

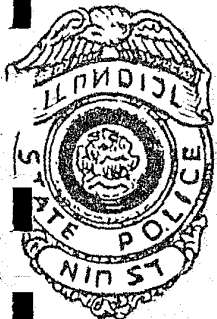

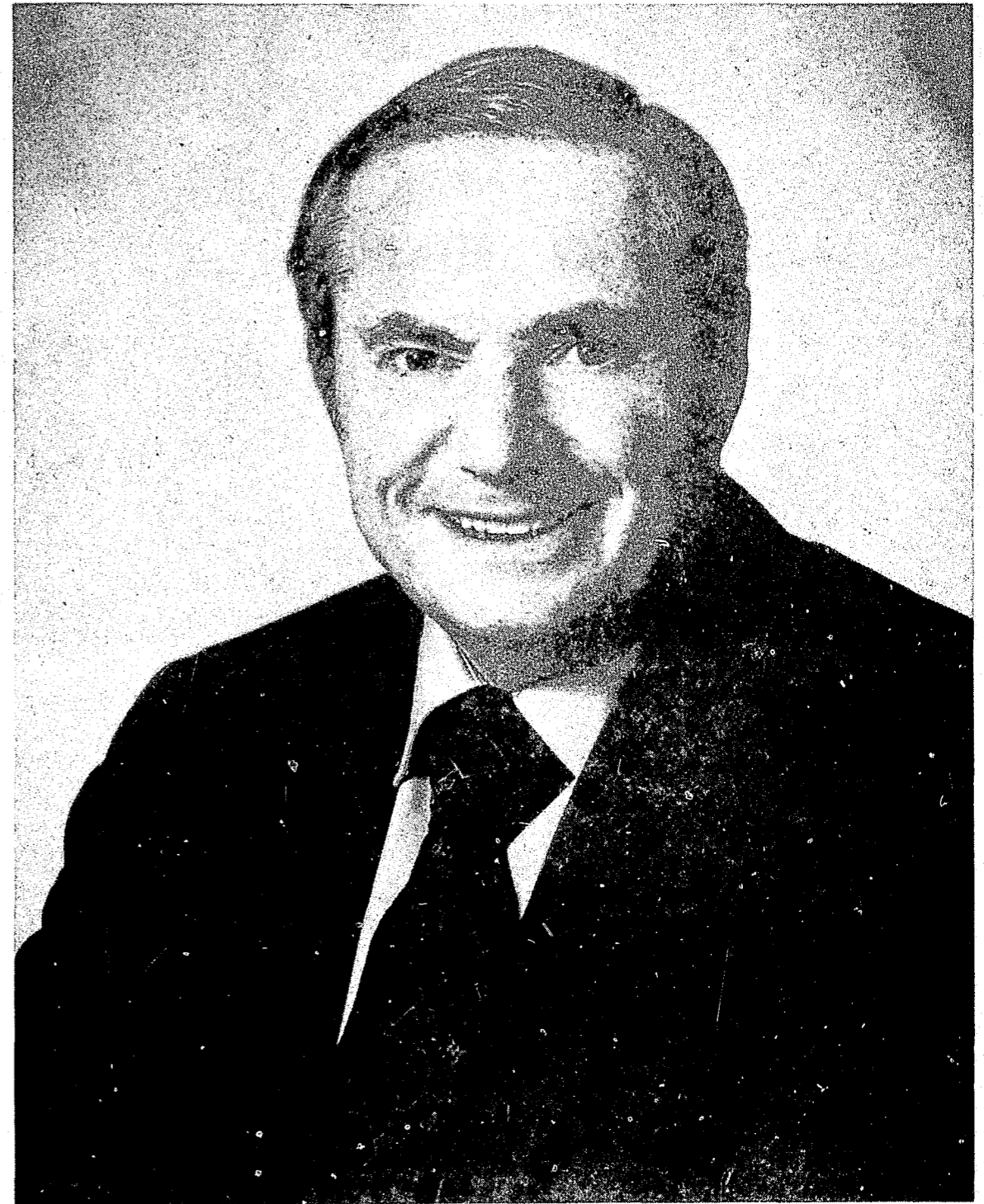

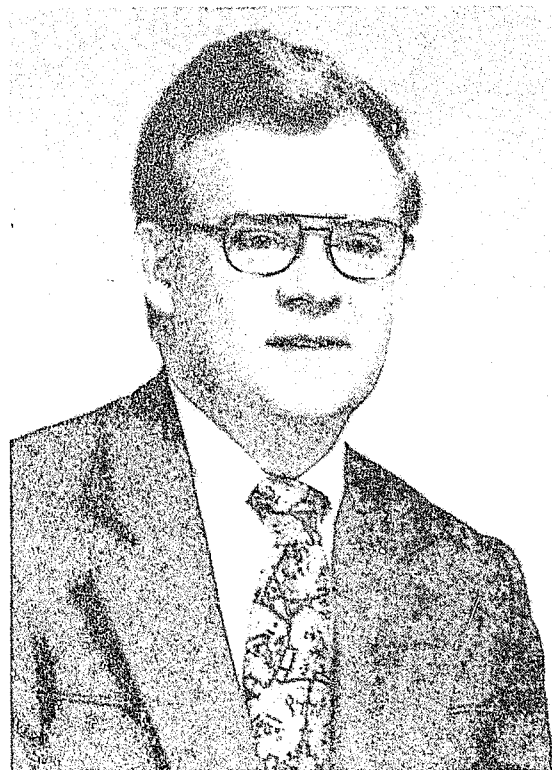

INTRODUCTION

THE PROGRAM

The Pennsylvania Uniform Crime Reporting Program was established as a result of the Uniform Criminal Statistics Act of 1970 (71 P.S. 307.8 and 307.9). Powers and duties relative to criminal statistics were given to the Attorney General. In October 1973, the duties set forth in this Act relative to Uniform Crime Reporting were transferred to the Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State Police by Reorganization Plan No. 7 of 1973, pursuant to the authority of the Reorganization Act of 1955 (P.L. 23).

The counterpart of the Pennsylvania UCR Program is the National UCR Program under the direction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. This national program is the result of a need for nationwide and uniform compilation of law enforcement data. Uniform Crime Reports, developed by a committee of The International Association of Chiefs of Police, were first collected in 1930. The IACP continues to serve in an advisory capacity to the FBI in its operation of the Program. In our state program, the UCR Committee of the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association was instrumental in the development of the program and continues to serve as advisor in its operation.

The primary objectives of the Pennsylvania UCR Program are to inform the Governor, Legislature, other governmental officials and the public as to the nature of the crime problem in Pennsylvania and to provide law enforcement administrators with criminal statistics for administrative and operational purposes.

The UCR Program has been subject to much criticism and, while many of the points are valid, some of the shortcomings are understandable and much of the criticism weakened when the primary objectives of the program are remembered. Uniform Crime Report Data is still the best crime information available. The returns completed by law enforcement agencies deal only with offenses that become known to them, and no data is routinely collected to measure the total amount of crime that actually occurs. Some studies indicate that many of the offenses committed are not reported to the police. As an example, offenses are less likely to be reported to police agencies when they are less serious or considered trivial by the general public.

There are many factors which will affect the type and volume of crime that occurs from place to place. Some of these are listed in "Crime in the United States, Uniform Crime Reports, 1973" page viii, and are reprinted below.

CRIME FACTORS

Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.
Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.

Economic status and mores of the population.
Stability of population, including commuters, seasonal and other transient types.
Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
Educational, recreational and religious characteristics.
Effective strength of the police force.
Standards of appointments to the local police force.
Policies of the prosecuting officials.
Attitudes and policies of the courts and corrections..
Relationships and attitudes of law enforcement and the community.
Administrative and investigative efficiency of law enforcement, including degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
Organization and cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police jurisdictions.

CLASSIFICATION OF OFFENSES

Uniformity in reporting under the Pennsylvania system is based upon the proper classification of offenses by police. The adoption of the Federal system of reporting included the utilization of the offense classifications of that system. Law enforcement personnel in this state have made accurate application of those classifications in the reports submitted to the program.

In view of the need for compatibility with the Federal system, the categories of offense classification employed in this program remain the same as those employed on the national level. Care must be taken by police officers in classifying because of the conflicts between this system and the Pennsylvania Crimes Code.

Part I Offenses

Offense data consists of information that has been extracted from reports of crimes that have come to the attention of Pennsylvania law enforcement agencies. In general, Part I crimes are those serious crimes that are usually reported to law enforcement agencies. They consist of the following offenses:

- (1) Criminal Homicide
 - 1a. Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter - The unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought.
General rule - Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assaults or commission of a crime.
 - 1b. Manslaughter by Negligence - The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, without malice aforethought.
General rule - The killing may result from the commission of an unlawful act or from a lawful act performed with gross negligence. Traffic deaths may be classified as such when due to gross negligence of someone other than the victim.
- (2) Forcible Rape
 - 2a. Rape by Force - The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly against her will.
General rule - Forcible rape of a female but excluding carnal abuse (Statutory Rape) or other sex offenses.
 - 2b. Assault to Rape - Attempts - All assaults and attempts to rape.

- (3) Robbery - The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.
 - 3a. Firearm - Any firearm used as a weapon or employed as a means of force to threaten the victim or put him in fear.
 - 3b. Knife or Cutting Instrument - Any knife, broken bottle, razor, or other cutting instrument employed as a weapon or as a means of force to threaten the victim or put him in fear.
 - 3c. Other Dangerous Weapon - Any club, acid, explosive, brass knuckles, or other dangerous weapon employed as a means of force to threaten the victim or put him in fear.
 - 3d. Strong Arm - Muggings, yokings, and similar offenses where no weapon is used, but strong-arm tactics are employed to deprive a victim of his property. This is limited to personal weapons such as hands, fists, feet, teeth, etc.
- (4) Assaults - An assault is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do physical injury to another.
General rule - All assaults will be classified in the following categories, excluding assaults with intent to rob or rape.
 - 4a. Gun - All assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of any type of firearms. (Revolvers, automatic pistols, shotguns, zip guns, rifles, pellet guns, etc.)
 - 4b. Knife or Cutting Instrument - All assaults and attempted assaults, involving the use of cutting or stabbing objects. (Knife, razor, hatchet, axe, cleaver, scissors, glass, broken bottle, dagger, ice pick, etc.)
 - 4c. Other Dangerous Weapon - All assaults and attempted assaults, when any other object or thing is used as a weapon. (Clubs, bricks, pick handles, bottles, explosives, acid, lye, poison, scalding water and cases of attempted drowning, burning, etc.)
 - 4d. Hands, Fists, Feet, etc. - Felonious - Assaults which are of a felonious nature when hands, fists, feet, etc., are used. To be classified as felonious assault, the attack must result in serious personal injury.
 - 4e. Other Assaults - Not Aggravated - All offenses of simple assault and assault and battery. Crimes of this classification are not considered Index Offenses and appear as classification 8 (Part II Offense) in this report.
- (5) Burglary - Unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny.
General rule - Any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any dwelling house, attached structure, public building, shop, office, factory, storehouse, apartment, house trailer, warehouse, mill, barn, other building, houseboat or railroad car.
Note: For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, breaking and entering and larceny are classified only as burglary; the larceny is excluded. Breaking and entering of a motor vehicle is classified as larceny.

