

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## PREFACE

California Prisoners and Parolees, 1988, is a presentation of statistical data about felons and non-felons under the jurisdiction of the California Department of Corrections (CDC). Statistical data on felons in CDC have been published since 1950 when the first issue of California Prisoners, covering the years 1945 through 1949, was released. Statistical data on civilly committed narcotic addicts have been published since 1967 when the first issue of Summary Statistics, Civil Commitment Program for Narcotic Addicts, covering the years 1961 through 1966, was published. Beginning in 1981, the two were combined into one publication. The Civil Narcotic Addict Program is covered in the last chapter along with other CDC populations.

The first chapter is a summary of the total departmental population and movements into and out of the institutions and parole regions during Calendar Year 1988. The second chapter looks at the characteristics of felons newly received from court. The next chapter covers characteristics of the institution population on December 31, 1988. The fourth chapter looks at the illegal or prohibited behavior of inmates in the institutions, while the fifth chapter is a summary of characteristics of parolees. The sixth chapter covers parole movements. And finally, the last chapter looks at other populations in CDC: the Civil Narcotic Addict Program, the County Diagnostic Cases, the Community Based Programs (work furlough and local RTC facilities), Inmates on Death Row, and Parolees at Large (PAL).

The Director of Corrections administered eighteen institutions and four parole regions in 1988. The types of commitments received by CDC are Felons, Civil Narcotic Addicts, County Diagnostic Cases (under Penal Code Section 1203.03), some Youth Authority Commitments, Federal Prisoners, safekeepers from county jails and prisoners from other states.

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
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
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## CALIFORNIA PRISONERS AND PAROLEES TOTAL CDC POPULATION, RECEIVED AND RELEASED




## TOTAL CDC POPULATION, RECEIVED AND RELEASED






## TOTAL CDC POPULATION, RECEIVED AND RELEASED

#### TOTAL CDC POPULATION

The population under the California Department of Corrections' (CDC) jurisdiction reached a high of 140,897, on December 31, 1988.

- The institution population was at an all time high of 76,171. This included:
  - 73,798 in institutions and camps.
  - 2,001 in Community Based Facilities.
  - 372 in Department of Mental Health Facilities.
- The California supervised parole population was at 50,832. There were:
- 48,983 felons and civil narcotic addicts under CDC supervision.
- 1,849 parolees from other states being supervised in California (ICOOPS: See Glossary).
- Non CDC jurisdictions totalled 3,524. (Populations temporarily located under other jurisdictions.)
  - 2,386 inmates being supervised by other state, federal or juvenile jurisdictions.
  - 1,138 California parolees being supervised by other jurisdictions (ISPU: See Glossary).
- Other CDC populations totalled 10,370. There were:
- 1,158 inmates out to court.
- 524 inmates on escape status.
- 230 inmates in work furlough status being housed in county jails.
- 8,458 felons and civil addicts absconded from parole (PAL/RAL).


The CDC institution population reached an all time high of 76,171.


- The institution population increased 13.7% from 66,975 on December 31, 1987.
- The institution population has increased 257.2% since 1978 and 93.5% since 1983.
- The incarceration rate increased to 265.8 per 100,000 California population. This was an all time high for CDC.
- The design capacity of CDC institutions and camps was 46,279.
- The CDC institution population was 159.5% of the design capacity.


#### The institution population consisted of:

- 49,108 (64.5%) new admissions from court.
- 14,100 (18.5%) parole violators returned with new terms from court (PV-WNT's).
- 11,590 (15.2%) parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTC's).
- 780 (1.0%) outpatient returns to the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC).
- 593 (0.8%) others, including escape returns and psychiatric returns.


#### Institution Population December 31, 1960 through 1988






- 29,551 Felon New Admissions from Court.
- 34,014 Parole Violators Returned to Custody (PV-RTC's).
- 8,458 Parole Violators Returned with New Terms from court (PV-WNT's).
- 1,537 new Civil Narcotic Addict admissions received from court.
- 2,387 County Diagnostic cases received.





#### **INSTITUTION MOVEMENTS, RELEASED**

- 61,977 felon inmates were paroled from CDC institutions and from temporary release status.
- 32,174 were first releases to parole.
- 29,803 were re-released to parole.
- 2,408 county diagnostic cases were discharged from CDC institutions.
- 92 inmates died in CDC institutions.
- 2,429 civil narcotic addicts were released to parole outpatient status.


The total parole population supervised both in and outside of California was 51,970.


- The California felon parole population totalled 48,427. There were:
- 47,289 California felon parolees under California supervision.
- 1,138 California parolees supervised outside of California under the Interstate Parole Unit Agreement (ISPU).
- There were 1,849 parolees from other states being supervised in California (ICOOPS).
- There were 1,694 Civil Narcotic Addicts on outpatient status.


#### During Calendar Year 1988, there were:

- 287 who died while on parole.






### Felon Parole Movements Calendar Year 1988




Felon New Admissions From Court reached 29,551, an all time high for CDC .

Felon New Admissions From Court increased 10.9% from Calendar Year 1987 to 1988.





The admission rate for Felon New Admissions in Calendar Year 1988 was 104.4 admissions per 100,000 California population. This rate was the highest ever experienced by CDC.

The number of Felon Drug Admissions reached an all time high of 10,445. This represented a 418% increase over Calendar Year 1983.






#### **During Calendar Year 1988:**

#### **ADMISSIONS**

CDC Felon New Admissions from Court reached an all time high of 29,551.

