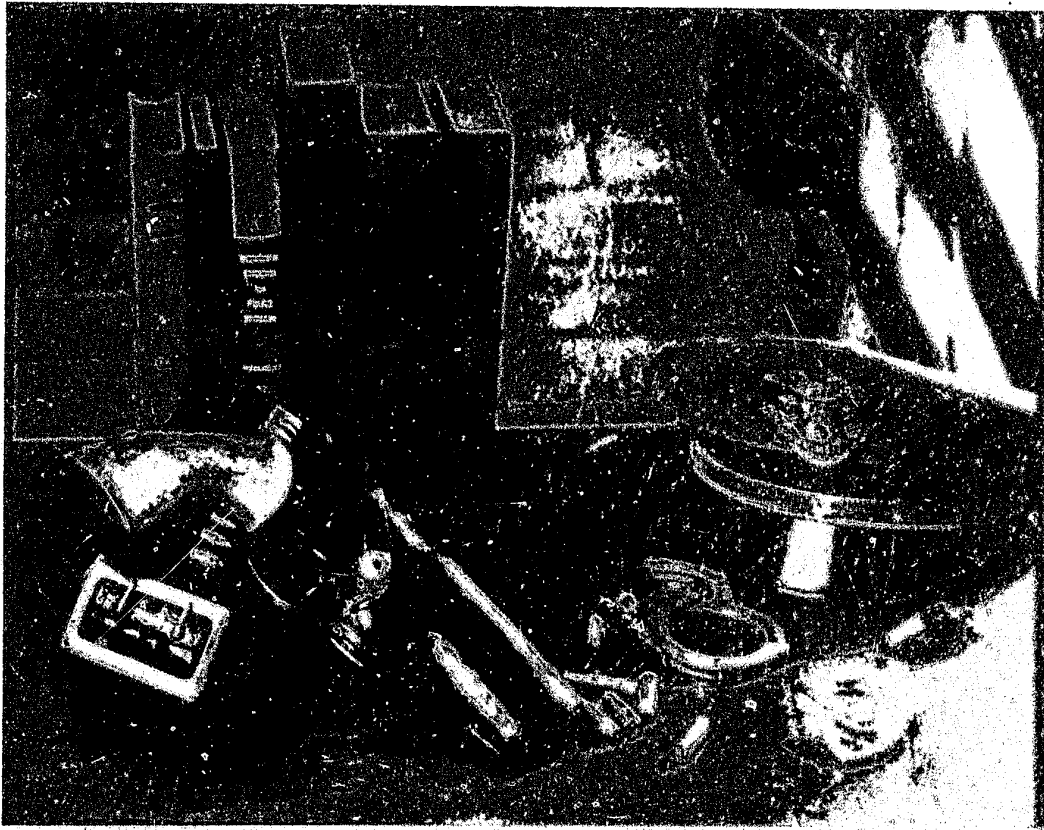

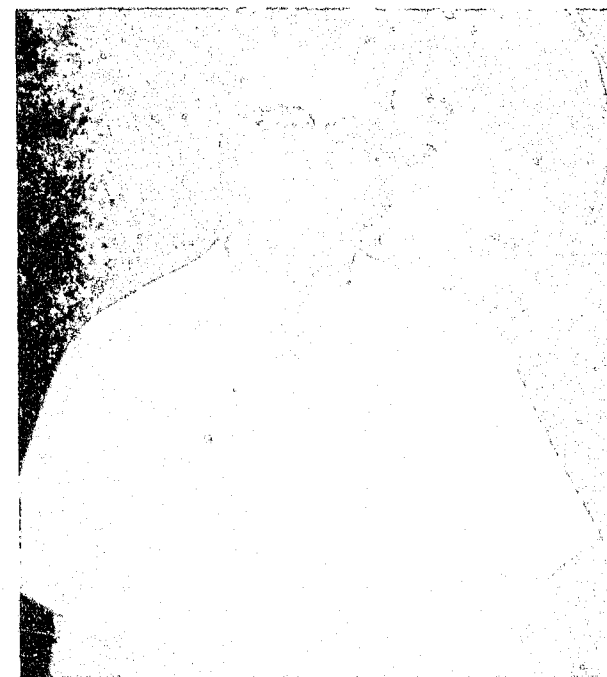

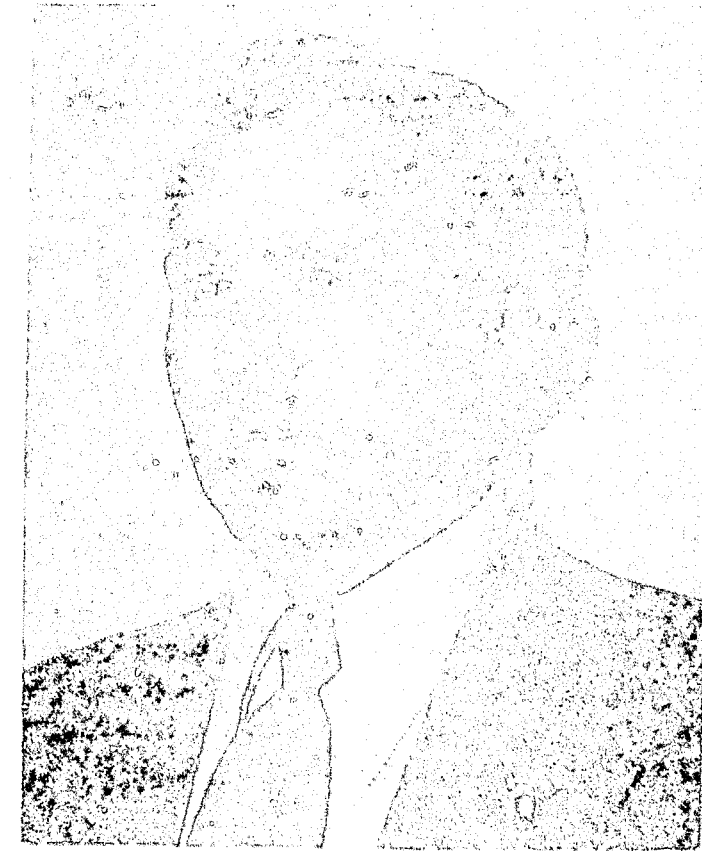

Dear Mr. Lee:

The Victoria Police Department respectfully submits this annual report covering our activities and performances for the 1973 calendar year. This report, accompanied by charts, graphs and photographs, serves as a narration for the police services performed.


A look at the Victoria Police Department records and statistics reveals that the City of Victoria experienced a 22% increase in crime index offenses over the previous year. A bulk of this total is made up of an increase of crimes relating to thefts. Of this increase 40% of all crime index offenses reported were cleared by arrest. We at the Victoria Police Department feel that even with the high standards and dedicated work of our police officers that has been obtained over years of development, we are now functioning at near the optimum level of personnel numbers versus reported criminal occurrences.

As in the past years the department's training programs in both basic and specialized areas of criminal justice have been justified by accomplishment of departmental objectives. Officers of this department acquired a total of 5,759 man hours of police training for the year. The average age of sworn personnel for this department is 31.8 years of age and an average 5.5 years of experience.

The Victoria Police Department spent considerable time on the enforcement of hazardous moving violations to alleviate the 4% increase in motor vehicle accidents over last year's totals.

We wish to express our sincere thanks and appreciation to the Honorable Mayor, City Council and you, the City Manager, for your interest and concern for police problems and to all the citizens of the City of Victoria for their increasing support and cooperation during the year.

