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1985 RELEASES: FIVE YEAR POST RELEASE FOLLOW-UP

The subject of this report is the group of 10,295 inmates released from facilities of the New York State Department of Correctional Services during 1985 and followed for the five year period 1985-1990 to determine the number subsequently returned to prison. This five year post release follow-up indicates that 48.0% returned within the study period including 25.4% committed by the courts for new felony offenses and 22.6% returned for violation of parole. An analysis of selected characteristics include: type of release; commitment offense; sex; age; ethnic group; time to return; drug offenders; time served in prison; returns of second felony offenders; region of commitment; minimum sentence and maximum sentence. Preliminary data on returns from the 1986-1989 annual release cohorts have also been included in this edition. In addition, similar data are also presented for comparable annual release cohorts for the years 1972-1984.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1985 RELEASES: FIVE YEAR POST RELEASE FOLLOW-UP

The subject of this report is a population of 10,295 inmates released for the first time in 1985 from facilities of the New York State Department of Correctional Services. Each case was followed for a period of five years to determine the number returned to Department custody. For purposes of comparison, similar release cohorts for 1972-1984 are also analyzed by rate of return for selected characteristics.

- 1. Out of 10,295 inmates released in 1985, there were 4,944 (48.0%) who returned to custody within five years, 25.4% as new commitments and 22.6% for violation of parole (see Table 2, p.6).
- 2. People released via parole tended to have a lower rate of return (47.9%) than did conditional releases (50.7%) (see Table 1, p.3).
- 3. Of the 4,944 returned, the largest portion (58.6%) were returned within 24 months (see Table 3, p.9).
- 4. Among 8,467 offenders released via parole, 23.3% were returned for new felony convictions while 24.5% were returned for violation of parole. Among conditional releases, 33.0% were returned for new felonies while 17.7% were returned for parole violation (see Table 2, p.6).
- 5. Women had a much lower rate of return at 31.0% than did males at 48.8%. The proportion of women returned for new felonies at 13.0% was substantially below the proportion of males returned for new felonies at 25.9% (see Table 5, p.13).
- 6. Offenses with higher than average rates of return included: robbery (all degrees); burglary (all degrees); stolen property and Youthful Offenders. Among offenses with return rates below the average were murder; homicide (all); assault (all degrees); sex crimes; arson (all degrees); forgery; drugs; and other felonies (see Table 6, p.14).
- 7. Crimes of robbery were the most frequent felony offenses for which members of the 1985 release population were re-committed to DOCS custody. There were 624 robbery commitments or 23.9% of those returned to DOCS for new felonies. Burglary offenses had the second highest frequency at 605 or 23.2% followed by drug felonies at 582 (22.3%); dangerous weapons at 162 (6.2%); grand larceny at 102 (3.9%); and crimes of homicide at 96 (3.7%). No other crimes accounted for more than three percent (see Table 8, p.18).

- 8. Inmates who were younger at time of release had higher return rates. Of those under 21 years of age, 60.6% returned to custody within five years while 46.5% of those 21 and over returned (see Table 11, p.27).
- 9. There was some difference in the return rates between ethnic groups. Offenders of Hispanic birth or parentage returned at a rate of 55.0% while black offenders returned at a rate of 53.4% and whites returned at 32.3% (see Table 12, p.29).
- 10. People who had been sentenced as predicate felons had a substantially higher rate of return at 52.7% than did first felony offenders at 44.9% (see Table 13, p.30).
- 11. There appeared to be no clear relationship between time served in prison and rate of return to prison (see Table 14, p.33).
- 12. The largest portion of the study population had been originally committed from New York City. The highest rate of return was for New York City commitments at 52.2% while upstate cases returned at a rate of 37.7% and Suburban New York City cases returned at a rate of 40.5% (see Table 15, p.34).
- 13. Among offenders returned for new felonies, the proportion returned for drug crimes has risen from 8.0% in 1978 to 22.3% in 1985 (see Table 10, p.20).