- Felon new admissions increased 10.9% from the 26,649 felon new admissions in 1987.
- Felon new admissions have increased 60.6% since 1983 and 216.9% since 1978.
- The number of male felon new admissions was 27,001, while the number of female felon new admissions was 2,550.
- The admission rate for felon new admissions reached a high of 104.4 per 100,000 California population.
- The comparable admission rate for 1983 was 73.2 and for 1978 it was 41.8.

### **OFFENSE CATEGORIES**

- Violent offenders accounted for 28.6% (8,446) of felon new admissions.
- Property offenders accounted for 31.9% (9,429) of felon new admissions.
- Drug offenders accounted for 35.4% (10,445) of felon new admissions.
- Offenders who committed other offenses made up the remaining 4.1% (1,217) of felon new admissions.


## FELONS NEWLY RECEIVED FROM COURT

### **VIOLENT OFFENSES**

The number of felon new admissions for violent offenses increased by 4.1% from 8,115 in 1983 to 8,446 in 1988. As a percentage of all felon new admissions, violent offenses decreased from 44.6% in 1983 to 28.6% in 1988.


- Homicides accounted for 1,520 (5.2%) of felon new admissions from court. There were:
  - 304 (1.0%) Murder First admissions.
  - 474 (1.6%) Murder Second admissions.
  - 627 (2.1%) Manslaughter admissions.
- 115 (0.4%) Manslaughter by Vehicle admissions.
- There were 2,839 (9.6%) Robbery admissions.
- Sex crimes accounted for 1,715 (5.8%) of felon new admissions from court. There were:
  - 366 (1.2%) admissions for Rape.
  - 1,030 (3.5%) admissions for Lewd Acts with a Child.
- 319 (1.1%) admissions for Other Sex crimes.
- Assault with a Deadly Weapon accounted for 1,532 (5.2%) of felon new admissions.
- Other Assaults/Battery accounted for 635 (2.2%) of felon new admissions.
- Kidnapping accounted for 205 (0.7%) of felon new admissions.

## **FELONS NEWLY RECEIVED FROM COURT**



#### **PROPERTY OFFENSES**

The number of felon new admissions for property offenses increased by 29.4% from 7,289 in 1983 to 9,429 in 1988. As a percentage of all felon new admissions, property offenses decreased from 40.0% in 1983 to 31.9% in 1988.

- Burglary First and Second Degree accounted for 4,727 (16.0%) of felon new admissions from court. These were the two largest of the property offense groups. There were:
  - 2,870 (9.7%) for Burglary First Degree.
  - 1,857 (6.3%) for Burglary Second Degree.
- Grand Theft was the next largest property offense group accounting for 1,217 (4.1%) of felon new admissions.
- Petty Theft with a Prior accounted for 1,023 (3.5%) of felon new admissions.
- Vehicle Thefts accounted for 841 (2.9%) of felon new admissions.
- Receiving Stolen Property accounted for 805 (2.7%) of felon new admissions.
- Forgery/Fraud accounted for 635 (2.2%) of felon new admissions.
- Other Property accounted for 181 (0.6%) of felon new admissions from court.

### **DRUG OFFENSES**


The number of felon new admissions for drug offenses increased by 418.1% from 2,016 in 1983 to 10,445 in 1988. As a percentage of all felon new admissions, drug offenders increased from 11.1% in 1983 to 35.4% in 1988. Drug offenders accounted for most of the overall increase in new admissions from 1983 to 1988.

- CSS (see note) Possession accounted for 3,521 (11.9%) of felon new admissions.
- CSS Possession for Sale accounted for 3,110 (10.5%) of felon new admissions.
- CSS Sale accounted for 2,516 (8.5%) of felon new admissions.
- Marijuana accounted for 966 (3.3%) of felon new admissions.




- Possession of Weapons accounted for 406 (1.4%) of felon new admissions.
- Driving Under the Influence (DUI) offenses accounted for 351 (1.2%) of felon new admissions.
- Arson offenders accounted for 158 (0.5%) of felon new admissions.
- Escapes accounted for 93 (0.3%) of felon new admissions.



#### Other Offenses Calendar Year 1988




## FELONS NEWLY RECEIVED FROM COURT

#### **RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS**

- The number of felon new admissions who were Black increased by 68.4% from 6,201 in 1983 to 10,442 in 1988.
- The number of felon new admissions who were Mexican/American increased by 79.2% from 4,987 in 1983 to 8,937 in 1988.
- The number of felon new admissions who were White increased by 34.4% from 6,477 in 1983 to 8,708 in 1988.

As a percentage of all felon new admissions from 1983 to 1988:

- Blacks increased from 33.7% to 35.3%.
- Mexican/Americans increased from 27.1% to 30.2%.
- Whites decreased from 35.2% to 29.5%.

#### AGE GROUPS


Over one half (55.3%) of felon new admissions in 1988 were under 30 years old. The percent under 30 in 1983 was 62.8.

- The 20 to 24 year old age group accounted for 26.1% (7,702) of felon new admissions.
- The 25 to 29 year old age group accounted for 26.8% (7,918) of felon new admissions.
- The 30 to 34 year old age group accounted for 19.9% (5,892) of felon new admissions.
- The median age of felon new admissions was 28 years.


