

Dedication

We are aware that numerous rapes occur that are not reported to law enforcement. This report is dedicated to rape victims who had the courage to report these offenses, and to all law enforcement officers endeavoring to uphold the laws and serve the people of Arkansas.

Definitions of Rape

The definition of rape in Arkansas, according to Arkansas Code 5-14-103 and as amended by Act 935 is:

A person commits rape if he engages in sexual intercourse or deviate sexual activity with another person:

- A. (1). by forcible compulsion; or
 - (2). who is incapable of consent because he is physically helpless; or
 - (3). who is less than fourteen (14) years of age. It is an affirmative defense to prosecution under this Section that the actor was not more than two
 (2) years older than the victim; or
 - (4). who is not his spouse, less than sixteen (16) years of age and incapable of consent because of mental defect or mental incapacity.
- B. Rape is a class Y felony.

The definition of forcible rape in the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program is:

Forcible rape is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults to commit forcible rape are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) is not counted in this category.

There is a wide disparity between these two definitions. **This report utilizes the Uniform Crime Reporting definition of rape.** The report includes all data collected, with the cooperation of law enforcement agencies from their offense reports, as reported to the Arkansas Crime Information Center in the UCR Program.

Throughout this report, except where noted, rape and attempted rape are combined for statistical purposes.

Rape in Arkansas 1994


There were 1,026 rapes and attempted rapes in Arkansas reported through the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Of these, 897 were rapes and 129 were attempted rapes reported by law enforcement agencies. This represents no change from 1993, but is still 11% higher than five years ago and 48% higher than in 1982.

Comparison of Rapes and Attempted Rapes 1984 through 1994

Rape by Time of Day

When time of day was known, almost half of all rapes (44%) occurred during the 6 hour period, between 10:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m. The most common two hour period was from midnight to 2:00 a.m.

Only 16% of the rapes occurred during the 8 hour period between 6:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. The least likely period was from 8:00 a.m. until noon.



Rape by Day of Week

Where day of the week was known, 53% of the rapes were comitted on weekend days (Friday, Saturday or Sunday) and 20% were committed on Saturday alone.

Rapes by Month (1994 compared to a ten year average – 1984 through 1993)



In 1994, more rapes occurred in June than any other month. From 1984 through 1993, the ten year average was highest for July and August.

Victims of Rape

Approximately three of every five victims were white. White victims have increased 27% over a five year period, black victims have decreased 6%.

The age distribution for victims has remained relatively constant over the past five years. Forty-five percent were younger than eighteen years old and two of every three victims were younger than 25. Two victims were less than a year old and the oldest victim was 94.

More rapes occurred in victims of age fourteen through seventeen than in any other age range. Almost 10% of the victims were 12 or 13 years of age.

Victim Characteristics

Weapons Used to Exert Force Upon Victim

An external weapon (other than hands, fists, verbal threats) was used in only 12% of the rapes compared to 15% in 1993 and 20% in 1992.

Victim-Offender Race Relationship

The first race listed is the race of the *victim*, and the second race is that of the *offender(s)*. For example: *white/black* means that the victim was white and the offender was black (1 or more). For offenses in which race is known, 82% of the rapes were between members of the same race.

Rapes Involving Family Members

Where the offender was known to the victim 24% of the rapes involved family members. Where the offender was a family member, 65 victims (35%) were age 10 or younger, and 111 victims (60%) were 14 years of age or younger.

Location of Actual Rapes and Attempted Rapes

In 1994, 40% of all rapes occurred in the victim's residence and more than two-thirds of all rapes occured in either the victim's, suspect's or another residence.

Rape Reporting Time Lapse

Where time lapse was known 40% of the rapes were reported to law enforcement agencies within four hours of the commission of the offense. This has remained approximately the same since 1991. Before 1991, 50% to 60% of the reports were made to law enforcement within four hours.

In 11% of the offenses, the time lapse was unknown or could not be used because more than one rape occurred over a time period of a month or more.

Rape Offenders (Suspects)

The number of white offenders decreased 5% compared to 1993; while the number of black offenders decreased (3%). The white offenders in the 21-25 age group decreased 19% black offenders of this age decreased 7%.

There were 24 rape incidents where age and race of the offender were unknown. They are included only in the total, and are only 2% of the total offenders.

Medical Attention for Victims

Of the 897 victims of actual rape, 612 (60%) received medical attention. Where medical information is known on actual rape victims, 80% received medical attention.