- 5a. Forcible Entry - All offenses where force of any kind is used to enter unlawfully a locked structure, with intent to steal or commit a felony. This includes entry by use of a master key, celluloid or other device that leaves no outward mark but is used to open a lock. Concealment inside a building, followed by the breaking out of the structure is also included.
- 5b. Unlawful Entry - No Force - Any unlawful entry without any evidence of forcible entry.
- 5c. Attempted Forcible Entry - When determined that forcible entry has been attempted.

- (6) Larceny-Theft (except Motor Vehicle Theft) - The unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. General rule - All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse snatching, shop lifting, larceny from auto, larcenies of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, larcenies from buildings and from coin operated machines. Any theft that is not a robbery or the result of breaking and entering is included. Embezzlement, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are excluded.
- (7) Motor Vehicle Theft - The larceny or attempted larceny of a motor vehicle. General rule - Thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as a motor vehicle in this state. Excludes cases where there is a lawful access to the vehicle, such as a family situation or unauthorized use by others with lawful access to the vehicle. (Chauffeur, employees, etc.)
- 7a. Auto Theft - The thefts of all sedans, stationwagons, coupes, convertibles and other similar motor vehicles which serve the sole purpose of transporting people from one place to another.
- 7b. Trucks and Buses - Thefts of those vehicles specifically designed to transport people on the commercial basis, and to transport cargo.
- 7c. Other Vehicles - Thefts of all other motor vehicles limited by the UCR definition such as snowmobiles, motorcycles, motor scooters, trailbikes, etc. Thefts of farm equipment, construction equipment or airplanes are considered Larceny-Theft.

Part II Offenses

Part II offenses are made up of all other crimes not classified as Part I crimes. Part II crimes for UCR purposes are as follows:

- (8) Other Assaults - This class is comprised of all assaults and attempted assaults which are simple or minor in nature. For reporting purposes, these "Other Assaults" are scored on Return A under item 4e as offenses known to Police. However, arrests for this offense are scored in this class.
- (9) Arson - Includes all violations of State Laws and municipal ordinances relating to arson and attempted arson. Includes: any willful or malicious burning or attempts to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, church, college, jail, meeting house, public building or any building, ship or other vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft; contents of buildings, personal property of another, goods or chattels, crops, trees, fences, gates, grain, vegetable products, lumber, woods, cranberry bogs, marshes, meadows, etc. In the event of a death from arson, the offense would be classified as murder and if personal injury results, the offense would be classified as assault (4c).

- (10) Forgery and Counterfeiting - In this class are placed all offenses dealing with the making, altering, uttering or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true.
- Includes:
- Altering or forging public or other records.
 - Making, altering, forging, or counterfeiting bills, notes, drafts, tickets, checks, credit cards, etc.
 - Forging wills, deeds, notes, bonds, seals, trademarks, etc.
 - Counterfeiting coins, plates, bank notes, checks, etc.
 - Possessing or uttering forged or counterfeiting instruments.
 - Erasures.
 - Signing the name of another or fictitious person with intent to defraud.
 - Using forged labels.
 - Possession, manufacture, etc., of counterfeiting apparatus.
 - Selling goods with altered, forged or counterfeited trademarks.
 - All attempts to commit any of the above.
- (11) Fraud - Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretense. Includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.
- (12) Embezzlement - Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.
- (13) Stolen Property; Buying, Receiving, Possessing - Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving and possession of stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.
- (14) Vandalism - Included in this class are all willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or person having custody or control, by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth or any other such means as may be specified by law or ordinance. This offense covers a wide range of malicious behavior directed at property.
- (15) Weapons: Carrying, Possessing, etc. - This class deals with violations of weapons laws such as:
- Manufacture, sale or possession of deadly weapons.
 - Carrying deadly weapons.
 - Using, manufacturing, etc., silencers.
 - Furnishing deadly weapons to minors.
 - Aliens possessing deadly weapons.
 - All attempts to commit the above.
- (16) Prostitution and Commercialized Vice - Included in this class are the sex offenses of a commercialized nature, such as:
- Prostitution.
 - Keeping bawdy house, disorderly house or house of ill repute.
 - Pandering, procuring, transporting or detaining women for immoral purposes, etc.
 - All attempts to commit any of the above.

(17) Sex Offenses - Except forcible rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Includes offenses against chastity, common decency, morals and the like.

Adultery and fornication.

Buggery.

Incest.

Indecent liberties.

Indecent exposure.

Intercourse with an insane, epileptic or venereally diseased person.

Sodomy.

Seduction.

Statutory Rape - (No Force).

All attempts to commit any of the above.

(18) Narcotic Drug Laws - Narcotic drug law violations are reported on the basis of the narcotics used. Include all violations of state and local ordinances, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing and making of narcotic drugs. The following subdivisions of narcotic drug law violations are classified:

18a. Opium or cocaine and their derivatives.

Morphine, heroin, codeine.

18b. Marijuana.

18c. Synthetic narcotics, manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction.

Demerol, methadones.

18d. Dangerous non-narcotic drugs.

Barbiturates, benzedrine, inhalants.

(19) Gambling - All offenses which are related to promoting, permitting or engaging in gambling. To provide a more refined collection of gambling offenses, the following classifications are used:

19a. Bookmaking (Horse and sport books).

19b. Numbers and lottery.

19c. All other.

(20) Offenses Against the Family and Children - Included here are all charges of nonsupport and neglect or abuse of family and children.

Desertion, abandonment, or nonsupport.

Neglect or abuse of child. (If injury is serious, offense is reported as aggravated assault).

Non-payment of alimony.

All attempts to commit any of the above.

(21) Driving Under the Influence - This class is limited to the operating of any vehicle while under the influence of alcoholic beverages or narcotic drugs.

(22) Liquor Laws - With the exception of "Drunkness" (Class 23) and "Driving Under the Influence" (Class 21), liquor law violations, state or local, are placed in this class:

Includes:

Manufacturing, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing, etc.

Maintaining unlawful drinking places.

Bootlegging.

Operating still.

Furnishing alcoholic beverages to a minor.

Using vehicle for illegal transportation of alcoholic beverages.

Consumption of alcoholic beverages by a minor.

(23) Drunkness - Included in this class are all offenses of drunkenness or intoxication, with the exception of "Driving Under the Influence" (Class 21).

Drunk and disorderly.

Public intoxication.

(24) Disorderly Conduct - In this class are placed all violations of committing a breach of the peace.

Includes:

Affray.

Unlawful assembly.

Disturbing the peace.

Disturbing meetings.

Disorderly conduct in State institutions, at court, at fairs, on trains or public conveyances, etc.

Prize fights.

Blasphemy, profanity and obscene language.

Desecrating the flag.

Refusing to assist an officer.

All attempts to commit any of the above.

(25) Vagrancy - In this class are placed persons who are "suspicious characters" and fail to give good account of themselves.

Includes:

Vagrancy.

Begging.

Loitering (persons 18 and over).

Vagabondage.

(26) All other Offenses - Include in this class, every other State offense not included in classes 1 through 25. Violations of local ordinances are not included in this class. Illustrated below is a partial list of offenses.

Abduction and compelling to marry.

Abortion (Death resulting from abortion is homicide, offense class 1a).

Bigamy and polygamy.
 Blackmail and extortion.
 Bribery.
 Contempt of court.
 Discrimination, unfair competition.
 Kidnapping.
 Offenses contributing to juvenile delinquency except as provided for in classes 1 through 29, such as employment of children in immoral vocations or practices, admitting minors to improper places, etc.
 Perjury and subornation of perjury.
 Possession, repair, manufacture, etc., of burglar's tools.
 Possession or sale of obscene literature.
 Unlawful use, possession, etc., of explosives, etc.

- (28) Curfew and Loitering Laws (Juveniles) - All violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances are included.
- (29) Runaways (Juveniles) - Reported in this category are apprehensions for protective custody. Protective custody actions taken with regard to runaways taken for other jurisdictions are not included.

CALCULATION OF RATES

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program provides data for police administrators to measure local problems, but to facilitate this function it is sometimes necessary to convert the data into rates or percentages. Simple formulas are presented to assist in these computations.

Crime Rates

One of the most useful crime statistics is the crime rate which is the number of offenses per 100,000 persons. This rate can be calculated regardless of the number of inhabitants in your jurisdiction. To compute rates, divide your jurisdiction's population into 100,000 and multiply the number of offenses by that answer.

Example:

$$\frac{100,000}{50,000 \text{ population}} = 2 \times 182 \text{ robberies} = 364$$

Your robbery rate would be 364 per 100,000 population.

Clearance Rates

The percentage of crimes cleared by arrest is obtained by dividing the number of offenses cleared by the number of actual offenses known. This answer is then multiplied by 100.

Example:

$$\frac{147 \text{ Robberies cleared}}{364 \text{ Robberies known}} = 0.404 \times 100 = 40.4$$

Your percentage of clearance for robbery is 40.4 percent.

Law Enforcement Employee Rates

These rates are conventionally expressed as the number of employees per 1,000 population. The rate is computed by dividing the population into 1,000 and in turn multiplying the number of employees by this quotient.

Example:

$$\frac{1,000}{50,000 \text{ population}} = 0.2 \times 102 \text{ Employees} = 2.04$$

Your rate is 2.0 Employees per 1,000 population.

SUMMARY OF CRIME IN PENNSYLVANIA 1974

A total of 715,602 crimes of all types were reported to the police in Pennsylvania during 1974. This total represents a rate of 5,937.3 crimes per 100,000 estimated population in Pennsylvania, an increase of 15.3 percent from the 1973 total of 620,695 crimes and a rate of 5,179.9.

During 1974, 359,131 Crime Index Offenses were reported and founded by Pennsylvania police after investigation. Actually, 368,213 offenses were reported, but 2.5 percent or 9,082 were unfounded following investigation, ranging from 2.0 percent unfounded for larceny to 14.2 percent unfounded for rape. Crime Index Offenses thus increased 20.6 percent from 1973's total of 297,758 Crime Index Offenses and a rate of 2,484.9. The Crime Index Rate in 1974 was 2,979.7.

Crime Index Offenses are considered to be both most serious and most likely to be reported and are used nationally as a standard base for comparisons. They include murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.

In addition, 355,733 Part II Offenses were reported during 1974 with a rate of 2,951.5 per 100,000 population. This is an increase of 10.4 percent over 322,122 Part II Offenses during 1973 and a corresponding rate of 2,688.2. Part II Offenses include other assaults, arson, forgery and counterfeiting, fraud, embezzlement, stolen property, vandalism, weapons, prostitution, other sex offenses, narcotic drug law violations, gambling, offenses against the family, driving under the influence, liquor law violations, drunkenness, disorderly conduct, vagrancy, and all other offenses.

In 1974, 41.9 percent of all offenses were cleared; 21.6 percent of Crime Index Offenses and 62.3 percent of all Part II Offenses.