1985 RELEASES: FIVE YEAR POST RELEASE FOLLOW-UP

A total of 14,198 inmates were released from facilities of the Department of Correctional Services (DOCS) during calendar year From this total a study population of 10,295 inmates was selected that included 9,896 first releases to parole supervision (8,467 via parole and 1,429 via conditional release) and 399 persons discharged upon maximum expiration of sentence as their initial release during 1985. Excluded are a total of 3,903 releases which consist of: 2,466 released to parole supervision who had been previously released to parole supervision and subsequently returned to custody as violators; 87 released by court order; 170 absconders from temporary release: 11 escapes; 163 deaths; 728 transfers to other agencies; 263 other releases; and 15 maximum expiration of sentence cases who had already been released to parole supervision before and returned as violators during 1985.

The purpose of this report is to provide information on annual cohorts of inmates released from DOCS facilities as well as the proportion and characteristics of these offenders subsequently returned to facility custody within five years of This methodology is utilized by many criminal justice agencies in studies of recidivism including the United States Department of Justice. This study does not attempt to determine whether an offender who leaves prison via parole or conditional release is under parole supervision at the time that the offender is returned to prison. Therefore, assumptions should not be made from this study as to the effectiveness of parole supervision. DOCS and the Division of Parole are presently coordinating the development of a shared data base on our mainframe computer. information will eventually allow the application of data relevant to the period of parole supervision to be added to these analyses. We will then be able to determine which returns are made while the offender is still under parole supervision as well as learn more about the relationship between length of supervision and return to prison.

Each case in the study group is followed up for a period of five years from date of release to ascertain if a return to DOCS custody occurred. Of the study group, 5,351 or 52.0% did not return to custody during the follow-up period. The remaining 4,944 (48.0%) were returned to a DOCS facility at least once during the follow-up period.

RETURNS TO CUSTODY BY RELEASE TYPE Three types of release are included in the 10,295 study cohort of inmates released during 1985. The largest group is composed of 8,467 inmates who were released at the discretion of the Board of Parole. The next largest group were conditional releases (CR's). These 1,429 inmates were released to parole supervision after serving two-thirds of their maximum sentence. The third release group includes 399 inmates released upon maximum expiration (ME) of their sentence.

The highest rate of return was registered by the CR group with 50.7% or 725 returned during the five years subsequent to release. The proportion of returns among parolees was 47.9% or 4,054 returns. While discharges upon maximum expiration of sentence registered an apparent rate of return of 41.4% it must be noted that the ME group is not subject to the conditions of parole or post release supervision and may be returned to DOCS only on commitment by the courts following conviction for a felony offense.

Over the 14-year period 1972-1985, there was an initial decline in the volume of releases which fell from 5,593 in 1972 to 5,222 in 1974. Subsequent years with the exception of 1978 and 1981 registered annual incremental growth with a high of 10,295 reached in 1985. Parole releases started at 3,582 in 1972, initially increased to 3,788 persons in 1973, in contrast to ME's which dropped from 979 to 561. In subsequent years paroles have generally increased, reaching a high of 8,467 in 1985. ME's did not share in this increase falling to 328 in 1979 and then rising to 572 in 1981. Conditional releases increased from 1,032 in 1972 to a high of 2,194 in 1980.

The overall rate of return for the 14 release cohorts varied by 14.4% from a low rate of return of 33.6% in 1972 to a high of 48.0% in 1985. The highest rates of return for the parole and conditional release groups occurred in 1985 at 47.9% and 50.7% respectively while the highest rate of return for ME's occurred in 1984 at 46.0%.

RETURNS TO CUSTODY: FELONY COMMITMENTS AND PAROLE VIOLATION In New York State, inmates released to parole supervision, either at the discretion of the Board of Parole or by mandatory CR after satisfactory completion of two-thirds of their maximum sentence, are subject to abide by the general rules governing parole for the remaining unexpired portion of their sentence. A serious violation of these rules during the period of supervision may result in the return of the parolee to DOCS' custody as a violator at the discretion of the Board of Parole. Inmates released upon maximum expiration of sentence are not subject to the rules of parole and may not be returned as violators. When an offender commits a new felony subsequent to release, the court must sentence the offender to a new indeterminate term to be served in DOCS custody regardless of prior type of release.

