
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

The State continues to experience unprecedented growth in its prison population, growing by 1,599 in calendar year 1991 and 762 in the first four months of 1992.

The public's response to combat crime in their community has driven this growth in incarcerated offenders. For the past two decades, we have adopted a national policy of punishing offenders well beyond our means. Increased penalties and mandatory sentences for all types of crimes — drug, property and violent — have resulted in increased admissions to prison. Many infractions have gone from felony classes for which probation was a possibility to higher felony classes with longer or mandatory prison sentences.

The information contained in this report can be used to further understand how the continued effects of increased criminal penalties have resulted in prison crowding. For example, there are now over 5,200 drug offenders in prison compared to only 534 in 1983. Residential burglary, which became a mandatory prison sentence in 1982, now accounts for 38% of all Class 1 sentences.

Pursuant to the requirements of Chapter 38, paragraph 1005-5-4.3, *Illinois Revised Statutes*, I present the 1991 Statistical Presentation.

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FOREWORD

The 1991 Statistical Presentation, prepared by the Illinois Department of Corrections, is published in compliance with the Unified Code of Corrections (Illinois Revised Statutes, Chapter 38, Section 1005-5-4.3). This report is intended to provide timely, reliable and comprehensive information to judges, their staffs and other interested parties. The data are for use in reviewing sentences under the Unified Code of Corrections and length of stay with the Department of Corrections.

In accordance with statute, this document reports data in terms of time served and sentences imposed by offense and offense class for the years 1978 through 1991. Data are reported by frequency, average (mean and median) and range. Time served represents stay with the Department of Corrections as well as total length of stay, which includes additional time spent in jail and other holding facilities. Comparisons of inmates sentenced under determinate sentencing can be made to those incarcerated under the previous indeterminate sentencing structure. Life, death and Sexually Dangerous Person sentence imposed data are reported. Sentences less than the minimum or more than the maximum, as outlined in determinate sentencing statutes, are reported. The number of inmates incarcerated as an Habitual Offender or Habitual Child Sex Offender, and those found Guilty But Mentally III, are also reported.

Beginning with the 1987 report, several tables were added in response to the changing pattern of inmates sentenced to the Illinois Department of Corrections. Sentence imposed and length of stay data are made available specifically for Class X and Class 2 Manufacture or Delivery of a Controlled Substance, Class 4 Possession of a Controlled Substance and Class 2 Auto Theft. Also, a table listing the types of consecutive sentences imposed has been added. Indeterminate sentence data are reported by year only; there has been a minimal number of such sentences imposed since 1978. Because of national concerns relating to the increasing arrest, prosecution, conviction, and imprisonment for drug offenders, a table had been added in 1988 to show the increasing incarceration of drug offenders.

All unusual cases are audited and reviewed. Any errors are corrected before data are reported. All data reported in this document fully conform to all state and federal laws and resolutions concerning the security, privacy and confidentiality of the materials.

INTRODUCTION

This document is divided into three sections which outline the key components of incarceration in the Illinois Department of Corrections. Data from 1978 to 1991 are reported by offense, offense class and sentence type, as well as by judicial circuit and district, and geographic region.

Part I, Impact on Population, addresses the important factors behind the increasing prison population in Illinois and why this trend is expected to continue. Increases in the Murder and Class X and 1 populations resulting from determinate sentencing can be noted. The impact of life, death and Sexually Dangerous Person sentences on the population can also be seen. Also, the changing Habitual Offender, Habitual Child Sex Offender and Guilty But Mentally III populations have been presented.

Part II, Length of Stay, notes the time inmates are serving in prison. In addition, the pace of releasing inmates sentenced under indeterminate sentencing can be seen. The impacts of the abolition of the forced release and misdemeanor admission policies are also shown.

Part III, Sentences Imposed, provides the data for sentencing patterns since 1978. Data for determinate and indeterminate, as well as life, death and Sexually Dangerous Person, sentences are provided. The number of extended and shortened sentences are also reported by offense. Median sentences for the major offenses are provided by judicial circuit and district, and geographic region in this section.

