

Director's Message



For Illinois Correctional Industries, fiscal year 1993 represented another of growth and development. Skilled inmate workers assigned by Industries provided a wide array of services ranging from asbestos removal to tire recycling. This work provides a number of benefits to the state:

- Government and non-profit agencies benefit from the use of a skilled inmate workforce that can provide low cost goods and services.
- Correctional institutions benefit from Industry programs that keep inmates productively assigned and less prone to violence.
- Inmates benefit from the job skills they acquire, which can in many cases significantly improve an inmate's prospects for employment upon release, thereby reducing recidivism.

Correctional Industries is in the unique position of operating a government program on business principles. All Industry programs operate on funds generated by sales. As a result of good management techniques Correctional Industries has successfully generated record sales in recent years, enabling the expansion of existing operations and the creation of new Industry programs. Consequently, inmate jobs have increased, as have the benefits described above. This growth would not be possible without the consistent support Correctional Industries has received from the members of the General Assembly and our customers throughout government. It is this support that will allow Industries to continue to grow in the future.

Chief Administrative Officer's Message



Illinois Correctional Industries continued during FY'93 to focus both on expanding the number of assignments for inmate workers and on passing along greater savings to the taxpayers of the State of Illinois. During the past year, inmate assignments with Correctional Industries increased 9%. It is our intention to stress efforts to provide additional meaningful work assignments to more inmates during FY'94. In the future, the Department of Corrections will recognize important savings as a result of our establishment of a centralized warehouse program for storage and distribution of inmate clothing and Correctional Officers' uniforms that will allow significant reductions in the department's costs of carrying inventories of these items at individual correctional centers. It is also planned to expand the variety of products available through the warehouse program.

Sensitivity to recycling and environmental concerns is not new to Correctional Industries and our efforts are still expanding. Examples include undertaking a massive tire cleanup project in Mounds, Illinois, establishment of remanufactured tires and re-refined oil distribution programs to state garages throughout Illinois and the preliminary development and planning for collection, cleaning and reuse of depleted antifreeze.

Both the production and agricultural divisions are committed to creation of products and services that not only will meet the needs of our customers, in a cost effective manner, but also will provide positive work experiences for inmates as well as help them prepare for a return to the community. Development of new cookie lines at the Illinois River bakery, enhanced chicken and turkey products at Western Illinois meat processing plant, expanded chair offerings at Graham furniture and additional microfilming services at Centralia are all examples of these efforts.

The value of Correctional Industries as an important program resource to the Department of Corrections has been recognized by the Governor's Task Force on Crime and Corrections. The task force made a number of recommendations that are designed to enhance the value and effectiveness of Correctional Industries. It has been gratifying to see the Illinois General Assembly endorse a substantial number of these recommendations through passage of enabling legislation. It is our pledge to you, the members of the General Assembly, that we will continue to make the programs of Illinois Correctional Industries something of which you can be as proud as we are.

The uncompromising support of the Illinois General Assembly is truly appreciated and has played no small part in past successes and will be equally important to our future achievements.

Inmate Assignments



During FY'93, Illinois Correctional Industries expanded the development of various recycling opportunities primarily directed toward State government. This support to State agencies provided for increased inmate assignments in areas that have not previously been utilized in traditional recycling programs.

Through the effort of attacking more difficult items of recycling, Illinois Correctional Industries has enabled the State of Illinois to become one of the few states utilizing re-refined oil, retreaded tires, and remanufactured tires in its vehicle fleet. Recycled antifreeze is also currently available as a result of Illinois Correctional Industries' efforts.

This expansion was further made possible through passage of legislation which gave the Department expanded responsibilities for providing services in the areas of recycling. The statute provides this direction as follows:

"Sec. 3-12-14. Recycling and Refuse Sorting Program. The Department shall establish and operate a recycling and refuse sorting program in which committed persons shall be employed. The Department shall promulgate rules and regulations to establish guidelines for the program. The Department shall report to the General Assembly as to the progress of this Recycling and Refuse Sorting Program." (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1991 Ch. 38, Par. 1003-12-14.)

Illinois Correctional Industries expects to expand the variety of recycling services in Fiscal Year 1994. Discussions have been held with a major city to provide services to enhance and expand their citywide recycling efforts. Correctional Industries will also explore the feasibility of a statewide collection effort for waste oil to further the state's efforts in recycling and reuse. Additional programs such as wood waste recycling, packaging of re-refined oil, and antifreeze should further expand inmate assignments during the next fiscal year.
