

Gentlemen:

The Attorney General's Annual Report of Criminal Statistics is herewith submitted in compliance with Louisiana Revised Statute 15.577 (12). The report, covering calender year 1974, is compiled from data furnished individually by the law enforcement agencies and district attorneys. With regard to the latter, reporting was initiated on a case by case basis, a radical departure from past years. In addition, for the first time in the state's history, data reporting on crime has been automated. A marked improvement in reporting, particularly in the law enforcement sector, has resulted with over ninety seven (97) percent of the population being represented. In addition, the automation factor has allowed quick and reliable data compilation and analysis; thus enabling prompt dissemination to all members of the criminal justice community.

This year's report provides a comprehensive reference section of crime statistics plus analysis of the major crimes and the overall state crime profile. In addition, a brief overview of the state's crime fighting resources and how they are used is furnished.

I am confident that this report will prove to be a valuable tool to the legislature, the criminal justice community and all interested persons for use in making more effective legislative, operational and managerial decisions in the area of crime reduction.

#### ABSTRAÇT

Society implies the existence of social rules. These rules are formulated from what is deemed as expected or normal behavior for that society. Sanctions or penalties are imposed upon a person(s) who breaches any of the rules. These penalties range from a mild disapproval to the severest punishment imposed by criminal law. A society defines the sanction for any violation of its rules. Emile Durkheim sums it up in the following:

"...an act is criminal when it offends strong and defined states of the collective conscience ...we must not say that an action shocks... because it is criminal but rather that it is criminal because it shocks...We do not reprove it because it is a crime, but it is a crime because we reprove it."1

Therefore, because criminal behavior is defined by every society, according to what it thinks is right or wrong, and because society will always draw this line between acceptable and unacceptable behavior, criminal behavior will always exist.

No one will deny that crime is a complex problem, presenting many diverse challenges to society. This tremendous complexity demands that the resources used to fight crime be used in the most efficient and effective manner possible. The prime ingredient for satisfying such a requirement is information, about the characteristics of crime, its predictive qualities, and its effects on society. Moreover, this data must be in such a form as to be useful to Louisiana's crime fighting forces. This is a tremendous task, even on a state level, and requires the understanding and patience of all Louisianians. The reason for this is that, before information can be obtained in a useful format two things must happen:

- 1. a comprehensive and valid statistical reporting system must be organized and functioning within the state's criminal justice community and,
- 2. a sufficient amount of quality data must be accumulated before valid inferences can be made about the crime problem we face in Louisiana.

Both of the above requirements obviously cannot be accomplished overnight. Several years of concerted effort by Law Enforcement, Judiciary, and Corrections agencies to gather this information will be needed. In 1974, a firm step was taken toward initiating this effort. Law Enforcement agencies began reporting directly, on a monthly basis, to the Louisiana Criminal Justice Information System (LCJIS), and each District Attorney initiated a case-by-case reporting program to LCJIS, outlining the sequential prosecutive and judicial events of each case. Both of these systems were new. In addition, data from these systems was automated, another first in the history of Louisiana criminal justice. As expected, with the simultaneous undertaking of these large programs, problems were encountered which prevented the attainment of a quality data base. This sacrifice in quality was deemed acceptable in order that a positive first step be taken to begin gathering valid crime data in Louisiana. This report is a product of the above effort. It presents, with the data from these two systems, a profile of crime in Louisiana in the year 1974. The bulk of this data is found in reference format in the Appendix. The initial segment of the report is devoted to a review of the data collection techniques used in the above systems plus a summary look at reporting with acknowledgements to all contributors. Next, statistical analysis of the data is presented, first on an individual crime level, including several crimes considered to be of a serious nature and thus worthy of close scrutiny, and secondly on an overall discipline level. This is followed by a look at the resources employed by the state to combat criminality, including an overview of LCJIS. The Appendix follows with a list of tables by parish and state totals intended for reference use and to support the preceding analysis presentations.

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#### Data Collection Techniques

Before any statistical analysis can be done, LCJIS must receive data from the agencies which comprise the criminal justice system.

DATA COLLECTION TECHNIQUES AND REPORTING SUMMARY

Presently data is being collected from the law enforcement agencies and district attorney offices in Louisiana on multi-part forms. The law enforcement agencies submit monthly summary report forms, while the district attorneys report on a case-by-case basis, using individual forms for each case. These report forms are completed and sent to the LCJIS Data Collection Center in Baton Rouge. Here the forms are examined for completeness and validity. If any questions arise on any of the forms, a representative of the Data Collection Center contacts the agency by phone and/or visit.

Upon completion of the examination and subsequent approval of the report forms, the forms are sent to the Office of Information Services for keypunching and verification. The keypunched cards containing the statistical data needed by the Statistical Analysis Center (SAC) from the criminal justice agencies are then read into a computer where the data is stored and available for access at any time. When needed, SAC retrieves the data from the computer at which time the data is broken down and analyzed. The results of these analyses are published in the form of reports, such as this one, or given to specific requesting agencies.

#### Reporting Summary

Law Enforcement - The year 1974, for Louisiana Criminal Justice Information System (LCJIS), marked the successful determination of the identity and number of Louisiana Law Enforcement agencies that are actually reporting crime data. In addition, the time period and the number of offenses and arrests reported within that time period by a given agency to LCJIS were also identified. Beginning January 1, 1974, each agency was required to send to the LCJIS Data Collection Center monthly reports of offenses reported and arrests for their agencies. Because this was the first year for this procedure, problems were expected to arise, the major problem being those agencies ordinarily working closely with the parish sheriff's office, depending on the sheriff's office to maintain all major paperwork, and who were now required to establish their own record procedures and report directly to the LCJIS.

To the credit of all Law Enforcement agencies within the state, this first year of reporting based on an agency by agency format was extremely successful. Agencies known to have reported during the course of the 1974 calendar year comprise 97.7 percent of the state population. It is the belief of the LCJIS staff that the year 1974 is a quality year for reporting.

Prosecution/Courts - Beginning January 1, 1974, LCJIS instituted a new method of district attorney reporting. Prior to that date the district attorneys reported their activity on a summary annual report. In 1974, all district attorneys were required to report to LCJIS on a case by case basis. The new system was implemented statewide simultaneously with very little lead time; i.e., without much of an opportunity on the part of the district attorneys to adjust to the increase in workload and to train personnel on the new forms and procedures. Besides the absence of time to prepare their staffs for the new system requirements, many office's record-keeping systems, though capable for immediate needs, were not sufficient to fulfill the requirements for a project of this magnitude.

Problems arise with the implementation of any new system, and with a system as large as the district attorney's reporting system the problems were magnified. However, through the conscientious effort of the district attorney offices to adjust to the new reporting procedures and the increased caseload on their personnel, response during this first year of reporting was very good.

Since many agencies had to reconstruct their record-keeping procedures to meet the requirements of the new system, the date of initial reporting varied from agency to agency. Also some of these agencies were not able to go back and pick up previous case actions.

Because of these problems, an estimated one-third of all cases billed in 1974 were reported to LCJIS, based on previous annual reports. Reporting for 1975 is expected to significantly improve, since the district attorney agencies have now adjusted to the system procedures and requirements.

The courts did not contribute data in 1974. A system for the courts is presently being designed and implementation is expected in the near future.

Corrections - Currently, the Department of Corrections has a correctional system (CAJUN) to collect pertinent data. Information from this system, though not received in 1974, is anticipated in 1975.

#### DEFINITION OF TERMS

The following definitions of terms are presented so that the reader may more fully understand the scope and content of this report:

- 1. Adjudicate: To settle in the exercise of judicial authority. To determine finally.
- 2. Arrests: The issuance of bookings, citations, notifications, or other summons charging one with a crime under the Louisiana Criminal Code (R.S. 1950, Title 14, Chapter 1 as amended) and Uniform Controlled Dangerous Substances Law (R.S. Title 40, Chapter 4, Part X).
- 3. <u>Corrections</u>: The State Department of Corrections is <u>comprised</u> of three adult institutions, thirteen probation and parole districts, four work release centers, five juvenile facilities, and the Baton Rouge Headquarters.
- 4. Crime Rate: The number of serious crimes committed per population unit (usually 100,000).
- 5. Crime Seriousness: A weighted crime measurement of serious crimes (See table D).
- 6. Index Crime (serious crime): Index crimes include the following crimes: Homicide, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault and Battery, Burglary and Theft.
- 7. <u>Judiciary</u>: The term "Judiciary", as used here, is defined as all district courts, supreme court, and district attorney offices. The district attorney offices are the source of court and prosecutorial data reported to LCJIS.
- 8. Law Enforcement: All parish sheriff offices, municipal police departments, marshals, state police, and the Enforcement Division of the Wildlife and Fisheries Commission are the reporting agencies which comprise the law enforcement section of the criminal justice system.
- 9. Offenses Reported: Incidents of crime that have been reported to a local or state law enforcement agency.

- 10. Planning Districts: Nine subdivisions of the state of Louisiana for the purpose of program evaluation, planning and funding of criminal justice agencies by the Louisiana Commission on Law Enforcement. Each district has a director and a council for evaluation and planning purpose within the district. The director and council submit a district plan each year to the Louisiana Commission on Law Enforcement for further study and future funding of programs.
- 11. Property Crimes: Property crimes include Burglary and Theft.
- 12. Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (SMSA):

"Comprised of a county or group of contiguous counties which contains at least one central city of 50,000 inhabitants or more or 'twin cities' with a combined population of at least 50,000. In addition to the county, parish or counties, containing such a city or cities, contiguous counties are included in an SMSA if, according to a certain criteria, they are essentially metropolitan in character and are socially and economically integrated with the central city."