If the reader wishes to compare the rate of return in New York State with return rates of other states, it is critical to understand that many states have adapted a determinate sentencing With determinate sentencing the offender serves the balance of his or her sentence in prison with either no period of parole supervision or only an abbreviated period of parole with a very limited provision for return to prison in the event parole is Under the indeterminate sentence policy of New York violated. State, the offender remains under parole supervision until the maximum expiration of the sentence. It is not unusual for an offender to serve more time on parole than in prison. above, during this period of supervision the offender may be returned to prison, not only for a new felony conviction, but also for violation of the conditions of parole, should the Board of Parole construe such a violation to be a possible threat to public In order to compare return rates between states, only offenders returned for conviction on a new felony charge should be counted. Returns for parole violation should only be compared to states with indeterminate sentencing policies similar to those of New York State.

In the 1985 release cohort there are marked differences between the parole, CR, and ME groups in the reason for return to custody. The parole group had the lowest proportion of those released who were later returned for new felony offenses, 23.3%. An additional 24.5% were returned for violation of parole. proportion of the CR release cohort returned for new felony offenses was somewhat higher at 33.0%, while 17.7% were returned as violators. The maximum expiration of sentence group represents the highest proportion of returns for new felony offenses at 41.1%. No parole violation returns are possible for the ME group. inmates released via maximum expiration of sentence had virtually all been released in prior years to parole supervision and returned to custody as violators. In contrast, the parole and conditional release groups include only original releases upon the sentence being served. Thus, the ME group includes inmates who, for the most part, had previously failed to successfully complete a period of parole supervision and who might reasonably be expected to experience a higher return rate than first releases.



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Among the 14 release cohorts encompassing the period 1972 -1985 there was some change in the proportion of inmates returned as new felony commitments who had been originally released by discretionary parole. The average rate of return of paroles for new commitment was 19.3% ranging from a low of 12.8% in 1972 to a high of 24.7% for the 1983 release cohort. The average rate of return for violation only for persons released by parole was 20.7% ranging from a low of 18.5% for the 1976 release cohort to a high of 24.5% for the 1985 cohort. Among conditional releases the average rate of return for new commitment was 26.4% ranging from a low of 17.0% in 1972 to a high of 33.7% in 1983. Conditional releases returned for violation of parole averaged 19.2% with a low of 15.7% in 1983 to a high of 22.3% in 1976. Among the maximum expiration of sentence cases the average rate of return was 34.6%, all of which were new commitments. The rate of return for maximum expiration of sentence cases increased from a low of 24.4% in 1972 to a high of 46.0% in 1984. (See Appendix Table A, p.45)

RETURNS TO CUSTODY: TIME TO RETURN Among the 1985 releases who returned, the largest portion of offenders returned during the 13th-18th month period subsequent to date of release. The 19th-24th month period accounted for the next largest group of returns. Combined, these two periods accounted for over a third (42.4%) of those returned. Of all returns, 58.6% were back in DOCS custody within 24 months after release. Subsequent periods account for declining portions of the return cohort. The median time between date of release and initial return was 22.2 months.



The pattern of time to return to DOCS custody was somewhat similar for the combined 1972-1985 release cohorts to that of the 1985 cohort. Well over half of those returned (61.4%) were back in prison within 24 months of release. The portion returned in each subsequent six-month period declined following a high in the 7-12 month period. The time to return was longer for the 1985 cohort with a median time of 22.2 months compared to the 20.4 months for the combined 1972-1985 group. Both the parole and CR groups for 1985 shared in this longer median time between release and return while the ME cases for 1985 showed a reduced median time to return.

When considering these time patterns, the reader should be aware that our definition of recidivism, return to DOCS, measures the speed of the system just as much as it measures the length of time it takes for an offender to return to criminal activity.





CHARACTERISTICS OF RELEASE AND RETURN POPULATIONS following section presents selected characteristics of the 1985 study group. Where available, similar data are provided for the total 101,393 offenders released over the 1972-1985 period. selected characteristics include: gender; reason for commitment; age on release; prior adult record; ethnic group; time served in DOCS custody; sentence; drug felons; and region. The reader is cautioned not to automatically assume a causative relationship where certain characteristics exhibit a high correlation with rate of return to custody. The factors which determine return of an individual to prison are numerous and their interaction is often It is hoped that a review of these selected characteristics will, however, identify areas for future in-depth study which will provide greater insight into the overall process by which certain persons are subject to reincarceration while others are able to maintain themselves in a free society.