The following table summarizes the combined Part I and Part II Offense total.

Pennsylvania is an extremely urban state, with 81.4 percent of its population living in Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas.* 87.9 percent of Crime Index Offenses and 86.7 percent of Part II Offenses occurred in Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA), as summarized in the following table:

It should be noticed that the crime rate of core city jurisdictions in SMSA's continued to be almost twice as high as their suburban jurisdictions. This year reported offenses were higher in suburban jurisdictions rather than in the core city jurisdictions.

* A Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area is composed of an entire county or group of counties with at least one core city, with the whole area meeting criteria of certain metropolitan characteristics established by the United States Bureau of the Census.

** Liquor Law Violations reported by Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board are not included in this portion of the report because of the difficulty of determining the exact location within the county where the violation occurred.

CRIME INDEX OFFENSES

OFFENSE DISTRIBUTION

Violent Crime accounted for 10.4 percent or 37,189 offenses within the total Crime Index: 0.2 percent or 789 for murder; 0.6 percent or 2,096 for forcible rape; 5.2 percent or 18,835 for robbery; and 4.3 percent or 15,469 for aggravated assault. Violent Crimes represented 20.2 percent of the Index Offenses reported by Philadelphia County, compared to only 0.8 percent in Sullivan County.

Property Crime consisted of 89.6 percent or 321,942 offenses in the Pennsylvania Crime Index: burglary, 30.3 percent or 108,939; larceny, 47.0 percent or 168,734; and motor vehicle theft, 12.3 percent or 44,269.

TREND

As outlined in Table 1, Property Crime increased by 21.3 percent from 265,361 in 1973 to 321,942 in 1974, while Violent Crime increased 14.8 percent from 32,397 in 1973 to 37,189 in 1974.

The offense increasing the greatest in 1974 was larceny with a 30.0 percent increase to 168,734 from 129,810 in 1973. Other offenses showing substantial percent increases were: burglary, 18.3 percent; aggravated assault, 16.6 percent; robbery, 14.2 percent; and forcible rape, 11.8 percent in 1974. Offenses showing the smallest increases were: murder, 4.6 percent; and motor vehicle theft, 1.8 percent in 1974.

CLEARANCES

As outlined in Table 3, 77,480 offenses or 21.6 percent of the total Crime Index of 359,131 were cleared in 1974. This was identical to the clearance rate in 1973. 45.5 percent or 16,884 Violent Crimes were cleared in 1974 in contrast to only 18.8 percent or 60,596 Property Crimes. Clearances of Violent Crimes decreased from 46.2 percent in 1973 while clearances of Property Crimes showed a slight increase from 18.6 percent in 1973. Clearances of Property Crimes are low because these are crimes of stealth and generally lack witnesses. Conversely, Violent Crimes are generally committed more openly, have more witnesses, and generate a greater degree of intensity from the aspects of police investigation.

CRIME INDEX DISTRIBUTION BY COUNTY

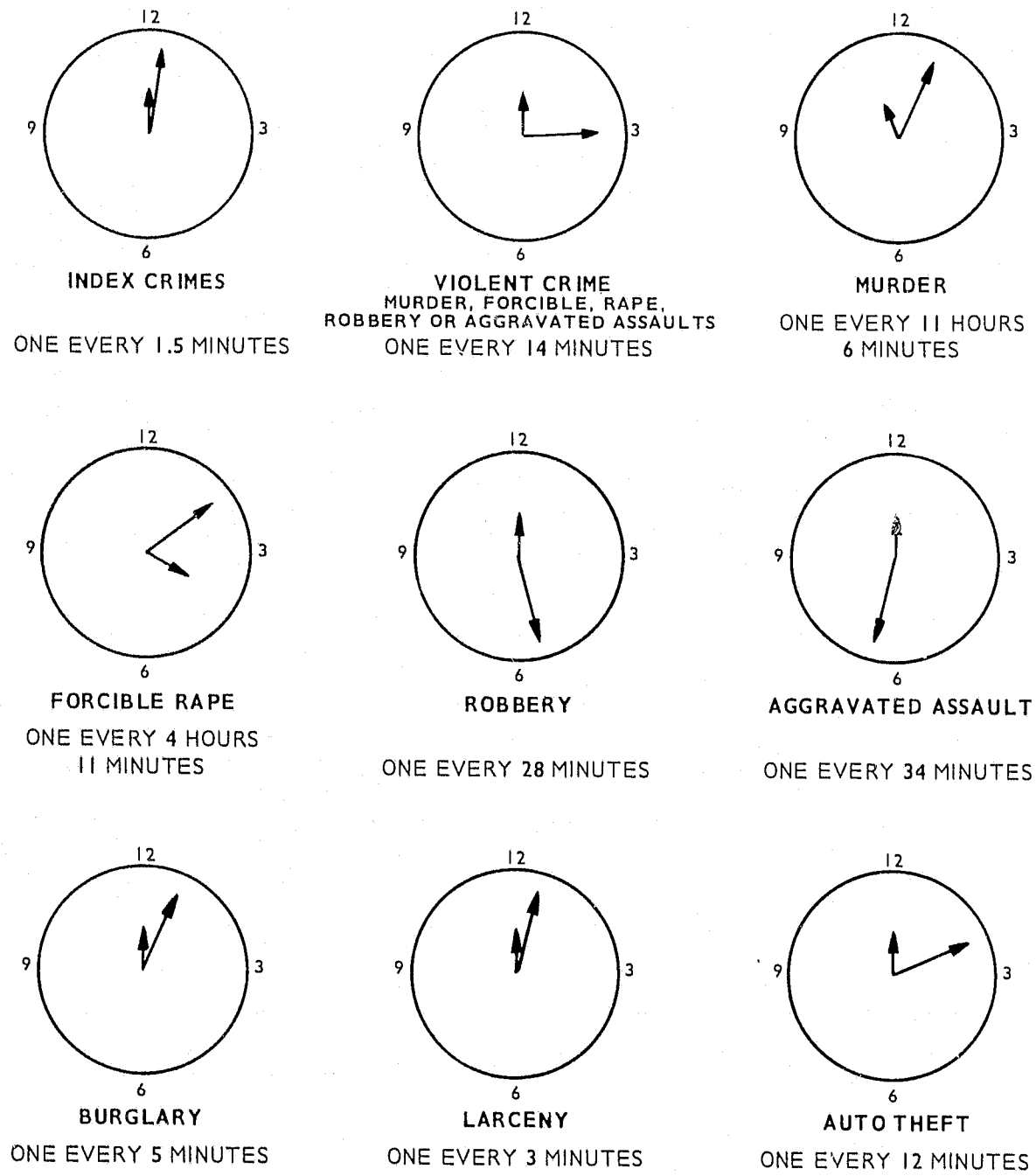

IN PENNSYLVANIA 1974

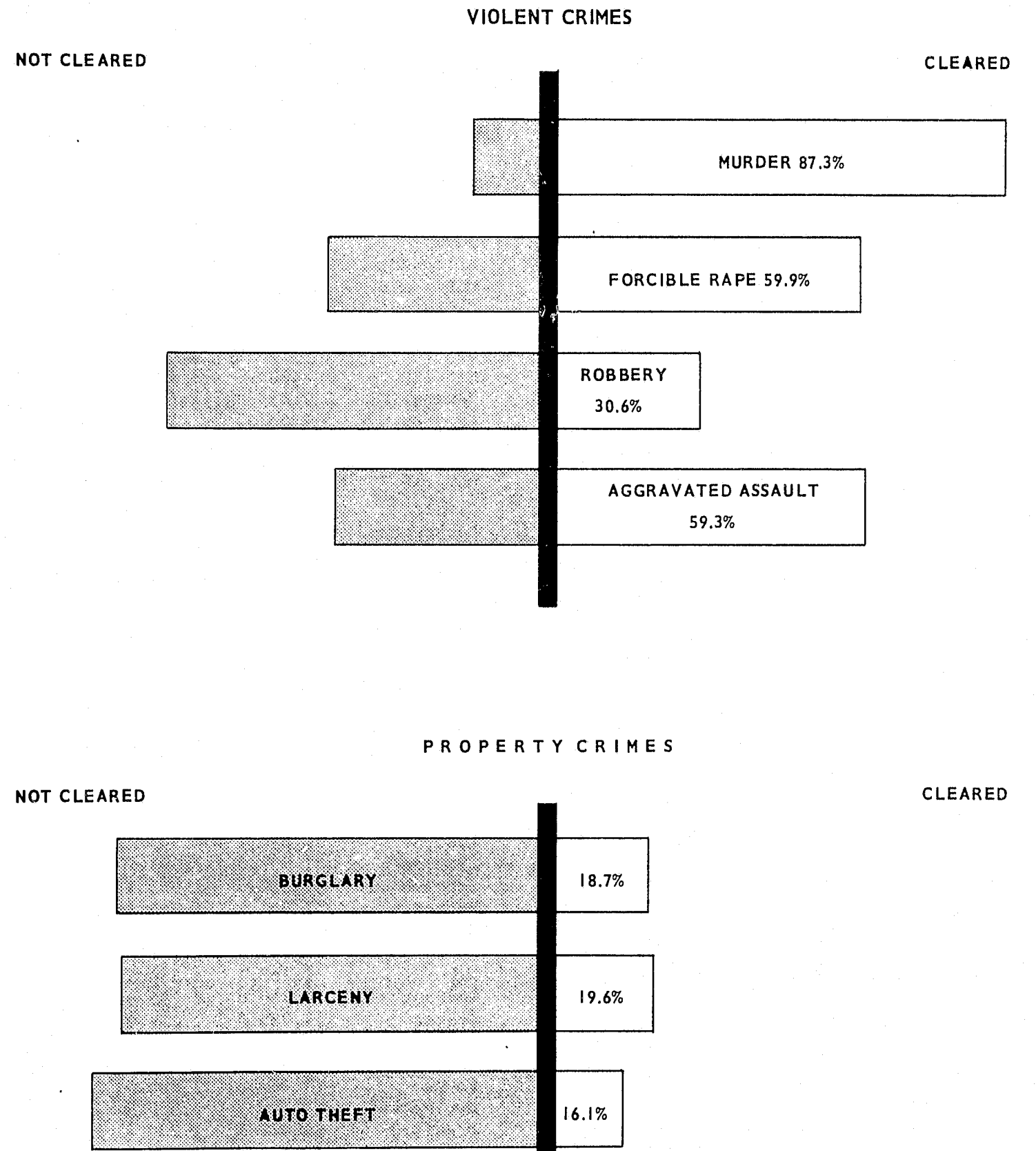

Philadelphia County reported the greatest increase in number of Index Offenses in 1974, while Warren County reported the largest decrease. Warren, Potter and Sullivan Counties were the only counties reporting a decrease in Index Offenses in 1974. Centre County reported an increase of 73.0 percent in Index Offenses while Sullivan County reported a decrease of 34.1 percent.