#### CORRECTION PAGE

The incorporation of late incoming data into the report resulted in some minor errors being detected after all tabulations had been completed. #### CHAPTER I. STATISTICAL ANALYSIS

#### INTRODUCTION

This chapter presents an analysis of the raw data collected from the aforementioned law enforcement and district attorney reporting systems. Thus, what we have here in this chapter is no longer data, but information.

However, caution must be exercised by the reader. We have already stated that the 1974 data gathered from the law enforcement agencies indicate quality characteristics. But it represents only one year's crime activity, an inadequate number for sophisticated analysis, allowing instead only simple descriptive statistics for that particular year.

Our analysis, then was simple in nature, primarily directed toward describing the size and seriousness of criminal activity in Louisisana for 1974.

Comparisons were made with the previous year, 1973, but any differences attributable to an actual change in criminal activity cannot be accurately quantified. Such a measurement will be attainable when comparing 1974 to 1975 data, assuming that the reporting quality is sustained through 1975 as expected. In addition, as the data base grows in comprehensiveness and quality, through statistical techniques, certain inferences or conclusions can be made. For example, assuming an adequate data base is available, crime trends can be predicted with a high degree of confidence.

With regard to the analysis of the judiciary data, for reasons explained in the reporting summary on page ix, we do not have a comprehensive data base for 1974. Therefore, unlike the law enforcement data, our ability to gauge the scope of prosecutorial and judicial activity from an overall state viewpoint is severely restricted. However, a sufficient amount of data was collected to allow some information to be extracted on an individual crime basis. Since the type of data from this system is much more varied in content, interesting analysis on several crimes was possible.

The analysis of corrections data was drawn mainly from data provided by the Louisiana Department of Corrections (DOC). Since 1974 also saw automation of some DOC collection and reporting systems, the data became both comprehensive and verifiable, although not in the same format as in previous years. Thus, analysis here is limited to a statistical summary cf DOC with emphasis on descriptive statistics of the inmate population.


The first part of this chapter begins with a quick summary of state crime followed by analysis of several crimes considered serious by FBI standards. Two additional crimes (DWI and Drugs) deemed to be worthy of note are then examined. In addition, a look at all crimes not previously mentioned, summarily called "other crimes" is presented.


A discussion then follows on a new concept of analyzing crime data known as the Offender-Based Transaction Statistics (OBTS) System. Results from a sample study conducted on a local level are presented as a sample indicator of the valuable information that is possible from such a system.

The last section of the chapter is devoted to analysis presentations on a criminal justice discipline level, i.e. Law Enforcement, the Judiciary, and Corrections. In this respect, as mentioned previously, analysis of the Judiciary is severely limited.


SECTION A. STATE AND INDIVIDUAL CRIME PROFILES

### STATE TOTALS







ONE EVERY 54 SECONDS



One crime was reported in 1974 at least once in every minute. To put it differently, 586,077 crimes, 36.7 percent more than 1973, were reported. Improved reporting by law enforcement agencies contributed to this significant increase. Arrests numbered 217,842 which was a 22.5 percent increase over 1973. In both of the above categories, all serious crimes, based on the FBI Crime Index definitions, showed an increase with Theft occurring the most often.

### HOMICIDE





Homicide is the killing of a human being by the act, procurement, or blameworthy ommission of another. The classifications of Homicide are a) Murder and b) Manslaughter.

#### Homicide

Homicide is of course, the most serious of all crimes. Public awareness of homicides is often accentuated by extensive coverage in the newspapers and on television. The table below indicates that the Louisiana homicide crime rate compares unfavorably with the nation as well as other southern states. The rate for the


United States and the southern states is derived from 1973 Uniform Crime Reports, while the Louisiana rate is the 1974 rate. It should be noted that all crime statistics must be measured against the quality of reporting. Viewed in this manner, and since Louisiana crime reporting is considered to be superior to that of most other states, it is probably true that the crime rates for those other states are understated.


Within Louisiana, offenses reported for homicide increased 21 percent from 1973 to 1974, and arrests for homicide increased 25 percent during the same period. Again, much of this increase can be attributed to improved reporting.

Based on cases reported in 1974, the average sentence for all homicide was 23 1/2 years. For computation purposes, life sentences were equated to 99 years. Roughly two-thirds of all persons convicted of homicide were confined to the Louisiana State Prison.

Finally, even though homicide represents only one-tenth of l percent of all offenses reported, the nature of the crime begs complete analysis. As better data becomes available such analysis will be made.







Robbery is the theft of anything of value from the person of another or which is in the immediate control of another, by use of force or intimidation, while either armed or not armed with a dangerous weapon. The classifications of Robbery are a) Armed Robbery, b) Simple Robbery and c) Attempted Robbery.

#### Robbery

Robberies were reported in Louisiana in 1974 at the rate of one every 45 minutes. Although there was an increase of over 3000 robberies reported in 1974 compared to 1973, for both years robbery represented 2 percent of total offenses reported.


The 1974 arrest rate for robberies reported is 22 percent compared to 29 percent in 1973. It should be understood that one offender can, and frequently is, responsible for more than one robbery incident; hence a one to one relationship between robbery offenses and robbery arrests should not be expected. It is entirely possible that the 2,549 robbery arrests reported in 1974 could have accounted for sixty or seventy percent, or even more of all total robberies reported.


Statistics available on robbery offenses prosecuted to a conclusion in 1974 show that in 82 percent of the cases disposed of, the offender entered a guilty plea prior to trial, and 14 percent actually were formally tried. In 4 percent of the cases, charges were dismissed either before or during trial for various reasons.

A breakdown of robbery convictions in 1974 reveals that 88 percent received confinement, 9 percent received probation, and 3 percent received some combination of fine, confinement, and/or suspended sentence. The 88 percent confinement rate is the highest of the four index crimes considered "Violent Crimes" with homicide second at 84 percent, followed by rape, 73 percent, and aggravated assault and battery, 36 percent.

The average length of confinement for robbery in 1974 was 8 years, 11 months. Only two other crime categories, homicide (23 years, 7 months), and rape (10 years) received higher average confinement sentences.

RAPE





Rape is the act of sexual intercourse with a female person not the wife of, or judicially separated from bed and board from, the offender committed without her lawful consent. The classifications of Rape are: a) Aggravated Rape, b) Simple Rape and c) Attempted Rape.

Generally speaking, statistics on reported rapes can be misleading because of the large number of rapes that are never reported to the police. Due to the victim's embarrassment, fear of exposure, or unwillingness to testify in a public court as to the specific details of the incident, many simply choose not to report the incident. It is estimated by the FBI that two-thirds or more of all rapes are never reported. In Louisiana in 1973 and 1974 rape represented only two-tenths of l percent (.2 percent) of all reported offenses.

For rape incidents that are reported, the immediate problem is identifying, and then locating, the alleged offender. The problems for law enforcement agencies are readily apparent——in general, the victim is the only witness, and in view of the traumatic experience, often is not able to give an accurate description of the attacker, or make a positive identification of apprehended suspects. In spite of the difficulties facing the police in a reported rape case, Louisiana law enforcement agencies were to report a 56 percent arrest rate in 1974.


Also of interest is the fact that rapes were reported at the rate of one every six hours in 1974, compared to one every eight hours in 1973. While this could indicate an increase in the number of victims willing to report such incidents, it could also indicate an actual increase in the number of rapes committed.


Of all rapes actually reported as charged and prosecuted to a conclusion in 1974, 65 percent entered guilty pleas, and 30 percent were formally tried and a verdict received. The remaining 5 percent exited the system via dismissal of charges either prior to or during the trial for a variety of reasons, including new evidence, death of the defendant, etc..

In terms of the type and length of sentence received for the crime of rape in 1974, the following statistics are available. First, 73 percent of all offenders convicted of the crime of rape received prison terms, compared to 17 percent receiving probation. The remaining 10 percent received sentences other than pure confinement or probation, such as suspended or combination type sentences.

The average length of confinement received for rape offenses in 1974 was 10 years and 4 days, making rape the second highest penalized crime, with homicide, averaging 23 years and 7 months being the highest. The maximum confinement sentence received for rape in 1974 was 20 years, and the minimum, 6 months.

# AGGRAVATED ASSAULT BATTERY





Assault is an attempt to commit a battery (i.e., to intentionally use force or violence upon another or the intentional administration of a poison or other noxious liquid or substance to another). Additionally, the intentional placing of another in reasonable apprehension of receiving a battery is considered as an assault. b) Aggravated Assault and c) Attempted Murder.


#### Aggravated Assault and Battery


Of all of the violent crimes, aggravated assault and battery ranks second to robbery in rate of occurrence. Moreover, in Louisiana total offenses reported for aggravated assault and battery increased 26 percent from 1973 to 1974, while arrests increased 1.5 percent over the same period. As stated in the analysis of other major crimes, part of the seeming increase in occurrence can be attributed to improved reporting.

The total judicial dispositions reported for aggravated assault and battery indicate that 58 percent plead guilty as filed, with only 4 percent of the cases being disposed of by jury trial. Of the total convictions reported for aggravated assault and battery, 36 percent were confined to state or parish prisons. The average confinement sentence in 1974 was 2 years, 1 month, and 2 days.

