# DOCKET OF THE OREGON SUPREME COURT 1973

Since 1970, the first full year of operation by the Court of Appeals, the number of appeals filed with the Supreme Court has remained fairly constant, about 350. The number of appeals pending has decreased each year since 1970, showing that more appeals have been terminated than have been filed. At the end of 1973 only 217 appeals were pending; this is the lowest number of appeals pending since 1955. Since 1970 about 380 appeals per year have been terminated with about 240 being terminated each year by decision with a written opinion. The average number of opinions per justice for those years has been about 34.

While the establishment of the Court of Appeals drastically cut the number of appeals that the Supreme Court had to decide, it added another function for the Court — the consideration of petitions for review from the Court of Appeals. This now occupies a substantial amount of the judicial time of the Supreme Court. In 1973, 206 petitions for review were filed. Petitions were filed in about one-third of the cases decided by the Court of Appeals.

The percentage of petitions for review granted has remained about the same, about 9 percent. In 1973, about half of the decisions of the Court of Appeals for which petitions for review were granted were affirmed.

The time it takes to process an appeal in the Supreme Court has also been decreased. Average elapsed time from filing notice of appeal to the Supreme Court to court decision has been reduced from 468 days in 1970 to 344 days in 1973. A major portion of this time is required in preparation of the record and the briefs to bring the case to issue. For the most part this is accomplished by the court reporter, the county clerk's staff and the attorneys. By close communication with these persons and by withholding extensions of time except in cases of genuine need, this portion of appeal time has been reduced about 40 days over the last three years. The portion of the appeal process which is completely within the control of the Supreme Court, docketing, hearing, considering and deciding, has been reduced 124 days within this time. The Supreme Court hears oral argument in a case within one or two months after it is at issue and ready for argument.

The statistics show that the docket of the Supreme Court is in excellent condition. What of the future? When the Court of Appeals was established in 1969 many believed that eventually all appeals would go to the Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court would be limited to cases taken on review from the Court of Appeals. These statistics show at least for the near future this is not necessarily required. On the other hand, it is doubtful that the Supreme Court can continue to maintain the same degree of currency in its docket. The circuit courts tried 1,000 more cases in 1973 than they did in 1970. The ratio of cases appealed to cases tried increases each year. Appeals to the Court of Appeals have risen approximately 11 percent each year. All these facts inevitably will cause the Supreme Court to be faced with an ever-increasing workload.





The above table and graph show that over one-half of the time required to appeal a case to the Supreme Court is devoted to the preparation and filing of the transcript of testimony, the preparation and filing of the briefs, and the other details necessary to get the case at issue and ready for hearing. This work is done by counsel for the parties, and the court seeks to prevent any undue delay by the attorneys in preparing appeals for hearing. The court is primarily concerned with hearing and deciding the cases after they are at issue.

#### DOCKET OF THE OREGON COURT OF APPEALS

1973

#### CASES FILED

The caseload of the Oregon Court of Appeals has increased at an annual average rate of eleven percent since its creation in 1969. This rapid growth rate required the addition of a sixth judge to that court in 1973. This additional position was much needed to maintain a ratio of case terminations that would keep pace with filings. The Court of Appeals maintained this balance and finished the year with only 21 more cases pending than at the end of 1972.

The jurisdiction of the Court of Appeals provides for a diverse caseload. In 1973 there were 195 civil cases filed, 470 criminal cases, 44 post-conviction relief cases, 93 appeals on administrative matters from government agencies, and 44 cases involving workmen's compensation claims. It is an important characteristic of the Court of Appeals' caseload that over half of the cases filed are appeals on criminal matters. There were 1,678 criminal cases tried in the circuit courts in 1973. While there is no way here to correlate the criminal cases tried to the cases appealed during the year, it is worthy of notice that the appeal rate for 1973 was 28 percent of the trial rate.

#### CASES TERMINATED

To keep pace with its rapidly growing caseload, the Oregon Court of Appeals has developed some alternative means for disposing of cases on the merits without having to write a full written opinion on each case.

In many situations the Court of Appeals issues bench decisions. These decisions are, as the name implies, issued from the bench orally at the time the case is argued. The Court of Appeals also issues memorandum opinions. These opinions are brief and generally only cite a controlling case that decides the issue and gives the decision of the court to affirm or reverse the case.

In 1973 there were 349 full written opinions authored by individual members of the court, 44 per curiam opinions authored by the court as a whole, 154 decisions issued from the bench, 13 memorandum decisions, and 34 cases closed by consolidation with other cases. The total number of decisions on the merits issued, broken down to a per-judge basis, yields 113 decisions per judge.

