


Correctional Populations in the United States, 1987

Important note

Correctional Populations in the United States presents numbers that describe persons under some form of correctional supervision. In this compilation the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) seeks to help users by--

- making readily apparent the links between different correctional institutions or methods in each State
- suggesting the similarities and differences between States and regions as our system of criminal justice responds to both common and disparate needs
- permitting comparisons, however limited they must be, with previous years' statistics.

Helping readers find a single number

Through an **index** at the end of the volume, readers can find all topics treated in tables. The index numbers refer to tables.

Footnotes give extra information about how to interpret the numbers in the tables.

Category definitions are available in three places: the **explanatory notes** in the appendices of sections, the **questionnaires** also in the appendices, and the **definitions of common terms** in the introduction, page 1.

To make comparisons across years or between jurisdictions

BJS makes every effort to report numbers that are consistent in interpretation with those of the past and between separate jurisdictions in the present. Data collection rules and reporting protocols that fit historical statistics and that impose the least burden on respondents are used.

Some jurisdictions depart from the reporting conventions, and some categories for counting have shifted over the years. Users who try to draw conclusions from such numbers, comparing years or jurisdictions, must take into account special circumstances and changes. Footnotes, table notes, explanatory notes, and other material highlighting the tables must be consulted for a full understanding of the data.

Introduction

History of U.S. corrections statistics

In 1850 the Federal Government, in cooperation with the States as a part of the Seventh Decennial Census, initiated a count of prisoners in 32 States and in the territories of Minnesota, New Mexico, Oregon, and Utah. Between 1850 and 1870, U.S. marshalls administered the census of prisoners as part of a special schedule of social statistics. The 1880 report indicated there were 61 prisoners in State institutions per 100,000 residents. By 1890 Nevada had the highest per capita rate among the States, 203, and Wyoming had the lowest at 16. In that same year New York had 136 prisoners per 100,000 residents, and California had 169.

In 1910 the introduction of the indeterminate sentence was described in prisoner statistics; 21% of State prisoners on January 1 had received such sentences. The 1923 report said that more than a half of the prison admissions that year were under indeterminate sentences and observed that such sentences resulted in wide ranges between minimum and maximum sentences and disparities in setting release dates. In 1926 the Bureau of the Census began the annual collection of prisoner statistics, and the report for that year described the goal of the effort as the collection of data to "show the application of penal policies for various classes of offenders and in different parts of the country." That first annual report in 1926 provided information by jurisdiction on admissions, releases, sentences and time served, inmates under sentence of death, recidivism, and crowding-- issues of major concern today.

During the past 60 years the partnership between the Federal Government and the States and localities in collecting corrections data has grown and prospered.

In 1950 the program was transferred from the Bureau of the Census to the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) in the Department of Justice and in 1971 to the predecessor agency of the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), the National Criminal Justice Information and Statistics Service of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA). LEAA added the statistical series on local jails (1970), probation (1979), and parole (1976).

All of the major reporting series and projects of the corrections unit, Bureau of Justice Statistics, are outlined under "Data sources" below. The Bureau of the Census serves as the data collection agency for these series. When Congress created the Bureau of the Census in the late 19th century, it charged the agency with the responsibility to account for prisoners. That involvement has continued intermittently and in various forms until the present, as shown in the following chronology that sketches the evolution of the statistical reports grouped in this volume:

1904. Prisoners and Juvenile Delinquents, 1904 reported movements rather than individuals. Prison officials served as enumerators.

1923. Prisoners, 1923 presented adults separate from juveniles.

1926. Prisoners in State and Federal Prisons and Reformatories began as an annual report that continued until 1946. The report included a special section on prisoners under sentence of death. From 1946 to 1970 the Bureau of Prisons published the annual figures. The Law Enforcement Assistance Administration followed for 9 years until BJS was created in 1980. (The Bureau of the Census has acted as collecting agent since 1972.)

1947. The Bureau of Prisons began the separate annual reports on prisoners under sentence of death. The LEAA and then BJS continued the reports until 1984. The Bureau of Justice Statistics will continue to publish annual bulletins about the death penalty and persons sentenced to death; the more detailed statistics will appear in the corrections volume.

1965. The National Council on Crime and Delinquency (NCCD), a nongovernmental organization, started the Uniform Parole Reports project under Federal contract.

1970. LEAA conducted its first 1-day count of jails.

1974. LEAA, with the Bureau of the Census, surveyed a national random sample of offenders in State prisons. The survey, repeated in 1979 and 1986, collected information about personal background and criminal history and inquired about drug and alcohol usage.

1976. The NCCD and LEAA annual reports covered parole data beginning in 1976.

1978. The Bureau of the Census counted prisoners in U.S. jails; the Bureau repeated the complete enumeration in 1983.

1979. The first annual report on parole and probation appeared, published by BJS. This Department of Justice agency will continue issuing summary reports, reserving detailed data for the corrections statistics volume.

1982. The Bureau of the Census completed the first annual jail sample survey for BJS. Bulletins containing data from the sample survey will be supplemented by the corrections volume.

Definitions of common terms used in tables

Custody. To have custody of a prisoner, a State must hold that person in one of its facilities. Early statistical reports gave custody counts that largely have been replaced by jurisdiction counts of State prison populations. A State may have custody of a prisoner over whom another State maintains jurisdiction. For example, State A's prison burns, and State Z houses the A inmates temporarily. State Z has custody; State A has jurisdiction. The tables present both kinds of counting procedures, with jurisdiction counts being more complete; States that report only on custody are noted.

Detention status. This term distinguishes between prisoners, usually in jail, who were convicted or who were awaiting judgment.

Discretionary parole. A release from prison to supervision is discretionary when it is decided by a board or other authority.

Good time. When correctional authorities deduct time from a prison or jail sentence, often to reward or to encourage good behavior, they give good time. When the good time is tied to a specific action, such as working in a prison industry or performing a meritorious deed, it is called "earned."

Hispanic origin. A person of Hispanic origin may be of any race; however, a few States treat the ethnic category as a racial one. Reporting officials usually rely on self-definition, but some States classify according to surname.

