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### **Preface**

This report has been compiled to provide a detailed statistical profile of the adult offenders within the Kansas correctional system and to describe offender commitment and release trends for the state.

Each year since Fiscal Year 1980, the data for this report have been obtained through an on-line computerized offender information system in which information is gathered systematically during the entire period that offenders are in the custody or control of the Department of Corrections. The number of offenders for which information could be obtained varies among the items of information being reported. For this reason, each percentage reported is based on the number of individuals for whom the data were available, and not necessarily on the total number in the population being described.


In accordance with Kansas Senate Bill 748, effective May 24, 1990, several correctional facilities were consolidated and/or renamed. Subsequent administrative actions taken by the Department of Corrections in August, 1990 and in June, 1991 resulted in further consolidation of facilities. In addition, two new facilities have opened relatively recently, El Dorado Correctional Facility (Central Unit) in June, 1991, and Larned Correctional Mental Health Facility in January, 1992. Table A contains a list of the current facilities and unit designations along with the prior names and designations. In addition to the facilities listed, inmates were also housed in FY 1994 at one contract work release facility (Topeka Halfway House), at Larned State Hospital (LSH), and in contract jail placement (CJP). Figure A is a map of Kansas showing the locations of the correctional facilities.

### Introduction

The purpose of this statistical profile report is to summarize information regarding offender population levels, commitment trends, and characteristics of the offender population. The first section of the report is a graphic summary of information on these topics with highlights that identify recent trends and developments. Subsequent sections of the report contain more detailed information and include: A description of the pattern of growth in the offender population; a summary of admission and release activities occurring during Fiscal Year 1994; a detailed description of the characteristics of the inmate population confined on June 30, 1994; and a description of the June 30, 1994 population of offenders on supervised release. The statistical tables and graphs of each of these sections of the report are preceded by a summary of the highlights. The reader is invited to refer back to the presentations in the graphic summary when the latter sections of the report are reviewed.

Where possible, emphasis has been placed on comparisons of current information with that of prior years. However, much of the offense-related information is restricted to current year offender populations. This is necessitated by the fact that such terms as "felony class of offense" and "controlling minimum offense," which were used for many years in describing offenses and sentences, no longer apply to all offenders. The overall most serious offenses is still applicable to all offenders. However, the "most serious offense for the current incarceration" is used in lieu of the "controlling minimum offense" to describe the primary "current" offense for each offender, including those sentenced under the Kansas Sentencing Guic alines Act.





### Inmate Population and Post-incarceration Population Under In-state Supervision: Fiscal Years 1985 - 1994



As of the end of the fiscal year (June 30)

- The June 30, 1994 inmate population of 6,091 is about 50% greater than the 1984 population of 4,033.
- The post-incarceration population of 6,083 is nearly triple the size of the 1984 population of 2,127.
- Note that term "post-incarceration population" is used to encompass the traditional "parole population" (Kansas offenders on parole/conditional release in Kansas and compact cases supervised in Kansas), as well as offenders released under the provisions of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act who are serving a designated period of supervised release.


Inmate Population and Post-incarceration Population Under In-state Supervision: Fiscal Year 1994 By Month\*



\*Figures reflect end-of-month population; June 30, 1993 figures were 6240 (inmate) and 5727 (post-incarceration).

- Primarily as a function of the application of the retroactive provisions of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act, which was effective July 1, 1993, there were large changes in offender population levels in both the inmate population and the post-incarceration population, especially in the first eight months of FY 1994.
- By the end of February in FY 1994, the inmate population had decreased by 563 (an average decrease of 70 per month), while the post-incarceration population under instate supervision grew by 732 (an average increase of 92 per month). However, by the end of FY 1994, the inmate population had regained some of the population loss and the post-incarceration population had lost some of the gain, with the two populations ending up nearly equal at 6,091 and 6,083, respectively.


Yearly Admissions and Releases: Fiscal Years 1985 - 1994



- The FY 1994 yearly totals for both admissions and releases are the highest on record.
- Admissions numbered 4,733, an increase of 427 (10%) from the previous record high level in FY 1993.
- Releases numbered 4,937, an increase of 637 (15%) from FY 1993.

#### Admissions


- All Types of Admission: FY 94 figure represents a moderate increase from FY 93 (10%) and from FY 92 (17%).
- Court Admissions: 11% lower in FY 94 than in either FY 93 or FY 92.
- Condition Violators: Much higher in FY 94 -- 52% higher than in FY 93 and 87% higher than in FY 92.

