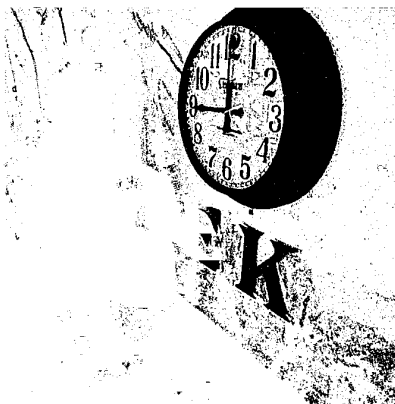

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PREFACE

California Prisoners and Parolees, 1992, is a presentation of statistical data about felons, civil narcotic addicts and other populations under the jurisdiction of the California Department of Corrections (CDC). Statistical data on felons in CDC have been published since 1950 when the first issue of *California Prisoners*, covering the years 1945 through 1949, was released. Statistical data on civil narcotic addicts have been published since 1967 when the first issue of *Summary Statistics, Civil Commitment Program for Narcotic Addicts*, covering the years 1961 through 1966, was published. Beginning in 1981, the two were combined into one publication.

This publication is organized into seven chapters with a Data Section containing information on different types of populations under CDC jurisdiction. Within each chapter, summary data are illustrated through descriptive text, charts, and graphs recording trends and providing comparisons of the constantly changing CDC population. More in-depth information for each chapter is provided in the tables located in the Data Section. These tables are referenced throughout the text as the source for charts and graphs. The last section of the book is the Reference Guide. The Reference Guide provides a list of prisons by name and location; maps identifying counties, areas of commitment, and parole regions; and a glossary of terms and acronyms used throughout the publication.

The Director of Corrections administered twenty-four institutions, four parole regions, and thirty-eight camps during 1992. The types of commitments received by CDC are Felons, Civil Narcotic Addicts, County Diagnostic Cases (under Penal Code Section 1203.03), some Youth Authority commitments, federal prisoners, and prisoners from other states. This publication contains only a portion of the data available in report format. TOTAL CDC POPULATION

HIGHLIGHTS

On December 31, 1992, the California Department of Corrections' population was 212,886.

On December 31, 1992, there were 86,389 felons and civil narcotic addicts on parole in California, a 4.6% increase from 1991.

The institution population at the end of the year was 109,496. This was a 7.6% increase from December 31, 1991.

There were 40,158 felon new admissions to CDC during calendar year 1992.

The bed design capacity of CDC institutions on December 31, 1992 was 53,459. The institution population was 186.6% of the design capacity.

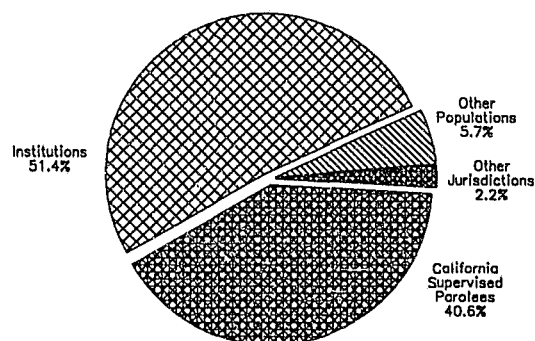
TOTAL CDC POPULATION

The total California Department of Corrections' (CDC) population reached a high of 212,886 on December 31, 1992.

- The institution population included:
 - 103,667 in the institutions and camps.
 - 5,396 in Community Correctional Centers.
 - 433 in the Department of Mental Health (DMH) State Hospitals.
- The California supervised parole population included:
 - 84,211 California felons and civil narcotic outpatients.
 - 2,178 parolees from other states being supervised in California through the Interstate Compact Agreement (Cooperative Cases).
- There were 4,772 California offenders supervised by other jurisdictions, including:
 - 2,733 inmates and parolees supervised by federal, juvenile, and other state jurisdictions.
 - 2,039 California parolees supervised under the jurisdiction of other states.
- Other populations totaling 12,229, included:
 - 1,371 felons and civil addicts temporarily released to other jurisdictions.
 - 571 inmates on escape status.
 - 10,287 felons and civil addicts who absconded from parole supervision (PALs/RALs).

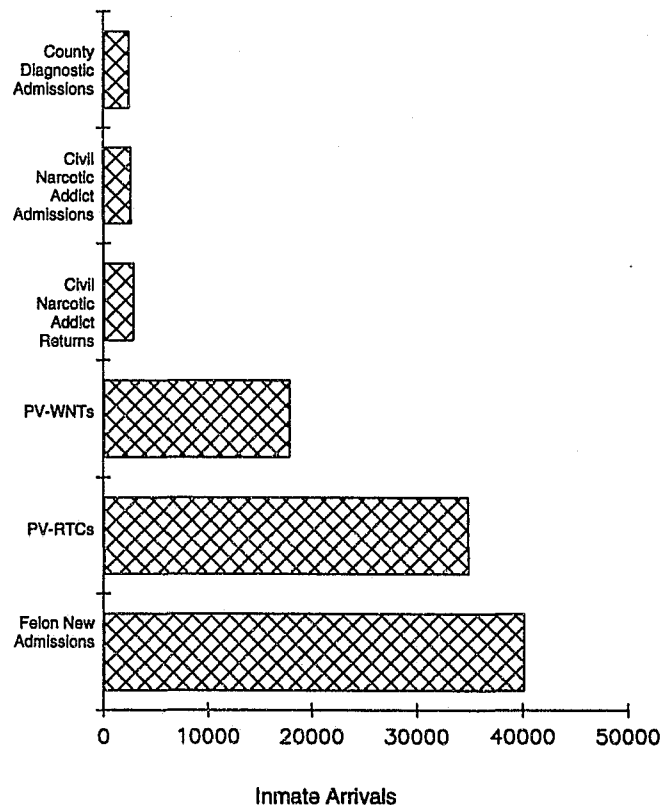

INSTITUTION ARRIVALS

During calendar year 1992, there were 334,851 inmate arrivals at institutions. Of these 218,551 were CDC institution transfers.

- Admissions accounted for 45,779. There were:
 - 40,158 felon new admissions.
 - 472 admissions of safekeepers.
 - 2,662 civil narcotic addict admissions.
 - 17 admissions from Federal jurisdiction, California Youth Authority (CYA) and Other States.
 - 2,470 county diagnostic cases.
- Parole returns accounted for 55,775. There were:
 - 34,932 parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTCs) (including those pending revocation hearings) for violations of parole conditions.
 - 17,939 parole violators returned with new terms (PV-WNTs).
 - 2,904 civil narcotic addict outpatient returns.
- 354 CYA parole returns.
- 441 were returned from other jurisdictions (federal, other state or CYA).
- Returns from temporary releases (court, jail, hospital/medical or other) accounted for 13,261.
- 656 were returned from escape status.

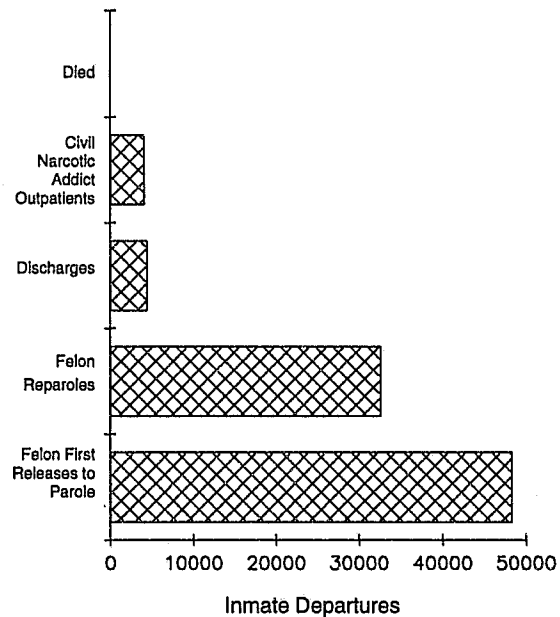

INSTITUTION DEPARTURES

During calendar year 1992, there were 327,068 departures from CDC institutions, including 218,551 institution transfers and:

- 85,163 offenders who paroled, of these:
 - 48,360 were felons first released to parole.
 - 32,661 felons who were reparaoled.
 - 4,139 civil narcotic addicts who were released to outpatient status.
 - 3 offenders that were released to other states to serve their parole period.
- 121 releases to CYA parole.
- 4,480 discharges.
- 137 offenders who died.
- 69 releases to other jurisdictions to serve their prison term (federal, other states, and CYA).
- 17,289 who were temporarily released for medical treatment, court appearance, jail or other type of departures.

HIGHLIGHTS

The California Department of Corrections' institution population on December 31, 1992 was 109,496.

The December 31, 1992 CDC institution population increased 7.6% from December 31, 1991.

Violent offenders accounted for 42.9% of the institution population on December 31, 1992.

On December 31, 1992, the White racial/ethnic group represented 28.5% of the felon institution population and 41.0% of the civil narcotic addict population.

During calendar year 1992, the first execution was carried out since the death penalty was reenacted in 1977.

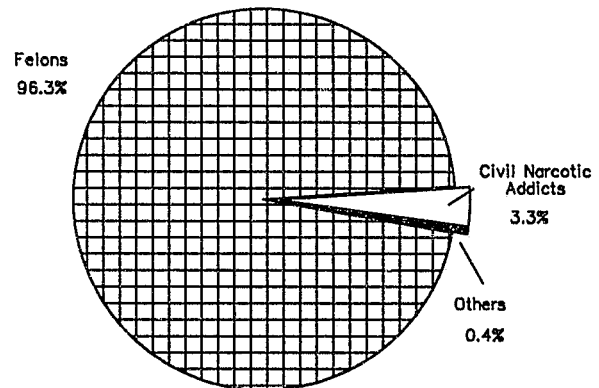

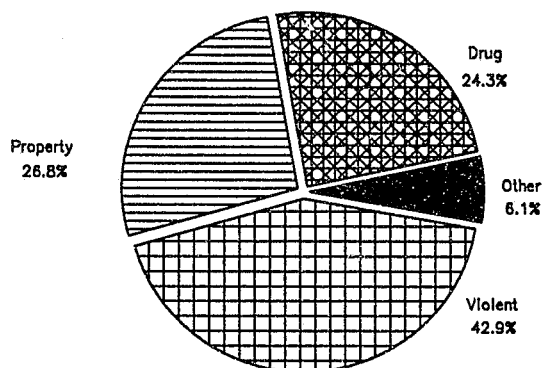

INSTITUTION POPULATION OFFENSE CATEGORIES

Violent offenders represented the largest offense category for the institution population on December 31, 1992.

- Violent Offenses accounted for 46,294 (42.9%) of the institution population.
- 28,862 (26.8%) were Property Offenders.
- Drug Offenses accounted for 26,156 (24.3%) of the institution population.
- Other Offenses made up the remaining 6,528 (6.1%).

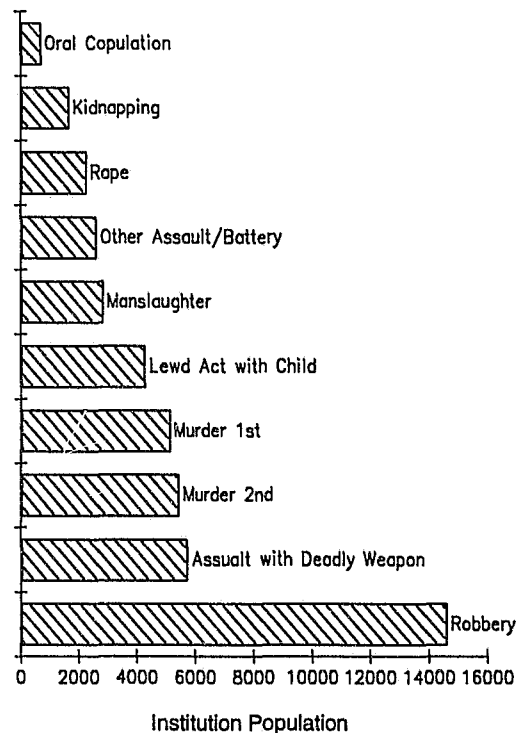

INSTITUTION POPULATION VIOLENT OFFENSES

42.9% of the institution population on December 31, 1992 were committed for violent offenses.

- Homicides accounted for 13,649 (12.7%). There were:
 - 5,153 (4.8%) Murder First inmates.
 - 5,457 (5.1%) Murder Second inmates.
 - 2,861 (2.7%) Manslaughter inmates.
 - 178 (0.2%) Vehicular Manslaughter inmates.
- Robbery accounted for 14,628 (13.6%) of the population. This represented the largest group of violent offenses.
- Assault with Deadly Weapon accounted for 5,741 (5.3%) of the population.
- Other Assault/Battery accounted for 2,620 (2.4%).
- Sex Offenses accounted for 7,976 (7.4%) of the CDC institution population. There were:
 - 2,285 (2.1%) incarcerated for Rape.
 - 4,305 (4.0%) incarcerated for Lewd Act with Child.
 - 718 (0.7%) Oral Copulation offenses.
 - 197 (0.2%) incarcerated for Sodomy offenses.
 - 244 (0.2%) for Penetration with Object.
 - 227 (0.2%) for Other Sex offenses.
- Kidnapping accounted for 1,680 (1.6%) of the population.

December 31, 1992



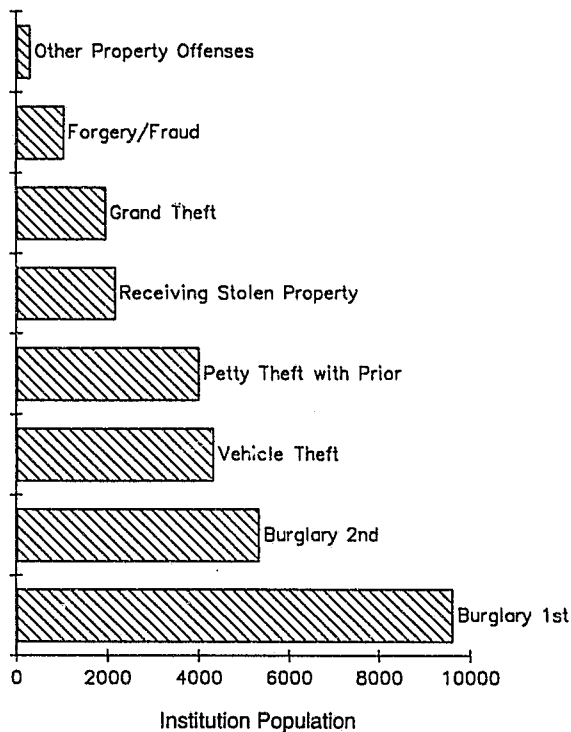

INSTITUTION POPULATION PROPERTY OFFENSES

Those incarcerated for property offenses accounted for 26.8% of the population at the end of 1992.