The FBI reports in their annual report, Crime In The United States - 1973 that, "Most aggravated assaults occur within the family unit and among neighbors or acquaintances. Law enforcement agencies have difficulty in obtaining convictions based on the original charge in the aggravated assault category. The close family or other relationship which exists between victims and assailants accounts for the victims' frequent unwillingness to testify for the prosecution."

### BURGLARY





Burglary is the unauthorized entering of any dwelling, vehicle, watercraft, or other structure, movable or immovable, with the intent to commit a felony or any theft therein. The classifications of Burglary are a) Aggravated Burglary, b) Simple Burglary and c) Attempted Burglary.

#### Burglary<sup>3</sup>

The number of burglary offenses reported to law enforcement agencies increased from 51,785 in 1973 to 68,708 in 1974 or 32.7 percent. Of the 68,708 burglaries reported, approxmately 92 percent were simple burglaries. Four percent of burglary offenses reported were for aggravated burglary; burglary offenses reported were attempted burglaries while the remaining 4 percent were attempted burglaries (see Table 1 below).

As shown in the above table, there were 8,535 burglary arrests made in 1974. This represents an increase of 4.9 percent over the 8,136 arrests made in 1973. Simple burglary, as in the case of offenses reported, accounted for the majority of the arrests (85 percent); while aggravated battery arrests comprised 9.5 percent and attempted burglary 5.5 percent.

Eighty-Seven (87) percent of all burglary cases disposed of by the court in 1974 resulted in guilty pleas while 8 percent were tried before a jury or judge and the remaining 5 percent disposed of in some other manner (dismissed, nolle prossed, etc.) Of the cases resulting in guilty pleas, 90 percent were pleas to the original charge while the other 10 percent were guilty pleas to burglary in which burglary was a lesser offense to the original billed offense or the result of bond forfeitures.

In 1974, 58 percent of all burglary sentences resulted in confinements, 34 percent received probation sentences and the remaining 8 percent resulted in fines and other type the remaining 8 percent resulted confinement sentence was 2 to sentences. The most frequent confinement sentence was 2 to 5 years.

Burglary, one of six index crimes in Louisiana, is classified as a property crime. Although not a personal crime in the sense of personal injury or threat of injury, burglary still effects the individual. It effects people in the area of loss or destruction of property and other valuables. Burglaries accounted for 28.2 percent or 6,755,077 dollars of the total loss of property (23,987,129 dollars) in Louisiana in 1973. During the last five years, the value of property stolen has increased from 4,284,650 dollars in 1969 to 6,755,077 in 1973 or 57.7 percent (see Table 2 below).


As shown in the table above, the greatest amount of property stolen, due to burglary, was to places of residence. Over the five year span from 1969 through 1973, residences were the victims of burglaries 63.1 percent of the time; 1970 had the highest residents rate of 64.8 percent while 1969 had the lowest residents rate (59.4 percent).


Burglary of residences by day proves to be the most expensive type of burglary. For all five years, burglary by day resulted in the highest dollar total of property stolen. On the average, one-third or 33.8 percent of all property stolen in burglaries was stolen during day burglaries.

One final look at the table shows that after two years of decreasing stolen property value, 1973 shows a 20 percent increase in property value stolen.

### THEFT





Theft is the misappropriation or taking of anything of value which belongs to another, either without the consent of the other or by means of fraudulent conduct, practices, or representations.

#### Theft $^4$

The number of thefts reported to law enforcement agencies in Louisiana in 1974 increased 38.4 percent from 1973. There was 90,308 offenses reported in 1974 as compared to 65,235 in 1973. As can be seen from Table 3 below, 97 percent of all thefts were classified as Thefts while 3 percent were classified as Unauthorized Use of Moveables.

Arrests increased from 16,094 in 1973 to 20,867 in 1974 or 29.7 percent. Again the theft classification comprised the majority of the arrests (95 percent) while unauthorized use of moveables accounted for only 5 percent of the total theft arrests.

For all theft cases disposed of in court, 89 percent were the result of guilty pleas while 8 percent were tried by a judge or jury and 3 percent were disposed of in some other manner. Of the guilty pleas, 94 percent were to the formal charge billed (theft) and 5 percent were pleas for a lesser charge than billed. The remaining 1 percent were guilty as a result of bond forfeitures.

Analyzing the sentences imposed for those offenders convicted of a theft (either theft or unauthorized use of moveables), approximately 37 percent were sentenced to confinement, 29 percent to probation, 11 percent were fined, and 23 percent received some other type of sentence. The most frequent confinement sentence given was less than 6 months.

Theft, like burglary, is considered a property crime. Theft is also deemed to be a less serious crime than homicide, rape, and armed robbery. As the following statistics indicate however, its effect on the victim and society as a whole is rather severe. In Louisiana alone in 1973, almost twenty-four million dollars (23,987,129)<sup>4</sup> worth of property was stolen. Of this figure, 15,939,467 dollars or 66.5 percent was stolen through acts of Theft.

During the past five years the value of property stolen through theft in Louisiana has risen from 13,513,546 dollars in 1969 to the 1973 figure of 15,939,467 dollars or 18.0 percent (see Table 4).





As shown in the above table, stolen auto comprises the largest single category of property stolen in each of the five years. The percent of stolen autos to the total value of property stolen ranges from 68.6 percent in 1972 to 75.8 percent in 1969 or an average over the past five years of 72.3 percent.

Although the value of autos stolen comprises over 70 percent of all property value lost due to theft, it should be noted that over the five year period from 1969 through 1973, an average of 82.4 percent of the auto value, in dollars, is recovered in Louisiana as compared to a national average over the same five year period of approximately 75.4 percent. This figure should stand as a tribute to Louisiana's law enforcement community.

D.W.I.





Operating a vehicle while intoxicated is the operating of any motor vehicle, aircraft, vessel, or other means of conveyance while under the influence of alcoholic beverages, narcotic drugs, central nervous "ystem stimulants, hallucinogenic drugs or barbiturates.

#### Driving While Intoxicated (DWI)

Operating a vehicle while intoxicated (under the influence of alcoholic beverages or drugs) is generally not classified as a serious crime. Yet, in 1974 22,733 offenses of DWI were reported, 22 percent more than 1973. In addition, 23,265 arrests were made in 1974, 7 percent more than 1973. It is interesting to note that of all the crime reported in 1974, spanning more than 280 offense categories, DWI's represented 4 percent of the total, a large portion for just one type of offense.

Since not all drinking drivers stopped by the Louisiana law enforcement officers are found to be legally DWI, the question of just how dangerous is the "drinking driver" becomes of just how dangerous is the "drinking driver" becomes interesting. Table 5 below, compiled from Louisiana State Police statistical records, reveals that 2,848 fatal accidents were recorded from 1971 through 1973, resulting in 3,400 motor were recorded from 1971 through 1973, resulting in 3,400 motor vehicle traffic deaths. Of these fatal accidents over 25 percent or one-quarter involved a drinking driver. Admittedly not all or one-quarter involved a drinking driver. Admittedly reinforce were legally DWI. However, these statistics certainly reinforce the assumption that DWI is a serious crime and should be treated accordingly by the criminal justice community and society as a whole.

From the judicial point of view, how are DWI cases processed?

Based on reported data, of the DWI cases processed by the courts,

92.5 percent pled guilty. Of the cases brought to trial, 82.4

percent were found guilty. In summary, 97.5 percent of the total

DWI cases judicially processed resulted in a conviction.

In regards to sentences meted out for DWI conviction, refer to Table 6. Note that for Distribution I, 5 percent received strictly confinement sentences, 3 percent received probation sentences, 37 percent were fined and 55 percent received other type of sentences. Ninety-eight percent of the sentences in the "other" category concerned a confinement or fine alternative. The probable that the great majority of these sentences resulted in the defendant paying the fine and thus avoiding confinement.

Assuming this happened to half of these sentences, we obtain Distribution II which indicates that 64 percent of all DWI sentences resulted in a fine, while only 5 percent were confined, 3 percent were placed on probation and 28 percent received some other sentence. If we assume all of the "other" sentences were fines, then we have Distribution III where 90 percent of the sentences are fines.

Looking at sentence severity (See Table 7), we note that the average length of confinement is 4 months and 3 days with a low of 2 days and high of 15 years. Compared to the state average of 2 years 7 months and 20 days, the above average falls considerably below it. Of the nine crime categories subjected to our analysis in this report, DWI ranks last in regard to average confinement sentences.

The average length of a probation sentence is 9 months and 19 days with a low of 5 days and a high of 5 years. The state average probation sentence for all crimes is 1 year 5 months with a low of 2 days and a high of 18 years. Thus, the average probation term is less severe than for all crimes.

The average fine amount for DWI is 185 dollars with a low of 1 dollar and a high of 514 dollars. The state average fine for all crimes is 86 dollars with a high of 15,000 dollars and a low of 1 dollar. Thus, a fine for DWI is more severe on the average than for all crimes.





# DRUGS





Drugs are dangerous substances which possess the following characteristics; 1) possesses a potential for abuse, 2) may or may not have a currently accepted medical use in treatment in the United States and 3) abuse of the substances may lead to psychological or physical dependence.

The term "drugs" as used in this analysis refers to all dangerous substances as defined in Louisiana Revised Statute Title 40, Chapter 4, Part X. Because of the numerous types of drugs and drug groups (called schedules in the above law), our analysis will concentrate on a few drugs of public interest such as marijuana and heroin and regard the remainder as a single drug category.

In 1974, 9,983 reports of drug offenses were received by law enforcement agencies, a <u>71 percent increase</u> from 1973. In addition, 16,076 drug arrests were made in 1974, 30.5 percent more than 1973.