GENDER The largest portion of the 1985 study population consisted of male inmates (9,872 or 95.9%). This is consistent with the composition of the total inmate population at the close of 1985 where only about 3% were females. The rate of return for females was substantially less than the return rate for men. Of the 423 women in the study population, only 131 or 31.0% returned within the follow-up period while 4,813 or 48.8% of the males returned. The proportion of women returned for new felony offenses at 13.0% was about one-half the rate for males (25.9%). The proportion of women returned for parole violation was also lower than the proportion of male returns, 18.0% compared to 22.8% respectively.

As with the 1985 study group, the combined releases for 1972-1985 was predominated by males, 97,613 compared to 3,780 women. Males returned at nearly twice the rate of females (41.6% compared to 22.2%). As in 1985, males were much more likely to be returned for a new felony offense (22.4%) than were women with a new commitment rate of only 8.5%. It should be noted, however, that the proportion of women returning as new commitments, with the 13.0% reported for the 1985 cohort, was almost four times greater than the low of 3.4% reported in 1973. REASON FOR COMMITMENT The greatest part (97.4%) of the 1985 study population had been originally committed for felony offenses. The remainder, 265 or 2.6% were Youthful Offenders. Table 7 groups commitment offenses into the violent offense and other offense categories as specified in the 1978 New York State legislation which designates certain crimes against persons as violent felony offenses (VFO).

There was some difference in the rate of return between the four major felony groups shown in Table 7. The highest rate of return (51.0%) was registered by the VFO group. The property and other offense group had the next highest rate of return at 48.9% followed by the offenses involving violence and/or coercion group at 41.3%. The lowest return rate among the major felony groups was for drug offenders at 36.6%. The Youthful Offender group had a return rate of 48.3%.

There were marked differences in the rate of return between individual crimes. Among those offenses with higher than average rates of return we find: robbery (all degrees); burglary (all degrees); stolen property and Youthful Offenders. Among offenses with return rates below the average were murder; homicide (all); assault (all degrees); sex crimes; arson (all degrees); forgery; drugs; and other felonies. (See Appendix Table C on page 47 for aggregate data for the 1978-1985 release cohorts).

For the 14 annual release cohorts of the 1972-1985 period, offenses have been grouped into 11 or the larger generic felony categories plus Youthful Offenders. (See Table 7 on page 17 and Appendix Table D on page 48). The average rate of return for these 14 release cohorts, by offense category, from lowest to highest rate of return, is as follows: releases in the murder category returned at a rate of 23.4%; manslaughter at 25.8%; drugs at 26.0%; other sex offenses and assault at 32.3%; dangerous weapons offenses at 33.8%; other felonies at 37.2%; rape at 38.6%; grand larceny a 40.1%; forgery at 40.9%; robbery at 47.3% and burglary at 52.4%. The return rate for Youthful Offenders was 46.1%.

Over the 1972-1985 period the rate of return increased by 14.4% from 33.6% in 1972 to 48.0% in 1985. The four offense categories with the greatest change in rate of return include: rape up 26.3%; murder and dangerous weapons up 17.7% and robbery up 16.9%.

CHART 6 1972 - 1985 RELEASES: RETURNS TO CUSTODY OFFENSE ON ORIGINAL COMMITMENT





CRIME ON RETURN Of the 10,295 inmates in the 1985 release study cohort, 2,612 or 25.4% were returned to DOCS custody following conviction for a new felony offense subsequent to their release in 1985. This section will look at the crimes for which these offenders were returned to prison.

Crimes of robbery were the most frequent felony offenses for which members of the 1985 release population were re-committed to DOCS custody. There were 624 robbery commitments or 23.9% of those returned to DOCS for new felonies. Burglary offenses had the second highest frequency at 605 or 23.2% followed by drug felonies at 582 (22.3%); dangerous weapons at 162 (6.2%); grand larceny at 102 (3.9%); and crimes of homicide at 96 (3.7%). No other crimes accounted for more than three percent.