## FELONS NEWLY RECEIVED FROM COURT

### **COUNTY AND AREA OF ADMISSION**

- 19,529 (66.1%) felon new admissions were admitted from Southern California.
- 4,728 (16.0%) felon new admissions were admitted from the San Francisco Bay Area.
- 5,294 (17.9%) felon new admissions were admitted from the rest of the state.
- Los Angeles County alone accounted for 12,618 (42.7%) of felon new admissions from court.
- San Diego was the next largest county of commitment, accounting for 1,992 (6.7%) of felon new admissions.
- Alameda County admitted the most in the San Francisco Bay Area, accounting for 1,295 (4.4%) of felon new admissions.
- Alpine and Mariposa County each had one felon new admission committed to CDC.




### Ten Largest Counties of Admission Calendar Year 1988


### Admission Rate per 100,000 County Population Calendar Year 1988

### **RATE OF ADMISSION BY COUNTY** POPULATION

- Madera County had the highest admission rate at 249.7 per 100,000 county population.
- Yuba County had the second highest admission rate at 237.7 per 100,000 county population.
- Lake County had the next highest admission rate per 100,000 county population at 231.5.
- Los Angeles County, which has the highest number of admissions, had the 6th highest admission rate at 146.6 per 100,000 county population.
- Mariposa County had the lowest admission rate at 6.9 per 100,000 county population.



## **Marital Status**

#### MARITAL STATUS

- 37.6% of felon new admissions had never been married upon reception to CDC.
- 62.4% of felon new admissions had been married at least once.
  - 24.0% were divorced or separated.
  - 29.3% were married once.
  - 6.5% were married twice.
  - 1.8% were married three or more times.
  - 0.8% had spouses who are deceased.

## FELONS NEWLY RECEIVED FROM COURT

### **DRUG HISTORY**


- Inmates with a past history of cocaine use represented the largest group of drug users among felon new admissions at 25.8%.
- Those with no reported history of drug use was the next largest group at 23.3%.
- Heroin use was the next largest group at 19.2%.
- 12.2% of felon new admissions had a history of Marijuana use.
- 6.4% of felon new admissions had a history of methamphetamine or amphetamine use.


Note: Only the most serious drug used was considered for drug history. It is likely that more than one drug has been used.

### **ALCOHOL HISTORY**


- 66.0% of felon new admissions had no reported history of alcohol abuse. This group either did not use alcohol or used it on social occasions only.
- 5.2% of felon new admissions were under the influence of alcohol at the time they committed their offense.
- 28.8% of felon new admissions had either past or current alcohol abuse before entering CDC.





#### **On December 31, 1988:**

#### INSTITUTION POPULATION

There were 76,171 inmates in CDC institutions. This represented a 257.2% increase from 1978 and a 93.5% increase from 1983.

• There were 71,278 (93.6%) men and 4,893 (6.4%) women in the institution population.

# The institution population consisted of the following types of commitments:

- 73,780 (96.8%) felon inmates.
- 2,040 (2.7%) civil narcotic addicts.
- 284 (0.4%) county diagnostic cases.
- 67 (0.1%) other types of commitments.

### **OFFENSE CATEGORIES**

- Violent offenders accounted for 45.2% (34,215) of the institution population and represented the largest offense category.
- Property offenders accounted for 29.5% (22,324) of the institution population.
- Drug offenders accounted for 22.0% (16,684) of the institution population.
- Offenders with Other offenses made up the remaining 3.3% (2,524) of the institution population.



### **VIOLENT OFFENSES**


Almost half (45.2%) of those incarcerated were committed for violent offenses. The number of violent offenders increased 50.4% from 1983. However, violent offenders have decreased as a percentage of the total population since 1983.

- Homicides accounted for 9,689 (12.8%) of those incarcerated. There were:
  - 4,174 (5.5%) Murder First inmates.
  - 3,305 (4.4%) Murder Second inmates.
  - 1,906 (2.5%) Manslaughter inmates.
- 304 (0.4%) Manslaughter by Vehicle inmates.
- Robbery accounted for 10,906 (14.4%) of the population.
- Assault with a Deadly Weapon accounted for 4,135 (5.5%) of the population.
- Other Assault/Battery accounted for 1,449 (1.9%) of the population.
- Sex crimes accounted for 6,751 (8.9%) of the CDC institution population. There were:
  - 2,164 (2.9%) Rapists in prison.
  - 3,256 (4.3%) incarcerated for Lewd Acts with a Child.
  - 1,331 (1.8%) incarcerated for Other Sex crimes.
- Kidnapping accounted for 1,285 (1.7%) of the population.

#### **PROPERTY OFFENSES**

Those incarcerated for property offenses accounted for 29.5% of those in prison at the end of 1988. While the number of Property offenders almost doubled since 1983, as a percentage of the institution population, property offenders decreased slightly.

- Burglary First and Second Degree accounted for 13,019 (17.2%) of those in prison. These were the two largest groups of property offenses. There were:
  - 9,222 (12.2%) in prison for Burglary First Degree.
  - 3,797 (5.0%) in prison for Burglary Second Degree.
- Petty Theft with a Prior was the next largest property offense group, accounting for 2,372 (3.1%) of those in prison.
- Grand Theft accounted for 2,207 (2.9%).
- Receiving Stolen Property accounted for 1,649 (2.2%).
- Vehicle Theft accounted for 1,634 (2.2%).
- Forgery/Fraud accounted for 1,167 (1.5%) of those in prison.
- Other Property accounted for 276 (0.4%) of the institution population.


## **CHARACTERISTICS OF THE INSTITUTION POPULATION**

#### **DRUG OFFENSES**

Drug offenders accounted for 16,684 (22.0%) of those in CDC prisons. This number increased 463.8% since the end of 1983.