Jurisdiction. Jurisdiction refers to a unit of government or to the legal authority to exercise governmental power. According to the latter meaning, the prisoners under a State's jurisdiction may be in the custody of local jails. (See "Custody.")

Mandatory parole. Mandatory parole results from statutory and correctional guidelines, and no judgment by a panel or board is required for release of a prisoner to supervision outside of prison.

Maximum sentence length. Some jurisdictions sentence offenders to a range of years; the larger number in that range is the most that a prisoner may serve on a sentence. Often, good time is subtracted from the maximum sentence. When the tables report on prisoners with sentences longer or shorter than a year, the maximum sentence is used where applicable.

Movement. In corrections, a movement is an admission to or a release from a status--prisoner, parolee, or probationer. A transfer between facilities does not, unless specifically noted, count as a movement.

One-day count. For a 1-day count a jurisdiction or facility is asked to report how many people were on its roll on a certain day. The average daily population is a year's total number of people on the roll each day, divided by the number of days. The methods of counting in aggregate do not yield estimates of either the number of persons in a status during a year or the average amount of time persons remain in a status.

Race. Classification by race often depends on the reporting program and the State. A few States reported two categories: white and nonwhite. A few others categorized Hispanic offenders as belonging to "Other race." Numbers of persons with certain racial backgrounds were sometimes estimated.

Reporting time. The prison, probation, parole, and capital punishment figures are from December 31, 1986, unless otherwise noted. The Bureau of the Census surveyed jails on June 30, 1986; they previously took a complete census of jails on June 30, 1983.

Revisions. Many States revise the yearend number reported for the previous year. Those revisions are made in the total, not the detail. For example, the numbers of blacks, whites, and members of other races for 1986 were not changed by a State in 1987 to equal its revised 1986 total.

Youthful offender status. State legislatures create the youthful offender status through statutes that provide for special sentencing, commitment, or record sealing procedures for young adult offenders adjudicated in a criminal court, as opposed to a juvenile court. The offenders may be above the statutory age limit for juveniles but below a specified upper age limit.

NPS8A. Yearend count of persons in prison under sentence of death.

NPS8B,C. Complete survey of States to determine any significant changes in statutes or case law relating to the death penalty.

NPR1. Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on probation by jurisdiction.

UPR1. Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on parole by jurisdiction.

CJ5. Annual sample survey of local jails to estimate the population of jails in jurisdictions holding a daily average of more than 100 people.

CJ5A. Annual sample survey of local jails to estimate the population of jails in jurisdictions holding a daily average of fewer than 100 people.

CJ42. Census every 5 years of all State-operated, community-based correctional facilities to record their characteristics.

Special studies of recidivism

It has incorporated into the parole records FBI data on each parolee's contacts with criminal justice agencies. The selected offenders were 18 to 22 years of age when they were released from prison in 1978.

Recidivism II. This data collection program permits analysis of criminal justice contacts through 1986 for a sample of 16,000 prisoners released from prisons in 11 States in 1983. The effort merges FBI, State, and local police records with correctional records.

Explanatory notes

The 1987 Annual Survey of Jails was the fifth annual survey sponsored by the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) and conducted by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. This series follows a similar effort made by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) during the 1970's.

The sample surveys yield estimates of the national jail population for those years that lack a complete enumeration. Full censuses were done on February 1, 1978, and June 30, 1983.

The 1987 survey, conducted on June 30, included 1,135 jails in 866 jurisdictions--counties, municipalities, or townships that administer 1 or more jails. A jurisdiction with an average daily inmate population of 100 or more in the 1983 census automatically entered the survey. Such units of government, referred to as certainty jurisdictions, accounted for 611 jails and 224,811 inmates, or 76% of the total estimated inmate population.

Administrators of jails in jurisdictions with large jail populations reported the number of inmates held because of crowded facilities elsewhere, jail capacity, and reasons for court orders, if any. (See the CJ-5 questionnaire.) The other jurisdictions in the survey belonged to a stratified random sample of jurisdictions with an average daily inmate population of less than 100.

The survey excludes five types of facilities from the count:

- lockups that house persons for less than 48 hours
- Federal facilities
- State facilities
- privately operated facilities
- the combined jail-prison systems of Alaska, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

Data were obtained through mailed questionnaires. Two follow-up mailings and phone calls elicited a response from 95% of the sampled jails not in a certainty jurisdiction (a jurisdiction with such a large population that it has 100% certainty of entering the sample). Ninety-seven percent of the facilities in jurisdictions with large populations responded.







Explanatory notes

The Bureau of the Census conducted the survey of juveniles and young adults in custody for the Bureau of Justice Statistics, completing most interviews by yearend 1987.

The Children in Custody (CIC) census, which is conducted every 2 years, provided the universe for this study of long-term, State-operated juvenile facilities. The CIC census obtains aggregate information on resident characteristics such as race, sex, age, ethnicity, adjudication status, and reason held. The census also collects descriptive information on the operating agency, the extent of security and community access, the length of stay, and the costs for operating the facility.

The sample design was a stratified sample based on the size of the correctional facility. Long-term and State-operated facilities with institutional environments were included in the sampling frame. The majority of these institutions described themselves as training schools. The survey excluded institutions that were locally operated State facilities not designed for secure custody, all short-term facilities, and all those being privately operated.

This survey was based on personal interviews with a nationally representative sample of 2,621 residents from among the more than 25,000 individuals confined in long-term, State-operated juvenile institutions. Interviews were carried out in 50 institutions in 26 States. Primarily as a result of the inclusion of California's Youth Authority facilities, young adults age 18 or older made up more than a quarter of the sample. Participation in the survey was voluntary, and the response rate was 89%.

Other conditional releases: The Parole Board controls the conditional reprieve releases.

Unspecified causes of death: Cannot specify cause that may include accidents.

Jurisdiction population: Excludes inmates awaiting pickup from jails.

Race: Numbers estimated. The State estimated that 359 men and 21 women of the 992 inmates with unknown data were white; 574 men and 38 women were black.

Black prisoners: Include all persons of a race other than white.

Hawaii

Category estimates: Jurisdiction and custody totals represent actual counts. Admissions, releases, race, and Hispanic origin are estimated from the 1987 fiscal year report.

New court commitments: May include a small number of probation violators or escapees returned to prison with or without new sentences.