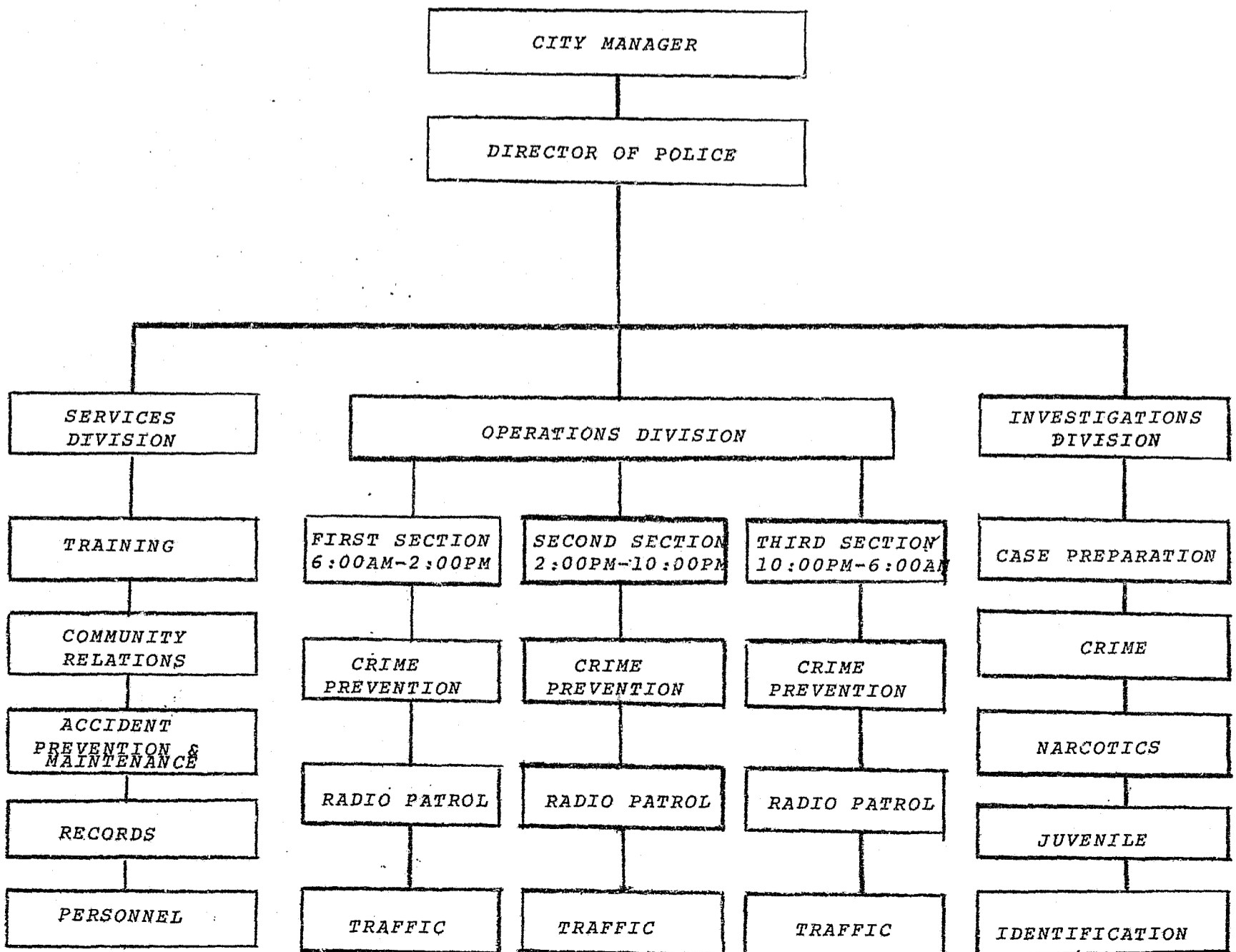
LAW ENFORCEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

AS A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER, my fundamental duty is to serve mankind; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation, and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the Constitutional right of all men to liberty, equality and justice.

I WILL keep my private life unsullied as an example to all, maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn, or ridicule, develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed in both my personal and official life, I will be exemplary, in obeying the laws of the land and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I WILL never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I RECOGNIZE the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of the police service. I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession

## UNIT FUNCTIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

### OFFICE OF THE DIRECTOR:

The "general administrator" of the department; maintains the command post, supervises internal good order; is responsible for the prevention of criminality, the repression of crime, apprehension of the offenders, recovery of property, and regulation of non-criminal conduct according to city ordinances, state and federal laws.

### SERVICES DIVISION:

Designed to assist the Director of Police in departmental administration; performs staff functions necessary to research and planning; organizing and coordinating; disseminates public information; and serves as a communication device between activities and handles citizen complaints involving police officers. Performs the auxiliary service necessary to support the primary task of providing for public safety. Manages the operation of the Detention Section, provides for the routine servicing, minor repairs and preventive maintenance program for the police motor fleet; performs analysis of traffic data and develops solutions to the problems in terms of police activity. The Services Division is also responsible for the operation of the Victoria Police Academy which is designed to raise standards of law enforcement, increase capabilities of personnel, insure uniform operating procedures, increase productivity of personnel and insure better performance.

### OPERATIONS DIVISION:

Performs the traditional and basic police task; duties consist of crime prevention, crime repression, protection of life and property, preservation of peace, action against criminals, regulation of non-criminal conduct, and assisting the law abiding public. Duties consist of patrolling and observing, answering radio calls, disposing of complaints, investigation on patrol, arrest of offenders (including traffic), preparation of reports, testifying in court, control of public gathering, directing traffic and miscellaneous field services.

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION:

Responsible for the investigation of crime, recovery of property, identification and apprehension of offenders; vice, narcotics, and juvenile delinquency control; adaptation-application of methods for the purpose of crime control and prevention.