Forest County again reported the highest Crime Index Rate (6,813.7), while Somerset County this year reported the lowest Crime Index Rate (1,169.7). Centre County showed the greatest change in Crime Index Rate increasing 68.5 percent, raising it from thirtieth position in 1973 to fifteenth position in 1974. The Crime Index Rate for Sullivan County decreased 33.8 percent dropping the county ranking from eighth position in 1973 to thirty-first position in 1974.

The first fifteen counties in the listing account for 78.9 percent of all Crime Index Offenses reported to the police in 1974. A review of Table 2 will indicate ranges in the Crime Index Rate from 4,898.6 in Dauphin County, to 1,169.7 in Somerset County among urban counties. Similar variations occurred in non-urban counties with ranges from 6,813.7 in Forest County to 1,191.4 in Schuylkill County. It should be noticed that all of the fifteen counties with the greatest number of listed offenses are SMSA counties.

CRIME INDEX DISTRIBUTION BY COMMON HUMAN SERVICE REGIONS

In 1967, the Governor's Office proclaimed six "Common Human Service Regions" (CHSR) in Pennsylvania, consisting of generally comparative counties in terms of interrelated needs and populations. See Figure D. Accordingly, the tables in this report are so organized, with the individual counties being identified alphabetically within the CHSR's.

These regions are considered "standardized" for Commonwealth planning and reporting purposes. They should not be confused with Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA), although the counties in the Southeast CHSR coincide with the Philadelphia SMSA.

PERCENT DISTRIBUTION

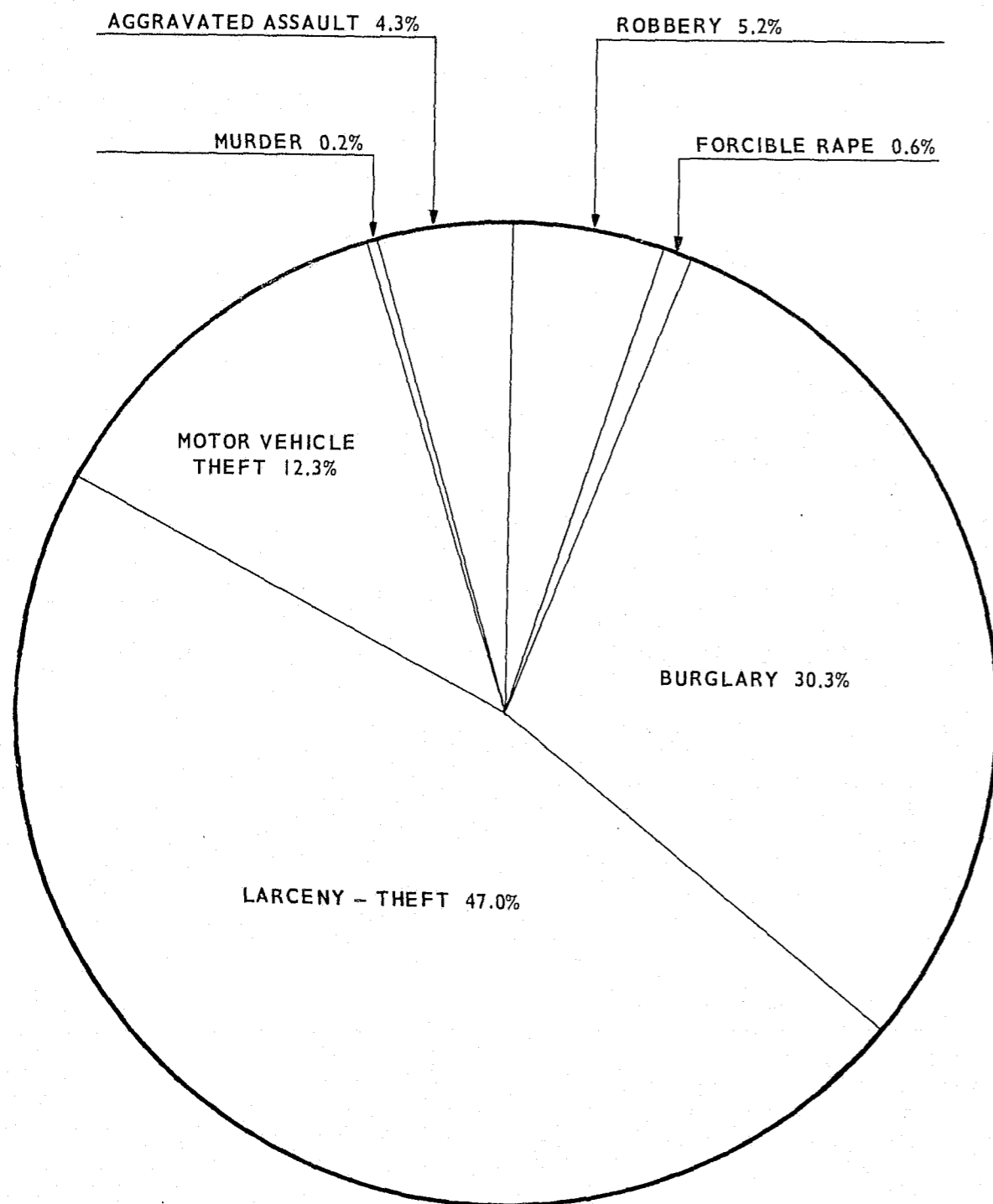

The Crime Index Rate ranges from 3,848.0 in the Southeast CHSR (Philadelphia and surrounding counties) to 2,132.9 in the Central CHSR, which is largely composed of Appalachian counties of Pennsylvania.

The Crime Index increased 20.6 percent to 359,131 offenses in 1974 from 297,758 offenses in 1973. The Southcentral CHSR provided the greatest increase in Index Offenses, increasing 35.0 percent from 28,013 in 1973 to 37,827 in 1974. The Central CHSR increased 33.7 percent from 16,584 offenses in 1973 to 22,173 in 1974.

CRIME INDEX DISTRIBUTION BY STANDARD METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREAS (SMSA)

Table 4 summarizes the 12 SMSA's in Pennsylvania and includes Susquehanna County, which is a part of the Binghamton, New York SMSA. A total of 28 counties are involved. Counties in New Jersey which are part of the Allentown-Bethlehem-Easton SMSA and the Philadelphia SMSA are not included in this report.

Highest Crime Index Rates were produced by Williamsport SMSA (4,538.2), Philadelphia SMSA (3,848.0), Erie SMSA (3,580.1), and Harrisburg SMSA (3,518.5). The lowest Crime Index Rate occurred in the Johnstown SMSA (1,216.7).

Of significance in this table are the high Crime Index Rates shown by the core cities of the SMSA's in contrast to the rates in their suburbs. Some examples are Harrisburg, 10,975.2 against a suburban rate of 2,211.9; Williamsport, 8,371.0 against 2,755.8; York, 7,564.2 against 2,500.0; and Lancaster, 5,681.3 against 1,483.3.

The core cities' Crime Index Rates were generally double that of their suburbs. In fact, the Crime Index Rate in Harrisburg was 5 times the rate of its suburbs; Lancaster 4 times, and Pittsburgh, York and Williamsport 3 times.

The highest rates of increase over 1973 were: York, 44.5 percent from 7,731 offenses in 1973 to 11,168 offenses in 1974 and Harrisburg, 36.5 percent from 11,097 offenses in 1973 to 15,143 offenses in 1974.

COMMON HUMAN SERVICE REGIONS

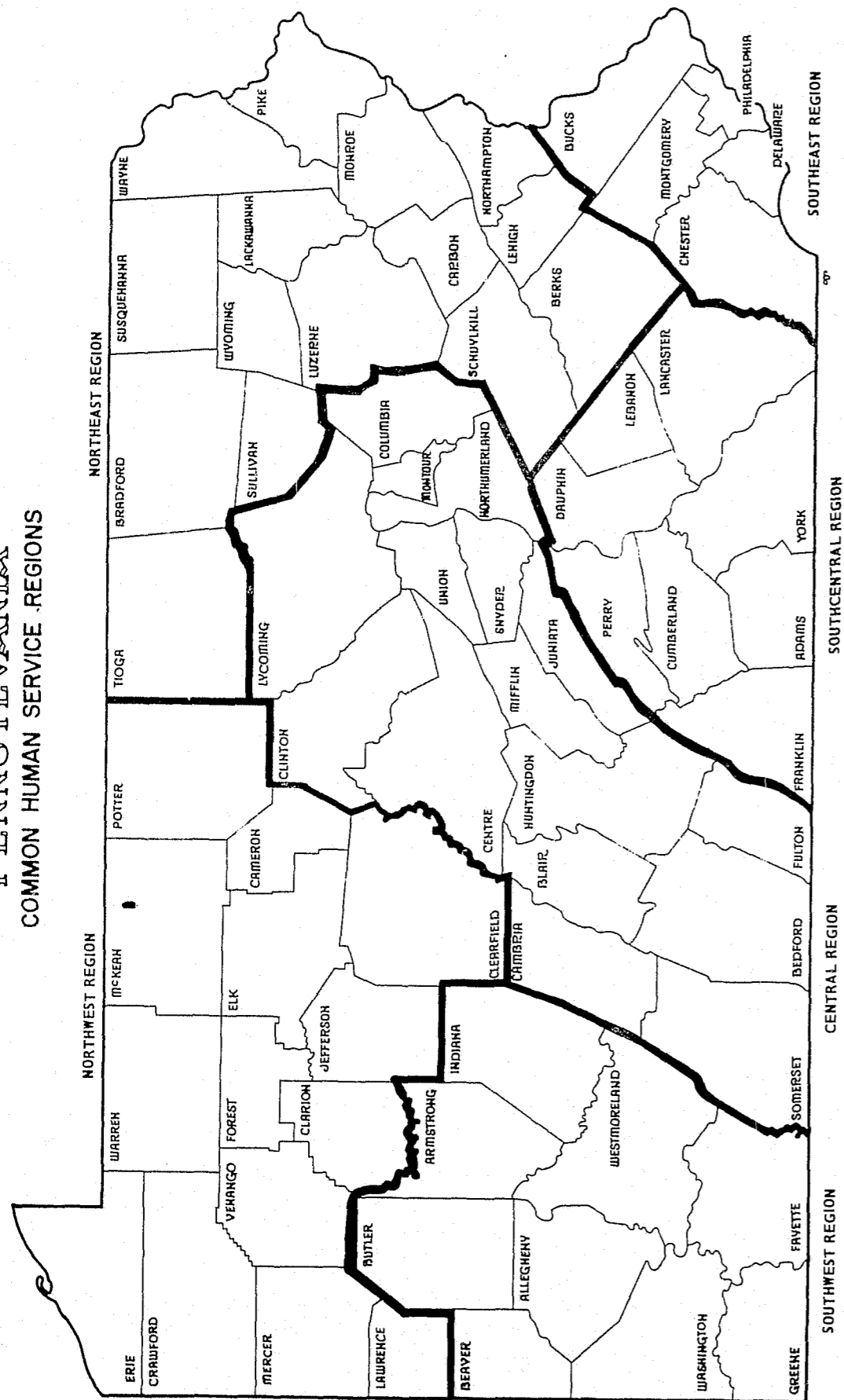

Throughout all of the SMSA's, suburban jurisdictions increased substantially over their core cities in total offenses reported. The core city jurisdictions increased 15.4 percent to 154,788 offenses in 1974 from 134,115 in 1973, but the suburban jurisdictions increased 25.1 percent to 160,960 offenses from 128,639 offenses in 1973.

