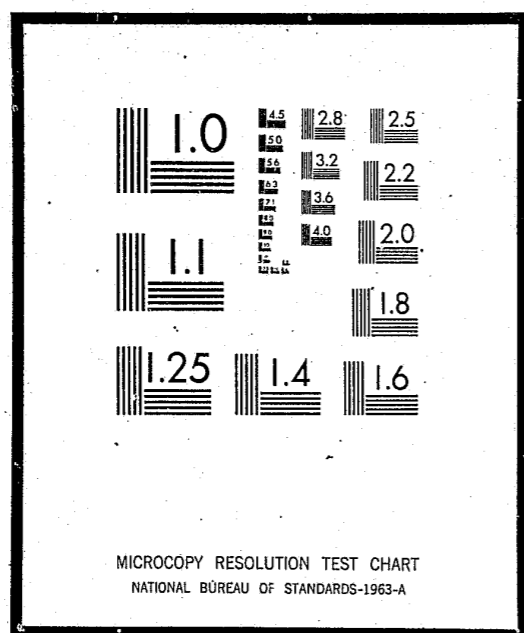

Dear Sir:

It is my privilege to present to you Crime in Kansas: 1973, the sixth consecutive annual publication since the Kansas Bureau of Investigation monthly crime reporting program began.

Although reports of certain serious crimes have decreased or remained stable in 1973 compared with 1972 (aggravated assault, auto theft, larceny, and rape), serious crime as a whole was up by 3.8 percent. However, due to the cooperative and vigorous efforts of Kansas law enforcement officers, 4.5 percent more crimes were cleared in 1973 than in 1972.

Nothing is more essential for measuring the progress of society toward the reduction of crime than comprehensive, accurate and timely criminal justice information. For this reason, the National Advisory Commission on Criminal Justice Standards and Goals adopted as one of its key proposals cooperation and coordination for developing criminal justice information systems within each state.

In keeping with Advisory Commission recommendations and related proposals of the Governor's Committee on Criminal Administration for improvement in criminal justice information systems and integration of planning data resources, the Kansas Bureau of Investigation has incorporated in Crime in Kansas: 1973 data from the information systems of over two hundred law enforcement agencies. For the first time, additional information has been supplied by the Kansas Supreme Court, the state district courts and the Kansas Department of Corrections.

Through such cooperation of agencies throughout the state, more information for crime prevention and planning will be available to the criminal justice community and Kansas citizens in the future.

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# INTRODUCTION

## Background

In 1963 the current Kansas crime reporting program was begun by the Attorney General and the Kansas Bureau of Investigation, based upon the FBI-administered Uniform Crime Reports, the Kansas program records offenses and arrests throughout the state.

Since 1968, the KBI has published Crime in Kansas as a summary and analysis of reports voluntarily submitted by Kansas law enforcement agencies. Each month, sheriffs, city police, and university security personnel report on standard forms the number of offenses which become known to them. Class I offenses correspond to the Index Offenses used by the FBI because of their serious nature and the frequency and reliability with which they are reported: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, manslaughter by negligence, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, and auto theft. All other crimes are designated as Class II offenses. Definitions for each category of offenses and other explanations and notes appear in the Appendix of this publication.

The crime count in each monthly report is taken from a record of offenses reported by victims, witnesses or other sources, as well as the "on view" offenses discovered by officers. Those complaints determined by subsequent investigation to be "unfounded" are subtracted from "offenses reported," the result being "offenses known." These are reported without regard to arrests or other clearances. Contributors also report the age, sex, and race of those arrested in each crime category. Finally the number of crimes in each category which were cleared by arrest or other means are recorded.

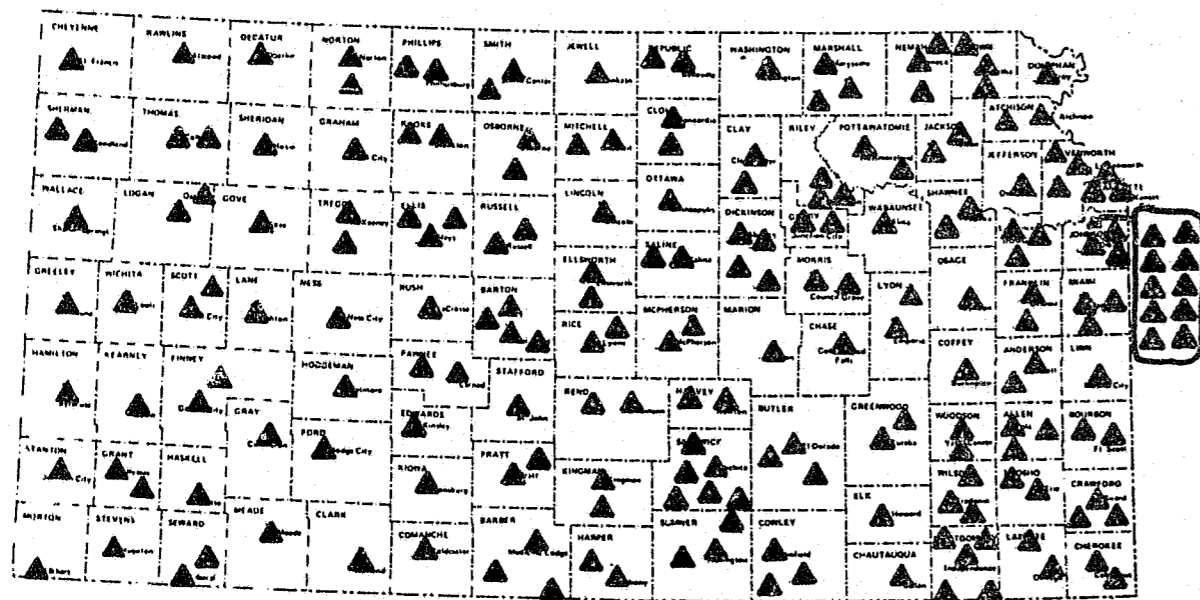
The primary objectives of the KBI monthly crime reporting program are:

1. To provide reliable statistics for the administrative use of law enforcement agencies and executives, as well as the judiciary and others who may be professionally interested in data of this nature.
2. To inform the public of the extent of criminal activity in the State of Kansas.
3. To develop a centralized collection of crime statistics in conjunction with computerized crime information systems at the state level.

Crime in Kansas presents separate crime statistics for areas individually reporting to the KBI. Report areas generally correspond to the political subdivisions of the State of Kansas; that is, its cities and counties. The sheriff of each of the 105 counties ordinarily provides coverage for the unincorporated, or rural, areas of his county, and also for any communities of 2,500 population or less which do not have their own police protection. For incorporated cities with municipal police departments, reports are submitted by the superintendent, commissioner, or chief of police.

The final sources of crime reports are the campus law enforcement agencies of several state colleges and universities which have instituted separate reporting procedures. In all, 203 separate law enforcement agencies have contributed their monthly reports to this 1973 publication, as seen in Figure 1.

Upon receipt of the monthly crime reports of the contributing agencies, personnel of the KBI review the reports for completeness and accuracy. Where necessary, contact is made with the contributing agency by Special Agents or other personnel to maintain liaison and to trace incomplete data to its source. Once reviewed, reports are subjected to automated verification and data processing.

The resultant printouts are utilized in the compilation of periodic, brief reports as well as this annual publication.

Regardless of the extent of any verification process which might be used, the accuracy of the information presented herein depends almost wholly on the degree of effort on the part of each contributing agency. For that reason, the Kansas Bureau of Investigation cannot guarantee the validity of the law enforcement reports received.

For this edition of Crime in Kansas, data on Kansas court action on criminal cases was taken from the Kansas Judicial Council Bulletin, October, 1973 and Statistical Report on the District Courts of Kansas, July 1, 1973, which was issued by the Office of Judicial Administrator.

Information on Kansas state prisoners was supplied by the Office of Secretary of Corrections. This previously unpublished data was compiled by the corrections research staff or taken from the National Prisoner Census of the U.S. Bureau of the Census.

### Victimization Surveys

Another valuable source of information about criminal activity, the victimization survey, has been sponsored recently by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration and conducted throughout the nation by the Bureau of the Census.

Victimization surveys are sample surveys of the population which identify victims of crime and obtain information from them.

Of necessity victimization studies are largely limited to those crimes in which specific victims understand what happened to them and are willing to talk about it. However, as a supplement to uniform crime reporting programs, the victimization survey holds much promise.

## Crime Factors

The reader should be aware that there are many factors which will affect crime rates, and these factors will vary from place to place. Direct comparisons of crime figures between communities should not be attempted without due consideration of the factors which might influence the volume or type of crime occurring in each location. Some of those factors, as formulated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the Uniform Crime Reports, are listed below:

- . Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.
- . Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
- . Economic status and mores of the population.
- . Relative stability of population, including commuters, seasonal, and other transient types.
- . Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- . Educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- . Effective strength of the police force.
- . Standards governing appointments to the police force.
- . Policies of the prosecuting officials, courts, and corrections.
- . Relationships and attitudes of law enforcement and the community.
- . Administrative and investigative efficiency of law enforcement, including degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- . Organization and cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police jurisdictions.

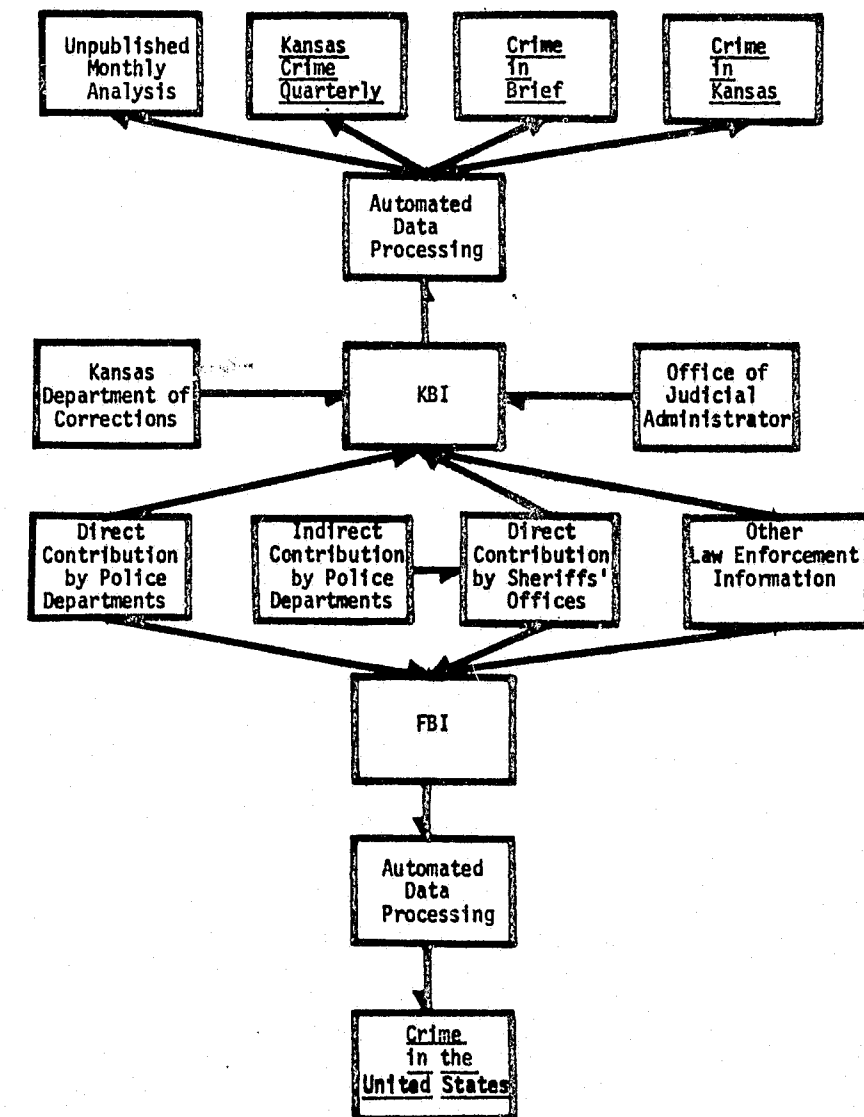
## Information Systems

The relationship of the Kansas crime statistics information system to other local, state and national systems is depicted in Figure 2.

Local law enforcement agencies contribute separately to FBI and KBI crime reporting programs. Planning is underway for an eventual consolidation of these processes.

Besides Crime in Kansas, the KBI issues two other statistical publications. Kansas Crime Quarterly provides a summary of state offense reports and arrests at the close of each quarter of the calendar year. The second publication, Kansas Crime in Brief, furnishes annual crime statistics and a preliminary analysis of state and local crime trends.

# CLASS I OFFENSES

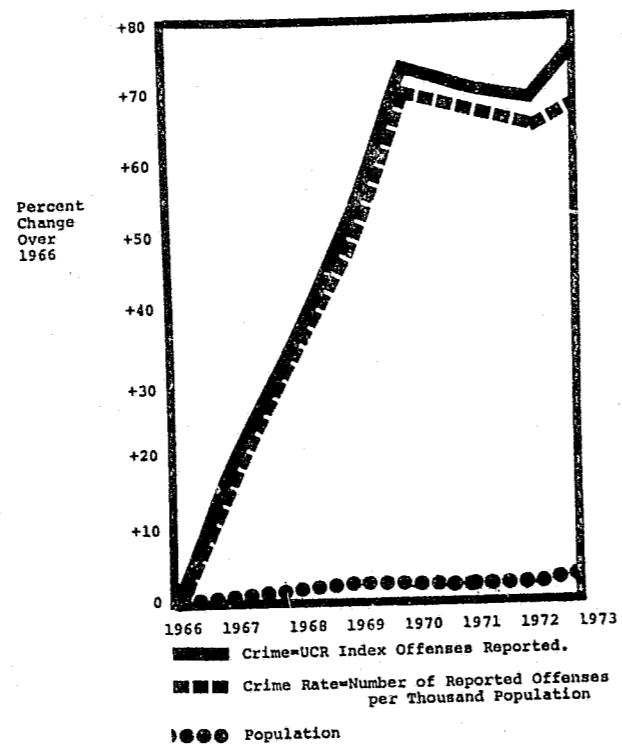
The index of offenses used in Crime in Kansas, 1973, is composed of the following classifications: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, manslaughter by negligence, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, and auto theft.