- Burglary First and Burglary Second accounted for 14,972 (13.9%). These were the two largest groups of property offenses. There were:
 - 9,625 (8.9%) in prison for Burglary First.
 - 5,347 (5.0%) in prison for Burglary Second.
- Vehicle Theft was the next largest property offense, accounting for 4,332 (4.0%).
- Petty Theft with Prior accounted for 4,020 (3.7%).
- Receiving Stolen Property accounted for 2,180 (2.0%).
- Grand Theft accounted for 1,976 (1.8%) of the population.
- Forgery/Fraud accounted for 1,065 (1.0%) offenders.
- Other Property Offenses accounted for 317 (0.3%).

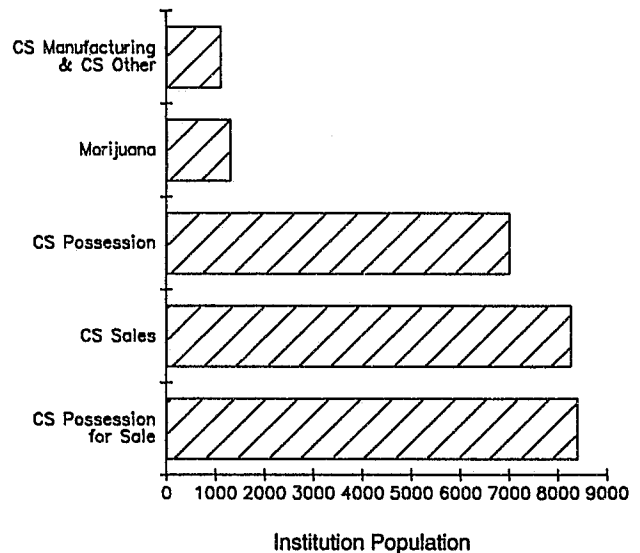
Drug offenders accounted for 26,156 (24.3%) of those in CDC prisons on December 31, 1992.

- Controlled Substance (CS) Possession accounted for 7,018 (6.5%) of those incarcerated.
- CS Possession for Sale accounted for 8,411 (7.8%).
- Offenders with the offense of CS Sales accounted for 8,281 (7.7%).
- CS Manufacturing and CS Other offenders accounted for 1,126 (1.1%).
- Marijuana offenders accounted for 1,320 (1.3%).

Institution Population Drug Offenses

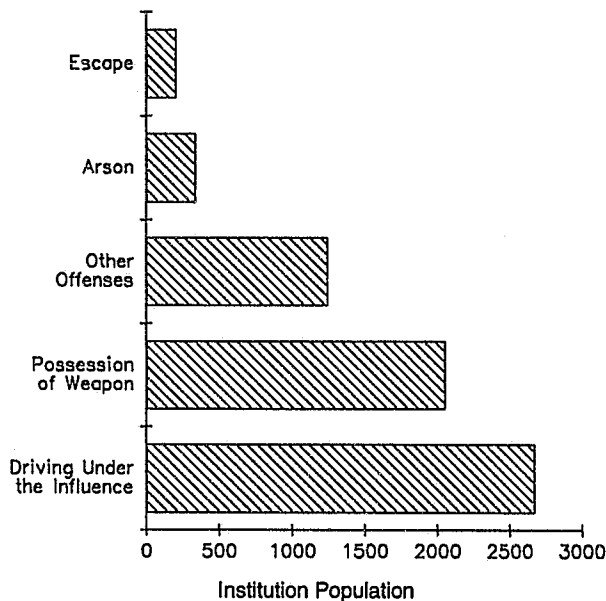

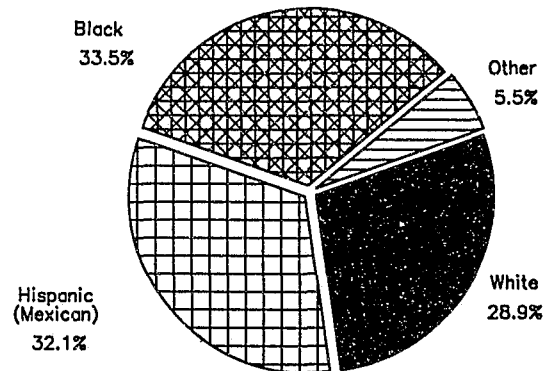

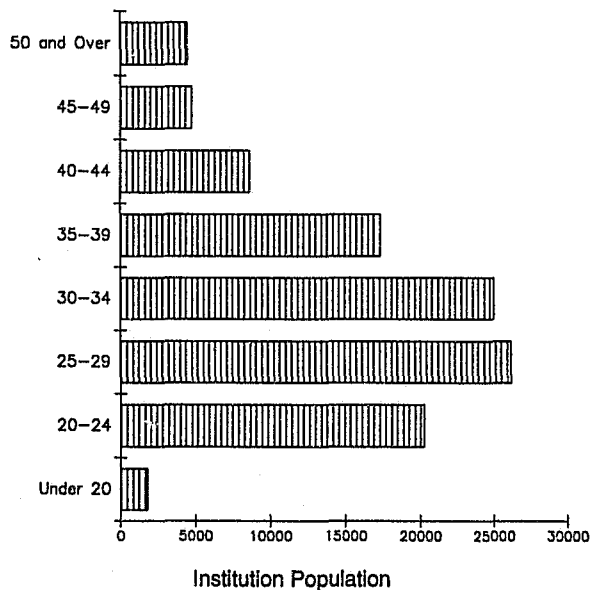

- The second largest age group, the 30 to 34 year old group, accounted for 24,993 (22.8%) of the institution population.

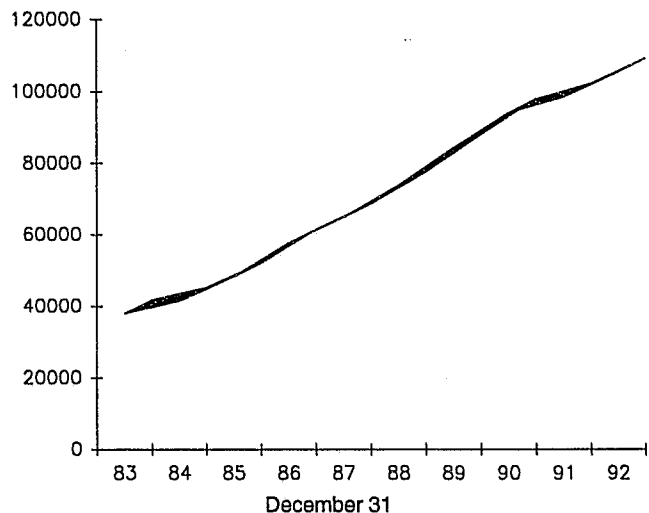

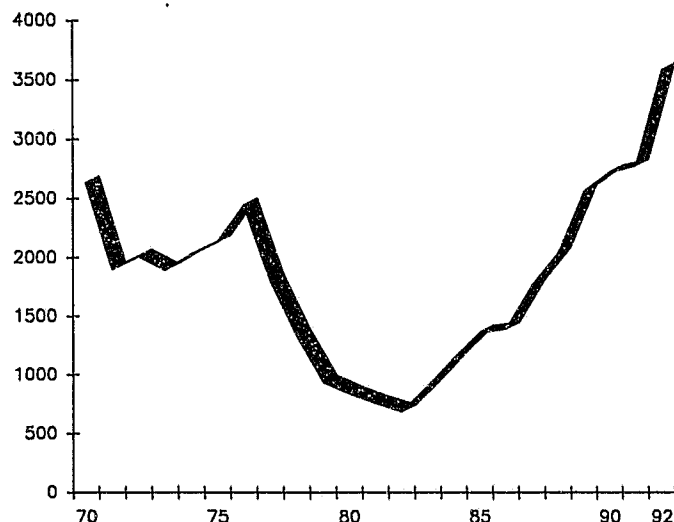

On December 31, 1992, the California Department of Corrections' civil narcotic addict (CNA) institution population was 3,586. There were:

- 2,862 (79.8%) males.
- 724 (20.2%) females.
- The CNA population increased 807 (29.0%) during 1992.

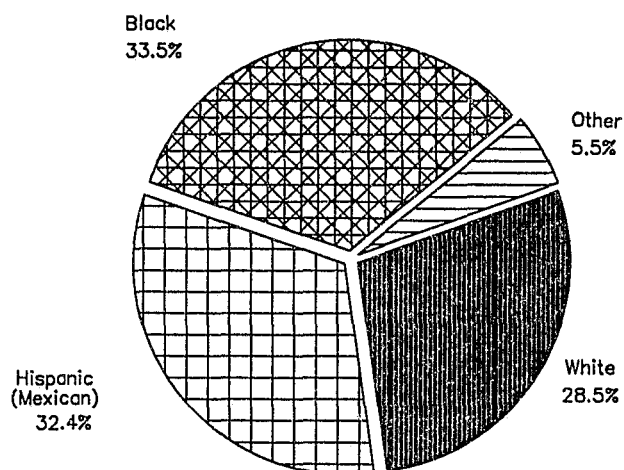

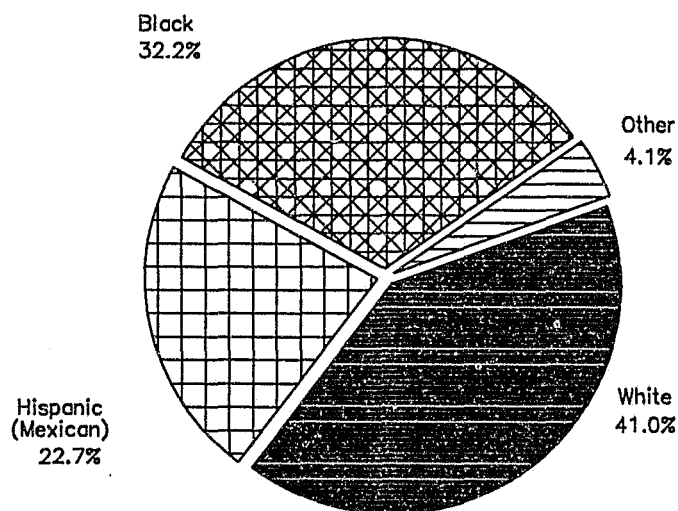
Felon Institution Population

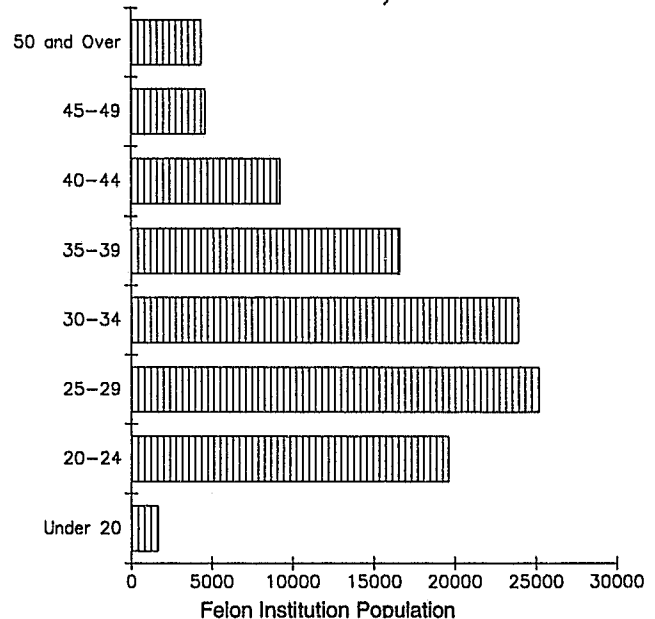

Felon Institution Population Age Groups

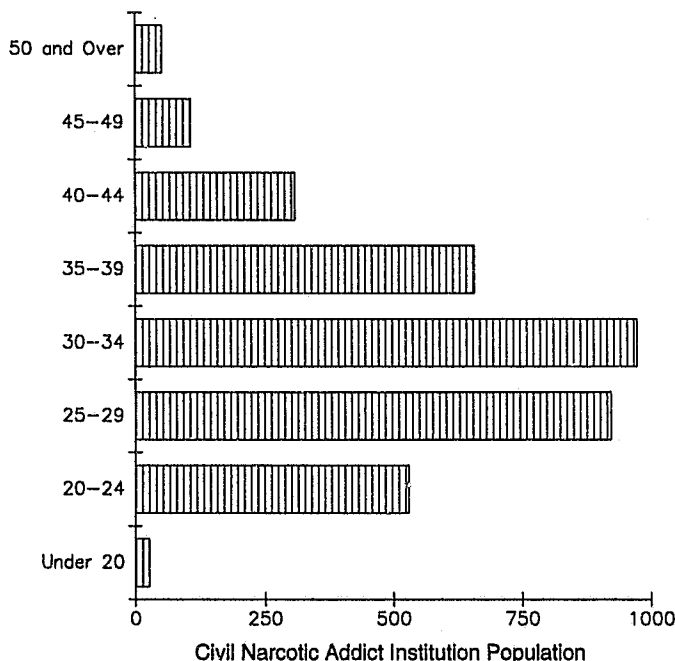
December 31, 1992

CIVIL NARCOTIC ADDICT INSTITUTION POPULATION AGE GROUPS

- The largest age group in prison was 30 to 34 years old. This group represented 974 (27.2%) of the CNA population.
- The second largest age group was the 25 to 29 year old group, accounting for 924 (25.8%) of the CNA population.
- In the smallest age group there was 28 under the age of 20 years.
- The median age for both the male and female CNA population was 31 years.