VALUE OF PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED

The total value of property stolen during 1974 in Pennsylvania was \$141,061,272, of which only 34.6 percent or \$48,824,488 was recovered. Motor vehicles accounted for 49.1 percent of the value stolen and 82.9 percent of the total value recovered.

As outlined in the following table, motor vehicle theft, while composing only 12.9 percent of offenses involving property loss, accounted for a loss of 48.9 percent of all property stolen or \$69,046,086. Burglary accounted for 29.4 percent of all property loss with \$41,407,240. While larceny-theft had the highest number of offenses, its valued property loss amounted to \$24,821,932 or 17.6 percent.

The average value stolen by offense categories ranged from \$1,560 for motor vehicle theft to \$147 for larceny-theft down to insignificant values of \$5 taken in a forcible rape and \$4 in the commission of a murder.

VALUE OF PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED

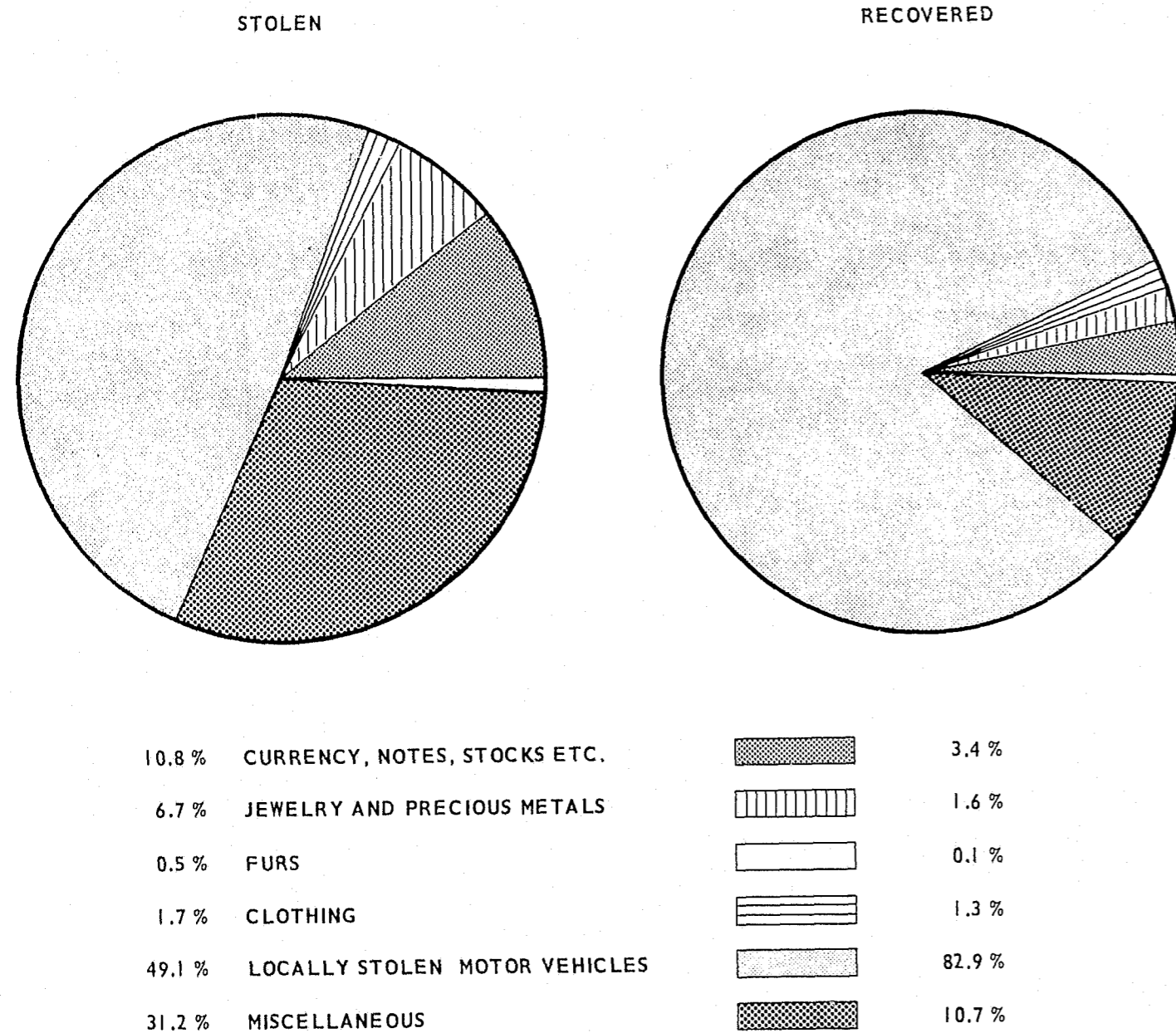

PERCENT RECOVERED OF PROPERTY STOLEN

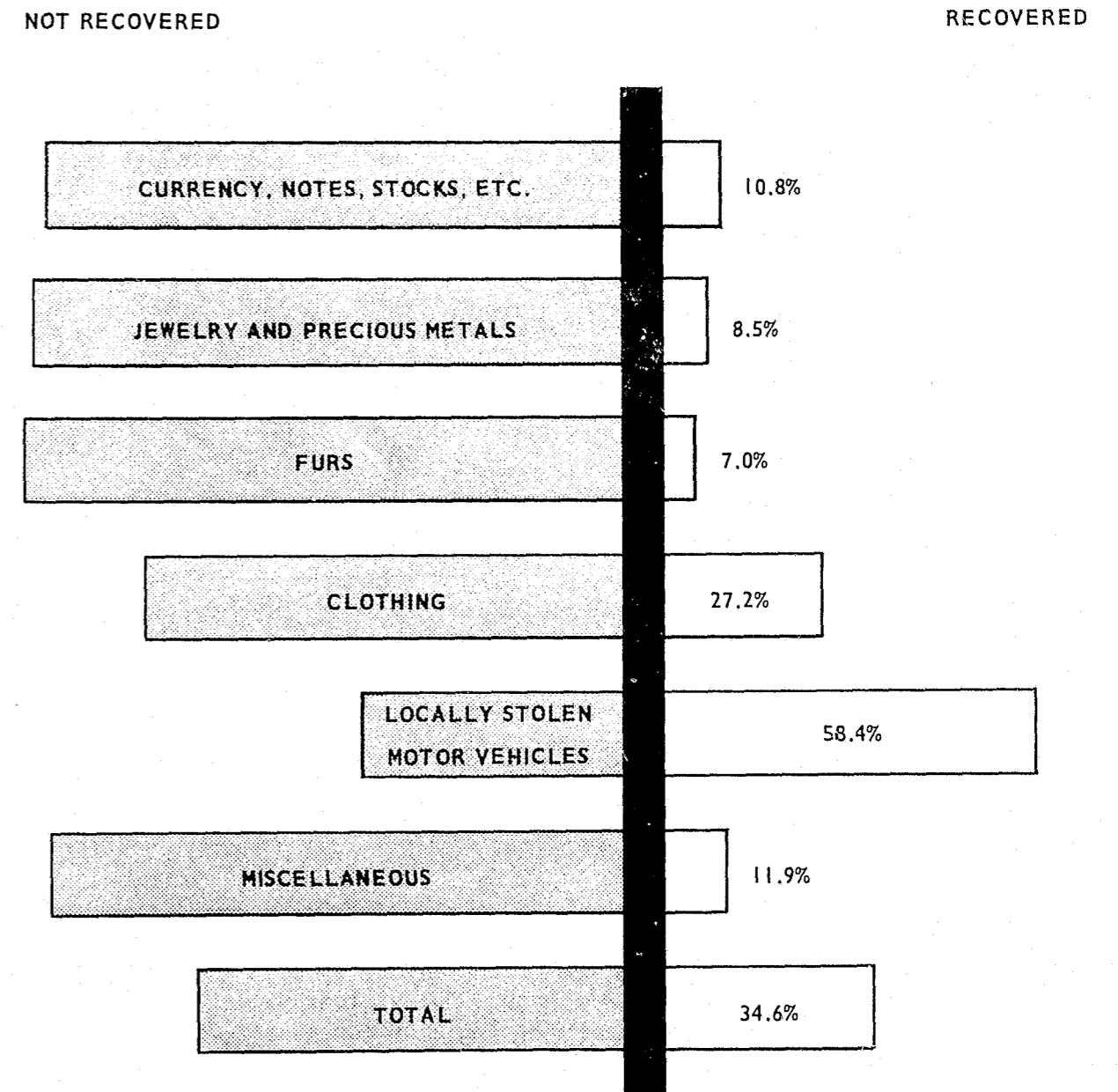
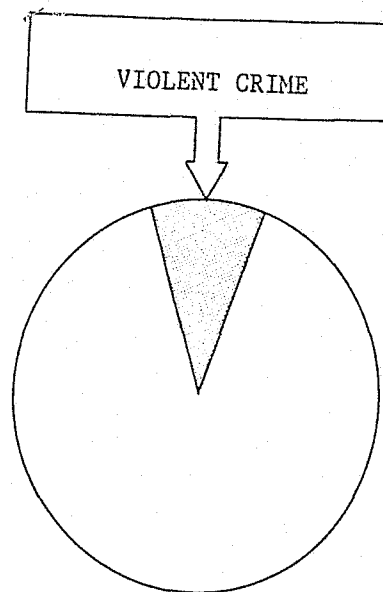

PENNSYLVANIA

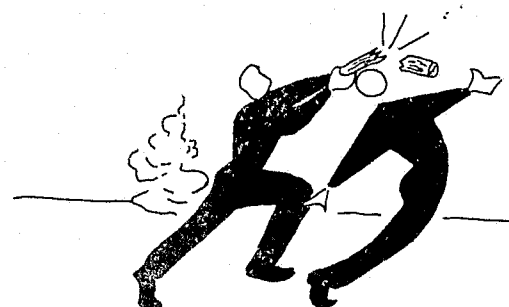

VOLUME, RATE, AND NATURE

A total of 37,189 Violent Crimes were reported during 1974 to Pennsylvania police departments, an average of 102 each day. The Violent Crime Index Rate was 308.6 for 1974. Violent Crimes represent 10.4 percent of all Crime Index Offenses in 1974.

The components of the 37,189 Violent Crimes were 789 murders (2.1 percent), 2,096 forcible rapes (5.6 percent), 18,835 robberies (50.6 percent) and 15,469 aggravated assaults (41.6 percent).

The Violent Crime Index Rate of 308.6 was composed of 6.5 for murder, 17.4 for forcible rape, 156.3 for robbery, and 128.3 for aggravated assault.

TREND

37,189 Violent Crimes represent a 14.8 percent change from 32,397 in 1973. The 308.6 rate represents a 14.1 percent increase from a 270.4 Violent Crime Rate in 1973.