These index offenses are considered Class I crimes and were chosen for special consideration in the KBI report due to their frequency of occurrence, the regularity with which they are reported and their conformity to the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting Index. Class II crimes include all other crime classifications separately reported to the KBI.

During 1973 there were 77,134 Class I offenses reported to Kansas law enforcement agencies. This is a 3.8 percent increase over 1972, and a 74.9 percent change since 1966.

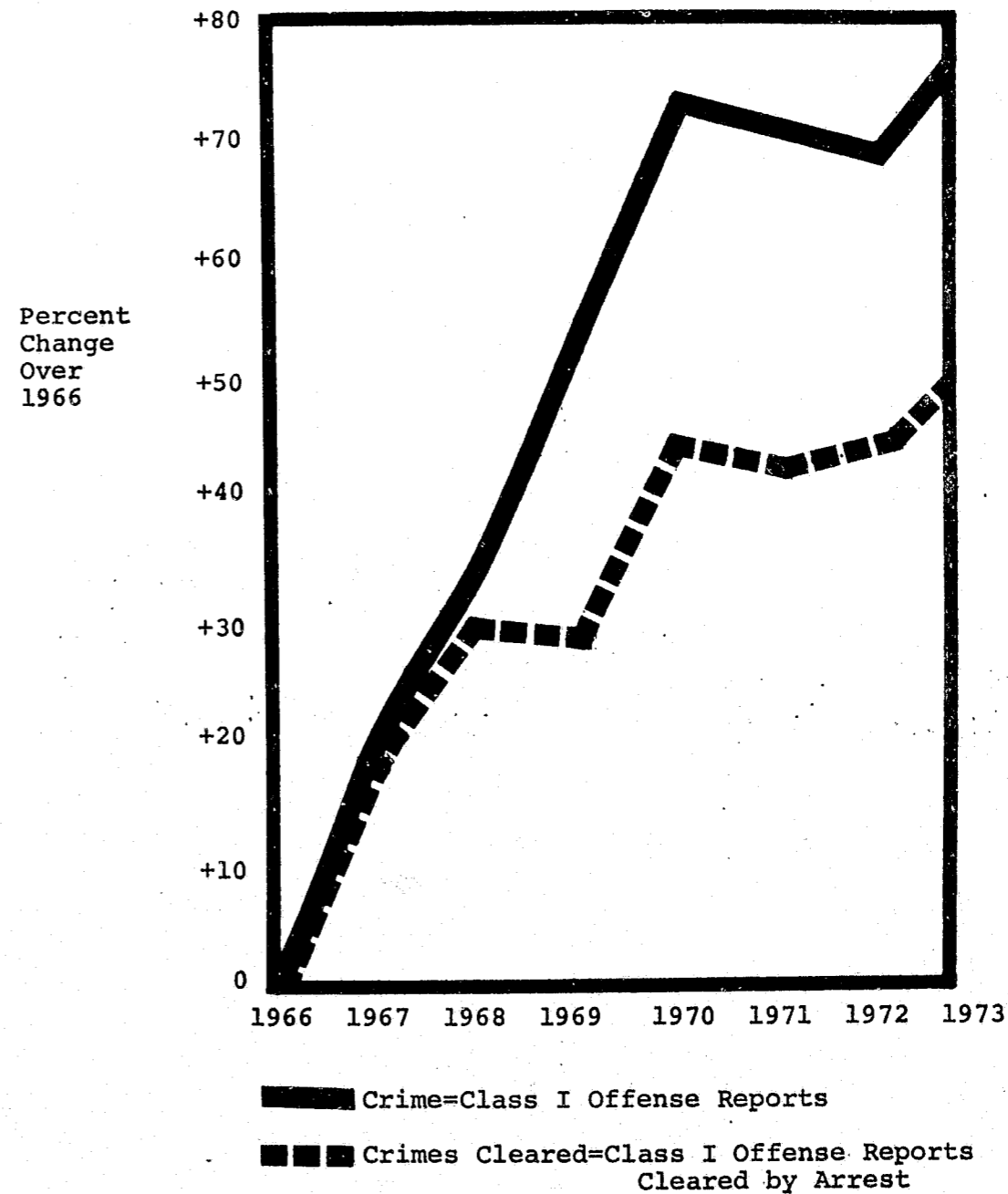
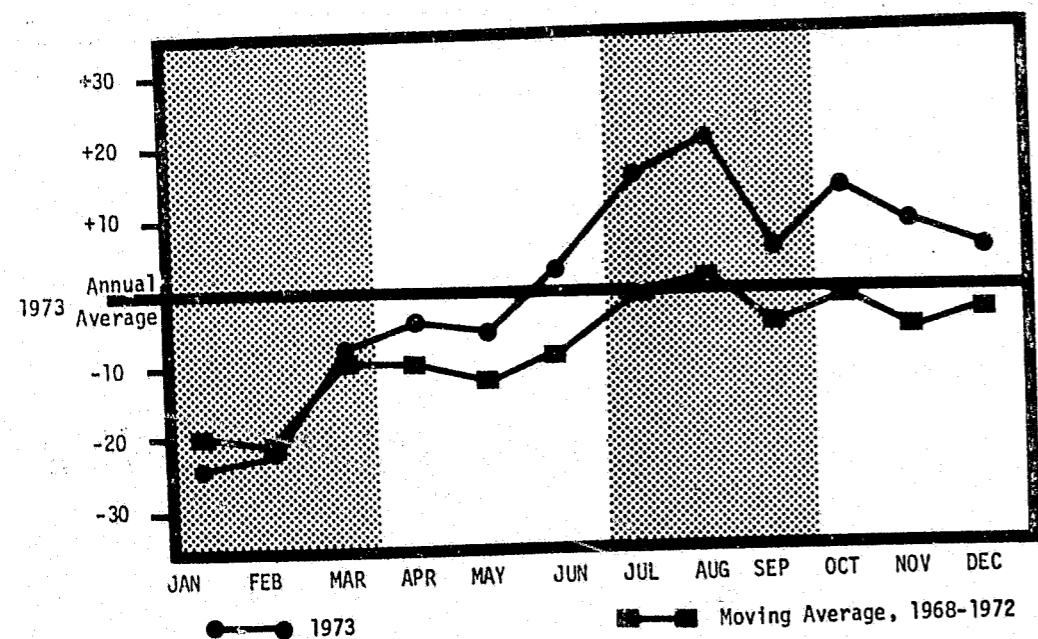


Fig. 4. Monthly Crime Trends: Class I Offenses, 1973.

The quarter with the highest number of Class I crimes reported was that including the summer months; July, August and September as shown in Figure 4.

For every 100,000 persons in Kansas there were 3,351 Class I offenses reported in 1973, which is an increase of 68.7 percent from the 1966 rate which was 1,986 crimes per 100,000. Kansas law enforcement personnel recorded 18,746 clearances of Class I crimes in 1973, or 24 clearances per 100 crimes. The number of clearances has therefore risen 49 percent from 1968 (12,561 clearances) to 1973.

Fig. 5. Crimes and Crimes Cleared: Kansas, 1966-1973.

## VIOLENT CRIME

The violent crime classification applies to the following offenses: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, manslaughter by negligence, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. During 1973, 4,815 violent crimes were reported in Kansas. Since 4,624 violent crimes were recorded in 1972, this represents a 4.1 percent increase over 1972.

Of the 4,815 violent crimes reported in 1973, 2,570 (or 53 percent) were cleared. This is a decline of 2 percent in the number of clearances from 1972 to 1973. Rural areas recorded the highest clearance rate for violent crimes during 1973 (76 percent), while urban areas and non-suburban cities reported the lowest rates (49 and 50 percent).

Rural areas of Kansas experienced the largest increase in number of reported violent crimes from 1972 to 1973, 19.5 percent. For the same period, the four largest cities in Kansas had a 5.3 percent increase, while their surrounding suburbs reported an 8.8 percent decrease in violent crimes. Non-suburban cities showed no significant change in reports of violent crime over the past two years.

Consistent with past years, the month of August had the greatest number of violent crimes reported for any month in 1973--492. (See Figure 6).

Fig. 6. Monthly Crime Trends: Violent Crime, 1973.

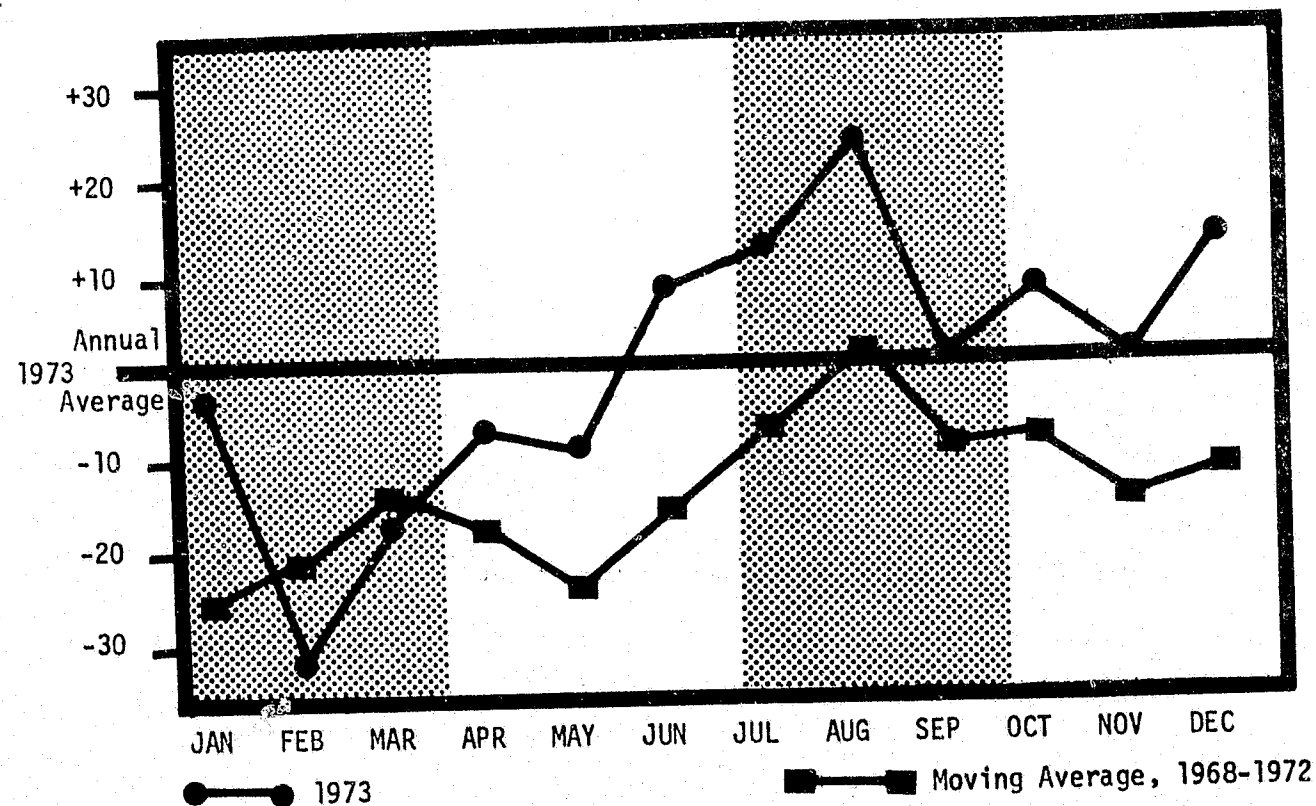
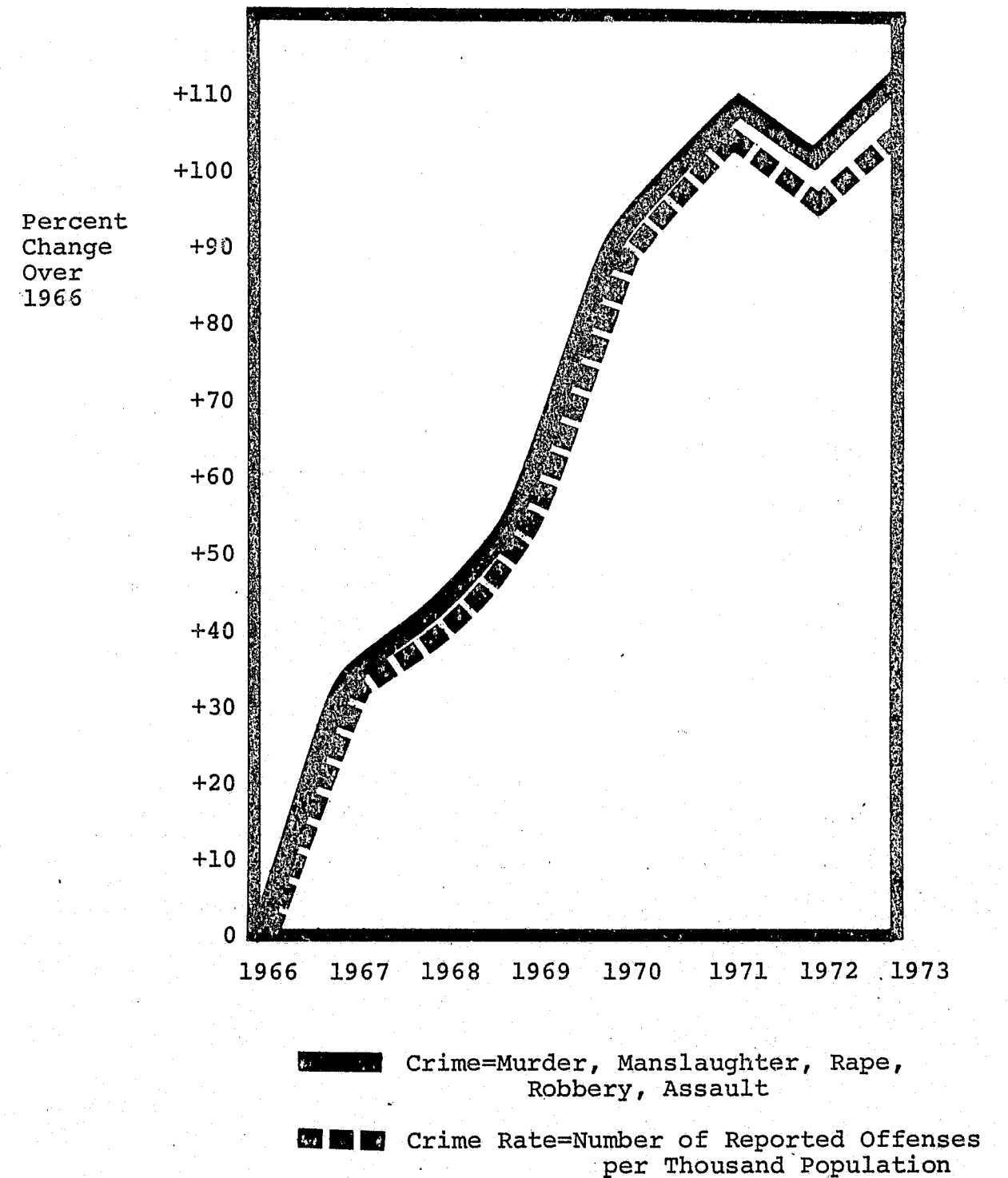


Fig. 7. Violent Crime: Kansas, 1966-1973.



