

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FOREWORD

This is the third quarterly survey of judicial salaries in state court systems published by the National Center for State Courts. The National Center will continually maintain this data on a current basis so that any state court system desiring information between quarterly issues can contact the National Center directly for the latest changes. All changes in this edition have been typed in italics to make the changes more noticeable.

In this issue, the section dealing with judicial salaries in courts of limited and special jurisdiction is divided into seven categories on a jurisdictional basis, which is self-explanatory.

In Appendix I we have listed all pending legislation which could affect judicial salaries on a state by state basis. Appendix II indicates those states which provide for "floating" judicial salaries on the consumer price index or other cost of living adjusters. Appendix III, which was included in the first issue of the salary survey and dealt with the Economic Stabilization Act, has not been included since the second issue due to the expiration of the Act on April 30, 1974 and no new controls being imposed.

Florida:

Legislation was passed in the 1974 legislative session establishing the salaries noted effective 1/1/75.

Illinois:

H.B. 2518 currently pending in the present legislative session would increase the Supreme Court to \$50,000. The Appellate Court to \$45,000; the Court Administrator to \$45,000; all Circuit Judges to \$42,500 and all Associate Circuit Judges to \$37,000. The bill has passed the House and is before the Senate for consideration.

Louisiana:

Legislation to raise judicial salaries will be introduced in April, 1975. Increases are being sought at all levels in the judiciary.

Michigan:

It is anticipated that the Michigan legislature will pass legislation under which the state will assume all costs of the District Court. The legislation provides that judicial salaries for these courts will be set at a uniform \$34,000 with local supplements forbidden. This would be the beginning of state financing of all courts.

* As concerns Supreme Court justices salaries, the State Officers Compensation Commission has approved an increase to \$43,500 of the justices salaries. This has yet to receive final approval by the legislature.

New Jersey:

It is anticipated legislation for increasing judicial salaries will be submitted this fall.

New Mexico:

The Administrative Director of the New Mexico Courts has advised the New Mexico Legislative Finance Committee he will seek substantial salary increases for Appellate Judges and Judges of Courts of General Jurisdiction. A bill requesting such salary increases will be introduced in the legislature in January. It is undetermined at this time whether the limited Jurisdictional Judges will be requesting a salary increase as well.

The proposed salaries are: Supreme Court Justices \$39,500; Appellate Judges \$38,000; District Judges \$37,000.

North Dakota:

Legislation will be introduced to raise the salary levels in the Supreme Court and the District Courts. The salaries will be increased to the following levels on the following dates;

The lower courts will propose salary increases also but the proposed figures have not yet been made public.

The County Court of Increased Jurisdiction and the County Court salaries may be increased up to 10% by the Boards of County Commissioners in each county.

Oregon:

Legislation will be introduced in the 1975 legislature to include judges in the regular cost of living percentage increase being planned for all state employees.

Pennsylvania:

House Bill No. 2715 was introduced on November 12, 1974 providing for salary increases r istrict ustices in Magisterial Districts. The bill was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary. See Appendix II for legislation concerning annual cost of living increases.

South Carolina:

A special Judicial System Study Committee created by an act of the South Carolina General Assembly to recommend legislation to implement the new Judicial Article of the Constitution has recommended the establishment of District Courts divided into six divisions as follows: (1) Civil, (2) Criminal, (3) Family, (4) Equity, (5) Traffic, and (6) Probate.

The District Courts will eliminate the courts of limited and special jurisdiction noted in Part II Salaries. The Committee further recommends that the new court system be put into effect by July 1, 1976 and be state financed.

Legislation to carry out the Committee's recommendations was introduced during the 1974 session of the General Assembly. No action was taken on the legislation. It will be reintroduced at the convening of the General Assembly in January 1975.

Utah:

Legislation to increase judicial salaries will be presented in the January 1975 session. The proposed legislation will increase the annual salaries of Supreme Court Justices to \$34,000 and the annual salaries of the District and Juvenile Judges as will as the Court Administrator to \$32,000.

Vermont:

The Vermont office of the State Court Administrator is going to introduce legislation to amend 32 V.S.A. §1003 (c). The legislation seeks to vest the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court with the authority to fix the compensation of judicial officers within prescribed ranges. The legislation would also provide the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court with \$1,500 more than any other judicial officer and the Chief Superior Judge and Chief District Judge with \$1,000 more than any other judicial officer under their respective jurisdictions.

Washington (State):

A State Salary Commission has just completed a study of salaries for state elected officials. When their report is filed with the Governor it will recommend the following salary levels: Supreme Court \$44,000; Court of Appeals \$41,000; Superior Court \$40,000 and full time District Court \$30,000. It is anticipated legislation will be introduced reflecting these recommendations.

West Virginia:

At the recent election held on November 5, 1974, a Judicial Reform Amendment was passed which eliminated limited and special Courts, making them all Circuit Courts. The basic salary for a Judge of the Circuit Court is \$26,000, so that until changed by the legislature all general trial court salaries will be in that amount. The amendment also abolished the Justice of the Peace system, making former "Justices" "Magistrates" and bringing them into the judicial branch at a salary yet to be fixed. There is also a provision for a State Court Administrator at a salary to be fixed by the Supreme Court.