DEATH SENTENCE POPULATION

Since 1978, there have been 411 persons sentenced to death in California. Of this total:

- 354 remain sentenced to death.
- 43 sentences were overturned.
- 8 committed suicide.
- 5 died of natural causes.
- 1 was executed.

The execution during calendar year 1992 was the first in twenty-five years. In fact, it was the first execution since the death penalty was reenacted in 1977.

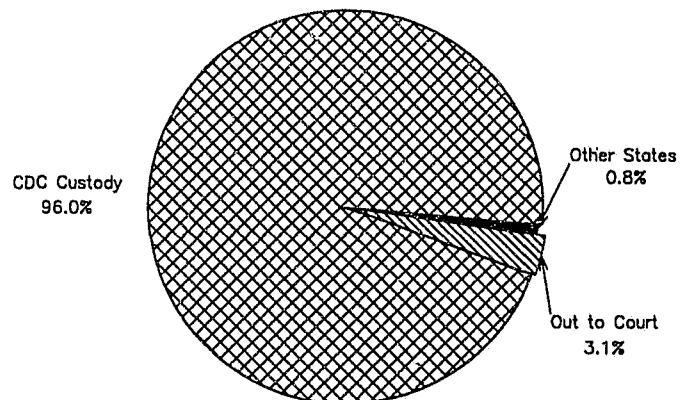
Calendar year 1992 represented an all time high of 42 for the number of offenders received with a death sentence during any calendar year. This number represents 10.2% of the total death sentence population received since 1978.

Of the December 31, 1992 population:

- Los Angeles County accounted for 106 (29.9%) of those who were sentenced to death.
- The next largest county of admission was Alameda County, at 26 (7.3%).

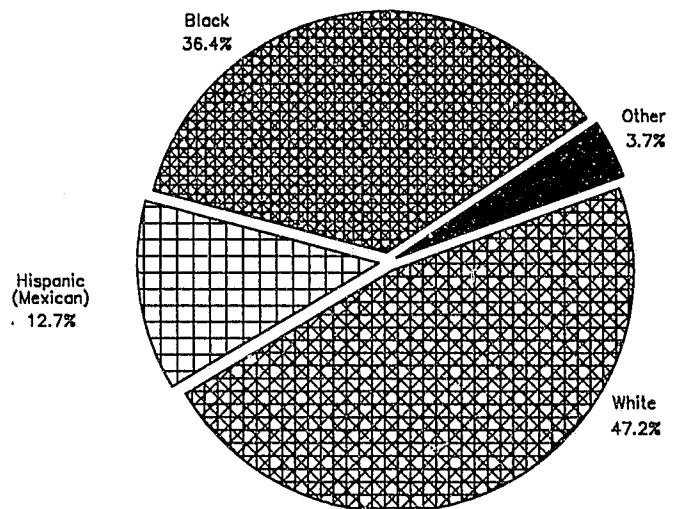

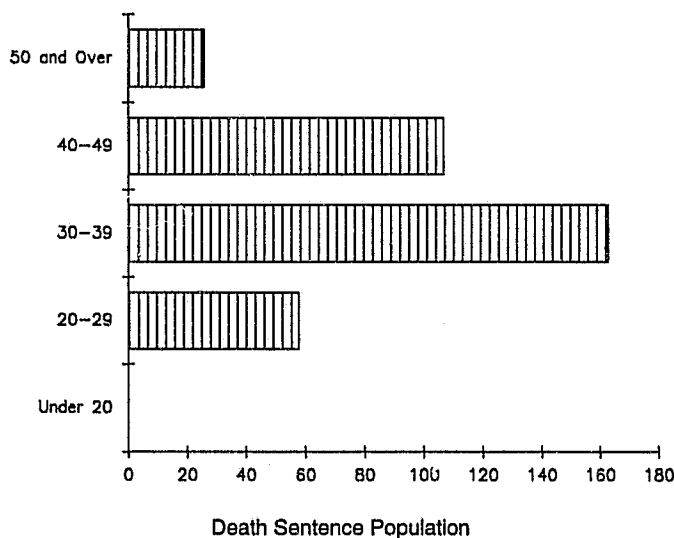

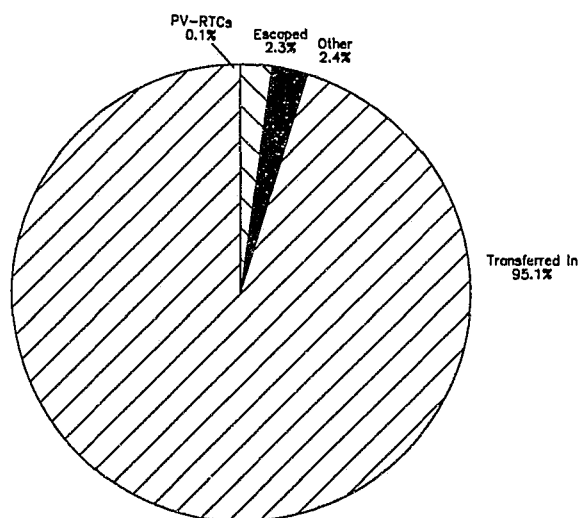

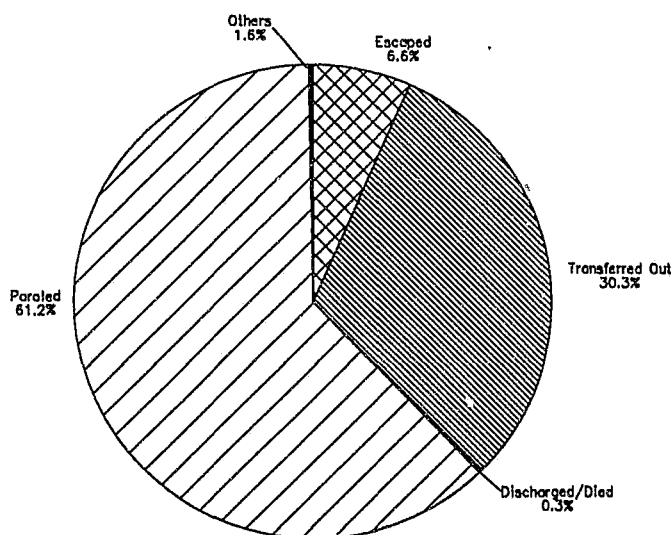
Community Correctional Center Population Departures Calendar Year 1992

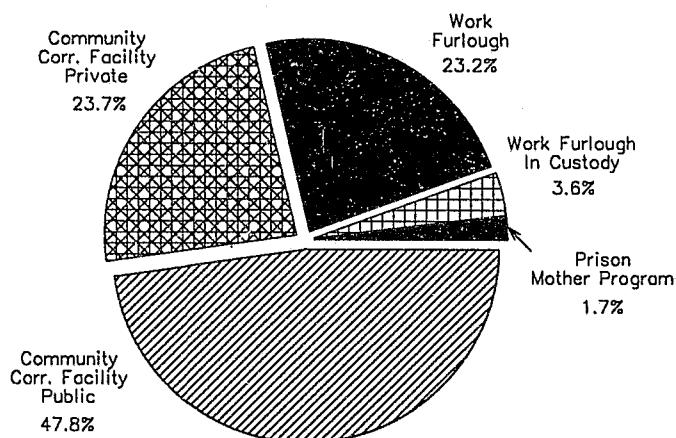

- 92 (1.7%) in the Prison Mother Program.

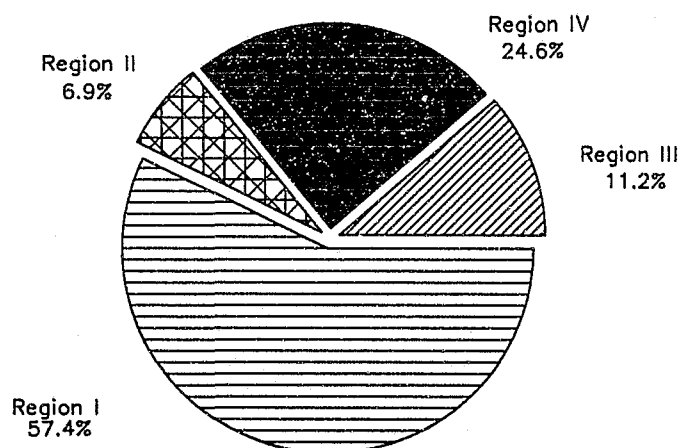
Community Correctional Center Population Program Types