Overall, drug offenses reported and arrests form a small percentage of the state total in these categories, 2 percent for offenses reported and 4 percent for arrests.

Table 8 below indicates that the great majority of offense reports and arrests are made for possession of the drug rather than the manufacture and/or distribution; 70.4 percent vs. 29.6 percent for offenses reported and 62.6 percent vs. 37.4 percent for persons arrested. Also, marijuana violations are the crimes for which most offenses reported and arrests are made; 64.6 percent of all drug offenses reported and 47.2 percent of all drug arrests.

With regard to judicial dispositions of drug cases Table 9 below illustrates the distribution rates of the judicial dispositions of drug cases reported to LCJIS. Notice that in both marijuana and heroin cases as well as total cases, total drug crimes, 85.2 percent are guilty pleas, 8.5 percent dispositions. For involve non-jury trials, 1.8 percent are jury trials and other drug cases go to trial, only 10.7 percent. In reference to drug activity 81.5 percent of the judicial dispositions involve comprise most of the dispositions in both the activities of of the former and 69.1 percent of the latter. Marijuana comprises 87.9 percent of all dispositions.

Table 10 below deals with the types of sentences handed down for drug crimes and their distribution rates. We note that 83.7 percent of the sentences were for possession convictions. Of these possession convictions, the most frequent sentence was probation with 39.9 percent of the cases falling in this category. However, heroin convictions were highest in the manufacture and/or distribute category with 59.5 percent of the convictions being in this group. Also, note that for both types of convictions, the most frequent sentence for a heroin conviction was confinement. Most marijuana convictions resulted in probations (42.0 percent) and of these, "possession" was the more frequent conviction type (36.9 percent).

Tables 11 and 12 deal with sentence severity for drug crimes involving manufacture and/or distribution and possession activities respectively. Note that for each of the drug categories, the average sentence, except fines, for possession highest average sentence for both drug activities is the one for the manufacture and/or distribution. 



#### Other Crimes

The "Other Crimes" category relates to all those crimes not mentioned previously in our analysis. A wide variety of crimes come under the scope of this category, ranging from serious crimes such as kidnapping and arson, to minor crimes such as disturbing the peace.

In 1974, 369,092 such crimes were reported, 38 percent more than 1973. In 1974, 137,808 arrests were made compared to 108,461 in 1973, a 27 percent increase.

Based on reported data 85 percent of the cases disposed by the courts pleaded quilty, 10 percent went to trial, and 5 percent received some other disposition, Eighty-seven percent of all court dispositions resulted in a conviction.

In regard to sentence distribution and severity, 13 percent were confinements, 11 percent were placed on probation, 50 percent were fined and 26 percent received other sentences. Of the other sentences 82 percent involved a confinement or fine sentence. It is probable that most of these resulted in a fine being paid in order to avoid confinement. If we assume that this happened to all of these type sentences, then fines comprised 76 percent of all sentences. If we assume half of the confinement or fine type sentences resulted in a fine, then fines comprised 63 percent of all sentences. In any event, even disregarding the confinement or fine sentences, at least half of all sentences for "Other Crimes" were fines.

#### Section B. TOTAL CRIME ANALYSIS-BY AGENCY DISCIPLINE

#### Law Enforcement System

"The attitudes of the American people toward the police service are often inconsistent. The police are appreciated when they are needed but are often feared because they represent authority. They are ridiculed in the low humor of situation comedies, and idealized in police television drama. In some cases political ideology dictates attitudes of respect or hatred toward the police. Only rarely is the real nature of the police service broadcast; rarely is the man inside the uniform known, or his true role appraised. Yet, his role is critical. Every day of his professional life he is met with conflicts and situations that are too painful or too frightening for many Americans to confront.

"There is no confusion about one point. When faced with trouble, Americans expect quick police response; when victimized, they want--and expect--the services of a professional."6

How can law enforcement agencies best perform their duties? What specific aids do they require? Let's go back to the words used by the Wickersham Commission in 1932, "accurate data ... the beginning of wisdom." Without accurate data in reference to crimes committed, where, and by whom, law enforcement agencies are severely hampered. Moreover, without such data, crime patterns and criminal patterns cannot be established, and the apprehension of criminals as well as the deterent and prevention of crime is almost an impossibility.

The law enforcement agencies alone cannot cope with the crime picture. Community understanding and cooperation with its law enforcement agencies as well as an awareness of the status of crime within their community is a must.

Let's look now at the crime picture of Louisiana. State crime totals and index crimes will be discussed in this section. More detailed data can be found in Appendix Tables A-D.

Louisiana reported 586,077 offenses in 1974 compared to 428,787 offenses reported in 1973; an increase of 36.7 percent. Let's look at these same figures considering another variable, population. The estimated population for Louisiana in 1973 and 1974 is approximately 3,764,000 with a percent change less than 1 percent over the two years. Compared to the offenses reported percentage increase, one can see that the total number

of offenses reported to law enforcement officials has increased faster than the state's population growth. These figures are significant because of the fact that population and population density is considered a factor of crime. With crime increasing at a faster rate than the population, the chances of all citizens becoming victims of crime are also increasing.

For many years index crimes have been used to measure crime. Index crimes are used because they represent crimes which are a serious threat to society. In Louisiana, index crimes are composed of homicide, rape, aggravated assault and battery, robbery, burglary, and theft.

In 1974 there were 184,269 index crime offenses reported to Louisiana law enforcement agencies as compared to 136,329 Louisiana law enforcement agencies as compared to 136,329 offenses reported in 1973. This represents an increase of crimes (36.7 percent) one can see that index crimes are increasing at a slightly lesser rate than total crime. It is creasing at a slightly lesser rate than total crime. It is interesting, if not alarming however, to recognize that index interesting, if not alarming however, to recognize that index crimes (serious crimes) are increasing at approximately the same rate as the less serious crimes.

Let's look at index crimes in respect to population or crime rate per 100,000 population (see definitions of terms). In 1974 the state crime rate was 4,896 index crime offenses reported per 100,000 population. Compared to 1973's crime rate ported per 100,000 population. 3,622 an increase of 35.2 percent is shown.

The pattern of the percent changes is the same for both total offenses reported and index crimes reported, although slightly lower for crime rates than for total index crimes. The important inference is that crime is increasing at a much faster rate than the state's population. Because of this, the people of the state are more likely to become victims of a serious (index) the state are more likely to rate increases.

Another way to look at index crimes is by looking at crime seriousness. Crime seriousness is a weighted measurement of crime. The six Louisiana index crimes are weighted in regard to their seriousness to society with the most serious index crime (homicide) having the heaviest weight (26). The other index crimes and their weights are rape (11), robbery (5), and theft (2). aggravated assault and battery (4), burglary (3), and theft (2).

In 1973 and 1974, Louisiana had a crime seriousness level of 2.9 percent. This shows that although the crime rate shows 4,896 index crimes per 100,000 people, the vast majority of index crimes are composed of burglaries and thefts.

These high percentage increases are due to two major reasons. One reason is that the actual number of offenses reported to the police increased significantly. The other reason is the quality of reporting. LCJIS believes more of the Louisiana population was covered in actual, not estimated, crime data (97.7 percent of state population in 1974 for example), than ever before.

Other factors also played an important role in the sharp rise in the number of offenses reported. Two of these factors are: (1) the present economic conditions especially beginning the last couple of years; (2) the population trend in Louisiana toward urban areas.

When offenses are reported and people become victims of crime they expect, and rightfully so, the law enforcement agency in their community to do everything possible to apprehend the offenders. The apprehension of criminals is shown statistically as arrests. Though arrests do not mean that the offense has been solved or that the arrestee is guilty. This has to be decided in a court of law. It does mean that the arresting agency has performed their duty of apprehending the individual or individuals they feel committed the crime or crimes in question, based upon the evidence they have received.

During 1974, 217,842 arrests were reported. This figure does not necessarily mean 217,842 people were arrested, as a single individual may be arrested more than once during the course of a year and for more than one offense. Also, remember that more than one individual may be arrested for committing a single offense. This figure simply shows the number of arrests made during the reporting period.

The 217,842 arrests shown for 1974 represents an increase of 22.5 percent over 1973 arrests (177,760). However, over the past five years the average rate of increase in arrests is 32.7 percent. Thus, the increase between 1973 and 1974 is less than the average arrest increase during the last five years. (See Table 13 below).

Even though the rate of increase is less in 1974 than the previous two years, the rate of increase corresponds to the rate of increase for total offenses reported when offenses reported peaked in Louisiana in 1973.

Index crime arrests in 1974 totaled 40,693 in 1974 compared to 35,181 in 1973 or an increase of 15.7 percent. Over the past five years, however, arrests in Louisiana have increased an average of 19.4 percent (see Table 14 below).

#### The Judiciary

The term "Judiciary" in this section encompasses both prosecutive and court elements. Historically, data on the activities of the court system have been submitted to the Attorney General by the district attorneys in the form of an annual summary report. Statistics were then manually tabulated from these reports and used in writing the Attorney General's Annual Crime Paport to the Governor and Members of the Legislature. Beginning in 1974, however, a new reporting system was devised to capture more information in a more efficient manner, the goal being the production of more useful information. The reporting agencies remained the district attorneys but the method was different. Instead of a summary-type annual report, reporting began on a case-by-case basis. Also, additional data elements were required to be reported. Finally, data from each report form have been automated by LCJIS.