#### **AVERAGE TIME FRAMES, 1973**

The Court of Appeals has managed its burgeoning caseload largely due to the administrative efficiency in processing cases through the system. Cases are set on the docket at the earliest possible moment and continuances of filing dates for transcripts or briefs are discouraged. This policy of strict caseflow management has resulted in a low average time of 137 days from filing to at-issue. The use of bench and memorandum opinions has lowered the average elapsed days from at-issue to decision to a low 39 days. This average of 176 days is made up of both civil and criminal cases. The average elapsed time from filing to decision in criminal cases is 139 days and in civil cases is 233 days. This type of efficiency helps keep the court's docket current and its pending caseload small.

#### THE OREGON TAX COURT

#### 1973

The caseload of the Oregon Tax Court fluctuates from year to year. Since the inception of the court in 1962 through 1973, there have been 915 Small Claims Divisions cases filed and 845 Regular Division cases filed. The growth pattern is slow but steady. This is probably due to the fact that the Tax Court has specialized jurisdiction. The Tax Court's cases are either appeals from the county boards of equalization [in the case of Small Claims property tax cases] or appeals from decisions of the Oregon Department of Revenue. The caseload is regulated somewhat by the number of appeals before the Department of Revenue and whether or not the taxpayers are satisfied with the administrative ruling.

#### CASES FILED

During 1973 total filings in the circuit courts increased from 41,540 cases to 44,943 cases. The difference of 3,403 cases represents an increase of eight percent over the 1972 filings. The annual average rate of increase for the last five years [1968-1972] has been only about 3.3 percent per year. Calculating the large 1973 increase into the rate for the last five years gives a six-year average increase of four percent per year. We may anticipate that the average rate will continue to climb.

The increases in types of cases filed statewide show a seven percent increase in law, divorce and criminal cases. There was a 19 percent increase in equity cases statewide. Of the total number of cases filed, 26 percent were law cases, 9.6 percent were equity cases, 39.4 percent were divorce cases, and 25 percent were criminal cases.

#### CASES TERMINATED

In the face of the high increase in cases filed it is good to be able to report an equal case termination rate of eight percent. This again represents a significant increase over the average rate of increase for terminations over the previous five-year period [1968-1972] of 3.7 percent per year.

There was a total of 5,515 cases terminated by trial during 1973. This represents 12.6 percent of the total number of cases filed in the circuit court. The number of trials in criminal cases was 15 percent of the total number of cases filed. 55 percent of the criminal cases tried were tried to a jury. In civil cases the proportion of trials to filings was 11.4 percent. (28 percent of the civil cases were tried to a jury.) This breaks down to 16 percent of the law and equity cases filed and seven percent of the dissolution of marriage cases filed. From the relatively small percent of dissolution cases terminated by trial we may assume that many of these are being disposed of under the no-fault divorce provisions.

#### CASES PENDING

The percentage of civil cases pending over two years continues to drop in Oregon's circuit courts while caseloads and the level of pending cases continues to grow. This indicates the efficiency of the circuit courts in getting out the older civil cases. The rise in pending cases does not reflect old cases, but new cases overflowing from increased filings and dockets too crowded to accommodate them. The short-run solution to this problem is the assignment of temporary judicial help to the districts. The long-run solution is the creation of additional judicial positions.

#### TEMPORARY JUDICIAL HELP

During 1973 only four judicial districts gave more help to other districts than they received. The remainder received more temporary help than they gave. If all of the days of help

received by the circuit courts are added together and the days of help given by regular circuit court judges to other districts subtracted, there is a balance of 694.5 days of help received by the circuit courts. This help came from sources other than 63.5 regular circuit judges on the bench in 1973. Calculating this number of days of temporary help into regular judge years [694.5/252], it is seen that in 1973 there were an additional 2.75 fulltime circuit judges in Oregon. This additional level of assistance means that in 1973 there were 66.25 fulltime circuit judges in Oregon. Given this level of judicial help, and, given the high increase in cases filed and the resulting growth of cases pending, there is a definite need for the continued creation of judicial positions to handle the growing workload of the circuit courts.

