile Judges, 65 attendees; Annual Spring Judges' Conference, 227 attendees; Summer School for Judges, 135 attendees; Mid-Year Juvenile Judges Meeting, 44 attendees; Annual Fall Judges' Conference, 197 attendees; Annual Fourth & Fifth Circuit Judges Conference, 34 attendees.

The Judicial College also sponsored three special seminars for Louisiana judges during the year. The conferences and attendees were: Evidence and Trial Practice for Louisiana Judges, 97 attendees; The New Louisiana Evidence Code, 102 attendees; and Perspectives on Louisiana Tort Law (dedicated to Professor Ferdinand Stone, Professor Emeritus

of Law at Tulane Law School), 89 attendees.



During 1988 the College republished the Louisiana Judicial Law Clerk's Manual. The manual was distributed, without cost, to all Louisiana judges who have law clerks. Also in 1988 the College completed and distributed the City Judges Benchbook, without cost, to all judges with limited jurisdiction.

Several other publications are in progress, including civil jury charges, a civil judges benchbook, the updating of the juvenile judges' benchbook and criminal judges' benchbook,

and a handbook for Louisiana clerks of court.

In its efforts to keep judges abreast of recent developments, the Judicial College published a criminal newsletter, and distributed to the judiciary copies of 1988 legislative acts having immediate impact upon pending cases, as well as a summary of other legislative developments during the 1988 session.

provision for timely order of appeals, return dates and notices in the trial court; an extension of the appeal return date; timely preparation and lodging of the record by the clerk of the appellate court; a requirement that all records for appellate court be certified and dated upon completion by the clerk; timely preparation and delivery of transcripts to the Court of Appeal; and to provide for contempt of court for failure to comply with the appellate procedure.

The Courts Community Relations Subcommittee chaired by Richard F. Knight and staffed by Paulette H. Holahan is actively involved in the production of a Jury Orientation film which it is anticipated will be suitable for statewide usage.

The annual survey of Louisiana's District Judges, conducted again this year by Paulette H. Holahan, for the Judicial Planning Committee, focused attention on appropriate action by the Judicial Council.

The survey revealed that Louisiana Judges continue to show concern for funding; judge space; juvenile facility space; and for the need for law clerks. Emerging for the first time was a concern for the "independence of the judiciary" and a corresponding concern about judicial selection/merit retention/reapportionment.

In 1988, the Judicial Council sought to actively involve the counsel for the House and Senate Judiciary Committees in the work of the Council in order to provide a means by which legislative bills affecting the judiciary, which did not receive the approval of the Judicial Council prior to submission to the legislature, can be identified.

#### THE JUDICIARY COMMISSION OF LOUISIANA 1988 ANNUAL REPORT

The Judiciary Commission of Louisiana, created in 1968 by an amendment to Article IX, Constitution of 1921, is continued in existence by Article V, Section 25, Constitution of 1974.

#### **Powers**

On recommendation of the Judiciary Commission, the Supreme Court may censure, suspend with or without salary, remove from office, or involuntarily retire a judge for willful misconduct relating to his official duty, willful and persistent failure to perform his duty, persistent and public conduct prejudicial to the administration of justice that brings the judicial office into disrepute, and conduct while in office which would constitute a felony, or conviction of a felony.

On recommendation of the Judiciary Commission, the Supreme Court may disqualify a judge from exercising any judicial function, without loss of salary, during pendency of disciplinary proceedings in the Supreme Court.

On recommendation of the Judiciary Commission, the Supreme Court may retire involuntarily a judge for disability that seriously interferes with the performance of his duties and that is or is likely to become permanent.

The Commission's jurisdiction includes justices and judges of all courts of this state, including commissioners, magistrates, justices of the peace, and mayors who perform judicial functions.

#### Confidentiality

In accordance with Rule XXIII, Section 23, of the Rules of the Supreme Court, all documents filed with and evidence and proceedings before the Commission are confidential unless and until the Commission files a recommendation for discipline or retirement with the Supreme Court. The record filed by the Commission with the Supreme Court and proceedings before the Supreme Court are not confidential. Once a recommendation is filed with the Supreme Court, it becomes public as any other case before the Court.

#### Complaints

During the year 1988 the Commission received 80 complaints against judges and justices of the peace, and 10 complaints were pending from 1987. These complaints included alleged violations of Canon 2, "A Judge Should Avoid Impropriety and the Appearance of Impropriety in All His Activities"; Canon 3, "A Judge Should Perform the Duties of His Office Impartially and Diligently"; Canon 7, "A Judge Should Refrain from Political Activity Inappropriate to His Judicial Office"; allegations of misconduct in exercising judicial discretion, unprofessional conduct, undue delays in rendering decisions, failure to perform judicial duties, among others, and were filed by litigants, interested citizens, and by the Commission's own motion.

#### Dispositions

During the year 1988 the Commission disposed of 74 complaints. These complaints were either closed because of insufficient evidence of judicial misconduct or otherwise resolved to the satisfaction of the Commission; 61 preliminary investigations were ordered and conducted; and one formal hearing was held. Sixteen cases are still pending at the beginning of 1989.



#### STATISTICAL APPENDIX

#### INTRODUCTION TO THE STATISTICAL SECTION


The statistical information in this section was compiled from data submitted to the Judicial Administrator's Office by the various courts of Louisiana during calendar year 1988.

In 1988, there were 3,109 filings in the Supreme Court. The filings in 1988 were 17.1% greater than the filings 10 years earlier. When compared with the 1987 filings, the 1988 filings represent a 7.8% increase.

In 1988, there were 7,844 total filings in the Louisiana courts of appeal. This represents an increase of 228.8% over the filings 10 years earlier. Total filings in 1988 were 6.2% greater than in 1987. The average time interval from the filing of a civil appeal to its disposition was 360 days in the First Circuit, 224 days in the Second Circuit, 422 days in the Third Circuit, 245 days in the Fourth Circuit, and 190 days in the Fifth Circuit. The average time interval from the filing of a criminal appeal to its disposition was 234 days in the First Circuit, 218 days in the Second Circuit, 250 days in the Third Circuit, 320 days in the Fourth Circuit, and 191 days in the Fifth Circuit

During the past 10 years, the combined civil and criminal filings in the district courts in Louisiana have increased by 44.3%. During 1988, there were 174,920 civil filings in the district courts, a decrease of 3.7% when compared with 1987. During 1988, there were 359,588 criminal filings in the district courts, an increase of 24% over 1987. Civil jury trials decreased by 4.6% when compared to 1987 and criminal jury trials increased by .4% when compared to 1987.

In 1988, there were 678,787 filings in Louisiana's city and parish courts. This represents an increase of 6.2% over the 1987 filings. In addition, the 1988 filings are 18.9% higher than the filings 10 years earlier.