- CSS (see note) Possession accounted for 5,140 (6.8%) of those incarcerated.
- CSS Possession for Sale accounted for 4,964 (6.6%) of those incarcerated.
- CSS Sale accounted for 4,630 (6.1%) of those in prison.
- Marijuana accounted for 1,306 (1.7%) of those in prison.




Drug Offenses December 31, 1988


### **OTHER OFFENSES**

- Possession of Weapons accounted for 1,126 (1.5%) of those in prison.
- Escape offenders accounted for 242 (0.3%) of those in prison.
- Driving Under the Influence (DUI) offenders accounted for 433 (0.6%) of those in prison.
- Arson offenders accounted for 319 (0.4%) of those in prison.

Other Offenses December 31, 1988




#### 26 Characteristics of the Institution Population

#### **RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS**


- Blacks accounted for 36.7% (27,958) of the institution population. They are the largest racial/ethnic group in the institution population.
- Whites accounted for 31.1% (23,703) of the institution population.
- Mexican/American inmates accounted for 27.6% (21,000) of the institution population.
- Other racial/ethnic groups accounted for 4.6% (3,510) of the institution population.

### AGE GROUPS

- The largest age group in prison was 25 to 29 years old. This group represented 28.2% (21,515) of the institution population.
- The second largest age group, the 30 to 34 year old group, accounted for 22.4% (17,044) of the institution population.
- The 20 to 24 year old group accounted for 19.8% (15,063) and was the third largest age group.
- The smallest age group was 60 years and older, representing 0.9% (711) of the institution population.
- There were 808 (1.1%) inmates under the age of 20 years.
- The median age of the institution population was 30 years.

The number of incidents in institutions decreased from 5,317 in 1987 to 4,925 in 1988.

The rate of incidents per 100 average daily institution population has been decreasing steadily since reaching a high of 12.73 in 1984. By 1988, the rate had declined to 7.07.


The number of inmate assaults on staff decreased from 914 in 1987 to 842 in 1988.

There have been no staff fatalities due to inmate assaults since 1985. The number of escapes from institutions and camps decreased from 89 in 1987 to 69 in 1988.

The number of escapes from Community Based Facilities (work furlough, etc.) increased from 735 in 1987 to 1,006 in 1988.

The number of inmates fatally injured during an assault decreased from 20 in 1987 to 10 in 1988.

**Total Number of Incidents** 



# NUMBER AND RATE OF INMATE INCIDENTS

- The number of inmate incidents increased steadily from 1970 through 1987. Incidents decreased in 1988 from a high of 5,317 in 1987 to 4,925 in 1988.
- The rate of incidents per 100 average daily institution population (ADP) peaked in 1984 at 12.73. Since then, the rate has declined to 7.07 in 1988.

#### NUMBER AND RATE OF ESCAPES

- The number of escapes from institutions and camps decreased from 89 in 1987 to 69 in 1988.
- The rate of escapes per 100 average daily institution population declined from 0.14 in 1987 to 0.10 in 1988.
- Escapes have declined substantially since reaching a high of 477 in 1972.



## **BEHAVIOR OF INMATES IN CDC INSTITUTIONS**

### **TYPE OF INCIDENTS**

- Assault incidents dropped from 2,155 in 1987 to 2,041 in 1988.
- Possession of Weapon incidents dropped from 1,053 in 1987 to 830 in 1988.
- Drug incidents increased slightly from 1,642 in 1987 to 1,657 in 1988.


#### Type of Incidents Calendar Year 1988



### ASSAULTS ON STAFF

- Inmate assaults on staff dropped from 914 in 1987 to 842 in 1988.
- This is the first time since 1980 that assaults on staff have decreased.
- The rate of assaults on staff per 100 average daily institution population peaked in 1984 at 1.7. Since 1984 the rate has decreased each year reaching 1.2 in 1988.





# INMATE ASSAULTS WITH AND WITHOUT WEAPONS ON STAFF

- Inmate assaults with weapons on staff decreased from 151 in 1987 to 124 in 1988.
- Assaults without weapons on staff decreased from 763 in 1987 to 718 in 1988.
- Assaults with weapons on staff dropped 18% in 1988.
- Assaults without weapons on staff dropped 6% in 1988.

### **FATAL ASSAULTS**

- The number of inmates killed as a result of inmate assaults dropped from 20 in 1987 to 10 in 1988.
- No staff were killed by inmates during 1988.
- The last staff fatality occurred in 1985.


### **ASSAULTS ON INMATES**

- The number of inmate assaults on inmates decreased from 1,291 in 1987 to 1,243 in 1988.
- Assaults with weapons decreased from 852 in 1987 to 815 in 1988.
- Assaults without weapons decreased from 439 in 1987 to 428 in 1988.


### RATE OF INMATE ASSAULTS BY INSTITUTION

- The California Correctional Institution IV-A facility had the highest rate of inmate assaults on inmates at 7.5 per 100 average daily institution population (ADP) in 1988. CCI-IV-A was also highest in 1987 with a rate of 8.7.
- New Folsom (CSP-Sacramento) had the next highest rate of assaults at 6.3. New Folsom also had the second highest rate in 1987 at 7.5.
- The rate of inmate assaults on inmates at San Quentin dropped from 3.9 in 1987 to 2.2 in 1988.
- While the inmate assault rate dropped at most institutions, the rate at CIM's Reception Center Central increased from 2.5 in 1987 to 4.0 in 1988.