As mentioned earlier, due to the problems generated by the implementation of the new reporting system, the data collected for 1,974 is presently incomplete and not representative of the total activity of the Louisiana Court System. These initial problems were anticipated, particularly when implementing a reporting system on such a large scale, and have been remedied. Also, statistical tables have been provided in the Appendix which reflect, on a parish and state basis, the prosecutorial and judicial actions reported to LCJIS during 1974. In addition, several tables show an analysis of judicial dispositions, distribution of sentences (by type), and sentence severity of confinement, probation, fines and other-type sentences. It was felt that such tables would have more reference than analysis use; therefore, they were incorporated in the Appendix rather than this section. It is anticipated that 1975 data from this system will be sufficiently comprehensive to present a representative profile of the Louisiana Court System.

#### Corrections

For purposes of this analysis, the term "corrections" means the Louisiana Department of Corrections (DOC), specifically excluding all other correctional agencies and systems, such as parish prisons, local jails, offender rehabilitation centers, etc. The principal reason for this restructured treatment of the broad category of corrections is the necessity of obtaining valid and comprehensive data upon which to base an analysis. DOC, as pointed out below, represents the only entity within Louisiana's corrections network that can currently provide such data. All data presented in this analysis, and much more, is available in reference table form in the Department of Corrections Annual Statistical Report for Fiscal year 1973-74.

Another term frequently used in this analysis is "admissions", which refers to offenders admitted to DOC institutions within a stated time period. Offenders receiving probation sentences are not included when referring to "admissions".

In all of the tables presented in this analysis, the data is grouped by type of institution. All adult male admissions are initially processed through Louisiana State Prison at Angola (LSP), and thus are included in the category "LSP". Female adult admissions are sent to the Louisiana Correctional Institute for Women at St. Gabriel (LCIW), and are designated "LCIW" in the tables. Juvenile admissions are initially processed through the Juvenile Reception and Diagnostic Center in Baton Rouge (JRDC), and are identified in the tables as "JRDC". Due to differences between the type and extent of data collected on adults and juveniles by DOC in fiscal year 1974, juvenile data is only presented in the first two tables in this analysis.

During Fiscal year 1974, the Louisiana Department of Corrections (DOC), began to automate many of its data collection and reporting systems, so that for the first time, data being collected became both comprehensive and verifiable. This fact, plus the fact that data from previous years were not collected and/or reported in the same format as is now possible, precludes any type of valid, longitudinal data analysis for the years preceeding fixcal year 1974. With this in mind, the following analysis will disregard data prior to 1974, and will concentrate on providing a statistical summary of the Louisiana Department of Corrections as it stands today.

The first area of DOC to be presented for analysis will be state-operated penal institutions. A breakdown of 1974 admissions to DOC institutions by race and sex is presented in Table 15 below.

Table 16 illustrates fiscal year 1973-74 admissions by number of previous commitments. The male adult intake facility at Angola (LSP) shows almost a 50-50 split between new and repeat commitments. The picture at the female adult institution (LCIW) and in the juvenile institutions (JRDC) is not so bleak, but even they report over one-fourth of their current admissions as repeat commitments.

Another method of describing penal institution admissions is to distinguish between those individuals coming in as parole violators, and those who are considered "regular" admissions (i.e. those not on parole status at the time of their crime). In Table 17, which presents data from the adult male and adult female intake centers, it can be seen that there was a relatively low proportion of parole violators to regular admissions during the current period (12 percent for males, 5 percent for females). However, an interesting fact surfaces when looking at the male parole violators—namely, that only one—third of adult males sent to prison for parole violations actually committed new felonies. The other two—thirds were incarcerated solely for violation of parole rules and regulations, i.e. "technical" violations.

In terms of type of crime committed by 1974 adult admissions, some interesting facts quickly become apparent. As shown in Table 18 below, comparisons of male (LSP) and female (LCIW) inmates reveals that the proportion of females convicted of murder is almost 3 times higher than that of males (22.1 percent versus 8.6 percent). This trend continues for assault and battery convictions, where the proportion of females to males is about two to one. Still speaking in terms of proportions, males outnumbered females four to one in burglary convictions and three to one in robbery convictions, while females held the edge in the categories of theft (less than two to one) and forgery/fraud (three to one), and drugs (almost two to one). Interestingly, no females were convicted of sex crimes, whereas almost 5 percent of the males were in this category.

Table 19 contains a detailed breakdown of length of sentence by type of crime for 1974 adult male and female inmates. It a three to one proportion ratio for female vs male homicide convictions, the actual penalties, in terms of sentence length, sentence length for males. For instance the modal, or most frequent, 5-10 years. On a percentage basis, almost one-third of all to only 7 percent of females. Over two-thirds of all males life), whereas almost two-thirds of females convicted of homicide received life sentences, compared receive at least 10 year sentences (including those receiving murder receive less than 10 years.

This trend toward lighter sentences for women is consistent across all categories. Disregarding the homicide category, in which a total of 10 (8.1 percent) females received sentences of over 10 years, only two other females received sentences all females received sentences of the sentences of over 10 years, compared to over 21 percent of males.

In Table 20, 1974 DOC admissions to each institution are broken out by parish of commitment. With a large proportion of the state's population, the Parish of Orleans, as expected, provided the lion's share (one-third) of all current adult admissions. Other high population density areas such as Jefferson, Caddo, Other high population density areas such as Jefferson, Caddo, and East Baton Rouge Parishes averaged around six to seven percent and East Baton Rouge Parishes averaged around six to seven percent of total admissions. All other parishes contributed less than of total admissions. All other parishes contributed less than 5 percent of the total 1974 adult commitments to DOC. Although

not presented in Table 20, juvenile admissions were more equally distributed by parish, with 18.3 percent coming from Caddo, 11.3 percent from Orleans, and all other parishes contributing less than 7 percent.

Table 21 illustrates the distribution of male and female inmates by occupational category. Inmates not included in this table are those classified as "students" (2.8 percent of males and 0.9 percent of females) and those classified as "not in labor force" (5.6 percent of males and 36.4 percent of females). Members of these categories were excluded from the table in order to present a true occupational breakdown of only those inmates actually in the labor force at the time of admission.

The proportion of adult inmates who are married is about the same for males and females (25 percent), although males classified as single (as opposed to common-law, divorced, widowed, etc.) represent 50 percent of the LSP population compared to 31 percent for single females at LCIW. Proportionally speaking, females outrank males 2 to 1 in portionally speaking, females outrank males 2 to 1 in being divorced and 3 to 1 in being either widowed or separated. (See Table 22.)

In the area of drug abuse, there is a noticeable lack of detailed information on the inmate population of DOC. Although a portion of DOC intake procedures involves questioning the offender about his drug usage history, the information obtained is neither extensive nor verifiable, and consists strictly of the offender's statement as to his degree of usage, if any, of certain specific drugs. The results of this completely subjective data gathering process are summarized in Tables 23 and 24 for adult male and female 1974 admissions. The figures presented in these tables do not reflect a count of persons, but a count of the occurrence of drug usage, hence a single person may be counted in any number of categories. Percentages shown reflect the distribution of non-addiction versus addiction occurrences for each drug type. The only specific drug type having over a 15 percent addiction rate for either sex was heroin, in which 72 percent of males and 52 percent of females reporting usage claimed to be addicts. The only female reporting amphetamine usage admitted to addiction, causing an inflated 100 percent addiction rate that should not be considered as statistically valid.

#### Section C. OFFENDER-BASED TRANSACTION STATISTICS - A SAMPLE STUDY

The concept emerging today as the tool for measuring crime and criminal justice activities is the Offender-Based Transaction Statistics (OBTS) System. It is the goal of OBTS to provide for the collection of significant data by law enforcement, court and correctional agencies about every person arrested on a serious charge (index crimes and other crimes as specified) from arrest to final disposition. An additional goal is to utilize this data to provide an accurate and current statistical profile of the state's criminal justice-system, and rapid, reliable and secure exchange of information on positively identified individuals convicted of a serious crime. The intent of this section is to reveal the type of information possible through the use of OBTS. The application of OBTS is dynamic, with the actual utilization of the system dependent upon the user agency.

The following data and analysis is the result of an OBTS study performed by the Statistical Analysis Center of the Louisiana Criminal Justice Information System in East Baton Rouge Parish. One hundred armed robbery cases were tracked from the time of arrest by the Baton Rouge City Police to the District Attorney's office, 19th Judicial Court, and the correctional segment (parish prisons and the State Department of Corrections). A more complete analysis, including a time analysis from one action point to another within the criminal justice system (e.g., arrest date to billing date), and a sentence analysis will be available in the summer of 1975.

#### Law Enforcement Segment

As stated previously, the study was conducted on 100 armed robbery cases, selected at random, from the Baton Rouge City Police Department. These cases were taken from 1971, 1972 and 1973 arrests. As can be seen from Table 25, three-fourths of the arrests consisted of black males while one-fourth consisted of white males. Notice that three-fourths of the arrests consisted of individuals 24 years of age or less.

Also, notice that no females were found in this sample. This does not rule out the possibility, even though small, that females committed armed robberies during this period in this jurisdiction.

Another interesting trend of the above table is that the older the offender, the higher probability of the offender being a white male. Remember, however, that this is only a trend of the sample for armed robberies, and only further OBTS studies can tell us if in fact an age/race correlation for armed robberies exists.

Of the 100 cases randomly selected, 19 were classified as juvenile cases and sent to family court. Since OBTS tracks only adult offenders, these 19 cases exited the system at this point.

