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ANNUAL REPORT

During the period of July 1, 1992 through June 30, 1993 (hereafter, SFY93) Kansas continued a multifaceted approach to the drug abuse problem by providing funding for prevention, interdiction, prosecution and treatment. In SFY93 the state of Kansas funded the following BJA program areas:

- BJA-01 Demand reduction education programs in which law enforcement officers participate;
- BJA-02 Multijurisdictional task force programs that integrate Federal, State and/or local drug law enforcement agencies and prosecutors for the purpose of enhancing interagency coordination and intelligence and facilitating multijurisdictional investigations;
- BJA-03 Programs designed to target domestic sources of controlled and illegal substances, such as precursor chemicals, diverted pharmaceutical, clandestine laboratories and cannabis cultivations;
- BJA-07a Improving the operational effectiveness of law enforcement through the use of crime analysis techniques, street sales enforcement, schoolyard violator programs, gang-related and low-income housing drug control programs;
- BJA-10 Improving the operational effectiveness of the court process by expanding prosecutorial, defender and judicial resources and implementing court delay reduction programs;
- BJA-13 Providing programs which identify and meet the treatment needs of adult and juvenile drug-dependent and alcohol-dependent offenders;
- BJA-16 Innovative programs which demonstrate new and different approaches to enforcement, prosecution and adjudication of drug offenses and other serious crimes;
- BJA-21 Programs of which the primary goal is to strengthen urban enforcement and prosecution efforts targeted at street drug sales.

The following table shows that in SFY93, the state of Kansas had a strong commitment to multijurisdictional task forces and the D.A.R.E. program.

Section I: A summary of program activities

A. BJA-01 Demand Reduction Education programs

BJA purpose area 1 is for demand reduction education programs in which law enforcement officers participate.

The D.A.R.E. program provides perhaps our best chance of stopping drug abuse before it starts. At various sites throughout the state, the D.A.R.E. core curriculum, the D.A.R.E. middle school curriculum, and the D.A.R.E. high school curriculum are being taught. Training for the core curriculum is done in state by our State D.A.R.E. Coordinator and his mentor staff.

In SFY93, 23% of the BJA grant monies received went to funding D.A.R.E. programs.

SFY93 BJA grant monies allowed D.A.R.E. programs to be taught in:



320 schools out of 1,468



2,252 classrooms out of 30,447



68,242 students out of 445,390

For SFY93, 27 D.A.R.E. subrecipients received over \$ 1.2 million in grant funding.

B. BJA-02 Multijurisdictional Task Forces

BJA purpose area 2 is for multijurisdictional task force programs that integrate Federal, State and/or local drug law enforcement agencies and prosecutors for the purpose of enhancing interagency coordination and intelligence and facilitating multijurisdictional investigations.

In SFY93, 28 of our BJA grant subrecipients received \$ 1,798,478 in grant funding for this purpose area.

Multijurisdictional Task Force grants had the largest number of participants in SFY93, and also received the most funding of any of the program areas.

Following is a comprehensive look at the multijurisdictional task forces funded by the BJA grant in SFY93:



As a result of grant funding of our multijurisdictional task forces:

- 82 persons were sentenced to prison
- 64 persons were sentenced to jail
- 166 persons were sentenced to probation
- 99 persons were sentenced to jail and probation
- 82 persons were sentenced to prison

As a result of this grant, 3.25 grams of cocaine, 1,423.5 pounds of marijuana, 1 DU of opiates, three DUs of stimulants, 176 DUs of depressants, 1 ounce of hallucinogens and 1 DU of multiple/other drugs were removed from the drug scene. The **KBI laboratory** grant provided funding to acquire a gas chromatograph-mass spectrometer equipped with an autosampler for the Topeka laboratory. Funding was also provided to acquire an autosampler for the gas chromatograph-mass spectrometer in the Great Bend laboratory. This equipment will help reduce the turnaround time for the laboratories, and will allow the examiners to set the instrument to analyze samples overnight, unattended. This equipment will allow a 25% increase in the number of drug samples analyzed annually without requiring the hiring of additional personnel.

In their annual report the **KBI Narcotics Strike Force** reported that they investigated 20 suspected illicit drug labs in SFY93. Their lab team raided seven clandestine lab sites and coordinated the cleanup of two major contamination sites. One site located in Neosho County was identified as the largest single lab ever investigated by the KBI. That lab was capable of producing 25 to 30 pounds of methamphetamine per cooking cycle. In May 1993 the Narcotics Strike Force investigated a large indoor growing operation in Chanute, Kansas that resulted in the seizure of 3,800 marijuana plants from a commercial building. This is believed to be the largest indoor grow ever seized in Kansas.

