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CONNECTICUT UCR PROGRAM

Purpose

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program periodically measures crime in the United States by counting those offenses brought to the attention of law enforcement agencies. The program's objective is to produce reliable crime statistics for law enforcement administration, operation, and management. Criminal justice professionals, legislators, scholars, and others concerned with crime problems make frequent use of UCR generated statistics. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program measures the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime throughout the United States.

National Program

Uniform Crime Reporting was initiated in 1929 when the International Association of Chiefs of Police (I.A.C.P.) standardized procedures for crime data collection. On June 11, 1930, Congress enacted legislation authorizing the Federal Bureau of Investigation to collect nationwide crime counts and to serve as the clearinghouse for such data.

Seven offenses were chosen to serve as an Index for gauging fluctuations in the overall volume and rate of crime. Known as the Crime Index, these offenses included the violent crimes of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault and the property crimes of burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. The Index was modified by congressional mandate in 1979 when it added the crime of arson.

During the early planning of the Program, it was recognized that the differences among criminal codes precluded the possibility of creating a national crime total based upon an aggregate of local statistics to arrive at a national total. Further, because of the variances in punishment for the same offenses in different state codes, no distinction between felony and misdemeanor crimes was possible. To avoid these problems and to provide nationwide uniformity in crime reporting, standardized offense definitions were

formulated by which law enforcement agencies were to submit data, without regard for local statutes.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the I.A.C.P. continues to advise the F.B.I. in the operation of the UCR Program and offers them a valuable link to local police departments.

State Program

In July, 1977, Connecticut began its own Uniform Crime Reporting Program. By August of the same year, data collection began with the recruitment and training of 70 agencies. Today, Connecticut has 100% participation with 99 police departments participating in its UCR Program.

The State Program ensures quality control and uniformity of the crime and arrest reports submitted. The centralized state collection agency streamlines the time consuming process of resolving questions between contributors and verifiers. Upon completion of the quality control process, the returns are forwarded to the F.B.I.

Types of Data Collected

Every month law enforcement agencies throughout the state submit UCR data. They indicate the number of offenses brought to their attention through such sources as victim, police or witness reports.

After counting Crime Index offenses reported, minus any unfounded complaints, contributors provide the number of "actual offenses" and the number of crimes cleared. For a criminal offense to be "cleared," either of the following situations must prevail. (1) at least one person is arrested, charged, and turned over to the court for prosecution; or (2) some element beyond police control precludes the physical arrest of the offender (e.g., death of offender, victim refuses to cooperate, confession by offender already in police custody), resulting in the offense being cleared by

"exceptional means." Contributing agencies also include data on the value of property stolen and recovered in connection with the reported offenses, plus specific information regarding homicides, officers assaulted and arson.

UCR arrest data is collected for all crimes except traffic violations. The age, sex, and race of arrestees are reported for all crime categories.

Verification Procedure

UCR reports are set up with numerous internal crosschecks to achieve reporting accuracy of the data. It is standard operating procedure to examine each incoming report for arithmetical accuracy. Reports are then subjected to logical tests of reasonableness, which are of key importance to confirming validity. Logical errors resulting from misinterpretations of what is to be measured can then be corrected. UCR personnel correct minor errors without contacting contributors, but necessary arithmetical adjustments or unusual variations are brought to the attention of the submitting agency.

UCR Limitations

There are inherent limitations in current crime reporting practices. Of primary importance is the question of how much crime is being reported. The degree to which crimes are being reported varies from area to area. A considerable volume of crime is not reported to law enforcement agencies because the victims consider the offenses against them to be of very little consequence or that the likelihood of apprehending the suspect is small. They may also fear retaliation from offenders, or in fact, be a participant in a crime, i.e., a prostitute who is robbed.

Even with these given limitations, the UCR Program provides the best network of State and National crime figures currently available.

Crime Factors

Because not all factors that have an impact on crime problems are measured or considered by the UCR Program, superficial conclusions are sometimes drawn from crime and arrest data, particularly when attempts are made to compare jurisdiction. Local ordinances and criminal justice administrative policies, record-keeping practices, and the degree of adherence to Uniform Crime Reporting standards all affect the number of crimes and arrests reported. Additionally,

socio-economic conditions and the characteristics and attitudes of the local population influence the extent and nature of criminal behavior in a community. The following factors must be taken into consideration before an informed assessment of crime data can be made:

Density and size of the community population and its surrounding area.

Variations in the composition of the population, particularly its age, sex and race characteristics.

Stability of population with respect to such factors as commuters, seasonal residents, and other transient groups.

Economic conditions, including unemployment.

Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.

Climate.

The trafficking and abuse of drugs in the community.

Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.

Administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency.

Policies of other components of the criminal justice system, such as prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational.

Attitudes of citizens toward crime.

Crime reporting practices of citizens.

Future of the UCR Program: NIBRS


The U.S. Department of Justice has recognized the importance of having one common vehicle to collect criminal justice information.

The Connecticut UCR Program is in cooperation with the Federal UCR Program in the implementation of the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). NIBRS will provide operational and statistical analysis of crime data on an incident by incident basis. NIBRS will also collect data on many more offenses than are reported in the UCR Program. NIBRS reporting will become a byproduct of an officer's case report with information originating directly from the case report. There should be no additional hours spent at the end of the month tallying figures and transposing them to other forms.

