



Honest in thought and deed in both my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the laws of the land and the regulations of my department. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of the police service. I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession.....law enforcement.

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
HIGHLIGHTS




- * Detectives Division purchased a new polygraph.
- * Nine persons were promoted to other positions from the Detective Division.
- * S.I.D. confiscated in conjunction with other agencies, the largest amount of hash-hish oil in the country ... street value 11 million dollars.
- * As a result of an ordinary drug investigation, several thousand dollars worth of property was recovered from five different locations with numerous arrests.

- * S.I.D. confiscated marijuana from Mexico with a street value of \$465,000.00.
- * During 1972-73 school year, two Youth Division officers participated in a Board of Education program called S.W.I.S. These officers served as police counselors for students who were being given a last and final opportunity to complete their education via this program. These students were classified by the Board of Education as problem students with police record.
- * The Patrol Division began their new S.P.A.C.E. program which is an experimental team policing program funded through a federal grant.
- * The Patrol Division vehicles were replaced with 1973 Torinos, two new paddy wagons were obtained screens placed in all field patrol units.
- * Appointment of a Legal Advisor has proved to be an asset to the officers and department and received by all with enthusiasm.
- * Two new radar guns were bought for the Traffic Division.
- * The department received a six month grant for selective enforcement.
- * The E.A.G.L.E. program was implemented August 15. Emergency Air Ground Law Enforcement.
- * Special Tactical Forces was changed to a divisional status-Special Operations Division which added the Airport and Reserves to their Division.




- * The radio 10-code was modified to more adequately fit the urban demands.
- * New copying and collating machines were bought to enable faster production and more professional products.
- * Four women police officers were hired. The first women to be hired in 14 years.
- * Helicopter patrol (E.A.G.L.E.) off to a flying start.
- * Police Cadets implemented. Serving as Resource Cadets in target junior high schools.
- * Implementation of Special Services Grant provides for a computer program analyst, a graphic designer - artist-photographer, and a research assistant.
- * Three retired officers, William Durtschi, Tom Soathoff, and Johnny Allen passed away.




PART 1 CRIME TREND