#### Prosecution Segment

Of the remaining 81 cases sent to the district attorney's office, 60 of the cases had bills filed. Of the 60 bills filed 42 or two-thirds were filed on the original charge (Armed Robbery) while eighteen (18) or approximately one-third were billed on a lesser charge. The following table lists the reduced formal billings and their frequency of occurrence.

As can be seen from Table 26, the most frequently used reduced formal charge is simple robbery, which occurs in approximately two-thirds of the cases billed for a lesser charge.

At the time of data collection of the prosecution segment (December 1974), one-eighth of the cases (10) were still awaiting prosecutor action. Also, ten (10) cases had been nolle prossed with six (6) of the nolle prosses coming before billing while four (4) cases were nolle prossed after billing. Fifteen (15) of the 81 cases reaching the prosecution stage exited the system with ten (10) of the cases never having been formally billed.

#### Court Segment

Of the fifty-five (55) cases billed and continued to the court segment, forty-two (42) cases have resulted in convictions. The table below shows the conviction breakdown by formal charge and by plea or jury trial.

Included in the formal charge billed section in Table 27 are those cases billed for an offense other than the arrested charge (Armed Robbery). This accounts for the higher ratio of convictions, especially pleas to the formal charge.

The following table shows the name and the frequency of the convicted charges which were less than the formal charge billed. Notice that simple robbery and attempted armed robbery were the more prevalent reduced conviction charge. Also, the vast majority of these cases were the result of pleas being entered by the offender on the lesser charge.

As previously stated, forty-two (42) of the fifty-five (55) cases billed and continued to the court segment resulted in convictions. However, eight (8) of these convictions were appealed with five (5) of the appeals being affirmed (upheld) by the supreme court, two (2) of the cases being returned, and one (1) case still pending as of March 1975. Also, ten

(10) cases exited the system during the court segment with five (5) resulting from not guilty dispositions and five (5) exiting because of dismissals, nolle prosses, etc., by the court or prosecutor during the course of the trial. Presently segment.

#### Corrections Segment

All forty-two (42) of the conviction cases entered into the correctional segment through either the parish prison or the State Department of Corrections. Thirty-two (32) of the offenders were placed in a confinement institution while ten (10) were placed on probation. The table below depicts the type of sentence for the forty-two (42) offenders.

As of March 1975, twelve (12) of the forty-two (42) offenders have exited the system with seven (7) exiting from parish prison and five (5) released from probation. No offenders have been released from the State Department of Corrections

As stated in the opening of this section, the use of OBTS is the latest and most potentially useful statistical tool available to criminal justice. If properly used, this system can prove immensely valuable to all users.

The use of OBTS is close to reality for Louisiana. System design and implementation documentation have been prepared and initial implementation of OBTS is scheduled to begin in the summer of 1975. It is planned to have OBTS reports, such cation as the data from participating agencies become available. is scheduled for late 1977.

#### CHAPTER II. THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM - AN OVERVIEW

#### INTRODUCTION

Criminality which we perceive daily must be controlled by a system which is yet only a diverse and loosely-knit series of agencies which include Law Enforcement, the Judiciary and Corrections. In an effort by the state to improve the Criminal Justice System, it is evident that the biggest obstacles have been the lack of information regarding its present operation. Specific information that is available often is neither timely nor in a form useful for decision making. All criminal justice agencies require substantial data to function properly as a part of the criminal justice system. The police need information to prepare themselves for citizen contact. For example, before pulling over a suspicious vehicle, an officer ought to be able to learn in a matter of seconds whether the vehicle is listed as stolen, who the registered owner is and whether the registered owner is otherwise wanted by the police. This type of information is vital to the officers safety and has a direct effect on the control and prevention of crime. A good example was an incident in New Orleans where an individual was booked on a minor charge and bonded out. A manual search of the criminal records (that became available a few days later) revealed that he was one of the FBI's ten most wanted persons. However, by the time this information was received by the police, the individual had completely vanished. Accurate and timely information is an absolute requirement to (1) the prevention of crime; (2) the investigation of crime and; (3) the apprehension of criminals.

In support of decision-making, prosecutors and judges require historical, environmental, and other descriptive data on the defendant and events proceeding the Judiciary's involvement. The more urgent, and more publicized courtroom need is for management information which will facilitate scheduling, allocate resources efficiently and minimize delays. Public awareness of jail congestion, particularly when half the inmates are awaiting the start or the completion of the court process, has spurred the adoption of advanced techniques in data gathering to promote better court management.

Corrections encompasses all programs involving the supervision of offenders, including pretrial detention, probation, parole, and institutional supervision. In order to support decision-making in the areas of management, research, offender accounting and rapid response to ad hoc questions, accurate and timely information must be available.

To prevent and/or reduce crime in this state and the nation, a system must be developed to insure the timely availability of information on crime and about criminals for the use of all criminal justice agencies.

The Comprehensive Data System Program described in this chapter will provide the missing ingredient that is absolutely necessary in our fight against crime - INFORMATION.

This chapter is devoted to the structure and functions of Louisiana's Criminal Justice System. The intent is to make the reader aware that this system is very large and has many diverse functions. Moreover, many effective decisions which can not be made without the types of information we have

#### Section A. LAW ENFORCEMENT

Louisiana has 439 law enforcement agencies which are comprised of 64 sheriffs, 15 state police troops (including Headquarters), 298 city police agencies and town marshals and 62 wildlife and fisheries agents.

Laws Prescribing Jurisdiction and Responsibilities for the Law Enforcement Agencies

The jurisdiction and the responsibilities for the four divisions in the law enforcement segment are prescribed in Louisiana statutes, the Louisiana Constitution, or unicipal Charters. In 1942 Legislative Act 310 designated the De rtment of State Police as the Division of State Police and placed the division under the Department of Public Safety. The following is the statute (Louisiana Revised Statute 40, Section 1379) covering their jurisdiction and responsibilities:

"The police employees of the division (state police) shall prevent and detect crime, apprehend criminals, sattlee criminal traffic laws of the state, and perform any other related duties imposed upon it by the legislature.

"Police emoloyees of the division are peace officers and have, in any part of the state, the same powers of the law relating thereto as sheriffs, constables, and police officers have in their respective jurisdictions. They have all the immunities and matters of defense now available or hereafter made available to sheriff's constables, and police officers in any suit brought against them in consequence of acts done in the course of their employment.

"Any warrant of arrest issued by any magistrate of the state may be executed by any police employee of the division in any part of the state according to the tenor thereof without endorsement."

Other paragraphs under this same statute prohibit state police from working in duly incorporated municipalities except:
(1) by order of the governor; or (2) upon request of the chief administrative officer of the political subdivision; or (3) when in "hot pursuit"; or (4) when investigating narcotic cases.

The sheriffs' responsibilities and jurisdiction are prescribed in Article V, Section 27 of the Louisiana constitution. It is as follows:

Section 27. Sheriffs
In each parish a sheriff shall be elected for a term of four years. He shall be the chief law enforcement officer in the parish, except as otherwise provided by this constitution, and shall execute court orders and process. He shall be the collector of state and parish ad valorem taxes and such other

taxes and license fees as provided by law. This Section shall not apply to Orleans Parish.

In the case of Orleans Parish, there is one sheriff's office with two positions, one of civil sheriff and one of criminal sheriff. The civil sheriff is responsible for collection of taxes and court related duties, whereas the criminal sheriff is custodian of the parish jail.

Jurisdiction and responsibility for the city police agencies and town marshals are defined in the charter of each of the municipalities. There is no Louisiana statute dealing with their responsibilities and jurisdictions, but there is a statute stating that there must be an elected town marshal when the form of the government is the aldermanic. He is the only peace officer in the municipality. In municipalities where the form of the government is other than aldermanic, the elective council appoints the chief of police and he is responsible to that council. The jurisdiction of the Town Marshal and Chief of Police is defined by the municipality in which they were either elected or appointed and their general responsibilities are upholding law and order.

The last division of the law enforcement agency is the wildlife and fisheries. Their jurisdiction and responsibilities are prescribed by the Louisiana constitution in Article IX, Section 7A & B. It is as follows:

Section 7. Wildlife and Fisheries Commission
(A) Members; Terms. The control and supervision of the wildlife of the state, including all aquatic life, is vested in the Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries Commission. The commission shall be in the executive branch and shall consist of seven members appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by the Senate. Six members shall serve members shall be electors of the governor. Three and representatives of the commercial fishing and representatives, as provided by law. No member who reappointment.

(B) Duties: Commission

(B) Duties; Compensation. The functions, duties, and responsibilities of the commission, and the compensation of its members shall be provided by law.

# Functions and Responsibilities

The function of the law enforcement agencies is basically to serve the public by preserving law and order. Included in this function are prevention of misconduct and/or crime as defined by law, responses to offenses as they are committed, arrest of offenders,

detention of arrestees until they are cleared or remanded for trial and keeping record of the offenses reported and arrest made. In order to fulfill these responsibilities, the agencies must perform certain functions. They are as follows: traffic, patrol, criminal investigations, communications and maintaining jails.

# Interfacing Between Agencies

In order to provide a complete picture of the criminal justice system, cooperation and communication between the segments of that system is mandatory. For example, the law enforcement agency collects the data on an offense, related arrests, and circumstances in which the incident occurs and submits their findings to the appropriate prosecutor. Unless a disposition of that case is returned to the law enforcement agency, there is little the agency can do to assess the effectiveness of their arrests. The same sort of mutual information flow must exist between the agencies of the courts and corrections segments of the system. Improving the present functional interfaces can only improve the effectiveness of the state criminal justice system.

