

WAHPETON POLICE YOUTH PROGRAM

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I. STATEMENT ABOUT WAHPETON - AND THE GENERAL NEED FOR THIS PROGRAM

Wahpeton, the county seat of Richland County, is the southeastern gateway to North Dakota. Located at the head of the Red River of the North, Wahpeton centers one of the richest agricultural areas in the nation. Richland County ranks among the leading counties of the United States in flax and oats production and is the top corn and soybean producer in North Dakota. Served by major highways, U.S. 81 and 75, and N. Dak. 13, and Minn. 210 and 9, three railroads and two trucking services, Wahpeton is a thriving community of 7,000 people, a retail center for a trade territory lying in nine counties with a population of over 56,000.

Wahpeton School District operates five elementary schools, one junior high and one senior high school. In addition there are 2 parochial schools. The chief institution of higher learning is the North Dakota State School of Science. This two year college has grown from one building to a campus of 125 acres and $12\frac{1}{2}$ million dollars investment in buildings with another $3\frac{1}{2}$ million dollars in equipment. The present enrollment is nearly 3,000. Also located in Wahpeton is one of the largest United States Indian Schools in the northwest. It provides an educational program and boarding facilities for approximately 400 students from several states in the area.

Care of the elderly is provided by the Wahpeton Rehabilitation Center which has beds for people who may need extensive care. The Leach Home offers care for ambulatory people, and the City also has a community center for the elderly.

Wahpeton is noted for its recreation. Hunting and fishing are two of the most popular sports in the area. The City has the finest park in the northwest. Complete in every respect, Chahinkapa Park has many acres of woodland with lagoons, lily ponds, flower gardens, a zoo, and picnic grounds. A lighted football field, twelve softball fields, tennis courts, a baseball park, horseshoe courts, an excellent swimming pool and an ice skating rink offer ample outdoor recreation. Adjoining the park is the beautiful Bois de Sioux Golf Club with a \$125,000 club house. Unique in that the course lies in two states, it contains 18 grass greens for golfers in Wahpeton and its twin city - Breckenridge, Minnesota. One indoor theatre, one drive-in theatre and a new 12 lane bowling center are additional recreational facilities. Wahpeton takes pride in the fact that its people cooperate to provide recreation for its citizenry of all ages.

The Community Development Corporation of Wahpeton promotes, aids, develops, and advances the industrial and business prosperity and welfare of Wahpeton and surrounding territory. It assists in securing loans and in leasing and purchasing. In addition it owns and manages lands and buildings and other properties. The Community Development Corporation also promotes the development of industries, commercial and other types of business in Wahpeton so as to create additional employment and stablize the economy of the territory.

The Wahpeton Chamber of Commerce is the official organization of the business and professional people of the City. The organization handles

such matters as information, agricultural programs, conventions, community public relations, and education civic affairs. The Chamber promotes many other activities concerned with the growth and welfare of Wahpeton and its trade area.

Governed by a Mayor-Council form of government, Wahpeton has the enviable reputation of having the lowest bonded indebtedness and the lowest total mill rate of towns of comparable size in the state. Wahpeton is one of the five fastest growing cities in North Dakota. The people of Wahpeton continually strive to improve the welfare of all its people, especially the young.

While the citizens of Wahpeton are proud of the recreational activities they have provided for their citizens, they are ever alert to the immediate and future recreational needs of their people.

Therefore, in 1965 the Wahpeton Rotary Club along with the Jaycees, Kiwanis, City Council, Park Board and Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the public school carried out a survey involving 500 young people in grades 9-12 and 400 parents. The purpose was to determine the attitudes and needs of youth.

The survey revealed several interesting facts. One-third of all students did not participate in any community or non-school associated activities. Of the teenagers sampled 58% felt there were not enough youth organizations within the community separate from the school. It showed that the

ninth grade students were the most active participants in non-school activities. Of all high school students surveyed 85% felt there was a lack of community youth organizations.

While about one—third of the students spent no time at all in school or community organizations, only 5% were not involved in some type of church related activities. Fifty seven per—cent spent between two and three hours per—week in church activities.