Transfers: Include a small number of escapes.

Total inmate population: Custody and jurisdiction counts include inmates of prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in Hawaii.

Prisoners of unknown race: Include Puerto Ricans, prisoners of other Hispanic origin, and inmates who identified more than one racial background; however, prisoners of part-Hawaiian ancestry were counted as Asians or Pacific Islanders.

Idaho

The population count for December 31, 1987, excludes 130 men held in jails solely to ease prison crowding.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Inmates returned from "Agreement on Detainers." Also include two civil commitments and two returned from court.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Cause of death: No cause is specified in Idaho's data system.

Other releases: Inmates released to "Agreement on Detainers."

Illinois

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data. Data for inmates with a sentence greater than 1 year include some inmates with 1 year's maximum sentence.

Conditional release violators with new sentences: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Other conditional release violators without new sentences: Include some parole violators without new sentences. Also include some returned violators with charges pending.

Other admissions: Contain the difference between total admissions and the number in other admissions categories. Include transfers and prisoners returning from a release on medical furlough, writ, appeal, or bond.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Other releases: Contain the difference between total releases and the number in other categories of releases. Include transfers and prisoners leaving for a release on medical furlough, writ, appeal, or bond.

Hispanic prisoners: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

Indiana

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Conditional release violators with new sentences: Include parole violators with or without new sentences and other conditional release violators without new sentences.

Unconditional releases, commutations: The Parole Board determines the termination of sentences.

Conditional releases, probations: Numbers estimated.

Other conditional releases: Releases to regulated community assignment.

Race and Hispanic origin: Numbers estimated.

Iowa

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Parole violators without a new sentence: Include persons returned to prison to await revocation hearing.

Other admissions: Include Safekeepers.

Unconditional releases, expirations of sentence: Include prisoners who received executive commutations that free inmates immediately and unconditionally.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered discharges.

Conditional releases, paroles: Numbers estimated. Include prisoners remanded to prison prior to a formal revocation hearing at which they were returned to parole. Also include inmates released to parole by Conditional Commutation Orders.

Hispanic prisoners: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

Kansas

New court commitments: May include a small number of prisoners returning from appeal or bond.

Other conditional release violators, with or without new sentences: Include some probation violators who should have been categorized as new court commitments.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other conditional releases: Prisoners under supervision similar to that of parole.

Hispanic prisoners: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

Kentucky

Category estimates: Population, admissions, and releases counts were actual; categories may have been estimated from proportions determined in previous years.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Prisoners returned to prison by court. May include some prisoners returning from appeal or bond.

Other releases: Court-ordered releases, conditional or unconditional. May include some releases for appeal or bond.

Total jurisdiction population: Excludes 898 men and 67 women awaiting pickup from jails where they were housed solely to ease prison crowding.

Louisiana

Category estimates: Jurisdiction and custody yearend counts were actual; movement data by category were estimated.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Include court-ordered releases, pardons, and good-time releases.

Other releases: Inmates whose types of release were unknown at the time of reporting.

Maine

New court commitments: Estimated from probation and parole data and the jurisdiction yearend count for 1987.

Supervised mandatory releases: Probation revocations. Mistakenly categorized in 1986.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners returned to prison: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Releases to intensive supervision program.

Maryland

Category estimates: The admissions, releases, and population totals are actual counts. Categories for admissions and releases are estimated by applying percents from automated data to the totals that are made manually. The automated data count only inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year, while the detailed categories in the manual data include inmates with a maximum sentence of 1 year or less.

New court commitments: May include a small number of prisoners returning from appeal or bond.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single group.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases. May include a small number of releases to appeal or bond.

Other conditional releases: Inmates from Patuxent Institution released to halfway houses.

Massachusetts

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Category estimates: The totals for admissions and releases are actual; the categories are estimated.

New court commitments: Include some parole violators with new sentences and other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Unconditional releases, expirations of sentence: Include some releases to probation.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Total inmate population with sentences longer than 1 year: Offenders who are sentenced to local correctional facilities for terms up to 2 1/2 years are excluded from counts of population, admissions, and releases; however, they may be included in reports about the jail population.

Total jurisdiction population: Excludes 142 men housed in jails solely to ease prison crowding.

Unknown race: The race of some Hispanics was unrecorded.

Michigan

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Transfers from other jurisdictions: Include transfers from mental hospitals, Federal prisons, and prisons of other States. May include other long-term admissions like writs or medical cases.

Returns from appeal or bond: Contain the net difference of movements to or from courts.

Unspecified causes of death: The cause of death was unknown at the time of data collection.

Asian and Pacific Islander prisoners: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

Releases to appeal or bond: Contain the net difference of movements to or from courts.

Hispanic prisoners: Include only Mexican Americans who are also categorized as prisoners of unknown race. Other Hispanic prisoners are classified as non-Hispanic.

Minnesota

Parole violators with new sentences: Include other conditional release violators from supervised mandatory releases and work releases, with new sentences.

Parole violators without new sentences: Include other conditional release violators from supervised mandatory releases and work releases, without new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Include prisoners discharged after the Office of Adult Releases modified their sentences or after a court or executive order. May include some commutations.

Other conditional releases: Work releases.

Prisoners of unknown race: Twelve non-Hispanic men categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

Hispanic prisoners and prisoners of unknown race: Include 65 men and 1 woman, Hispanics, categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

Mississippi

New court commitments: Include a small number of shock probation violators.

Other admissions: Inmates awaiting parole revocation hearings.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Include supervised earned releases, Governor's suspension of sentence, and Emergency Powers Act releases.

Other releases: Inmates who went back to prison pending a revocation of parole hearing that subsequently returned them to community supervision.

Missouri

New court commitments: Include some shock probation commitments. May also include other conditional release violators returned to prison.

Parole violators without new sentences: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Conditional releases, paroled women: Numbers estimated.

Unspecified causes of death: No cause specified.

Race: Numbers estimated.

Montana

Parole violators, no new sentences: Include some other types of conditional release violators with new sentences.

Nebraska

Nebraska revised the previously reported December 31, 1986, number of male inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

New court commitments, men: May include some prisoners returned from appeal or bond.

