Arrests of Juveniles In Wisconsin, 1980-1989

With Correctional Institution Admissions

INTRODUCTION

This publication summarizes data on juvenile arrests in Wisconsin over the past ten years, and also includes data on admissions to correctional institutions.

During the past ten years there has been an average of 87,659 juvenile arrests each year in Wisconsin. In 1989, juvenile arrests accounted for over 26 percent of all arrests made in the state.

The information presented in this publication has been obtained from <u>Crime and Arrests in Wisconsin</u>, published annually by the Wisconsin Office of Justice

Assistance, and from <u>Admissions to Juvenile Institutions</u>, published by the Wisconsin Division of Corrections (now the Department of Corrections).

This flyer consists of six major sections. In addition, two tables are also presented for reference purposes. One contains juvenile arrest data for Milwaukee County and the other for the entire state.

It should be noted that the arrest figures presented are estimates based on approximately 98 percent of the actual number of reported arrests.

GENERAL ARREST TRENDS


Total Arrests

Graph 1 shows the total number of juveniles arrested in Wisconsin over the past ten years. Adult arrests are included for purposes of comparison. While the number of adult arrests has steadily risen during the last ten years, the number of juvenile arrests has remained relatively stable. The total number of juvenile arrests increased less than six percent from 88,175 in 1980 to 93,516 in 1989. In contrast, adult arrests rose 66 percent from 157,726 in 1980 to 261,655 in 1989.


Arrest Rates

Graph 2 shows the arrest rates for both juveniles and adults in Wisconsin during the ten year period. The arrest rate is the number of arrests per 100,000 residents. Arrest rates are used to control the effect of varying populations from year to year, permitting the examination of arrests on equal population bases. The juvenile arrest rate increased steadily from 1981 through 1986, decreased in 1987, and increased through 1989. The adult arrest rate, however, continually increased through 1989, surpassing the juvenile arrest rate in 1989.

INDEX CRIME ARREST TRENDS

Index Offense Arrests

Graph 3 shows the number of arrests for Index Offenses. Again, adults are shown for comparison. Index Offenses are considered to be an "index" of crime, that is, representative of the overall crime picture. Index Offenses are divided into two categories, violent Index Offenses and property Index Offenses. Violent Index Offenses are murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault. Property Index Offenses are theft, burglary, motor vehicle theft and arson.


While juvenile arrests for Index Offenses remained relatively stable, adult arrests increased during the ten year period. Specifically, juvenile Index Offense arrests increased by about one percent from 27,052 in 1980 to 27,432 in 1989, while adult Index Offense arrests increased by 46 percent from 24,232 in 1980 to 35,334 in 1989.


Tables one and two in this flyer consist of two reference tables containing data on the number of juvenile arrests and arrest rates in Wisconsin and Milwaukee County respectively. Milwaukee County data are presented separately due to the high population density in the county and also because arrest rates in Milwaukee County differ considerably from the rest of the state. Note, however, that Milwaukee County data are also included in the table of statewide data.

Geographic Distribution of Index Offense Arrest Rates

The map of Wisconsin at right categorizes counties according to their 1989 juvenile arrest rates for Index Offenses. In general, the highest arrest rates were found in urban counties, although some rural counties had fairly high rates. This characteristic of arrest rates, that is, rates rising with increasing populations, is similar to that of many other reported offenses, for example, aggravated assault and robbery.

Index Crime Arrests Versus All Other Arrests

Graph 4 shows the total number of juvenile arrests in Wisconsin for Index Offenses and for all other offenses during the past ten years. In 1989, Index Offense arrests accounted for approximately 29 percent of all juvenile arrests. Remaining relatively stable, the total number of juvenile arrests for Index Offenses increased about one percent, as previously indicated. However, juvenile arrests for all other offenses increased over eight percent during the same period.

Index Crime Arrest Rates Versus All Other Arrest Rates


Graph 5 shows the juvenile arrest rates in Wisconsin for Index Offenses and for all other offenses during the past ten years. Graphs 6 and 7 were created to illustrate how Milwaukee County differs from the rest of the state.

For the entire state, juvenile arrest rates for Index Offenses have increased about two percent from 2,042 arrests per 100,000 juveniles in 1980 to 2,087 in 1989. The arrest rate for all other offenses increased about nine percent during the same period, from 4,615 arrests per 100,000 juveniles in 1980 to 5.031 in 1989.