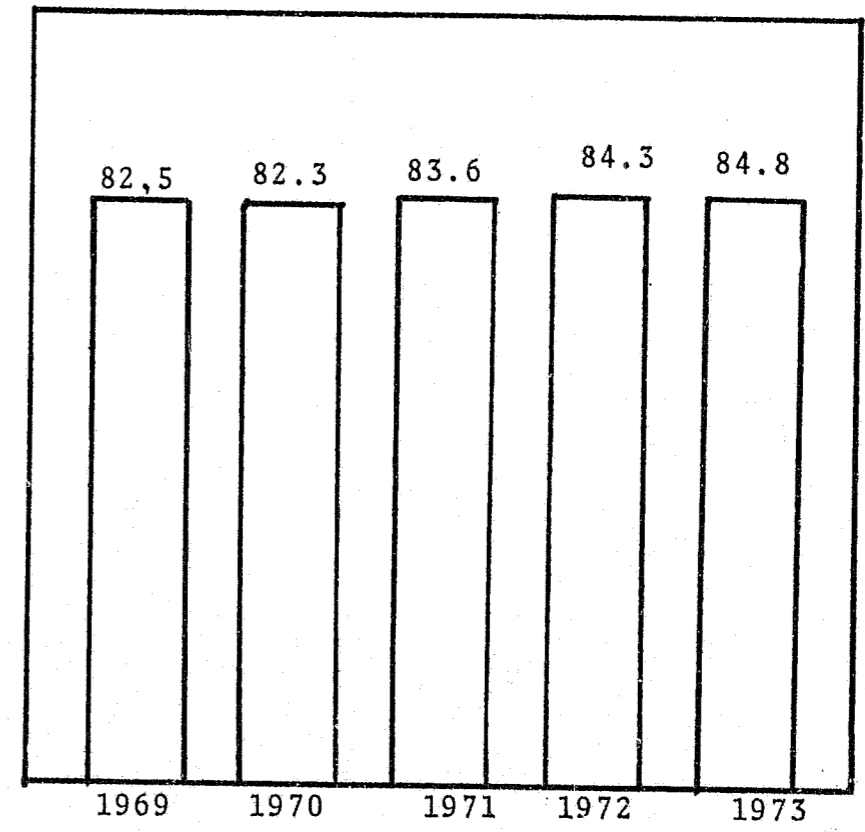

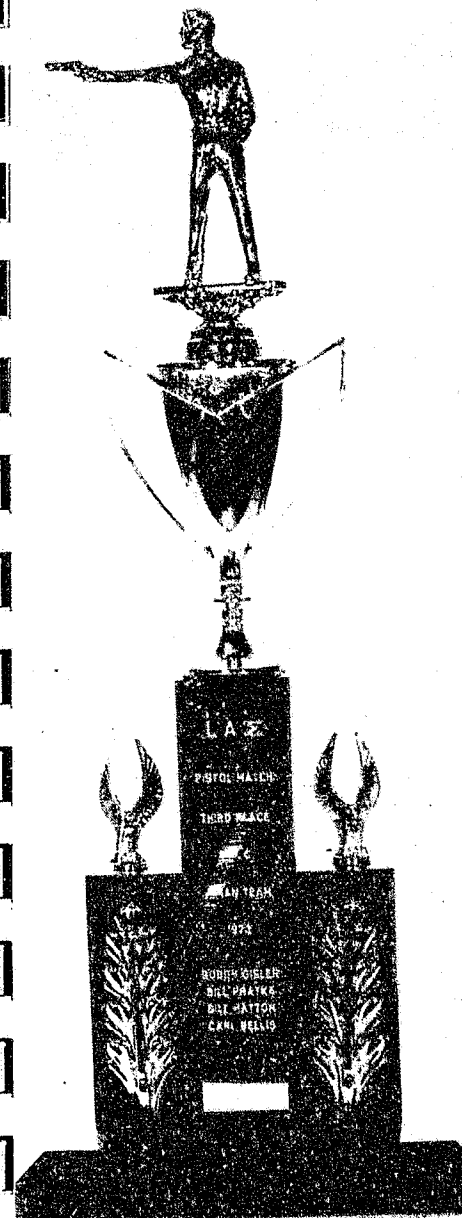

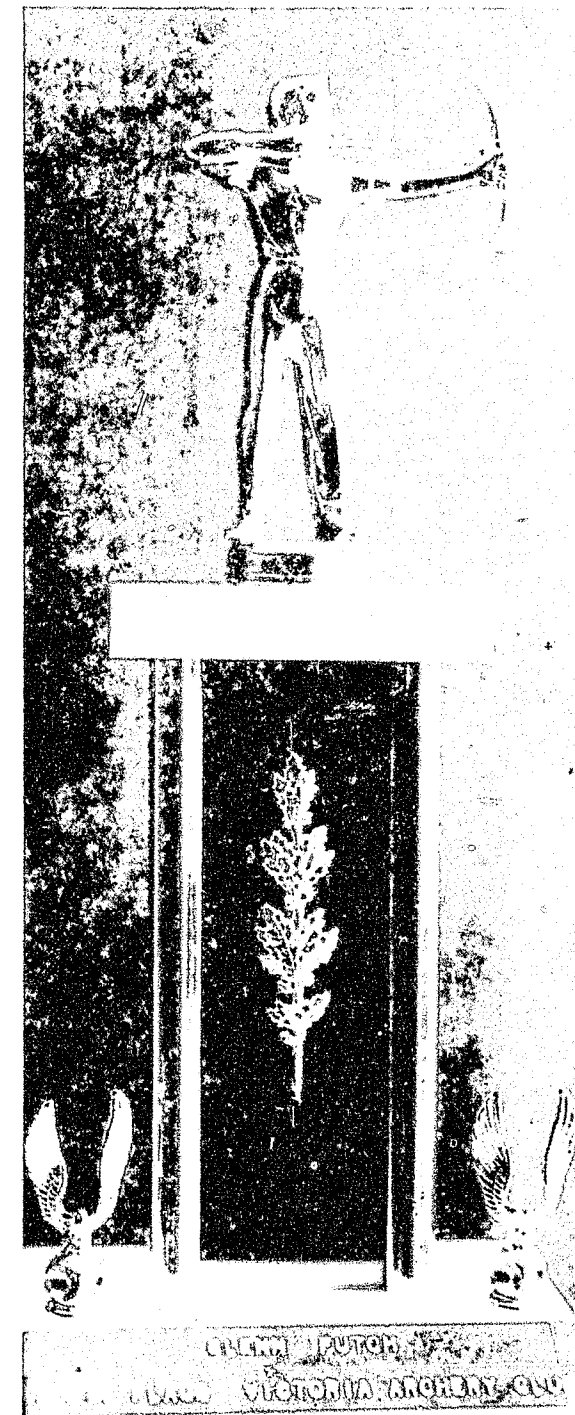

## VICTORIA POLICE ACADEMY

THE VICTORIA POLICE ACADEMY CONDUCTED TWO BASIC POLICE TRAINING SESSIONS DURING THE YEAR 1973. THE BASIC COURSE HAS BEEN ELEVATED TO 240 HOURS OVER THE 140 HOURS WHICH WAS REQUIRED PRIOR TO JANUARY 1, 1973. IN ADDITION TO THESE BASIC SCHOOLS, THE POLICE ACADEMY CONDUCTED FOURTEEN SPECIALIZED POLICE TRAINING SCHOOLS. THERE WAS A TOTAL OF 15,650 MAN HOURS EXPENDED BY 353 OFFICERS WHICH WERE IN ATTENDANCE AT THE VARIOUS TRAINING PROGRAMS IN 1973. THESE OFFICERS AND SUPPORTING PERSONNEL REPRESENT ALL OF THE LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES IN THE GOLDEN CRESCENT COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS.