CLEARANCES

During 1974, 45.4 percent or 16,882 of all Violent Crimes were cleared. Clearance rates for the components of Violent Crimes were 87.3 percent for murder, 60.0 percent for forcible rape, 30.6 percent for robbery, and 59.3 percent for aggravated assault. Police are able to clear a higher proportion of Violent Crimes, not only because of the more intense investigative effort afforded these crimes, but also because witnesses are usually available who can identify the perpetrators.

GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION

As outlined in the following table, 21,562 or 58.0 percent of all Violent Crimes during 1974 occurred in the Southeast CHSR, followed by 7,838 or 21.1 percent in the Southwest CHSR, these two regions accounting for 79.1 percent of all Violent Crimes in Pennsylvania. The Central CHSR had the lowest volume of Violent Crimes, 1,146 or 3.1 percent.

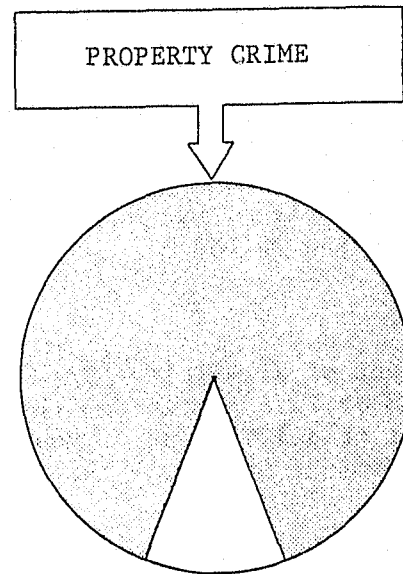
The Violent Crime Index Rate ranged from 536.2 in the Southeast CHSR to 110.2 in the Central CHSR. However, the Central CHSR had the highest clearance rate, 57.9, the Southwest CHSR having the lowest, 34.7

The highest rates of increase in Violent Crime offenses occurred in the South-central CHSR, 49.6 percent from 1973, and the Central CHSR, 40.6 percent over 1973. The lowest rate of increase was recorded in the Southwest CHSR, 3.2 percent over 1973.

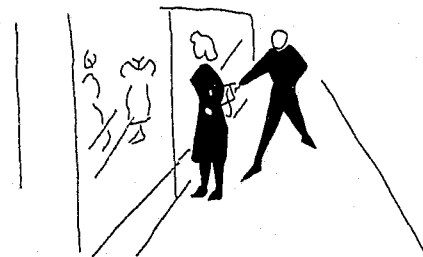

VOLUME, RATE, AND NATURE

A total of 321,942 Property Crimes were reported during 1974 to Pennsylvania police departments, an average of 882 each day. The Property Crime Index Rate was 2,671.1 for 1974.

The components of the 321,942 Property Crimes were 108,939 burglaries (33.8 percent), 168,734 larceny-thefts (52.4 percent), and 44,269 motor vehicle thefts (13.8 percent).

The Property Crime Index Rate of 2,671.1 was composed of 903.9 for burglary, 1,400.0 for larceny-theft, and 367.3 for motor vehicle theft.

TREND

321,942 Property Crimes represent a 21.3 percent increase over 265,361 Property Crimes in 1973. The 1974 Property Crime Index Rate of 2,671.1 was 20.6 percent higher than the 2,214.5 rate in 1973.

CLEARANCES

During 1974, 60,596 or 18.8 percent of all Property Crimes were cleared. Clearance rates for the components of Property Crimes were 18.7 percent for burglary, 19.6 percent for larceny-theft, and 16.1 percent for motor vehicle theft. Clearance rates for Property Crimes are generally much lower than rates for Violent Crimes, because of the stealth involved and general lack of witnesses.

GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION

As outlined in the following table, 133,171 Property Crimes or 41.4 percent occurred in the Southeast CHSR, followed by 69,071 Property Crimes or 21.5 percent in the Southwest CHSR. Thus, these two regions accounted for 62.9 percent of all Property Crimes in 1974. The Central CHSR had the lowest volume of Property Crimes in 1974, 21,027 or 6.5 percent.

Property Crime Index Rates ranged from 3,311.8 in the Southeast CHSR to 1,584.8 in the Central CHSR.

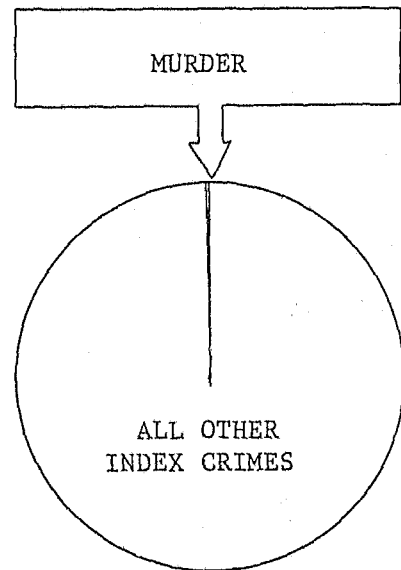
The Southcentral CHSR had the highest clearance rate in 1974, 28.5 percent, while the Southwest CHSR had the lowest clearance rate, 13.9 percent.

The Southcentral CHSR had a rate of increase in Property Crimes of 33.9 percent from 1973, followed closely by the Central CHSR with an increase of 33.3 percent over 1973. The lowest rate of increase over 1973 was reported in the Southwest CHSR, 16.6 percent.

PENNSYLVANIA



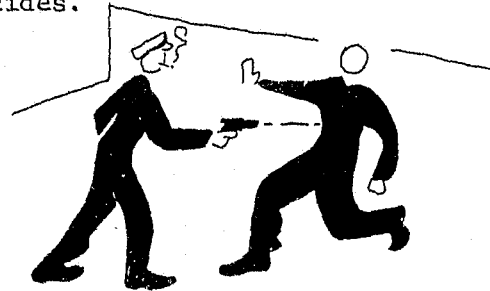

DEFINITION: Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter includes all willful killings without due process and is scored on the basis of police investigation as opposed to any decision of a court, coroner, jury, or other judicial body. Deaths caused by negligence are not included in this category but are counted as manslaughters by negligence. Attempts or assaults to kill are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. The crime count for this offense classification also excludes suicides, accidental deaths and justifiable homicides.

VOLUME AND RATE

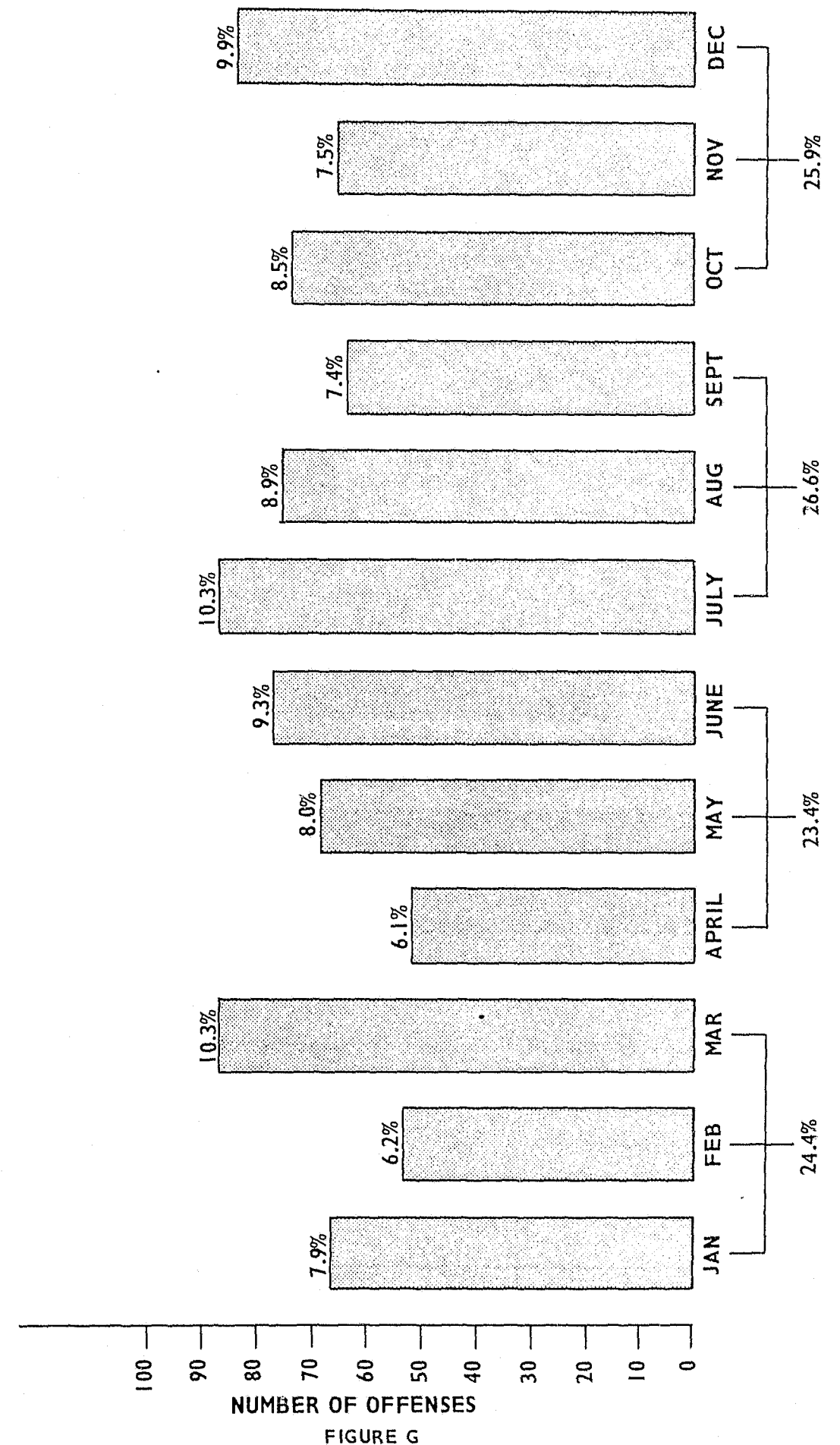
A total of 789 murders were reported during 1974 to Pennsylvania police departments, an average of 2 each day. Murder comprised 0.2 percent of all Index Crimes and 2.1 percent of all Violent Crimes. The victimization rate was 6.5 per 100,000 population (Table I).

CLEARANCES

Of the 789 murders that occurred during 1974, 689 or 87.3 percent were cleared. This represents the highest clearance rate of any of the Index Offenses.