NIBRS has the potential to collect state mandated information on Family Violence, Hate Crime and Gang-Related activities. In the future police officers will not have to fill out separate forms for separate reporting programs. With the support of Connecticut Police Departments, this information can be collected by filling out only the case report and forwarding the data through NIBRS.

At this time there are 12 police departments submitting NIBRS data to the Department of Public Safety. Many others are in the testing stage, and still others are in the process of budgeting for new software that will have NIBRS capabilities.

In the near future, NIBRS will replace the current summary-based UCR program with an incident-based program. Connecticut's transition to this new system will revolutionize the utility of criminal justice data.



CRIME MEASUREMENTS

The Crime Index

There were 149,085 Index Offenses reported in 1994, a decrease of 3,404 crimes (2.2 percent) from 1993. The 1994 Total Index Offenses are the lowest reported in the last ten years.



Index Crime has dropped each year since 1990.

The crimes of Murder, Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault make up the Violent Crime category. The total number of violent crimes reported in 1994, 15,018, remained almost the same as in 1993, which was 15,047 (a 0.2 percent difference). The 216 Murders reported in 1994 are the most homicides recorded in the Connecticut UCR Program.

The crimes of Burglary, Larceny and Motor Theft make up the Property Crime category. In 1994 there was a drop of 3,375 property crimes, or a 2.5 percent decrease from 1993. Although the overall number of property crimes fell there was a 3.3 percent increase in Motor Vehicle Theft. The 20,168 Motor Vehicle Thefts reported in 1994 follows two years of decline in that category. The crime of Burglary decreased 9.0 percent from the previous year and is 43.9 percent lower than the high of 51,985 burglaries reported in 1980.




Annual Crime Trends

Monthly crime variations show that, in general, crime occurrences peak in the summer months of July and August. The lowest volumes of crime are reported in January and February, historically the coldest time of the year with the most severe weather and the fewest days.




Type of Crime


Crime analysis generally looks at two categories of crime: Violent Crime and Property Crime. In 1994 Violent Crime in Connecticut made up 10.1 percent of the Crime Index, and 89.9 percent were Property Crimes.



Violent Crime

Violent Crime hit a high in 1990 with 18,219 offenses. Since then the state has experienced a four year decrease, with 15,018 violent offenses reported in 1994.







As in previous years the largest category of Violent Crime is that of Aggravated Assaults. In 1994 there were 7,846 Aggravated Assaults, which accounted for 52.2 percent of all Violent Crime.

Property Crime

The number of Property Crimes reported in 1994 was 134,067; an eleven year low. Most significant was the 9.0 percent decrease in Burglary.



Larceny-Theft traditionally comprises the highest percentage of Property Offenses. In 1994 Larceny-Theft decreased 1.3 percent.





Clearances

For UCR purposes, law enforcement agencies clear or solve an offense when at least one person is arrested, charged with the commission of the offense, and turned over to the court for prosecution. Clearances in 1994 may be for offenses which occurred in prior years. Several crimes may be cleared by the arrest of one individual, while the arrest of many persons may clear only one offense. Law enforcement may also clear a crime by exceptional means when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes the placing of formal charges against the offender. Examples are: suicide of the offender, offender justifiably killed, victim's refusal to cooperate in the prosecution after the offender has been identified, and denial of extradition. exceptionally clear a case law enforcement must know the offender's identity, location, and have sufficient information to support an arrest.

Law enforcement in Connecticut cleared 20.3% of all reported Index Crimes. Collectively 44.9% of violent offenses and 17.6% property offenses were cleared. The higher rate of clearances for violent offenses may be attributed to the fact that there was an element of personal confrontation and a more intense investigation.

Motor Vehicle Theft and Burglary have the lowest clearance rates with 10.3 percent and 12.4 percent, respectively, in 1994.






Property Stolen/Recovered

The total amount of property stolen in Index Offenses during 1994 was \$174,045,435. Of that amount, \$85,598,128 or 49.2% of the stolen property was recovered. When the value of motor vehicles are subtracted from the totals the figures are \$65,129,952 stolen and \$5,047,807 recovered with a recovery rate of 7.8%.



Note: As the most aggregate representation of UCR data, the Crime Clock should be viewed with care. The Crime Clock conveys the relative frequency of Index Crimes. This display does not imply any regularity in the commission of crimes, but rather, the clock represents the annual ratio of crimes to fixed time intervals.

The offenses in this chart were compiled from previously published annual reports by the Department of Public Safety. During this time period reporting compliance was 100%. The term "Rate" refers to the number of crimes per 100,000 population.

INDEX CRIME ANALYSIS 3

MURDER

DEFINITION

Murder is defined in the UCR program as the willful killing of one human being by another.

This offense category includes any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime. Attempted murder and assaults with the intent to kill are not counted as murder, but are included in the UCR as aggravated assaults. Suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are also excluded from the murder classification.

The classification of this offense, as well as for all Index Crimes, is based solely on police investigation and not upon determinations by courts, medical examiners, coroners, juries, or other judicial bodies.