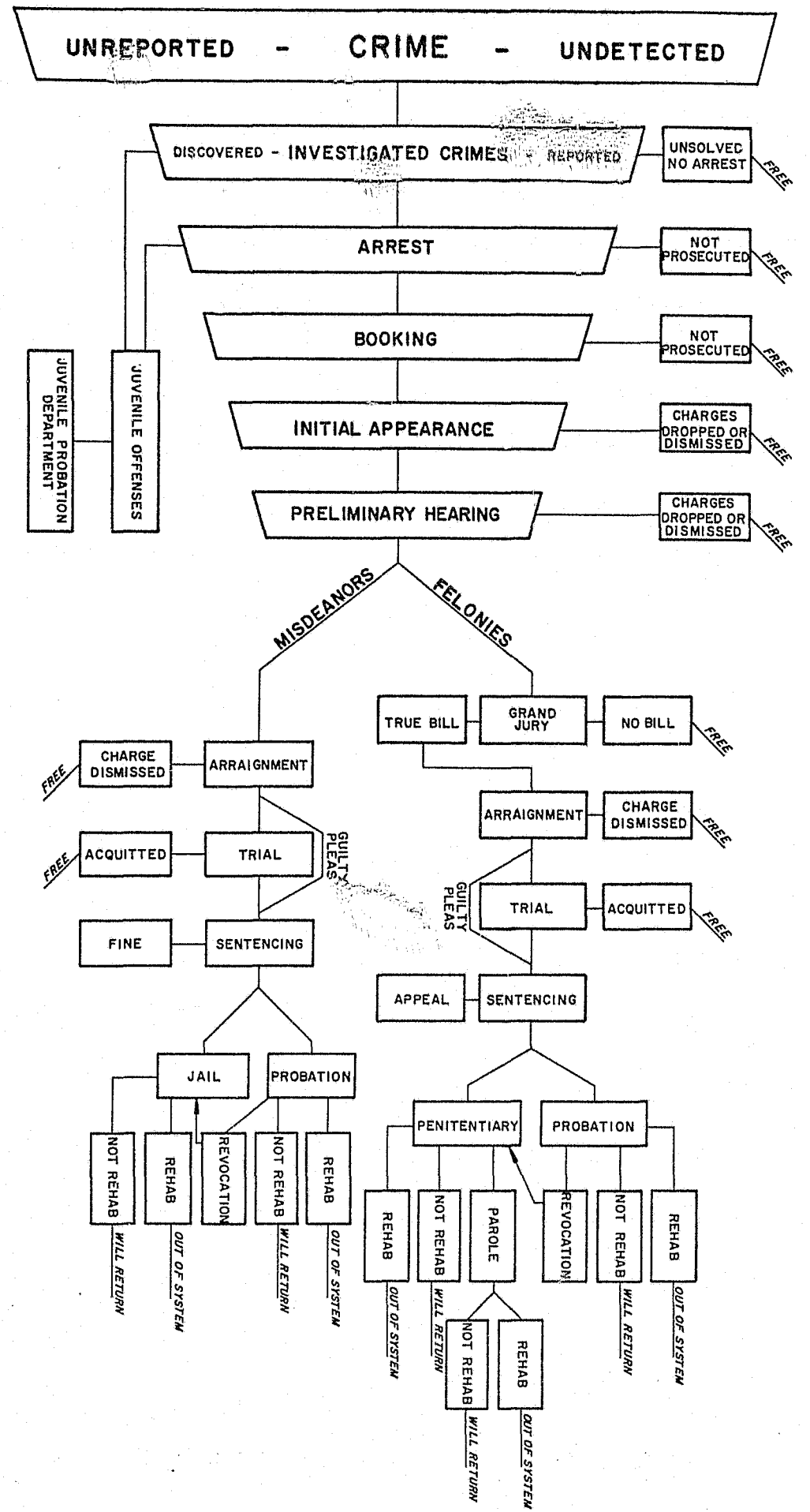

DON'T BLAME THE SCOREKEEPER

The below is a article that was printed in the HOUSTON CHRONICLE under EDITORIALS.

The latest statistics on crime in the United States don't present a pretty picture. Serious crime grew twice as fast as the population and there wasn't a single decrease in a major crime category nationwide.

These statistics are gathered by the police departments around the nation, and it is to the police departments that the public turns for answers to questions about the rise in crime.

And that's not entirely fair. In one sense, the police department is acting as a scorekeeper on public behavior, and is the scorekeeper the one to be held responsible for the final outcome of the game?

The public is like the man who in a fit of temper throws an ashtray through a window and then turns to his wife and declares: "Look what you let me do!"

The Federal Bureau of Investigation, which gathers these national statistics, searches for patterns in crime and found conditions which affect the amount and type of crime that occurs. Density of a community is a factor as well as the economic status and mores of the economic status and mores of the population. The relative

stability of the population plays a part. Climate makes a difference. Educational, recreational and religious characteristics affect crime rates. And, among the many social factors, the FBI adds to the list the effective strength and the standards of the police force in the community and the policies of prosecutors and the courts. In other words, crime and its prevention is a package deal, the responsibility of an entire community, not just the policeman.

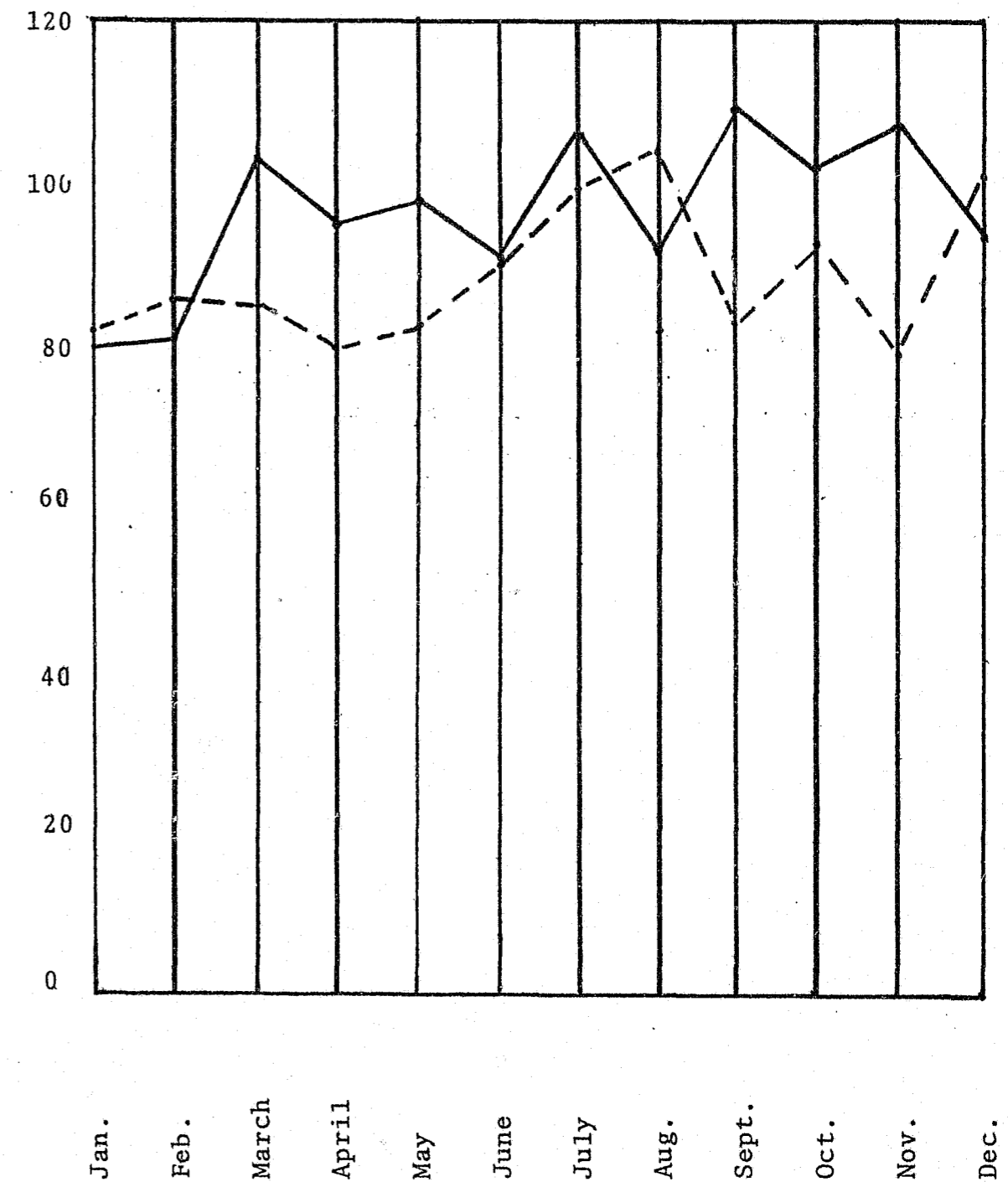
Of course, the degree to which the police and the prosecutors and the courts are supported depends upon community attitude, and that is why it is important for a community to want and work for high criminal justice standards.

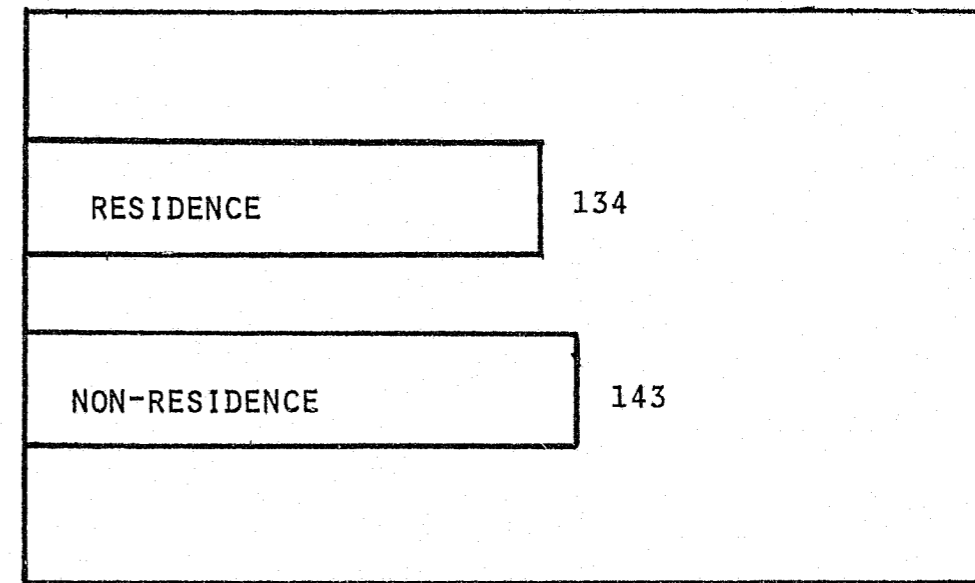
Just so we remember when these crime statistics are released, we aren't judging the police alone; we are keeping score on the entire community.