#### Releases

- All Types of Release: FY 94 figure represents an increase from FY 93 (15%) and from FY 92 (41%).
- Much of the increase in releases in FY 94 was due to the application of the retroactive provisions of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act. Court-related releases were down 30% from FY 93 and 29% from FY 92.

## Parole Rate: Kansas Parole Board Decisions to Parole as a Proportion of Total Decisions, FY 1985 - 1994\*




\*Information pertains to decisions resulting from regular parole hearings. Excluded are decisions from parole violation hearings, one outcome of which is the decision to \*reparole,\* which was used increasingly more frequently in FY 94 and in effect reduces the number of regular parole hearings.

Note. In FY 1994 the application of the retroactive provisions of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act, effective July 1, 1993, resulted in a number of offenders being released directly to post-incarceration supervision rather than being considered for parole through the parole hearing process.

- Parole rate is defined as the proportion of regular hearing decisions that are grants of parole.
  - Parole rate decreased to 27% for FY 1994 from 51% in FY 1993.
  - The average parole rate for the 10-year period, FY 1985 FY 1994 is 48.4%.

### Yearly Return Admissions for Violation While on Post-incarceration Status: FY 1985 - 1994\*




\*\*Condition Violation\* reflects the number of return admissions for violation of the conditions of release -- no new felony offense involved. "New Sentence" reflects the number of return admissions resulting from new felony convictions while on release status.

The two types of violation admission (new sentence and condition violation) together comprised the majority (52%) of total admissions in FY 1994.

- New sentence returns: For the past three years this type of return admission has been relatively stable in terms of both number (from 364 to 366) and proportion (8% - 10% of total admissions each year). However, this proportion is somewhat higher than for several years prior to FY 1991, when it was about 7%.
- Condition violator returns: Over the past decade, returns for violation of the conditions of release have increased both in number and as a proportion of total admissions.
  - The number of condition violation admissions has increased eightfold since FY 1984 (from 242 to 2,112) while the total number of admissions has not quite doubled (2,457 to 4,733). In FY 1994 this type of return admission accounted for 45% approaching half the total admissions, compared to 32% in FY 1993 and 28% in FY 1992.
  - A sudden influx of offenders to the post-incarceration population occurred during FY 1994 as a result of the application of the retroactive provisions of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act. This contributed to the near fourfold increase in the number of Kansas offenders on supervised release in-state and out-of-state since FY 1984 (1,806 to 6,933).
  - Along with the increase in the number supervised, the ratio of condition violation returns to the average daily population (ADP) of all Kansas offenders on supervised release has changed. In FY 1992 there was one condition violation return for every 5.5 ADP. In FY 1993 it was one violation return for every 4.5 ADP, and in FY 1994 it was one for every 3.3 ADP.


Capacity vs. Inmate Population:

As of June 30, 1994

- Total inmate population is at 92% of total capacity, down slightly from 94% the previous year (June 30, 1993).
- Male population is at 93% of capacity designated for males, down slightly from 95% the previous year.
- Female population is at 83% of capacity designated for females, down from 89% the previous year.

Total Inmate Population: FY 1985 - 1994




As of June 30 each year

- The inmate population grew steadily from FY 1985 to FY 1989, but dropped in FY 1990 and FY 1991. In FY 1992 the population grew again by 574 or 10% higher than at the end of FY 1991. There was little change from FY 1992 to FY 1993 (+1%), but a large decrease (8%) during the first six months of FY 1994 (through December, 1993). However, by the end of FY 1994 the population had regained much of that loss and at 6,091, was only 149 (2.3%) lower than at the end of FY 1993.
- The decrease in the inmate population from FY 1989 to FY 1990 was related to the passage of Senate Bill 49, which enhanced good time provisions and resulted in "early" releases for a number of inmates.
- The decrease in inmate population during the first half of FY 1994 resulted primarily from a large number of offenders being released under the retroactive provisions of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act, which took effect July 1, 1993.





### Offender Population Levels and Institutional Capacity for Fiscal Year 1994

### Components of the System-wide Offender Population

- Primary components of June 30, 1994 in-state inmate and post-incarceration population of 12,174 are as follows:
  - Inmate confined in Kansas correctional facilities numbered 6,091 or 50.0% of the population.
  - Kansas parole caseload -- Kansas offenders on parole/conditional release or post-release supervision in Kansas and compact parole/probation cases supervised in Kansas -numbered 6,083 or 50.0% of the population.
- Additional offenders under management include 121 inmates either on in absentia or compact status, as well as 2,794 offenders under out-of-state supervision or on abscond status.
- Total number of offenders under management is 15,089.

