

FOREWORD

The initial issue of the Missouri Crime and Arrest Digest was published in 1981. Since that time, the Statistical Analysis Center has annually compiled and published this report with some changes in data analysis or presentation each year.

This 1988 edition of the Digest differs from earlier editions in presentation format. A desktop publishing system was used to prepare all data, graphs, charts, etc., which provides a more readable format for the large volume of data contained in this publication.

As in the past, the data presented in the Digest are collected by the FBI as part of their national Uniform Crime Reporting System. At the end of each calendar year, the FBI provides these data to the Statistical Analysis Center for analysis and interpretation. It is, therefore, extremely important that each law enforcement agency in Missouri participate in the FBI UCR Program and submit all required data.

In addition to the UCR data, the Center also has other sources of data on crime offenses, offenders, traffic accidents, etc., which can be provided to other agencies upon request. If you need research assistance or special data analyses, contact the Statistical Analysis Center at the Missouri State Highway Patrol.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this Digest is to provide criminal justice authorities and other interested parties with summary data on crime and law enforcement activity in the State of Missouri.

The Digest is produced annually by the Missouri Statistical Analysis Center (SAC). The primary source of data for the Digest is the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) Uniform Crime Reporting System (UCR). Although this publication contains Missouri crime and arrest activity from 1979 through 1988, emphasis is placed on data reported in the most recent year (1988).

For statewide crime activity, estimation routines have been used to better identify the actual number of crimes that have occurred in the State. These estimation routines are designed to compensate for those law enforcement agencies that did not report their crime activity into the FBI UCR Program. Please note that no estimation routines were employed in the presentation of arrest activity.

The Crime Index is the sum of eight major offenses and is used to measure the magnitude of crime in the United States. The major offenses are included in the Index because of their frequency of occurrence and the fact that they are most likely to be reported to law enforcement agencies. These eight offenses are: murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The first four make up the Violent Crime Index and the last four make up the Property Crime Index.

1988 Crime Index Offenses - - - 3.9% Increase Over 1987

In 1988, a total of 236,791 Crime Index offenses were reported in the State of Missouri. It is estimated that a total of 251,719 Crime Index offenses actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was a 3.9 percent increase over 1987. In 1988, one Index Crime was committed every 2.1 minutes. In 22.7 of every 100 Crime Index offenses, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.

1988 Violent Offenses - - - 2.4% Increase Over 1987

Violent offenses made up 11.3 percent of the total 1988 Missouri Crime Index. There were 27,228 Violent Index offenses reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 28,519 Violent Index offenses actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was an increase of 2.4 percent compared to 1987. A violent offense was committed in Missouri every 18.5 minutes. In 51.0 of every 100 Violent Index offenses, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means. A brief analysis of each type of Violent Index offense is given below.

- There were 388 murders reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 412 murders actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was a decrease of 3.3 percent compared to 1987. While murder is the most serious Index offense, it made up only 0.2 percent of the total 1988 Missouri Crime Index. One murder was committed in the State every 21.3 hours. In 88.0 of every 100 murders, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- There were 1,404 forcible rapes reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 1,500 rapes actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was an increase of 2.0 percent compared to 1987. Forcible rape accounted for 0.6 percent of the total 1988 Missouri Crime Index. One forcible rape was committed every 5.9 hours. In 61.4 of every 100 forcible rapes, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.

- There were 8,475 robberies reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 8,622 robberies actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was an increase of 2.8 percent compared to 1987. Robbery accounted for 3.4 percent of the total 1988 Missouri Crime Index. One robbery occurred every 1.0 hours. In 28.8 of every 100 robberies, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- There were 16,961 aggravated assaults reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 17,985 aggravated assaults actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was an increase of 2.3 percent compared to 1987. Aggravated assault accounted for 7.1 percent of the total 1988 Missouri Crime Index. One aggravated assault occurred every 29.3 minutes. In 60.6 of every 100 aggravated assaults, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.