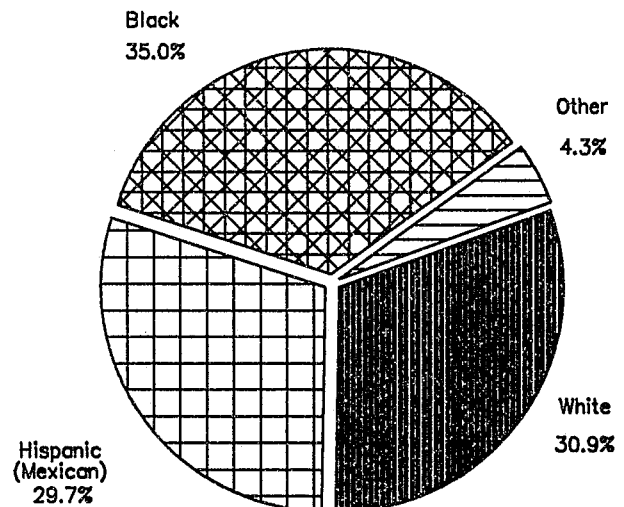

December 31, 1992

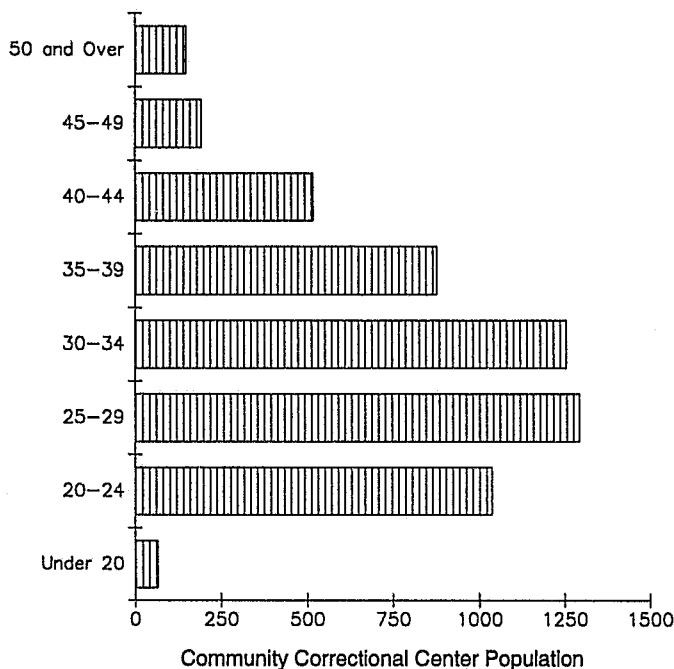

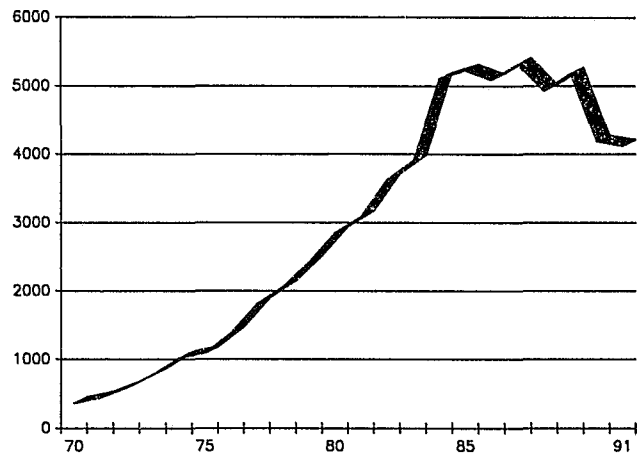

Calendar Year 1970 Through 1991

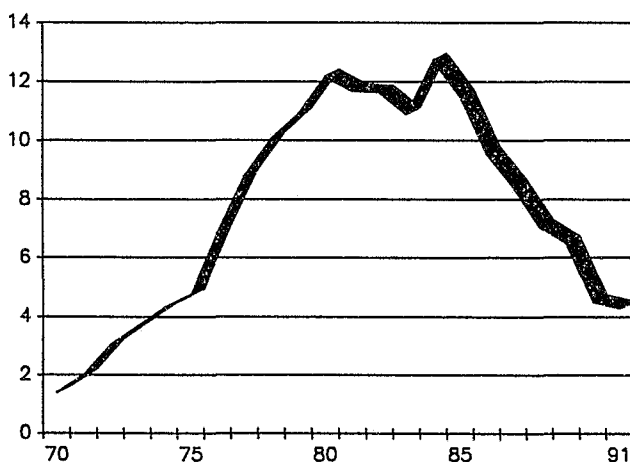

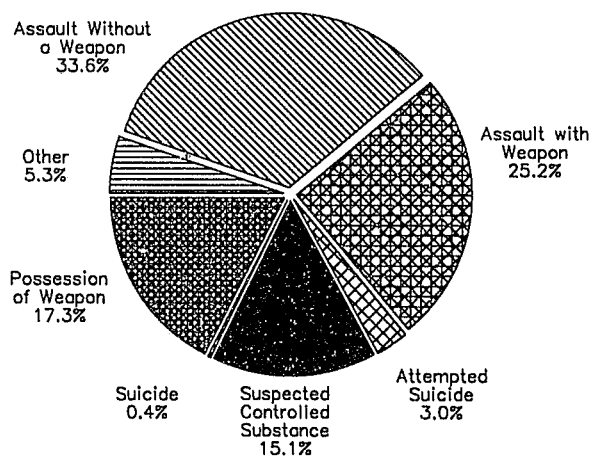

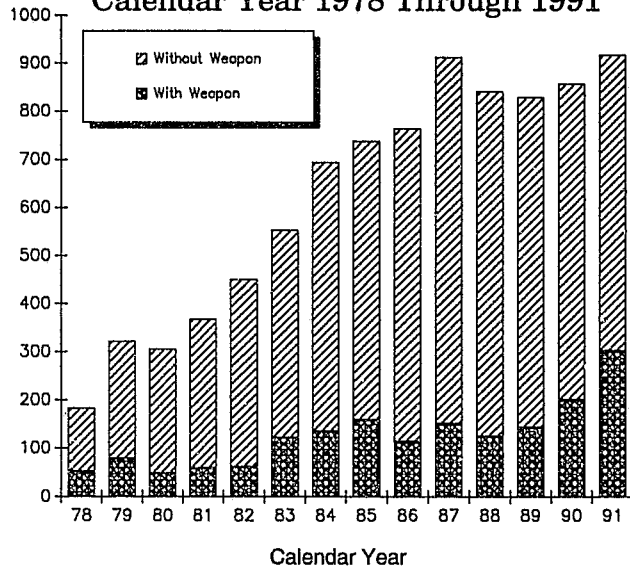

Inmate Assaults on Staff With and Without Use of Weapons

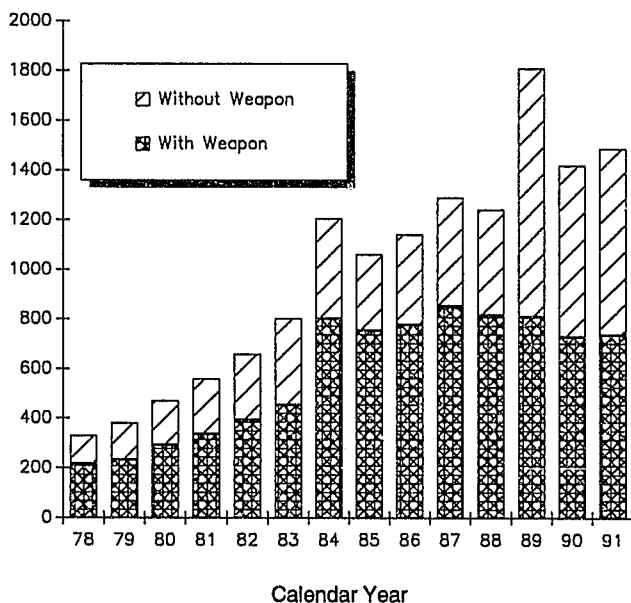
Calendar Year 1978 Through 1991

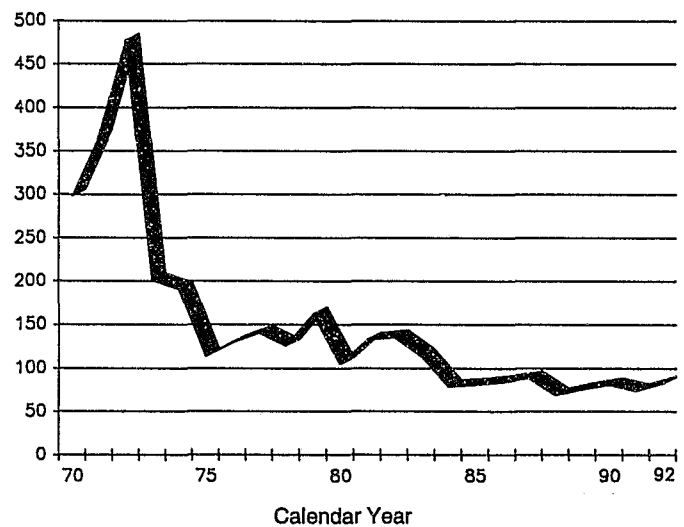

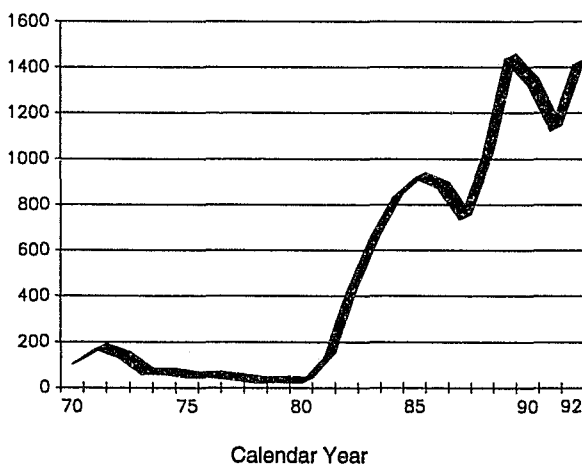

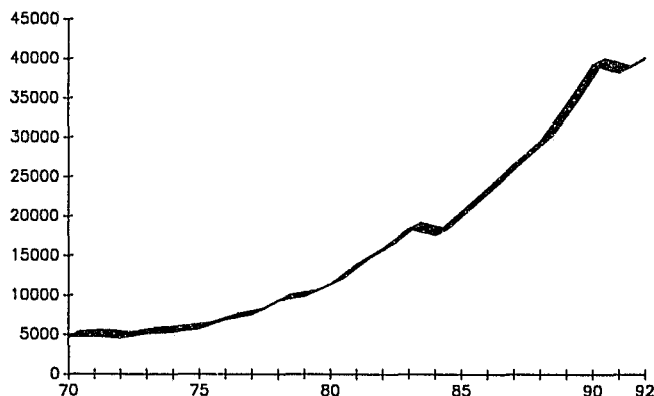

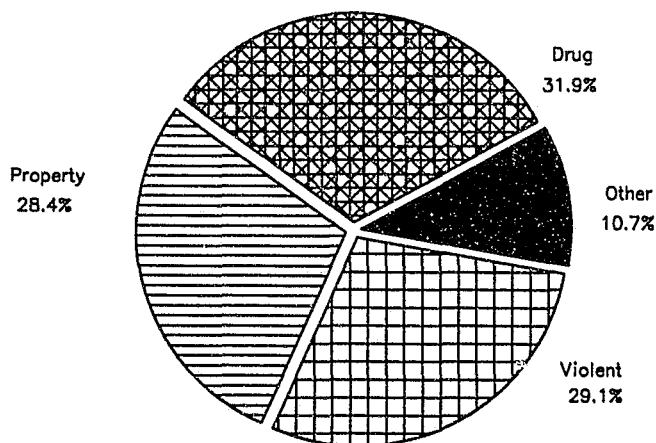
Felon New Admissions

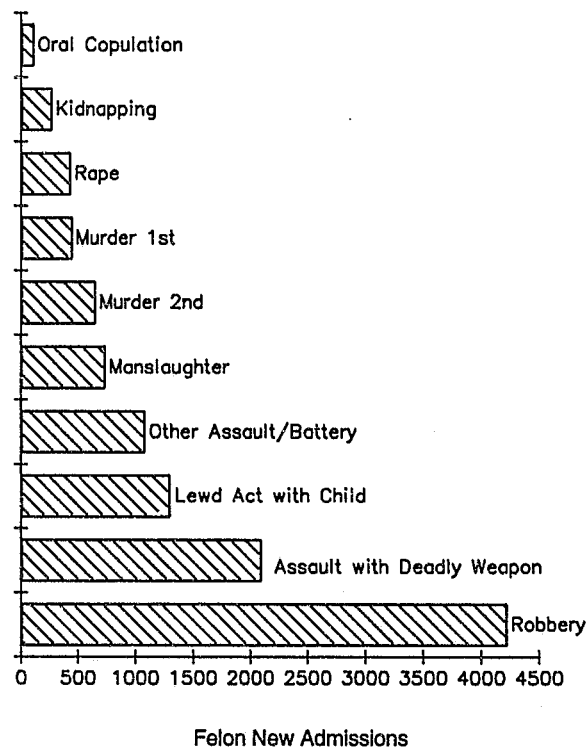

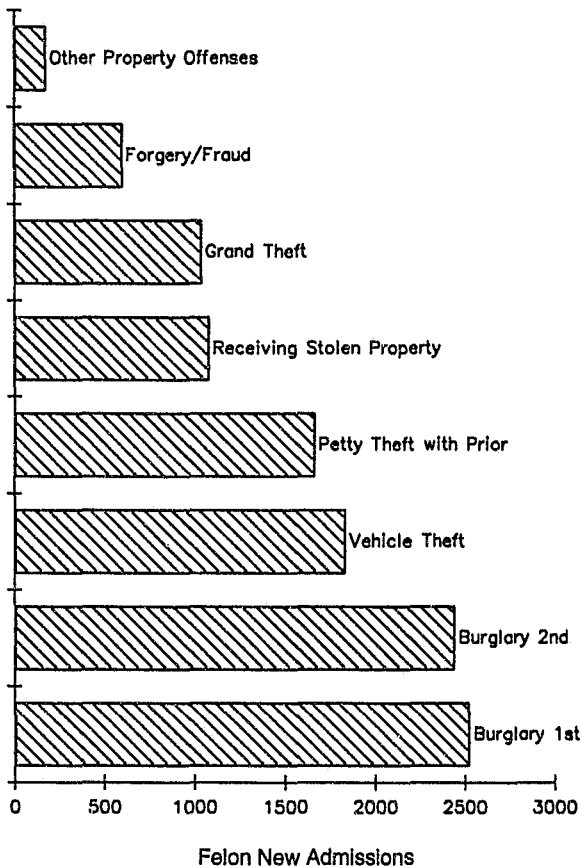

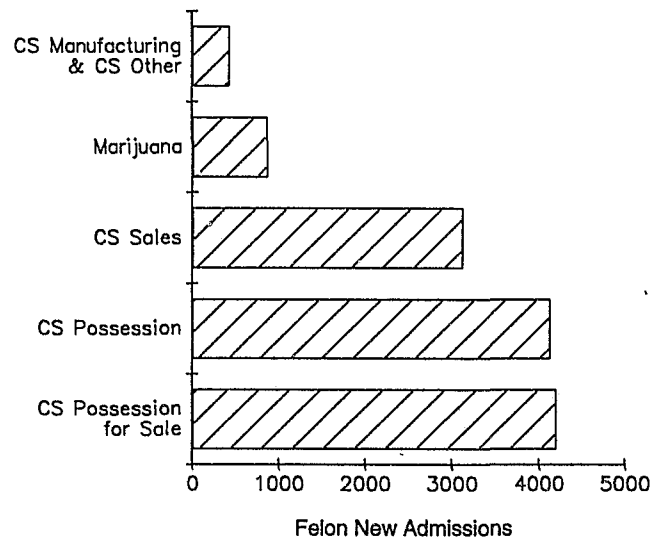

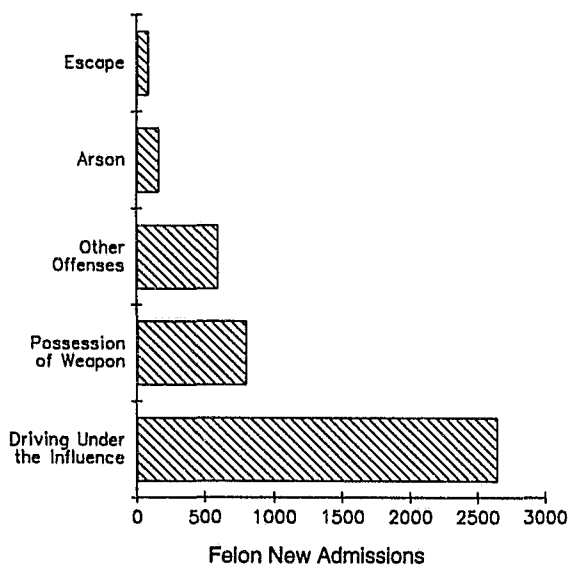
Drug Offenses

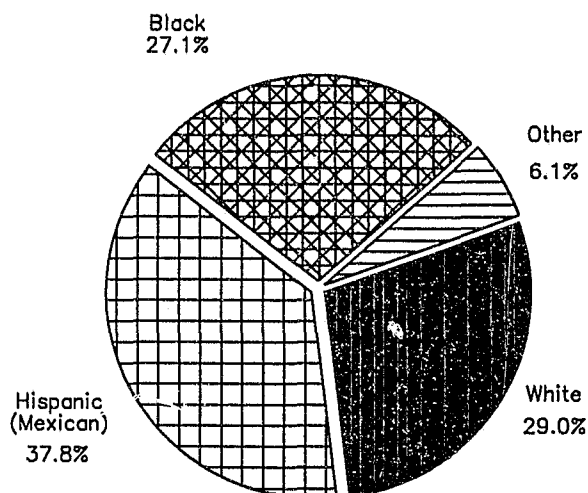

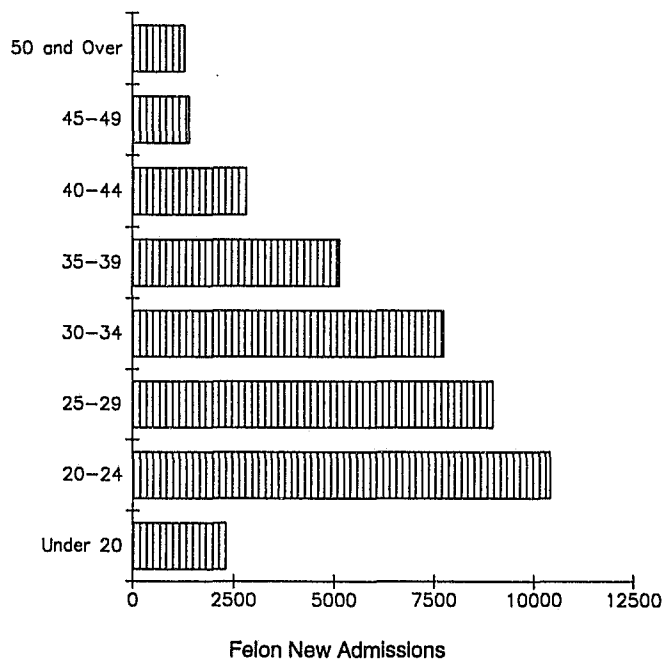
Racial/Ethnic Groups Calendar Year 1992

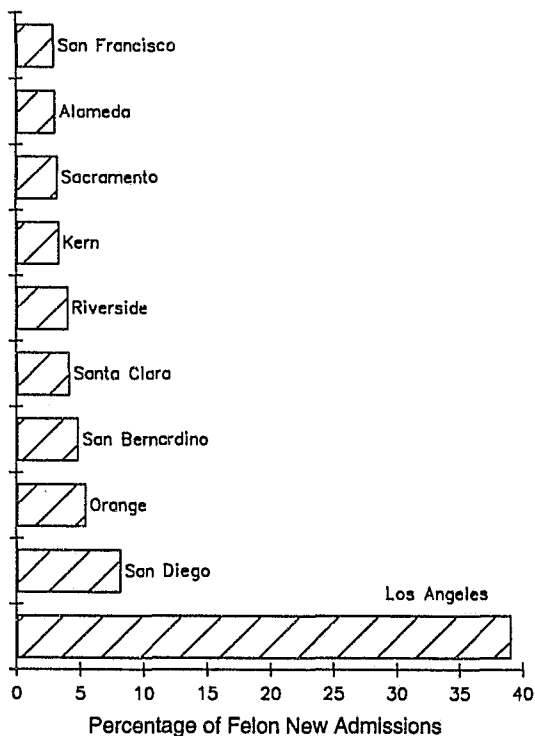

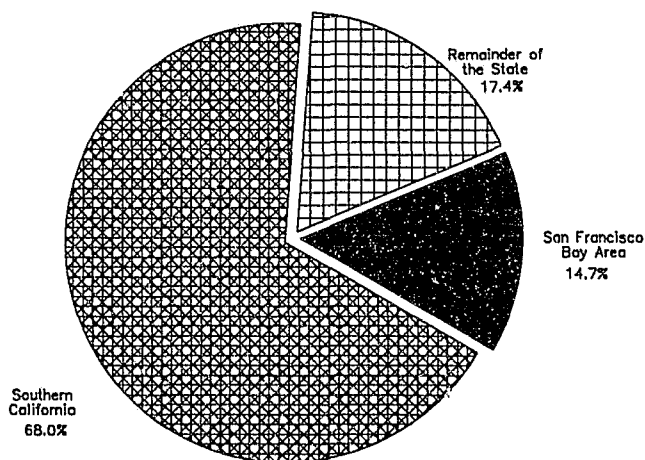

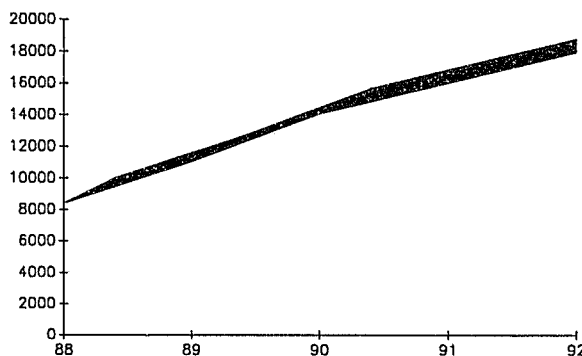

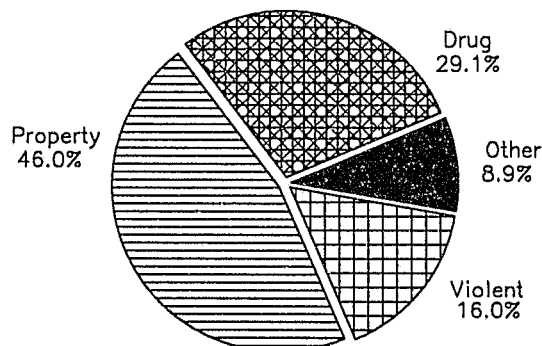
PV-WNTs

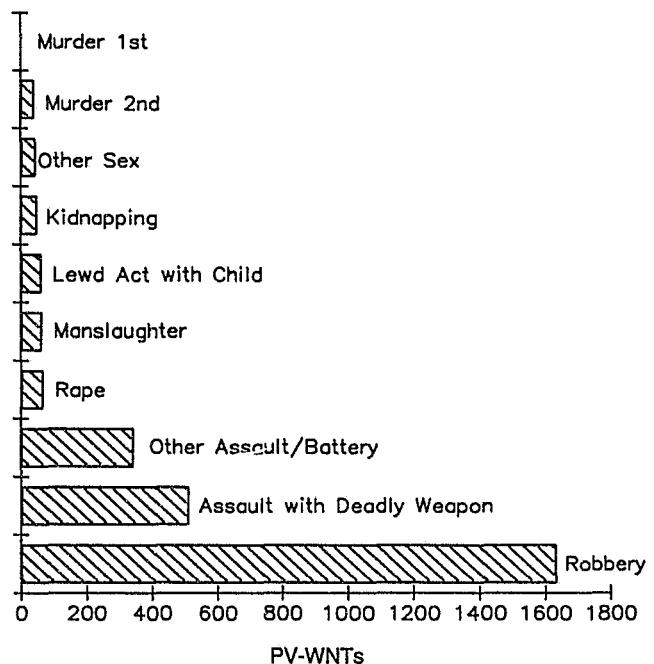

Calendar Year 1992

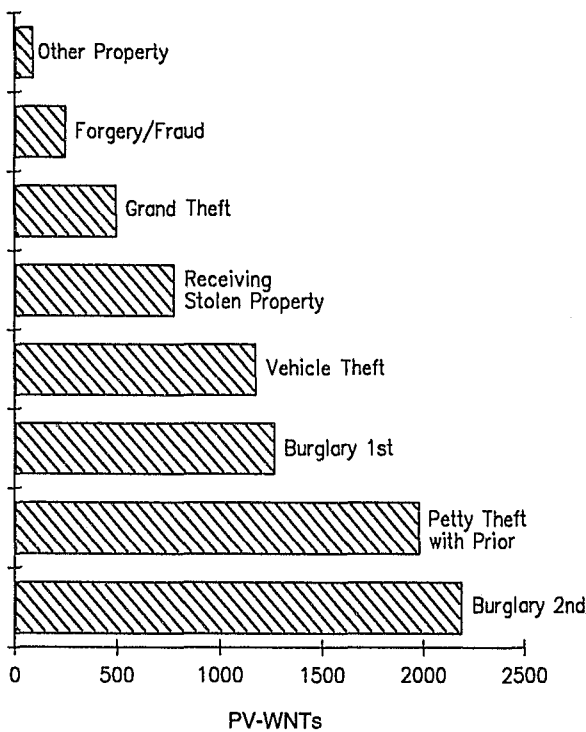

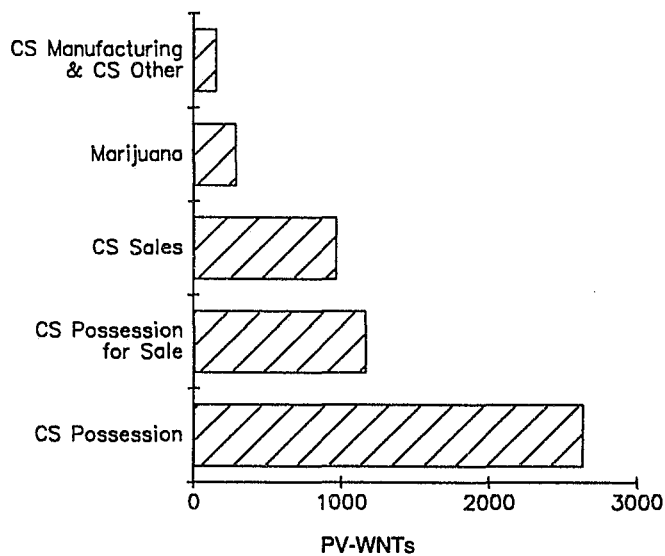

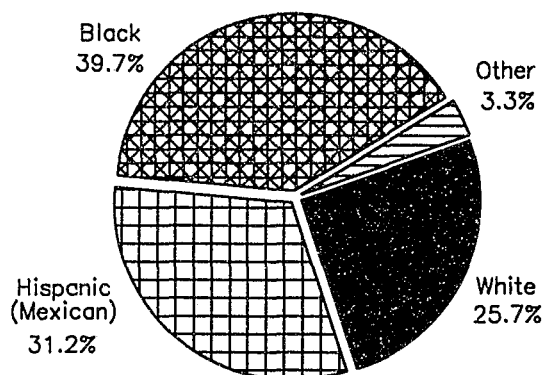

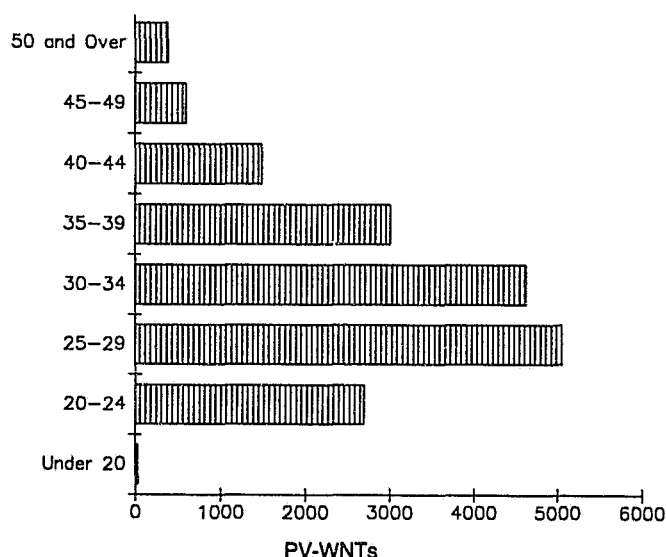