### Number of Inmate Assaults on Inmates Calendar Years 1977 through 1988




Inmate Assaults on Inmates Rate per 100 Institution ADP Six Highest Institutions Calendar Year 1988



### NUMBER AND RATE OF ESCAPES

- The number of escapes from institutions and camps dropped from 89 in 1987 to 69 in 1988.
- The rate of escapes per 100 average daily institution population dropped from 0.14 in 1987 to 0.10 in 1988.
- The number and rate of escapes has, with some exceptions, decreased steadily since reaching a high of 477 (rate 2.48) in 1972.
- A majority of the escapes are escapes from camp. In 1988, there were 45 escapes from camps and 25 escapes from institutions.
- Escapes from institutions have decreased more rapidly than escapes from camps.
- Escapes (i.e., walkaways, late returns) from Community Based Facilities increased from 735 in 1987 to 1,006 in 1988.





### TIME CREDITS LOST

Information presented below shows the average number of days lost by felon inmates due to serious behavior reports (CDC 115: see Glossary).


- The average number of days lost per felon (based on the average daily institution population, ADP) for 1988 was 26.0. This average is based on both inmates who lost credits and inmates who did not lose credits.
- The average days lost has remained about the same for the last three years (1986-1988).
- While the average number of days lost remained about the same for men, the women's average increased from 21.1 in 1987 to 24.1 in 1988.

Note: On January 1, 1983 legislation was implemented which increased the number of time credits which could be lost for one offense from 45 to 180 days. 




On December 31, 1988 the California Felon Parole population reached an all time high of 48,427.

Unlike the felon institution population, California Felon Parolees who were originally committed for property offenses made up the largest group of parolees. This group accounted for 38.7% of the California Felon Parole population.






The 1988 year end California Felon Parole population reached a high of 169.0 parolees per 100,000 California population, the highest in CDC history.




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Parole Population December 31, 1960 through 1988

### PAROLE POPULATION

The California Felon Parole population includes only felons released to parole from CDC institutions. This includes those supervised in California and other states.

- The felon parole population increased by 153.1% from 19,133 on December 31, 1983 and by 20.3% from 40,242 on December 31, 1987 to 48,427 on December 31, 1988.
- There were 44,552 (92.0%) male felon parolees compared to 3,875 (8.0%) female felon parolees.

### **OFFENSE CATEGORIES**

Property offenders represented the largest offense category on parole as of the end of 1988.

- Property offenders accounted for 38.7% (18,716) of the felon parole population.
- Violent offenders accounted for 31.2% (15,094) of the felon parole population.
- Drug offenders accounted for 25.2% (12,162) of the felon parole population.
- Parolees with Other offenses accounted for 4.9% (2,355) of the felon parole population.


### **VIOLENT OFFENSES**

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Violent offenders almost doubled from 7,610 in 1983 to 15,094 in 1988. However, violent offenders have decreased as a percentage of the total population from 38.6% in 1983 to 31.2% in 1988.


- Homicides accounted for 1,501 (3.1%) of those on parole. There were:
  - 294 (0.6%) Murder First parolees.
  - -90(0.2%) Murder Second parolees.
  - 882 (1.8%) Manslaughter parolees.
  - 235 (0.5%) Manslaughter by Vehicle parolees.
- Robbery offenders accounted for 6,247 (12.9%) of the parole population.
- Assault with a Deadly Weapon accounted for 2,888 (6.0%) of the parole population.
- Other Assault/Battery accounted for 1,012 (2.1%) of the felon parole population.
- Sex offenders accounted for 3,140 (6.5%) of the parole population. There were:
  - 989 (2.0%) Rapists on parole.
  - 1,496 (3.1%) Lewd Acts with a Child offenders on parole.
  - 655 (1.4%) Other Sex offenders on parole.
- Kidnapping offenders accounted for 306 (0.6%) of the parole population.

### **PROPERTY OFFENSES**

Property offenders on parole more than doubled from 8,874 in 1983 to 18,716 in 1988.

- Burglary First and Second Degree accounted for 9,506 (19.7%) of those on parole. Burglary was the largest group of property offenders. There were:
  - 5,291 (11.0%) on parole for Burglary First Degree.
  - 4,215 (8.7%) on parole for Burglary Second Degree.
- Grand Theft offenders were the next largest property offense group, accounting for 2,391 (5.0%) of those on parole.
- Petty Theft with a Prior offenders accounted for 1,959 (4.1%) of those on parole.
- Receiving Stolen Property offenders accounted for 1,782 (3.7%) of those on parole.
- Vehicle Theft offenders accounted for 1,364 (2.8%) of those on parole.
- Forgery/Fraud offenders accounted for 1,378 (2.9%) of those on parole.
- Other Property offenders accounted for 336 (0.7%) of the felon parole population.



### **DRUG OFFENSES**

Drug offenders accounted for 12,162 (25.2%) of those in the parole population. This number represents an increase of 10,184 (514.9%) over the drug offender parole population of 1,978 in 1983.

- CSS (see note) Possession accounted for 4,891 (10.1%). The largest CSS subgroup.
- CSS Possession for Sale accounted for 3,634 (7.5%) of those on parole.
- CSS Sale accounted for 1,814 (3.8%) of those on parole.
- Marijuana accounted for 1,426 (3.0%) of those on parole.







### **RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS**

The White racial/ethnic group has decreased from 44.8% of the parole population in 1978 to 31.3% in 1988, while the Mexican/American group has increased from 21.8% to 31.4% for the same time period.