The Narcotics Strike Force also helps the Kansas Highway Patrol in their Drug Interdiction Program. Additionally, the Narcotics Strike Force Drop-In was initiated in January 1993, as a cooperative effort with U. S. Customs, Federal Aviation Administration, and the Kansas National Guard to combat air smuggling in Kansas.

D. BJA-07a Improving the Operational Effectiveness of Law Enforcement

BJA Program Area 07a is for improving the operational effectiveness of law enforcement through the use of crime analysis techniques, street sales enforcement, schoolyard violator programs, gang-related and low-income housing drug control programs.

Prior to 1990, criminal cases adjudicated in Crawford County District Court revealed that less than 10% of the cases filed were drug or drug related. In 1990, the Crawford County Drug Task Force was formed. The 1990 undercover drug operations of the task force resulted in a 54% increase in the drug offense case load for the Crawford County Attorney's Office. This increase prompted the Crawford County Attorney's Office to request a grant for a drug prosecutor. The Crawford County Attorney's Office received grant funding in SFY92 and SFY93 for a drug prosecutor. In 1992 there was a 62% increase in the drug offense case load. During the first six months of the SFY93 grant, 26 arrests were made and another 50 cases were being worked.

In Geary County, drug related cases have increased 43% from SFY92 to SFY93. Adult cocaine arrests increased 34% during this period. In SFY93, the Geary County Attorney filed 127 adult drug cases and handled 14 juvenile prosecutions. Thirteen vehicles were seized and forfeited during SFY93. Seizures for the grant year amounted to \$ 118,414.87.

The grant for the Kansas Board of Indigents' Defense was primarily for implementing sound criminal defense practices under guidelines sentencing for drug and other cases. Three hundred and six persons received training as a result of this grant. Thirteen and one half hours of training occurred.

In SFY93 the Leavenworth County Attorney's Office requested grant funding for a part time drug prosecutor. Since this attorney has been on staff all drug related cases, to misdemeanor marijuana possession, have been handled through the Leavenworth County District court. This ensures the first conviction for the charge of marijuana possession is heard in a court of record. This action will enhance subsequent offenses to the felony level.

The Wyandotte County District Attorney's Office just completed the 4th year of BJA funding. They prosecuted 170 drug cases in SFY93 which resulted in fines of \$ 7,000. This subrecipient also has \$ 21,587.89 in forfeitures during the SFY93 grant period.

The **Kansas Department of Corrections Alcohol and Drug Addiction Primary Treatment (ADAPT)** program reports that seventy percent of the Kansas Department of Corrections (KDOC) inmates have a substance abuse problem. A problem identified by KDOC was thirty percent of those inmates entering treatment have been in primary treatment on two or more occasions. Placing "treatment wise" inmates in primary treatment is neither logical nor effective. A dual track treatment program was devised to correct this problem. KDOC now uses a 45 day Terence Gorski model relapse prevention program for inmates who have completed primary treatment for substance abuse on two or more prior occasions. Identification of this problem and the solution to it was done by the Director of Substance Abuse Treatment, a position that is funded by the BJA grant.

The number of clients admitted to the program during SFY93 was 10,558. Of these clients 9,039 were successfully terminated.

The Kansas Department of Corrections, Division of Community and Field Services (Community Corrections) had 786 clients admitted to their program during SFY93 with 611 of these clients successfully completing the program. Community Corrections is a sentencing option designed to provide a continuum of correctional services within local communities for offenders who would otherwise be incarcerated in state facilities. The Division of Community and Field Services acts as the conduit through which BJA funding is given to local Community Corrections programs.

Day Reporting Centers provide enhanced supervision for substance abusers engaged in a recovery process. These centers provide drug testing to monitor participants avoidance of drugs; relapse prevention groups/activities; life skills groups; literacy enhancement and job readiness classes. Of the thirty Community Corrections programs in the state of Kansas, eighteen submitted grant applications.

G. BJA-16 Innovative Programs

BJA Program Area 16 is for innovative programs which demonstrate new and different approaches to enforcement, prosecution and adjudication of drug offenses and other serious crime.