Racial/Ethnic Groups

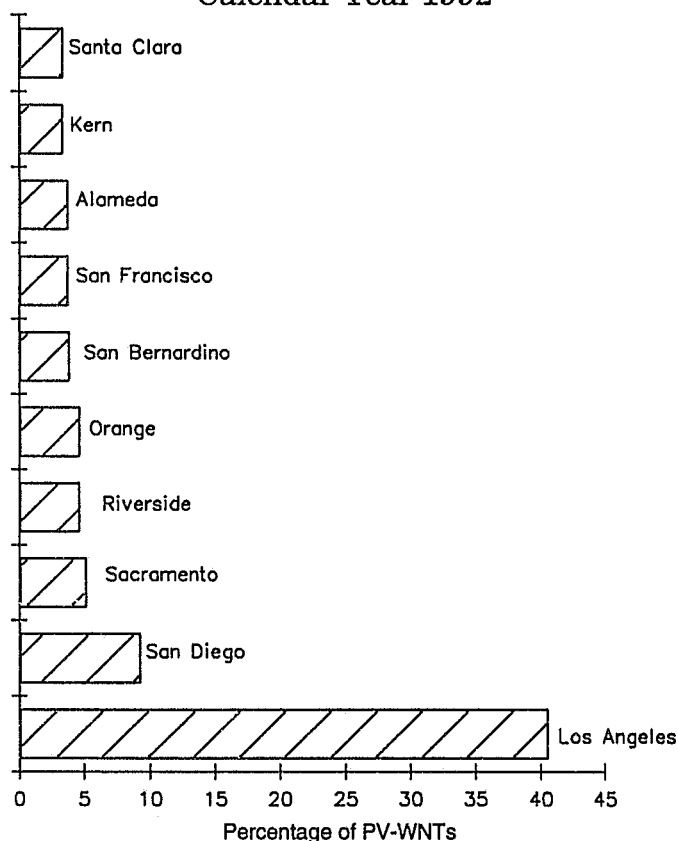

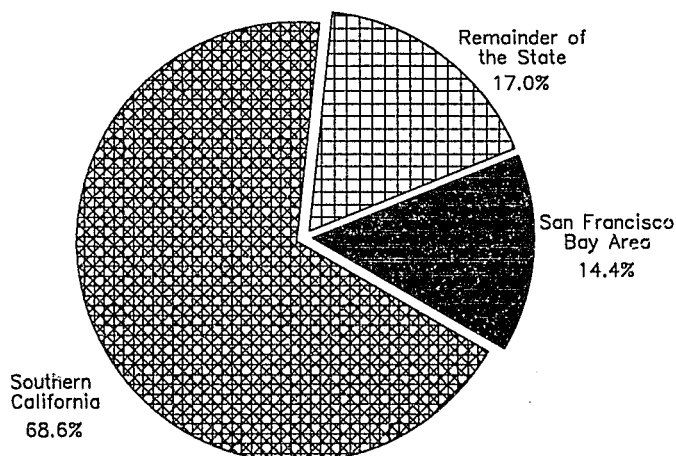

PAROLE VIOLATORS RETURNED TO CUSTODY

HIGHLIGHTS

During calendar year 1992, there were 34,932 parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTCs).

PV-RTC refers only to parolees returned to Department of Corrections institutions. It does not include revoked parolees who are housed in non-state facilities or who later return to prison with another prison commitment. The PV-RTC rate does not represent the parole revocation rate.

The number of PV-RTCs returned during calendar year 1992 decreased by 6,402 from calendar year 1991 (41,334).

The mean revocation time assessed for PV-RTCs only during calendar year 1992 was 8.4 months.

The rate of PV-RTCs per 100 Average Daily Felon Parolee and Parolee at Large (PAL) population (68.1) has decreased steadily since 1989. By 1992, the rate had dropped to 39.7.

During calendar year 1992, 42.1% of the male PV-RTCs returned were Black, 28.7% were White, and 26.1% were Hispanic (Mexican).

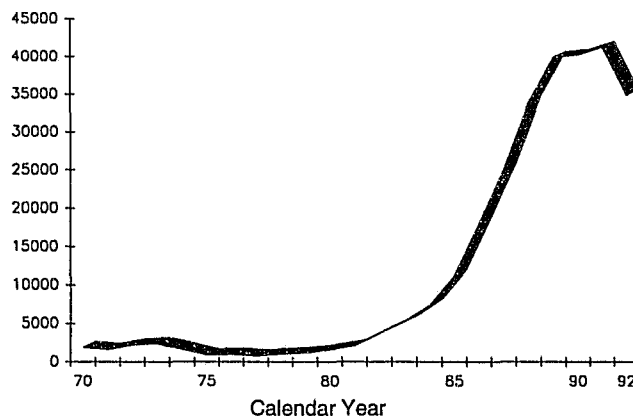

PAROLE VIOLATORS RETURNED TO CUSTODY (PV-RTCs)

The number of Parole Violators Returned to Custody (PV-RTCs) decreased during calendar year 1992 to 34,932. This decrease was the first since calendar year 1977.