Part I: Impact on Population

PART I: Impact on Population

Summary

This section demonstrates how determinate sentencing contributes to the continuing increase in the prison population. At the end of 1977, the population was 10,982. The December 31, 1991 population was 29,115, an increase of over 165% in the past 14 years.

Figure 1 shows the rise in the adult prison population since 1970. Increases beginning in 1974 are attributed to the fact that more convicted felons were being sentenced to imprisonment than in earlier periods, and with longer sentences. The increase in population continued after determinate sentencing was implemented. It began to slow in the early 1980's when the forced release policy was in effect. A significant rise began once forced release was stopped.

The population increased by over 1,600 (6%) in 1991 after a jump of over 2,800 (11%) in 1990. This mirrors the slower rate of increase in incarcerating drug offenders as shown in Figure 2.

Determinate sentencing has not only resulted in an increase in the number of inmates, but has also slowed the rate of movement through prison. Table 1 shows that the number of inmates incarcerated for Murder, Class X or Class 1 offenses (the most serious offenders) increased by 14,299 since 1977, just prior to determinate sentencing. Figure 3 shows this 366% increase.

In 1977, these most serious offenders comprised 37 % of the population. By 1991, they made up 63% (Table 1).

These serious offenders are also serving more time in prison. Since 1978, the average length of stay for an inmate convicted of Murder rose 4.6 years. Class X inmates sentenced in 1991 are expected to serve 5.3 years in prison, 1.2 years longer than those released in 1978 (Table 2).

Inmates currently in prison, excluding community supervision violators, have an average of 3.8 years left to serve (Table 3). The 3,884 murderers without a life or death sentence will be in prison for 12 more years before their projected release date. For Class X offenders, 8,995 will be in prison for an average of 4.5 years. In addition, more of these serious, long-term offenders will be added to the population each year, with relatively few releases. Thus, there has been, and will continue to be, a "stockpiling" of these inmates in the prison population (Figure 4).

The stockpiling of Murder, Class X and Class 1 offenders is shown in Table 4 and Figure 4. Although few of the sentences imposed and admissions are for these most serious offenders, there are relatively few exits. Thus, they remain in prison and make up the largest percentage (63%) of the prison population.

On the other hand, Class 2, 3 and 4 offenders are serving less time in prison than in 1978. This group also represents a lower percentage in the population. In 1978, these

inmates made up 44 % of the population, and served an average of 2.7 years. By 1991, they comprised only 37% of the population, and should average 1.8 years (Tables 1 and 2). Class 4 offenders average six months in prison. The 2,371 Class 4 offenders released in 1991 cost the Department \$19 million.

Therefore, while Murder, Class X and Class 1 inmates will continue to increase in the population, Class 2, Class 3 and Class 4 inmates will comprise a relatively small proportion of the population due to relatively shorter time to serve.


There are 679 inmates remaining in prison who are serving an indeterminate sentence, with most having a long period of time before release (Table 5). They can only be released with permission of the Prisoner Review Board or the governor, or until the end of their sentence. With relatively few releases occurring each year, the most serious offenders should remain in prison for many years.

There is also a growing number of inmates who will never be released. The number of inmates with a life (533) or death (134) sentence continues to rise (up over 200% since 1983). The number of Sexually Dangerous Persons (60), who can only be released by court order, also continues to grow (Table 6 and Figure 5). The average age for these inmates (36.6 years) is over 6 years older than the average age of other inmates in prison at the end of 1991.

The number of inmates imprisoned as Guilty But Mentally III (GBMI) increased by six in 1991, to 154 (Figure 6).

The number of inmates sentenced to a natural life sentence under the habitual offender statute (83) increased by nearly 500% since 1983 (Figure 7). The number of these inmates continues to rise as offenders with three or more Class X offenses are prosecuted and sentenced as habitual offenders.

There were 11 Habitual Child Sex Offenders in prison at the end of 1987. The number rose another 46% in 1991, with 73 in prison at the end of the year (Figure 8).