- Blacks, now the largest group, accounted for 32.7% (15,836) of the parole population.
- Mexican/Americans accounted for 31.4% (15,207) of the parole population.
- Whites accounted for 31.3% (15,151) of the parole population.
- Other racial/ethnic groups accounted for 4.6% (2,233) of the parole population.

### AGE GROUPS

The majority (52.8%) of felons on parole were 25 to 34 years of age.

- The largest group of felon parolees was the 25 to 29 year old group. This group represented 29.5% (14,268) of parolees.
- The next largest group was the 30 to 34 year old group, which accounted for 23.3% (11,291) of parolees.
- The smallest age group was the under 20 year old group, which accounted for only 0.2% (88).
- The median age of felon parolees was 30.

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









Region of Parole Release Calendar Year 1988






### Ten Largest Counties of Parole Release Calendar Year 1988



### PAROLE REVOCATION TIME IMPOSED BY BPT CHARGE GROUP

There were 34,014 felon parolees revoked by the Board of Prison Terms (BPT) for technical and criminal violations who were returned to CDC institutions (PV-RTC's). (See glossary).

- The total average amount of revocation time imposed was 6.6 months.
  - Males were given an average of 6.7 months revocation time.
- Females were given an average of 6.1 months revocation time.
- 16.8% (5,635) of the revoked parolees were returned for violating property offense BPT charges, and were given an average of 8.4 months revocation time.
- 22.2% (7,426) of the revoked parolees were returned to prison for drug violations, and were given an average of 5.6 months revocation time.
- 9.8% (3,276) of the revoked parolees were returned to prison for violent or sex related BPT charges, and were given an average of 9.6 months revocation time.
- Technical violations of the general and special conditions of parole accounted for 34.2% (11,440) of the total principal charges. These technical violators were given an average of 5.0 months revocation time.







Average (Mean) Time Served in Months Calendar Year 1988











### Community Based Populations 1978, 1983 and 1988







# GLOSSARY



## CALIFORNIA PRISONERS AND PAROLEES GLOSSARY

#### **GLOSSARY OF COMMONLY USED TERMS**

**ADMISSION RATE:** The number of felons entering CDC institutions as new admissions from court (See NEW ADMISSIONS FROM COURT) during a specified time period per 100,000 population, usually state or county population.

ADP: See AVERAGE DAILY INSTITUTION POPULATION.

AGE GROUPS: The grouping of persons by age into ten major groups used for summary statistics.

**ARSON\*:** Willfully setting fire to any structure, forest land, or property.

**AVERAGE DAILY INSTITUTION POPULATION (ADP):** The average population per day in a CDC facility for a given period of time, usually one year.

(BPT) BOARD OF PRISON TERMS: The state agency which has jurisdiction over the release to parole of inmates sentenced to indeterminate terms and parole revocation of all felons.

**BPT CHARGE GROUP:** The grouping of similar revocation charges used for summary statistical purposes.

**BPT CHARGE CATEGORY:** The grouping of BPT charge groups into five major categories (Violent, Property, Drug, Other and Conditions of Parole) used for summary statistical reporting.

**BPT REVOCATION CHARGE:** The principal violation by a parolee that led to his or her being revoked and subsequently sent back to prison as a parole violator returned to custody (PV-RTC).

**BREACH OF PERIMETER:** Escape from a CDC facility which contains a fenced or walled perimeter.

**BURGLARY, FIRST DEGREE\*:** Entry into an inhabited building (being used for dwelling purposes) with the intent to commit grand or petty larceny or any kind of felony.

**BURGLARY, SECOND DEGREE\*:** Entry into an uninhabited building with the intent to commit grand or petty larceny or any kind of felony. See BURGLARY, FIRST DEGREE.

**CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS (CDC):** The state agency which has jurisdiction over the California prison and parole system and the California Rehabilitation Center.

**CALIFORNIA POPULATION:** The total population in the state of California of which rates are computed per 100,000 people.

CALIFORNIA REHABILITATION CENTER (CRC): An institution operated by the California Department of Corrections which is designated for the Civil Narcotic Addict (CNA) program.

### **GLOSSARY**

CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY (CYA): The state agency which has jurisdiction over and maintains institutions as correctional schools for the reception of wards of the juvenile court and other persons committed from justice, municipal and superior courts. CYA also supervises these wards while on parole.

### CDC: See CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS.

**CDC 115:** A behavior report documenting an inmate's violation of California law or a serious rule of the Rules and Regulations of the Director of Corrections while incarcerated.

**CDC TIME:** The time spent in a CDC institution from the date received to the first parole date.

**CIVIL COMMITMENT:** A type of commitment in which criminal proceedings are suspended while a defendant undergoes treatment at the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC) for narcotic addiction.

**CIVIL NARCOTIC ADDICT (CNA):** A person civilly committed to the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC).

COMMITMENT: See COURT COMMITMENT.

**COMMITMENT RATE:** The number of felon new admissions from court and parole violators with new terms (PV-WNT'S) committed to prison during a specified time period per 100,000 population, usually state or county population.

**COMMUNITY BASED FACILITIES:** County, state, and privately contracted facilities which are located in local communities, who house inmates in work furlough and prisoner-mother programs, and parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTC'S) who are serving revocation time in RTC facilities.

COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMS: See COMMUNITY BASED FACILITIES.

**CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES SCHEDULES:** Schedules of drugs, substances, or immediate precursors which are set forth in Health and Safety Code Sections 11054 through 11058. These schedules include heroin, marijuana, amphetamines, barbiturates and psychedelics, and categorize substances according to their potential for abuse and set restrictions for their use.