### **Inmate Population Trends**

- Year-end inmate population and the average daily population for each of the last 10 years are presented graphically in Figure 13.
- Year-end inmate population decreased slightly in FY 1994 by 2.4% -- compared to just less than a 1% increase the previous fiscal year.
- During FY 1994, the inmate population fluctuated considerably from month to month, with decreases in seven of the first eight months of the year and increases in five of the last six months.

• The average monthly change in inmate population has fluctuated markedly over the past 10 years.

### **Current Inmate Population**

- On June 30, 1994 the total inmate population was 6,091, a decrease of 149 (2.4%) from June 30, 1993.
  - The number of inmates in facilities operated by the Department of Corrections was 6,009, a decrease of 139 (2.3%) from FY 1993. The population in contract placement was 82, down 10 from 92 in FY 1993.
- The FY 1994 average daily population was 5,935, a decrease of 184 (3.0%) from 6,119 in FY 1993.

- Total inmate population on December 31, 1994 was 6,369 -- up 278 (5%) from 6,091 on June 30, 1994.
- In-state post-incarceration caseload on December 31, 1994 was 5,522 -- down 561 (9%) from 6,083 on June 30, 1994.

### Capacity of Correctional Facilities

- The total capacity, including placements in non-KDOC facilities, was 6,609 as of June 30, 1994.
  - Of the total capacity, 376 beds have been designated for female occupancy.
- The capacity for placement of inmates at non-DOC facilities was 161. This total includes placements at Larned State Hospital, contract jail facilities, and a contract work release facility (Topeka Halfway House).
- A new 85-bed female maximum security unit currently is under construction and will be located on the grounds of the Topeka Correctional Facility. Completion is targeted for 1995.



End-of-Month Inmate Population: Fiscal Years 1993 - 1994



### \*Changes to Capacity in FY 1994:

Topeka Correctional Facility: 90-bed male minimum security unit closed; renovation at the Reception and Diagnostic Unit increased capacity by 9 (net reduction of 81 in capacity).

Hutchinson Correctional Facility: Court-authorized conversion of 79 3-bed cells to 4-bed cells (increase of 79 in capacity).

### **New Construction:**

A new 85-bed female maximum security unit is currently under construction on the grounds of the Topeka Correctional Facility. Completion is targeted for early 1995.

### Admissions and Releases During Fiscal Year 1994

Information pertaining to admissions and releases of offenders during FY 1994 is summarized in this section. The basic data are presented in Table 4, the format of which is explained in the footnotes accompanying the table. Detailed information on court-related admissions to the system is presented by type of offense and county of commitment. Also included as part of this section is information on two topics that are central to the discussion of admissions and releases -- rate of parole and offender recidivism.

### Summary of Admission and Release Activities





Figure 16 Yearly Releases by Category: Fiscal Years 1985 - 1994

- The number of admissions and releases for each of the past ten years is presented graphically in Figures 15 and 16. Admissions have increased from the previous year in all except in FY 1991.
- The yearly number of releases remained relatively stable from FY 1985 through FY 1987. Large increases during the period FY 1988-1990 have been followed by decreases during the two-year period FY 1991 1992. In FY 1993 and FY 1994 the number of releases increased sharply. The pattern of releases basically follows the fluctuations in the number released to post-incarceration supervision, since this category accounts for the large majority of releases.
- In FY 1994, both admissions and releases were the highest on record.
  - Total number of admissions during FY 1994 was 4,733, up 427 (9.9%) from FY 1993.
  - Total number of releases during FY 1994 was 4,937, up 637 (14.8%) from FY 1993.
- Return Admissions: The two types of violation admission, new sentence and condition violation (no new sentence), together comprised the majority (52%) of total admissions in FY 1994.
  - New sentence returns: For the past three years this type of return admission has been relatively stable in terms of both number (from 364 to 396) and proportion (8% 10% of total admissions each year). However, this proportion is somewhat higher than for several years prior to FY 1991, when it was about 7%.
  - Condition violator returns: Over the past decade, returns for violation of the conditions of release have increased both in number and as a proportion of total admissions.