The standard deviation is a measure of variability and is expressed in the same unit as the average time served and age (years). Adding one standard deviation and subtracting one standard deviation from the average yields a range which includes approximately 68 percent of the cases. A larger standard deviation indicates a wider range of time served and age.








in Prison Population 1983 - 1991





Part II: Length of Stay

PART II: Length of Stay

Summary

The number of exits grew by over 24% in 1991, following a 36% increase in 1990. For the second straight year, both the mean total time served and length of stay in prison for all adult felons released in 1991 decreased slightly over averages for the past five years (Table 7). This increase in exits and decrease in length of stay is associated mostly with the continued granting of 90 days of Supplemental MGT.

Seventy-two percent of the reported exits in 1991 were of Class 2, 3, and 4 offenders (Table 8). The total average length of stay (1.9 years) is driven by the higher proportion of these lower offense classes released from prison.

Because of the large percentage of inmates exiting for these lower class offenses, the majority of inmates (72%) serve less than two years. Over half (53%) serve less than one year in prison (Figures 9 and 10).

The number of exits increased for all offense classes in 1991. The highest percentage was for Class 1 offenses (37%). This increase is mainly attributed to the over 100% rise in exits for Manufacture or Delivery of a Controlled Substance. The average length of stay only increased for inmates sentenced for Murder (these inmates are not eligible for Supplemental MGT). Both time served and prison stay decreased for Class 1 and Class 2 offenses (Table 8).

The number of exits continues to decrease for Rape (Class X) and Voluntary Manslaughter (Class 1 and Class 2). Table 9 indicates that the average length of stay for these three offenses have increased because the statutes have been revised. Thus, inmates exiting under the old offenses were admitted prior to the statutory changes. Those with shorter sentences exited in previous years. Since the remaining cases have longer sentences, the mean has risen.

Average length of stay fell for most selected offenses in 1991 (Table 9). The Department will be experiencing shorter lengths of stay for these offenses due to the use of Supplemental MGT, which reduces the stay of some inmates by up to 90 days. Increases in time served were only noted for Murder and Attempted Murder.

The number of exits from determinate sentences rose by 24% in 1991. Both the overall average time served and prison stay declined by .2 years from 1990 (Table 10).

As more inmates go through the prison system for the revised Criminal Sexual Assault/ Abuse Offenses, their average length of stay continues to increase. For those inmates sentenced to Aggravated Criminal Sexual Assault (Class X), the average prison stay rose by .3 years in 1991, with the overall time served increasing by nearly 50% during the past four years. Increases also occurred for two other related statutes: Criminal Sexual Assault (Class 1) and Aggravated Criminal Sexual Abuse (Class 2). Their data are included in Table 14. However, the average stays are lower than those sentenced under the former Rape Statutes.

The most indeterminate cases (65) since 1985 were released by the Prisoner Review Board during 1991 after serving over 16 years (Table 11). Over 90% of the indeterminate releases were for inmates convicted of Murder and Class X offenses (Table 13).

The majority of inmates who remain in prison with an indeterminate sentence are incarcerated for Murder and Class X offenses (Table 5). Compare Tables 12 and 13 to note various lengths of stay by offense for determinate versus indeterminate sentences.

The offense with the most exits in 1991 was Burglary. The 1,825 released burglars served an average of 1.6 years. The next most often occurring offense was Class 4 Possession of a Controlled Substance, which also had over 1,000 releases in 1991. Table 14 lists the 25 most frequent offenses for inmates exiting in 1991, as compared to the number of cases and average length of stay for the previous two years. Drug and property offenses are the most prevalent.

During 1991, 506 inmates graduated from the Department's Impact Incarceration Program (IIP). These inmates served an average of 8 months total, with 6 months in the Department of Corrections. That 6 months includes time at a Reception and Classification Center, at the Shawnee Correctional Center awaiting intake to the IIP, and the 4-month stay at the boot camp facility. This length of stay was compared to inmates who met eligibility criteria for the IIP, but were not selected to participate. This similar group of inmates, totalling 5,055 exits in 1991, served 1.34 total years of incarceration. They served over twice as long in prison (1.01 years) as comparable inmates who served time in the IIP. (Table 15 and Figure 11).