The distribution of crimes for which offenders are returned to custody has remained relatively constant over time. For example, the crimes of robbery and burglary each account for one-quarter to one-third of the returns from each release cohort. Changes, however, do occur over time. Table 8 compares the distribution of return crimes of the 1985 study population to distribution experienced by the seven previous (1978-1984) release cohorts.

CRIME ON RETURN BY PREVIOUS CRIME A question often asked is do offenders tend to repeat the same type of crime. The following section summarizes data on several specific crimes for which members of the 1978-1985 release cohorts were returned to DOCS custody. Data from these eight cohorts are used to provide a broader numeric base than would data for a single year as the number of annual returns for certain crimes is quite small. (See graph on page 22, as well as Table 10 and Appendix Table E on page 52).


Murder There were 399 (0.6%) offenders returned for the crime of murder among the 66,624 offenders included in the 1978-1985 release cohorts. Three persons originally committed for murder were returned for that crime. Among other offenders returned for murder, 173 (43.3%) had originally been committed for robbery (robbery 1st, 71; robbery 2nd, 80; and robbery 3rd, 22). Forty-five (11.3%) offenders originally committed for burglary (burglary 1st, 2; burglary 2nd, 12; and burglary 3rd, 31) were returned for murder. Other crimes of homicide accounted for 37 (9.3%) (attempted murder, 3; manslaughter 1st, 19; manslaughter 2nd, 13; and criminally negligent homicide, 2) of the returns for murder. Assault accounted for 36 (9.0%) of the murder returns; dangerous weapons for 29 (7.3%); sex offenses for 22; and Youthful Offenders at 21 (5.3%) each. No other crime category exceeded five percent of those returned for murder.


Robbery 1st The single largest crime on return was robbery 1st at 2,221. Of these, 1,257 (56.6%) had originally been committed for robbery (517 for robbery 1st; 536 for robbery 2nd; and 204 for robbery 3rd). Burglary made up the next largest group at 285 (12.8%) (11 for burglary 1st; 64 for burglary 2nd; and 210 for burglary 3rd). Youthful Offenders at 146 (6.6%) made up the next largest group. No other crime category exceeded five percent of those returned for robbery 1st.

Robbery 2nd There were 1,888 offenders returned for robbery 2nd. Of these 1,114 (59.0%) had originally been committed for robbery (353 for robbery 1st; 578 for robbery 2nd; and 183 for robbery 3rd). Burglary at 243 was the next largest group (7 for burglary 1st; 69 for burglary 2nd; and 167 for burglary 3rd). Youthful Offenders accounted for 135. No other crime category exceeded five percent of those returned for robbery 2nd.

Burglary 2nd There were 1,817 offenders returned for burglary 2nd. Of these, 1,010 (55.6%) had originally been committed for burglary (11 for burglary 1st; 328 for burglary 2nd; and 671 for burglary 3rd). There were 370 originally committed for robbery (123 for robbery 1st; 180 for robbery 2nd; and 67 for robbery 3rd). Youthful Offenders accounted for 92. No other crime category exceeded five percent of those returned for burglary 2nd.

Burglary 3rd There were 2,109 offenders returned for burglary 3rd. Of these, 1,086 (51.4%) had originally been committed for burglary (8 for burglary 1st; 174 for burglary 2nd; and 904 for burglary 3rd). There were 465 originally committed for robbery (135 for robbery 1st; 200 for robbery 2nd; and 130 for robbery 3rd). Youthful Offenders accounted for 121. No other crime category exceeded five percent of those returned for burglary 3rd.

Drugs There were 2,248 offenders returned for drug felonies. Of these, 655 (29.1%) had originally been committed for drugs. There were 737 originally committed for robbery (285 for robbery 1st; 359 for robbery 2nd; and 93 for robbery 3rd). Burglary accounted for 290 (6 for burglary 1st; 102 for burglary 2nd; and 182 for burglary 3rd) followed by dangerous weapons at 174. No other category exceeded five percent of those returned for drug felonies.