It should be pointed out that of the 694.5 days of help received by the circuit courts, 580 [84 percent] of those days were received by four counties: Washington County, 67 days [10 percent]; Marion County, 138 days [20 percent]; Lane County, 149.5 days [21.5 percent]; and, Multnoman County, 226 days [32.5 percent]. These counties occupy the population center of the state and presumably receive the greatest portion of new filings. Looking at the statistics for number of filings per judge in 1973, the Second [Lane], Third [Marion], Fourth [Multnomah], and Twentieth [Washington] Districts all experienced a high rate of filings per judge. However, the Sixteenth District [Douglas] experienced the highest filing rate per judge of all districts and yet received a balance of only 13 days of help in 1973. Also, the Fifth [Clackamas], Eleventh [Gilliam, Grant, Crook, Deschutes, Jefferson, Wheeler], and Fifteenth [Coos, Curry] Districts experienced high filing rates and yet received a minimum of judicial help in 1973.

#### **DECEDENTS' ESTATES**

At the end of 1973 there were 7,665 decedents' estates pending in the circuit, district and county courts. This is 115 fewer cases than were pending at the end of 1972. This continues a long-run trend of a declining number of decedents' estates pending at the end of each year. The average rate of decline has been about 3.4 percent over the last five years. This rate of decline almost equals the average increase in regular cases filed experienced by the circuit courts over the same five year period [4 percent, 1969-1973].

The decreasing number of probate cases pending has been accompanied by a steady decrease in the number of estates pending over three years. The actual number of cases pending over three years has been declining at about ten percent per year for the last five years. This decline of the actual number of cases pending over three years, and of the total number of cases pending, results in a steady decline in the percentage of cases pending over three years. Probates reaching disposition are not being fully replaced by new filings.

Therefore, continued effort to reduce the probate backlog should yield in the long run more time for judges and staff to spend on other judicial matters. The disposition of old decedents' estates should receive high priority in any county having more than 20 percent of the cases pending over three years. The time spent clearing these old cases from the docket will allow more time for other judicial matters in the future and clear up a cloud in Oregon's otherwise highly efficient court system.





#### THE DISTRICT COURTS, 1973

#### CASES FILED

The 384,131 cases filed in the district courts in 1973 represents an increase in cases filed over 1972 of 19,313 cases. This is a five percent increase over the one year period. This growth includes one new district court in Columbia County and the 6,017 cases filed in it in 1973. The average rate of growth of district court filings has been about six percent over the past five years, not including cases transferred to Multnomah County from the Portland Municipal Court in 1972.

The proportion of cases filed by category of case is as follows: Traffic 75 percent, misdemeanors six percent, felonies two percent, civil eight percent, small claims nine percent. During 1973 traffic cases increased 16,473 cases [six percent]; misdemeanor filings decreased 1,790 cases [a seven percent decrease]; felonies increased 361 cases [six percent]; civil cases increased 953 cases [three percent] and small claims cases increased 3,316 cases [eleven percent].

Most district courts experienced some increase in cases filed. The greatest increase in filings occurred in Marion County where the caseload grew 9,506 cases, 42 percent. However, there were some decreases in filings in several counties. Multnomah County experienced a twelve percent decrease in total cases filed over its 1972 level. Klamath County showed a 1,216 case decrease in filings, but still has the second highest number of cases filed and terminated per judge for the district courts. Wasco County has had a 44 percent decrease in cases filed, primarily due to a 49 percent decrease in traffic filings in 1973. Clatsop, Hood River and Polk counties also experienced small declines in filings in 1973.

Over-all the number of cases filed per district court judge increased in 1973. There were 9,354 cases filed per judge in 1972 and 9,603 cases filed per judge in 1973.

#### CASES TERMINATED

During 1973 the district courts terminated 380,884 cases, an increase of five percent over the one year period. This growth in case terminations means that less than one percent of the increase in case filings ended up in the pending case category at the end of 1973.

The proportion of cases terminated by category of cases is as follows: traffic 75 percent, misdemeanors six percent, felonies two percent, civil cases eight percent and small claims cases 9 percent. During 1973 traffic case terminations increased 14,259 cases [five percent], misdemeanors 1,691 cases [eight percent], felonies 532 cases [eight percent], civil 239 cases [one percent], and small claims 3,247 [19 percent].

Again, most district courts show increased case terminations for 1973. Marion County, with its high rate of filing has a termination increase of 50 percent over 1972. Several other courts have increased terminations twenty to thirty percent over the 1972 level. However, some district courts terminated fewer cases in 1973 than in 1972. These decreases in the number of cases terminated occurred in Multnomah, Klamath, Hood River, Lincoln and Wasco counties.

The number of cases terminated per district judge increased in 1973. There were 9,282 cases terminated per district judge in 1972 compared to 9,522 cases terminated per judge in 1973.
