
Finally, CYD is grateful to the many trainers around the country who participated in the interviews for this project, and who provided a context in which to understand training systems and the needs of youth workers.

INTRODUCTION

This directory is prepared to be a resource for the field. We cannot, of course, make judgements about the quality of any of the training organizations. However, we feel confident that the included training organizations, perhaps individually and certainly collectively, provide the types of training services appropriate for the vast array of youth serving programs. All of these organizations were nominated because of their reputation, and as discussed below, the vast majority of the organizations have experience working with "justice," "welfare," "community-based" and other youth-serving programs.

In selecting the organizations to be included in this directory, the purpose was to be neither exhaustive nor representative. Certainly there are additional organizations that provide training to youth workers that are not listed in this directory. There are many national youth-serving organizations, such as Boys & Girls Clubs of America, Big Brothers/Big Sisters of America, and Girls, Incorporated that provide training to their local affiliates, and other organizations as requested. In addition, American Humanics, Inc., in conjunction with colleges and universities across the country, operates a certificate program for educating students interested in careers in youth-oriented non-profit service organizations. Nevertheless, we sought to gain as broad a range of organizations as possible in terms of their "specialties" as they concern youth workers working with youth in high risk situations. It is possible that the directory will be reprinted in the future. If your organization is not presently included and you would like it to be, please contact the Center for Youth Development and Policy Research.

The organizations are listed in alphabetical order. There is an index at the end of the directory that lists the organizations by geographical region. The directory has been prepared to provide basic information about each training organization on two pages. On the first page, the organization and the services it provides are briefly described. Areas of expertise and regions served are also listed. The second page provides an overview of the topic areas in which the organization has trained. Areas that are checked represent the self-reports of the training organizations. It should be stressed that this information should be simply used as a guide for an interested person or program seeking service from a training organization. A quick review of the directory, for example, shows that some organizations reported expertise in almost all areas, and other organizations reported expertise in only a couple of areas. We are not in a position to interpret this information. Ultimately, the choice to engage a training organization is a complex and time-consuming process for organizations or for individual workers — a process that requires negotiation and the search for an appropriate "match." This directory is intended to expedite, but not circumvent that process.

The Center for Action on Coalition Development was given a start-up grant by the Kellogg Foundation in 1991 to help youth professionals on a national level mobilize their communities by working collaboratively with agencies, organizations, and citizens to help youth in the community. The primary audience is youth professionals rather than young people directly, and the goal is to help the professionals to become more effective in their work with youth.

The workshops focus on elements of coalition development including understanding community structure, communication issues, and issues of diversity.