AGE ON RELEASE The median age of the 1985 study population at time of release was 28.1 years. The largest age category was the 25-29 year old group which accounted for 2,569 (25.0%) of all releases. The releases tended to be under 30 years of age with 59.6% falling within the 16-29 age on release group which spans only 14 years while the remainder of the releases were spread over a 35 year plus category ranging from 30 to 65 and over.

Among those returned to custody, the median age at time of release was 26.6 years or 1.5 years younger than the total study population. Correspondingly, persons not returned had a median age of 29.7 years or 1.6 years greater than the total study population. The 16-18 year old group registered the highest rate of return with more than half (62.2%) returned within five years of release. The second highest return rate, 60.3%, occurred in the 19-20 year group followed by a 30.6% rate for the 21-24 year group. For the remaining age categories as age at time of release increased the proportion of cases returned to custody decreased for each age category. (See Table 11 and graph on page 26).

A somewhat similar pattern of returns is found for those returned for new felony commitments. The median age on release of those returned as new commitments was 26.2 years which is almost two years younger than the total study population. The 19-20 year old category had the highest rate of return at 34.7% followed by the 16-18 year old category with a new commitment rate of 31.6%. The proportion of returns decreased as age on release increased for each successive category. Among those returned for violation of parole the median age at time of release was 26.9 years, about onehalf year greater than those return for new commitments. pattern of higher return rates for younger releases was less pronounced for the returned violators. While the highest rate of return (30.6%) was found in the 16-18 year group, the next highest return rate, 26.0% occurred in the 21-24 age group followed by the 19-20 age group. Decreasing rates of return for successive age categories were found in the older age categories of returned parole violators.

The median age at time of release of the combined 1972-1985 study population was 27.5 years. The 21-29 category accounted for one-half of those released with another 12.8% being under 21 years of age. The remaining 37.3% of the study population fell into the 30 years and over categories.

Among those returned to custody, the median age on return was 25.7 years at time of release. This was 2.8 years younger than the 28.5 years of age of those who did not return. The 16-18 year old group registered the highest rate of return with over half (55.1%) returned within five years of release. Each successive age group had decreasing rates of return. This reduction in rate of return as age on release increased was found in each of the 14 study cohorts.

AGE ON RELEASE




ETHNIC GROUP The ethnic distribution of the 1985 study population closely followed that of the inmate population under custody in DOCS facilities during 1985. The largest portion of releases, 5,253 or 51.0% were in the black ethnic group. Whites comprised the second largest group with 2,599 or 25.3%. Hispanics accounted for 2,207 or 21.4% and other ethnic groups made up the remaining 236 or 2.3%.

The highest rate of return for the 1985 study population was found among Hispanic inmates at 55.0% followed by blacks at 53.4%; other ethnic groups at 36.9% and whites at 32.3%. A somewhat similar pattern is found for those returned for new felony commitments. The Hispanic release group had the highest proportion returned for new felonies, 29.8%. Blacks had the next highest new commitment rate at 27.5% while whites at 18.0% returned at a slightly higher new commitment rate than did other ethnic groups at 17.4%.

For the combined 1972-1985 study population, the Hispanic ethnic group had the highest overall rate of return at 44.5% for this 14-year period. The second highest return rate was for the black ethnic group at 44.0% followed by other ethnic groups at 33.5% and whites at 32.7%. For returns with new felonies the Hispanic group had a slightly higher rate of return at 24.9% than did the blacks at 24.0%. The white group had a new felony rate of 16.1% followed by the other group at 14.0%. (See Table 12 and Appendix Table F).

RETURNS OF PREDICATE OFFENDERS Of the 10,295 offenders in the 1985 study population, there were 4,150 or 40.3% who had originally been committed as predicate felony offenders. New York State law (effective September 1973) provides more severe penalties for persons convicted of a second felony. The basic provisions of the second felony offender law mandate a state prison sentence with a minimum term equal to one-half of the maximum (compared to a limit of one-third the maximum for first felony offenders).

The second felony offenders in the 1985 study group had a 7.8% higher rate of return at 52.7% than did the first felony offenders who returned at a rate of 44.9%. This difference in return rates between second felony and first felony offenders occurred in each of the major crime groupings. The highest rate of return for second felony offenders occurred in the violent felony offender group at 54.6% followed by the property/other offender group at 52.3%; the other violence/coercion group at 48.9% and the drug group at 48.6%.