Of all students sampled, 65% felt there was a sufficient number of school affiliated organizations. More than 50% of the ninth graders, juniors, and seniors indicated that the school provided adequate activities, whereas 86% of the sophomores indicated there were insufficient activities or organizations to meet their needs.

The survey seemed to indicate that about a third of the students did not participate in school or community organizations, but nearly all (95%) spent some time each week in church related activities. There seemed to be a tendency for students to participate less in community organizations and more in school organizations as they progressed from minth grade to the senior year. Ninth graders particularly felt there were not enough community clubs and tenth-graders feel strongly that there are not enough school organizations. The majority of students in this survey indicated that more community organizations were needed. Part of this evaluation will try to find out if the Wahpeton Police Youth Program has helped solve some of these problems for ninth and tenth-graders.

It will also try to determine if any improvement of youth recreational needs for junior and seniors have taken place.

II. PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAM

For some time the Wahpeton City Park Board has had a summer activity program. This program includes a swimming team, regular swimming pool hours for all Wahpeton Youth, a Junior Legion Baseball Team, plus a regular baseball league for all young people of Wahpeton. It also includes a girls softball league, as well as slow-pitch leagues for men and women of all ages.

In 1964 and 1965 Wahpeton began to have problems with some of the ninth grade students. The most serious was the increase in car thefts by the younger teenage boys.

It. Joe Dietchman, a regular member of the Wahpeton Police Department, took a special interest in these young fellows. Working with the juve-nile authorities of Wahpeton, Mr. Dietchman began getting these people involved in activities at the Armory, first by playing basketball with them. It was these young people who enticed Dietchman to conduct a program on a regular basis and to involve all the young people of Wahpeton.

Early in 1969 Mr. James R. Eissinger from the North Dakota Combined Law Enforcement Council met with people from Wahpeton who were interested in doing more for the youth of the community. Mr. Eissinger informed the group that federal funds were available for crime prevention under Public Law 930 of the Safe Streets Act. Under this act funds were

available to assist cities in keeping young people off the streets and involved in wholesome activities. Mr. Robert L. Eckert, Wahpeton city attorney, wrote the proposal which was approved by the city council. In 1969, Wahpeton received funds for this program administered by the City Police Department under the supervision of Lt. Dietchman.

The purpose of the Police Youth Program is to aid in effective law enforcement and to implement and enact programs dealing with young people. The officer in charge has two main duties: (1) to organize and supervise youth activities in the City of Wahpeton and (2) to work with juvenile delinquents and investigate criminal activities of young people in Wahpeton. The officer also acts as coordinator between city, county and state law agencies.

The overall objectives of the program are twofold: one, to provide wholesome activities for all young people of Wahpeton thereby preventing young people from getting into trouble. By providing worthwhile activities, properly supervised these youth will develop better attitudes toward authorities and society in general. The second objective is to help a youngster who may have gotten into trouble. Briefly stated, the objectives are preventative and rehabilitative.

By having this program under the supervision of the Police Department, young people will see the policeman as a "person" in our society rather then an enforcement officer. When young people have worked and played under the supervision of a policeman, they may develop a better

attitude toward this individual and toward the police.

Another phase of this program is the Police Cadet Program. The objective of this phase is to have youth of the community work directly with police officers, allowing these cadets to see how law enforcement agencies work. By having them work with an officer, these young people will better understand the penal and correctional institutions in our society. The second objective of this program is to encourage these young people to become policemen.

A-B. At present the activities at the Armory are mainly recreational.

Some are: basketball, wrestling, volleyball, gymnastics, ping pong, table games, football, soccer, trampoline, roller skating, weight lifting and archery. There is a high school basketball league and a wrestling league for fourth, fifth and sixth graders. There is an adult volleyball league. Last year there was a very active women's physical fitness program. The Jaycees are working with a youth rifle club, instructing youngsters in the proper use of rifles. During the summer competitive softball leagues will be established.

Another aspect of this program, put into effect in January of 1971, is the teen club above the City Hall. This is primarily for the high school students of Wahpeton. The rooms provide for pool and card playing or just relaxing. One room includes a record player for dancing. There is also a TV room.