Part III: Sentences Imposed

Summary

In 1991, the number of determinate sentences imposed rose by 8%, following a 21% increase in 1990, and a 31% rise in 1989. As opposed to the previous two years, the average overall sentence length increased in 1991 (Table 16).

Sentences within the ranges of determinate sentencing averaged 5.0 years in 1991. When including shortened and extended sentence lengths, the average rises to 5.3 years (Table 16).

The increase in average length of stay in 1991 is demonstrated by the increase in the percentage of 4 to 20 year sentences, and the decline in the percentage of 1 to 3 year sentences. The percentage of sentences over 21 years fell for the third year in a row (Table 17).

The number of determinate sentences imposed during 1991 continued to rise for all the classes of offenses, although not as much as in previous years. The largest increases were for Class X and Class 1 offenses, rising by 17% and 16%, respectively. However, as opposed to the other classes, mean sentence length decreased for these two offense classes (Table 18).

Manufacture or Delivery of a Controlled Substance (Class X), Voluntary Manslaughter (Class 1), Forgery, Theft (Class 3), and Possession of a Controlled Substance (Class 4) were the only major crimes to have a decline in the number of sentences imposed during 1991 (Table 19).

The number of Murder sentences (previous statute) declined in 1991, although the average sentence length increased by over 1.5 years. However, the new First Degree Murder offense continues to escalate in the number of sentences imposed.

The average sentence imposed for First Degree Murder (34.6 years) continues to be higher than those sentences imposed under the previous murder statute. This is because 29% of the First Degree Murder sentences were over 40 years, which had been the maximum sentence for the previous murder statute.

The 93 Attempted First Degree Murder sentences imposed during 1991 averaged (14.2 years) nearly one year higher than the averages for Attempted Murder sentences imposed during the previous years under the old statute.

The number of sentences imposed for two of the major drug offenses fell in 1991. The number of sentences imposed for Manufacture or Delivery of a Controlled Substance (Class X) fell by 6%, but the average sentence rose by .4 years. For Possession of a Controlled Substance (Class 4), the number declined by 3%, also with this average sentence increasing (Table 19).

Highest increase in the number of sentences imposed were for Armed Robbery, Attempted Murder, Attempted First Degree Murder (all Class X offenses), and for the other Class X, Class 1 and Class 2 offenses. All rose by 20% or higher from 1990.

Lowest increases in the number of sentences imposed for major offenses were for Burglary, Manufacture or Delivery of Controlled Substance (Class 2), Aggravated Battery, Other Class 3, and Other Class 4 offenses. All rose by less than 10% from 1990.

The average sentence length dropped for most Class X offenses, with Manufacture or Delivery of a Controlled Substance being the only exception. Slight increases were seen for Burglary, Motor Vehicle Theft (Class 2), Aggravated Battery, Theft (Class 3), and Possession of a Controlled Substance (Class 4) (Table 19).

Indeterminate sentences continue to be imposed for offenders who committed crimes before 1978. Tables 20 and 21 indicate that four indeterminate sentences were imposed in 1991 for two offenders. The offenses included two for Manufacture or Delivery of a Controlled Substance (Class X), and one each for Bail Bond Violation (Class 2) and Manufacture or Delivery of a Controlled Substance (Class 2). Since 1978 over 200,000 determinate prison sentences have been imposed in Illinois.

Three percent of the 1991 sentences were less than the minimum (Table 22). Most sentences which were less than the minimum were imposed for a variety of Drug (57%) and Theft (27%) offenses. The offenses which received reduced sentences have been consistent over the past few years. Sixty-one percent turned out to be the holding offense at admission. The others were associated with another offense(s) which was the holding sentence at admission (Table 23).

Five percent of all sentences imposed in 1991 were for extended terms. There were 52 extended sentences for Murder, representing 13% of all Murder sentences imposed in 1991 (Table 22). Such sentences are imposed for crimes with heinous or aggravating circumstances.

Over one-third of the extended sentences were for crimes against a person, including Murder, Aggravated Criminal Sexual Assault/Abuse, Aggravated Battery, Robbery, Armed Robbery, and Unlawful Use of a Weapon. Some were imposed for property and drug offenses. Eighty-four percent were imposed for the lower Class 2, 3, and 4 offenses. Only 44% were actually the holding offense (Table 24).