## HOMICIDE

Definition--All felonious homicides due to willful acts (nonnegligent) and deaths due to negligent acts.

### Event and Trend

In 1973, 135 homicides (and nonnegligent manslaughters) were reported to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation. This count represented a 45.2 percent increase over the 93 homicides reported in 1972, and a 64.6 percent increase over the 82 reported in 1968. Homicides comprised 0.2 percent of all index offenses, and 2.8 percent of violent crimes.

The four largest cities in Kansas reported 74 homicides for 54.8 percent of the total, while their surrounding suburbs reported 8 homicides or 5.9 percent. Non-suburban cities accounted for 12.6 percent of homicides with 17 reported, while the rural areas reported 36 homicides for 26.7 percent of the Kansas total.

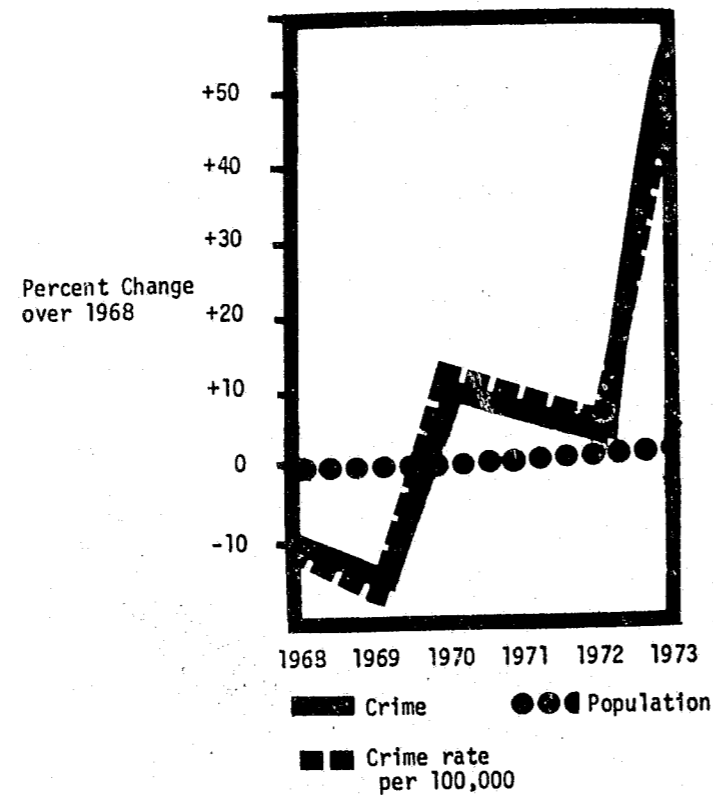
### Rates and Clearances

The rate of homicides for Kansas in 1973 was 5.9 per 100,000 population. In 1972 the homicide rate was 4.1 per 100,000, and five years ago in 1968, the rate was reported at 3.6 per 100,000. Therefore, the homicide rate has increased 43.9 percent over 1972 and 63.9 percent over 1968.

Urban areas showed the highest rate of homicides with 11.1 per 100,000, while the rural areas reported 5.2 per 100,000. Non-suburban cities were next with 2.7 per 100,000 and suburban cities had a rate of 0.03 per 100,000.

Of every 100 homicides reported, 90 were cleared, which is a 3.2 percent decrease in the clearance rate from 1972 which had a 93 percent clearance rate reported.

### Homicide Victims

Of the 124 victims covered in the 1973 Kansas Homicide Survey, over 25 percent were 60 years of age or over (See Table 1). The most notable trend in victim characteristics is the shift in age distribution toward older and elderly homicide victims.

The greatest percentage of homicides took place in a non-family quarrel, 30.6 percent. The next most frequent situations for homicides were lovers' quarrels (12.9 percent) and one spouse killing another (12.9 percent). In 13.7 percent of the cases surveyed in 1973, the relationship of victim to suspect was unknown, (as shown in Table 2).

Persons Arrested

A total of 111 persons were arrested for homicide in 1973, a 37 percent increase over 1972, and a rise of 22.0 percent from 1968.

In all, 107 adults were arrested for homicide, or 96.4 percent of all persons arrested. Juveniles accounted for 3.6 percent of persons taken into custody. Females accounted for 19.8 percent of homicide arrests. Of the 111 arrests, 57.7 percent were of whites, 39.6 percent were of blacks, and 1.8 percent were of American Indians.

At the time of the 1973 Homicide Survey, 21.3 percent of persons arrested had been judged guilty of homicide as charged, and 16 percent had been judged guilty of a lesser charge. Of the cases surveyed, 18.1 percent were dismissed, 6.4 percent resulted in acquittal and 33.0 percent were still pending. The remaining cases were cleared by exceptional means or were referred to juvenile court (5.3 percent).

Handguns continued to be the most frequently used type of weapon in Kansas homicides (see Table 3).

## FORCIBLE RAPE

Definition--The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Includes assault to rape and attempted rape. Excludes statutory offenses (no force used--victim under age of consent).

### Event and Trend

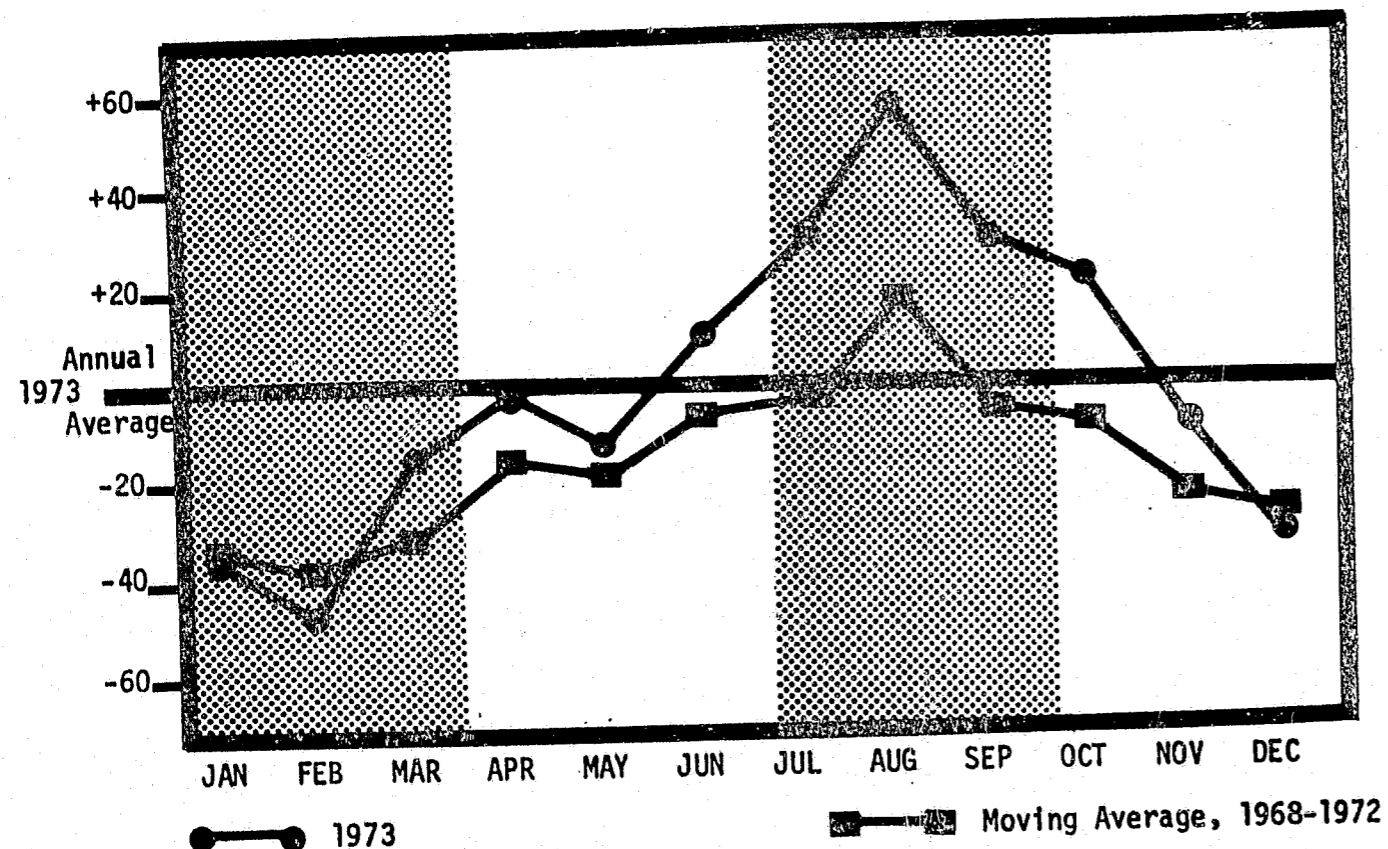


Fig. 10. Forcible Rape: Kansas, 1968-1973.

A total of 381 forcible rapes was reported in 1973. This represents a 36.6 percent increase from the 279 rapes reported in 1968. (See Figure 10). Forcible rapes comprised 7.6 percent of all violent crime and 0.5 percent of index offenses.

Of the total number of rapes reported, 49.9 percent occurred in the four largest Kansas cities. Non-suburban cities received 22.8 percent of the reports of forcible rape, while suburban cities recorded 12.9 percent of rapes reported in Kansas. Rural areas accounted for 14.4 percent of rapes known to the police.

The crime of rape was most frequently reported during the three summer months of July, August, and September as is shown in Figure 9. During these summer months, 35.2 percent of all rape reports were received by the Kansas police.

Fig. 9. Monthly Crime Trends: Forcible Rape, 1973.

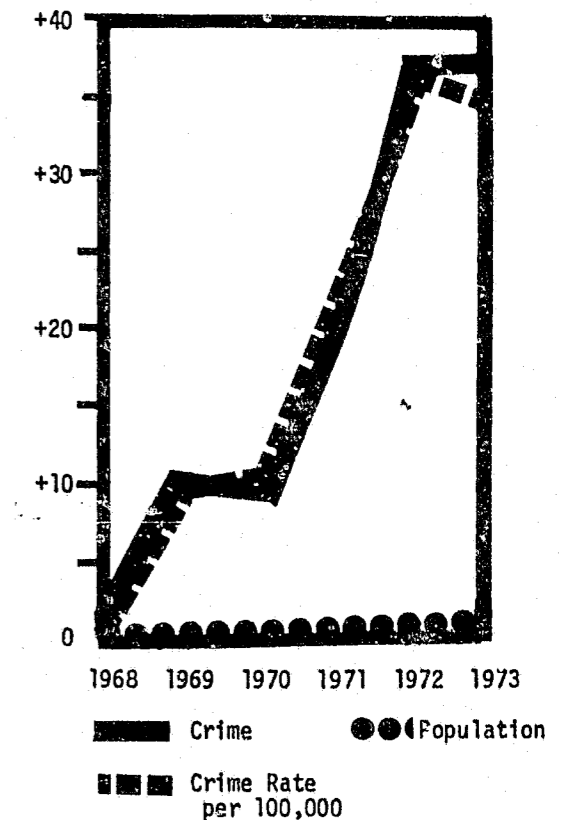
### Rates and Clearances

During 1973, the state had 33.2 rapes reported for each 100,000 females. This is an increase of 35 percent over the rate for 1968, 24.6 rapes per 100,000 females.

Percent Change over 1968

Of every 100 forcible rapes reported in 1973, 52 were cleared. This clearance rate is down 17.5 percent from the 1972 clearance rate of 63 percent.

The four major cities of Kansas had the highest rate of rapes reported, 57.2 per 100,000 females. In the surrounding suburban areas, the rate was 31.8 per 100,000 females. Rural Kansas areas had a 1973 rate of 15.8 and non-suburban cities reported 27.2 per 100,000 females.



### Persons Arrested

For the crime of forcible rape, 175 persons were arrested in 1973. This is a decrease of 12.5 percent from the 200 arrests in 1972, but an increase of 16.7 percent from the 150 arrests in 1968.

Of all persons arrested for rape, 12.6 percent were under 18 years of age. White persons accounted for 53.7 percent of rape arrests, black persons for 37.7 percent and persons of American Indian origin for 8.6 percent of arrests.

## ROBBERY

**Definition**--The stealing or taking of anything of value from a person by force or violence or by placing in fear, such as strongarm robbery, stick-ups, armed robbery, assault to rob, and attempt to rob.