The number of condition violation admissions has increased eightfold since FY 1984 (from 242 to 2,112) while the total number of admissions has not quite doubled (2,457 to 4,733). In FY 1994 this type of return admission accounted for 45% -- approaching half -- the total admissions, compared to 32% in FY 1993 and 28% in FY 1992.

A sudden influx of offenders to the post-incarceration population occurred during FY 1994 as a result of the application of the retroactive provisions of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act. This contributed to the near fourfold increase in the number of Kansas offenders on supervised release in-state and out-of-state since FY 1984 (1,806 to 6,933).

Along with the increase in the number supervised, the ratio of condition violation returns to the average daily population (ADP) of all Kansas offenders on supervised release has changed. In FY 1992 there was one condition violation return for every 5.5 ADP. In FY 1993 it was one violation return for ever 4.5 ADP, and in FY 1994 it was one for every 3.3 ADP.

### **Admissions by Court Actions**

- The distribution of the FY 1994 court commitments by type of crime indicates that the most serious active offense for the current incarceration was a "person" offense in 39% of the cases and was a "non-person" offense in 61% of the cases. As shown in the data on offense grouping, court commitments for drug offenses were the most common (29%), followed by burglary and forgery/theft, each at 13%.
- The distribution of the FY 1994 court commitments by county indicates that as in prior years, the four most populous counties (Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte) collectively account for over half the total (55%).
- In FY 1994 there were 100 admissions of offenders under age eighteen at the time of offense, down 11 (10%) from FY 1993.

#### Rate of Parole

The information presented on rate of parole reflects Kansas Parole Board decisions only and not actual parole exits from correctional facilities. The length of the period of time between the decision to parole and the actual release varies among cases.

- The rate of parole decreased in FY 1994 -- to 27% from 51% in FY 1993. However, it should be noted that with the application of the retroactive provisions of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act, effective 7-1-1993, in FY 1994 a number of offenders were released to post-incarceration supervision rather than being considered for parole through the parole hearing process. Also, the data on parole decisions, as in past years, is limited to regular parole hearing decisions (whether by regular hearing, special minute, etc.) that were recorded by KPB staff. Excluded are decisions from parole violation hearings (outcomes of which include a new regular hearing date being set, a future release date being set, or the offender being "reparoled"). During FY 1994, the decision to reparole became increasingly more prevalent and in effect reduced the number of regular parole hearings.
- For the past five years, FY 1990 through FY 1994, the rate of parole has averaged 48%. The rates of parole experienced in recent years are substantially lower than the estimated 80% parole rate for the early 1980s.

### Offender Recidivism

The rate of offender recidivism has been operationally defined by the Department as the rate of return to Kansas prisons by offenders released to post-incarceration supervision. In deriving the data on this measure each offender is tracked individually for the specified length of the follow-up period. Separate rates are calculated for those returning with new sentences and those returning with no new sentences. A graphic summary of the return rates for three yearly cohorts of releasees (FY 1989, FY 1990, and FY 1991) is presented in Figure 18. Table 9 contains more detailed information regarding the return rates for the release cohorts for these years and other years (Fiscal Years 1986 - 1993).

"Overall return rate" (combined returns via new sentence, no new sentence, new commitment after discharge, plus those for whom parole warrants were in effect as of the end of the followup period) for the release cohorts was as follows:

Follow-up Period (years after release)	Range of Return Rates
One	29.8% - 42.8%
Two	43.8% - 50.0%
Three	49.2% - 52.9%
Four	52.0% - 56.0%
Five	52.7% - 57.2%

- Note that most failures occur in the first three years after release, and by the end of three years about half those released have returned to Kansas correctional facilities, or have active parole warrants.
- In general there appears to be the same trend in these data as noted in the admissions and releases section of this report:

Considerably higher rate of return for condition violations (no new sentences) in recent years, especially in the first year after release (e.g., up to 27.2% for FY 1993 releases after one year, compared to 20.8% for FY 1992 releases and 17.6% for FY 1991 releases).

Yearly Admissions by Category: Fiscal Years 1985 - 1994





#### Profile of the Inmate Population: June 30, 1994

This section provides a description of selected characteristics of the inmate population confined within Kansas correctional facilities on June 30, 1994, the last day of FY 1994. The focus of this profile information is on the demographic attributes and social backgrounds of the offenders, the nature of the offenses for which incarcerated, the sentences imposed, and the criminal histories of the offenders. The inmate population was composed of 5,779 males and 312 females, for a total of 6,091.