**COUNTY DIAGNOSTIC CASE:** A person who has been convicted of a felony and sent to prison by the court to receive a diagnostic evaluation (under Penal Code Section 1203.3) to help the court determine whether he or she should be sentenced to state prison, or probation and/or jail.

**COURT COMMITMENT:** A person received by CDC from court to serve time following a felony conviction. He or she can be received as a felon, civil narcotic addict or county diagnostic case.

CSS: See CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES SCHEDULES.

### CALIFORNIA PRISONERS AND PAROLEES GLOSSARY

**DEATH ROW:** Term used to describe the housing of inmates sentenced to death in California under CDC jurisdiction.

**DESIGN CAPACITY:** The maximum number of inmates a facility was originally designed to house, less/plus beds lost/gained due to later conversions, additions or deactivations.

**DETERMINATE SENTENCING:** The sentencing structure which became effective in California July 1, 1977. Determinate sentencing requires imposition of a term of imprisonment proportionate to the seriousness of the crime, with uniform sentences for similar crimes.

**DISCHARGED:** When a person is released from prison or parole and is no longer under CDC jurisdiction.

**ESCAPE RETURN:** When an inmate escapes from a CDC facility and is returned to prison either with or without a new term from court.

FELON: A person who has committed a felony.

**FELONY:** A crime which is punishable by death, imprisonment in state penal institutions, local jails or probation.

**FIRST PAROLE:** The release to parole of a felon for the first time following a commitment from court. This would include new admissions from court and parole violators with new terms (PV-WNT's).

GOOD TIME SYSTEM: Time credit system by which an inmate could reduce up to one-third of his or her prison sentence for good behavior, regardless of whether he or she was working in an educational/vocational program. Replaced by the INMATE WORK TRAINING INCENTIVE PROGRAM (IWTIP) in 1983.

**GRAND THEFT\*:** The unlawful stealing of another person's property worth more than \$400.

HOMICIDE\*: The unlawful killing of another person.

HONORABLE DISCHARGE: An exit from the military under favorable conditions.

**ICOOP: See INTERSTATE COOPERATIVE PAROLE AGREEMENT.** 

**INCARCERATION RATE:** The number of persons in prison per 100,000 population, usually state or county population.

**INCIDENT:** An event committed by an inmate in a CDC facility which is either against the law c a violation of the Rules and Regulations of the Director of Corrections.

## GLOSSARY

**INDETERMINATE SENTENCING:** A type of sentencing structure used in California until July 1, 1977 where the purpose of sentencing was rehabilitation, and the parole authority, rather than the Legislature or the courts, determined the length of sentence. Under indeterminate sentencing, the commitment is not for a single specific period of time (such as three, five or seven years), but is instead for a range of time (such as fifteen years to life). Indeterminate sentences are still given for offenses committed before July 1, 1977 and for crimes which carry life sentences.

**INMATE:** An inhabitant of a penal institution ordered by the court to serve a prison term.

**INSTITUTION:** See PRISON.

**INTERSTATE COOPERATIVE PAROLE AGREEMENT (ICOOP):** An agreement between California and other states to supervise parolees from other states while they live in California.

(ISPU) INTERSTATE PAROLE UNIT: The California parole unit responsible for coordinating the supervision of California parolees living out of state.

JAIL: A county or municipal facility for incarceration of sentenced and unsentenced persons.

JUVENILE: A person under the age of 18.

**KIDNAP\*:** Transportation or confinement of a person without authority of law and without his or her consent, or without the consent of his or her guardian, if a minor.

**LEWD ACTS\*:** Engaging in sexual activity with a child under the age of 14 years with the intent of arousing such a person or child.

**LIFER:** An inmate who has been sentenced by the courts to life in prison. The sentence can be life in prison with the possibility of parole or without the possibility of parole.

MANSLAUGHTER\*: Causing the death of another person by recklessness or gross negligence.

**MANSLAUGHTER BY VEHICLE\*:** Causing the death of another person by reckless use of an automobile, usually drunk driving.

**MEAN:** The sum of individual values of each case divided by the number of cases; the average of all values.

**MEDIAN:** A designated point in a series chosen so that one-half of the individuals in the series are below and <u>one-half</u> above.

**MENTAL HEALTH FACILITY:** A facility operated under the jurisdiction of the Department of Mental Health which treats the mentally ill or criminally insane.

## CALIFORNIA PRISONERS AND PAROLEES GLOSSARY

**MISDEMEANOR:** A crime punishable by imprisonment in a county jail, probation, or fine. Under certain conditions defined in Section 17 of the Penal Code, a felony crime can be treated like a misdemeanor.

**MURDER, FIRST DEGREE\*:** Murder which is perpetrated by means of a destructive device or explosive, knowing use of deadly ammunition, lying in wait, torture, or any other kind of willful, deliberate, and premeditated killing; or which is committed in the perpetration or attempt to perpetrate arson, rape, robbery, burglary, mayhem, and other crimes.

MURDER, SECOND DEGREE\*: All murders that are not first degree murders in that they do not involve the willful, deliberate and premeditation of the crime. See MURDER, FIRST DEGREE.

**NEW ADMISSION FROM COURT:** An original commitment from Superior Court where the inmate is given a new CDC identification number. A new admission from court can be for a felony conviction or a civil narcotic addict commitment.

**OFFENDER BASED INFORMATION SYSTEM (OBIS):** An automated computer system designed to track all movements of inmates committed to the California Department of Corrections from the time of their admission to their discharge from prison or parole.