Parole violators without new sentences, men: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Transfers for women: Prisoners admitted from and released to a work release center (custody movements only).

Other admissions, women: Custody movements only of inmates resident in a State mental facility.

Other releases, women: Interstate compact cases housed and released in other States.

Nevada

Nevada revised the previously reported December 31, 1986, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

New court commitments: May contain a small number of returns from appeal or bond.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other causes of death: Inmate shot while trying to escape.

Hispanic prisoners: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

New Hampshire

New court commitments: Include some prisoners returned from appeal or bond and may include other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Parole violators without new sentences: Include parole violators who receive new sentences after readmission to prison.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

New Jersey

New court commitments: May include some transfers from other jurisdictions.

Other conditional release violators without new sentences: Prisoners returned (some with new sentences) from the Intensive Supervision Program, an experimental program operated by the Administrative Office of the Courts. The program provides a sanction that in severity lies between incarceration and probation.

The category may also include some conditionally released prisoners returned with new sentences.

Escapes and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other conditional releases: Prisoners released to the Intensive Supervision Program.

Total jurisdiction population and categories for admissions and releases: Exclude 1,847 men and 103 women held in jails to ease prison crowding. Include 436 men held in jails to ease prison crowding.

New Mexico

Parole violators without new sentences: May include parole violators with new sentences.

New York

New court commitments: Include parole violators and other conditional release violators with new sentences.

Transfers from and to other jurisdictions: Transfers from and to the Department of Mental Hygiene for psychiatric treatment.

Other admissions: Types of admission unknown at the time of data collection.

Other causes of death: Causes unknown at the time of data collection.

Custody population with sentences of more than 1 year and total: Include 195 men and 3 women who were detained on warrant as alleged parole violators, awaiting revocation hearings.

Hispanic prisoners and race: All Hispanic inmates, white and black, are categorized as white.

North Carolina

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Parole violators with new sentences: Include some parole violators without new sentences and some other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Escapes and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Some prisoners serve sentences in which the term in prison is partially suspended, to be completed under probation. The prisoners are categorized with inmates sentenced to 1 year or more only when the prison portion of their sentences exceeds 12 months. Although the maximum sentences of all such prisoners were more than 1 year, nearly all of them are included with those prisoners having sentences of 1 year or less. As a result, the counts of population, admissions, and

releases of inmates with more than 1 year maximum sentences are understated, and the population of inmates with maximum sentences of 1 year or less is overstated.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Paroles: Include some supervised mandatory releases.

Other releases: Residual not accounted for in other categories, used to adjust the movement data to the yearend total.

Category estimates, sentencing: Population totals represent actual counts; however, sentence length populations, more or less than 1 year, are estimates.

North Dakota

New court commitments: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Other conditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Ohio

Sentencing information: The yearend total of inmates with maximum sentences longer than 1 year included some inmates with sentences of 1 year or less.

New court commitments: Include some other conditional release violators with new sentences.

Transfers: Include only prisoners transferred between prison and Ohio's Forensic Unit.

Other unconditional releases: Sentences vacated by courts.

Other conditional releases: Extended furloughs from prison to parole supervision, as in preparole and medical furloughs.

Race and Hispanic origin: Actual counts only of jurisdictional inmates in Ohio's custody.

Oklahoma

Oklahoma revised the previously reported December 31, 1986, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Category estimates, admissions by sex: Numbers of men and women in each admission category estimated.

Sentencing information: Population, admissions, and releases of inmates with sentences of more than 1 year may include a very small number of inmates with sentences of 1 year.

Other admissions: Include six inmates inadvertently dropped from the count and one circumstantial court reception.

Escapes and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Include 1,247 male and 140 female legislative cap releases (Senate Bill 445).

Race and Hispanic origin: Numbers estimated.

Hispanic prisoners: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

Oregon

Parole violators without new sentences: Include some returned parolees whose revocation status was unknown at the time of admission.

Escapes and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Inmates recommitted after a court-ordered release.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Other causes of death: Death certificates not received for two inmates who died while on furlough.

Race and Hispanic origin: Numbers estimated.

Pennsylvania

Parole violators with or without new sentences: Include 871 men and 19 women returned to State incarceration by the Board of Probation and Parole. They entered on their original sentences and not as technical or convicted parole violators. Their count was divided between violators with new sentences and violators without new sentences according to the ratios of actual convicted or technical parole violators. Hence, 440 men and 11 women were categorized as parole violators with new sentences; 431 men and 8 women were considered to be parole violators without new sentences.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Conditional releases, paroles: Include 214 men and 4 women who had been admitted to prison for parole violations and then released after revocation hearings on their original paroles.

Other releases: Type of release was unknown at the time of data collection.

Rhode Island

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Some prisoners serve sentences in which the term in prison is partially suspended, to be completed under probation. They were categorized with inmates sentenced to 1 year or more only when the prison portion of their sentences exceeded 12 months. As a result, the population and movement counts of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year are understated, and the population count of inmates with 1 year or less maximum sentences is overstated.

Total inmate population: Custody and jurisdiction counts include inmates of prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in Rhode Island.

South Carolina

New court commitments: Include a very small number of transfers from other jurisdictions.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases and offenders who paid fines.

Other conditional releases: Inmates released to the jurisdiction of the Department of Parole and Community Corrections under the Emergency Powers Act.

Unspecified causes of death: Death of escaped prisoners.

South Dakota

South Dakota revised the previously reported December 31, 1986, population of inmates with sentences of more than 1 year.

Tennessee

Parole violators with new sentences: Include parole violators without new sentences and other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Releases to parole: Include some mandatory releases to supervision.

Other causes of death: Deaths that resulted during attempted escape (3 drowned, 3 killed).

Other releases: Include inmates in the Contract Sentencing Releasing Program and releases for medical reasons.

Men in jails to relieve prison crowding: The 1,201 inmates classified as men include some women.

Prisoners of unknown race: Include all inmates not classified as white or black.

Texas

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Parole violators with or without new sentences: All parole violators reported as having new sentences.

Other conditional release violators with or without new sentences: All conditional release violators reported as having new sentences.

