
## PROPOSED EVALUATION FORMAT FOR PINELLAS AND BROWARD COUNTIES

Goal #1 - Determine what services are being provided, by whom, by what agencies, where and to which clients.

#### Objectives:

- A. Prepare a list of all agencies that provide direct services to youth. The information on each agency should include but not be excluded to the following information:
  - the director of the agency.
  - the agency's telephone number and address.
  - the contact person(s) to wnom referrals should be made.
  - the type of services provided.
  - the cost of services (each different type of service should be costed out).
  - the criteria used in screening service recipients.
  - testing or other requirements imposed upon the recipient before he can receive the service.
  - follow-up services provided by the agency.
  - agency's funding source.
  - agency's budget.
  - source of agency's referrals.
  - description of clients served over last fiscal year.
  - · names of agency providing similar or related services.
- B. Preparation of reference manual of community services to youth organized by subject category.
- Goal #2 Determine what services should be provided needs assessment.
  - A. Determine approximately how many clients will require services.
  - B. Determine what types of services these clients will require from the point of view of service agencies, institutions and the clients themselves.
  - C. Determine the quantity of each type of service required.
- Goal #3 Determine what gaps currently exist in services and determine how these gaps can be filled.
  - A. Compare the findings of goal #1 with the findings of goal #2 and determine what types and amount of services are yet to be developed in order to meet goal #2.
  - B. Determine how these services should be developed, i.e., the development of additional agencies or the modification of existing ones.

- Goal #4 Assess the practices, policies and procedures of institutions that may be responsible for dysfunctional behavior.
  - A. Renew the policies, procedures and practices of major agencies that have responsibility for youth, i.e., police, courts, schools and welfare agencies.
  - B. Isolate those conditions that apparently elicit and support dysfunction.
  - C. Isolate those dysfunctional behaviors that are particularly bothersome to the above institutions.
- Goal #5 Determine what changes in polices and practices need to be undertaken and develop a strategy to facilitate that change (bearing in mind those efforts already underway to facilitate that change).
  - A. Taking each of the major institutions described in goal #4, describe what policies and practices that need to be changed.
  - B. Develop a strategy to facilitate the change in each of these agencies.
- - A. Describe whatever police, courts and community based diversionary efforts are currently being undertaken.
  - B. Determine the sources of referrals to the above diversion programs and what percentage is attributable to each source.
  - C. Determine what percentages of total clients served by each police, courts, schools and welfare agencies are diverted.
- Goal #7 Develop a strategy to increase diversionary efforts.
  - A. Reviewing the percentages of diversion described in goal #6, develop a strategy that would increase the percentage of clients that are diverted from the juvenile justice system.
- Goal #8 Completion of unfinished tasks, collection of data analysis, general recommendations, etc.



Appendix VII

Pending Changes

#### The Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act

For the past three years Senator Birch Bayh has introducted bills "to improve the quality of juvenile justice in the United States and to provide a comprehensive, coordinated approach to the problems of juvenile delinquency, and for other purposes." The bill is nearing final approval in Congress and is likely to be enacted in the near future. The main provisions of the bill include:

- The development of national guidelines for juvenile justice including the guaranteeing of rights to juveniles;
- 2. The establishment of the National Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention;
- 3. The provision of federal assistance to State and Local governments, and to public and private agencies for research, training, and service programs in the area of juvenile delinquency, and
- 4. The establishment of a National Institute for Juvenile Justice which would provide centralized research, serve as an information bank, and as a clearinghouse for information on juvenile delinquency programs.

Because of the comprehensive nature of the bill, it is bound to have a major impact on juvenile delinquency programs around the nation. The bill has a major emphasis on preventing delinquency and diverting juveniles from the juvenile justice system. Community-based programs are particularly emphasized, including programs to work with parents and other family members and the development of foster-care and shelter care homes, group homes, halfway houses, and similar programs. If the bill is enacted,

as it seems highly probable that it will be, several hundred thousand dollars will probably be available to programs in Florida.