Analysis

Volume


The reported number of murders committed in Connecticut in 1994 was 216. This represented a 4.9 percent increase in the number of murders when compared with 1993. More murders were reported in Connecticut in December than in any other month, while the fewest were reported during February. Note that the "Murder by Month" graph depicts the month when the homicide became known to police.


Rate

The murder rate for Connecticut in 1994 was 6.6 murders for every 100,000 persons. The change in the murder rate increased from 1993 by 4.8 percent.

Clearance Rate


Connecticut law enforcement agencies continue to be successful in solving a greater percentage of murders than any other Index Crime. In 1994, 69.0 percent of all murders were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.






Weapon Used

Of the 1994 murders, 73.1 percent involved firearms. Knives or cutting instruments were used in 13.0 percent of the reported cases. Personal weapons (hands, feet and fists) accounted for 5.1 percent of 1994 murders. Blunt objects were employed in 1.9 percent of murders. Another 4.2 percent involved murder weapons listed as unknown or other.




Of the murders in which firearms were used, handguns accounted for 86.7 percent of the weapons (or 63.4 percent of all murders). Rifles were the murder means in 4.4 percent, shotguns in 3.2 percent and firearms of an unstated type were 5.7 percent.



Persons Arrested

When compared to 1993 statistics, the number of persons arrested for the crime of murder in Connecticut increased

22.4 percent. Of the persons arrested for murder, 92.7 percent were male, almost half (48.2 percent) of arrestees were white and 17.8 percent were under age 18. By contrast, ten years ago (1985) persons under 18 accounted for only 9.2 percent of murder arrestees.



Murder Circumstances

The majority of murders for which circumstances are provided are itemized in the following chart. Frequently, more than one circumstance may be present in any one homicide situation; for instance a gang dispute over drug turf contains elements relating both to drugs and gangs. Therefore caution is advised in interpetation of this circumstantial data. Most frequently cited circumstances were: Other Arguments, 19.4 percent, Family Violence, 13.4 percent, and Narcotic Drug Laws, 11.1 percent.

Murder Victims


Law enforcement agencies participating in UCR provide additional homicide information so that an in-depth analysis of murder is possible. Through the Supplemental Homicide Reporting system, information is provided that identifies the age, sex, race and ethnic origin of both victims and offenders; the relationship of the victim to the offender; the murder weapon; and the circumstances of the offense.

Based on the information about the murder victims it can be determined that 77.3 percent of murder victims in 1994 were male and 22.7 percent were female. The age group with the greatest number of murder victims is the 20-24 age group.

Of the victims whose race was known, 51.2 percent were white, 47.9 percent were black, and 0.9 percent were Asian or Pacific Islander. The 20-24 year age group comprised 25.0 percent (54) of all murder victims. The next highest age group for victims were 15-19 year olds at 17.6 percent; 25-29 year olds at 15.7 percent; and 30-34 year olds at 13.9 percent. Almost three-fourths (72.2%) of all victims were within the 20 year age group from 15 through 35 years of age.

Females comprised 70 percent of all victims over the age of 65, and two-thirds of the victims under age 15.

Murder Offenders

Information pertaining to homicide offenders is known for only slightly over half (57%) of the offenders, since in many homicides the identity of the offender(s) is unknown. Of known murder offenders, 92.5 percent were male and 7.5 percent were female. Almost three-fourths of the known offenders fell within the fifteen year age span ranging from age 15 through 29. Nine out of ten offenders were between the ages of 15 and 39. Of known offenders, 51.1 percent were black, 48.1 percent were white, and 0.8 percent were Asian.

RAPE

DEFINITION

Rape, as defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting program, is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Statistics reported in this crime category include attempts to commit forcible rape. However, statutory rape (rape against a female under the age of consent), sexual assaults on males and other sex offenses are excluded.




Volume


The number of rapes reported for Connecticut in 1994 was 805. This represents an increase of 0.6 percent in the number of rapes when compared with 1993. More rapes were reported for Connecticut in August than in any other month, while the fewest rapes were reported during December. Of all reported forcible rapes during 1994, 16.0 percent were attempts to commit forcible rape and 84.0 percent were rapes by force.


Rate

The rape rate for Connecticut in 1994 was 47.8 rapes for every 100,000 females. The rape rate increased 0.8 percent from 1993.










Clearance Rate

Statewide, Connecticut enforcement agencies cleared 47.2 percent of all reported rapes compared to 53.9 percent in 1993. Of the attempts to commit forcible rape, 31.0 percent were cleared and, of the rapes by force, 50.3 percent were cleared.

Persons Arrested


When compared with 1993, the number of persons arrested for forcible rape decreased 18.7 percent to 379. Of the forcible rape arrestees in 1994, 14.0 percent were under 18, 60.7 percent were white, 38.3 percent were black, and 1.0 percent were Asian. The age group 30-34 was the highest group in terms of the number arrested with 19.3 percent of all arrests.



SEX CRIMES

The sex offense arrests below include offenses against chastity, common decency, morals and the like. NOT included in the data below are rape arrests, arrests for prostitution and arrests for commercialized vice.

Sex offense related arrests in 1994 decreased by 12.0 percent from 1993. These same sex crime arrests are down 35.1 percent from 10 years ago (1985).



ROBBERY

DEFINITION

Robbery, in the Uniform Crime Reporting program, is defined as the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force, threat of force or violence, or by putting the victim in fear.