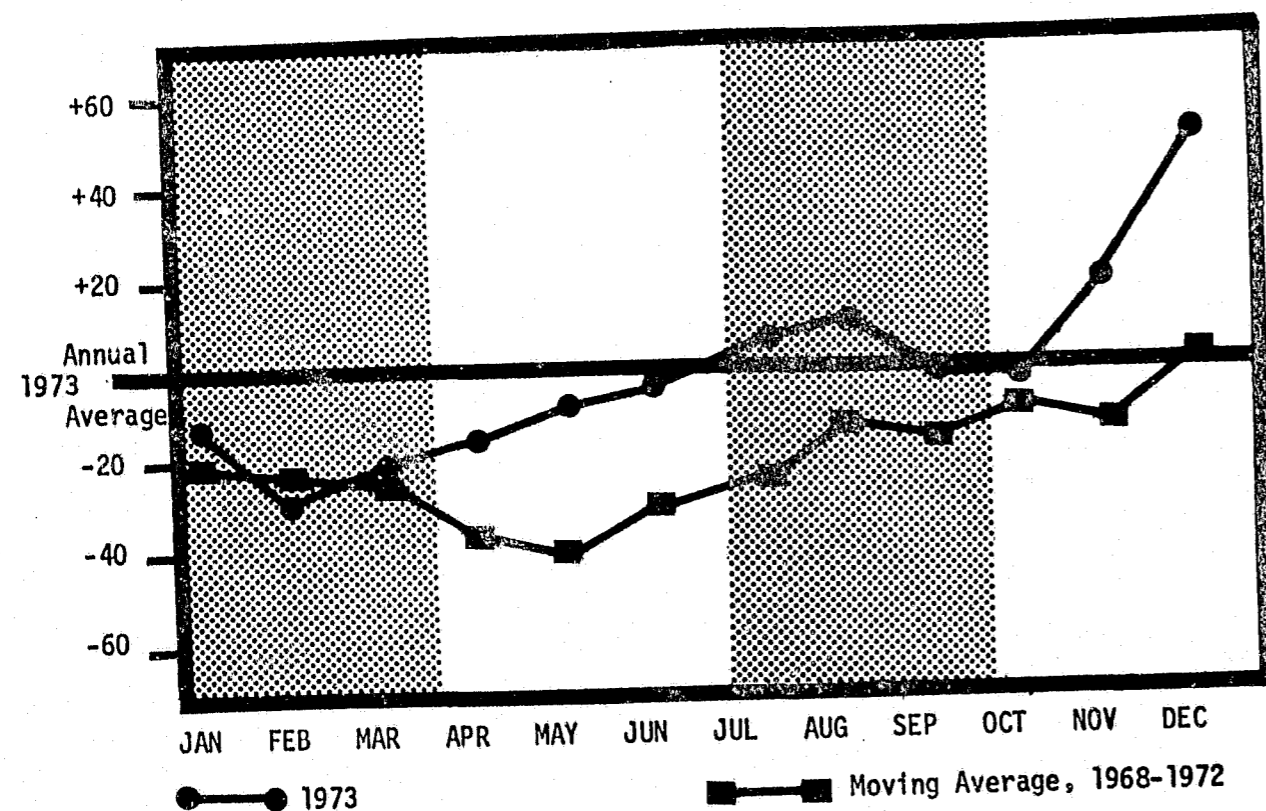
### Event and Trend

Kansas law enforcement agencies received reports of 1,768 robberies during 1973. Therefore, a 12.2 percent increase was noted from the 1,575 reported in 1972, and a 67.6 percent increase from the 1,055 reported in 1968. Robberies were 37.1 percent of all violent crimes in 1973, and 2.3 percent of all index offenses.

The incidence of robbery was highest in the four largest cities, which reported 67.1 percent of all crimes in this classification. Non-suburban cities accounted for 20.7 percent of robbery reports. Rural areas reported 7.7 percent of the total, while the suburban areas surrounding the metropolitan centers accounted for only 4.5 percent of reported robberies.

The month of December had the largest number of robberies reported of all months of 1973 (See Figure 11). The 223 robbery reports received during December were 51.4 percent greater than the 1973 monthly average of 147 robbery reports.

### Rates and Clearances

For every 100,000 persons in Kansas during 1973, 76.8 robberies were reported. This is up 11.1 percent from the rate of 69.1 per 100,000 population of 1972, and up 30.2 percent from the rate of 46.5 per 100,000 population of 1968.

The urban areas of Kansas reported the highest rate of robbery, 178.6 per 100,000 population. The urban rate was nearly seven times higher than the rate for the surrounding suburban cities, 25.6 per 100,000 population, and over three times higher than that of the non-suburban cities, 57.4 per 100,000. Rural areas reported the lowest rate of all, 19.7 robberies per 100,000 population with the highest clearance rate, 60.3 percent of all robberies.

In 1973, 32 of every 100 robberies were cleared. This clearance rate is up by 3.2 percent from the 1972 clearance rate of 31 percent.

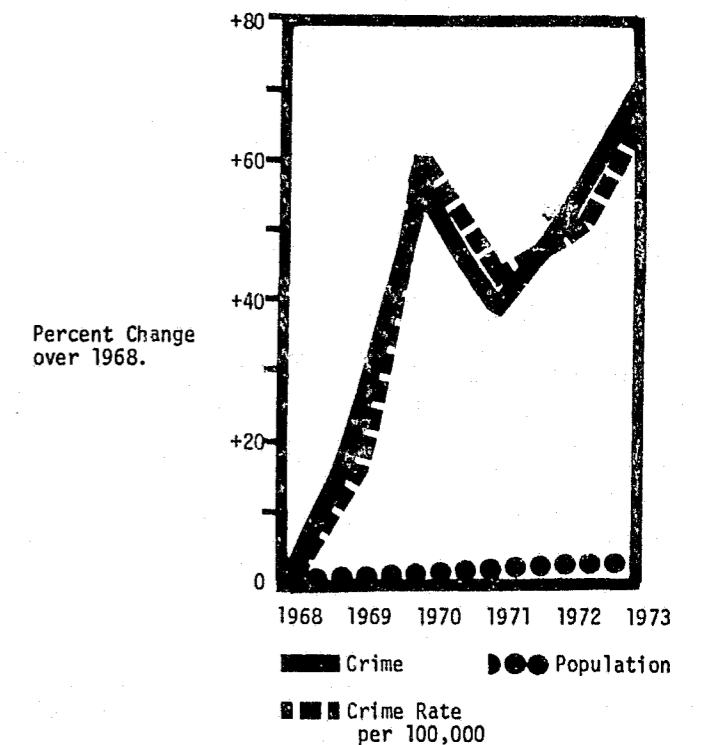
### Persons Arrested

In 1973, 608 persons were arrested for the crime of robbery. This count represents a 12.8 percent increase over the 539 arrests in 1972 and a 35.4 percent increase over the 449 persons arrested in 1968.

Juveniles taken into custody accounted for 30.3 percent of all arrests. Of all robbery arrests, only 6.7 percent of persons arrested were females.

Arrests of whites accounted for 45.6 percent of all robbery arrests, while 51.8 percent of persons arrested were black. Other races accounted for the remaining 2.6 percent of arrests.

## AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

**Definition**--The unlawful attack by one person upon another with the intent of inflicting severe bodily injury accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that any injury result from an aggravated assault.

### Event and Trend

In all 2,483 aggravated assaults were reported in 1973. This is up 38.2 percent since 1968, but down 3.5 percent when compared to 1972. Aggravated assault accounted for 51.6 percent of all violent crime, and 3.2 percent of all index offenses.

Forty-nine percent of all aggravated assaults were reported by Kansas' four major cities. The suburbs surrounding these cities reported an additional 13.4 percent of these offenses. Non-suburban cities accounted for 24 percent of the reports, while the remaining 13.7 percent of aggravated assaults were reported to rural agencies.

The month of August was the month in 1973 when most aggravated assaults were reported, with 265. August was 28.1 greater than the 1973 monthly average of 207 assaults.

Fig. 13. Monthly Crime Trends: Aggravated Assault, 1973.

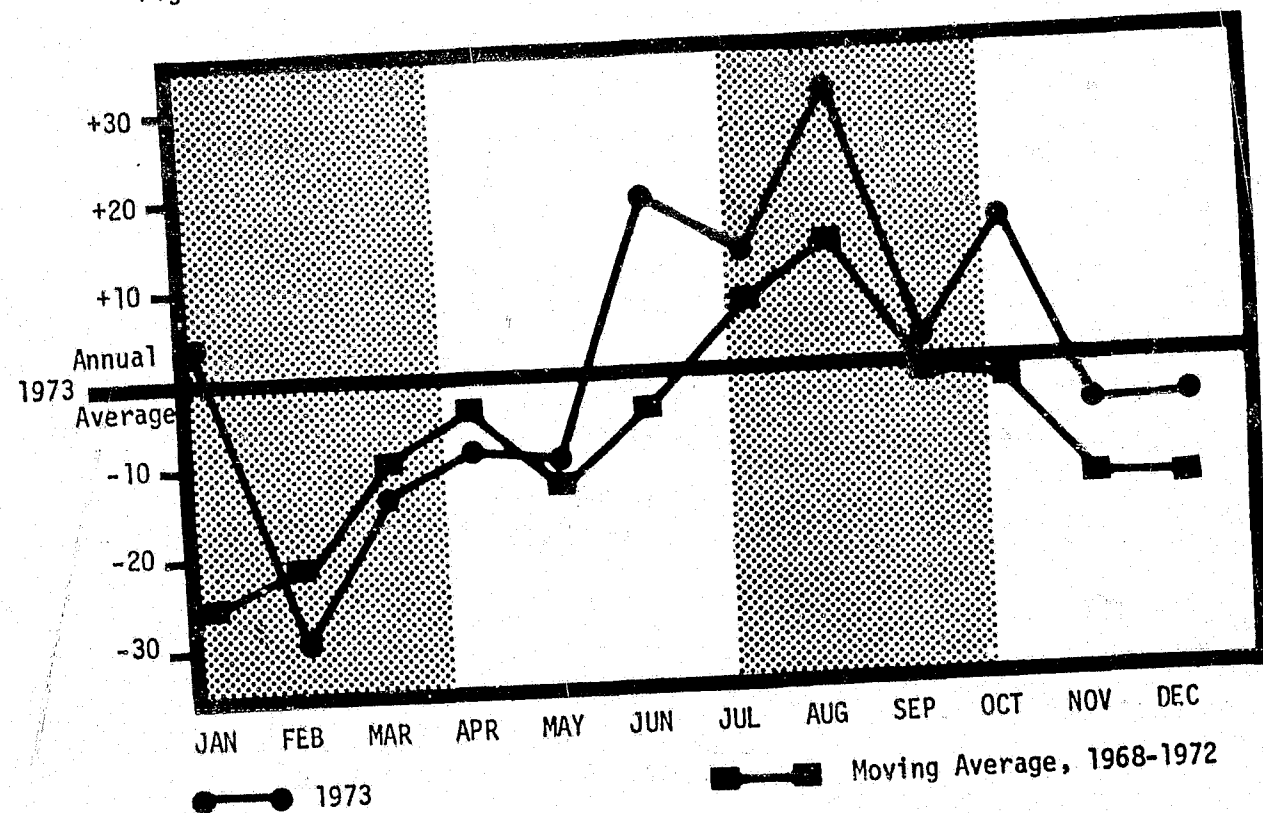
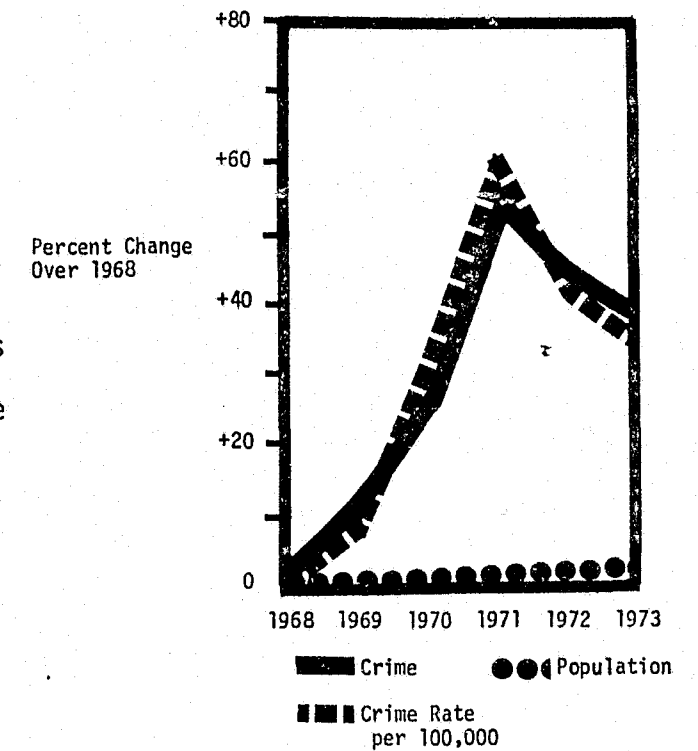


Fig. 14. Aggravated Assault: Kansas, 1968-1973.



### Rates and Clearances

During 1973, Kansas agencies reported 107.9 aggravated assaults for every 100,000 persons. This rate is up 36.1 percent from the 1968 rate of 79.3 assaults per 100,000 population.

The highest rate of aggravated assault was reported by the four largest cities (182.6 per 100,000) followed by the suburban areas (107.8 per 100,000), the non-suburban cities (93.4 per 100,000) and finally the rural areas (49.3 per 100,000). Rural agencies reported 82 clearances per 100 assaults, which was considerably higher than the overall rate for the state, 66 percent.

### Persons Arrested

Kansas law enforcement agencies made 1,223 arrests for aggravated assault in 1973. Compared to the 808 arrests made in 1968, this arrest figure was up 51.4 percent.

Arrests of juveniles accounted for 20 percent of all persons taken into custody for aggravated assault. Eleven percent of persons arrested in 1973 were female. Whites were arrested twice as frequently as members of minority races for this offense.

## PROPERTY CRIME

Burglary/breaking and entering, larceny and auto theft make up the classification property crime.

In the property crime classification during 1973, there were 72,319 offenses reported. Compared to the 69,653 recorded for 1972, this count represents a 3.8 percent increase. Property crimes accounted for 94 percent of all Kansas index crime during 1973.

July and August had the highest number of property crime reported for any two-month period in 1973. This pattern is consistent with previous years in Kansas, as can be seen in Figure 15.