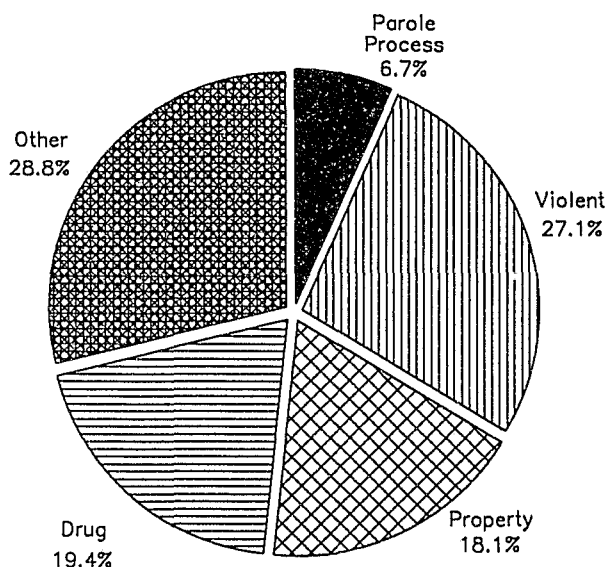
- The return rate of PV-RTCs per 100 average daily felon parolee and parolee at large (PAL) population peaked during calendar year 1989 at 68.1. Since then the rate decreased to 39.7 during calendar year 1992.
- The rate of male PV-RTCs for 1992 was 40.6 while the female PV-RTC rate was 31.5.

VIOLATION CHARGE CATEGORIES

During calendar year 1992, there were 34,932 felon parole violators who were returned to custody as PV-RTCs. Of these:

- 11,525 were returned to CDC custody and after assessment, were released to parole without referral for revocation proceedings.
- 23,407 were assessed revocation time. Of these:
 - The mean revocation time assessed was 8.4 months.
 - Males were given an average of 8.5 months' revocation time, while the females were given an average of 7.6 months.

NOTE: PV-RTC refers only to parolees returned to Department of Corrections institutions. It does not include revoked parolees who are housed in non-state facilities or who later return to prison with another prison commitment. The PV-RTC rate does not represent the parole revocation rate.

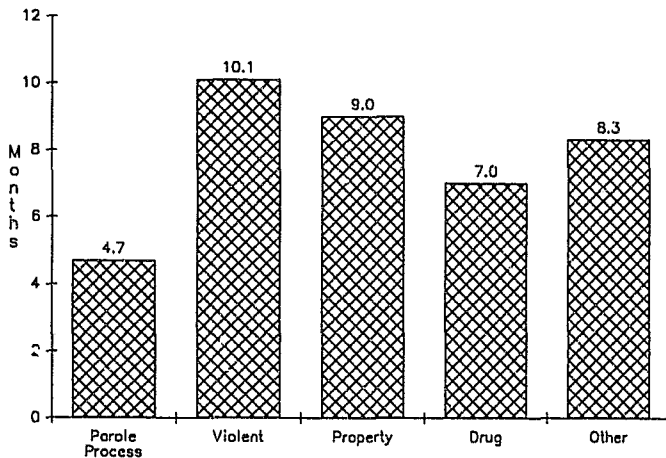

- 1,483 (6.7%) were returned for Violations of Parole Process with an average of 4.7 months.
- Those returned for Property Offense charges accounted for 4,010 (18.1%), with an average of 9.0 months' revocation time assessed.
- Drug Offenses accounted for 4,291 (19.4%) with an average of 7.0 months' revocation time.
- Violent Offenses were 6,001 (27.1%) of the PV-RTCs returned, averaging 10.1 months' revocation time assessed.
- 6,381 (28.8%) were returned with Other Offenses with an average of 8.3 months assessed. Other includes weapons, driving, and arson violations.
- The median revocation time was 9.0 months for males and 7.0 months for females, while the mean revocation time was 8.5 months and 7.6 months, respectively.

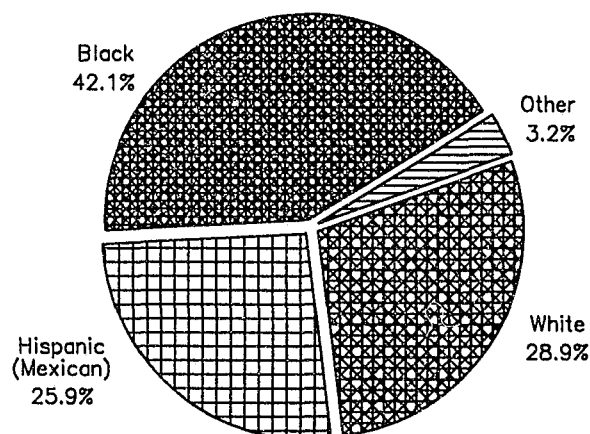

RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS

During calendar year 1992, 42.1% of the PV-RTCs returned were Black, 28.9% were White, and 25.9% were Hispanic (Mexican).

- The racial/ethnic percentages for male PV-RTCs have remained about the same during the past five calendar years (1988-1992).
- Female PV-RTCs showed a similar distribution to males during calendar year 1992. However, during the past five years the percent of Black female PV-RTCs returned increased from 32.5% during calendar year 1988 to 41.4% during 1992. During the same time period the Hispanic (Mexican) female PV-RTCs returned decreased from 27.7% during calendar year 1988 to 23.1% during 1992.

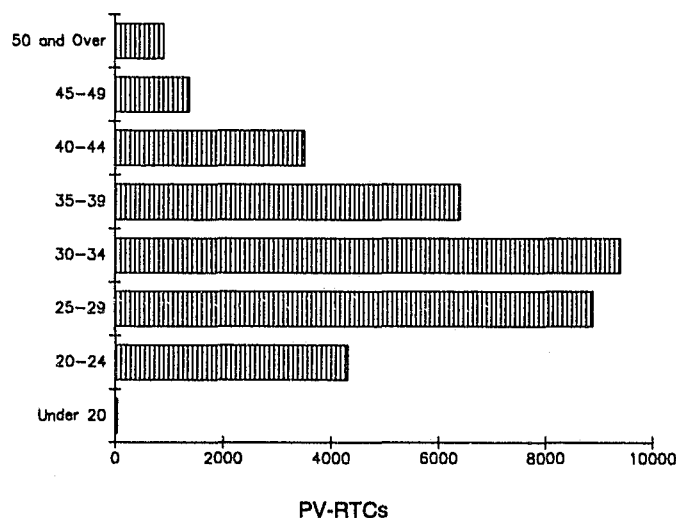
Racial/Ethnic Groups

AGE GROUPS

During calendar year 1992, more than half (52.4%) of the PV-RTCs returned were 25-34 years of age.

- The smallest age group of PV-RTCs returned was the Under 20 group, at 55 (0.2%).
- The median age of male PV-RTCs returned increased from 30 years during calendar year 1988 to 32 years during 1992.

Los Angeles County received 30,752 (36.4%) of the felons released to parole.

On December 31, 1992, the majority of the California Felon Parolees supervised by the California Department of Corrections (CDC) were 25 to 34 years of age.

For calendar year 1992, the average (mean) time served by felons first released to parole was 21.0 months.

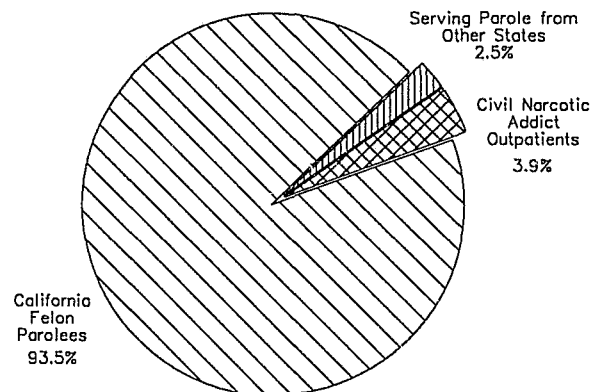

California felons supervised by the California Youth Authority (CYA) was 1,025 on December 31, 1992.

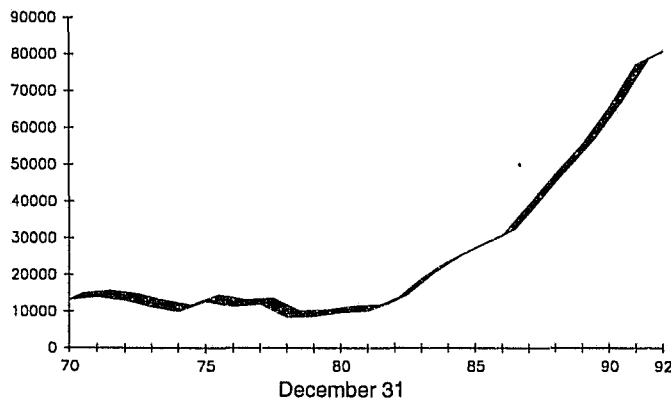

- The rate per 100,000 California population for the parolee and outpatient population supervised in California on December 31, 1992 was 273.8. This is an increase from the rate of 266.6 on December 31, 1991.
- The parolee and outpatient population supervised in California has increased each year since 1981. During the last five years, this population has more than doubled.
- While the number of parolees from other states supervised in California decreased from 2,233 on December 31, 1991 to 2,182 on December 31, 1992, the number of California parolees supervised by other states increased from 1,793 to 2,039 during the same time period.

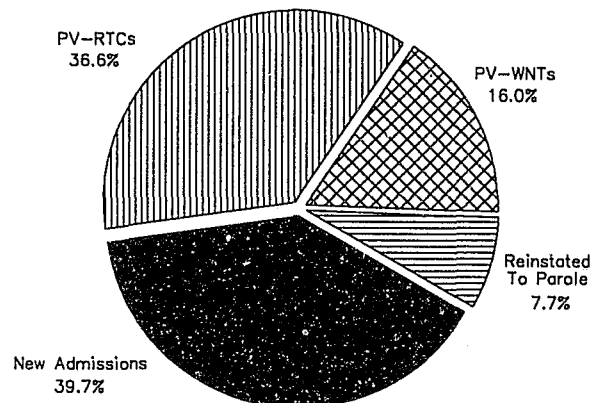

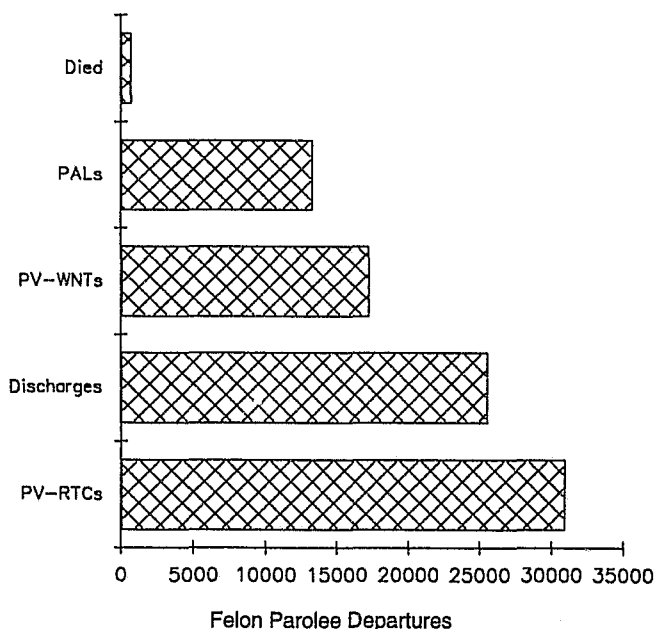

FELON PAROLEE DEPARTURES

There were 88,596 departures from parole during calendar year 1992. Of these:

- 30,962 (34.9%) felon parolees (PV-RTCs) returned to prison for technical or criminal violations.
- 25,600 (28.9%) felons discharged from parole.
- 13,319 (15.0%) felon parolees absconded (PALs).
- 17,280 (19.5%) felon parolees returned to prison from parole with new terms (PV-WNTs).
- 759 (0.9%) felon parolee deaths.