The 1,069 admissions with a holding offense consecutive to other offense(s) was 6.3% of all court admissions in 1991. The number of consecutive sentences decreased for most offense classes in 1991 (Table 25).

Over the past three years, a major reason for the increasing prison population had been the rise in sentences and admissions for drug offenses. However, in 1991, the number of drug sentences imposed began to level. There had been a 300% increase in the number of drug sentences imposed from 1987 to 1990 (Table 26 and Figure 12). In 1991, there was only an 8% increase in drug sentences, with a slight increase in the average sentence.

The majority (79%) of drug sentences are for offenders from Cook County. However, drug sentences are nearly one-half year higher when imposed downstate. The number of drug offenders admitted to IDOC showed a similar pattern as sentences imposed, increasing by 250% from 1987 through 1990, then only by 9% from 1990 to 1991 (Table 27 and Figure 13). For those admitted for a drug offense, the average sentence returned to a 4.1 year mean.

After burglary, three of the top four offenses for which sentences were imposed in 1991 were drug offenses (Table 28). Drug sentences comprised 30% of all sentences handed down in 1991.

Other offenses for which sentences were imposed most often were Motor Vehicle Theft, Armed Robbery, Residential Burglary, Robbery, Theft, and Aggravated Battery (Table 28).

When examining sentencing patterns among judicial circuits and districts in 1991, many of the following characteristics continue to remain consistent with past years.

The number of Murder sentences for offenses committed before July 1, 1987 declined again in 1991, while the number of sentences imposed for First Degree Murder is rising. Cook County imposed over 92% of the Murder sentences in 1991, with a median in the middle among the other judicial districts (Table 30). Each judicial district levied less than 10 Murder sentences.

On the other hand, 36% of the First Degree Murder sentences were assessed downstate. The downstate average sentence was higher than in Cook County (Table 31). Only the 20th Judicial Circuit (St. Clair and surrounding counties) imposed over 10 sentences. Median rankings among districts were similar to those First Degree Murder sentences imposed before 1991.

Overall, as in 1990, Cook County imposed over 77% of the Class X sentences in 1991. Sentences were lower if imposed in Cook County. Class X sentences continue to be higher in the Central and Southern Districts (Tables 32 to 36). 1991 rankings among districts correspond to those imposed in previous years.

Residential Burglary accounted for 38% of all Class 1 sentences handed down during 1991. Median sentences ranged from 4.0 to 6.0 years among judicial circuits and averaged 5.0 years across the districts (Table 37).

Other Class 1 sentences averaged 5.0 years among downstate districts, but had a lower median of 4.0 years in Cook County. The highest Class 1 sentence was 6.5 years in the 5th Circuit located in east central Illinois (Table 38).

Cook County assessed over 71% of the Class 2 sentences. Statewide, 35% of Class 2 sentences were for Burglary. Burglary sentences ranged between 3.0 and 4.0 years across the state. Only the Northern District had lower than a 4.0 year median. Only 192 Robbery sentences were imposed downstate, with two circuits imposing none and 10 others reporting eight or less (Tables 39 and 40).

Auto Theft continues to be used exclusively in Cook and the Northern Judicial District, and range from 3.0 to 7.0 years. Class 2 drug sentences are also primarily levied in the northern districts, but the highest median is in the 4th Circuit in Southern Illinois. The remaining Class 2 offenses comprise less than 10% of all Class 2 sentences imposed in 1991 (Tables 41 through 43).

Cook County imposed less Aggravated Battery, Forgery and Theft (Class 3) sentences than downstate again in 1991 (Tables 44 to 46). Cook County sentences were among the highest assessed for Aggravated Battery (4.0 years), along with the 8th (Adams and other west central counties) and 15th (extreme northwestern counties) Circuits. Forgery and Theft sentences were lowest in Cook County.

The majority (74%) of Other Class 3 offenses, which include Unlawful Use of a Weapon by a Felon, Retail Theli, and other property and drug crimes, were imposed in Cook County (Table 47).