The highest rate of property crime during 1973 was in the urban areas of Kansas. Taken together the four largest cities had 5,349 property crimes reported per 100,000 population. Suburban areas were next highest with 4,935 property crimes per 100,000. Non-suburban cities reported 3,392 property crimes per 100,000, while rural areas had 966 property crimes per 100,000 population.

Clearance rates for property crime during 1973 ranged from 17 percent in suburban areas to 27 percent in rural areas. The overall clearance rate for Kansas property crime was 22.4 percent, up 2 percent from the 1972 clearance rate of 22.0 percent.

Fig. 15. Monthly Crime Trends: Property Crime, 1973.

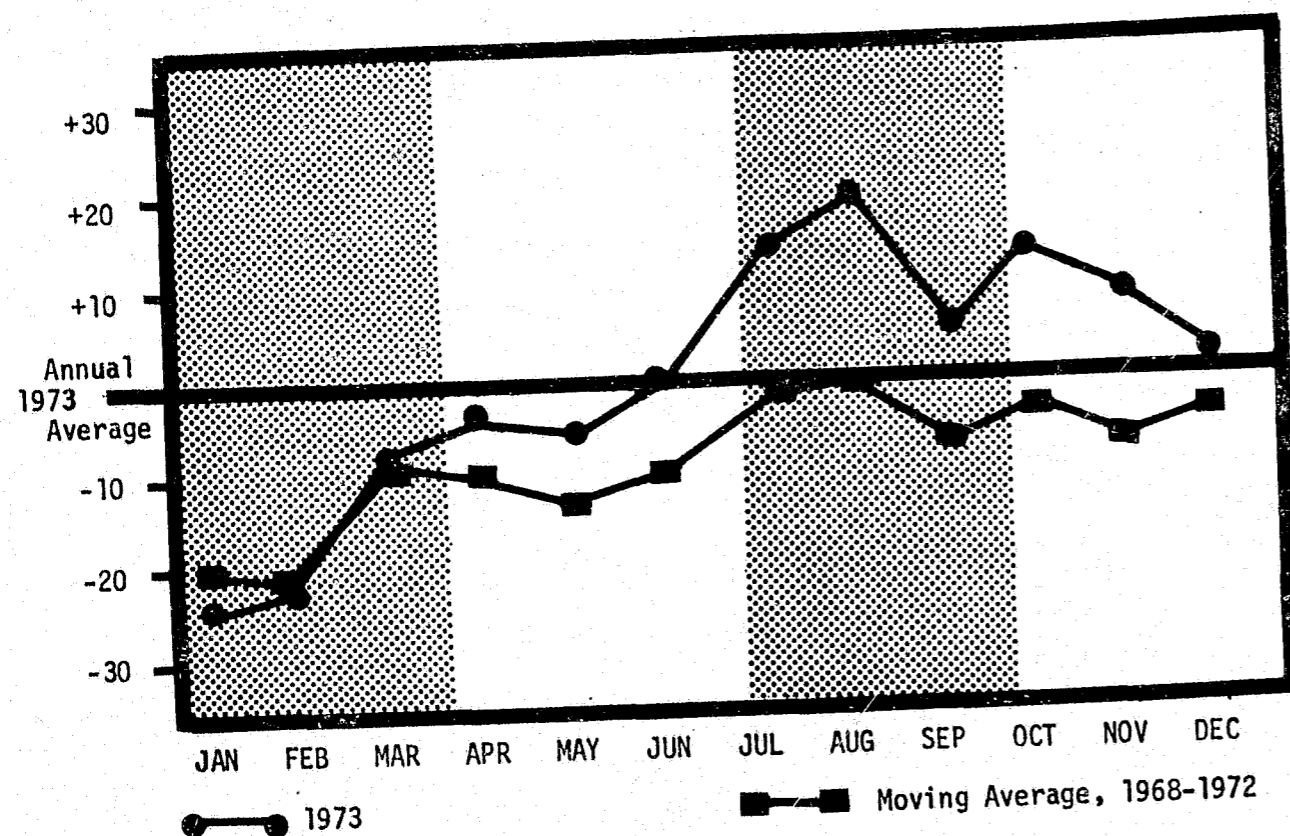
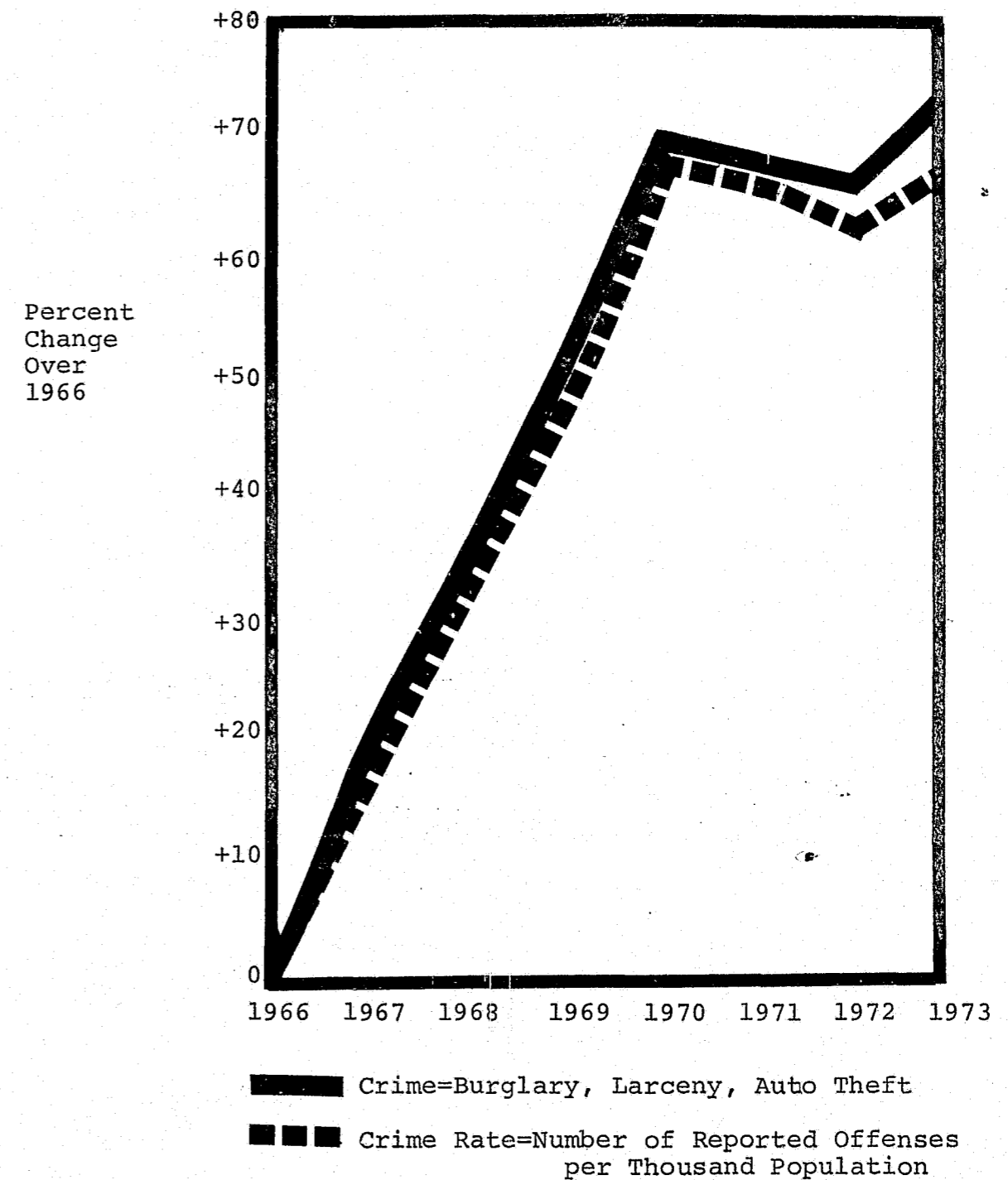


Fig. 16. Property Crime: Kansas, 1966-1973.





## BURGLARY

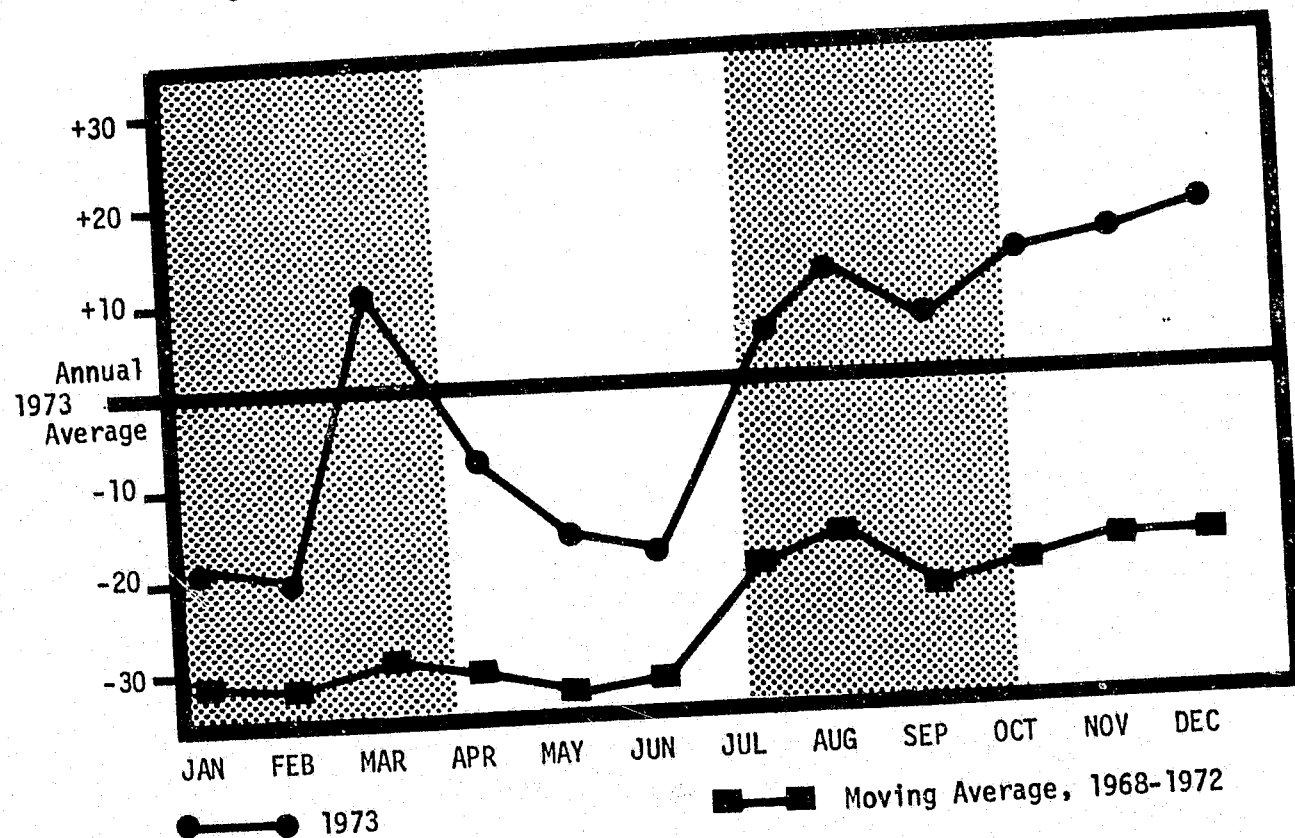
Definition--Any actual or attempted unlawful entry to commit a felony or a theft, even though no force was used to gain entrance.

### Event and Trend

In the classification of burglary/breaking and entering, 23,650 separate incidents were reported in 1973 by Kansas law enforcement agencies. This figure is up 14.2 percent since 1972, and shows an increase of 79.5 percent since 1968. During 1973, burglary accounted for 30.7 percent of all index crime and 32.7 percent of all property crimes.

Forty-eight percent of all burglaries reported in 1973 took place in the four largest cities in Kansas. Non-suburban cities reported 30 percent, while Kansas suburbs accounted for 13 percent, and the remaining 11 percent were in rural areas.

### Rates and Clearances

For every 100,000 persons in Kansas during 1973, there were 1,028 burglaries. This represents a 13 percent increase over the rate in 1972 (909 per 100,000) and a 76 percent increase over the 1968 rate (583 per 100,000).

Kansas rural areas reported by far the lowest rate of burglary in 1973, 366 per 100,000 population. The highest rate of burglary was found in the four largest cities: 1,719 per 100,000 population. The remaining two population categories, the suburban areas and the non-suburban cities, had burglary rates very near the over-all state rate (1,003 and 1,034, respectively).

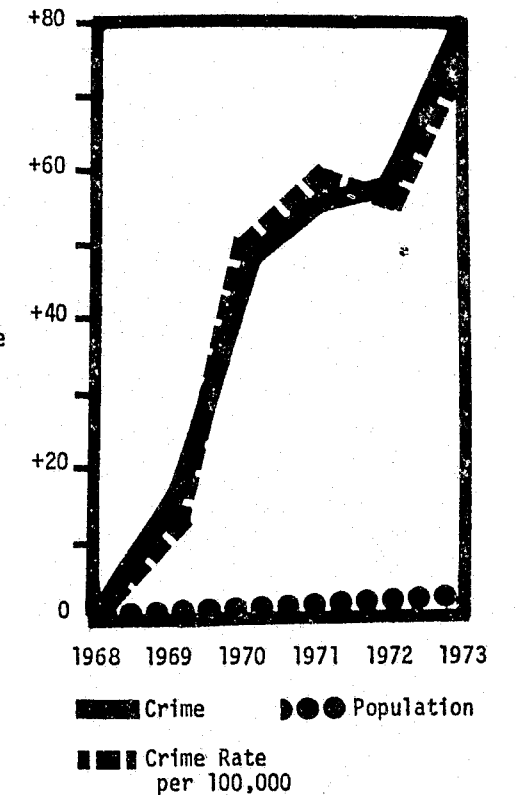
The 1973 clearance rate for burglaries was down 4.5 percent from 1972. In 1973, 21 of every 100 burglaries were cleared, compared with the 1972 figure of 22 per 100.

