



FOR CRIMINAL JUSTICE NEEDS IN

1975



FEDERAL FUNDS FOR THE NORTH DAKOTA CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

IN TITLE I OF THE OMNIBUS CRIME CONTROL AND SAFE STREETS ACT OF 1968, THE 90TH CONGRESS RECOGNIZED THAT, "CRIME IS ESSENTIALLY A LOCAL PROBLEM THAT MUST BE DEALT WITH BY STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS IF IT IS TO BE CONTROLLED EFFECTIVELY". THAT ACT, AS AMENDED IN 1970 AND THE CRIME CONTROL ACT OF 1973, PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE ADMINISTRATION AND FOR FEDERAL MATCHING FUNDS TO HELP STATES, COUNTIES, CITIES AND INDIAN TRIBES TO IMPROVE THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM AND PREVENT CRIME.

THE NORTH DAKOTA COMBINED LAW ENFORCEMENT COUNCIL IS THE AGENCY DESIGNATED BY THE GOVERNOR TO RECEIVE THE FEDERAL BLOCK GRANT FUNDS AND TO ADMINISTER, MONITOR, EVALUATE AND AWARD GRANTS TO STATE AGENCIES, COUNTIES, CITIES AND INDIAN TRIBES.

THE LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE ADMINISTRATION HAS ALLOCATED \$132,000 TO NORTH DAKOTA FOR REGIONAL PLANNING AND \$1,755,000 (Includes Part "E") FOR ACTION PROJECTS IN FISCAL YEAR 1975.

THE 1975 PLAN

The North Dakota Combined Law Enforcement Council serves as the state planning agency called for by the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Street Act of 1968, amended in 1970 and the Crime Control Act of 1973. The Council staff, working with the regional criminal justice planners, the committees of the Council and members of the criminal justice system throughout North Dakota develops the annual state plan for criminal justice and law enforcement. After approval by the Council the plan is submitted to the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration for their review to determine if it meets the Federal guidelines. The plan must show how the Federal funds allocated to North Dakota will be used to prevent and control crime and delinquency. The plan must be comprehensive and take into consideration the needs of the entire criminal justice system throughout the State -- Police, Courts, Corrections and Crime Prevention.

ACTION PROJECTS

NORTH DAKOTA'S 1975 CRIMINAL JUSTICE PLAN ANTICIPATES THE AWARDING OF A WIDE VARIETY OF ACTION GRANTS TO STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL UNITS; THOSE PROPOSED GRANTS AND THEIR OBJECTIVES ARE LISTED ON THE COLORED SHEETS; IN OTHER WORDS, FUNDS HAVE BEEN SET ASIDE FOR THESE TYPES OF PROJECTS IN THE AMOUNT INDICATED.

YOU MAY APPLY FOR THESE FUNDS BY USING THE LAW ENFORCEMENT COUNCIL APPLICATION FORM. Please request application forms from the Council offices by writing to the Law Enforcement Council, Box B, Bismarck, ND 58501 or stopping by the offices. The Law Enforcement Council offices are located on the State Penitentiary Grounds, east of Bismarck. If you need assistance write or call any member of the staff at 224–2594 or contact the regional planner in your region. A list of regional planners and their address and telephone number is listed in the planning section.

If a proposed project is not listed on the enclosed sheets it is extremely unlikely that the project will be approved and funded. However, if you have questions as to whether your project is included in the state plan, contact the staff of the Law Enforcement Council.

LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL UNITS WISHING TO CARRY OUT A PROJECT WHICH IS NOT PART OF THE 1975 STATE PLAN SHOULD CONTACT THE LAW ENFORCEMENT COUNCIL TO DETERMINE WHETHER THERE ARE ALTERNATIVE METHODS OF FUNDING THE PROJECT. It is very important that projects not included in the 1975 state plan but considered necessary by local governmental units be brought to the attention of the Law Enforcement Council so that these projects can be considered for inclusion in the 1976 state plan.

ELIGIBILITY FOR GRANTS

The recipient of a grant must be:

- 1. a state agency
- 2. a county
- 3. a city
- 4. an Indian tribe; or
- 5. a combination of any of the above

LOCAL SHARE OF PROJECT COST'S

The recipient of a grant must furnish the following proportion of the costs of the proposed project:

- 1. Planning Grants Available to Regions Only Match is waived
- 2. Equipment Only Grants twenty percent (20%)
- 3. All Other Action Grants five percent (5%)
- 4. Construction of Physical Facilities ten percent (10%) *

CONTINUATION FUNDING

The following Council policy will apply only to new projects funded after April 1, 1974. Generally, the Council will only provide funds for the initial year of funding for any given project. In the event that an applicant requests second, third or ensuing years' funding it will be considered a continuation application.

No application for funds will be approved unless it appears reasonably probable that, in the event the project is determined to be successful in preventing or reducing crime, Law Enforcement Council funds and resources will not be necessary to continue funding the program or project.

- No project will be funded for more than four years unless the Council designates the project as a Council project and agrees to fund the project indefinitely. These projects must be approved annually for continuation funding.
- To be eligible for continuation funding the applicant must assume a greater percentage of the total project costs in accordance with the following schedule:
 - a. For the first year of a project, the subgrantee will be required to contribute at least the statutory minimum based on total project cost. Local funding greater than the statutory minimum will be encouraged.
 - b. For the second year of a project, the subgrantee will be required to contribute at least 1/4 of the total cost of the project.

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- c. For the third year of a project, the subgrantee will be required to contribute at least 1/2 of the total cost of the project.
- d. For the fourth year of a project, the subgrantee will be required to contribute at least 3/4 of the total cost of the project.

*The LEC has adopted a policy that no construction funds will be awarded except Part E from 1975 funds.

INDIAN TRIBES

If the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration determines that an Indian tribe does not have sufficient funds available to meet the normal local share of a grant project, the federal share of the cost may be increased to the extent that LEAA determines to be necessary. This is determined by the tribe's submitting a detailed account of its income and resources.

All applications must be acted upon by the Council within 90 days of receipt in the Council office. It is important that all applications be submitted by or on the deadline date. Applications received after the deadline will not be acted upon until the next scheduled meeting as indicated in the above schedule. When the application is submitted, it must be signed by the appropriate official. Any application not signed or with an incorrect signature will be returned to the applicant.

Applications can be submitted prior to the deadline. If this is done, the LEC will have more time to work out any problems that may exist. The staff will be contacting applicants (in cases where corrections are essential or changes need to be made) from the deadline date until the application is submitted to the appropriate committee. Unless an application has been reviewed by the appropriate committee, the application will not be submitted to the LEC for action.

SUPPLANTING

Grants are designed to help state and local governmental units develop new and more effective ways to prevent and control crime and delinquency. Federal funds may not be used to take the place of local funds which are being spent on criminal justice. Applicants are expected to show that their local expenditures for law enforcement will continue to increase at a normal rate despite the approval of a federal grant. If local expenditures remain the same or are reduced during a year in which federal funds are received, recipients will have to show that the reduction or lack of increase would have occurred even if grant funds had not been made available.