There was considerable variation by individual crime in return rates for second felony offenders. Appendix Table G on page 54 indicates there were 18,039 second felony offenders released over the 1980-1985 six-year period. The return rate for this group of predicate felons was 50.1%. For this combined group, we find that among crimes with 100 or more second felony releases, the highest rates of return were for robbery 2nd; burglary 2nd; burglary 3rd; rape 1st; robbery 3rd; stolen property; and assault 1st. Crimes with return rates below the average for second felony offenders included manslaughter 2nd; dangerous weapons; attempted assault 2nd; sexual abuse 1st; forgery; assault 2nd; manslaughter 1st; and grand larceny.





CHART 11 1985 RELEASES: RETURNS TO CUSTODY TIME SERVED PRIOR TO RELEASE



TIME SERVED IN DOCS CUSTODY This section deals with time served in DOCS facilities and subsequent rates of return to DOCS custody. The maximum expiration group is excluded as these cases have had prior episodes of DOCS incarceration on their current commitment and time served data for these periods of incarceration are not readily available from material contained on our computer files.

Offenders released via parole had a lower rate of return 48.0% than did conditional releases at 50.9%. The lowest rate of return among the 1985 paroles was registered by persons serving one year on DOCS custody (39.5%) followed by those serving less than 12 months at 42.5%. The return rate for persons serving more than one year was somewhat higher ranging from 46.6% to 51.2% in the six categories shown in Table 14. The combined 1976-1985 release cohorts exhibited a somewhat similar pattern.

There seems to be no pattern among conditional releases between time served in DOCS facilities and rate of return.

REGION The largest portion, (7,073 or 68.7%) of the 1985 study population had been originally committed from one of the five counties of New York City. Suburban New York City counties accounted for an additional 12.1% while the remaining 19.2% of the study population had been committed from other areas of the state. The highest rate of return was registered by those originally committed from New York City at 52.2%. Study cases from the Suburban New York City counties and other areas of New York State had notably lower return rates of 40.5% and 37.7% respectively.

Data for the combined eight-year period 1978-1985 follow a somewhat similar distribution. As with the 1985 study group the combined 1978-1985 cohort had been committed predominantly (56.1%) from New York City. Similarly, the New York City category had a higher rate of return (45.4%) than did the Suburban New York City category at 38.2% and other areas of the state at 39.5%. The higher return rate for New York City reflects a higher proportion (26.0%) of New York City cases returning with new felony commitments than was found among the Suburban New York City group with a new commitment rate of 22.4% and other state at 18.7%.



SENTENCE Offenders committed to DOCS custody receive an indeterminate sentence of imprisonment consisting of a minimum term and a maximum term. The minimum term is the time that an offender must serve before becoming eligible for parole consideration. Prior to the 1980 Penal Law revision, the minimum term of imprisonment could, in certain cases, be set by the Board of Parole after commitment rather than the sentencing court. This accounts for the "No Minimum" category in Table 16.

1. Minimum Sentence - Close to half (44.8%) of the 1985 release population had a minimum term of less than two years or "no minimum" sentence. Offenders with 24-35 month and 36-47 month minimum terms accounted for 29.7% and 12.8% of the release population respectively. Lower than average rates of return were registered by the shortest (no minimum at 38.6% and 12-23 months at 45.7%) and the longest (60-71 months at 47.2%; 72-119 months at 46.4%; 180-239 months and 240 months and over at 15.4%). The shorter minimum categories tended to have a higher proportion of returns resulting from court commitments than did the longer sentence categories where the proportion of parole violators was higher.



2. Maximum Sentence - The maximum sentence of over half (60.6%) of the 1985 release population did not extend beyond five years. Only one out of ten (10.2%) had maximum terms of over ten years including 221 with life maximum terms. As with minimum sentence, the lowest rates of return were found among offenders with the shortest (36 month group at 44.0%) and the longest (240+ months at 42.4% and Life at 13.6%) maximum sentence categories. Maximum sentence categories of 120 months or less tended to have a higher proportion of returns resulting from new commitments than did categories with maximum terms of more than 10 years.