### Persons Arrested

During 1973, a total of 3,516 persons were arrested for burglary. Since 3,364 persons were arrested in 1972 for this offense, the 1973 figure represents a 4.5 percent increase. Compared with 1968, arrests for burglary were up 26.2 percent.

Like other property crimes, the majority of persons taken into custody for burglary were under 18 years of age. During 1973, 47 percent of those arrested for burglary were 18 years of age or older. Whites were arrested for burglary four times as frequently as members of minority races. Only five percent of those arrested for burglary were female.

## LARCENY

**Definition**--The felonious stealing, taking and carrying, leading, riding or driving away of the personal property of another without claim of right, with the intent to deprive him of his ownership or to convert such property to the use of the taker or another. Excludes thefts of motor vehicles.

### Event and Trend

Discounting thefts of motor vehicles, there were 43,558 larcenies reported in Kansas during 1973. This represents an increase of 13.2 percent since 1968 when 37,821 larcenies were reported. Larcenies accounted for 56.2 percent of all index crimes and 60.2 percent of all property crimes.

Forty-eight percent of all reported larcenies took place in the four largest cities. Thirty-two percent of larcenies were reported in non-suburban cities of Kansas, while 12 percent were reported to suburban police, and 8 percent to officers in rural areas.

Thirty percent of all larcenies reported occurred during the summer months of June, July, and August as depicted in Figure 19.

Fig. 19. Monthly Crime Trends: Larceny, 1973.

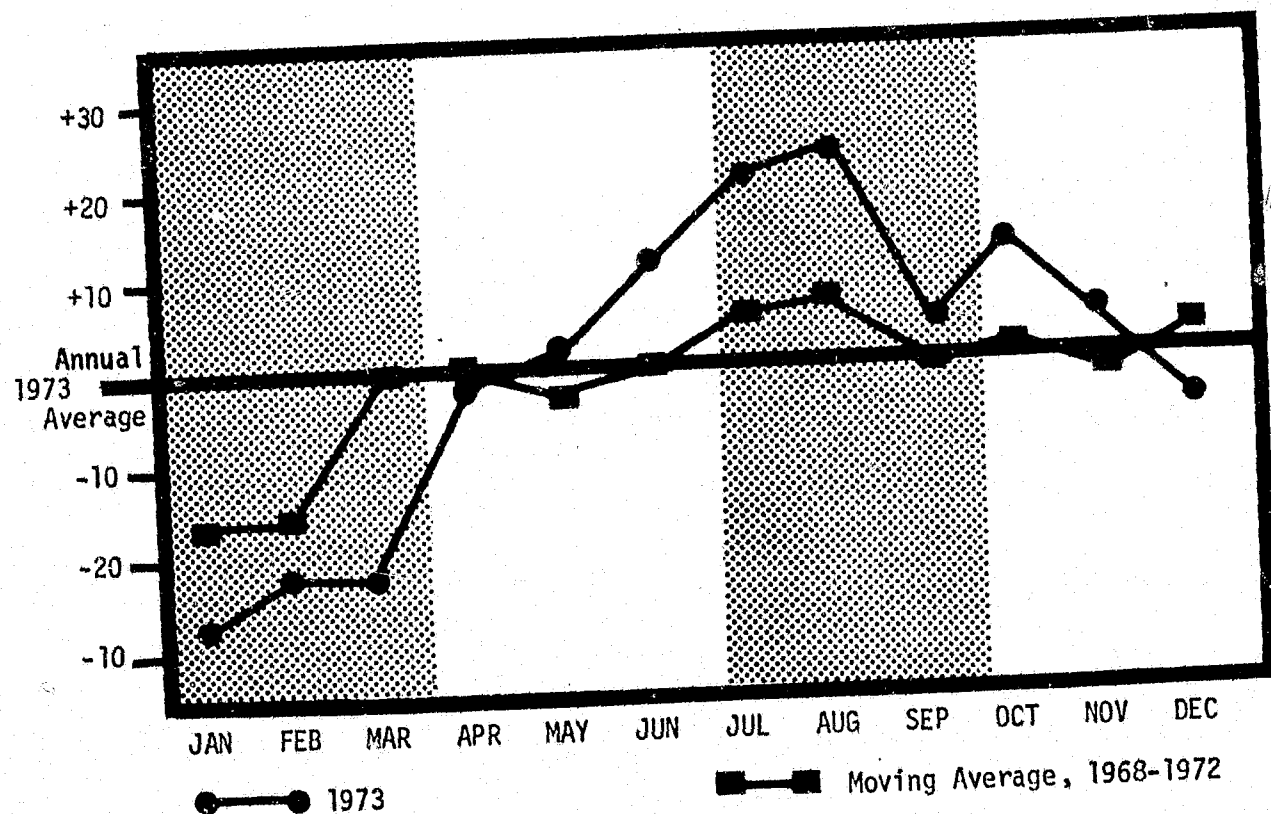
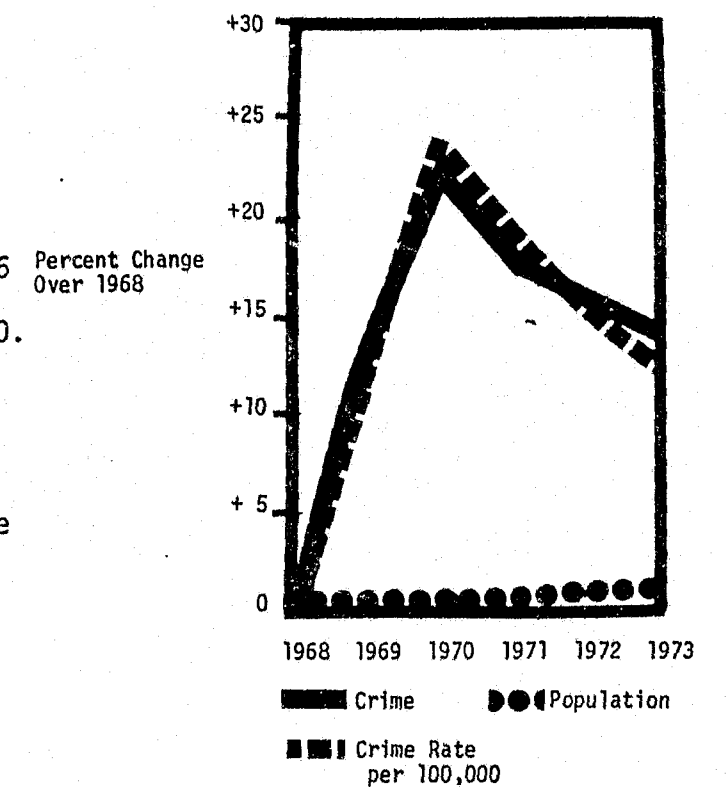


Fig. 20. Larceny: Kansas, 1968-1973.

### Rates and Trends

In 1973, the rate of larceny was 1,193 per 100,000 Kansas inhabitants. This is a 1 percent decrease from 1972, but an increase of 13 percent from 1968. The urban areas of Kansas had the highest rate of reported larceny, 3,116 per 100,000, while the rural areas showed the lowest rate, 520 per 100,000. Suburban areas and non-suburban cities had larceny rates approximating the overall state rate, 1,702 per 100,000 and 2,196 per 100,000 respectively.

Larcenies were cleared at the same rate in both 1973 and 1972, 21 per 100 reported crimes.



### Persons Arrested

There were 7,945 arrests of persons for larceny in Kansas during 1973. This is an increase of 21 percent from the 1968 figure which was 6,558 arrests.

Fifty-three percent of persons taken into custody for larceny were 17 years of age or under. White persons were involved in 76 percent of the arrests, while black persons accounted for 23 percent of the arrests for larceny. Consistent with previous years, a higher percentage of females was arrested for larceny than for any other index offense. During 1973, 30 percent of all persons arrested for larceny were female.

## AUTO THEFT

**Definition**--Actual or attempted stealing or driving away and abandoning of a motor vehicle. Excludes taking for temporary use when actually returned by the taker or unauthorized use by those having lawful access to the vehicle.

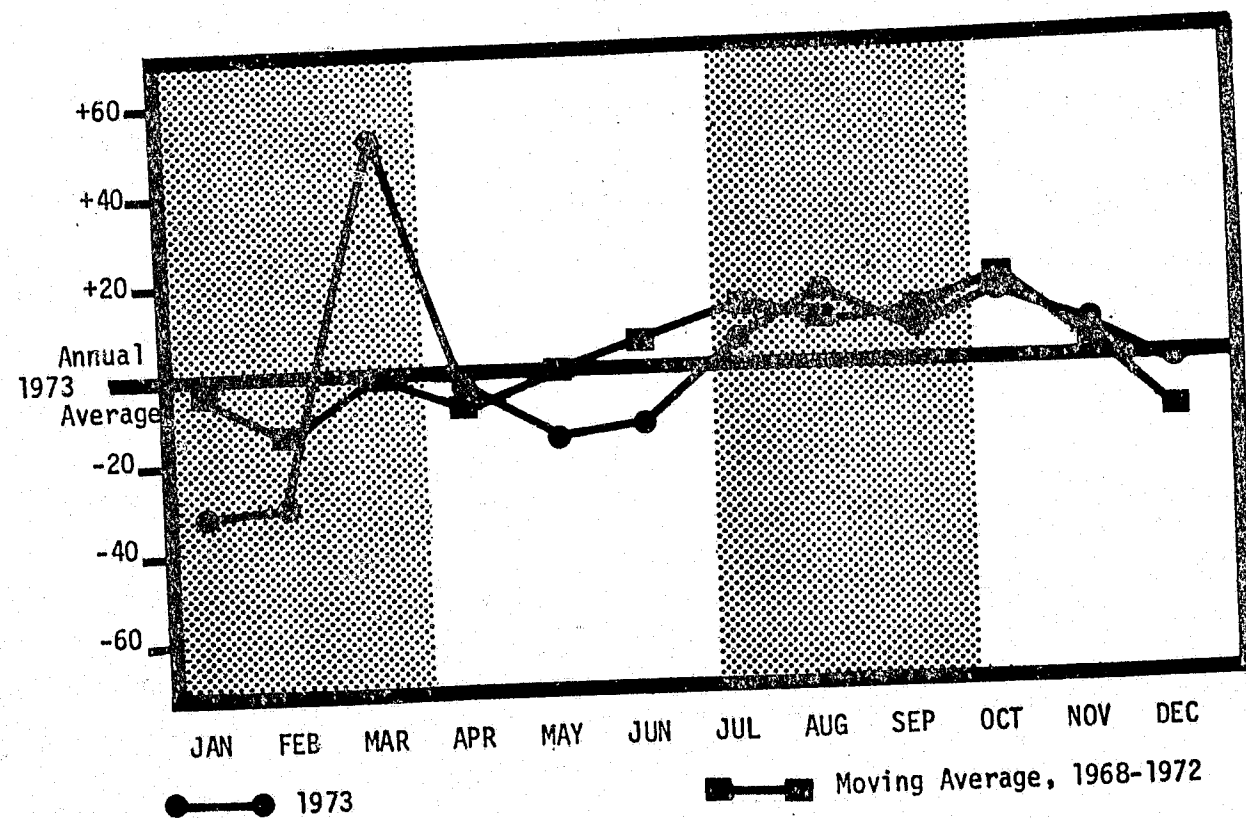
### Event and Trend

A total of 5,111 thefts of motor vehicles was reported in Kansas during 1973. Compared with 1972, there was a 2 percent decrease in this type of theft during 1973. Thefts of motor vehicles were 7.1 percent of all property crimes, and 6.6 percent of index crimes as a whole.

Two out of every three motor vehicle thefts occurred in the four largest cities of Kansas. Rural areas reported only 7.1 percent of the total, while suburban areas had 8.4 percent of the thefts, with the remaining 17.8 percent being reported in non-suburban cities.

The highest single month for theft of autos in 1973 was March, with 624 thefts reported (See Figure 21).

Fig. 21. Monthly Crime Trends: Auto Theft, 1973.



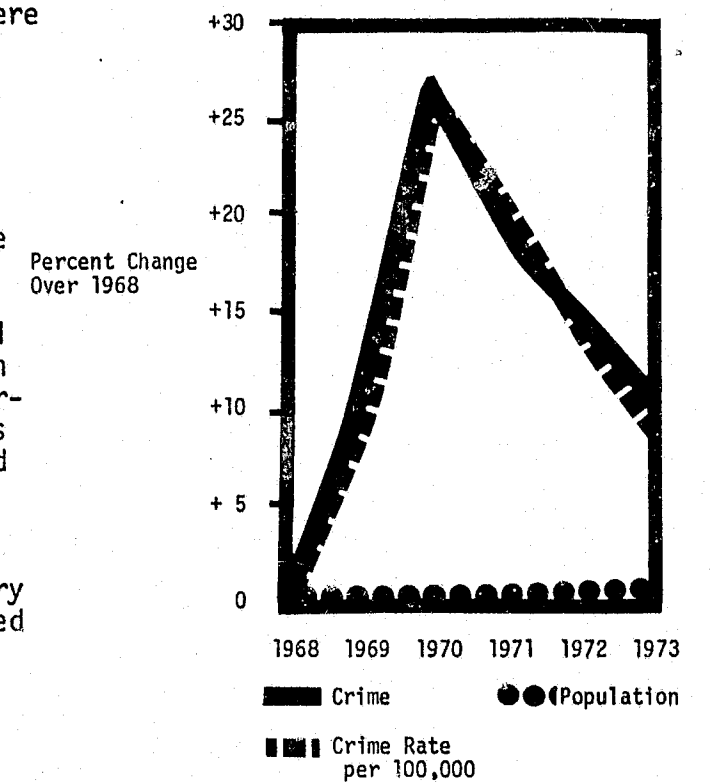
### Rates and Clearances

During 1973, 222 motor vehicle thefts were reported for every 100,000 persons in Kansas. This figure is down 3 percent from the rate of 1972, 229 per 100,000 and up only 10 percent from the 1968 rate of 202 per 100,000.