The arrest rates in Milwaukee

County, while considerably higher than the arrest rates for the state as a


Graph 4: Wisconsin Juvenile Arrests by Offense Type




Graph 5: Juvenile Arrest Rates by Offense Type Wisconsin



whole, (note different scale values on graphs) showed a different pattern during the ten year period. Index Offense arrest rates in Milwaukee County decreased almost nine percent from 3,112 arrests per 100,000 juveniles in 1980 to 2,847 in 1989. In addition, arrest rates for all other offenses decreased about one percent from 6,660 arrests per 100,000 juveniles in 1980 to 6,604 in 1989. For the balance of the state, arrests for Index Offenses and all other offenses increased during the ten year period.

Violent and Property Arrests

Graph 8 shows the number of juvenile arrests in the state for virglent Index Offenses (murder, for ble rape, robbery, and aggravated assault) and for property Index Offenses (burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson). While the number of juvenile arrests for violent offenses increased 20 percent from 1,197 in 1980 to 1,432 in 1989, the number of arrests for property offenses increased only one percent from 25,855 in 1980 to 25,991 in 1989.


DISTRIBUTION OF ARRESTS

Distribution of 1989 Arrests

Graph 9 shows the distribution of arrests for Wisconsin juveniles in 1989 for four types of offenses: Violent Index Offenses; Property Index Offenses; status; that is, liquor law violations, curfew violations, and runaways; and all other offenses. Two percent of arrests were for violent offenses. To better understand the distribution of arrests, two additional pie charts have been created, one showing the distribution of arrests for Milwaukee County and one showing the distribution for the balance of the state.

While a greater proportion of juvenile arrests in Milwaukee County were for violent offenses, Milwaukee County had proportionately fewer arrests for status violations and property offenses with more arrests for "all other" offenses.

Graph 9: Distribution of 1989 Wisconsin Juvenile Arrests





Arrest Information For Select Counties

Table 3 presents juvenile arrest data for other selected counties in Wisconsin from 1985 through 1989. Shown are the number of arrests for Index Offenses, other criminal offenses, and status offenses. Brown County experienced a rather substantial decrease in total juvenile arrests during the

five year period, in which all categories decreased in arrests. However, arrests in the other counties in Table 3 decreased only slightly, with the exception of Racine County which increased by 14 percent. In addition, all counties shown in the table except Racine County experienced a decrease in the number of juvenile Index Offense arrests.



JUVENILE ADMISSIONS TO CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

Total Admissions


Graph 12 shows the total number of admissions to Wisconsin Juvenile Correctional Institutions from 1980 through 1988. Total admissions decreased 7 percent during the nine year period. While there are no data available prior to 1983 on admissions regarding prior juvenile correctional institution experience, from 1983 through 1986 the number of juvenile admissions with prior correctional experience remained relatively stable. However, in 1988 the number increased 37 percent over 1986, from 159 to 218.

Violent Admissions

Graph 13 shows the number of admissions into Wisconsin Juvenile Correctional Institutions for viole offenses from 1980 through 1988. For purposes of this graph, violent admissions are defined as all degrees of murder and sexual assault, aggravated assaults, all robberies, and armed burglaries. The number of violent admissions increased over 350 percent from 1980 to 1985, then decreased sharply, decreasing 48 percent from 1985 to 1988.

SUMMARY

The total number of juvenile arrests in Wisconsin have remained relatively stable over the past ten years. However, the juvenile arrest rate increased steadily from 1982 through 1986, before decreasing in 1987. During the ten year period, the number of juvenile arrests for Index Offenses increased a little more than one percent. Index Offense arrest rates for Wisconsin juveniles increased over two percent from 1980 to 1989. Milwaukee County experienced decreases in arrests and arrest rates, but the arrest rates were higher in Milwaukee County than the rest of the state. Ninety-five percent of the juvenile arrests for Index Offenses made in Wisconsin were for property crimes. Arrests for property offenses increased slightly during the ten year period while the number of arrests made for violent offenses increased substantially. Milwaukee County had a slightly higher proportion of juvenile arrests for violent offenses than did the rest of Wisconsin.

The total number of juveniles admitted into Wisconsin correctional institutions decreased by approximately 7 percent from 1980 to 1988. However, the proportion of those admitted with previous experience in correctional institutions increased 37 percent since 1986. Admissions of juveniles for violent crimes increased steadily from

1980 through 1985, but decreased in 1986, decreasing 48 percent from 1985 to 1988.