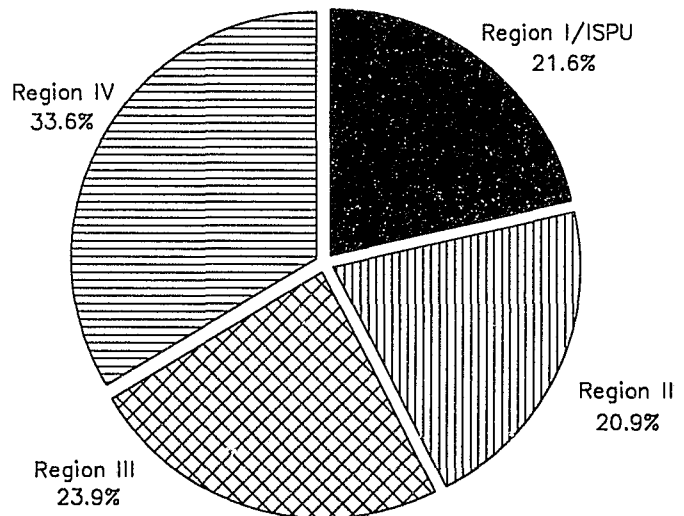

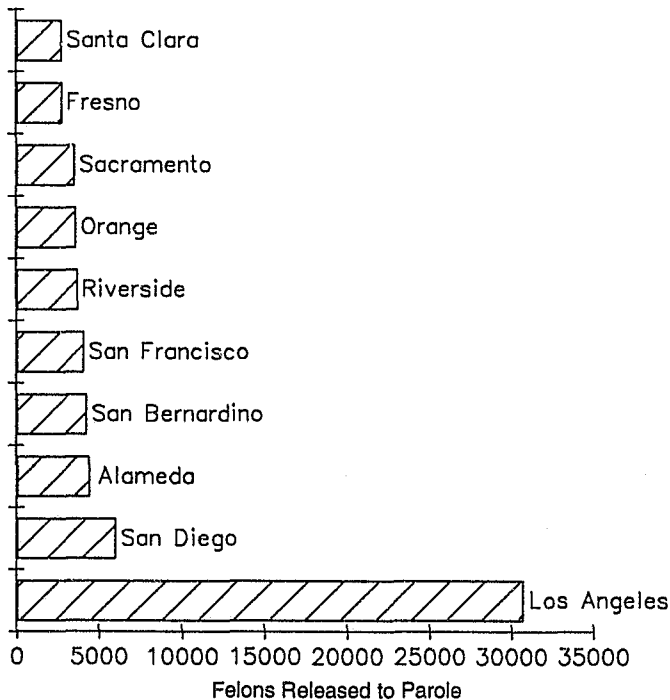

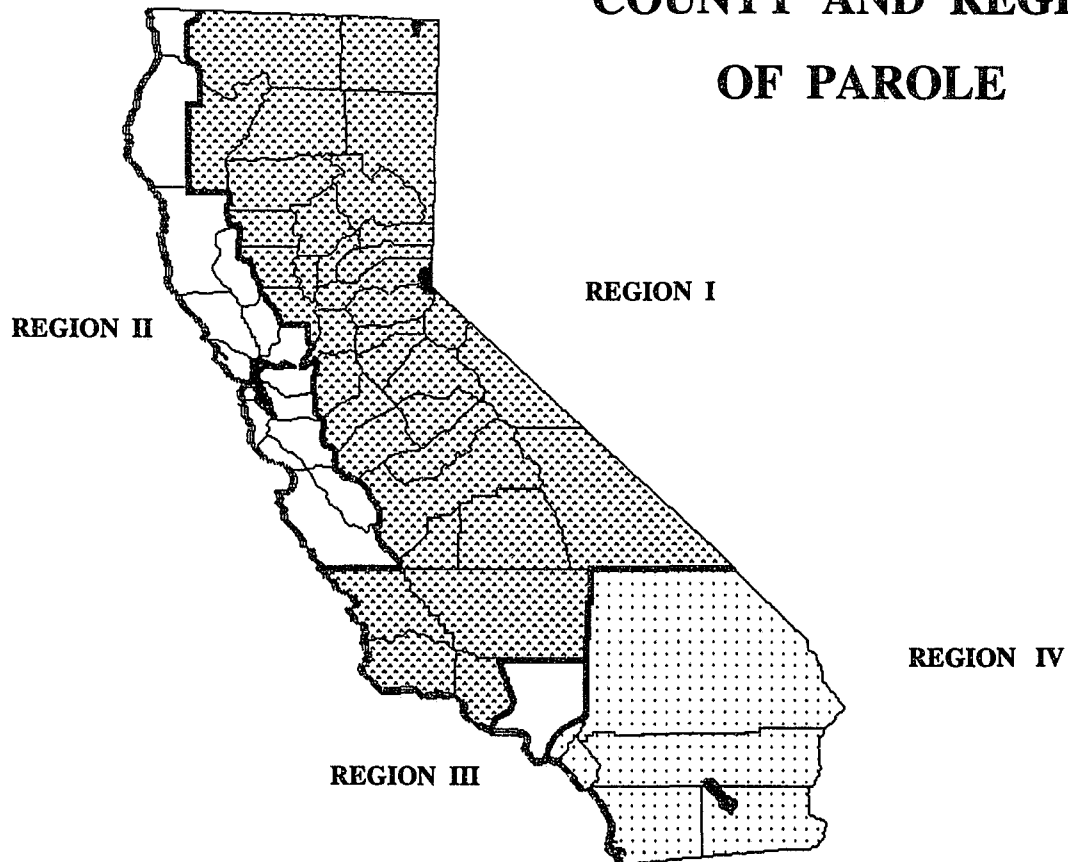

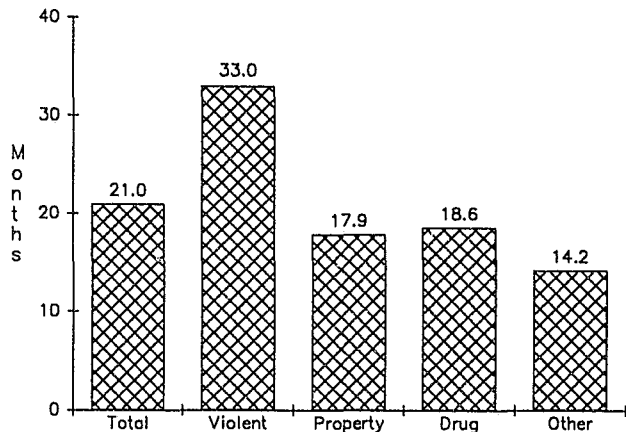

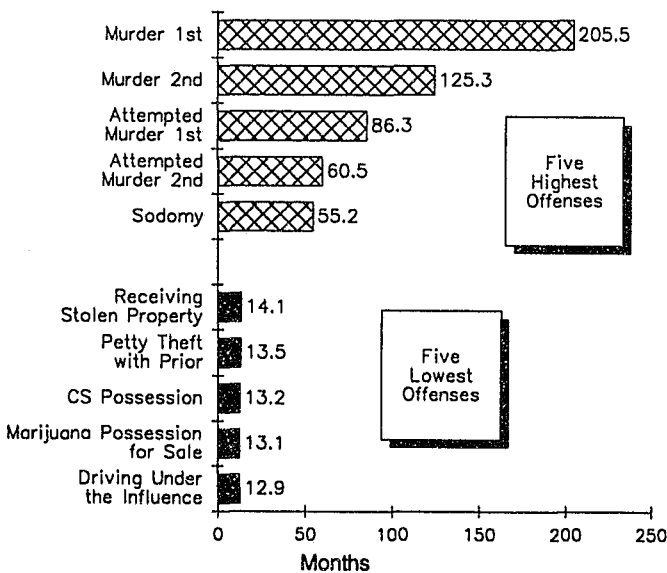

- Murder First releases had the highest average time served at 205.5 months.
- Of the male felons first released to parole 23.2% (10,585) had violent offenses. Violent offenses were 12.0% (520) of the female first releases.
- Drug offenses was the largest category for females at 42.8% (1,859). For males the largest offense group was Property offenses, at 34.1% (15,896).

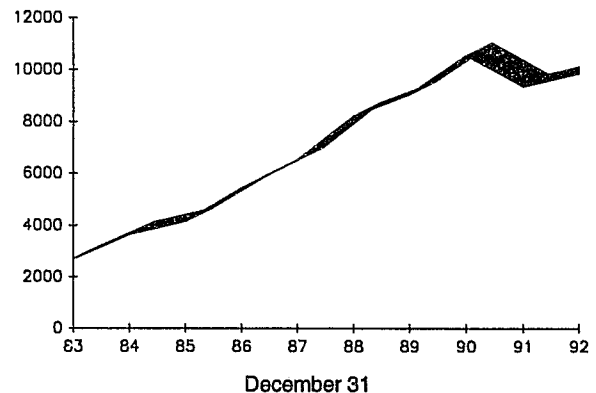

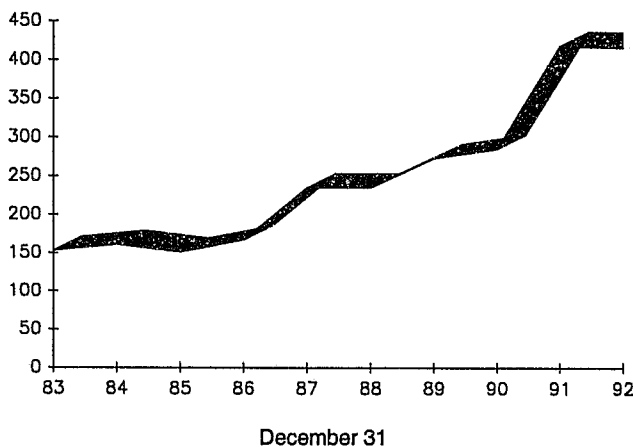
Felon Parolees At Large December 31, 1983 Through 1992

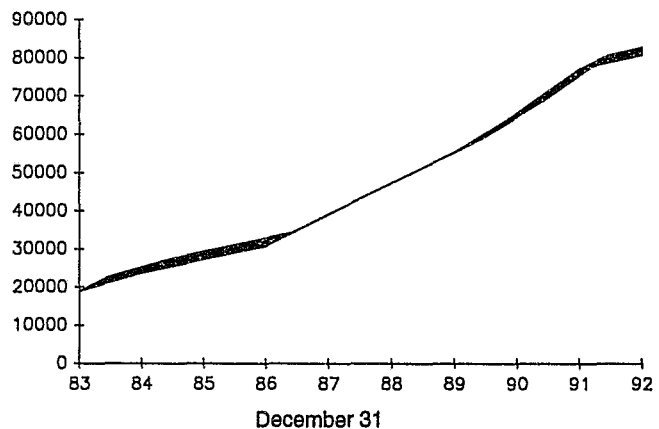

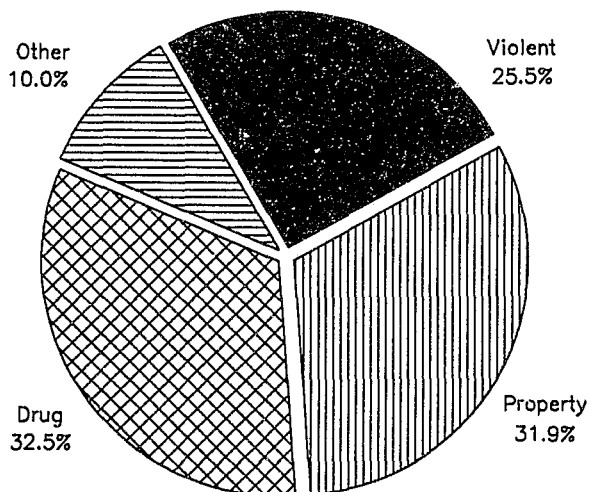
California Felon Parolees Supervised by CDC December 31, 1983 Through 1992