- The sanitory conditions in the Armory may not be up to the standards of the young people are used to having in their homes. However, taking into consideration public rest rooms in general the facilities available at the Armory would meet average standards.
- Do At present, It. Dietchman's main objective in working with problem youngsters is to get them involved with other young people of Wahpeton. He realizes that in some cases there should be much closer guidance and supervision of these people, but at present, time does not permit it. As this program develops he would like to work more with these people in small groups and give them the proper guidance.
- E. The educational activities concerning driving, drinking, and drugs are very limited at this time. Although the police department cooperates with the local schools in presenting programs on these subjects there is no special program at the Armory to develop and improve attitudes in these areas.

III. JUVENILE DELINQUENCY PRIOR TO ESTABLISHING THIS PROGRAM

The general objective of this program are to have Wahpeton young people work directly with city policemen. To help them understand the work of law enforcement agencies and to interest youth in law enforcement work.

The Police Cadet Program has been in effect for one year having started with five boys, three of whom are still with the organization. At present there are nine active members. Some of these cadets are youth who have had a run—in with the law in some way or another. The boys have regular police uniforms, the only difference being an arm patch identifying them as cadets. There is no membership limit in this organization. To belong to the program a boy must be in high school and maintain a "C" average. He must submit in a written report on his ideas and opinions regarding the law enforcement officer's work. After one year of work with police officers, a cadet is required to turn in additional such reports. Cadets must also attend the regular weekly meetings. Should an individual miss three meetings or more, the other members may request the individual to turn in his uniform. The boys try to discipline their own members.

The cadet activities have included helping officers supervise parades, license bicycles, and patrol streets when requested by the cadet supervisor. Last year on Halloween, three boys used their own cars to patrol the streets. In fact, they were the only officers that caught any young people soaping windows. They asked these young people to clean these windows and refrain from doirg anymore soaping. The boys have also given talks before Cub Scout groups.

The cadets have also toured the State School at Grafton. This resulted in a clothing and toy drive by the boys for this school.

Movies have been shown to the cadets regarding police work, public relations work, car accidents, and procedures for investigating accidents.

There have also been films on drinking and driving.

The boys have not been riding with officers in the squad car. The reasons for this are the liability factor and the fact that the boys would not be covered by the City's insurance policies. Another reason is that if an officer had to give chase, the cadets could sustain injuries. The idea is to introduce the cadets to police work in situations with little or no risk to their physical safety. The boys have assisted in solving a burglary and have given information which assisted officers in preventing some youth from getting into serious trouble.

The boys learn early that an officer's work isn't always pleasant,

Future plans by the supervisor include having the County Judge and the Juvenile Commissioner explain the state and federal court systems. A trip is also planned to the state capitol, the state industrial school, and the drug and alcoholic wards at Jamestown.

Some of the improvements the supervising officer would like to see are:

(1) a better attitude of the general public toward these young fellows
when they are on duty. (2) more interest in program by fellow officers.

(3) finding activities to keep an active interest in police work. The

attrition rate has been about 1 in 5. The supervising office also feels much credit must be given to these young fellows, since much abuse is given them by their peer group. This comes in such catch phrases as "you're a cop lover", "you're just informers for the cops".

The evaluator also had an opportunity to interview three of the cadets.

The boys are all active in school programs and some are working part—time.

Most of the boys were encouraged to join the cadet program by a friend. A

few just wanted to find out what it takes to get started in law enforcement work.

They stated that the biggest obstacles they as individuals had to overcome were insults from adults and their own peer group during the first few outings with regular police officers. However, they all felt this harassment has subsided since the early days of the Cadet Program. They feel that adults and some of their peers fail to see the reasoning for them being involved with the police and that many of the adults are ready to condemn the entire Cadet Program the minute one of them gets a little out of line. This has also subsided somewhat since the first few months of the program.

The boys feel the program has helped them in many ways, but two things stand out above the rest. They are: 1) they have learned much about the work of law enforcement officials, and 2) they feel most of the members have developed a better attitude towards law enforcement officials. In fact, a few of the cadets are very seriously considering law enforcement as their chosen career.