### Social Services Amendments of 1974

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare recently drafted a bill to amend the Social Security Act by providing grants to states for services. The bill provides for the payment "to each State, for each quarter, an amount equal to 90 percent of the total expenditures during that quarter for the provision of family planning services and 75 percent of the total expenditures during that quarter for the provision of other services directed at the goal of --

- (A) achieving or maintaining economic self-support to prevent, reduce, or eliminate dependency;
- (B) achieving or maintaining self-sufficiency, including reduction or prevention of dependency;
- (C) preventing or remedying neglect, abuse, or exploitation of adults unable to protect their own interests or children;
- (D) preventing or reducing the more intensive forms of institutionalization by providing for community-based care, home-based care, or other forms of less intensive care;
- (E) securing referral and admission for institutional care when other forms of care are not appropriate,..."

Some of the services mentioned in the bill which are relevant to the present report include child care services, protective services for children and adults, services for children and adults in foster care, services relating to the management and maintenance of the home, and services to various types of handicapped people.

It should be emphasized that this bill is in draft form at this time, and may or may not be introduced into Congress.

#### The Florida Annual Action Plan for Criminal Justice 1974

The state Bureau of Criminal Justice Planning and Assistance in their annual action plan for 1974 break the reduction of crime into 1) the prevention of crime and 2) the control of crime. Of these, the prevention of crime (among youth) is relevant to the current report. Under prevention, the plan lists goals related to the reduction of crime-initialing conditions and the reduction of crime sustaining conditions. These goals are as follows:

- A. Reduction of Crime-Initiating Conditions
  - 1. Improve Personal Health Conditions
  - 2. Reduce Negative Peer, Environmental and Societal Pressures
  - 3. Improved Leisure Time Utilization
  - 4. Improved Occupational Opportunities/Readiness
  - 5. Deterrence
  - 6. Reduced Opportunity for Criminal Activity
  - 7. Reduction of Potential Gain from Criminal Activity
- B. Reduction of Crime Sustaining Conditions
  - 1. Personal Health Related Conditions/Responses
  - 2. Occupational Related Opportunities/Conditions/Responses
- 3. Socialization of Interpersonal Related Conditions/Responses
  Specific programs to meet some of these goals in various parts of the state
  are funded by LEAA and the State of Florida. However, no programs under
  these prevention goals are funded in Broward County for the aid of youth.
  The only funded program in Broward is to the City of Fort Lauderdale for
  the Victim Ombudsman Program. Several programs in Broward have been
  funded for the coming year to meet the control of crime objectives.

#### Broward County Charter Commission

County Charter Commission was conducting hearings to make recommendations for the revision of Broward County government. The Commission had several committees (Administrative; Transportation; Public Health and Safety; Municipalities/Special Districts; and Environmental, Planning, Building, Zoning and Recreation) and most of the committees were made up of task forces. The Committee Reports were submitted on July 19, 1974.

Most relevant to the present report, are the reports of the Law
Enforcement and Corrections Task Force and of the Health Services Task
Force both of the Public Health and Saftey Committee. The Health Services Task Force recommends the establishment of a Department of Human
Services. This department would have the following divisions: Housing;
Community Affairs; Bio-Environment Services, Mental Health, and Youth
Services. The Youth Services would be the existing County Division of
Youth Services.

The Law Enforcement and Corrections Task Forces recommends that local communities should be responsible for delinquency prevention, supervision of delinquents where no delinquency petition has been filed, and for diversionary activities for youth diverted from the juvenile justice system. They also recommend the establishment of a "central information center, possibly with neighborhood branches, to provide for a complete directory of services in Broward County—whether these services fall under state, local or private jurisdiction—to help juveniles with problems." Further, the task force recognized the need for the local coordination of juvenile services and recommends that ideally, a single agency should coordinate these programs. Additionally,

they recommend the use of a single phone number that can be used by both juveniles and their families when they need help.

Also relevant to the present report is the recommendation of the Environmental and Recreational Task Force that a department of Parks and Beaches be established and that they undertake a continuing study of all Broward County recreational needs (all leisure-time activities).

#