Other admissions and other releases, men: Include an adjustment for inmates counted as being released even though they remained in the jurisdiction of a prison. Include prisoners returning from or leaving for long-term bench warrants and medical furloughs.

Other admissions, women: An adjustment to correct the difference between the beginning and ending 1987 population.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Conditional pardon releases.

Unspecified causes of death: Cause not determined at the time of data collection.

Race: Texas used two categories, white and nonwhite.

Hispanic prisoners: Classified as prisoners of unknown race.

Utah

Utah revised the previously reported December 31, 1986, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Other unconditional releases: Include inmates whose sentences were terminated by the Board of Pardons.

Vermont

Combined prison and jail populations: Numbers reflect population of integrated jail and prison system. "Lockups" operated by some cities and counties were excluded.

Population counts: Made December 10, 1987.

Race: Numbers estimated, with less than .5% of the men classified as nonwhite.

Virginia

New court commitments: May include a small number of prisoners returning from appeal or bond.

Transfers from other jurisdictions: Include inmates admitted to begin Virginia sentences or to continue Virginia sentences. Thus, transfers from other jurisdictions may be slightly overstated and new court commitments slightly understated.

Other unconditional releases: Administrative releases.

Unspecified causes of death: Unspecified to the Virginia data system for some deaths.

Other releases: Types unknown at the time of data collection.

Prisoners held in jails to reduce prison crowding: Include those with outstanding warrants and being held in jail.

Prisoners of unknown race: Include all inmates who are neither white nor black.

Washington

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Contain a residual adjustment to reach the year-end count.

Hispanic prisoners and prisoners of unknown race: Prisoners of unknown race include Hispanics and inmates with mixed racial origins.

West Virginia

West Virginia revised the previously reported December 31, 1986, population of female inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Population, admissions and releases counts, men: Based on custody data.

New court commitments, men: Include parole violators and other conditional release violators with new sentences.

Conditional releases, probations, men: Include some releases to court jurisdiction of inmates declared unfit to remain in a particular minimum security facility.

Other conditional releases, women: Inmate released on medical furlough.

Other releases: Court-ordered releases for which conditions, if any, are unknown.

Jurisdiction population total, men: Excludes some inmates awaiting pickup from jails where they were housed solely to ease prison crowding.

Wisconsin

Wisconsin revised the previously reported December 31, 1986, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Other admissions: Types unknown at the time of data collection.

Other conditional releases: Special Action early releases.

Unspecified causes of death: Unspecified to the Wisconsin data system.

Other releases: Court-ordered releases for which conditions, if any, are unknown.

Wyoming

Wyoming revised the previously reported December 31, 1986, population of inmates with sentences of more than 1 year.

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

New court commitments: May include a small number of administrative turnovers--the start of a consecutive sentence.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Unconditional releases, expirations of sentence: May include a small number of administrative turnovers--the end of one sentence to be followed by another.

Other releases: Releases to detainers.

Race and Hispanic origin: Totals are actual counts; numbers of men and women in each group represent estimates.

Hispanic prisoners: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.



You should report the admission or release of state inmates held in local jails as a direct result of overcrowding in state facilities if these inmates are considered to be under your State's **jurisdiction** while they serve in local jails. You should not report the admission or release of inmates your State was merely housing for other states.

JURISDICTION POPULATION ON JANUARY 1

The jurisdiction population on January 1, 1987 (Item 1) should equal the number of inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence on December 31, 1986 (Item 5a). Revise Item 5a for 1986 if appropriate.

ADMISSIONS

- a. **New court commitments** — Include all inmates who were admitted with all new sentences, that is, these inmates were not **readmitted** for any sentences. This category includes probation violators entering prison for the first time on the probated offenses. Do not include parole violators with new sentences as new court commitments.
- b. **Parole violators with new sentences** — Include all parolees returned with new sentences.
- c. **Other conditional release violators with new sentences** — Include all conditional release violators (other than parole violators) returned with new sentences, for example, returns from shock probation, from supervised mandatory release, etc.
- d. **Parole violators only, no new sentences** — Include all parolees returned only for **formal** revocations of parole which were not accompanied by new sentences. If the parole was not formally revoked, that is, the parolee was held only temporarily pending a hearing, no admission occurred for NPS purposes.
- e. **Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences** — Include all conditional release violators (other than parole violators) returned only for **formal** revocations of conditional release which were not accompanied by new sentences. If the conditional release was not formally revoked, that is, the conditional release violator was held only temporarily pending a hearing, no admission occurred for NPS purposes.
- f. **Transfers from other jurisdictions** — Include all inmates transferred to your State's jurisdiction to continue sentences already in force. Do not report the admission if your State does not acquire jurisdiction. Do not report movements from prison to prison within your State.
- g. **AWOL returns, with or without new sentences** — Include all returns from AWOL. AWOL is defined as failure to return from authorized temporary absences such as work furlough, study release, mercy furlough, or other authorized temporary absence.
- h. **Escapee returns, with or without new sentences** — Include all returns from escape. Escape is defined as unlawful departure from a state correctional facility or from the custody of state correctional personnel.

ADMISSIONS — Continued

- i. **Returns from appeal/bond** — Include all inmates reinstated to correctional jurisdiction from long-term jurisdictional absences on appeal or bond. Do not report returns from short-term movements (that is, less than 30 days) to court (that is, where the state retains jurisdiction).
- j. **Other admissions** — Include all other admissions not covered by the above categories. **Please specify the nature of these admissions in the "Notes" section on page 2.**

RELEASES

Unconditional — An unconditional release occurs only if the released inmate cannot be reimprisoned for any sentence for which he was in prison.

- a. **Expirations of sentence** — Include all inmates whose maximum court sentences minus credits have been served.
- b. **Commutations** — Include all inmates whose maximum sentences have been changed (lowered) to time served to allow immediate unconditional release.
- c. **Other unconditional releases** — Include all other unconditional releases not covered by the above categories. **Please specify the nature of these releases in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.**

Conditional — A conditional release occurs if the released inmate, upon violating the conditions of his release, can be imprisoned again for any of the sentences for which he was in prison.