Over 78% of the Class 4 Possession of a Controlled Substance sentences were handed down in Cook County during 1991 (Table 48). Their average was lower than the rest of the state. Lowest sentences were imposed in the 13th Circuit (northcentral portion of the state) while highest sentences were assessed in the 1st (extreme southern Illinois) and 5th (east central counties) Circuits.

In contrast, less than 27% of the remaining Class 4 offenses were from Cook County. There was a wide range of sentences among the judicial circuits for the Class 4 crimes (Table 49).

Appendix B: Definitions and Data Interpretation

General Methodology

Each offense presented in this report is followed by a reference to the class of offense as categorized in the Illinois Criminal Sentencing Code. All offenses have been converted to the new offense categories enacted with determinate sentencing legislation as of February 1, 1978.

Voluntary Manslaughter was upgraded from a Class 2 to a Class 1 offense in 1982; data beginning in 1983 report it as a Class 1 offense. Data for Residential Burglary were added when it became a mandatory prison sentence in 1983. On July 1, 1984, the Illinois Criminal Sexual Assault Act took effect, replacing Rape and associated offenses with Aggravated Criminal Sexual Assault. On January 1, 1985, a Class 2 Motor Vehicle Theft offense became effective. The effects of these statutory changes are shown in the report. Class X and Class 2 Manufacture/ Delivery of a Controlled Substance, Aggravated Criminal Sexual Assault, Class 2 Motor Vehicle Theft, and Class 4 Possession of a Controlled Substance determinate sentence cases were added to the tables in 1987.

Effective July 1, 1987, Murder was changed to First Degree Murder (Chapter 38, Section 9-1), Attempted Murder was renamed Attempted First Degree Murder (Chapter 38, Section 8-4-c-1) and Voluntary Manslaughter was changed to Second Degree Murder (Chapter 38, Section 9-2) (Public Act 84-1450). Changes were also made in the definition of the First Degree Murder and Second Degree Murder offenses. For First Degree Murder, the maximum sentence was increased from 40 years to 60 years; the extended term was lengthened from 80 years to 100 years. Attempted First Degree Murder remains a Class X offense and Second Degree Murder remains a Class 1 offense. These new offenses are reported beginning with 1987 data.

In addition to the arithmetic mean, the median is often included as a measure of average length of stay. The mean is defined as the arithmetic average of the raw data. It is calculated by summing the lengths of stay for all cases and dividing by the total number of cases. The median is the measurement where exactly 50 percent of the scores lie below that length and 50 percent are above it. The mean is affected by extremely low or high stays. A large percentage of low stays will produce a mean greater than the median. This is true for most length of stay comparisons. Conversely, a large percentage of high lengths of stay produces a mean less than the median. When the mean and median are equal, the distribution of sentences is symmetrical, i.e., sentences both greater than and less than the average are distributed evenly. The few extreme minimum and maximum length of stay cases discussed above have little effect on the mean and no effect on the median.

During 1988, the Department converted its Correctional Institution Management Information System (CIMIS) to a new Offender Tracking System (OTS). OTS is a more efficient, larger data base with better tracking capabilities to provide more effective management information. The data purification during conversion may have caused some differences in 1988 through 1991 data not present in earlier figures.

There was also a change in the use of the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS) in 1990. SPSS Release 4, a product of SPSS, Inc., was used in the 1990 and 1991 reports. SPSS-X (Version 2.1) had been used to calculate statistics in the 1988 and 1989 reports. Prior to 1988, SPSS (Version 9.7) was used. Some changes in the internal formulas may make slightly different calculations for the median and length of prison stay.

Part I Impact on Population

A case is a record of time in years an inmate served in prison. Where an offender served time for more than one offense, time served is for the holding offense. The holding offense is the offense which holds the inmate in Illinois Department of Corrections custody for the longest period of time.

For Tables 1 and 4, prison population numbers and percentages include all inmates incarcerated on December 31, 1977 and 1991. For Tables 3, 5, and 6 time served data are for the adult population as of December 31, 1983 through 1991.