#### Section B. JUDICIARY

#### Introduction

The term "Judiciary" encompasses both the prosecutive and judicial elements of the Louisiana Court System.

The courts are concerned with deciding what the law on a given matter is, and how it applies to a certain set of facts. A case may come into the courts in the form of competing claims between private persons or corporate bodies, or it may result from a conflict between private parties and the government.

Origanizationally the state courts tend generally to follow the pattern of the federal court system. This means that there are three general levels of courts: (1) a fairly numerous group of courts of general jurisdiction (district courts) where most of the trials originate, (2) an intermediate set of appellate courts, few in number, where no cases are heard in the first instance, and (3) the single supreme court, which is the highest court of appeals and which also hears a limited number of cases in the first instance. In addition, there are always a number of courts of special jurisdiction; in Louisiana these include juvenile courts, family courts, city parish courts, mayor's courts and justice of the peace courts.

In the matter of procedure, the courts are governed by complicated sets of rules coverning such matters as requirements for instituting suits, the admissibility of evidence and the general methods of conducting business before the courts. The findings of the courts are handed down in the form of decisions when a trial has been completed. These decisions, along with the opinions of the judges as to the relevant case factors, become part of the working law of the state and are cited in support of various points of law which they are supposed to cover.

One further factor which should be noted with respect to Louisiana is the use of the civil law in contrast with the remainder of the country which is a product of the common law tradition. The civil law is a heritage of the latin influence in this state, while common law is an anglo-saxon development. Civil law is based on a code whose principles are supposed to be applied by judges to their cases. Common law, however, is essentially case law, that is, the judges develop the law on the basis of principles handed down through a succession of cases, and the decision of even a single case is held to be the binding law until reversed by a later ruling. Today the two have merged somewhat, even in Louisiana.

The remainder of this section will present a brief, general description of the various courts in Louisiana and their criminal statistics reports and methods of reporting. In addition, a short discussion on the functions of the offices of District Attorney and their reporting methods is provided.

#### Justice of the Peace Courts

These courts of minor jurisdiction are a holdover from the days of scattered local communities and are now supplanted by city courts in incorporated areas. Nevertheless, at present there are over 450 Justice of the Peace Courts in existence, located principally in parish wards of less than 5,000 population.

Justice of the Peace courts have authority as committing magistrates only; that is, they may order a person to be held in custody but cannot sentence an individual to hard labor on a criminal charge. In cases not capital or punishable by hard labor, they can allow bail or discharge the arrested person, and they can require the posting of bonds as assurance that the peace will be preserved. Complaints concerning alleged violations are filed with the justice of the peace in affidavit form. Later, these affidavits are presented to the district attorney for prosecution in the district court.

Appeal on an action of a Justice of the Peace court is made to the appropriate district court.

#### Mayors' Court

Today, there are approximately 250 Mayors' Courts. They were established for incorporated areas with populations less than 5,000. Basically, they are to be found in all municipalities that do not possess a City Court.

A mayor's jurisdiction is limited to traffic and non-traffic ordinance violations. He may conduct court and impose penalties. However, a mayor does not possess injunctive powers. The mayors' courts have original jurisdiction over all city ordinances unless there is a city court. A 1970 legislative enactment specifically removed the mayors' jurisdiction over DWI cases. Otherwise, mayors' courts have concurrent jurisdiction with the district courts in traffic offenses.

Appeal is made to the District Court.

#### City/Parish Courts

City Courts are Louisiana's principal courts of limited jurisdiction and may be created in any parish ward containing the parish seat or at least 5,000 population. Presently, there are 48 such courts.

Outside Orleans Parish, the City Court has original jurisdiction concurrent with the District Court over the following:

- Criminal offenses not punishable by hard labor, including violations of parish and city ordinances, peace bonds, and preliminary examinations in non-
- 2. Juvenile cases, except where there is a separate juvenile or family court.

In the city of New Orleans, the structure of the city courts differs from the rest of the state. The city possesses four (4) courts whose combined jurisdiction is equivalent to the jurisdiction of city courts elsewhere in the state. These courts are: (1) First City Court, (2) Second City Court, (3) Traffic of New Orleans have civil jurisdiction only. The traffic court of New Orleans has jurisdiction only over traffic offenses in the power over criminal non-traffic ordinance violations.

Presently, there are two parish courts, both residing in Jefferson Parish. The First Parish Court covers all territory east of the Mississippi River while the Second Parish Court covers all land west of the Mississippi.

The jurisdiction of these courts is similar to a City Court. They have original jurisdiction with the District Court over criminal offenses except for capital crimes or those punishable by imprisonment at hard labor.

Appeal from a City or Parish Court decision is made to the appropriate district court if the judgment was less than \$300.00 or imprisonment under six months; otherwise, appeal is made to the state Supreme Court.

# Family and Juvenile Courts

The constitution specifies that each parish shall have a juvenile court, but presently, only the parishes of Orleans, Caddo, and Jefferson possess a juvenile court while East Baton Rouge Parish has a family court. Juvenile cases in the balance of the state are handled by district courts or concurrently by district and city courts.

These are courts of special jurisdiction having exclusive original jurisdiction over certain types of cases. The Juvenile Court handles the following cases:

 Neglect and delinquency of children under 17 except capital crimes and attempted aggravated rape by children over 15.

- 2. Crimes by adults over children, unless punishable by death or hard labor.
- 3. Desertion, non-support, and adoption of children under 17.

The Family Court also has jurisdiction over the above case types with the following two additions:

- 1. Uniform reciprocal enforcement of support, adoption of all minors, and marital cases (except for property matters).
- 2. Limited habeas corpus jurisdiction.

#### District Courts

The district court is the general trial court in Louisiana and, as such, has broad jurisdiction. The state is divided into thirty-three judicial districts each presided over by one district court plus the Orleans Parish judicial district which has two district courts, the Orleans Parish Civil District Court and the Orleans Parish Criminal District Court.

In general, district courts have jurisdiction over all matters within their territorial limits. Exceptions occur in Orleans Parish and in the First, Nineteenth, and Twenty-Fourth Districts, where family and juvenile courts have exclusive jurisdiction over certain types of cases. Further, in Orleans Parish, municipal violations are tried exclusively by the Municipal and Traffic Courts.

Basically, courts of limited jurisdiction (justice of the peace, mayors', city) have concurrent jurisdiction with the district court. In criminal cases, city courts exercise concurrent jurisdiction over misdemeanor and juvenile cases.

The appellate jurisdiction of a district court includes the following cases:

- 1. All criminal cases tried by city, municipal, traffic and mayors' courts, except where a fine exceeding \$300.00 or imprisonment exceeding six months has been imposed.
- 2. Orders requiring a peace bond issued by a Justice of the Peace.
- 3. Orleans Criminal District Court has general supervisory jurisdiction over the Orleans Municipal and Traffic Courts.

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- 2. Crimes by adults over children, unless punishable by death or hard labor.
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#### Office Of The District Attorney

The Louisiana Constitution provides for the requirement of a District Attorney in each judicial district, the powers and duties of the DA, the power of the Legislature to create and provide one or more assistant DA's in each judicial district and the salary of the DA and his assistant(s).

Basically, the District Attorney is charged with representing the state in the prosecution of all criminal actions. This includes the prosecution of cases in city courts when the case involves violation of a state ordinance. The DA is also the state's representative having the duty of aiding the grand jury in its investigations in the formulation of its accusations and prosecuting those accused. Finally, the Constitution states that the DA shall act as counsel for all parish boards and commissions.

In addition to the above responsibilities, most DA's will also control court dockets, take part in criminal investigations, receive complaints, and allot cases to the assistant DA's. Although procedures vary among the DA offices, the following process of a criminal case is generally followed:

- 1. A complainant signs an affidavit prepared by the DA.
- 2. An arrest warrant is drawn up, signed by a judge and given to the Parish Sheriff to serve and make arrest.
- 3. The Sheriff's arrest report is received by the DA, reviewed, and a decision is made on whether or not to prosecute, and on what charges.
- 4. A Bill of Information is prepared for each case to be prosecuted (Exception: Capital cases, in which case an indictment must be made by the grand jury). On serious charges, a bond amount is specified.
- 5. An Assistant DA is assigned to the case. He is responsible for setting arraignment and trial dates and notifying the Clerk of Court through the DA's docket schedule.
- 6. A witness list is then prepared by the Assistant DA and sent to the Clerk of Court who issues the necessary subpoenas.
- 7. The DA prosecutes the case at the trial.
- 8. On appeals, the DA must prepare an answer and be prepared to substantiate his case.

Presently, all DA's are participating in a reporting program designed and implemented by LCJIS. Both manual and automated in nature, this program strives to identify the entire number of charges against an individual for one specific case and then to show how each of these charges are disposed of during the prosecutive and judicial phases of the criminal justice the prosecutive and judicial phases of the criminal justice the prosecutive and judicial phases of the offender 3-part, snap-out form, each part being sent in as the offender passes from one judicial and prosecutive stage to another. #### Section C. CORRECTIONS

#### Introduction

The area of the criminal justice system that is concerned with post-conviction sure vision of offenders is referred to as "Corrections". In uisiana's system of corrections, all state penal institutions adult and juvenile), state work release center, and state-operated adult probation and parole systems fall under the jurisdiction of the Louisiana Department of Corrections (DOC). Inmates within the Louisiana Parish Prison system are not under the control of DOC during their confinement; however, when they are released on parole, formal supervision is generally provided by DOC. In addition to the parish prison system, juvenile probation and parole, local jails, and privately-operated offender treatment centers are not included within the jurisdiction of

#### Organization

The Louisiana Department of Corrections is organized into three basic areas: adult institutions; juvenile institutions; and the headquarters function, which includes probation and parole supervision. There are three adult institutions, five juvenile institutions, and thirteen probation and parole districts.