- d. **Probations** — Include all inmates who have been placed under probation supervision and conditionally released. Include all shock probation releases.
- e. **Supervised mandatory releases** — Include all inmates who must, by law, be conditionally released. This type of release may also be called mandatory conditional release.
- f. **Paroles** — Include all inmates conditionally released to parole. Enter only releases officially entitled "parole."
- g. **Other conditional releases** — Include all other conditional releases not covered by the above categories. **Please specify the nature of these releases in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.**

Death

- h. **Executions** — Self-explanatory
- i. **Illnesses/natural causes** — Self-explanatory
- j. **Suicides** — Self-explanatory
- k. **Accidental injury to self** — Include all inmates who accidentally caused their own deaths (for example, a fall from a ladder, mishandling electrical equipment).
- l. **Death caused by another person** — Include all inmates whose deaths were caused accidentally or intentionally by another inmate or prison personnel.
- m. **Other deaths** — Include all other deaths not covered by the above categories. **Please specify the nature of these deaths in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.**

INSTRUCTIONS

RELEASES — Continued

Other Releases

- n. AWOLS** — Include all failures to return from an authorized temporary absence such as work furlough, study release, mercy furlough, or other authorized temporary absence.
- o. Escapes from confinement** — Include all unlawful departures from a state correctional facility or from the custody of state correctional personnel.
- p. Transfers to other jurisdictions** — Include all inmates who were transferred from your State's jurisdiction to another to continue sentences already in force. Do not report the release if your State does not relinquish jurisdiction. Do not report movements from prison to prison within your State.
- q. Releases to appeal/bond** — Include all inmates released from correctional jurisdiction to long-term jurisdictional absences on appeal or bond. Do not report short-term movements (that is, less than 30 days) to court where the state correctional system retains jurisdiction.
- r. Other releases** — Include all other releases not covered by the above categories. **Please specify the nature of these releases in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.**

JURISDICTION POPULATION DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates under your State's **jurisdiction** on December 31, regardless of the location of the inmates. Do not include other jurisdictions' inmates (for example, inmates from other states, pre-trial detainees) merely housed in your prisons. These inmates, however, are enumerated in item 6, "Custody Population."

CUSTODY POPULATION DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates in your State's **custody**, that is, housed in your State correctional facilities on December 31. Do not include state inmates housed outside state prison facilities (these are reported under "Jurisdiction Population," item 5). Include other jurisdictions' inmates (for example, inmates from other states, the courts, local jails) housed in your State's facilities.

OVERCROWDING DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates housed in local jails on December 31, as a direct result of overcrowding in your State's prisons. Do **not** include inmates held in local jails for other reasons, (for example, work release, court appearance, etc.). If you enter a number (other than "0") or "NR" in item 7a, mark the "Yes" or "No" box in item 7b to indicate whether or not these inmates are included in 5d, "Total Inmate Population – Jurisdiction Population December 31." **If you mark "No," explain in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.**

RACE

- (1) **White** — A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.
 - (2) **Black** — A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa.
 - (3) **American Indian or Alaskan Native** — A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
 - (4) **Asian or Pacific Islander** — A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian Subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
 - (5) **Other** — Any other races not covered by the above categories. **Please specify the other races in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.**
 - (6) **Not known** — Any inmate whose race is unknown should be included here.
- ETHNIC ORIGIN**
- (1) **Hispanic** — A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
 - (2) **Not Hispanic** — A person not covered by the above category.
 - (3) **Not known** — Any one whose ethnic origin is unknown should be included here.

Explanatory notes by jurisdiction

Some States revise their caseload counts from year to year because of audits, late reporting, or altered reporting practices; hence, the January 1, 1987 counts may not match the December 1986 counts reported earlier.

Alabama

The December 31, 1986, population differs from the count for January 1, 1987, because the State included 47 local parolees in the 1987 counts.

For adults entering or leaving parole (tables 6.4 and 6.5) Alabama provided no details.

Alabama did not report sex, Hispanic origin, and sentence length. It estimated the number of black and white parolees.

Alaska

Data for approximately 150 parolees on mandatory parole were not available.

Alaska included parolees supervised out of State among those under active supervision (table 6.3).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Arizona

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes interstate compact cases.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Other" includes five early discharges.

Arizona estimated the data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and length of sentence. "Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes 591 Mexican Americans or Mexicans.

Arkansas

Discharged absconders in 1987 were no longer kept in the caseload and were not reported in the year-end counts. In December 1987 Arkansas had 278 absconders, 11 of whom had absconded during the year.

California

The State did not report on 6,225 absconders.

The 51 "Other" entries adjust categories to the total (table 6.4).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). The 143 "Other" exits adjust categories to the total.

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes 1,626 Mexican Americans and 12,305 persons of unspecified race.

Colorado

Parolees who had absconded or who were supervised out of State were counted as being under active supervision (table 6.3).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). Colorado does not classify transfers to other jurisdictions as exits.

Colorado estimated the data for persons leaving parole, sex, and race.

"Unknown" race includes 21 illegal aliens (table 6.7).

Connecticut

For "Unknown" race (table 6.7) the State included 96 Hispanic parolees.

Delaware

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revoked parole, with revocation or charges pending, or with a new sentence were counted as having been discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant (table 6.5). Parolees transferred to other States were similarly counted.

Delaware estimated the data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and status of supervision.

The State did not supervise persons released from prison after less than 1 year of incarceration.

District of Columbia

The District estimated the data for mandatory releases from prison, persons supervised out of State, parolees returned to prison or jail with new sentences, and those whose parole was revoked.

Florida

All categories of adults leaving parole (table 6.5), except discharged absconders, were reported in "Successfully completed parole."

Florida estimated the data for sex and race.

Georgia

The active supervision status includes absconders (table 6.3).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Georgia estimated data for sex and race.

Hawaii

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with new charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with a new sentence (table 6.5).

Illinois

Illinois estimated all demographic data from the percentage distribution of 12,137 parolees under active supervision. It had no demographic information on absconders and parolees supervised out of State; therefore, data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and status of supervision are estimates.

The State monitors only those parolees with sentences of 1 year or more.

"Discharged as absconder" and "Discharged to detainer, warrant" are included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. The 385 in "Other or unknown status" adjust categories to the total.

For "Unknown" race (table 6.7) the State reported 930 Hispanic parolees.