# MONTHLY REPORT OF OFFENSES KNOWN TO POLICE

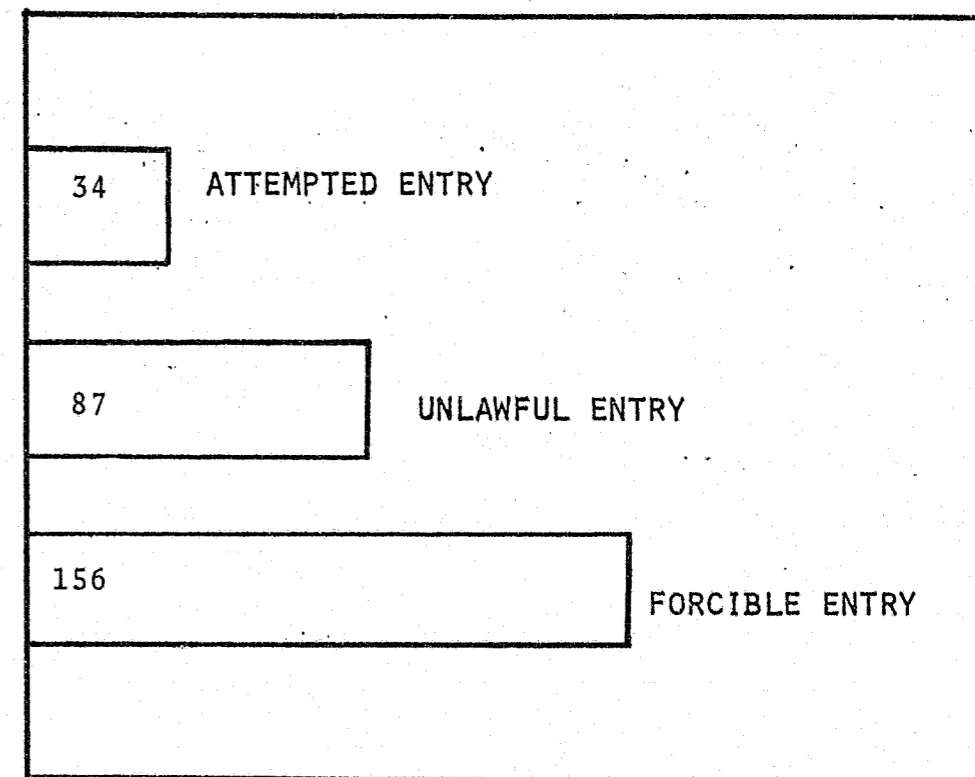

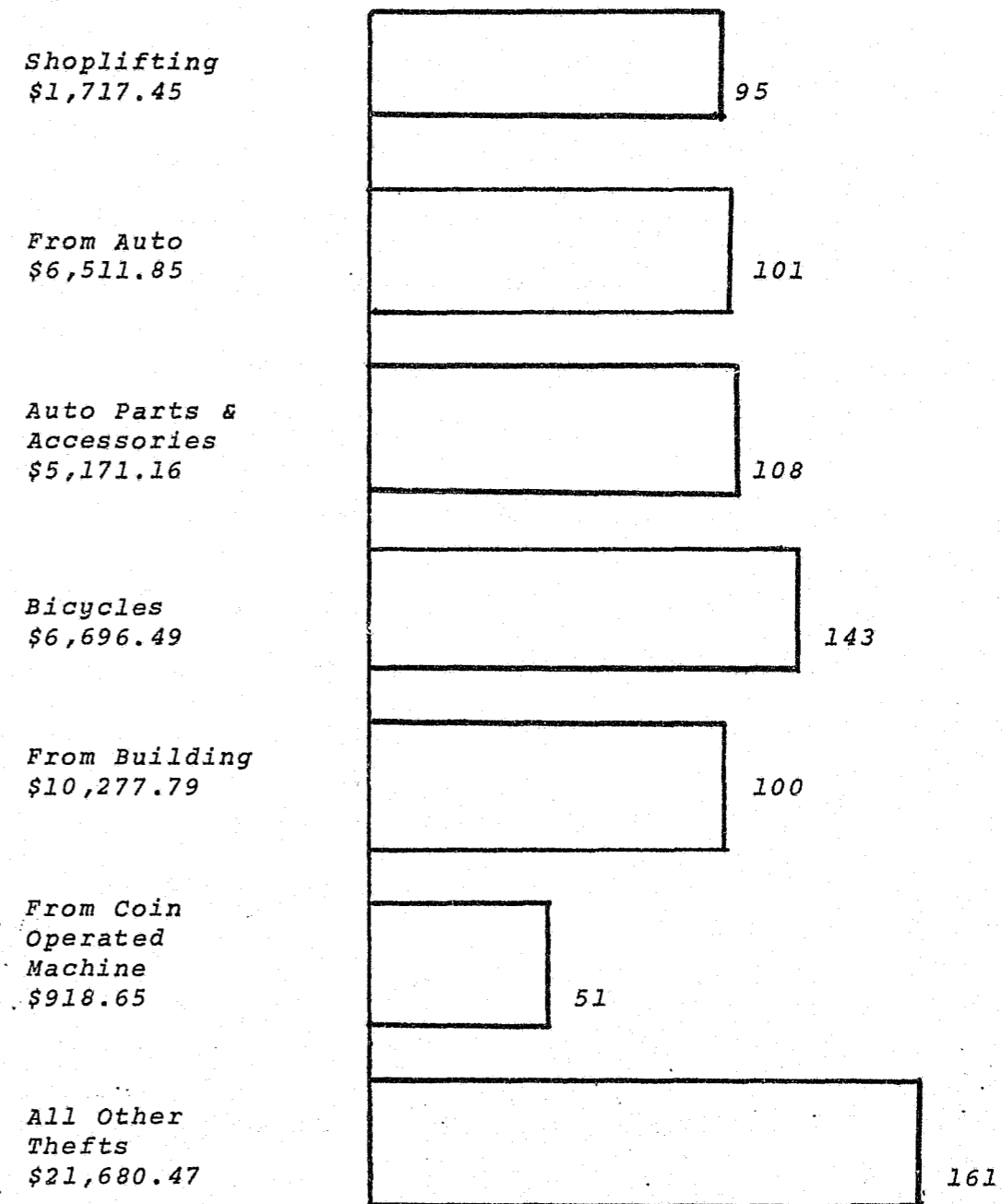


ANALYSIS OF BURGLARIES 1973

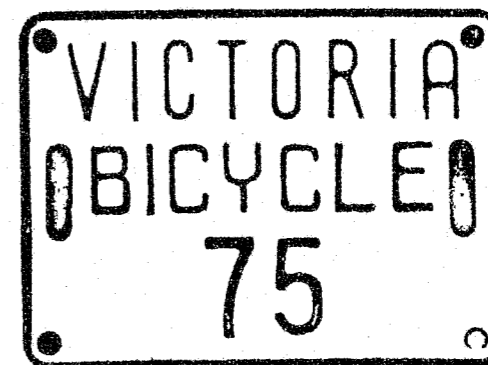

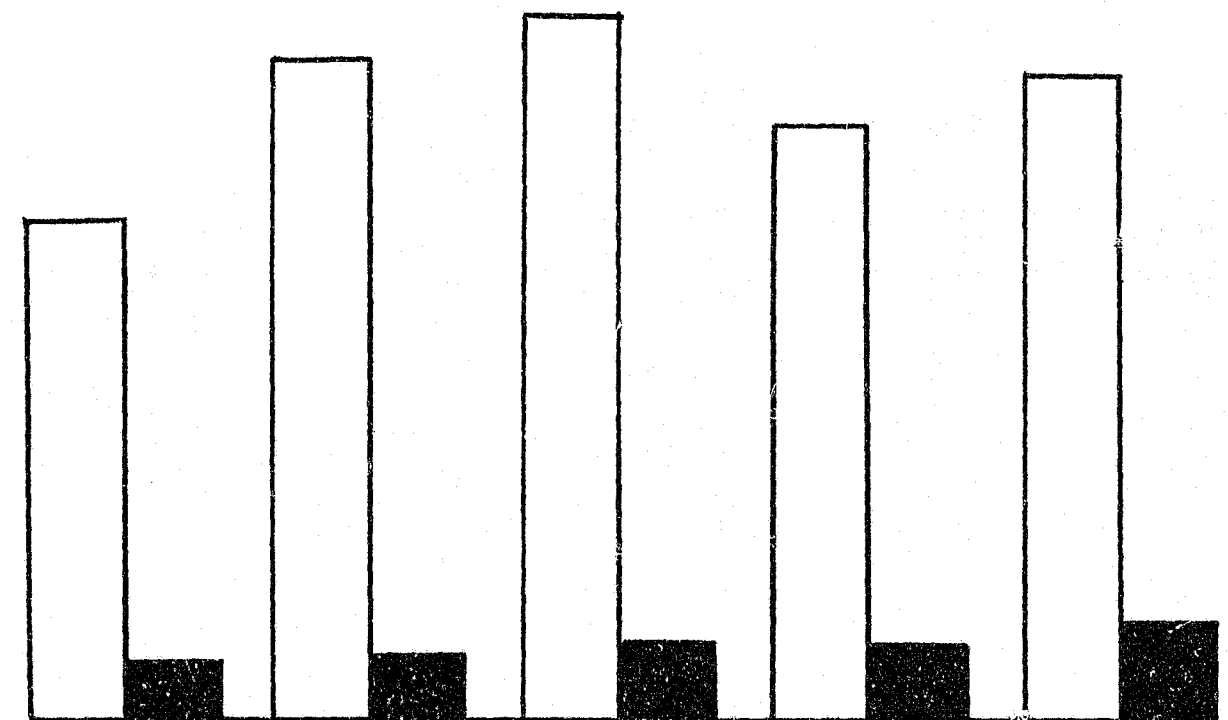



## RACE OF PERSONS ARRESTED

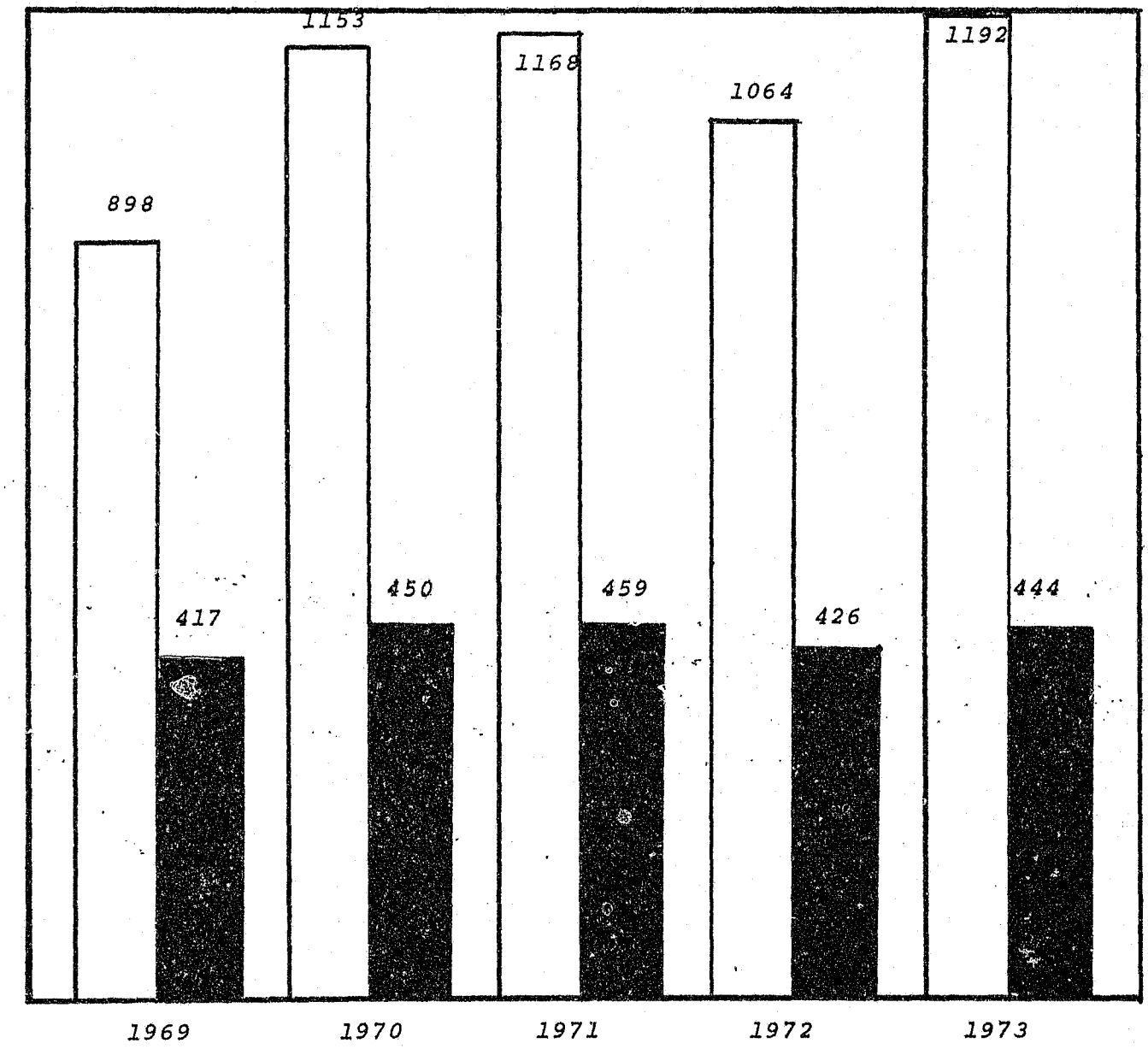

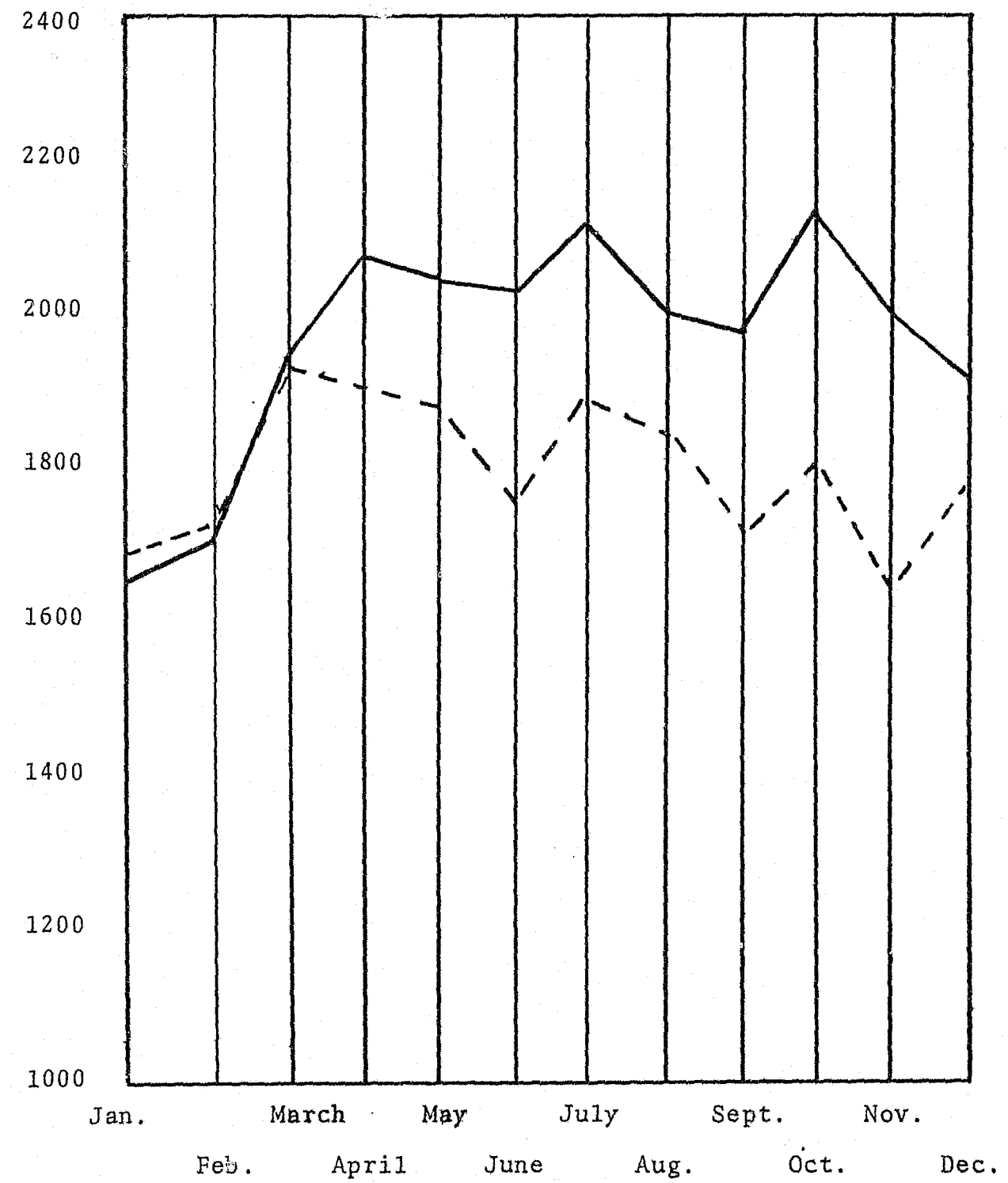



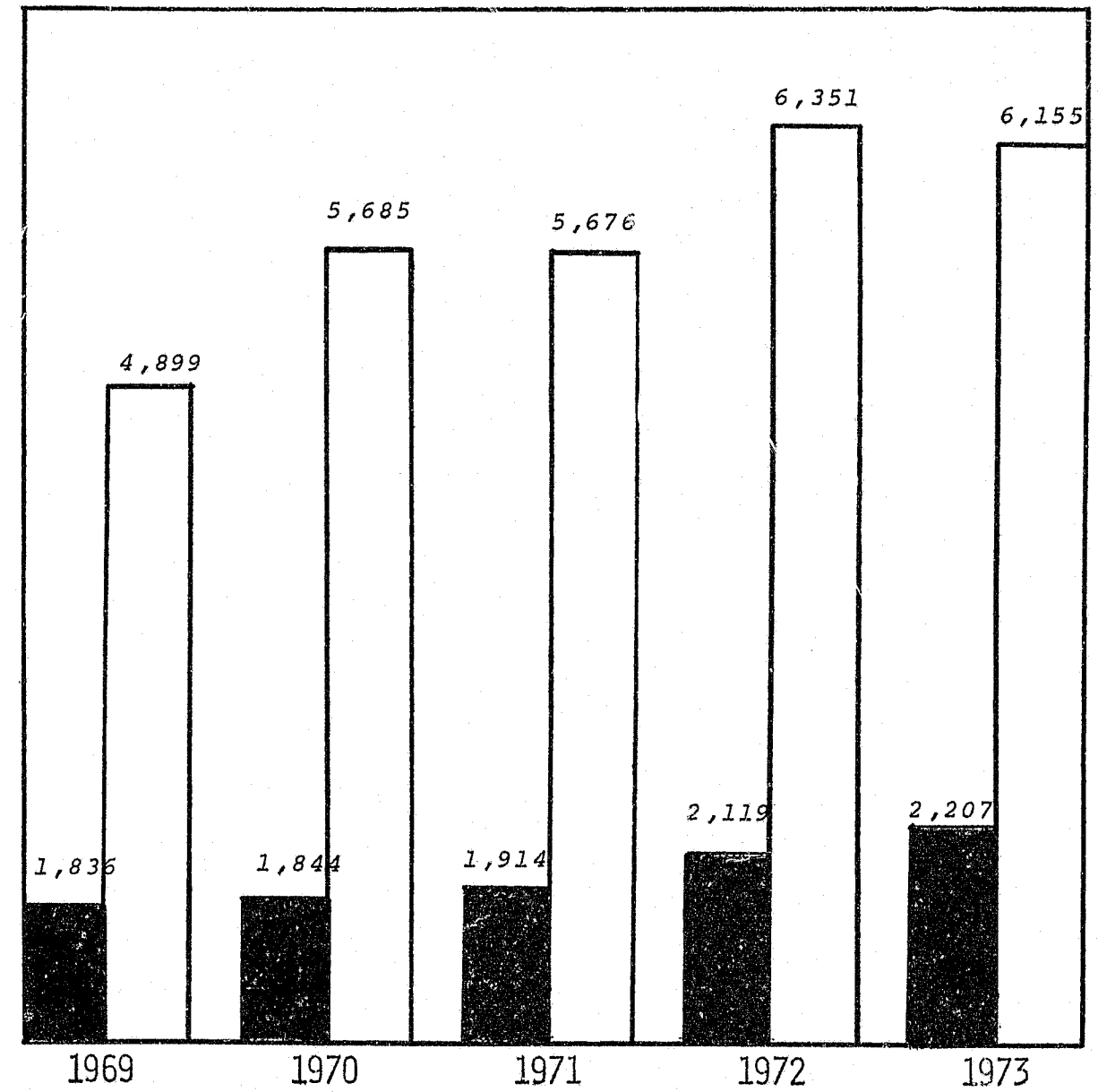

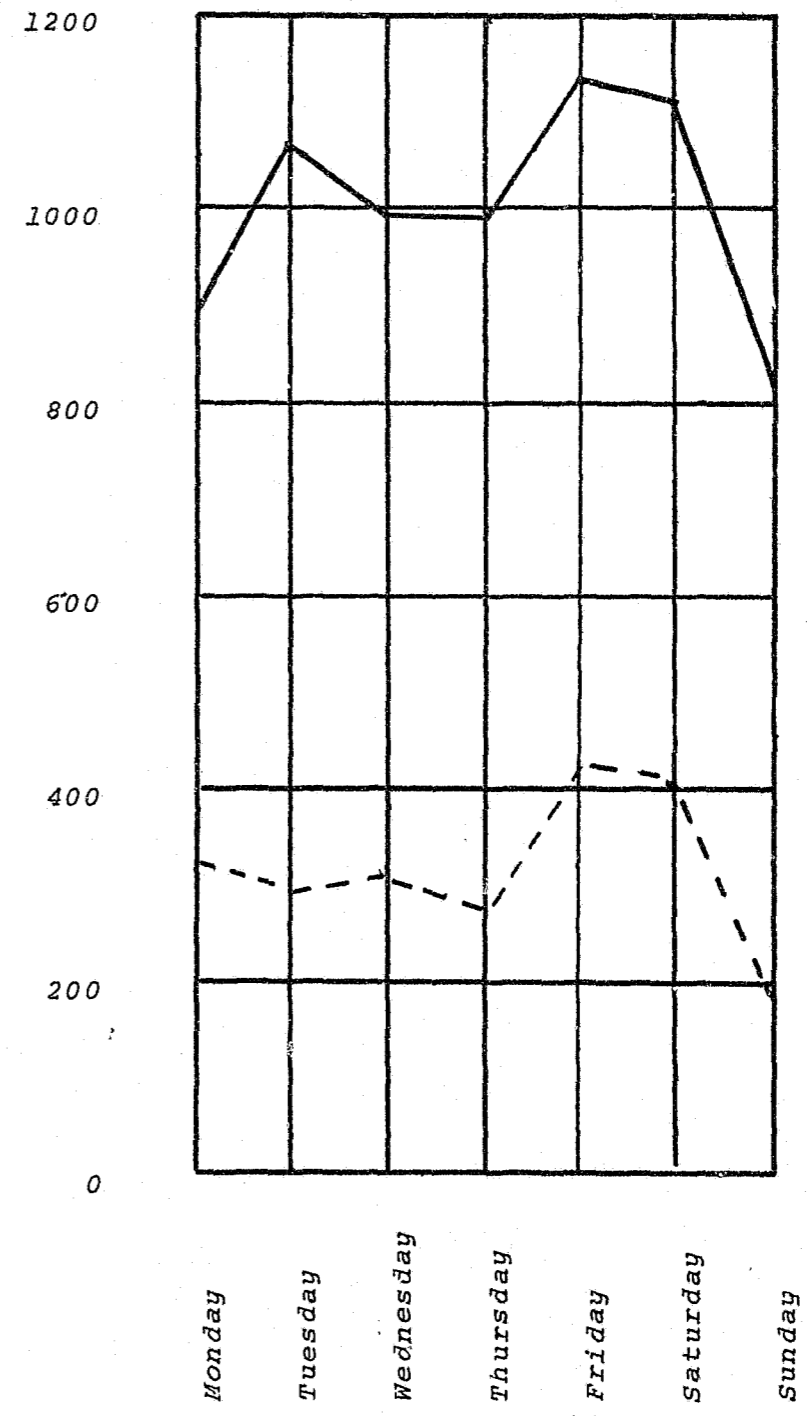
TOTAL HAZARDOUS VIOLATIONS

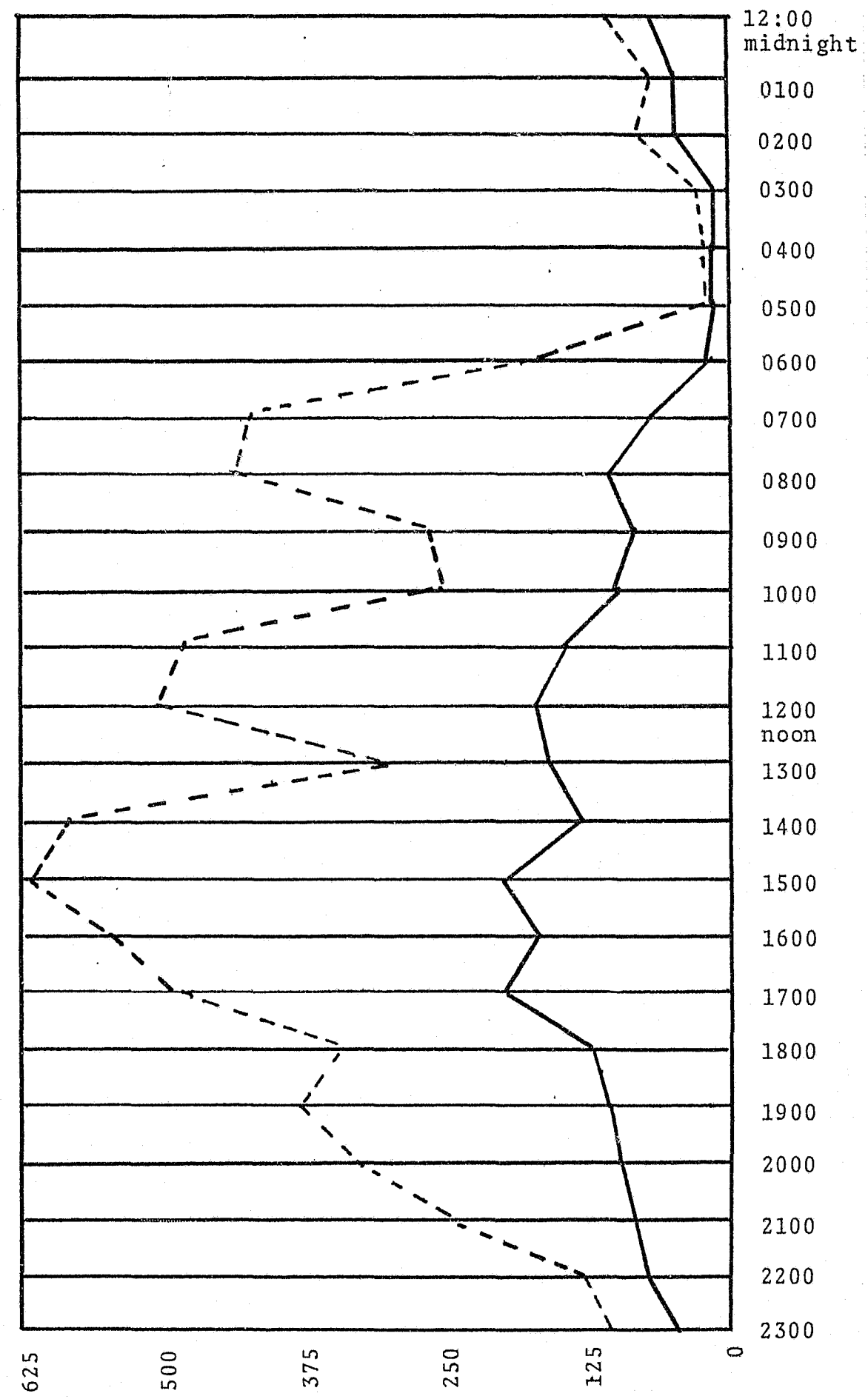

W H A T I S A C O P ?

Cops are human (believe it or not) just like the rest of us. They come in both sexes but mostly male. They also come in various sizes. This sometimes depends on whether you are looking for one or trying to hide something. However, they are mostly big.