1988 Property Offenses - - - 4.1% Increase Over 1987

Property offenses made up 88.7 percent of the total 1988 Missouri Crime Index. There were 209,563 Property Index offenses reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 223,200 Property Index offenses actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was an increase of 4.1 percent compared to 1987. It is estimated that property offenses accounted for \$240,638,429 in property stolen or destroyed. One such offense occurred every 2.4 minutes in the State. In 19.0 of every 100 Property Index offenses, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means. A brief analysis of each type of Property Index offense is given below.

- There were 54,052 burglaries reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 58,016 burglaries actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was an increase of 2.3 percent compared to 1987. Burglary accounted for 23.0 percent of the total 1988 Missouri Crime Index. One burglary occurred every 9.1 minutes and it is estimated that \$55,604,855 in property was stolen in 1988 due to this offense. In 16.0 of every 100 burglaries, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- There were 131,774 thefts reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 140,510 thefts actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was an increase of 4.9 percent compared to 1987. Theft accounted for 55.8 percent of the total 1988 Missouri Crime Index. One theft occurred every 3.8 minutes and it is estimated that \$49,542,421 in property was stolen in 1988 due to this offense. In 20.8 of every 100 thefts, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- There were 21,557 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 22,351 motor vehicle thefts actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was an increase of 2.9 percent compared to 1987. Motor vehicle theft accounted for 8.9 percent of the total 1988 Missouri Crime Index. One motor vehicle theft occurred every 23.6 minutes and it is estimated that \$110,519,437 in property was stolen in 1988 due to this offense. In 15.3 of every 100 motor vehicle thefts, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- There were 2,180 arsons reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 2,323 arsons actually occurred on a statewide basis. This was an increase of 14.0 percent compared to 1987. Arson accounted for 0.9 percent of the total 1988 Missouri Crime Index. One arson occurred every 3.8 hours and it is estimated that \$24,971,716 in property was destroyed due to arson in 1988. In 27.6 of every 100 arsons, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.

INTRODUCTION

This Digest is the eighth in a series of publications prepared by the Missouri State Highway Patrol, Statistical Analysis Center (SAC). It is designed to present data on crime and arrest activity in Missouri from 1979 through 1988 with special emphasis on the most recent year's (1988) crime and arrest activity. This publication differs from earlier editions in that all data displays, graphs, and text were developed using a desktop publishing system in order to improve readability.

The crime and arrest data contained in this publication are segmented into five parts. The first section displays the Missouri Crime Clock. This clock offers an overview of the frequency of occurrence of Crime Index offenses committed in the State in relation to time. The Crime Index is the sum of the eight major offenses used to indicate the occurrence of crime in the United States. The eight offenses making up the total Crime Index are: murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The second section provides data related to Crime Index offenses committed in the State of Missouri. Its purpose is to provide a comparison of the various types of Crime Index offenses so that their relative importance can be assessed. In addition, Crime Index activity is displayed by geographical regions of the State and also over time to observe trends. The third section presents data on arrest activity and clearance rates associated with Crime Index offenses as well as arrest activity associated with other classes of criminal offenses. These data provide an appreciation of criminal enforcement activity being performed in the State of Missouri by class of crime. The fourth section provides a series of data and analysis related to each of the eight types of Crime Index offenses. Data are provided on crime activity, clearance rates, crime patterns, and arrest activity associated with each of these offenses. Finally, the last section provides summary data on Crime Index offenses and arrest activity for specific law enforcement jurisdictions in the State of Missouri.

The data contained in this Digest were provided on a voluntary basis by Missouri law enforcement agencies to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI), Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program.

The national UCR Program was initiated in 1930 by the Committee on Uniform Crime Reports of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP). This committee developed uniform offense and arrest classifications as well as reporting procedures which could be used by law enforcement agencies throughout the nation. The FBI was designated to administer the Program and became the national clearinghouse for UCR data. The Committee on Uniform Crime Reports of the IACP continues to serve the national Program in an advisory capacity. In 1966, the National Sheriff's Association also established a Committee on Uniform Crime Reports to act as an advisory body for this program and to promote reporting to the UCR Program.

