NOTES:

DRUG RELATED DEATHS:

(1) DRUG RELATED DEATHS are based on the Medical Examiner's records. They do not include drug or alcohol related traffic deaths.

(2) "Cocaine" includes all cases involving cocaine and cocaine combined with other drugs including alcohol.

(3) "Alcohol Combination" includes all alcohol and alcohol combined with other drugs except cocaine.

(4) "Other Drug" cases includes any non-cocaine and non-alcohol or related combined drugs cases.

DRUG RELATED TRAFFIC DEATHS are based on the Medical Examiner's results.

INCIDENCE OF ILLICIT DRUGS DURING PREGNANCY:

Most pregnant women who register for prenatal care though the Outpatient Services Department (OPS) are screened on their initial OPS visit. OPS patients with an initial positive screen, a history of drug abuse and/or clinical indications of drug abuse are re-screened throughout pregnancy. Approximately 70 percent of OPS patients are screened at least once during their pregnancy. Only patients who are registered with OPS at the time of their delivery are included in these data. Therefore these data cannot be extrapolated to the total obstetric population.

POSITIVE ILLICIT DRUG SCREENS IN EMERGENCY ROOM:

Selection of patients for emergency room drug testing is biased towards those patients with clinical indications of drug use and precludes direct extrapolation to the Emergency Department population as a whole. Only about 3 percent of the approximately 91,000 Emergency Department patients are tested for drugs in their urine.

Presence of morphine in urine with no record of in-hospital administration of opiates or a history of drug abuse is highly suggestive of heroin use.

Some drug screens show use of more than one drug. If more than one drug is reported for a case, the results are reported only for one drug using this hierarchy: morphine, cocaine, PCP, amphetamines, and marijuana.

SELF REPORTED MONTHLY DRUG USE BY 11th GRADERS:

(1) As of 1989, DPI initiated an annual self report random sample survey of public school's students use of illicit drugs and related issues. The survey is called <u>Foundations for Prevention</u>: <u>Student Perspectives</u> <u>on Drug and Alcohol Use</u>, and is issued each fall for the previous school year's data.

(2) "Other" includes heroin, inhalants, look-alike drugs, hallucinogens, stimulants, depressants, and overthe-counter cold medicine used for kicks.

DUI ARRESTS:

Fiscal Year DUI arrests as reported by the Department of Public Safety.

DRUG ARRESTS:

These data are based on FBI definitions of drug arrests based on calendar year State Bureau of Identification's Complaint File. The FBI definitions exclude some less serious Delaware drug statutes, and the FBI uses a hierarchical classification procedure where a drug arrest is counted only if a more serious crime is not committed at the same time.

COCAINE ARRESTS are a subset of DRUG ARRESTS.

SUBSTANCES ANALYZED BY MEDICAL EXAMINER:

 "Illicit Drug Substances": During a drug arrest or investigation a substance or a set of substances is found. Each separate substance must be tested and weighed for legal evidence.
"Other" includes amphetamines, barbiturates, and other controlled substances.

DRUG OFFENDERS ADMITTED TO DOC:

(1) "Detention" includes those persons detained after arrests and prior to sentencing.

(2) "Jail" includes those persons sentenced to terms equal to or less than one year.

(3) "Prison" includes those persons whose sentence is greater than one year.

ADULT TREATMENT PROGRAMS:

(1) "Admissions" includes all persons entering a residential or non-residential program within a year. A person entering more than one program or entering one program more than once during the year is counted at each entry as an admission.

(2) Admissions numbers are for all individuals whose primary treatment need is for drug and/or alcohol problems.

(3) Total DADAMH admissions will not add up as juveniles are included in the three subcategories. Hence the total reflects the actual number of adults less juveniles.

JUVENILE TREATMENT PROGRAMS:

Data reported as 1988, is fiscal year 1989 data — i.e. July 1988 through June 1989. Data reported as 1989, is fiscal year 1990 data — i.e. July 1989 through June 1990 ... and so on.