For cases in Table 3 and for admissions and exit data in Table 4, only cases admitted from court are included. Inmates returned for a technical violation of Mandatory Supervised Release (MSR) are not included. Only cases with a determinate sentence and cases originally sentenced with an indeterminate sentence which opted for a set release date are included. Life, death and Sexually Dangerous Person (SDP) cases are excluded from Table 3.

The data in Table 5 represent cases sentenced with an indeterminate or indeterminate day-for-day sentence. Indeterminate cases which were received from court are included; cases returned as a technical violator of parole are excluded. Cases given an indeterminate life sentence before February 1978 or were on bond on December 31, 1991 are not counted as cases in Table 5. Time projected to be served and time left to serve could not be calculated because release can only be granted by the Prisoner Review Board or the Governor. This type of release date cannot be predetermined.

For Table 6, the cases represent inmates incarcerated with a life, death or SDP sentence at the end of December 1983 through 1991. Sentences imposed both before and after determinate sentencing are included. The number of each will not total the previous year total plus admissions for that year because of vacated sentences, remanded sentences, deaths, or releases. Projected time to be served could not be calculated because some cases will never be released (death and life without parole sentences) or release dates are unknown (SDP and life with parole).

Average time served represents the arithmetic mean. Standard deviations are also included in Table 6.

Part II Length of Stay

In the length of stay tables, a case is a record of the cumulative time an inmate spent in prison, jail, or other holding facilities. In situations where an offender served time for more than one offense, the length of stay data are for the holding offense. The holding offense is the offense which holds the inmate in Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) custody for the longest period. All types of exits from prison, including release to parole or Mandatory Supervised Release (MSR), expiration of sentence discharge, death, court-ordered discharge, reversal, and reversal and remanded sentence, are reported. Release data of Sexually Dangerous Persons are also included.

Length of stay data are for two time periods. "Time Served" is comprised of time spent in jail, mental health custody, juvenile facility, on probation etc. for which the offender received credit on the sentence, plus time in prison. "Prison Stay" refers just to the time spent in IDOC adult facilities. The data are broken out by three categories: all cases of adult felons, determinate cases, and indeterminate cases. For offenders released to parole or MSR who are revoked and returned to prison, the additional time spent completing the original sentence is not included in the length of stay calculation.

Some unusual minimum and maximum lengths of stay may be noted in Tables 7 to 13. These cases were identified and their files were examined to find the causes. For example, some extremely short lengths of stay were results of inmates who died in the institution or had their sentences reversed. Extremely short minimum prison stays occurred for inmates who served a large percentage of their sentence in jail due to such circumstances as continuances and illness. Large differences between total time served and prison stay can be attributed to credit for time served on probation, in a mental health center, juvenile facility, TASC or other community drug program, or prison in another state. Some extremely long lengths of stay resulted from inmates who were released on bond or writ and were not cleared until the year of exit, who received a consecutive term for a crime committed in prison (escape, drug possession, aggravated battery, etc.) and had to serve extra time, or who received extensive good time revocations. All of these situations were rare and legitimate, and were included to be consistent with previous years.

Two length of stay tables have been added in the 1991 report. The offenses presented in Tables 9, 12 and 13 were selected prior to 1983 as the most relevant at the time. Since, however, offenses occurring more often have appeared. This has been a result of new laws in Illinois (Criminal Sexual Assault, Residential Burglary, Class 2 Motor Vehicle Theft, Unlawful Use of a Weapon, etc.), changes in the statutes (revised Manufacture or Delivery of a Controlled Substance statutes), or more use of prison sentences (Retail Theft, Driving with a Suspended License). Since it is difficult to add some of these offenses to the selected offenses tables, a new format was developed to present the most occurring offenses and comparing the number of cases and measures of central tendency (mean and standard deviation) over the past three years (Table 14). Offenses are in rank order for inmates released in 1991.

In addition, the influence of the Impact Incarceration Program (IIP) on length of stay can now be presented. The IIP opened on October 15, 1990, with the first graduation taking place on February 12, 1991. The affects of the program on length of stay for inmates released in 1991, as compared to a group of inmates who meet IIP criteria but were not selected to participate, is presented in Table 15 and Figure 11.