By far the highest rate of motor vehicle theft was in the four most populous cities, which had 513 motor vehicle thefts for every 100,000 persons. Rural areas had a considerably lower rate than the urban areas: 53 per 100,000. Suburban cities and cities other than suburbs had approximately the same rate (140 and 143 per 100,000 population).

Clearances of motor vehicle thefts were up 34 percent from 1972, with 39 of every 100 auto thefts cleared in 1973, compared to 29 of every 100 in 1972.

### Persons Arrested

Kansas law enforcement officers arrested a total of 1,074 persons for theft of motor vehicles during 1973. This represents a decrease of 12 percent since 1972, which had 1,219 arrests reported for this offense.

Of those arrested, the majority was under 18 years of age, 628 persons. The percentage of juveniles taken into custody (58.5) was greater for motor vehicle theft than for any other offense during 1973. Eighty-two percent of those arrested were white, 17 percent were black and 7 percent of the total arrests were of female persons.

## NARCOTICS/ DANGEROUS DRUGS

### Rates of Arrest

During 1973, 4,666 arrests were made by Kansas law enforcement officers for narcotics law violations. This count represents an increase of 40.6 percent from the 3,319 arrests in 1972. Since the 1968 report shows 329 arrests in this category, arrests for narcotics/dangerous drug violations have gone up over 1,300 percent during the past five years.

For every 100,000 persons in Kansas, there were 203 arrests for narcotics/dangerous drug violations during 1973. The highest rate of arrest for these violations was reported in the suburban areas surrounding the four largest cities. The suburban areas reported 311.7 arrests per 100,000 population, while the four central cities had a rate of 233.1 per 100,000 population. A rate considerably lower than the state average was found in both the rural areas (188.3 per 100,000) and the non-suburban cities (134.2 per 100,000).

### Persons Arrested

Of the 4,666 persons taken into custody for narcotics offenses during 1973, 1,416 were under 18 years of age as is shown in Figure 23. (30.4 percent) Eighty-eight percent of the arrests were of persons of white race, 10 percent were of black race, and the rest were of other minorities. Twelve percent of the persons arrested for this offense in 1973 were female.

Fig. 23. Arrests for Narcotics/Dangerous Drugs Violations: Kansas, 1973.

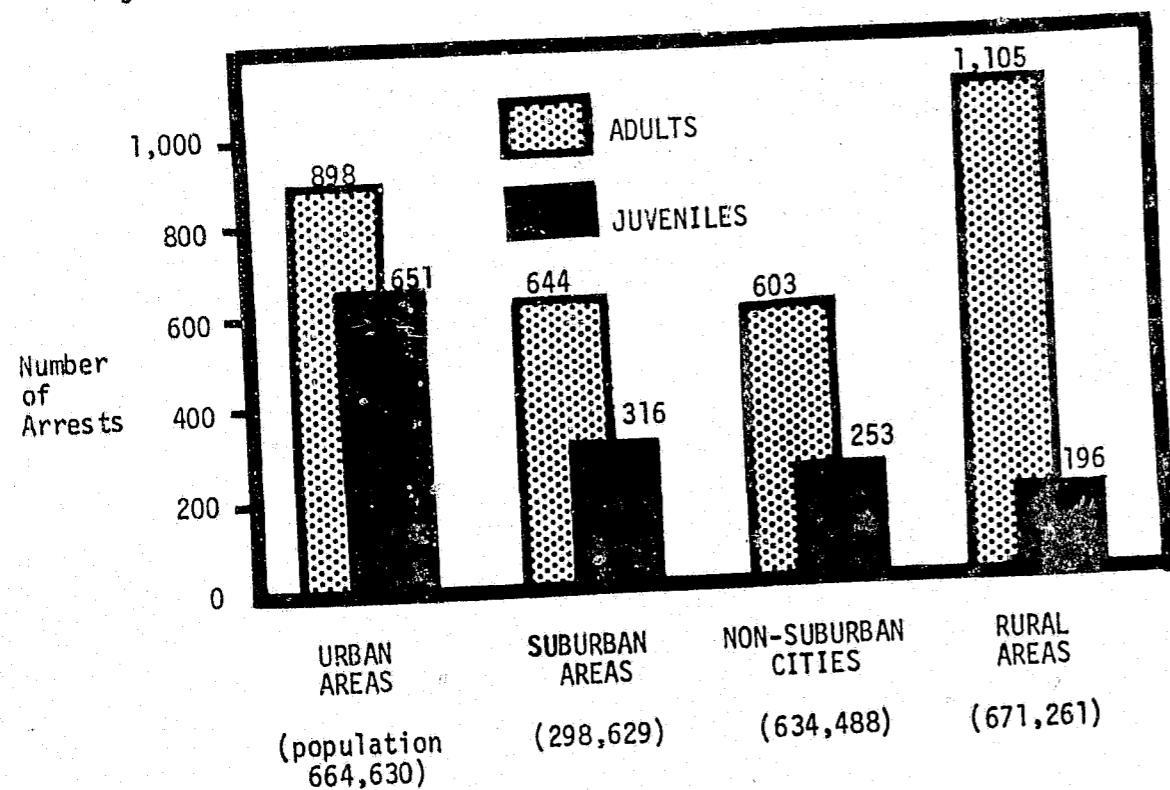
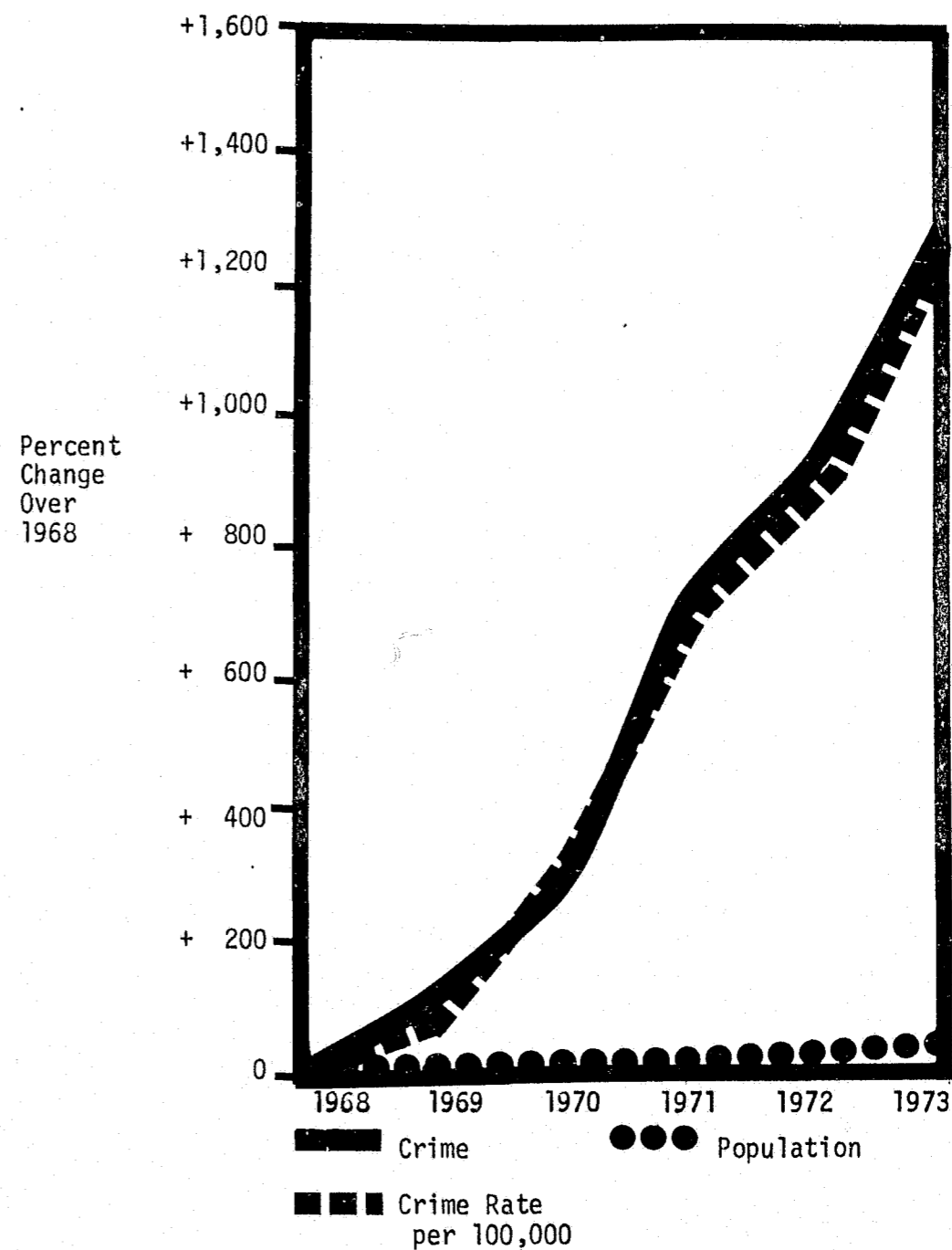


Fig. 24. Narcotics/Dangerous Drugs: Kansas Arrests, 1968-1973.

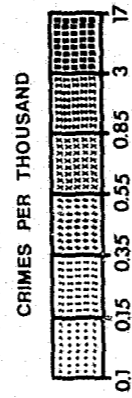
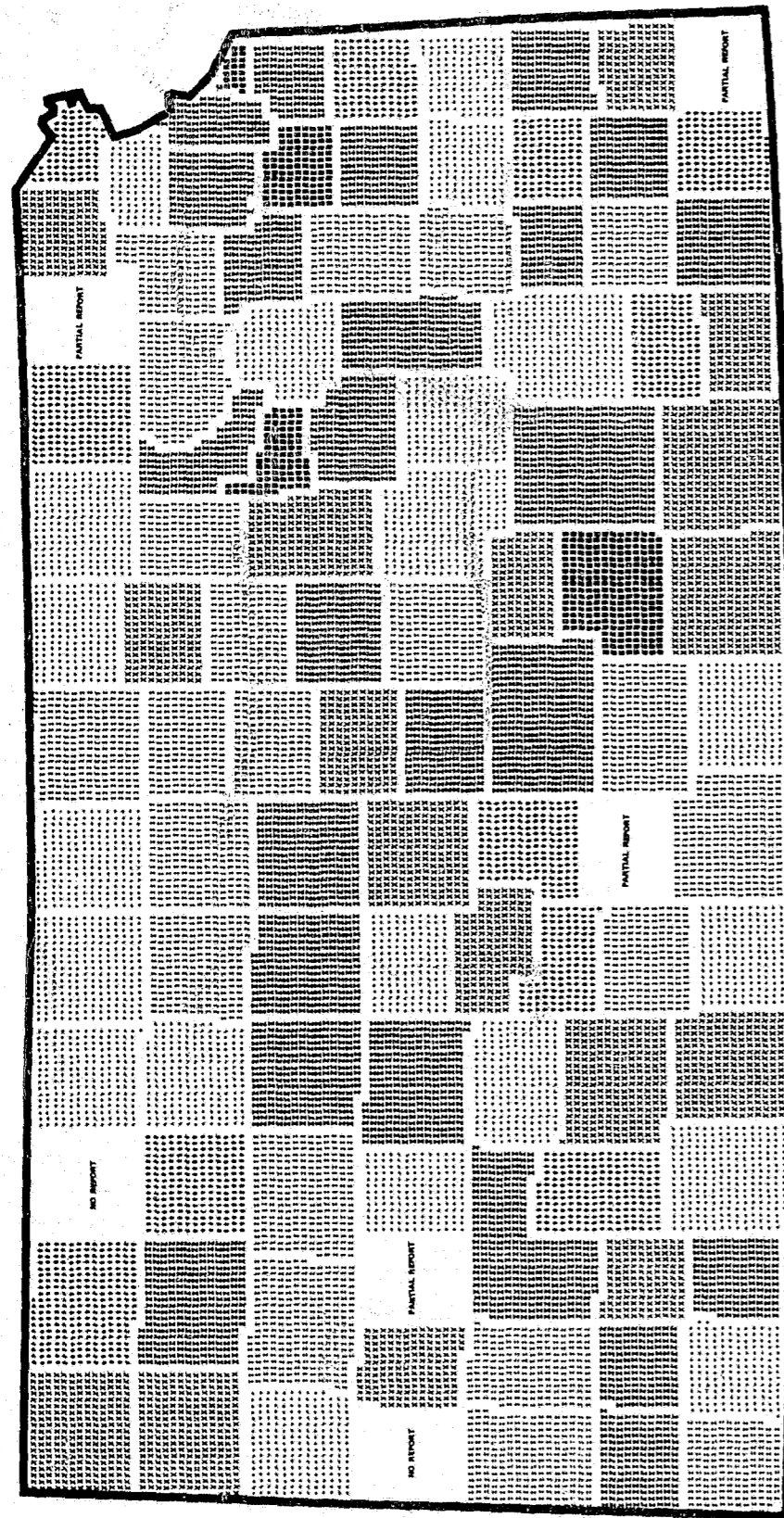