Robbery is a violent crime that frequently results in injury to the victim. Included in this category are assaults to commit robbery and attempted robberies.


ANALYSIS


Volume

The number of robberies reported for Connecticut in 1994 was 6,151. This represented a 4.6 percent decrease in the number of robberies when compared with 1993. More robberies were reported in Connecticut in August than in any other month, while the fewest robberies were reported for February.

Rate


The robbery rate for Connecticut in 1994 was 187.8 robberies for every 100,000 persons. The change in the rate of robbery from 1993 was a decrease of 4.6 percent.





Clearance Rate

Statewide, Connecticut law enforcement agencies were successful in clearing or solving by arrest 25.1 percent of all robberies that were reported. Robberies by "other weapons" experienced the highest rate of clearance (29.1 percent), while robberies using firearms had the lowest rate of clearance at 20.0 percent.




Losses

In 1994, property loss due to robberies amounted to \$3,200,168. Although the number of offenses decreased in 1994, the value of lost property increased 25.9 percent from the property loss experienced in 1993. The value of property stolen during robberies averaged \$520 per incident, up \$126 from the average loss in 1993. The impact of this violent crime cannot be measured in monetary loss alone, as the crime involves force or threat of force and many victims suffer personal injury.

Robberies on streets and highways accounted for more than half (3,761 incidents, 61.1 percent) of these offenses. Robberies of commercial establishments were 12.2 percent (751 cases) of the total; residences were 8.6 percent (527 occurences); convenience stores were 4.2 percent (260 incidents); gas stations were 2.6 percent (160 cases); and banks were 1.0 percent (64 occurences). The remainder were all other locations.






Of all reported robberies in 1994, 38.4 percent were committed with the use of firearms. Strong-arm tactics (hands, fists, feet, etc.) accounted for 42.2 percent of robbery weapons; knives or cutting instruments were used in 10.0 percent of robberies; and other weapons made up the rest of the incidents.

Persons Arrested

Statewide arrests for robbery in 1994 amounted to 2,185 persons. When compared with 1993, the number of persons arrested for robbery increased 7.3 percent. Of the robbery arrestees in 1994, 25.6 percent were under 18 (up from 20.0 percent in 1993), with the remainder being adults; 89.6 percent were male; 46.5 percent were white; and 52.6 percent were black. The age group reflecting the largest number of robbery arrestees was the 15-19 year-old bracket with 28.9 percent (631 persons) of the total.





AGGRAVATED ASSAULT


DEFINITION


Aggravated Assault is defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Statistics for aggravated assault include attempts to commit aggravated assault.

Analysis

Volume

The number of aggravated assaults reported in Connecticut in 1994 was 7,846. This represented an increase of 3.3 percent in the number of aggravated assaults when compared to 1993. More aggravated assaults were reported in Connecticut in July than any other month, while the fewest aggravated assaults were reported during January and February.






Rate


The aggravated assault rate for Connecticut in 1994 was 239.6 aggravated assaults for every 100,000 persons. The change in the rate of aggravated assault from 1993 was an increase of 3.4 percent.

Type

Of all reported aggravated assaults in 1994, 13.3 percent (1,041) were committed with the use of firearms. Strongarm weapons (hands, feet, fists, etc.) accounted for 36.5 percent (2,867) of the aggravated assaults; knives or cutting instruments were used in 15.6 percent (1,223) of the cases; and other dangerous weapons made up the remaining 34.6 percent (2,715 incidents).

The use or attempted use of a dangerous weapon in an assault, or the serious injury inflicted by hands, fist, feet, teeth, etc. is what separates this index offense from assaults categorized as "simple assaults." Connecticut reported 25,669 simple assaults in 1994, which is 76.6 percent of all assaults.






Clearance Rate

Statewide, Connecticut law enforcement agencies were successful in clearing or solving by arrest 59.6 percent of all aggravated assaults. Since aggravated assaults are often a face-to-face confrontation between an assailant and a victim, there is a better likelihood of the assailant being identified and apprehended than in some other offenses. Strong-arm assaults, when hands, fists, feet, teeth, etc. are the only weapons used, experienced the highest rate of clearance (72.0 percent). Aggravated assaults using firearms showed the lowest rate of clearance at 40.2 percent.

Persons Arrested

Connecticut law enforcement agencies arrested 5,878 persons for aggravated assault in 1994. When compared with 1993, the number of aggravated assault arrests decreased 6.3 percent. Of the aggravated assault arrestees in 1994, 15.8 percent were under 18; 77.6 percent were male; 62.9 percent were white; 36.2 percent were black; and the remainder were other races. The age group with the highest number of aggravated assault arrests was the 15-19 year-old bracket (20.6 percent) for both males and females. The 20-24 year olds were the second largest age group with 19.3 percent of arrestees.



BURGLARY

DEFINITION

Burglary in the Uniform Crime Reporting program is categorized into three subclassifications: The forcible entry of a structure; unlawful entry where no force is used; and attempted forcible entries to commit burglary.




Volume

The number of burglaries reported in Connecticut in 1994 was 29,152, a 9.0 percent decrease compared with the number of burglaries in 1993. Burglary activity in 1994 is the lowest for the ten years presented, and is 27.8 percent under the 1990 peak burglary level. More burglaries were reported in Connecticut for July than in any other month. The month with the fewest burglaries reported was February.

