Acknowledgement

Dedication

We are aware that numerous rapes occur that are not reported to law enforcement. This report is dedicated to rape victims who had the courage to report these offenses, and to all law enforcement officers endeavoring to uphold the laws and serve the people of Arkansas.

Definitions of Rape

The definition of rape in Arkansas, according to Arkansas Code 5-14-103 as amended is:

A person commits rape if he engages in sexual intercourse or deviate sexual activity with another person:

- (a) by forcible compulsion; or
- (b) who is incapable of consent because he is physically helpless; or
- (c) who is less than fourteen (14) years of age. It is an affirmative defense to prosecution under this Section that the actor was not more than two (2) years older than the victim. Rape is a class Y felony.

The definition of forcible rape in the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program is:

Forcible rape is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults to commit forcible rape are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) is not counted in this category.

There is a wide disparity between these two definitions. This report utilizes the Uniform Crime Reporting definition of rape. The report includes all data collected, with the cooperation of law enforcement agencies from their offense reports, as reported to the Arkansas Crime Information Center in the UCR Program.

Throughout this report, except where noted, rape and attempted rape are combined for statistical purposes.

Rape in Arkansas 1991

There were 1,052 rapes and attempted rapes in Arkansas reported through the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Of these, 903 were rapes and 149 were attempted rapes reported by law enforcement agencies. This is an increase of 4% over 1990, and is 54% higher than five years ago.




Over one-third of the rapes were committed on Friday or Saturday.

Victims of Rape

There were more white victims of rape than black victims in 1991, while there were almost the same number of black and white victims in 1990.

The age distribution for victims has remained very constant over the past five years. Thirty-nine percent were younger than eighteen years old and two of every three victims were younger than 25. The youngest victim was less than a year old and the oldest 92.

Victim-Offender Race Relationship

The first race listed is the race of the *victim*, and the second race is that of the *offender(s)*. For example: *white/black* means that the victim was white and the offender was black (1 or more). For offenses in which race is known, 85% of the rapes were between members of the same race.

Rapes Involving Family Members

Where the offender was known to the victim 20% of the rapes involved family members. Where the offender was a family member, 42 victims (39%) were age 10 or younger, and 82 victims (56%) were less than 15 years of age.

Rape Reporting Time Lapse

Where time lapse was known 41% of the rapes were reported to law enforcement agencies within four hours of the commission of the offense. In 1990, 56% were reported within four hours.

In 9% of the offenses, the time lapse was unknown or could not be used because more than one rape occurred over a time period of a month or more.