Fig. 26. Property Crimes in Kansas by County, 1973

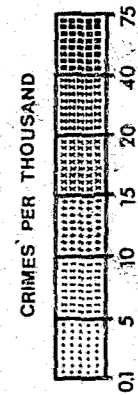
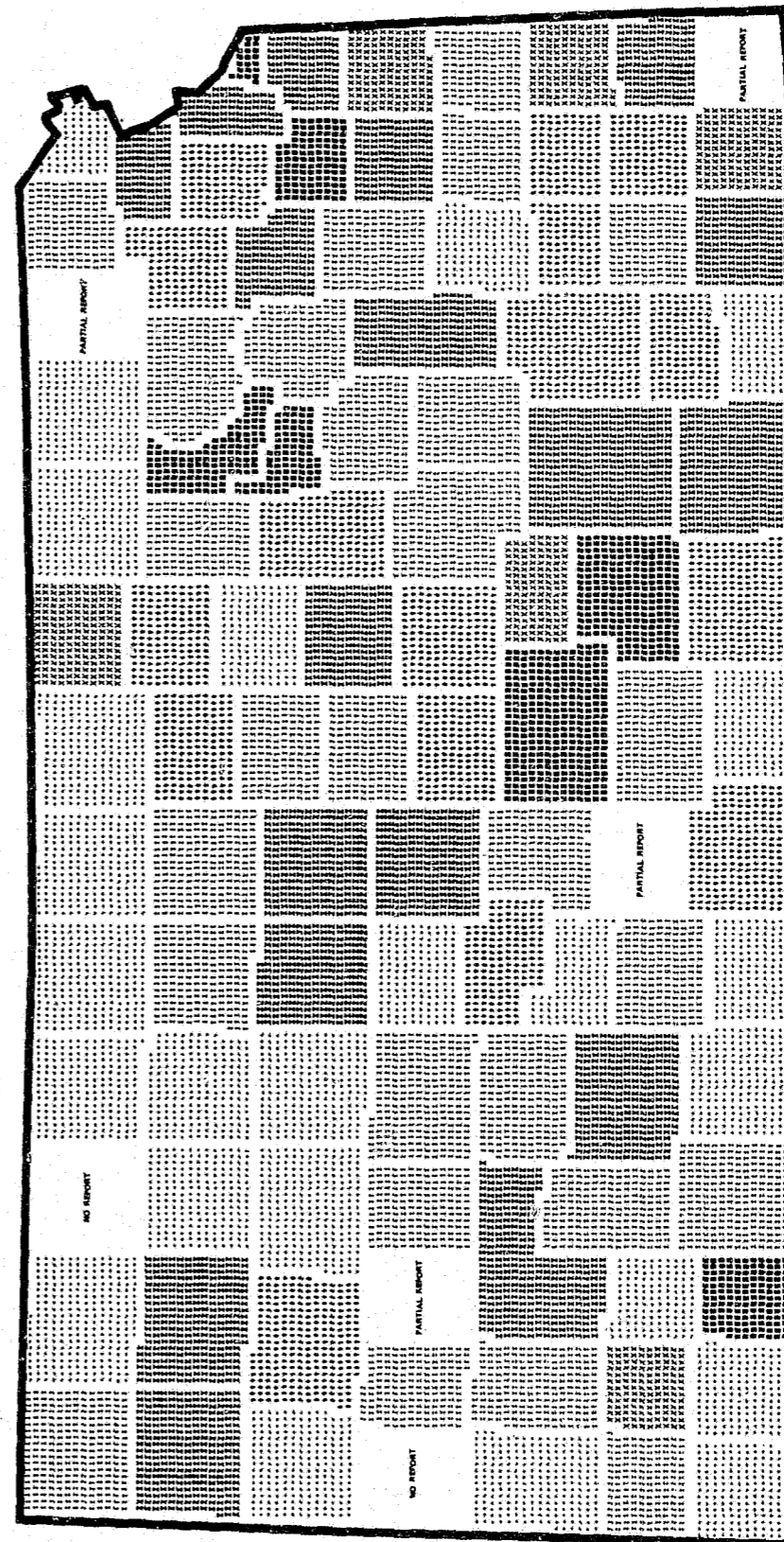
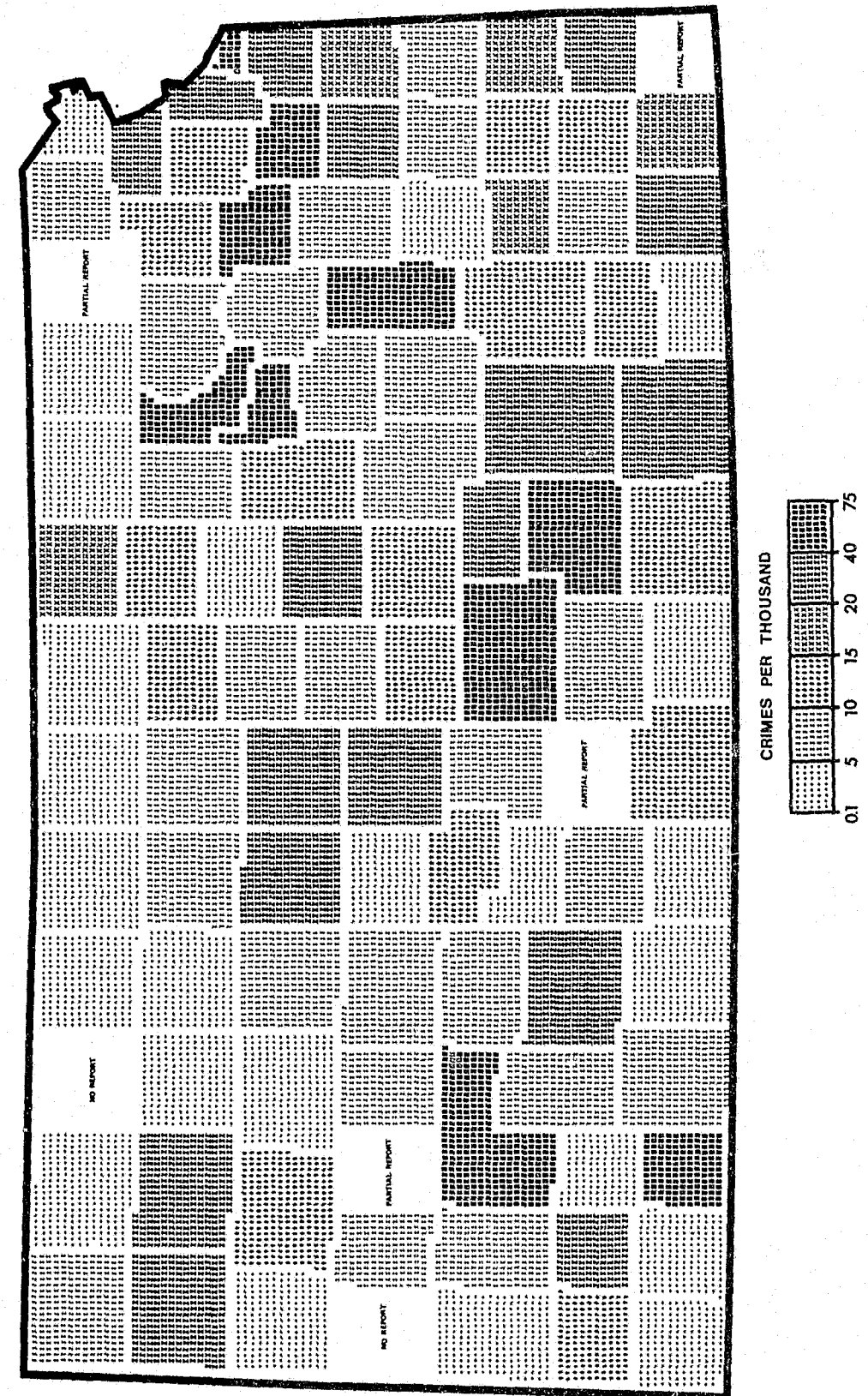

**DEFINITIONS AND  
NOTES**

## GLOSSARY OF TERMS

**ADULT** A person eighteen years of age or older.

**AGGRAVATED ASSAULT** The unlawful attack by one person upon another with the intent of inflicting severe bodily injury accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that any injury result from an aggravated assault.

**ARREST** Taking a person into physical or other legal custody for committing an offense in the jurisdiction making report. Arrests are reported for every criminal offense and for driving while intoxicated, but no other traffic offenses. Juveniles are included in reports of arrests for purposes of summary and comparison, although Kansas law prescribes that law enforcement custody of a child is not legally considered an arrest.

**ARREST RATE** The number of arrests reported per unit of population. For example, the arrest rate per 100,000 population is:

$$\frac{\text{NUMBER OF ARRESTS}}{\text{POPULATION}} \times 100,000$$

**ARSON** The actual or attempted willful or malicious burning with or without intent to defraud.

**AUTO THEFT** The actual or attempted stealing or driving away and abandoning of a motor vehicle. Excludes taking for temporary use when actually returned by the taker or unauthorized use by those having lawful access to the vehicle.

**BURGLARY** Knowingly and without authority entering into or remaining within any building, mobile home, tent or other structure, or any motor vehicle, aircraft, watercraft, railroad car or other means of conveyance of persons or property, with intent to commit a felony or theft therein.

**CLASS I OFFENSE** Any offense within the following classifications: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, manslaughter by negligence, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, and auto theft. These are also denoted as Index Offenses.

**CLASS II OFFENSE** Any criminal offense which is not included in a Class I category.

**CLEARANCE** Takes place when an offense is cleared by arrest or by exceptional means. An offense is cleared by arrest when at least one person is arrested, charged with the offense, and bound over for prosecution. Exceptional clearances occur when police have exhausted all leads and have done everything possible to clear a case (examples are deathbed confessions, extradition denied, suicide of the offender, confession by offender already in custody or serving sentence).

**CLEARANCE RATE** The number of offenses cleared in a classification per 100 offenses reported in that classification. The clearance rate is calculated:

$$\frac{\text{NUMBER OF CLEARANCES}}{\text{NUMBER OF OFFENSES}} \times 100\%$$

Clearance rate is also known as "percent cleared."

**CRIME** An act or omission defined by law and for which, upon conviction, imprisonment or fine, or both imprisonment and fine is authorized. Same as "offense" and "criminal offense."

**CRIME RATE** The number of offenses reported per unit of population. The crime rate per 1,000 population is computed as follows:

$$\frac{\text{NUMBER OF OFFENSES}}{\text{POPULATION}} \times 1,000$$

**DRIVING WHILE INTOXICATED** Driving or operating any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

**DISORDERLY CONDUCT** All charges of committing a breach of the peace.

**DISPOSITION** The legal outcome of the action taken upon a person arrested for an offense.

**EMBEZZLEMENT** The misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control.

**FORCIBLE RAPE** The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Includes assault to rape and attempted rape. Excludes statutory offenses (no force used--victim under age of consent.)

**FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING** Actual or attempted altering, uttering or possession, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

**FRAUD** The fraudulent conversion and obtaining of money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks except forgeries and counterfeiting.

**GAMBLING** Promoting, permitting, or engaging in, gambling.

**INDEX CRIMES** Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, manslaughter by negligence, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, and auto theft.

**JUVENILES** Persons seventeen years of age or younger.

**LARCENY/THEFT** Excludes thefts of motor vehicles. The felonious stealing, taking, and carrying, leading, riding or driving away of the personal property of another without claim or right, with the intent to deprive him of his ownership or to convert such property to the use of the taker or another.

**LIQUOR LAWS** The manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, or possessing of intoxicating liquor in violation of State and local laws.

**MANSLAUGHTER BY NEGLIGENCE** Any death which police investigation establishes was primarily attributable to gross negligence of some individual other than the victim.

**MOVING AVERAGE** The average of offense reports, taken over a period of years, in a month-by-month procedure. For example, each January is averaged with all other Januarys in the period, each February with all other Februarys, and so on.

**MURDER/NONNEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER** All felonious homicides due to willful acts (nonnegligent) and deaths due to negligent acts.

**NARCOTIC DRUG LAWS** Offenses such as unlawful possession, sale, or use relating to narcotic drugs and controlled substances. Excludes federal offenses.

**NON-SUBURBAN CITIES** All jurisdictions with reporting police departments or with reporting campus law enforcement agencies in non-SMSA counties.

**OTHER ASSAULTS** Assaults and attempted assaults which are **not** of an aggravated nature.

**OTHER OFFENSES** All state or local offenses not explicitly mentioned in Class I or Class II listings.

**PERCENT CHANGE** The percent increase or decrease in number from one period of time to another. This is computed:

$$\frac{\text{NUMBER AT PRESENT} - \text{NUMBER IN PAST}}{\text{NUMBER IN PAST}} \times 100\%$$

**POPULATION DATA** Figures used in the computation of crime rates are taken from those compiled by the Kansas State Department of Agriculture, from figures submitted to that agency by county assessors on January 1 of each year. Estimated full-time enrollment figures based on the fall term, are used to compute crime rate statistics of state colleges and universities with reporting law enforcement agencies. Enrollment figures are supplied by the Kansas State Department of Education.

**PREVIOUS EXPERIENCE** Commitment to a correctional institution, prior to the sentence in effect at the time of the National Prisoner Census.

**PRISONER** A person sentenced as an adult or youthful offender for one year and one day or more, to a state correctional institution. Those held for other jurisdictions are not included. Inmates sentenced in Kansas, but held in another state's institution are included.

**PROPERTY CRIME** Includes burglary, larceny, and auto theft.

**PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE** Attempted or actual sex offenses of a commercialized nature such as prostitution, keeping a house of prostitution, procuring, transporting, or detaining women for immoral purposes.

**ROBBERY** The stealing or taking of anything of value from a person by force or violence or by placing in fear, such as strongarm robbery, stickups, armed robbery, assault to rob, and attempt to rob.

**RURAL AREAS** All jurisdictions with sheriff's offices in non-SMSA counties.

**SEX OFFENSES** Attempted or actual statutory rape, offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Excludes forcible rape and prostitution.

**SMSA (Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas)** Population categories which have been established by the U.S. Bureau of the Census and which are wholly or partially located in the State of Kansas. Generally each SMSA is made up of an entire county or group of counties having one or more central cities meeting the requirements of certain metropolitan characteristics and having a population of 50,000 or more. Kansas SMSA's currently are Kansas City (Johnson and Wyandotte counties), Topeka (Shawnee County), and Wichita (Butler and Sedgwick counties).

**STOLEN PROPERTY** Actual and attempted buying, receiving, and possessing of stolen property.

**SUBURBAN AREAS** All jurisdictions with less than 50,000 population in the Kansas SMSA counties: Butler, Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte.

**UNFOUNDED OFFENSES** Reports of crimes judged to be false or baseless by law enforcement.

**UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING** A program for the collection, analysis and publication of law enforcement statistics. In order to insure comparability, standard crime definitions are generally maintained.

**URBAN AREAS** Cities over 50,000 in population located in SMSA counties. Currently, the cities included in this classification are: Kansas City, Overland Park, Topeka, and Wichita.

**VAGRANCY** Offenses of vagrancy, begging, and loitering.

**VANDALISM** The willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or person having custody or control.

**VIOLENT CRIME** Classification made up of murder/nonnegligent manslaughter, manslaughter by negligence, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

**WEAPONS** All attempted and actual violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers.