Rate


The 1994 burglary rate for Connecticut was 890.1 burglaries for every 100,000 persons. The change in the burglary rate from 1993 was a decrease of 9.0 percent.







Type

Of all reported burglaries in 1994, 19,799 (67.9 percent) occurred at residences. Forcible entry accounted for 66.1 percent of all burglaries, while 21.5 percent were unlawful entries without force and the remainder were forcible entry attempts. Burglaries of residences (when the approximate time was known) occurred slightly more frequently (60.2 percent of the time) during the day (6:00 AM to 6:00 PM). Seventy-eight (78.8) percent of the burglaries of non-residences occurred at night between 6:00 PM and 6:00 AM.








Value

In 1994, Connecticut burglary victims suffered losses totaling \$25,775,845, a decrease of 4.0 percent when compared to the 1993 total burglary losses. The average dollar loss per burglary was \$884. The average loss for residential offenses was \$886 (19,799 incidents totaling \$17,540,473). Non-residential losses totaled \$8,235,372 for 9,353 cases, averaging \$881.


Clearance Rate

Statewide, Connecticut law enforcement agencies were successful in clearing 12.4 percent of all burglaries reported. Burglaries classified as unlawful entry-no force were cleared at 13.3 percent and forcible entry had a clearance rate of 12.7 percent, while attempted forcible entries had a clearance rate of 9.3 percent.



Persons Arrested

In 1994, 5,386 arrests for burglary were made by Connecticut law enforcement agencies. When compared to 1993, the number of persons arrested for burglary decreased 3.9 percent. Of the burglary arrestees, 1,590 (29.5 percent) were under 18, with the remainder being adults; 91.4 percent were male; 73.5 percent were white; 26.1 percent were black and the remainder were other races. The age group that contributed the largest number of burglary arrestees was the 15-19 year-old group with 1,578 arrestees at 29.3 percent.



LARCENY

DEFINITION


Larceny theft, in the Uniform Crime Reporting program, is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Larceny theft includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, and other things of value in which no use of force, violence or fraud occurs.


In the UCR program, this crime classification does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and the passing of worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft is not included in this category as it is a separate index crime offense.



Volume


The number of larceny thefts reported in Connecticut in 1994 was 84,747. The volume of larcenies in 1994 decreased 1.3 percent from 1993. More larceny thefts were reported in Connecticut in August than in any other month, while the fewest larcenies were reported during January.





Rate

The 1994 larceny theft rate for Connecticut was 2,587.7 thefts for every 100,000 persons. The change in the larceny rate from 1993 was a decrease of 1.3 percent.




Losses


In 1994, larceny theft victims suffered losses totaling \$38,480,944. This total represents an increase of 2.0 percent when compared with 1993 total theft losses. The average dollar loss per theft was \$454, up from \$439 in 1993.

Thefts in the "under \$50" category accounted for 37.6 percent (31,875 cases) of all reported thefts (but only 1.0 percent, \$400,556 of the total value), while thefts of items totaling over \$200 accounted for 37.5 percent (31,760 incidents) of the total larcenies reported and 93.5 percent--\$35,974,838--of the total value. The remainder of the thefts were between \$50 and \$200, accounting for 24.9 percent (21,112 occurences) of the volume and 5.5 percent--\$2,105,550--of the value.

For data collection, larceny theft is divided into nine categories: pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, thefts from motor vehicles, theft of motor vehicle parts, theft of bicycles, theft from buildings, theft from coin-operated machines and all other thefts (except motor vehicles).

The highest losses per reported offense were thefts from buildings averaging \$746. The All Other category averaged the second highest loss rate at \$661 per occurrence, with Thefts from Motor Vehicles averaging \$515 each. Pocket-Picking, Purse Snatching, Motor Vehicle Parts stolen, Bicycles stolen and thefts from Coin-Operated Machines ranged from \$235-239 loss per incident. Shoplifting had the lowest average loss at \$137.





Clearance Rate

Statewide, Connecticut law enforcement agencies were successful in clearing or solving by arrest 21.1 percent of all reported larceny thefts. As with many other non-violent property crimes, most larcenies are crimes of opportunity and stealth which make detection and apprehension difficult.

Persons Arrested

Connecticut law enforcement agencies made 22,224 larceny theft arrests in 1994. When compared with 1993, the number of persons arrested for theft decreased 2.4 percent. Of the theft arrestees, 23.6 percent were under 18; 67.9 percent were male; 69.6 percent were white; 29.5 percent were black. The age group with the largest number of theft arrestees was the 15-19 year-old group with 4,789, which is 43.4 percent higher than the next highest group.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

DEFINITION

Motor Vehicle Theft, for UCR purposes, is the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that travels on land but not on rails. Specifically excluded from this category are motor boats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment.




Volume

The number of motor vehicle thefts reported in Connecticut in 1994 was 20,168. The volume of motor vehicle theft increased 3.3 percent when compared with 1993. More motor vehicle thefts were reported for November than in any other month, while the fewest motor vehicle thefts were reported during January and February.