As the name implies, one purpose of "Corrections" is to correct, or in other words, see to it that the offender (after completing his obligation to society) is able to avoid further criminal activity.

While this is the desired result after the offender <a href="leaves" "Corrections", DOC first must be concerned with a more immediate objective - custody. It is the lawful duty of the Department of Corrections to maintain proper custody of offenders sentenced to confinement in state penal facilities. In the case of probation and parole, proper supervision is the objective. In either case, a major concern is protecting the public, while helping the offender learn to avoid future criminal behavior.

More recently, as a result of increasing interest being expressed by members of state and local governments in the operation of the state correctional system, DOC has become aware of the need for more information on its offender population. Among many other recent innovations initiated by DOC is a real-time video-terminal computerized information system, installed in early 1973. Known as the Corrections And Justice Unified Network (CAJUN), this system is one of the most modern correctional information system available anywhere, and has provided DOC the capability of locating any offender under its control instantaneously, and at the same time, displaying the offender's entire DOC history file.

## Adult Institutions

The oldest of the three adult institutions is Louisiana State Penitentiary (LSP), an all male facility located at Angola, Louisiana. A sprawling, former sugar plantation, it is currently the only maximum security penal facility in Louisiana. The other two adult institutions are the Louisiana Correctional and Industrial School (LCIS) at DeQuincy, an all male minimum security facility, and the Louisiana Correctional Institute for Women (LCIW), a female minimum security facility located in St. Gabriel, Louisiana.

In terms of size or capacity, LSP at Angola is by far the largest, maintaining an average daily population of approximately 3,383 inmates. In comparison, the average daily populations of LCIS and LCIW are 492 and 141, respectively. These figures, along with the corresponding population figures presented below for juvenile institutions, were prepared by DOC and reflect in-house populations only.

## Juvenile Institutions

The juvenile institutions subsystem consists of one reception facility, the Juvenile Reception and Diagnostic Center (JRDC) in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and four custodial facilities called Louisiana Training Institutes (LTI's), which are individually located in Baton Rouge, Bridge City, Monroe, and Pineville. Average daily population figures for these facilities are as follows: JRDC (129), Baton Rouge (572), Monroe (296), Pineville (126), and Bridge City (141).

All juveniles are initially received and screened at the Juvenile Reception and Diagnostic Center (JRDC). The screening process involves educational and psychological testing and evaluation, psychiatric evaluation and counseling where needed, and physical and dental examinations. When screening is complete, the individual is transferred to the appropriate custodial facility (LTI) to complete his sentence.

In addition to screening all juveniles, the JRDC operates the Adjustment Center, which is a maximum security holding facility for male juveniles with serious behavior problems who are unable to adjust to normal institutional programs.

The third project within JRDC is the federally funded Drug Abuse Treatment Program, now in its second year. This program is designed for the treatment of identified drug abusers within the institutional population.

## Headquarters Function

The Department of Corrections Headquarters, which includes the

Director and Headquarter's staff, is responsible for executive management of all areas, including public relations and fiscal authority. Included within the DOC Headquarters is the Division of Probation and Parole, which is responsible for the supervision of all adult offenders on probation, parole, or work release status. The division also handles all pre-and post-sentence investigations. Current figures published by DOC reveal the average caseload per supervising officer to be 113. This average is computed according to standards established by the American Correctional Association, and takes into consideration both cases supervised and investigations performed.

#### Offender Flow (Adults)

Adult offenders under supervision by the Louisiana Department of Corrections come from a variety of sources, such as city, district, and parish courts; out-of-state courts and institutions; and federal courts and institutions. Offenders whose crimes were not of a serious enough nature to warrant incarceration for the protection of the public may receive non-custodial sentences involving some form of probation under the supervision of the Department of Corrections.

Typical offenses for which an offender may receive probation include: simple burglary, simple robbery, theft, and similar crimes. Circumstances surrounding the actual commission of the crime, as well as the offender's criminal record, if any are also factors in determining whether or not the offender is a "good risk" for probation. The offender can earn release from supervision by completing his probation period without incurring additional violations.

If the offender is determined to be a poor risk regarding probation due to his criminal record, seriousness of the offense, etc., he or she may be sentenced to a custodial institution. Inmates of custodial institutions can exit in several ways, including completing the full sentence period, earning a "good behavior" early release, or receiving parole. Parole eligibility occurs after the inmate has served one-third of his full sentence, and involves the inmate's release from the institution with the requirement of monthly supervision by the Department of Corrections for the remainder of the original sentence. A small percentage of inmates are able to earn the right to be placed on Work Release status up to six months prior to being paroled. This transitional-type program enables the inmate to hold employment in the community, while returning to the institution when off-duty. Normal parole follows completion of the work release period. Parole, work release, and probation require active supervision by personnel within one of the thirteen probation/parole districts. Failure to successfully complete a parole, work release, or probation period will involve review of the offender's case, possible extension of the

supervisory period, and in many cases, institutionalization.

# Offender Flow (Juveniles - under Age 17)

Juvenile offenders are normally tried as juveniles within the juvenile or district court system. Upon conviction, the youthful offender may be placed on juvenile probation, or if custodial treatment is deemed appropriate, the offender can be committed to the care of the Department of Corrections for placement in one of four juvenile training institutions. In the case of a capital crime or attempted aggravated rape, the case of a capital crime or attempted in criminal district courts as adults.

Juvenile probation, as mentioned earlier, does not fall under the jurisdiction of the Louisiana Department of Corrections. Approximately 50% of all juvenile probation cases remain under the supervision of local court systems, such as East Baton the supervision of local court systems, such as East Baton Rouge Parish Family Court, the Juvenile Courts of Orleans Parish, Jefferson Parish, and Caddo Parish, and the 14th Judicial District Juvenile Court. The remaining 50% are under the control of the Division of Youth Services, a juvenile the control agency established by the 1974 Louisiana Constitution.

All juveniles sentenced to the Department of Corrections are initially sent to the Juvenile Reception and Diagnostic Center in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, for screening, as described earlier, in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, for screening, as described earlier, and then transferred to one of the four juvenile correctional and industrial schools. If paroled before completion of his full sentence, parole supervision is provided either by the Division of Youth Services or one of the above mentioned local court systems.

#### Section D. LOUISIANA CRIMINAL JUSTICE INFORMATION SYSTEM (LCJIS)

This imposing title represents a group of highly skilled men and women who use the latest information gathering machinery to provide the police, the courts and corrections with information which is vital to their functions. This data can then be used by those agencies to make long range plans to find the root causes of delinquent behavior, to study the social effects of alternative courses of action, to improve the handling of offenders in the courts, and to make corrections more effective in the supervision and rehabilitation of offenders.

LCJIS serves many purposes, among which are:

- (1) Meeting the operational and informational need of all segments of the Criminal Justice System.
- (2) Providing analytical techniques for the solution of problems posed by crimes and criminals.
- (3) Assisti in the search for realistic goals which will promote the reduction of crime.
- (4) Permitting the speedy exchange of information among Criminal Justice agencies.

Six operational components go into LCJIS's make up:

- (1) A State Criminal Justice Statistical Analysis Center. In addition to the information needs of criminal justice planners, this center is responsible for the development and maintenance of quality control procedures for data collection centers and for each component in the system. This branch is also assigned the task of system auditing and inspection.
- (2) Management and Administrative Statistics System. To determine the needs of the criminal justice system, this component has as its goal the collection of systematic data on Louisiana's work force in law enforcement, courts and corrections and comprehensive information on the quantity and quality of equipment used within the system. Another important bit of data collected is that concerning the adequacy of existing facilities.
- (3) Offender Based Transaction Statistics System. This system accounts for and describes each encounter between individuals and agencies in the criminal justice system. By monitoring an offender's entry into, travel through, and exit from the criminal justice system, the entire system's effectiveness and deficiencies are discovered.
- (4) Uniform Crime Reports System. Simply put, this component has the not-so-simple task of collecting information concerning

every facet of every crime committed in Louisiana. It is only with such comprehensive information that officials will be able to assemble long range crime prevention programs.

- (5) Technical Assistance Capability. A highly trained technical field staff has been assembled to provide technical support to criminal justice agencies in the state in their development and use of the data which will be supplied to them.
- (6) Corrections and Justice Unified Network. With this system, the Department of Corrections has at its disposal valuable information on each person committed to its supervision so that effective prison management, as well as the equitable and efficient handling of probationers and parolees is now a reality.

All of these components are vital to an effective criminal justice system. The personnel of LCJIS, working in close harmony with members of law enforcement, courts and corrections, are able to function more efficiently and effectively as a unit and as a member of an overall system.

When totally implemented, the Louisiana Criminal Justice Information System will be a state-wide complex of local criminal justice agencies reporting important data to a centralized computer, to be stored for eventual feed-back and use on the local level. The ultimate benefactors of this complex system of people and machines will be the individual citizen, the person for whom the criminal justice system was designed to protect. Federal Judge Irving justice system was designed to protect. Federal Judge Irving Kaufman once said: "No machine has yet been devised that can do Kaufman once said: "No machine has yet been devised that can do justice." While this is true even today, modern technology has justice." While this is LCJIS.