Crime and arrest data are, for the most part, collected on a monthly basis in the UCR Program. The FBI provides report forms, tally sheets, and self-addressed envelopes to Missouri law enforcement agencies who complete and return them to the FBI.

The fact that this program is voluntary in nature in the State of Missouri increases the problems associated with the completeness and representativeness of the information being captured and analyzed. Certain Missouri law enforcement agencies either do not report to the program or they send incomplete data. In most states, reporting to this program is mandatory for law enforcement agencies through the enactment of state statute.

To reduce the problems associated with both non-reporting and incomplete reporting, a number of techniques have been used for displaying statewide crime and arrest activity. For statewide arrest activity, reliance has been placed on displaying arrest rates on a per 100,000 population basis. This type of data display identifies arrest activity in relation to the population of only those jurisdictions that reported the activity. For statewide crime activity, mathematical routines have been employed to estimate the actual number of crimes that occurred in the State. Crime rates on a per 100,000 population basis also are included. These rates are based on the estimates of actual crimes being committed rather than on those that were reported. Individual data displays in the Digest fully identify whether reported, estimated, or rates per 100,000 population data are used in the display.

Data displays identifying a specific law enforcement jurisdiction's crime and arrest activity contain only the activity reported into the UCR Program. No effort has been made to estimate individual law enforcement agency's crime and arrest activity.


Slight discrepancies may be found if comparisons are made with FBI UCR publications and this Digest covering the same subject matter for the State of Missouri. Although similar, estimation routines and rates per 100,000 population calculations used by the FBI are not the same as those used in this Digest. Discrepancies also may be noted when examining actual reported figures. This is a result of updates having been made to the UCR files between the time the FBI data were processed and the time the SAC analysis was performed.

1.0 MISSOURI CRIME CLOCK

THE CRIME CLOCK SUMMARIZES ESTIMATED CRIMINAL ACTIVITY IN THE STATE OF MISSOURI DURING 1988 IN RELATION TO TIME. FROM THIS PERSPECTIVE, AN APPRECIATION OF THE RELATIVE FREQUENCY OF VARIOUS CRIMINAL OFFENSES CAN BE OBTAINED. THE CRIME CLOCK SHOULD BE VIEWED WITH CARE. IT IS DESIGNED TO CONVEY ANNUAL ESTIMATED CRIME EXPERIENCE BY SHOWING THE RELATIVE FREQUENCY OF OCCURRENCE OF THE INDEX OFFENSES. THIS MODE OF DISPLAY SHOULD NOT BE TAKEN TO IMPLY A REGULARITY IN THE COMMISSION OF CRIME; RATHER, IT REPRESENTS THE ANNUAL RATIO OF CRIME TO FIXED TIME INTERVALS.

2.0 MISSOURI CRIME INDEX COMPARISON ANALYSIS

A SERIES OF TABLES AND FIGURES SUMMARIZES CRIME INDEX OFFENSES COMMITTED IN THE STATE OF MISSOURI. THE PURPOSE OF THESE DISPLAYS IS TO COMPARE THE VARIOUS TYPES OF CRIME INDEX OFFENSES BEING COMMITTED ACCORDING TO THEIR RELATIVE CONTRIBUTION TO THE CRIME INDEX. IN ADDITION, CRIME INDEX OFFENSE RATES ARE DISPLAYED BY GEOGRAPHICAL REGIONS OF THE STATE AND OVER TIME IN ORDER TO OBSERVE TRENDS.