The statistics following this report, give numbers, but actually statistics are not ever a clear picture of any situation. The rise or fall in any specific heading can be due to a number of things, such as population fluctuation, change in the laws affecting juveniles, as well as, in this locality, school terms. The illegal possession picture, due to the change in law which went into effect July 1, 1970, shows a noticeable drop. This law states that all liquor with exception of a few violations, were put into either Police or County Court. This also applied to the traffic violations.

The ungovernable behavior or unruly behavior seemed to show an increase.

Likely this is a picture locally on a much smaller scale then the National one, and but one of children in rebellion against parental discipline.

Violation of Court Orders by these children in many cases led to commitments to the State Industrial School at Mandan, North Dakota, was also a strike—out at authority, whether at home or the Court.

Larceny (stealing of bicyles, etc.) appeared to be greater in the month of September. One must be aware of the fact that we have a large population of Indian children here at the Wahpeton Indian School. These children are returned here in September and the urge to run away is very strong. Maybe they don't run toward home, but they run! They sometimes steal, bikes and in some cases cars, and start out. They also make up the largest share of breaking and entering violations, for they run away, usually at night, get cold and hungry, and break into a vacant house, a country elevator or a

village store or bar. They steal potato chips, candy bars, pop or cookies. They may take some old coats, blankets or such if they find them, for it is cold sleeping out.

Each number represents someone's child who is trying to solve his own problem the way he sees it. It may be against authority, it may be illegal, but it is done. There are children who never seem to want to become involved in programs that could help them, they feel self-sufficient and do many things for acceptance by their peers. Surely they need help and someone who cares.

Most of the young people in Wahpeton are aware of the recreational facilities at the Armory and that activities are under the supervision of a police officer. A majority of the students at all grade levels indicated that police should be working with youth in recreational activities. In this survey adults and youth indicated that the police treat people fair in most cases.

Many parents with children in grades 4, 5, and 6 had visited the Armory but in each grade the percentage was less than half. The percentage of parents of upper grade students visiting the Armory seemed to decrease steadily. Very few parents had visited the Teen Center above the City Hall.

Almost all students at all grade levels indicated that their parents felt the Youth Program was a good thing. This correlated quite well with the parents' part of the survey.

Many of the students participated in a variety of activities and spent more than one nite a week there for recreational activities.

At no grade level did the students feel the Armory was just a hang out. It was interesting that a high percentage of students said the facilities at the Armory provide a place to go and relax.

Although the reply to the question dealing with proper supervision

was quite evenly divided by the students, it was one of the major concerns of parents. This was the major concern of people I had personally talked with about activities at the Armory. The second major concern was lack of organization. Too many young people are just running around. The students feel they need a place to go seven days a week even though they may not go everyday. Just knowing that there is a place to go is important to them.

Students felt that their parents didn't care if there were older students at the Armory as long as they were students from Wahpeton. Both students and parents felt that Science School Students should not be allowed in the Armory when younger people are using the facilities. However, this feeling seemed to decrease with the upper grade levels. In fact in grade 11, 52% of students indicated that Science School students should be allowed to participate in activities with them.

Although many of the students indicated that the rest rooms were in good condition, the majority felt there was room for improvement. The survey showed that many of the young people of Wahpeton use the facilities at the Armory, and for some it is their only means of recreation.

However, the time spent by students at the Armory decreases at the upper grade levels. Of course, the Teen Center could be a factor since more senior high students are going there for recreation.

However, it was surprising to note that the ninth grade had the highest number of students who said that none of their recreational time was taken up by activities at the Armory. This was also the only grade where the majority of students felt it wasn't a good idea to have police work with young people.

It might be well for the officer to take special note of this and in his future dealings with this age group try to correct any misunder—standings.