Rate


The 1994 motor vehicle theft rate for Connecticut was 615.8 motor vehicle thefts for every 100,000 persons. The change in the motor vehicle theft rate from 1993 was an increase of 3.4 percent.






Losses

In 1994, motor vehicle theft losses totaled \$108,915,483, including vehicles stolen in the commission of other index crimes. This loss represents an increase of 6.1 percent compared to 1993 total motor vehicle theft losses. Of the stolen motor vehicles reported, 89.2 percent (17,984) were automobiles, 5.6 percent (1,136) were trucks and buses, and the remainder are classed as "other vehicles." The "other vehicles" classification in UCR includes such vehicles as snowmobiles, motorcycles, motor scooters, trail bikes, mopeds, golf carts and the like.







Clearance Rate

Statewide, Connecticut law enforcement agencies were successful in clearing 10.3 percent of all motor vehicle thefts that were reported. Persons under 18 years of age accounted for 30.0 percent of the motor vehicle thefts that were cleared.

Of the three vehicle types for which information is collected, Other Vehicles show the highest rate of clearance at 10.7 percent. Of the Other Vehicles clearances, 22.3 percent involved persons under eighteen. Thefts of Autos were cleared at a 10.4 percent rate, of which 30.5 percent involved persons under eighteen. Trucks and Buses had a 9.3 percent clearance rate, and 28.3 percent of these clearances involved persons under the age of eighteen.






Persons Arrested

In 1994, Connecticut law enforcement agencies arrested 2,639 persons for motor vehicle theft. When compared with 1993, the number of motor vehicle theft arrests increased 7.3 percent. Of the motor vehicle theft arrestees in 1994, 51.0 percent were under 18; 88.6 percent were male; 54.0 percent were white; 45.7 percent were black. The age group that contained the largest number of motor vehicle theft arrestees was the 15-19 year-old group (46.9 percent).

Recoveries

There were 14,309 motor vehicles recovered in 1994 with an estimated value at recovery of \$80,550,321, including vehicles recovered which were stolen in the commission of other index crimes.



ARSON

DEFINITION

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, arson is defined as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arson. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded from data collection.




Volume

The reported number of arsons committed in Connecticut in 1994 was 1,106. The volume of arson offenses increased 9.2 percent in comparison with 1993. Because the U.S. Congress did not mandate arson to be an Index Crime until 1979, information on offenses before that year is incomplete.

Rate

The 1994 arson rate for Connecticut was 33.8 arsons for every 100,000 persons. The change in the arson rate from 1993 was an increase of 9.4 percent.






Losses

Structures were the most frequent targets of arsonists in 1994, comprising 71.3 percent of the reported incidents and 94.2 percent of the property value lost to arson. Mobile property constituted 23.6 percent of the reported arsons, but only 5.8 percent of the value lost. The 'other' category (crops, timber, fences, signs, etc.) formed the remaining 5.1 percent of arsons and .02 percent of the value lost.

Residential property comprised 67.4 percent of the structural arsons in 1994, with 22.7 percent of residential arsons directed at single occupancy dwellings. Of all targeted structures, 21.5 percent of the properties



were abandoned, or not in use, at the time the arson occurred. Motor vehicles were 95.4 percent of all the mobile property at which arsons were directed.

In 1994, arson victims suffered losses totaling \$14,192,043. This total value loss represents a 37.5 percent decrease when compared with 1993 total arson losses. The average dollar loss per arson was \$12,832, down from \$22,419 in 1993. Structural property was the classification with the highest average loss per offense, \$16,940. Single occupancy residences showed an average loss of \$28,055; motor vehicle arsons averaged a loss of \$2,818; and the "other" group (crops, timber, fences, signs, etc.) had an average loss of \$63.

Clearance Rate


Statewide, Connecticut law enforcement agencies were successful in clearing or solving by arrest 25.7 percent of all arsons that were reported. Of the various property classifications struck by arsonists, the highest rate of clearances was reported for Other, of which 33.9 percent were cleared. Mobile showed the lowest clearance rate (11.5 percent) of any property class.


Of all arson clearances, 50.0 percent involved persons under the age of eighteen. Persons in this age group accounted for 48.4 of single occupancy clearances; 57.9 percent of the clearances on other residences; 54.8 percent of the community/public structure clearances; and 76.9 percent of the storage structure clearances.

Persons Arrested

Connecticut law enforcement agencies arrested 285 persons for the crime of arson in 1994. When compared with the previous year, the number of persons arrested for arson increased 3.6 percent. Of the persons arrested for arson in 1994, 149 (52.3 percent) were under 18; 89.8 percent were male; 80.4 percent were white; 19.3 percent were black. The age group that contained the highest number of arson arrestees were the 15-19 year-old group (30.9 percent), followed closely by 10-14 year olds with 27.7 percent of arrestees.






Crime Index Offenses By County





According to population figures supplied by the F.B.I., Connecticut's eight counties in descending order of population are: Hartford (845,949), Fairfield (827,614), New Haven (800,124), New London (247,935), Litchfield (176,267), Middlesex (144,327), Tolland (129,784), and Windham (103,000).



PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED 3

For further analysis of crime, the Uniform Crime Reporting Program collects supplementary reports relating to properties stolen and recovered by type and value. Although Connecticut law enforcement agencies recovered approximately 49% of the property stolen, over \$88 million dollars worth was not recovered. When motor vehicles are excluded from the property loss total, the recovery rate is 7.8%, which leaves an unrecovered value of over \$60 million dollars for all other property.


The reader should take note that these values relate only to Index Crime. Property lost or damaged as a result of crimes such as fraud, vandalism, etc., are not included in these totals.

ARREST DATA 6

The Connecticut UCR Program requires monthly reports on persons arrested in the state. A record of total arrests for Part I and Part II crimes is received from UCR participants by the Age, Sex and Race of arrestees. Traffic arrests, except Driving Under the Influence, are not reported. The Age, Sex, and Race of Persons Arrested Forms are designed to collect data on the number of persons arrested and not the number of charges lodged. For example, a person may be arrested on several charges at one time; only one arrest would be scored. For UCR purposes, a juvenile is counted as "arrested" when circumstances are such that if he or she were an adult, an arrest would result. The UCR crime definitions are below.

PART I OFFENSES

Murder & Nonnegligent Manslaughter-The willful killing of one human being by another.

Negligent Manslaughter-The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Rape-The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.

Robbery-Taking or attempting to take anything of value from the control of another person by force, threat of force or violence, or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault-Attack by one person upon another to inflict severe bodily injury.

Burglary-The unlawful entry of a structure, forcible and non-forcible, including attempts to do the same.

Larceny-The unlawful taking of property from the possession of another.

Motor Vehicle Theft-The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

Arson-Willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn a structure, vehicle, property of another, etc.

PART II OFFENSES

Other Assaults (Simple)-Assaults which are not of an aggravated type.

Forgery and Counterfeiting-Making, altering, uttering or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true. Includes attempts to do the same.

Fraud-Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks except forgeries and counterfeiting. Also includes larceny by bailee.

Embezzlement-Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care.

Stolen Property; Buying, Receiving, Possessing-Offenses of buying, receiving, and possession of stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

Vandalism-Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or person having custody or control.

Weapons; Carrying, Possessing, etc.-All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

Prostitution and Commercialized Vice-Sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts, such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc.

Sex Offenses (Except Forcible Rape, Prostitution and Commercialized Vice)-Statutory rape, offenses against chastity, common decency, morals and the like. Includes attempts to commit any of the above.

Narcotic Drug Laws-Offenses relating to narcotic drugs, such as unlawful possession, sale, use, growing and manufacturing of narcotic drugs.

Gambling-Promoting, permitting or engaging in illegal gambling.

Offenses Against the Family and Children-Nonsupport, neglect, desertion or abuse of family and children.

Driving Under the Influence (DUI)-Driving or operating any motor vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

Liquor Laws-State or local liquor law violations, except drunkenness and driving under the influence.

Disorderly Conduct-Breach of the peace.

Vagrancy-Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

All Other Offenses-All other violations of state or local laws, except crimes listed above and traffic violations.

Curfew and Loitering Laws (Juveniles)-Offenses relating to violation of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such laws exist.

Runaway (Juveniles)-Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody as runaways under provisions of local statutes.





### Law Enforcement Employee Data

The Connecticut law enforcement community employed an average of 2.20 full-time officers for every 1,000 state inhabitants as of October 1, 1994. Considering full-time civilians, the overall law enforcement employee rate was 2.74 per 1,000 inhabitants according to 99 local police departments and the state police. These agencies represented a population of 3,275,000 state residents, employing 7,207 officers and 1,764 civilians.

Key figures for 1994 law enforcement personnel were:


- Law enforcement agencies in the state reported a total of 8,971 full-time police employees for 1994.
- There were 7,207 sworn police officers, 80.3% of the total law enforcement employees.
- Full-time civilian employees were reported at 1,764; or 19.7% of total law enforcement employees.
- 93.3% of all full-time law officers were male; 6.7% were female.
- 67.1% of all full-time civilians were female; 32.9% were male.
- Of the 7,207 full-time sworn police officers
   86.4% were Municipal Officers and 13.6% were
   State Police.

Varying demographic and other jurisdictional characteristics greatly affect the requirements for law enforcement service from one locale to another. The needs of a highly mobile or seasonal population may be different from a population that is relatively stable. Economic factors, size and density of the jurisdiction, variations of the population (particularly the age, sex and race of the inhabitants) are only some of the factors that will affect the need for police service.

Sworn staffing levels reached 7,207 officers in 1994. This was the third highest count in the last ten years with 7,216 officers in 1988. The 7,398 officers in 1990 was the highest. The least amount of sworn officers reported in the ten year period was 6,780 in the year 1986.



## FAMILY VIOLENCE 11

### **DEFINITION**

Police in Connecticut make an arrest whenever they respond to a call that involves family violence and there is sufficient probable cause to effect an arrest. Officers report each family violence arrest incident to the Department of Public Safety.


In order for an offense to be classified as family violence, there must be either injury or present danger with the likelihood that physical violence will occur, and the relationship between parties conforms to the definition of "family or household members." Verbal abuse or argument, without violence or threatened violence, does not constitute family violence. Acts of parents when disciplining minor children do not constitute family violence unless the actions are abusive.²



There were 18,768 incidents of family violence in which at least one person was arrested during 1994. This represents a 4.4 percent decrease since 1993. About eighty-five percent of cases involved an arrest for assault, breach of peace or disorderly conduct.