The **Lenexa Police Department** grant allowed two more investigators to join the Drug Enforcement Unit. These investigators did foot surveillance in specific geographic areas with the objective of locating and observing drug/gang associates or activity. They also initiated a "knock and talk" strategy where the investigators would knock on the doors of suspected low level drug distributors and openly talk with them about reported or observed drug activity at the residence. During the first three quarters of this grant the Lenexa Police Department Drug Enforcement Unit removed the following amount of drugs from the drug scene:

The Shawnee Police Department grant helped establish a two man narcotics unit. The prime objective of this grant was to follow up on all complaints of narcotics activity at single family dwellings in Shawnee. In the past, the Shawnee Police Department had received many calls pertaining to narcotics activity, but did not have the manpower to follow up these calls. They also established a computerized intelligence file which now contains 222 entries on individuals suspected of narcotics activity. During the grant period:

- 36 tips of narcotics activity at single family dwellings were received. All of the tips were investigated.
- 66 arrests were made for narcotics violations.
- 11 confidential informants were developed. Using these CI's 19 undercover purchases of narcotics were made.

The Westwood Police Department grant provided drug interdiction and legal risk management training to ninety percent of the line officers of the six participating jurisdictions. The training was conducted twice during the grant period.

The final innovative program grant was placed in this area because it did not fit in any other area. Project Freedom is a community coalition located in Wichita. It was written into federal law that BJA funding be provided for this program. Project Freedom's Drug Affected Baby Task Force implemented a Case Management Prevention and Intervention Program for low-income women of childbearing age, and pregnant and parenting women currently drug-involved or at high risk for drug-involvement in the Wichita/Sedgwick County area.

One of the important aspects of this grant is support group sessions. The case managers continue to report that clients are able to share very personal experiences. The clients do personal diaries which they share with the group and their case manager.

H. BJA-21 Urban Enforcement

BJA Program Area 21 is for programs of which the primary goal is to strengthen urban enforcement and prosecution efforts targeted at street drug sales.

As a result of the Sedgwick County District Attorney's Office grant, 178 people were sentenced to prison, 11 people were sentenced to jail, 203 people were placed on probation and 52 people received jail and probation.

Section II: A summary of the activities carried out during the year under any discretionary grants received by the State

Relationship to Strategy & Activities

The purpose of this cooperative agreement is to assist the Kansas Bureau of Investigation (KBI), the state's Central Repository for criminal history records, in completing the consolidation and automation of the criminal history files. In conjunction with the implementation of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act on July 1, 1993, and focusing toward utilization of the 5% set-aside funds for the improvement of criminal justice records, the CHRI project attempts to locate missing dispositions, synchronize file holdings with the FBI in preparation for participation in the Interstate Identification Index (III) and create automated linkages between the state Department of Corrections, the Kansas Sentencing Commission and the KBI.

Impact

In conjunction with the Sentencing Guidelines Act, the overall impact of this project will be to enhance the data quality level of the holdings of the Central Repository in terms of clear, complete, accurate, and timely data. Given the nature of determinate sentencing, complete and accurate criminal histories are imperative. Sentence lengths will be affected based upon an individual's prior record. "Getting the bad guys off the street" will greatly reduce the incidence of both drug-related and violent crime.

Section III: Evaluation results of programs and projects

During SFY93, a formal evaluation was performed by the Salina All-American Prevention Partnership in collaboration with the Kansas State D.A.R.E. Coordinator, the Saline County Sheriff's Office and the Salina Police Department. A study was conducted to assess the short-term effects of D.A.R.E. in the Saline County schools.

*....."The major findings of this study are as follows:

- 1) The scales created out of the D.A.R.E. core curriculum were found to be very reliable. Overall, the questionnaire . . . is strikingly parallel (similar) to others; especially the Illinois study (on-going) and Honolulu (1985).
- 2) D.A.R.E. is seen as an important support system by both graduates and non-graduates.
- 3) D.A.R.E. graduates are more positive about the role of law enforcement in the community.
- 4) Seventy-four percent of the D.A.R.E. graduates rated the knowledge learned in D.A.R.E. as either helpful or very helpful. However, only about 1/3 of the respondents (31%), have used this knowledge regularly.
- 5) Seventy-seven percent of D.A.R.E. graduates thought that the knowledge they gained in D.A.R.E. will be helpful or very helpful in the future. This finding holds mainly among students reporting no alcohol use in the last three months.
- 6) Among D.A.R.E. graduates, students who use alcohol were less likely to be interested in serving as D.A.R.E. role models.
- 7) Compared to non-D.A.R.E. graduates, D.A.R.E. graduates are significantly more likely to know drug-free activities.
- 8) D.A.R.E. graduates are more likely to get in trouble at school compared to non-D.A.R.E. graduates.