The activities at the Armory were never intended to take care of the total recreational needs of the young citizens of Wahpeton. The youth indicated this by the number of hours spent with such activities, hobbies, watching TV, reading, family activities or just spending time with a small group at someone's home.

vising activities while the upper grades were more opposed to parental supervision. The lower grades also give the police-student relationship a better rating. From junior high to grade 12 the police student relationship was generally rated from fair to good. Even so, they indicated that their parents attitude toward police was generally good. The students at most grade levels seemed to split fairly evenly on whether a policeman's conduct should be above reproach. This is almost the complete opposite of how their parents feel about this question. Seventy six percent of the parents indicated that a policeman's conduct should be above reproach.

Grades 4, 5, and 6 were not surveyed concerning the Police Cadet

Program. Here, as with the recreational program, most students and

parents surveyed were aware of the cadet program. The majority of

students and parents expressed approval of the program. Many students

including girls indicated a desire to become part of the cadet program.

The students from junior high and high school said that, even though

they are receiving information on driving, alcohol and drugs at both

school and the youth program, more information is needed.

At the upper grade levels more than 80% felt that the Teen Center above City Hall was a step in the right direction. The same percentage said that recreation activities help to keep teenagers off the streets and out of trouble.

Students surveyed were also given an opportunity to indicate the activities that should be added or eliminated. They were also allowed to express any opinions about the program and the police in general.

There wasn't too much disagreement regarding activities that should be eliminated, nor activities that should be added. However, there were many students at all levels, plus parents that are concerned with the organization and supervision of the activities. In most cases students had a positive attitude toward police and felt they were doing a good job. However, they would like to see policemen be strict, but fair. They would like to see a policeman with a

friendly personality that doesn't always look towards the negative side of things, a person that would consider both sides before making a decision. The students question the policeman's attitude. They seemed to indicate that some policeman act cool, as if to say, "I am the law; look out."

SUMMARY

The survey clearly indicated that both students and parents feel the youth program is a step in the right direction for the City of Wahpeton. Young people need a place to go to spend some of their free time, to be able to socialize with their peer group.

The majority of youth stated it made no difference to them that a policeman was supervising the program. In fact, most felt it was a good way to get to know the police. It was also pointed out to some extent that youth of today regard a policeman's life as an individual, that he need not be "pure and white" as if there were no skeleton in the closet. Parents, however, felt a policeman's conduct should be above reproach. I think most youth understand him as a human being doing a job, that he could falter. They want the police to know that the youth realize he is human. Should he try to portray any other image to them, he would look phony to the people he must work with in society.

The people I talked with about the program at the Armory were concerned with the supervision and organization. The survey certainly did verify this concern. Poor supervision was a greater concern of the parents who had youngsters going to the Armory, while the organization of activities was a major concern of both parents and young people. Most students felt that the grades should have separate nights, or a time when they had to leave the Armory. Even students in grades 4, 5, and 6 felt there should be a time just for them. There should be activities that would involve both boys and girls.

I am sure the people responsible for the existence of this program realize what a difficult job it is for one person to supervise and organize a program such as this with limited help. In conducting this survey, I must say no credit can be taken away from the supervision by Mr. Dietchman. He has tried to build a program for young people which certainly has gotten off to a fine start. The cadet program seems to be going well and all indications are that it also is having a positive effect on the young people in regard to police and their work. The city fathers responsible for seeing the need for this program must also receive their due credit, for without them there would be no program. Credit must also be given to the North Dakota Combined Law Enforcement Association for funding part of this program.

In visiting the Armory and Teen Center it was obvious that a good relationship with young people had been established by the police officer in charge of the recreation program. Young people at all levels seemed quite at ease in communicating with the supervision and spoke well of him. The other policemen on the force should also be assigned a certain number of hours per month either at the Armory or Teen Center.

The survey revealed that many young people of all ages and grade levels are spending some time at the Armory or the Teen Center. It was obvious in my visits to the Armory that many of our youth are making good use of the facilities there. The program is taking care of a need and that, regardless of what agency becomes responsible for

leisure time, this survey certainly revealed that some form of year round organized activity is needed.