#### Characteristics of the Inmate Population

- The list below summarizes some of the basic characteristics of the inmate population on June 30, 1994. Each of the following characteristics was observed in a majority of the inmates upon admission to the correctional system (or, as in the case of "age" and "length of current confinement," the status as of June 30, 1994):
  - Sex Male (95%)
  - Racial/ethnic Group White (with large non-white minority)
  - Age 32 or under (average age 30.7)
  - Religion Protestant
  - Formal Education High school graduate, G.E.D., or more (56%) (Change from previous years, 1992 and before, when majority had less than high school or G.E.D.)
  - Formal Vocational Training None (about solo-thirds)
  - Longest Period of Employment 18 months or less
  - Type of Admission New court commitment (68%)
  - Type of Offense (overall most serious offense) Person crime (70% vs. 58% for FY 1993)
  - Duration of Confinement To-date (through 6-30-94) 18 months or less
  - Prior Felony Convictions None (62%)
  - Prior Felony Incarcerations None (70%)

- There is considerable difference among the correctional facilities with regard to the demographic and criminal history characteristics of the inmate population housed. To a great extent this reflects the assignment of housing according to the security needs of the inmates, as well as their needs for particular correctional programs and services.
- The distribution of the population by inmate custody classification was as follows on June 30, 1994:

The distribution of the inmate population by substance abuse level indicates that just over half (53%) was categorized as "dependent" or "addicted," with another 21% classified as "episodic abusers."

#### Inmate Employment Status and Program Assignments

- On June 30, 1994, 4,717 or 78% of the 6,009 inmates in department facilities had full-time work, program, academic or vocational assignments. As a general rule, a full-time assignment means that a single work or program assignment occupies the inmate for more than half the work day, usually for 6.5 hours or more.
- Of the 1,292 inmates without full-time assignments:
  - 772 were not available for assignment because they were in some type of segregation, treatment, orientation, or evaluation.
  - 520 were not assigned because they were in transition between assignments, or because an assignment was not available on the specified date, or because they were unwilling or temporarily unable to be assigned.
- An additional 82 inmates were contract placements (Larned State Hospital, contract jail placement, and contract work release).
- The most common institutional assignments were of the following types: institutional support, maintenance, utility work detail, Kansas Correctional Industries, vocational or academic education, and evaluation status. Additionally, a large number of inmates housed at the smaller facilities were assigned to non-institutional work programs.

#### Comparison of Female and Male Inmate Populations

- As of June 30, 1994, the inmate population was 94.9% male and 5.1% female.
  - The women in the inmate population numbered 312, down 23 (6.9%) from 335 the previous year.
- The female ADP is 48% greater and the male ADP is 60% greater than 10 years ago (FY 1984), at which time the female ADP was 205 and the male 3,521. The female ADP decreased by 7% from FY 1993 to FY 1994 while the male ADP decreased by 3%.
- As in the past several years, differences have been noted between the female and male inmates on almost all the characteristics compared. Proportionately speaking, in comparison to the male population the female population:
  - contained more inmates from minority racial/ethnic groups
  - had a higher level of formal education upon admission
  - had been committed for less severe offenses.
  - had shorter average duration of current confinement

- had less extensive criminal histories
  - fewer had prior felony convictions
  - fewer had prior felony incarcerations

## Characteristics of the New Admissions Population

Although the yearly turnover rate is relatively high among the offenders in the inmate population, at any point in time there is a large proportion of the group that has been counted in the yearly population for a number of years. For the past several years the characteristics of newly admitted offenders have been examined in order to better assess any trends toward change in the composition of the inmate population. Included as new admissions are new court commitments, aggravated juvenile delinquency commitments, and probation violators. Many offenders in this group are also members of the end-of-year inmate population since they were still on hand as of June 30, 1994. Note that the new admissions were not necessarily first-time offenders -- some had been incarcerated previously in other states or had served Kansas sentences from which they had been discharged.

- Compared to the June 30, 1993 inmate population, the FY 1994 new admissions population contained proportionately:
  - more offenders in the younger age groups
  - more women
  - more offenders with less serious offenses
  - fewer offenders with prior felony convictions
  - fewer offenders with prior felony incarcerations

To some extent the differences noted are due to the type of offense and sentence length. The
offenders with more serious offenses, extensive criminal histories, and longer sentences tend
to accumulate in the inmate population. Thus, the population on hand contains proportionately
more offenders with these and related characteristics than does the population of new incoming
offenders.