MURDER DISTRIBUTION OF VICTIMS BY AGE GROUP

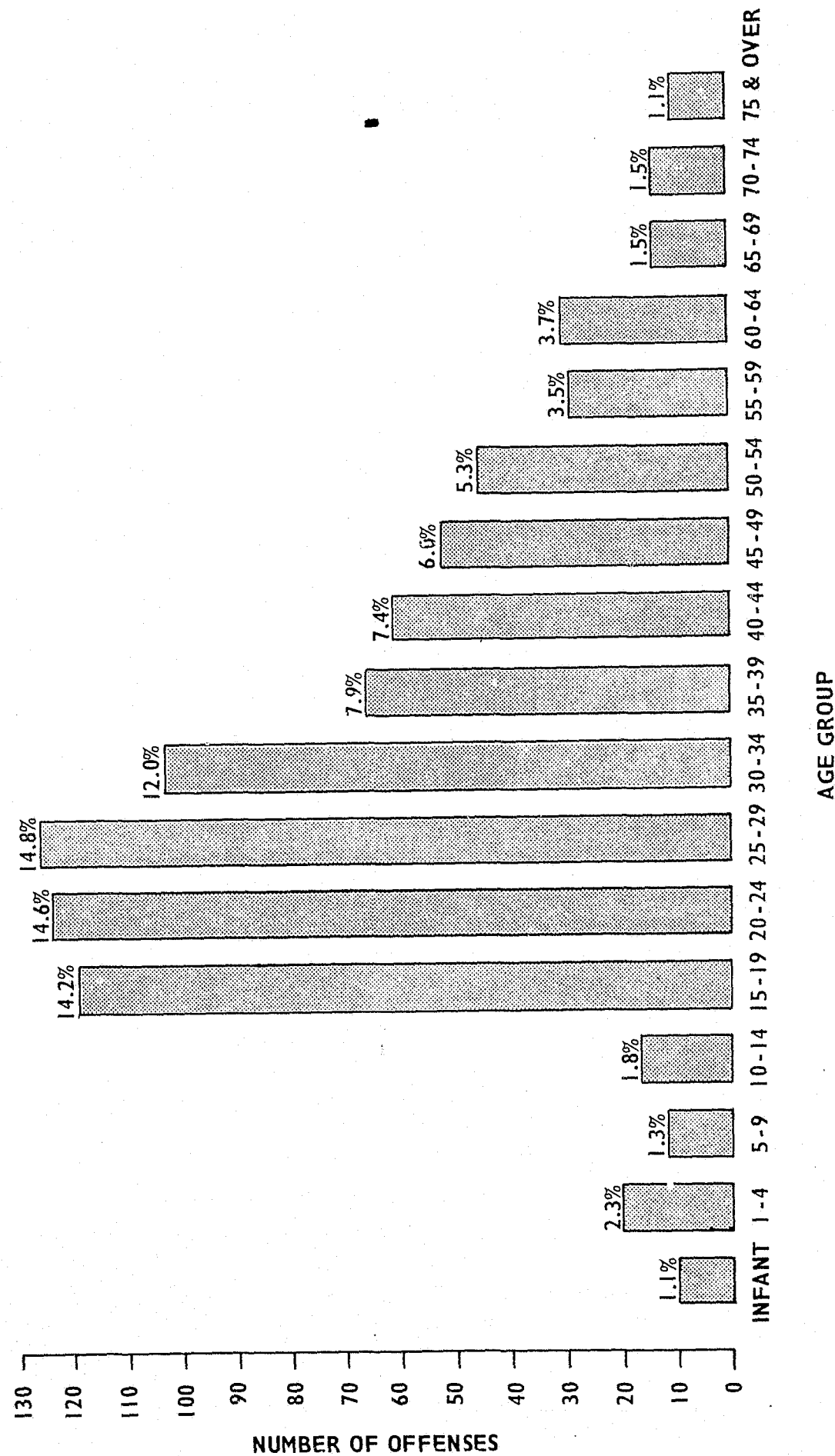

As outlined in the following table by population grouping, the only city in Pennsylvania with over 1,000,000 inhabitants (Philadelphia) accounted for 444 murders or 56.3 percent of the state total with a 23.0 Index Rate per 100,000 population. The rate of clearance was 82.2 percent.

Municipalities with 25,000 - 50,000 population accounted for 32 murders or 4.1 percent of the state total with a 2.5 Index Rate. The percent cleared was 87.5.

The city with 250,000 - 1,000,000 population (Pittsburgh) reported 70 murders and had the highest rate of clearance among municipalities, 98.6 percent.

GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION

As outlined in the following table, the highest volume of murders occurred in the Southeast CHSR, with 520 murders of 65.9 percent, and the Southwest CHSR with 140 murders or 17.7 percent. These two regions totalled 83.6 percent of murders in 1974. The Central CHSR had the lowest volume, 20 or 2.5 percent of total murders.

The Murder Crime Index ranged from 12.9 in the the Southeast CHSR to 1.9 in the Central CHSR.

The Northwest CHSR reported a clearance rate of 116 percent while the Southeast CHSR had the lowest clearance rate of 83.3 percent.

MURDER BY TYPE OF WEAPON

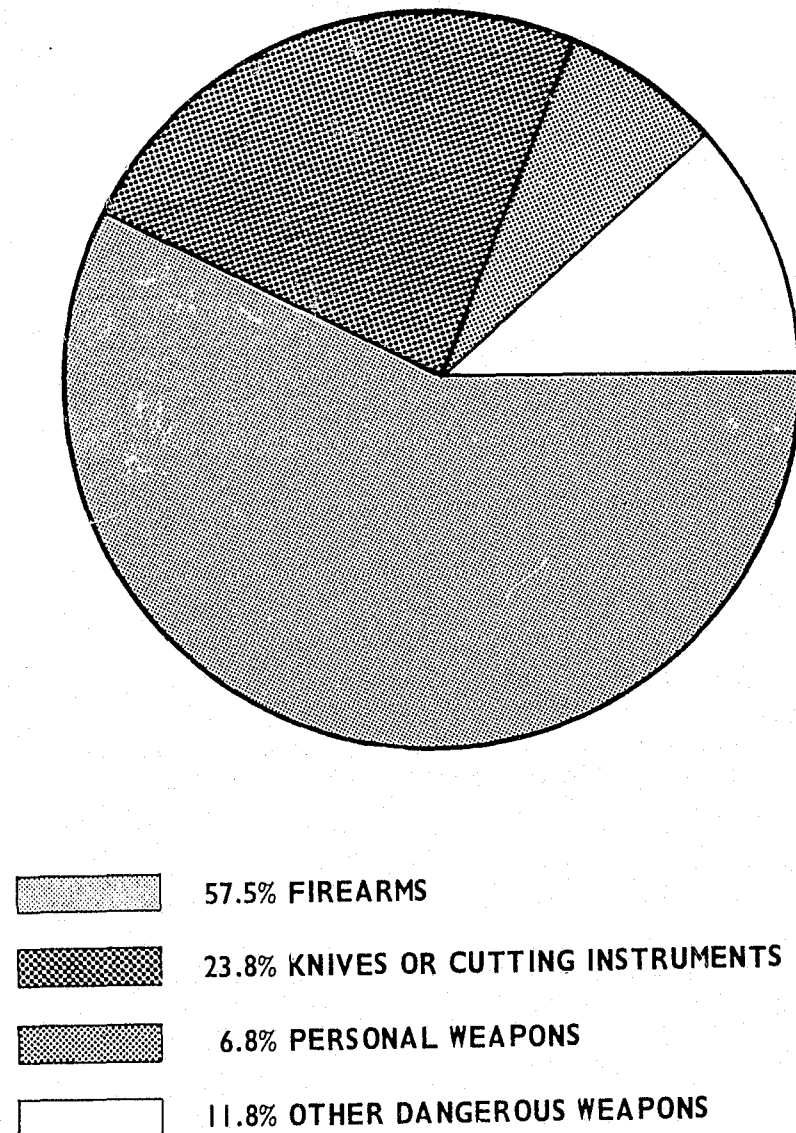

FREQUENCY

Murder, by month of year, is depicted in Figure G. The highest frequency of murder was in the months of March and July, each with 81 offenses (10.3 percent) and the lowest in the month of April with 48 offenses (6.1 percent). The third quarter of the year (July, August and September) had the greatest frequency of murder compared to the other quarters of the year.

AGE, RACE AND SEX OF VICTIM

In 1974, murder victims were predominately males, who accounted for 76.8 percent of the total. See Table 5. Victim analysis by race discloses that 39.1 percent were white and 60.9 percent were non-white. The largest number of murders occurring in any ten year age bracket was in the 20 to 29 group (29 percent).

MURDER WEAPONS

In 1974, firearms, chiefly handguns, predominated as the weapon most often used in the commission of the crime.

Statewide, 57.5 percent of the reported murders were attributed to the use of firearms (Table 6, Figures I and J). The use of cutting or stabbing weapons represented 23.8 percent of the state total. Personal weapons such as hands, fists, feet, etc., were used in 6.8 percent of all murders, with the remaining 11.8 percent being attributed to the use of other weapons such as blunt objects, narcotics and drugs, arson, explosives, etc.

CIRCUMSTANCES CAUSING MURDER

The circumstances which result in murder vary from family arguments to felonious activities (Table 7, Figure K). In 1974, murder within the family made up 20.7 percent of the state total. Over one-half of these family killings involved spouse killing spouse. The remainder were parent killing child and other in-family killing.

MURDER BY TYPE OF WEAPON

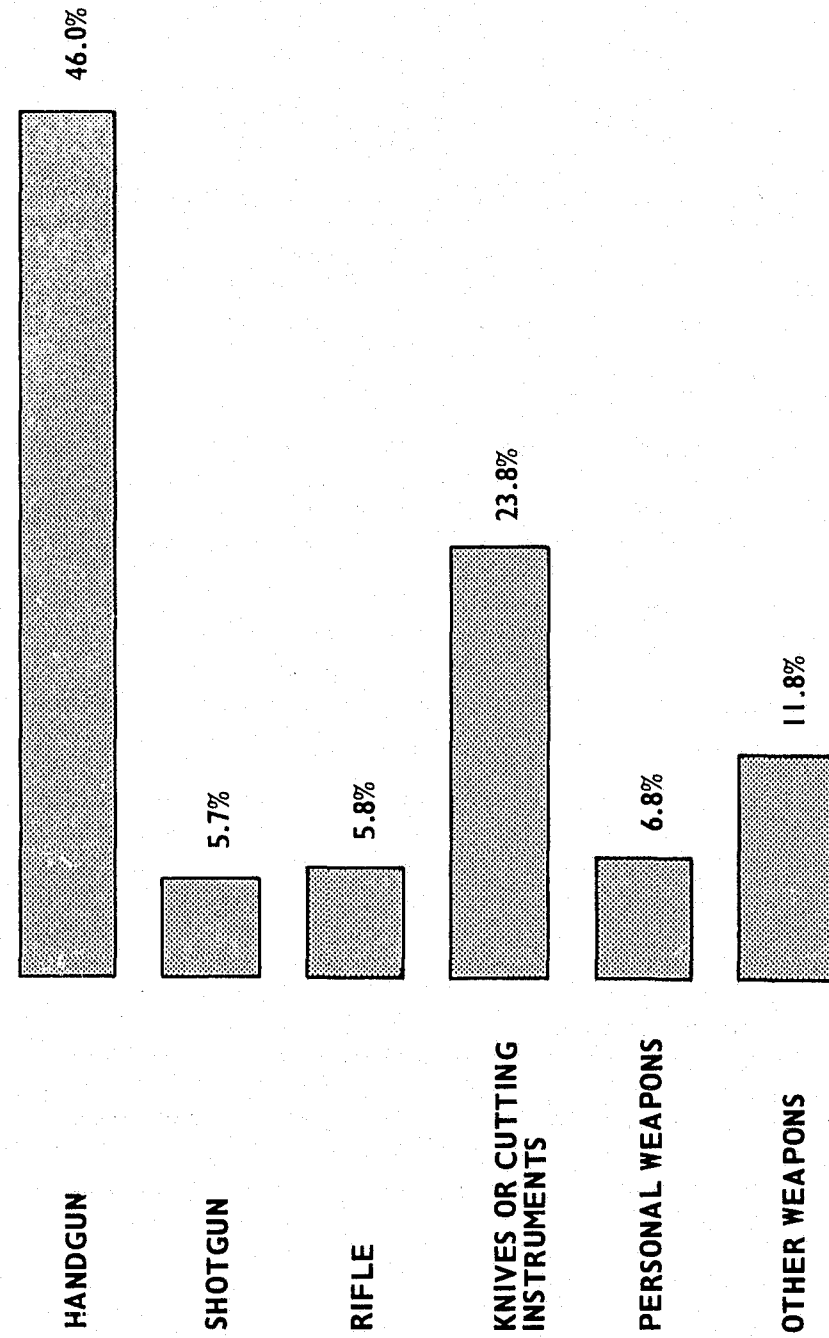

The most prevalent of circumstances surrounding murder were those incidents involving an altercation or quarrel between acquaintances. The frequency of this type of situation is reflected by 48.4 percent of the total number of murders it represents.