Indiana

Indiana estimated the number of American Indians, Alaska Natives, and Hispanic Americans (table 6.7).

Iowa

Iowa monitors only those parolees who have a sentence of a year or more.

Current absconders were terminated from parole and were not included in the population count.

"Discharged to detainer, warrant" is included in either "Successfully completed parole" or "Discharged as absconder" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with a new sentence, revocation, or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

Kansas

"Discharged as absconder" and "Discharged to detainer, warrant" are included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were not considered to be exits. "Other" includes discharged absconders (161), expiration of sentence (188), and out-of-State exits (27).

Kansas estimated data for race and Hispanic origin.

Absconders are monitored apart from the regular parole caseload and did not appear in the yearend counts. Of the 161 parolees who absconded in 1987, an unknown number remained in that status at yearend.

Kentucky

Kentucky reported inactive cases in the active supervision category (table 6.3).

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Discretionary" releases include mandatory releases. "Other" includes 435 interstate transfers.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) those successfully completing parole include releases from active supervision, final discharges, and closed cases. All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Kentucky did not report demographic and sentence length data.

Louisiana

Louisiana reported absconders from parole and out-of-State parolees as "Under active supervision" (table 6.3).

"Discharged as absconder" and "Discharged to detainer, warrant" are included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

Maine

Maine abolished parole in 1976. There are now 41 pre-1976 parolees under supervision, with 35 in prison who will eventually be eligible for parole.

Maryland

For "Other status" of supervision (table 6.3) Maryland reported 612 parolees in some form of custody.

Massachusetts

Massachusetts estimated the year-end 1986 count, entries, and exits.

"Discharged as absconder," "Discharged to detainer, warrant," "Transferred to another State," "Death," and "Other" are included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

For "Unknown" race (table 6.7) Massachusetts included 525 Hispanic and 35 Cape Verdian parolees.

Michigan

For "Other" releases from parole (table 6.5) Michigan reported one discharged by court.

Minnesota

"Discharged as absconder," "Discharged to detainer, warrant," and "Transferred to another State" are included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

For "Unknown" race (table 6.7) the State reported 37 Spanish-speaking parolees and 5 others.

Mississippi

Mississippi placed absconders indefinitely in an inactive caseload and omitted them from the population counts.

Mississippi reported mandatory releases in "Discretionary" releases (table 6.4). "Other" releases include one work release and eight supervised earned releases.

Persons of unknown race include four Hispanic parolees (table 6.7).

Missouri

"Discharged as absconder" is included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. All persons sent back to prison or jail with charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with a new sentence.

Montana

Montana estimated all demographic information from past populations. It also estimated the number of persons leaving parole.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). Montana did not report the number of persons transferred because it does not maintain records for parolees who leave the State.

Nebraska

Nebraska does not discharge absconders (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. "Other" releases include 15 pardoned parolees who were to report annually.

"Unknown" race includes 22 Hispanic parolees (table 6.7).

Nevada

Nevada estimated all data.

"Discharged as absconder" is included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

New Hampshire

The State places absconders on an inactive case list and does not report them in the yearend counts. It monitors only those parolees with sentences of a year or more.

"Discharged to detainer, warrant" is included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). New Hampshire could not provide further detail for those leaving parole because those categories include both probation and parole records.

New Jersey

New Jersey reported those absconding from parole as being under active supervision (table 6.3).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). "Other or unknown status" includes seven who were recalled by court or who were discharged by paroling authority decree.

New Mexico

New Mexico in 1987 did not count 198 parolees supervised out of State and 184 absconders. Absconders are placed indefinitely in an inactive caseload.

Discretionary parole entries and reinstatements to parole were reported under mandatory parole entries (table 6.4).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). "Discharged to detainer, warrant" was also counted under revocation. "Other" exits include 375 closed, semiactive, or out-of-State parolees.

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes Asians and Pacific Islanders.

New York

"Discharged as absconder" and "Discharged to detainer, warrant" are included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). Persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation pending were counted as having been returned with a new sentence. Persons sent back with charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes 7,903 Hispanic parolees.

New York did not report parolees from county jails (301 in 1987).

North Carolina

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" adjusts categories to the total.

North Carolina does not dismiss absconders; instead, warrants are issued for life or until the absconder is found.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). Those discharged to detainer or warrant were also counted as parole revocations.

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes Asians and Pacific Islanders.

North Dakota

North Dakota has a new statute that "freezes" time to be served for discharged absconders and for those discharged to detainer or warrant. The statute affected no one in 1987. Three parolees were changed to absconder status during the year.

The State counted absconders as being under active supervision (table 6.3).

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes two Hispanic parolees.

Ohio

Ohio places absconders indefinitely in an inactive caseload and omits them from the yearend count.

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes 290 parolees supervised in other States.

"Discharged to detainer, warrant" is included in "Successfully completed parole" (table 6.5). For adults leaving parole "Other" includes 114 interstate compact cases closed for reasons other than final release.

Ohio did not report data for sex, race, or Hispanic origin.

Oklahoma

Oklahoma estimated data for sex, race, and Hispanic origin.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). Transfers to other parole jurisdictions are not considered to be exits; rather, they continue in the administrative caseload.

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes Asian, Pacific Islander, and Hispanic (33) parolees.

A small number of parolees with sentences of less than 1 year may be included with those of a year or more (table 6.8).

Oregon

Mandatory releases from prison and reinstatements to parole were reported as discretionary releases from prison (table 6.4).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with a new sentence, with their parole revoked, or with revocation or charges pending were counted as "Other" (table 6.5).

Pennsylvania

Pennsylvania data include 25,615 local parolees.

"Other" type of entry includes 14,329 parolees released from jails (table 6.4).

Pennsylvania reported "Discharged to detainer, warrant" in "Other" (table 6.5). The number of absconders, who are maintained in the active parole caseload, was not known.

"Unknown" race includes 1,441 Hispanic parolees (table 6.7).

Rhode Island

Under status of supervision (table 6.3) the 46 parolees supervised out of State include 3 in prison and 1 held on a parole detention warrant. "Other" includes the following: 16 men and 1 woman detained on warrants at the Rhode Island Adult Correctional Institution, 1 person in Federal prison, 6 persons supervised by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, and 3 persons in the Federal Witness Protection Program.