Of the 16,702 total number of victims, 13,385 (80.1%) were female and 3,317 (19.9%) were male. There were 15,083 total offenders, 12,812 (84.9%) of whom were male and 2,271 (15.1%) were female. There were 8,024 dual arrests (both arrested), of whom 4,115 were male and 3,909 were female.

For 47 percent of victims their relationship to the offender was 'live-in' (people who live together, ever lived together or share a child). Half (50.9%) of 'Both Arrestees' were live-ins. More than half (53.7%) of the participants were between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-five. Ninety percent of all participants were under the age of 46.

### Offenses

Arrestees used guns in 275 incidents, knives in 945, other dangerous weapons in 1,402 and physical force in 13,461. Injury, either minor or serious, occurred in 12,422 incidents; 11,998 were minor and 424 were serious injuries.

A prior court order, either a Temporary Restraining Order issued by the civil court or a Protective Order issued by the criminal court, was issued in 3,389 of the incidents. Liquor or drugs were involved in 8,375 of the incidents.


In 2,485 (13.2%) incidents, children were directly involved. In an additional 6,209 (33.1%) incidents, children were present in the household, but were not involved in the incident. In 10,074 (53.7%) incidents, children were neither involved nor present.

### Family Violence Homicide5

There were 29 family violence homicides. This represents a 3.6 percent increase from 1993. There were 24 people arrested and 5 additional incidents in which the offender committed suicide. Of the 216 homicides reported to UCR during 1994, 29 (13.4%) were verified as family violence. Of the 29 victims, 25 (86.2%) were female and 4 (13.8%) were male. Twenty-four of the 29 offenders (82.8%) were male. Females accounted for 5 (17.2%) of the family violence homicide offenders.

Guns were the most commonly used weapon in family violence homicides (34.5%), followed closely by knives (31.0%). These percentages differ from the weapons used for overall homicides in Connecticut in 1994. As a percentage of all homicides occurring in the state, guns were used more frequently (73.2% of the homicides), and knives in only 13.0 percent of total homicides.

The remaining family violence homicides were caused by other dangerous weapons (13.8%) and physical force (hands, fists, feet etc.-20.7%).

Prior court orders were known to have been issued in five of the homicides. Liquor or drugs were known to be involved in three incidents.



### HATE CRIME 12

### **DEFINITION**

The Connecticut legislation pertaining to hate crimes, C.G.S. Sec. 29-7m directs the Division of State Police within the Department of Public Safety to monitor, record and classify all crimes committed in the state which are motivated by bigotry and bias. The public act became effective as of July 1, 1988. For an incident to be considered a hate crime two criteria must be satisfied:


- 1. A crime as defined by Sec. 53a-24 of the Connecticut General Statutes must have been committed.
- 2. There must be probable cause to believe the crime was motivated by bias and bigotry with reference to race, religion, ethnicity or sexual orientation.


### ANALYSIS

### Volume

The number of hate crimes has fluctuated since 1989, which was the first full year of reporting. The total number of hate crime incidents reported in 1989 was 82, in 1990 it was 69 and in 1991 the total was 103. In 1992, 90 crimes were reported and 137 were reported in 1993. The reported number of hate crime incidents in Connecticut in 1994 was 105. This was 23.4 percent lower than 1993.




Sixty-nine percent of incidents involved a single victim, 15 percent of incidents had 2 or more victims and 16 percent of the victims were organizations of some type. Fifty-three percent of cases involved a single offender and thirty percent had unknown offenders.



### Day of Week

Twenty-four percent of hate crimes occurred on Friday. Sunday (16.2%) and Thursday (15.2%) were the next two days with the highest numbers of offenses.



### **Bias Motivation**

In 1994, the largest percentage of hate crime reports were motivated by racial bias. The second most commonly reported bias motivation was religious followed by sexual orientation. The lowest number of incidents involved ethnicity.


### **Extent of Injury**

In 87.6 percent of hate crime incidents there was no personal injury to the victim. In 7 cases (6.7%) there was an injury but no treatment was needed and in 6 cases there was treatment needed (5.7%). Property was defaced in 22.9 percent of the incidents. Of the property defacement incidents 45.8 percent included a swastika. Property was destroyed in 5.7 percent of incidents.

### **Offenses**


Offenses in the hate crime data collection program are defined in accordance with federal Uniform Crime Reporting definitions as well as specific Connecticut statutes concerning crimes motivated by bigotry or bias. Hate crime offenses consist of the index crimes of murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The non-

index crimes include criminal mischief, breach of peace and harassment as well as intimidation based on bigotry or bias. The assault category which includes both simple and aggravated assaults accounted for 14.3 percent of the reported incidents. Criminal mischief (vandalism) occurred in 23.8 percent of incidents while threatening and intimidation based on bigotry or bias account for 28.6 percent of all bias crime.

### Source of Data



The reports received each month indicate the number of persons reported missing as well as the cancellation of reports previously entered. Cancellations designate cases as inactive, that is, no longer reported missing, for a variety of reasons. The total number of active reports fluctuates as these reports are received. The greatest number of missing person cases consistently occurs for those between the ages of thirteen and seventeen.
