

#### INTRODUCTION

The violence within the American domicile has been recognized for decades by elements of government and society with little done to correct the problem. Only recently has this phenomenon begun to receive the attention it deserves. In an effort to understand, identify and treat the incidents of abuse occurring within the home, the State of New Jersey, through its legislature, has provided the means to gain a meaningful insight into this issue.

In 1982, the Domestic Violence Act was instituted to protect battered victims and study the complex problems that spark such aggressive behavior. This legislation also provided the opportunity to identify the causes of violence in the home and put forth a more comprehensive effort to combat the crime of Domestic Violence.

Improvements since the implementation of the Domestic Violence Act are continuing; serious concern has been displayed within many municipal and county agencies whereby various committees and working groups have been formed to help battle this important problem. Revised investigation and reporting procedures by the police; improved processing of domestic complaints by the courts; mandatory in-service training for police and court personnel have all enabled the victim to come forward and implement the constitutional rights granted to all Americans.

The following pages of narrative and graphics in this chapter are the result of gathered data displaying the complexities of domestic violence found within the State of New Jersey. As stated in the following pages, reported domestic violence acts increased twenty-seven percent over 1992. (NOTE: Legislation effective November 12, 1991, added terroristic threats and criminal trespass as occurrences which constitute domestic violence acts; these additional offenses may effect comparisons of the volume of reported domestic violence acts.) It is through analysis of this data that, hopefully the keys to preventing future violence can be found.

#### DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 1993 domestic violence statistics are listed below:

- There were 66,248 domestic violence offenses reported by the police in 1993, a 27% increase compared to the 52,321 reported in 1992.
- Murders decreased 10% in 1993 (54) when compared to 1992 (60).
- Assaults accounted for 57% (37,760) of the reported offenses in 1993.
- The total arrests for 1993 (24,115) increased 22% over 1992 (19,720).
- Arrests were made in 36% (24,115) of the offenses reported for 1993.
- The most frequent day of domestic violence occurrences was Sunday (12,239).
- For the eleventh consecutive year, the most frequent hours of domestic violence incidents were between 8:00 p.m. and midnight, when 30% (19,855) of the offenses were reported.
- Children were involved or present during 50% of all domestic violence offenses occurring in 1993. Specifically, 9% (5,736) were involved and 42% (27,505) were present.
- Wives were the victims in 31% (20,652) and ex-wives were the victims in 3% (1,975) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1993. Overall, females were victims in 83% (54,830) of all domestic violence offenses.
- The number of domestic violence complaints that had prior court orders issued against the offender increased from 12,051 in 1992 to 15,631 in 1993. This is an increase of 30%.
- Alcohol and/or drugs were involved in 41% (27,042) of the reported offenses occurring in 1993. Alcohol involvement alone accounted for 35% (23,449) of the total domestic violence offenses reported.
- Persons age 60 or over were victims in 3% (1,941) of all reported domestic violence offenses that occurred in 1993.
- Domestic Violence does not occur at a regular frequency, but when viewed as a ratio of its occurrence to a fixed time interval, one act of domestic violence would occur every seven (7) minutes and fifty-six (56) seconds.

- Fifty-two percent (34,226) of all domestic violence complaints resulted in injury. This is a 30% increase when compared to the 26,335 that occurred in 1992.
- Of all the domestic violence offenses involving weapons (38,523), hands, fists, feet, etc. were used in 87%(33,687) of these offenses.
- Domestic violence offenses involving a gun increased 17%, from 394 in 1992 to 462 in 1993.
- There were 3,258 serious injuries reported in 1993, a 21% increase when compared to the 2,700 reported in 1992.




- Assaults accounted for 43% (839) of all domestic violence offenses for victims 60 years of age or over.
- Females, 60 years of age or over, were the victims in 69% (1,331) of the 1,941 elderly abuse offenses.
- Persons age 60 or over were the victims in 3% (1,941) of all the reported domestic violence offenses during this period.

### DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES BY TIME OF DAY 1992/1993




• During 1993 forty-three percent (28,381) of the reported Domestic Violence offenses occurred between 6:00 p.m. and 12 Midnight.

- The most frequent day of occurrence for Domestic Violence during 1993 was Sunday.
- During 1993, thirty-six percent (23,620) of the reported Domestic Violence offenses occurred during the weekend (SATURDAY and SUNDAY).

- In 1993, the highest number of Domestic Violence offenses occured during the months of July and August.
- During 1993, the month with the lowest number of reported Domestic Violence offenses was February.