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes those persons who were reparaoled after revocation of the original parole and who either had no new sentence or had a new sentence of less than 6 months.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Other" includes 21 absconders whose parole was revoked in absentia.

South Carolina

Of the 38 absconders counted, 14 had absconded in 1987 (table 6.3).

South Carolina reported those parolees transferred to another jurisdiction in all other relevant exit categories (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with a new sentence (table 6.5). "Other" includes 17 pardons.

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes American Indians, Asians, and Pacific Islanders.

South Dakota

South Dakota reported parole data for the fiscal year July 1, 1986, to June 30, 1987.

Absconders are not discharged and are included in the yearend populations.

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes some persons with suspended sentence to probation or work release.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes five Hispanic parolees.

Tennessee

Tennessee estimated all data except the population count for December 31, 1986.

Reinstatement entries are included with discretionary and mandatory releases from prison (table 6.4). "Other" entries include 613 inactive parolees not previously counted.

Discharged absconders and those discharged to detainer or warrant were counted as having successfully completed parole (table 6.5). All persons returned to prison or jail, whether with a new sentence or with charges or revocation pending, were reported as parole revocations.

American Indians, Alaska Natives, Asians, and Pacific Islanders were reported as white or black (table 6.7).

Tennessee supervised only parolees with sentences of 1 year or more.

Texas

Texas reported parole data for September 1, 1986, to August 31, 1987.

The "Other" supervision status includes 3,684 detainees (table 6.3). The detainees were not considered exits because they were not formally discharged to other jurisdictions.

Texas reported all categories of exit except successful completion as "Other or unknown status" (table 6.5).

"Unknown" includes 14,136 Hispanic parolees (table 6.7). The black racial category includes all races except white.

Texas estimated the data for sex, race, and Hispanic origin.

Utah

Utah began to include interstate compact cases in its 1987 count.

Of the 114 absconders, 70 were changed to the absconder status in 1987 (table 6.3).

Utah does not count as an exit from parole returning to prison or jail with parole revocation pending (table 6.5).

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes 60 Hispanic parolees.

Vermont

All persons sent back to prison or jail with charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Virginia

The 457 parolees in "Other or unknown status" had missed reporting or had committed other violations and were liable for action by the parole authority (table 6.3).

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes 837 intrastate transfers, transfers from other States, Virginia cases returned to Virginia from other States, and unknown types of entry.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant" includes all those returned to incarceration; "Other" includes intrastate transfers, terminations of out-of-State cases, and exits of unknown type.

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes Hispanic parolees.

Virginia estimated the numbers for race and sex.

Washington

Washington estimates the number of persons entering and leaving parole.

Washington places absconders in an inactive caseload and includes them in the yearend counts. For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other or unknown type" includes reinstatements and parolees who had absconded from parole and had returned.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with a new sentence.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.4) Washington could not identify the separate categories in which the deaths were reported (table 6.5).

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes 407 Hispanic parolees.

West Virginia

Of the 25 reported to have absconded from parole, all entered that status during 1987 (table 6.3).

"Other or unknown type" of entry adjusts categories to the total (table 6.4).

All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). Those who were discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant were counted as having completed parole successfully. "Other or unknown status" of exit adjusts categories to the total.

Wisconsin

Parolees with inactive supervision are included under active supervision, and those out of State are either under absconders or active supervision (table 6.3).

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) all absconders and parolees discharged to detainer or warrant were counted as having successfully completed parole. All persons sent back to prison or jail with a new sentence or with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Wyoming

Wyoming could not report absconders apart from active supervision status (table 6.3). Absconders are placed in the interstate compact caseload.

All persons sent back to prison or jail with a new sentence or with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes five Hispanic parolees.

Federal parole system

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) persons discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant were counted in "Discharged as absconder." All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.



Explanatory notes

The statistics reported for capital punishment may differ from data collected by other organizations. The differences occur for a variety of reasons:

- Inmates under sentence of death are originally added to the National Prisoner Statistics (NPS) counts when they enter correctional facilities rather than when judges pronounce sentence.
- Following the year when prisoners are first counted, their admissions or releases as a result of court order are attributed to the year for the sentence or court order. For example, a prisoner sentenced in November 1985 and entering prison custody in January 1986 would be counted as an admission in the 1986 report; the 1987 report would count him or her as being under sentence of death at yearend 1985. Similarly, a prisoner whose sentence is overturned in 1985 but who remains in the count until 1987 when the court's decision is reported would be subtracted from the 1985 and 1986 reports.
- NPS counts of persons under sentence of death are always for the last day of a calendar year and thus will differ from more recent counts.

Correctional populations in the United States, 1986 failed to include 25 inmates who either were reported late to the NPS program or were not in the custody of State correctional authorities at yearend 1986: Ohio (2), Delaware (1), Tennessee (2), Alabama (1), Mississippi (7), Louisiana (7), Arizona (3), Georgia (1), and Virginia (1). Six inmates had sentences to death removed in 1986 but were not reported: Georgia (2), Tennessee (1), Mississippi (1), Texas (1), and Wyoming (1).

In 1987 two male prisoners of the Armed Forces were under a military death sentence for murder.







Information Package

- Are older Americans more likely to be victims of crime than younger age groups?
- Are the elderly being arrested for certain crimes more frequently than in the past?
- Are offenders in crimes against the elderly more likely to be strangers or nonstrangers compared to other age groups?

A new information package available from the Justice Statistics Clearinghouse answers these and other questions about crime and the elderly. Drawing from national sources for crime statistics—including the BJS National Crime Survey, the FBI Uniform Crime Reports, and the BJS National Corrections Reporting Program—the 34-page package discusses the types of crimes in which older Americans are most likely to be victims and offenders, and the types of crime prevention they use.

As the elderly population has grown, so has concern about the effects of crime on this age group.

Population statistics indicate that older Americans are fast becoming a large segment of the total U.S. population. In 1985, Americans 60 years and older totaled 39.5 million—a 21-percent increase over the past 10 years.

This package also includes the names and addresses of associations and organizations that are sources of information about crime and older Americans and a list of further readings.