- 9) Seventy-seven percent of the respondents in the survey have not tried cigarettes, while 23% have tried them at least once in the past three months. Seventy-two percent have not tried alcohol, while 28% have tried alcohol at least once in the last three months. In comparison to other studies, the rate of usage of both substances is relatively high in this sample.
- 10) D.A.R.E. and non-D.A.R.E. graduates talk about the program, but graduates talk about D.A.R.E. to their friends, parents, and guardians on a ratio of 2:1.
- 11) The study showed no significant difference between D.A.R.E. and non-D.A.R.E. graduates with respect to the use of cigarettes, alcohol, and other drugs.
- 12) There was no reported significant difference between D.A.R.E. and non-D.A.R.E. graduates with respect to most of the variables connected with the D.A.R.E. core curriculum.".....

*"A Pilot Study of D.A.R.E. Effectiveness in Saline County Schools"; by Dan Muhwezi, Ph.D. and Kathi Dupy, Assistant; August, 1993.

The only surprise in this study was that D.A.R.E. graduates were more likely to "get in trouble" at school compared to non-D.A.R.E. graduates. The *actual* question students were asked was: "Do friends get you in trouble at school?". One possible explanation for D.A.R.E. graduates answering this question affirmatively is that they interpret "get in trouble" differently than non-D.A.R.E. graduates. D.A.R.E. students are made aware of how peer pressure can affect them. Rather than indicating that D.A.R.E. graduates get in more trouble at school than non-D.A.R.E. graduates, this question could indicate that D.A.R.E. graduates responded to the peer pressure verbage they learned in D.A.R.E. This question was poorly worded; thus, inferences regarding this question were subject to misinterpretation.

The possibility of using this instrument for future studies is currently being considered.

Section IV: An explanation of how the Federal funds provided under this program were coordinated with State agencies receiving Federal funds for drug abuse education, prevention, treatment and other relevant activities

Federal funds provided under this program were coordinated with State agencies receiving Federal funds for drug abuse education, prevention and treatment.

First, the Director of this SAA chairs the Governor's Interagency Coordinating Committee on Substance Abuse. The committee consists of representatives of 22 state agencies. Of course, not all agencies administer Federal funds, but several do (i.e. Department of Transportation, State Board of Education, Department of Health and Environment, Alcohol and Drug Abuse Services, Kansas Bureau of Investigation, Kansas National Guard). The committee meets monthly and serves as an information sharing vehicle. Opportunities to collaborate on programs are discussed, however joint funding is rare. The committee was asked for input into the BJA state strategy.

There is one program around which state agencies with Federal funds have planned and jointly funded. The **Kansas Family Initiative** is the first statewide parent training and empowering program in the nation. The State Board of Education, Alcohol and Drug Abuse Services, the National Guard's demand reduction program, and this SAA share monies to train trainers, advertise and coordinate. This initiative has commitment from participating agencies. Means by which they can share resources are developing continuously. Meanwhile other agencies do serve this intense collaboration and are inquiring as to how they can participate. The initiative is being expanded into a statewide family network.

The Governor's Conference on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse that was held in October '92 was another "rallying point" for agencies to share plans and resources. Last year's conference theme was "Neighbors Helping Neighbors". Professional "neighbors" (i.e. State Board of Education, National Guard, Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse, this SAA, Bureau of Justice Assistance)

shared in the planning and funding.

Another "device" being implemented by this SAA to encourage collaboration is the promotion and implementation of a theoretical model called "Risk and Protective Factors". The BJA applicants were recommended by this SAA to meet with twelve Regional Prevention Centers (jointly funded by ADAS and this SAA) to gain assistance with establishing needs assessments in their applications. The Regional Prevention Centers have conducted "Community Risk Assessments". In the process of discussing these assessments state and local entities were introduced to the "Risk and Protective Factor" model. It is hoped that if sufficient numbers of agencies begin to be competent in this model, collaboration can be enhanced by means of using a common language.

This table shows both the accomplishment of the BJA grant funding, and the great challenge facing us should the BJA grant funding cease. The above table shows that 78% of the grant funding goes to personnel and fringe benefits. Clearly, the BJA grant provides help for the manpower needs of law enforcement. However, since the grants are so personnel intensive, it will be harder for the local entities to pick up these positions should grant funding cease. This presents a great challenge for us.

In an attempt to avoid possible "addiction" to federal grant money, we are looking into the possibility of changing the amount of local match required to receive a grant. Currently the BJA funding accounts for 75% of the grant, with the other 25% coming from local match monies. To gradually wean local law enforcement from this federal grant, we are looking at increasing

the local match in the second year of a grant to 30%, in the third year of the grant to 50%, and in the fourth and any subsequent years of the grant to 75%. When grant funding ceases we do not want the local governments to throw up their hands and tell us they do not have the funds to continue the program funded by the grant. By informing local government officials now that grant funding will eventually cease, it is hoped that they will take measures now to start assuming more fiscal responsibility for the grant program.