CRIME INDEX OFFENSE RATES, STATE OF MISSOURI¹

BY COUNTY / 1988²






VIOLENT INDEX OFFENSE RATES, STATE OF MISSOURI¹

BY COUNTY / 1988²






PROPERTY INDEX OFFENSE RATES, STATE OF MISSOURI¹

3.0 MISSOURI ARREST ANALYSIS




CRIME INDEX ARREST RATES, STATE OF MISSOURI¹


VIOLENT INDEX ARREST RATES, STATE OF MISSOURI¹

4.1 MURDER

DEFINITION

Murder and non-negligent manslaughter are the willful killing of one human being by another. Not included in this offense classification are deaths caused by negligence, suicide, accident, justifiable homicide (the killing of a felon by a peace officer in the line of duty or a private citizen during the commission of a felony), and attempts to murder (these are classified as aggravated assaults). Murder offenses are reported on a per victim basis.

1988 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- There were 388 murders reported during 1988. It is estimated that a total of 412 murders actually occurred on a statewide basis. Based on this estimate, this was a 3.3 percent decrease from 1987.
- It is estimated that one murder occurred every 21.3 hours.
- Murder accounted for 0.2 percent of the Total Crime Index and 1.4 percent of all Violent Index offenses.
- The murder rate per 100,000 population was 8.0 in 1988 compared to 8.4 in 1987.
- In 1988, 88.0 of every 100 murders were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- 390 persons were reported arrested for murder in 1988. Of these, 88.5 percent were adults and 11.5 percent were juveniles.
- Of the murder victims reported, 76.3 percent were male and 23.7 percent were female. Of the total, 87.9 percent were adults, 9.8 percent were juveniles, and 2.4 percent had an unknown age.
- A firearm was used by 61.7 percent of the offenders associated with murders.



4.2 FORCIBLE RAPE

DEFINITION

Forcible rape is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults or attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force also are included. However, statutory rape (without force), sex attacks on males, and other types of sex offenses are not included in this category. Forcible rape offenses are reported on a per victim basis.

1988 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- There were 1,404 rapes reported during 1988. It is estimated that a total of 1,500 rapes actually occurred on a statewide basis. Based on this estimate, this was a 2.0 percent increase from 1987.
- It is estimated that one rape occurred every 5.9 hours.
- Rape accounted for 0.6 percent of the Total Crime Index and 5.3 percent of all Violent Index offenses.
- The rape rate per 100,000 population was 29.2 in 1988 compared to 28.8 in 1987.
- Rape by force constituted 82.9 percent of the estimated rapes while attempted rapes accounted for 17.1 percent.
- In 1988, 61.4 of every 100 rapes were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- 708 persons were reported arrested for rape in 1988.
- Of those persons arrested for rape in 1988, 83.5 percent were adults and 16.5 percent were juveniles.



4.3 ROBBERY

DEFINITION

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear. Robbery involves a theft or larceny but is aggravated by the element of force or threat of force. Robbery offenses are reported on an incident-by- incident basis.

1988 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- There were 8,475 robberies reported during 1988. It is estimated that a total of 8,622 robberies actually occurred on a statewide basis. Based on this estimate, this was a 2.8 percent increase over 1987.
- It is estimated that one robbery occurred every 1.0 hours.
- Robbery accounted for 3.4 percent of the Total Crime Index and 30.2 percent of all Violent Index offenses.
- The robbery rate per 100,000 population was 167.8 in 1988 compared to 164.4 in 1987.
- It is estimated that in 33.8 percent of all robberies, a firearm was used.
- Street robbery was the most prevalent class of robbery accounting for an estimated 61.3 percent of all such offenses.
- It is estimated that \$5,568,088 in property was stolen in 1988 due to this offense.
- In 1988, 28.8 of every 100 robberies were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- 2,218 persons were reported arrested for robbery in 1988. Of these, 77.1 percent were adults and 22.9 percent were juveniles.



4.4 AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

DEFINITION

Aggravated assault is an unlawful attack or attempted attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. All assaults or attempted assaults by one person upon another with the intent to kill, maim, or inflict severe bodily injury with the use of any dangerous weapon are classified under this category of offense. Aggravated assault offenses are reported on a per victim basis.