**OFFENSE:** The principal or controlling offense for which the person was committed to prison.

**OFFENSE CATEGORIES:** The grouping of offense groups into four major categories (Violent, Property, Drug and Other).

**OUTPATIENT STATUS:** A Civil Narcotic Addict released from the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC) to the jurisdiction of the Parole and Community Services Division.

PAL: See PAROLEES AT LARGE.

**PAROLE:** A period of supervision in the community following completion of a prison sentence. The conditional release provides supervision and control over offenders after they return to society.

**PAROLE REGION:** An area of the state whose boundaries define jurisdiction and supervision of the Parole and Community Services Division. There are four parole regions in the state under CDC jurisdiction.

**PAROLE RELEASE:** The release of an inmate to the jurisdiction of the Parole and Community Services Division. This includes both first paroles and reparoles.

**PAROLEE AT LARGE (PAL):** A parolee who absconds from supervision and whose parole is suspended by the Board of Prison Terms (BPT).

### **GLOSSARY**

**PENDING REVOCATION:** A parolee who may have committed a violation of parole but has yet to have a parole revocation hearing, and is being held in a state prison facility.

**PETTY THEFT\*:** Unlawful taking of property under \$400; can be a felony if there are prior convictions.

**POPULATION-AT-RISK:** The number of persons in a population at a given point in time and the number of persons entering a given population during a calendar year.

**PRECONFINEMENT CREDITS:** See PRE-PRISON CREDITS.

**PRE-PRISON CREDITS:** The time credits granted by a judge at sentencing for time spent in jail awaiting trial and/or sentencing and the time spent in jail after sentencing to the date of delivery to CDC.

**PRINCIPAL CONTROLLING OFFENSE:** The offense which usually has the greatest term of imprisonment imposed by the court, including enhancements. This offense is also used for statistical reporting in CDC publications.

**PRIOR COMMITMENT:** A previous order by the court to serve time in a prison, jail or juvenile facility.

**PRISON:** A state correctional facility where persons are confined following conviction of a felony offense.

(PV-RTC) PAROLE VIOLATOR RETURNED TO CUSTODY: A parolee who has violated the terms of parole, been revoked from parole by the Board of Prison Terms (BPT), and returned to prison for a term up to twelve months.

(PV-WNT) PAROLE VIOLATOR WITH A NEW TERM: A parolee who has violated the terms of parole by committing a new crime and has been returned to prison with a new commitment from court.

**RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS:** Grouping by racial and ethnic origins into four major groups (White, Black, Mexican/American and Other) used for summary statistics.

**RATE:** As used in this publication, the ratio of the number of one specific group to a population base.

**REINSTATED:** When a parolee at large (PAL) whose parole has been suspended is reinstated to active parole status.

**REPAROLE:** The release to parole of a felon who has had his or her parole revoked.

**GLOSSARY** 

**RETURN STATUS:** An indication of whether or not an inmate has escaped or been paroled and has subsequently been returned to prison.

**REVOCATION:** Cancellation or the repeal of parole by the Board of Prison Terms (BPT).

**REVOCATION TIME IMPOSED:** The amount of time given to serve in prison for a parole violator returned to prison for a technical and/or criminal violation (PV-RTC'S) by the Board of Prison Terms (BPT).

**REVOKE:** To withdraw, repeal, or cancel parole.

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**ROBBERY\*:** Felonious taking of personal property in the possession of another, from his or her person or immediate presence, and against his or her will, accomplished by means of force or fear.

STATE JUVENILE COMMITMENT: Commitment to the California Youth Authority (CYA) or equivalent in other states.

SUSPENDED: The suspension of parole for someone who has absconded and is considered a Parolee at Large (PAL).

TEMPORARY RELEASE STATUS: An inmate released temporarily from a CDC institution to go back to court, jail, an outside hospital or medical facility, or on temporary community leave.

TIME CREDIT: The net difference between credits earned and restored through the Inmate Work Training Incentive Program (IWTIP) and credits lost due to administrative or serious rule violation (CDC 115). This also includes credits earned for those still under the "Good Time" System.

TOTAL TIME SERVED: The sum of preconfinement time plus CDC time served.

**VEHICLE THEFT\*:** The unlawful taking of an automobile, bicycle, motorcycle, or other vehicle or motorboat or vessel, for the purpose of temporarily using or operating it; a felony if there are prior convictions.

WALKAWAY: An inmate who escapes from, or fails to return to, prison, a community based facility, or correctional camp with no fenced or walled perimeter.

WORK FURLOUGH: A program to assist felons to adjust from institution life to the community. Inmates work in the community during the day without correctional supervision and return each evening to the custody of the jail or correctional facility.

### YOUTH AUTHORITY: See CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY.

### **PAROLE REGIONS**

- **Region I:** Covers all the counties north of Los Angeles and San Bernardino counties, with the exception of those in Region II and Inyo and Mono counties.
- **Region II:** Covers the San Francisco Bay Area counties including: Monterey, San Benito, Santa Cruz, Santa Clara, San Mateo, San Francisco, Alameda, Contra Costa, Solano, Napa, Lake, Mendocino, Sonoma, and Marin.
- **Region III:** Covers Los Angeles county excluding the southeastern area (Long Beach through Pomona), and also covers Inyo and Mono counties.
- **Region IV:** Covers all of southern California from San Bernardino county and the southeastern area of Los Angeles county to the Mexican border.