Citizens of a community must realize the purpose and function of the police in our society. This certainly seems a good way to establish a means of communication between citizen and police. I definitely feel that the participation of the police with young people can only have a positive effect on an individual's attitude as one grows and matures. The one thing that comes up often even in the lower grades, but progressively more so in the upper grades is the policeman's attitude. The policeman's image as he sees himself, the image he portrays to the people he must protect seems to be so vitally important. I would encourage the North Dakota Combined Law Enforcement Association to make every effort to establish an educational program for policemen in every community in this state. An educational program dealing with self-image, human relations and dealing with the public is a vital part of a policeman's job. Besides this, a community must learn to know these people in activities other than confrontations with the law. What better way than working in recreational activities with people of all age levels in a community.

As one person conducting a survey of young people working with policemen, I must say, regardless of what city agency becomes responsible for the recreational needs, the police should very definitely continue to be a part of the program. VI. POSSIBLE METHODS OF FUNDING SHOULD FEDERAL FUNDS BE DISCONTINUED

In the future, definite steps should be taken to combine the recreational activities to function under one city agency. The police youth committee, the park board, and service clubs sponsoring recreational programs should get together and appoint one city agency to be responsible for the recreational needs of the entire community at all age levels.

The program could be funded by a mill levy to support part of the program.

A certain percentage of money from the Community Fund could be alotted for this program.

Season tickets to be a member of the Youth Club at a minimal cost to the student. Adults could also buy tickets - sort of like a YMCA - where there is adult membership.

Check for Federal Funds - Senator and Representative. It may be possible to obtain federal funds to construct or remodel a building that would meet the needs of the community if all activities were under the direction of one city agency.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Should the Police Youth Program continue to operate as is, the following recommendations should be considered.

- 1. An in-service training program on human relations should be conducted for all city police.
- 2. The director of the youth program should attempt to provide more information on driving, alcohol and drugs at the Armory and also at the schools.
- 3. The police should plan regular talk sessions with young people at the Armory and at the Teen Center. (This should involve all police)
- 4. The director should organize a volunteer group of adults to help with supervision.
- 5. Director should organize a group of young people at the Teen Center to help him organize and plan activities.
- 6. Delegate more responsibility of routine chores to young people.
- 7. Develop an attitude of individual responsibility at both the Teen Center and Armory.
- 8. The Director should attempt to work more in organizing activities.

 Delegate supervision to responsible volunteers.
- 9. Police should definitely be more concerned with the attitude they portray towards the public. An attempt should be made by police to improve understanding of youth at the upper grades. Special thought should be given to 9th graders.

- 10. Organize activities for grade levels example, for grades 1-6
 special time, activities, and maybe assistance in supervision
 from parents. Plan some events with parents and these youngsters.
 Consider the possibility of a parent-child committee for organization and supervision.
- Plan activities for and with grades 7-8-9. Consider the College
 Circle "K" Club to assist in supervision. They are always looking
 for activities. (Jaycee Club)
- 12. Some consideration should also be given to include Science School students. (For supervision or activities for them!)
- 13. Activities and events for all grade and adult levels should be listed in the newspaper. (Get the paper and radio station to cooperate on the matter)
- 14. It would be better to begin the organization of events at one grade level at a time and then move on to the next. (In other words, have the scheduled events and supervision going more smoothly before you begin with another level)
- 15. One of the big drawbacks of this program was the fact that it tried to do too much too soon for all.
- 16. Youth Committee members need to be more consistent in attending meetings. Non-voting members should be listed on basis of interest and willingness to attend meetings regularly. (In other words, not having one member come one week and other the next and so on)
- 17. The Youth Committee that is being planned should have direct lines of communication established with student governments at all grade levels.

- 18. All members of the police force should get involved in recreational activities.
- 19. Policemen need to let people in the community get to know them as individuals, not just the policemen you see once in a while.
- 20. An advisory committee made up of adults and young people. (For the total program this committee would be separate from the ones mentioned earlier for specific grade levels.)
- 21. Some organized activities for girls.
- 22. Crafts should be considered when new activities are added to the program.

Being a cadet has changed my opinion on a lot of things. About two or three years ago the last thing I ever thought of being was a cop. But that is about all I want to do now is be a cop. I didn't think that I could think as much of a cop as I do now. Maybe later on the cadet program will change the minds of lots of young people. But we have to have people like Joe and Dale to do it, and also the finances.