1988 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- There were 16,961 aggravated assaults reported in 1988. It is estimated that a total of 17,985 aggravated assaults actually occurred on a statewide basis. Based on this estimate, this was a 2.3 percent increase over 1987.
- It is estimated that one aggravated assault occurred every 29.3 minutes.
- Aggravated assault accounted for 7.1 percent of the Total Crime Index and 63.1 percent of all Violent Index offenses.
- The aggravated assault rate per 100,000 population was 350.0 in 1988 compared to 344.5 in 1987.
- It is estimated that a firearm was used in 30.5 percent of the cases.
- In 1988, 60.6 of every 100 aggravated assaults were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- 6,438 persons were reported arrested for aggravated assault in 1988. Of these, 82.6 percent were adults and 17.4 percent were juveniles.



4.5 BURGLARY

DEFINITION

Burglary is the unlawful entry or attempted unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Burglary offenses are reported on an incident-by-incident basis.

1988 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- There were 54,052 burglaries reported during 1988. It is estimated that a total of 58,016 burglaries actually occurred on a statewide basis. Based on this estimate, this was a 2.3 percent increase over 1987.
- It is estimated that one burglary occurred every 9.1 minutes.
- Burglary accounted for 23.0 percent of the Total Crime Index and 26.0 percent of all Property Index offenses.
- The burglary rate per 100,000 population was 1,128.9 in 1988 compared to 1,111.1 in 1987.
- It is estimated that 70.5 percent of all burglaries involved a residential dwelling and 67.0 percent were accomplished by forcible entry.
- It is estimated that \$55,604,855 in property was stolen in 1988 due to this offense.
- In 1988, 16.0 of every 100 burglaries were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- 6,697 persons were reported arrested for burglary in 1988. Of these, 68.6 percent were adults and 31.4 percent were juveniles.



4.6 THEFT

DEFINITION

Theft is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Attempted thefts also are included. This category includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts or accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., in which no use of force, violence, or fraud occurs. It does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, or worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft also is excluded inasmuch as it is a separate crime index offense. Theft offenses are reported on an incident-by-incident basis.

1988 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- There were 131,774 thefts reported during 1988. It is estimated that a total of 140,510 thefts actually occurred on a statewide basis. Based on this estimate, this was a 4.9 percent increase over 1987.
- It is estimated that one theft occurred every 3.8 minutes.
- Theft accounted for 55.8 percent of the Total Crime Index and 63.0 percent of all Property Index offenses.
- The theft rate per 100,000 population in 1988 was 2,734.2 compared to 2,625.1 in 1987.
- It is estimated that 43.3 percent of all thefts involved the taking of vehicle parts/accessories or other types of property from a vehicle.
- It is estimated that \$49,542,421 in property was stolen in 1988 due to this offense.
- In 1988, 20.8 of every 100 thefts were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- 25,984 persons were reported arrested for theft in 1988. Of these, 72.5 percent were adults and 27.5 percent were juveniles.



4.7 MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

DEFINITION

Motor vehicle theft is the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. By definition, a motor vehicle is a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. Motor vehicles include automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motor scooters, snowmobiles, etc. Motor vehicle theft offenses are reported on a per vehicle basis.

1988 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- There were 21,557 motor vehicle thefts reported during 1988. It is estimated that a total of 22,351 motor vehicle thefts actually occurred on a statewide basis. Based on this estimate, this was a 2.9 percent increase over 1987.
- It is estimated that one motor vehicle theft occurred every 23.6 minutes.
- Motor vehicle theft accounted for 8.9 percent of the Total Crime Index and 10.0 percent of all Property Index offenses.
- The motor vehicle theft rate per 100,000 population was 434.9 in 1988 compared to 425.7 in 1987.
- Of vehicles stolen in 1988, it is estimated that 79.1 percent were recovered.
- It is estimated that the cost of vehicles stolen in 1988 was \$110,519,437.
- In 1988, 15.3 of every 100 motor vehicle thefts were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- 2,556 persons were reported arrested for motor vehicle theft in 1988. Of these, 56.3 percent were adults and 43.7 percent were juveniles.