During 1988, the Department converted its Correctional Institution Management Information System (CIMIS) to a new Offender Tracking System (OTS). OTS is a more efficient, larger data base with better tracking capabilities which provides more management information. The data purification during conversion may have caused some differences in 1988 through 1991 data not present in earlier data.

PART III Sentences Imposed

In Section III of this report, a sentence represents any case in which a sentence is imposed for an offense. Thus, the number of sentences imposed, not the number of offenders, is being reported. The cases categorized by year are based on the dates offenders are sentenced to the Department of Corrections, not necessarily the date they are received by the Department.

For Tables 16 through 21, the average sentence represents reported cases within that offense category for that year excluding life, death, and Sexually Dangerous Person (SDP) sentences. For Tables 18 and 19, the averages represent the mean sentence length. For Tables 16, 18 and 19, in addition to the mean, the median is reported as a measure of average sentence for 1983 to 1991 data.

Data reported in the top of Table 16 and in Tables 18 and 19 do not reflect sentences which fall outside of the range specified for each class (Illinois Revised Statutes, Chapter 38, Section 1005-8-1). Judges may impose a sentence up to twice the maximum range (Section 1005-8-2) for cases which reflect factors in aggravation (Section 1005-5-3.2) or may minimize a sentence of imprisonment for cases with mitigating circumstances (Section 1005-5-3.1). Interpretation of sentence data for cases less than the minimum must take into account that, if the court does not specify the class of crime for drug offenses, the highest class of crime is entered until the courts clarify the information. Compare the top and bottom of Table 16 to note the difference in overall sentence lengths when shortened and extended sentences are calculated.

Table 22 summarizes all sentences imposed from 1978 to 1991 by offense class, including those which fall into the range, extended sentences and those less than the minimum. Tables 23 and 24 report the specific offenses for both sentences imposed and admissions for 1991 which were less than the minimum and greater than the maximum. A case is counted as an admission only if the listed offense was the holding offense.

Court admissions for which the holding offense was a consecutive sentence are reported in Table 23. They are listed by offense class for the years 1984 to 1991. In Table 27, only court admissions for holding drug offenses are included.

One sentence imposed table (Table 28) has been added to the 1991 report. As with length of stay tables, the offenses presented in Tables 19, and 30 through 49, were selected prior to 1983 as the most relevant at that time. Since, however, sentences for offenses occurring more often have been imposed. Thus, a new table was developed to present the most occurring offenses for which sentences have been imposed in 1991. All sentences, including those outside of the sentencing ranges, are included. Also provided in Table 28 are measures of central tendency (mean and standard deviation) and the number of admissions for crimes which were the holding offense. The other sentences were imposed but were in conjunction with another sentence that was for the holding offense, which would have an equal or longer sentence for an equal or higher class of crime.

In Tables 30 to 49, median determinate sentences imposed in 1991 are reported by judicial circuit and district, and geographic region. Only those sentences which fall into the range established by statute are reported. The purpose of these tables is to aid judges and other court administrators to discern sentencing patterns within their jurisdiction. These tables should be interpreted as comparisons among circuits and districts of median sentence lengths and the number imposed in relation to other jurisdictions within Illinois. Rankings (lowest to highest) for similar sentences imposed from 1984 through 1990 are included to compare sentencing patterns across the state for the past seven years. Attention should also be given to the number of sentences imposed when making comparisons. The number of ties in the rankings of some Class 2, 3 and 4 offenses indicates a similarity among circuits and districts over time. A list (Table 29) and maps (Figures

15 and 16) of circuits and districts by county precede the tables.

As of July 1, 1983, misdemeanants could no longer be sentenced to the Department of Corrections as the holding (longest sentence) offense. Misdemeanor sentences imposed after this date are consecutive or concurrent with a felony which incarcerates the inmate in the Department of Corrections. The number of cases reported after 1983 is considerably greater than in previous years. The primary reason for this improvement is that in 1983 the Planning and Research Unit, in cooperation with the Data Processing Section, began developing audited monthly admission and exit data files. This approach decreased the probability of missing cases and increased data reliability.

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