The combined release population for the seven year 1979-1985 period registered a somewhat similar pattern of returns. The highest rates of return were registered by the categories falling in the four through ten year maximum term range. The 36 month maximum term group had a lower than average rate of return as did categories with maximums greater than ten years. The lowest rates of return were for inmates with life sentences at 22.4% and inmates who originally received death sentences which were later converted to life (8.3%).





CHART 15 1985 RELEASES: RETURNS TO CUSTODY DRUG FELONS



DRUG FELONS As previously noted, drug felons, at 36.6% had a lower rate of return than the 48.0% average for the entire 1985 release cohort. There was a considerable amount of variation between felony classes. (Note: New York State grades felonies into classes ranging from the most serious Class A-I to the least serious Class E.) For felony Classes A-I through D, the rate of return increased as the seriousness of the felony declined. Two or 11.1% of the 18 Class A-I felons returned while 50.5% of the Class D had returned to prison within the five year follow-up period. This did not hold true for the Class E felony group, however, where only 36.4% returned. The variation between drug crimes involving sales and those involving possession was less pronounced. Sales offenders had a return rate of 37.8% compared to 32.6% for possession.

While the rate of return for those whose original commitment was for drugs remains below average, it appears that for those offenders returned as new commitments, the proportion returned for drug felonies is steadily rising. Among the 1978 release cohort, drug crimes accounted for only 8.0% of the returns. This proportion has grown to 22.3% in the 1985 release cohort.

SUBSEQUENT RELEASE COHORTS This section provides information on the 1986, 1987, 1988 and 1989 annual release cohorts. Only partial data are available for these cohorts as none had been at risk for the full five years that we have for the 1985 cohort. Comparisons can be made, however, at the one, two, three and four year periods subsequent to date of release for some or all of these cohorts.

These partial data tend to indicate a rise in the return rates of these four cohorts compared to the 1985 cohort with each year exhibiting a higher rate of return than that registered by the previous year's cohort. (See Table 19 and Appendix Table H)

SUMMARY Among the 10,295 inmate cohort released from DOCS facilities in 1985, 48.0% returned to DOCS custody within five years of the date on which they were released. Conviction on a new felony charge was the cause of return for 25.4% while violation of parole resulted in the return of 22.6%. Well over half of the returns (58.6%) were back in prison within two years. The median time to return was 22.2 months.

Women returned to custody at a much lower rate (31.0%) than did men (48.8%). Persons committed for robbery had the highest (56.5%) rate of return while murder commitments had the lowest return rate (25.5%). Offenders who were older at time of release tended to return at a lower rate than did those in the younger age brackets. The median age at time of release of those returned was 26.6 years compared to 29.7 years for those who did not return. Hispanics returned to custody at a rate of 55.0% while blacks and whites registered rates of 53.4% and 32.3% respectively. Among the 2,612 offenders recommitted to DOCS for a new felony, the most frequent crime was robbery which accounted for 23.9% of these The return rate by region was 52.2% for New York City compared to 40.5% for Suburban New York City and 37.7% for Upstate Offenders with shorter minimum terms tended to have a higher rate of return for new felonies that did those with longer minimum terms. The same was true with maximum terms with offenders with life maximum terms registering the lowest return rate. Offenders originally committed for drug felonies tend to return at a lower than average rate. However, the portion of releases returned for subsequent drug felonies is rising.

In retrospect, the proportion of releases returning to custody declined in the early 1970's compared to levels of the prior decade. A study* of the 1969 original releases to parole supervision recorded a 46.1% level of return to custody. The analysis of the 14 release cohorts for 1972-1985 indicates that the return rate reached a low of 33.6% in 1972. This decline primarily reflected a drop in returns for parole violation. The overall rate of return has risen by 14.4% since 1972 to the 1985 level of 48.0%. Returns for new felony commitments have accounted for the greatest portion of this increase while the rate of return for parole violation is only moderately higher than in 1972.

Each year the release experience of various inmate cohorts released from facility custody of the Department of Correctional Services is reviewed. The data base developed in this process serves as a resource for examination of the interaction of various characteristics and institutional program experience which relate to the probability of ex-offenders to remain at liberty in a free society as compared to those who are reincarcerated.