- Offenders whose most serious offense was a drug crime numbered 1,001. This represents 16.5% of the population and reflects an increase of 5% from the corresponding figure for FY 1993 (952), 15% from FY 1992 (867), 37% from FY 1991 (731).
- Distribution of that portion of the inmate population still subject to indeterminate sentencing (by the minimum term of the controlling sentence) shows that there is a nearly even split between those with minimums of five years or under (53%) and those with minimums of more than five years (47%).

For the small portion of the population who had only determinate sentences, the distribution is much different. It should be noted that the determinate sentence group was admitted only recently and probably is not yet representative of a "fully determinate sentencing population."


• It should be noted that, as indicated in Table 18, the information for FY 1994 is not directly comparable to that of previous years since it excludes offenders who had most recently been admitted as condition violators (no new sentence). This exclusion was made because of the

great increase in the number of condition violators released in FY 1994 and the large decrease in the average length of stay of this group (per the provisions of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act, which was effective 7-1-1993).



Female Inmate Population and Average Daily Population: Fiscal Years 1985 - 1994\*



Post-incarceration Offender Population, June 30, 1994

This section provides a brief description of the population of offenders in the correctional

system who were on post-incarceration status as of June 30, 1994. Also included is a summary of

various post-incarceration-related activities occurring during FY 1994.

In years prior to FY 1987 the parole services caseload information that was described in this

report was limited to that pertaining to clients in good standing. For the past several years there has

been more detailed information available regarding the various categories of clients comprising the

caseload. The parole officer caseload consists of Kansas offenders released to post-incarceration

supervision in Kansas, as well as out-of-state parolees and probationers received by Kansas for

supervision under interstate compact. There are no Kansas probationers included in the caseload since

the supervision of this group has been a function of the district courts since July 1, 1979.

Population Under Management of Parole Services

• As shown in the graph of Figure 22, the in-state supervision population -- Kansas offenders

supervised in Kansas and compact cases supervised in Kansas -- has more than doubled since

1987.

The out-of-state supervision population -- Kansas offenders supervised in other states under

compact -- also has more than doubled since that time.

The number on abscond status increased steadily during the ten-year period FY 1984 - 1993, but decreased by 12% in FY 1994. During FY 1994, the Department assigned saven "Special

but decreased by 12% in FY 1994. During FY 1994, the Department assigned seven "Special Enforcement Officers" to be responsible for locating and arresting offenders who abscond

supervision or in some other fashion violate the conditions of release. It is probable that the work of this group contributed significantly to the reduction in the number of absconders.

#### Composition of Post-incarceration Supervision Caseload

- As of June 30, 1994, there was a total in-state caseload of 6,083 offenders under supervision of 91 Kansas parole officers.
  - The total in-state caseload has increased by 356 (6%) from FY 1993.
  - The year-end average caseload per officer was 67, up from 63 in FY 1993, but lower than for several years prior to that (70 to 79 for FY 1990 FY 1992).

## Characteristics of Kansas Offenders Under Post-incarceration Supervision in Kansas

- The basic profile information on the characteristics of the population of Kansas offenders on post-incarceration supervision in Kansas suggests relatively little change in the past several years.
- There are substantial differences between the post-incarceration supervision population and the inmate population with regard to type of offense:
  - For the inmate population, the overall most serious offense was a person offense in 70% of the cases with the remaining 30% non-person offenses. In contrast, for the post-incarceration supervision population, it was 41% person and 59% non-person.

- As in previous years, the releases to post-incarceration supervision occurring in FY 1994 were concentrated in a few counties/states:
  - Three counties (Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte) collectively account for 62% of the total number of in-state releases. Sedgwick County alone received 1,252 or 33% of the statewide total.
  - Three states (Missouri, Oklahoma, and Texas) collectively account for 58% of the total number of out-of-state releases.
- Within the June 30, 1994 post-incarceration population there was a total of 1,336 out-of-state offenders being supervised in Kansas (394 parole cases and 942 probation cases). The number of such cases changed little from the 1,366 at the end of FY 1993.
- As of June 30, 1994, there was a total of 2,187 Kansas cases being supervised out-of-state again the majority (52%) in Missouri, Oklahoma, and Texas collectively.