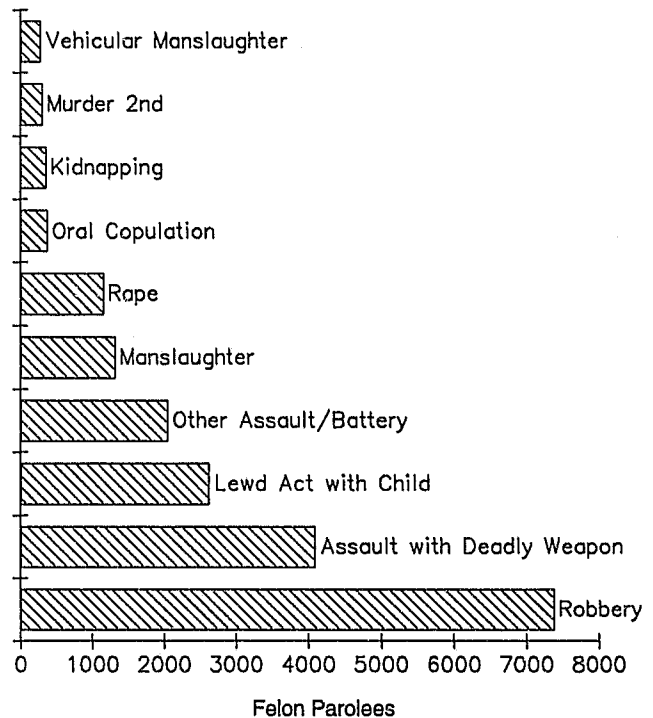

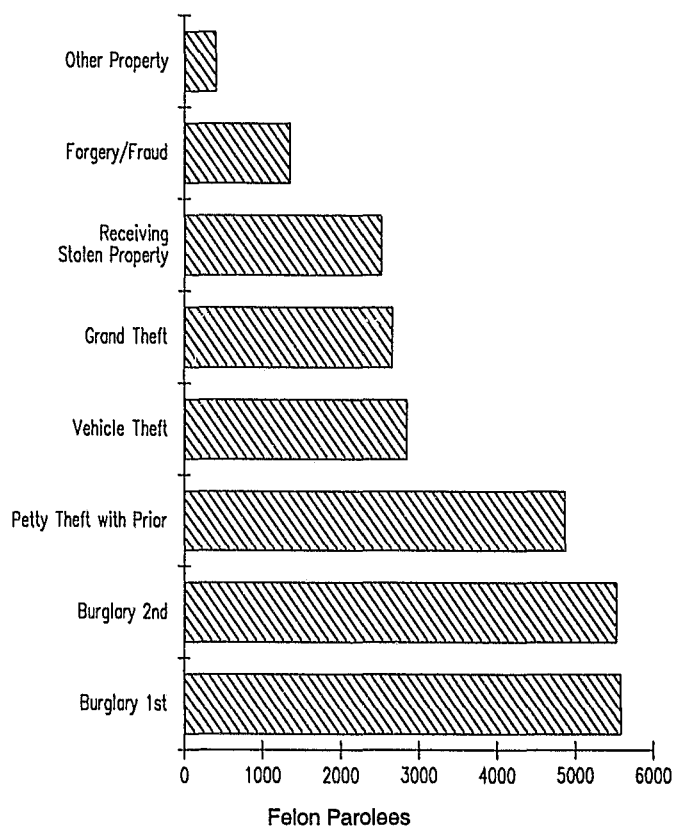

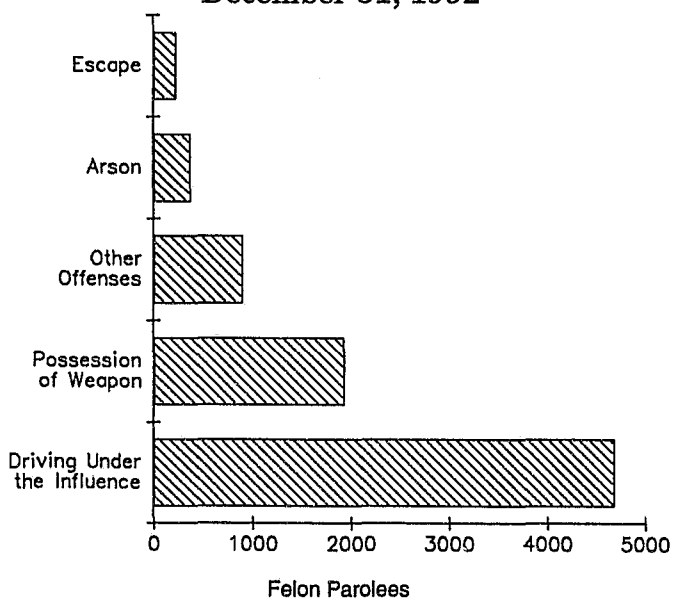

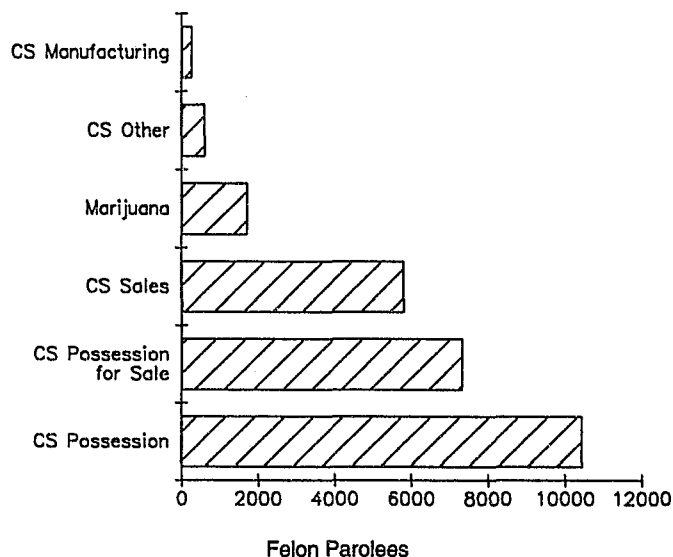

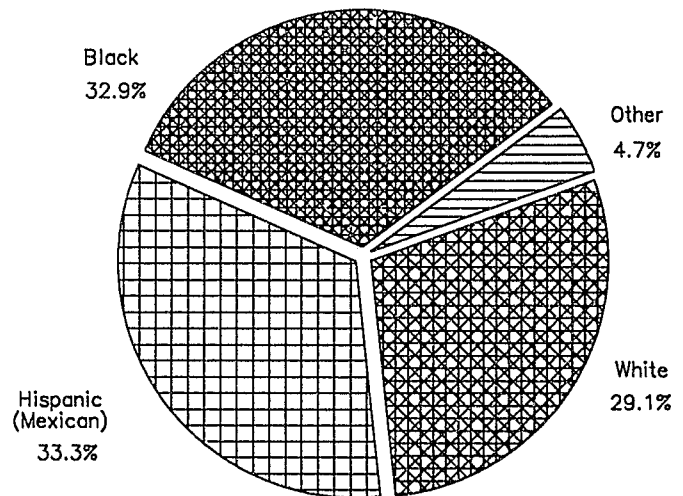

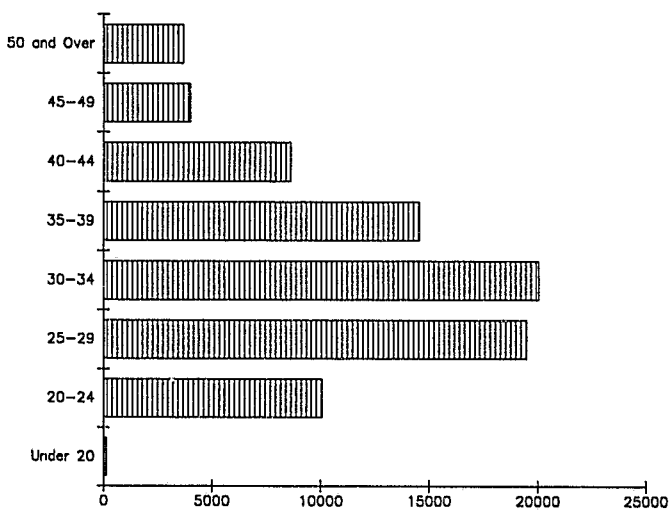

Region I: Covers Alpine, Amador, Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, El Dorado, Fresno, Glenn, Inyo, Kern, Kings, Lassen, Madera, Mariposa, Merced, Modoc, Mono, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Sacramento, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Shasta, Sierra, Siskiyou, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tehama, Trinity, Tulare, Tuolumne, Ventura, Yolo, and Yuba counties.

Region II: Covers Alameda, Contra Costa, Del Norte, Humboldt, Lake, Marin, Mendocino, Monterey, Napa, San Benito, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Solano and Sonoma counties.

Region III: Covers Los Angeles County excluding the southeastern area (Long Beach through Pomona).

GLOSSARY OF TERMS AND ACRONYMS

ABSCONDER: see **PAROLEE AT LARGE (PAL)** and **RELEASEE AT LARGE (RAL)**.

ADP: see **AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION**.

ADMISSION: The first commitment from the court for felons, civil narcotic addicts, safekeepers, county diagnostic cases, and those received for the first time from other jurisdictions.

ADMISSION RATE: The number of felon new admissions received by CDC from court during a specified time period, per 100,000 California population.

AREA OF COMMITMENT: California counties are grouped into three areas for statistical purposes, these are: San Francisco Bay Area, Southern California and the Remainder of the State (refer to the map in the Reference Guide).

ARRIVAL STATUS: The offenders status upon receipt by CDC, i.e., new admission, PV-WNT, PV-RTC, Civil Narcotic Addict Outpatient or Escape Return.

AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION (ADP): The average population per day for a stated population for a specified time period, usually one year.

BASELINE CAMPS: see **INSTITUTION BASED CAMPS**.

CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS (CDC): The state agency which has jurisdiction over the California prison and parole system.

CALIFORNIA FELON PAROLEES: Offenders committed to CDC as felons serving their parole period in California.

CALIFORNIA REHABILITATION CENTER (CRC): A facility operated by the CDC to house Civil Narcotic Addicts (CNA) and selected felons.

CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY (CYA): The state agency which has jurisdiction over juvenile offenders who are wards of the juvenile, municipal and superior courts.

CAMPS: Facilities that house 60-160 minimum custody inmates to work on conservation projects or fight fires.

CDC: see **CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS.**

CIVIL ADDICT: see **CIVIL NARCOTIC ADDICT.**

CIVIL COMMITMENT: A type of commitment in which criminal proceedings are suspended while a defendant undergoes substance rehabilitation treatment at the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC) as a Civil Narcotic Addict.

CIVIL NARCOTIC ADDICT (CNA): An offender civilly committed to CDC for treatment of narcotic addiction per W&I Code 3000 et seq.

CNA: see **CIVIL NARCOTIC ADDICT.**

COMMITMENT RATE: The number of new felon admissions from court and parole violators returned with a new term (PV-WNTs) committed to CDC during a specified time period per 100,000 California and county population.

COMMITMENT TYPE: Felons, Civil Narcotic Addicts, County Diagnostic Cases (under Penal Code Section 1203.03), some Youth Authority commitments, federal prisoners and prisoners from other states.

COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMS: see **COMMUNITY CORRECTIONAL CENTERS.**

COMMUNITY CORRECTIONAL CENTERS: County, state, and private facilities in local communities under contract with CDC to house inmates in work furlough and prisoner mother programs, and parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTCs) who are serving revocation time in county jails.

CONTINUED ON PAROLE (COP): Parolees who are returned to CDC custody and are returned to parole instead of having revocation time assessed and their parole revoked.

CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE (CS) SCHEDULE: A schedule that categorizes drugs, substances, or precursors according to their potential for abuse and provides penalties (Health and Safety Code Sections 11054 through 11058).

COOPERATIVE CASES (ICOOP): see **INTERSTATE COMPACT.**

COP: see **CONTINUED ON PAROLE.**

COUNTY DIAGNOSTIC CASE: An offender placed by the court in CDC custody for a pre-sentence diagnostic evaluation (Penal Code Section 1203.03).

COURT COMMITMENT: A commitment imposed by the court sentencing the defendant to CDC.

CRC: see **CALIFORNIA REHABILITATION CENTER.**

CS: see **CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE SCHEDULE.**

CYA: see **CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY.**

DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH (DMH) STATE HOSPITALS: State Mental Health Hospitals under contract with CDC to provide psychiatric treatment to inmates who require treatment that is not available in CDC facilities.

DESIGN CAPACITY: The maximum number of beds a facility was originally designed to contain, less or plus beds eliminated or added due to conversions, additions or deactivations.

DIAGNOSTIC CASE: see **COUNTY DIAGNOSTIC CASE.**

DISCHARGED: When an offender is no longer under the jurisdiction of CDC.

DMH: see **DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH STATE HOSPITAL.**

ESCAPEE RETURNED TO FINISH TERM (ESCTFT): An escapee returned to prison to finish the term that was being served at the time of escape.

ESCAPEE RETURNED WITH A NEW TERM (ESCWNT): An escapee returned to prison with a new term.

ESCTFT: see **ESCAPEE RETURNED TO FINISH TERM.**

ESCWNT: see **ESCAPEE RETURNED WITH NEW A TERM.**

FELON: A person convicted of a felony offense and sentenced to state prison by the court.

FIRST RELEASE TO PAROLE: The first release to parole for felon new admissions and parole violators returned with a new term (PV-WNTs).

ICOOP: see **INTERSTATE COMPACT.**

INCIDENT: A violation of the law, regulations, or rules of the Director of Corrections by an inmate.

INSTITUTION: As used in this publication, an institution is a state prison or community correctional centers.

INSTITUTION BASED CAMPS: Conservation camps that are adjacent to the California Correctional Institution (CCI), California Men's Colony (CMC) or California Rehabilitation Center (CRC).

INSTITUTION TRANSFERS: Inmate movement between CDC institutions.

INTERSTATE COMPACT (ICOOP): An agreement between California and other states for CDC to provide supervision of parolees from other states.

INTERSTATE PAROLE UNIT (ISPU): A CDC parole unit that coordinates with other states the parole supervision of California parolees who reside in other states.

ISPU: see **INTERSTATE PAROLE UNIT.**

MEAN: The sum of individual values divided by the number of cases; an average of all values.

MEDIAN: The middle value in a distribution, above and below which lie an equal number of values.

OFFENSE: As used in this publication, the principal or controlling offense for which a person was committed to CDC.

OFFENSE CATEGORIES: Similar offenses grouped into four major categories (Violent, Property, Drug and Other).

OFFENSE GROUPS: Similar offenses grouped in specified groups for reporting purposes.

OPR-TFT: see **OUTPATIENT PAROLEE RETURNED TO FINISH TERM.**

OPR-WNT: see **OUTPATIENT PAROLEE RETURNED WITH A NEW TERM.**

OUTPATIENT: A civil narcotic addict on parole.

OUTPATIENT PAROLEE RETURNED TO FINISH TERM (OPR-TFT): An outpatient parolee who violated the conditions of parole and has been ordered by the Narcotic Addict Evaluation Authority to return to prison to finish their remaining term.

OUTPATIENT PAROLEE RETURNED WITH A NEW TERM (OPR-WNT): An outpatient parolee who returned to CDC with an additional term to be served.

PAL: see **PAROLEE AT LARGE**.

PAROLE: After the prison term is served, offenders are supervised in the community by CDC for an established period up to the statutory maximum.

PAROLE REGION: There are four parole regions that administer parole supervision throughout the state. The boundaries are identified in the Reference Guide.

PAROLE VIOLATOR RETURNED TO CUSTODY (PV-RTC): A parolee who has violated the conditions of parole and has been returned to prison.

PAROLE VIOLATOR RETURNED WITH A NEW TERM (PV-WNT): A parolee who has received a court sentence for a new crime and been returned to prison.

PAROLEE AT LARGE (PAL): A felon parolee who absconds from parole supervision.

PENDING REVOCATION: A parolee who has been charged with violating a condition of parole and placed in CDC custody pending investigation to determine if revocation time will be assessed.

PMP: see **PRISON MOTHER PROGRAM**.

POPULATION AT RISK: Offenders in a population on January 1 of any given year plus offenders entering the population during the year.

PRINCIPAL OFFENSE: The controlling offense designated by the court as the base term, usually the offense that keeps the offender in custody the longest period of time. The principal offense is used for statistical purposes by CDC.

PRISON: A state correctional facility where offenders are confined following sentencing in court.

PRISON MOTHER PROGRAM (PMP): A community based facility operated by private profit and nonprofit organizations that houses mothers and their small children while serving a court imposed term.

PV-RTC: see **PAROLE VIOLATOR RETURNED TO CUSTODY**.

PV-WNT: see **PAROLE VIOLATOR RETURNED WITH A NEW TERM**.

RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS: Grouping of racial and ethnic origins into four major groups, White, Black, Hispanic (Mexican) and Other, for summary statistical purposes.

RAL: see **RELEASEE AT LARGE**.

RATE: As used in this publication, the ratio of the number of a specific group to a population base.

REINSTATED: A parolee at large (PAL) who is reinstated to active parole status.

RELEASEE AT LARGE (RAL): A civil narcotic addict (CNA) on outpatient (parole) status who absconds from CDC supervision.

REPAROLE: When a parolee who has been returned to custody for violating a condition of parole completes the revocation time assessed and is released to serve the remaining time on the original parole period.

REVOCATION: Suspension of parole and return of an offender to custody for a parole violation.

REVOCATION TIME ASSESSED: The amount of time in custody that is assessed for a parole violation.

SAFEKEEPER: County prisoners housed in state prison during sentencing when the county facility does not have adequate facilities to provide for the prisoner.

SUSPENSION: The interruption of a parole period, usually by absconding. Time on suspension is not credited to the period of parole.

TEMPORARY RELEASE: An inmate released temporarily from a CDC institution to court, jail, an outside hospital or medical facility, or on leave to the community.

TERM: A specific period of time the court sentences an inmate to serve in prison.

WORK FURLOUGH: Community based facilities operated by the state and private profit and nonprofit organizations.

WORK FURLOUGH IN CUSTODY: Inmates that were housed in Community Correctional Centers who are placed in local custody for either disciplinary reasons or for an arrest by local jurisdiction.

YOUTH AUTHORITY: see **CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY**.
