

INDEX CRIMES IN NEW YORK STATE DECREASED 9.2% FROM 1993 TO 1994

New York City reported a 9.7% decrease in index offenses, while index crimes in the sampled Non-New York City jurisdictions decreased 8.1%.

Among the Non-New York City jurisdictions, agencies in the 100,000 to 999,999 population group had a 8.1% decrease in index offenses, agencies in the 50,000 to 99,999 group decreased 6.4%, while the 25,000 to 49,999 group decreased 10.4%. Agencies with populations under 25,000 and multijurisdictional agencies decreased 7.9%.

The crime data in this bulletin are estimates based on Uniform Crime Reports (UCR) index crimes reported for 1994 and 1993 by law enforcement agencies that had submitted complete monthly reports as of September, 1994. The sampled agencies represent 84 percent of the total number of reporting agencies in the State. Populations are 1993 estimates based on data from the Federal Bureau of Investigation.




NEW YORK STATE UNIVERM CRIME REPORTING **CRIME INDEX OFFENSES: JANUARY - JUNE 1994 (ESTIMATES)**

VIOLENT CRIMES

- Violent crime decreased 8.1 percent statewide. Robbery, the most frequently » occurring violent crime in the State, experienced the largest decline (-10.5%) of the four violent crimes.
- New York City reported a decrease of 9.3 percent in violent crime and accounted » for 82 percent of the violent crimes in the sample. The sampled Non-New York City agencies showed a 2.4 percent decrease in violent crime. The largest decrease was reported from agencies in the 50,000 to 99,999 population group (-15.4%). The only group of agencies to report an increase in violent crime was the 100,000 to 999,999 population group (+1.7%). For that group of agencies, an increase was reported for each violent offense category except forcible rape.

PROPERTY CRIMES

- Property crime decreased 9.4 percent statewide. Larceny is the most frequently occurring property crime, with a frequency more than double that of any other property crime. Motor vehicle thefts experienced the largest decline (-13.4%) of the three property crimes.
- New York City reported a decrease of 9.8 percent in property crime and » accounted for 62 percent of the property crimes in the sample. The sampled Non-New York City agencies showed an 8.8 percent decrease in property crime. The largest decrease was reported from agencies in the 25,000 to 49,999 population group (-11.0%).