4.8 ARSON

DEFINITION

Arson is defined by the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded. Arson offenses are reported on an incident-by-incident basis.

1988 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- There were 2,180 arsons reported during 1988. It is estimated that a total of 2,323 arsons actually occurred on a statewide basis. Based on this estimate, this was a 14.0 percent increase over 1987.
- It is estimated that one arson occurred every 3.8 hours.
- Arsons accounted for 0.9 percent of the Total Crime Index and 1.0 percent of all Property Index offenses.
- The arson rate per 100,000 population in 1988 was 45.2 compared to 39.9 in 1987.
- Residential dwellings accounted for an estimated 44.9 percent of all types of property destroyed by arson. Motor vehicles accounted for an estimated 21.9 percent.
- It is estimated that arson accounted for \$24,971,716 in property loss in 1988.
- In 1988, 27.6 of every 100 arsons were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- 381 persons were reported arrested for arson in 1988. Of these, 62.2 percent were adults and 37.8 percent were juveniles.



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GLOSSARY

ADULT: A person 18 years of age or older.

ARREST: Taking into physical or other legal custody for committing an offense in the local reporting jurisdiction. Arrests for all criminal offenses are scored. Arrests for ordinance violations are included. Arrests for traffic offenses, with the exception of driving under the influence of intoxicants and arrests in connection with negligent manslaughter in traffic accidents, are not scored. Included are those persons arrested but released without being formally charged.

CLEARANCE: The resolution of a criminal offense by the arrest, charging, and turning over to the court for prosecution one or more persons alleged to have committed a crime. An offense also can be cleared by exceptional means when the law enforcement agency has: 1) established the identity of the offender, 2) has enough information to support an arrest, charge, and prosecution in court, 3) the exact location of the offender is known so that he/she could be taken into custody, and 4) there is some reason outside law enforcement control that precludes arresting, charging, and prosecuting the offender, (Ex., offender dies).

CLEARED OFFENSES ONLY JUVENILES: The number of clearances for an offense in which only juveniles were arrested or were identified as the offender but for some valid reason could not be arrested divided by the total number of clearances for that offense expressed as a percentage. The formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Offenses Cleared Involving Only Juveniles}}{\text{Number of Clearances}} \times 100$$

CLEARANCE RATES: The number of clearances divided by the total number of offenses, expressed as a percentage. The formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Clearances}}{\text{Number of Offenses}} \times 100$$

CRIME INDEX: The Crime Index is the sum of the eight major offenses used to indicate the occurrence of crime in the United States. They were selected because of their frequency of occurrence and because they are most likely to be reported to a law enforcement agency. The eight offenses are: murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The first four make up the Violent Crime Index and the last four make up the Property Crime Index. Definitions of each of the offenses making up the Crime Index are provided in the section entitled "Missouri Detail Crime Index Analysis". In addition, refer to Crime Index Offense in this section for an explanation of how each type of offense is reported to the UCR Program.

CRIME INDEX OFFENSE: In the UCR Program, the offenses of murder, forcible rape, and aggravated assault are crimes against persons. For these crimes, one offense is counted for each victim. Robbery, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson are crimes against property. For these crimes, with the exception of motor vehicle theft, one offense is counted for each distinct operation. In the case of motor vehicle theft, one offense is counted for each stolen vehicle.