Cops are found everywhere - on land - on the sea, in the air, on horses, in cars, and sometimes in your hair. In spite of the fact that "you can't find one when you want one" they are usually there when it counts the most. The best way to get one is to pick up the phone.

When he serves a summons he's a monster. If he lets you go he's a doll. To little kids he's either a friend or a bogeyman, depending on how the parents feel about it. He works "around the clock", split shifts, Sundays and Holidays and it always kills him when a joker says "Hey tomorrow is Election day, I'm off, let's go fishing". (That's the day he works twenty hours.)

A cop is like a little girl, who, when she was good, was very, very good, but when she was bad she was horrid. When a cop is good "he's getting paid for it". When he makes a mistake he's a grafter and that goes for the rest of them too". When he shoots a stick-up man he's a hero, except when the stickup man is "only a kid, anybody coulda seen that".

Most of them have homes, some of them covered with ivy, but most of them covered with mortgages. If he drives a big car he's a chiseler; a little car, "who's he kidding". His credit is good; This is very helpful, because his salary isn't. Cops raise lots of kids, most of them belong to other people.

A cop sees more misery, bloodshed, trouble, and sun-  
rises than the average person. Like the postman, cops must  
be out in all weather. His uniform changes with the climate,

Cops like days off, vacations and coffee. They don't

They have unions but they can't strike. They must be im-  
partial, courteous, and always remember the slogan, "At your  
service".

Cops get medals for saving lives, stopping runaway horses,  
and shooting it out with bandits (once in a while his widow  
gets the medal). But sometimes the most rewarding moment  
comes when after some small kindness to an older person,  
he feels the warm hand clasp, looks into grateful eyes and  
hears, "THANK YOU AND GOD BLESS YOU, SON".