The Legislature will not convene until January so the salary figures resulting from the implementation of this amendment are not available for the December publication.

Wisconsin:

The maximum salary limitations for Circuit and County Judges are as follows:

\$33,500 through December 31, 1974 and \$34,500 for the period January 1, 1975 through December 31, 1975, barring any intervening group reassignments which may occur. State pay and local supplements combined cannot exceed those limitations.

Floating Salary Statutes.

California, Maryland, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island and Tennessee all provide for judicial salary increases based on floating indices as per capita income increases and the consumer price index. The statutory formulae for these salary increases follow.

California: The California Government Code §6203 provides:

"Salary increases; formula. On September 1, 1968, and on September 1 of each fourth year thereafter the salary of each justice and judge named in Sections 68200 and 68202, inclusive, shall be increased by that amount which is produced by multiplying the then current salary of each justice or judge by the percentage by which the figure representing per capita personal income in California as compiled and reported by the United States Department of Commerce has increased between the calendar year which precedes September 1 of the fourth year preceding the designated date of adjustment and the calendar year which immediately precedes the designated date of adjustment.

In addition to the increase provided under this section on September 1, 1968, on the effective date of the 1969 amendments to this section and on September 1 of each year thereafter, the salary of each justice and judge named in Sections 68200 to 68202, inclusive, shall be increased by that amount which is produced by multiplying the then current salary of each justice or judge by the percentage by which the figure representing the California consumer price index as compiled and reported by the California Department of Industrial Relations has increased in the previous calendar year."

The judges named in §§68200 to 68202 include, the Chief Justice of California, associate justices of the Supreme Court, justices of courts of appeal, superior court judges and municipal court judges.

Maryland: 27 Maryland Code §47 Salaries of Judges provides:

"From and after July 1, 1972, the salaries of the judges of the Court of Appeals, the Court of Special Appeals, the circuit courts of the several counties, the Supreme Bench of Baltimore City and the District Court shall be as provided in the State budget. Whenever there is a general salary increase awarded to State employees, the said judges shall receive the same percentage increase as is awarded to the minimum step of the highest salary grade for classified employees in the State salary plan. Any general salary increase awarded to State employees in the budget bill enacted at the 1972 session of the General Assembly shall not be applicable to and shall not inure to the benefit of the judges. Any proposed increases in the salaries of judges subsequent to July 1, 1972,

shall not be included in that portion of the budget for the judicial department but shall be included in that portion of the budget for the executive department and shall be subject to legislative review and approval."

Massachusetts: Massachusetts General Laws Annotated Chapter 30 \$46 provides:

"The director of personnel and standardization shall annually determine the percentum difference between the average cost of living for the next preceding calendar year and the average cost of living for the calendar year next preceding the calendar year during which the weekly rates prescribed in the above salary schedule were last revised, both as shown by the United States Consumer Price Index for such years, and shall prepare and submit to the general court a report of such determination within a reasonable time after said Index for the next preceding calendar year has become available. Whenever such determination indicates a percentum increase or decrease of at least three percentum, such report shall be accompanied by a recommendation for legislation to provide a corresponding percentum increase or decrease in the salaries of all employees in the service of the commonwealth and paid from the treasury thereof...Whenever such determination indicates a percentum increase of at least three percentum, as hereinbefore described, such report shall be accompanied by a recommendation of legislation to provide a corresponding percentum increase in the salaries of the chief justice and associate justices of the supreme judicial court, the appeals court, the superior court and the municipal court of the city of Boston, the judges and associate judges of the land court, the chief judge and the judges of probate and insolvency, the chief justice and the justices of the district courts other than the municipal court of the city of Boston, the justices and special justices of the Boston Juvenile Court, the justices of the Worcester, Bristol county and Springfield juvenile courts, and special justices of the district courts, including the municipal court of the city of Boston, such increase to take effect as of the beginning of the first payroll period of the year in which such report is submitted."

Ohio:

All judicial personnel will be given an 8.5% cost of living increase in salary as of December 15, 1974.

Pennsylvania:

S.B. No 1651 introduced april 23, 1974 provides; Section 1.

(a) "All employees of the Commonwealth shall be entitled to receive, as additional compensation, a cost of living allowance as provided in this section. The amount of the cost of living allowance shall be determined on the basis of the 'Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers' published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. Department of Labor (1967-1959=100). . . .

Beginning September 1, 1974, the compensation of judges and chancellors shall be the base salaries fixed in this law adjusted to reflect the percentage of change in the per capita personal income of the state of Tennessee, as defined and published by the United States Department of Commerce, between that of the calendar year 1970 and the calendar year next preceding September 1 of the year for which the salaries are to be paid. The adjustments shall occur on September 1, 1974 and on September 1 of every year thereafter for the ensuing year commencing September 1. The base salaries per year shall be as follows:

Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, thirty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$32,500).

Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000).

Presiding Judge of the Court of Appeals and Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, twenty-eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$28,500).

Associate Judges of the Court of Appeals and Court of Criminal Appeals, twenty-seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$27,500).

Circuit Judges, Criminal Judges and chancellors, twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000).