CRIME INDEX OFFENSE ESTIMATES: Estimation routines were used in the Digest to identify the actual number of index crimes that occurred in the State on an annual basis. They are designed to compensate for non-reporting and incomplete reporting of such offenses by Missouri law enforcement agencies. The following procedures and formulas were used to obtain statewide crime index offense estimates:

- Law enforcement agencies in the State of Missouri were categorized into Groups. The following categories were used:

Municipal agency - 250,000 and over
 Municipal agency - population 100,000 - 249,999
 Municipal agency - population 50,000 - 99,999
 Municipal agency - population 25,000 - 49,999
 Municipal agency - population 10,000 - 24,999
 Municipal agency - population 2,500 - 9,999
 Municipal agency - population under 2,500
 Rural Sheriff's Department
 Suburban Sheriff's Department and County Police

- For those law enforcement agencies within a group that reported six months or more, a yearly estimate of their crime index offenses was obtained using the following formula:

$$\frac{\text{Crime Index Offenses Reported}}{\text{No. of Months Reported}} \times 12 = \text{Yearly Crime Index Offenses}$$

- For each group, the yearly crime index offenses for all law enforcement agencies reporting six months or more and their jurisdiction's population were summed and the following group crime index rate was computed.

$$\frac{\text{Sum of Rpt. Agency's Yearly Crime Index Offenses}}{\text{Sum of Rpt. Agency's Population}} = \text{Group Crime Index Rate}$$

- For those law enforcement agencies that reported less than six months or no activity at all within a group, their yearly crime index offenses were computed using the following formula:

$$\text{Law Enforcement Agency Population} \times \text{Group Crime Index Rate} = \text{Yearly Crime Index Offenses}$$

- Yearly crime index offenses computed above for all Missouri law enforcement agencies were then summed in order to obtain a statewide yearly crime index offense estimate for use in this Digest.

No estimation routines were used in data displays that identify specific law enforcement agency's yearly crime activity in the Digest. In these data displays, only crime activity that was reported into the UCR Program is displayed.

JUVENILE: A person under 18 years of age.

JUVENILE ARREST: Juvenile arrests do not include law enforcement contacts with juveniles where no offense has been committed. Juveniles taken into custody for their own protection, such as in neglect cases, are not scored since they have not committed any crime.

PERCENT CHANGE: The formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Value in Current Period} - \text{Value in Base Period}}{\text{Value in Base Period}} \times 100$$

POPULATION: The total number of persons residing in a jurisdiction based on United States Census data.

QUARTILE: The value that marks the boundary between two consecutive intervals in a frequency distribution of four intervals with each containing one quarter of the total population.

RATE PER 100,000 POPULATION: Rates per 100,000 population are indicators of activity standardized by the population of those law enforcement agencies associated with the activity. Three types of rates are provided: statewide crime index offense rates, reporting agency crime index offense rates, and arrest rates.

The statewide offense rate formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Estimated Offenses Reported} \times 100,000}{\text{Population of all Agencies Used in Estimate}}$$

The reporting agency offense rate formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Offenses Reported} \times 100,000}{\text{Population of Reporting Agency(ies)}}$$

The arrest rate formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Arrests Reported} \times 100,000}{\text{Population of Reporting Agency(ies)}}$$

STRONG ARMED ROBBERY: A robbery wherein no weapons were used but tactics (limited to the use of personal weapons such as hands, arms, feet, fists, teeth, etc.) were employed to deprive the victim of his/her property.

TIME SERIES: Time-series analysis was used in the Digest to forecast future crime and arrest activity. With this technique, data for past periods were used as the basis for projecting levels of future activity. Ten years of past data normally were used to make these projections.

Crime and arrest rates on a per 100,000 population basis were used in making the forecasts. These rates reflect crime and arrest activity in relation to population.

The technique used to project crime and arrest activity was Exponential Smoothing (available through the SAS Econometrics and Time Series software package). Use of this technique took into consideration the limited number of data points in the time series, as well as whether or not the time series was best characterized as constant, linear, or non-linear. In applying the smoothing technique, greater weight was given to the more recent data values than to the earlier data values when projecting future levels of activity.