Crime related circumstances such as gang killings, institutional killings and felony killings represent 24.8 percent.

The 6.1 percent listed under Miscellaneous completes the data in this area.

JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDES

In addition to the 789 homicides, 55 justifiable homicides were reported by police agencies. The justifiable homicides all involved the killing of a felon by a police officer or private citizen and are omitted from this analysis.

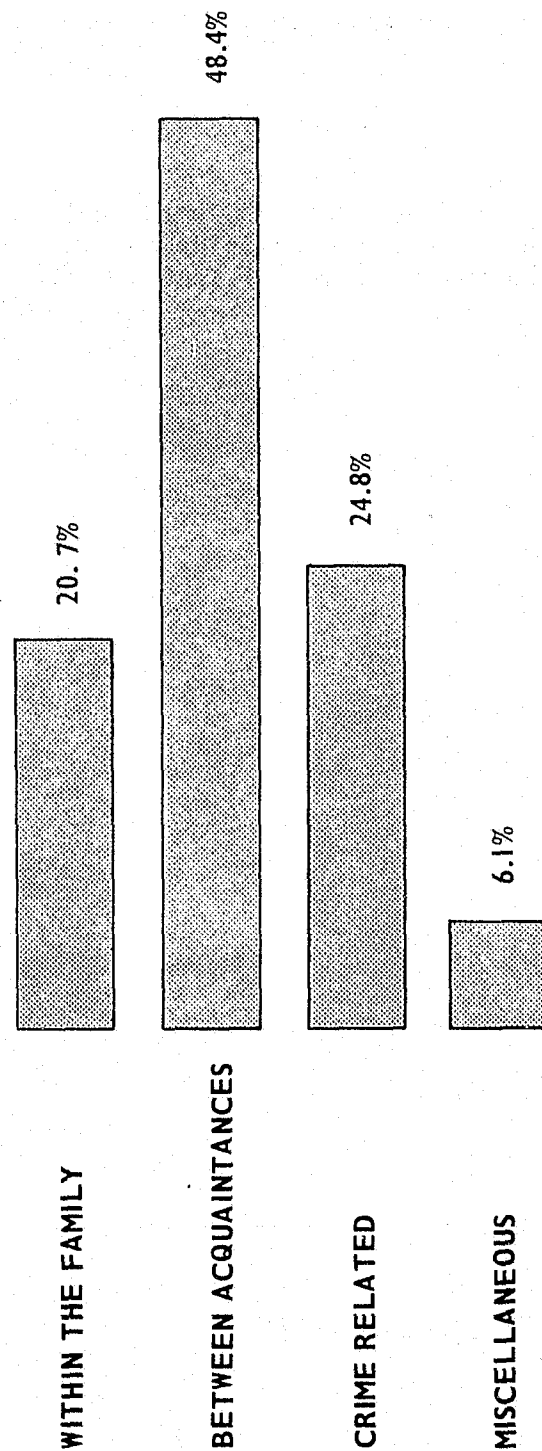
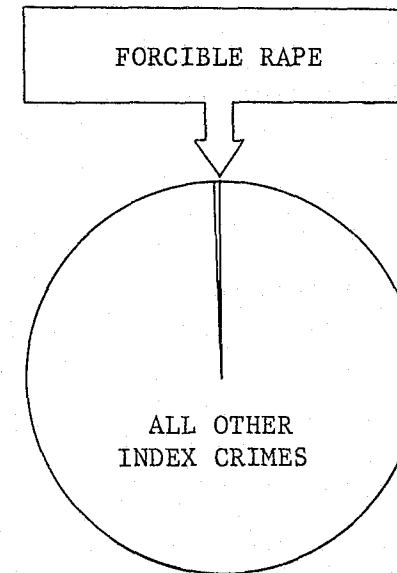


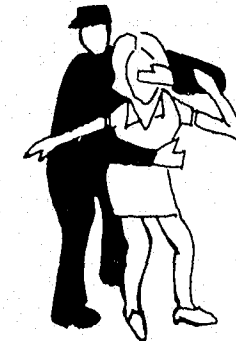

Assaults or attempts to commit forcible rape are included; however, statutory rape (without force) is not counted. Crime counts in this category are limited to actual offenses of forcible rape or attempts, as established by police investigation.

VOLUME, RATE, AND NATURE

A total of 2,096 forcible rapes were reported to Pennsylvania police departments during 1974, an average of 6 each day. This offense represents 5.6 percent of all Violent Crimes and only 0.6 percent of all Crime Index Offenses.

While the Forcible Rape Crime Index Rate for 1974 was 17.4, the rate per 100,000 Pennsylvania females was 33.5, which places the rate in its proper perspective as a victim risk rate, since it equates the number of crimes per unit of population.

Actual rape by force accounted for 75.6 percent of forcible rape or 1,585, and the remaining 24.4 percent representing 511 cases of assaults to commit rape or attempts to commit rape. Of all the Index Crimes, law enforcement administrators recognize rape as one of the most unreported crimes, primarily because of fear and/or embarrassment on the part of the victim. In addition, 14.2 percent or 348 of all reported rape cases in 1974 were unfounded by police investigation. This is primarily due to the question of the use or

threat of force frequently complicated by a prior relationship between the victim and the offender.

TREND

The 2,096 forcible rapes in 1974 are an 11.8 percent increase from 1,875 in 1973. Similarly, the Index Rate of 17.4 is an 11.5 percent increase over 1973's 15.6 rate. Actual rapes increased by 14.9 percent over 1973, while attempted rape only increased 3.2 percent over 1973.

CLEARANCES

During 1974, 60.0 percent or 1,257 of all forcible rapes were cleared. Actual forcible rapes were cleared in 62.7 percent of the 1,585 cases and attempted rape in 51.5 percent of the 511 cases.

GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION

As outlined in the following table, 52.9 percent or 1,108 cases of all forcible rapes reported in 1974 occurred in the Southeast CHSR, followed by 22.2 percent or 465 cases in the Southwest CHSR. The lowest occurrence of rape by regions is in the Central CHSR where 4.0 percent or 83 cases were reported.

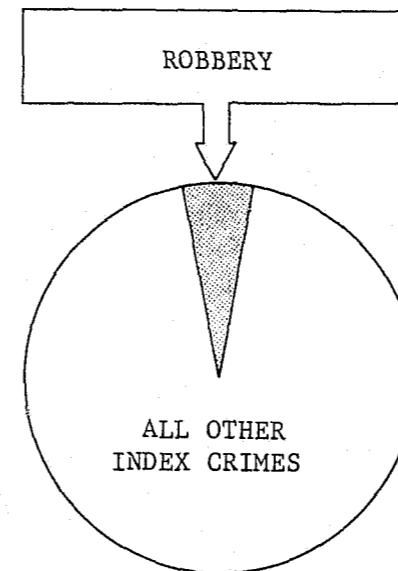
The Forcible Rape Crime Rate ranged from 27.6 in the Southeast CHSR to 8.0 in the Central CHSR.

The Northeast CHSR had the largest increase of rape cases over 1973, 39.4 percent. Rape cases actually declined 20.9 percent in the Northwest CHSR and 1.2 percent in the Central CHSR.

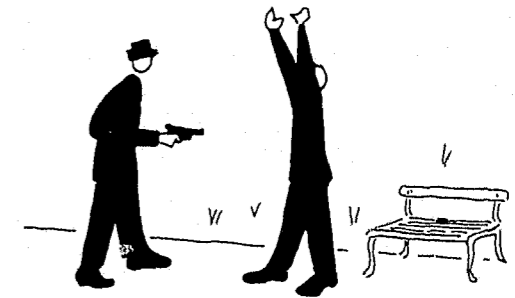

DEFINITION: Robbery is a vicious type of crime which takes place in the presence of the victim to obtain property or a thing of value from a person by use of force or threat of force. Assaults to rob and attempts are included. Robbery is violent crime that sometimes results in injury to the victim. Both armed robberies where any weapon is used, and strong-arm robberies where no weapon other than a personal weapon is employed ("mugging") are included in this category.

VOLUME, RATE, AND NATURE

A total of 18,835 robberies were reported to Pennsylvania police departments in 1974, an average of 52 each day. Robberies represented 5.2 percent of all Crime Index Offenses, and 50.6 percent of all Violent Crimes.

Robberies with firearms represented 43.6 percent or 8,209 of all robberies in 1974; with knife or cutting instruments, 12.4 percent or 2,336; with other dangerous weapons, 4.7 percent or 880; and strong-arm robberies (no weapons), 39.3 percent or 7,410.

The Crime Index Rate for robbery in 1974 was 156.3, sub-divided to 68.1 for robberies with firearms, 19.4 for robberies with knives or cutting instruments, 7.3 for robberies with other dangerous weapons, and 61.5 for strong-arm robberies.

TREND

Robberies increased 14.2 percent from 16,498 in 1973 to 18,835 in 1974. The Robbery Crime Index Rate increased 13.5 percent from 137.7 in 1973 to 156.3 in 1974. Armed robberies (with weapons) increased 14.8 percent over 1973 and strong-arm robberies increased 10.6 percent over 1973.

CLEARANCES

30.6 percent or 5,768 robberies were cleared during 1974. Robberies with firearms were cleared in 25.7 percent or 2,107 cases; with knife or cutting instruments, 33.2 percent or 776 cases; with other dangerous weapons, 39.4 percent or 347; and strong-arm robberies, 34.3 percent or 2,538 cases.

GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION

As outlined in the following table, the highest volume of robberies occurred in the two CHSR's with the most metropolitan characteristics; the Southeast CHSR with 11,963 robberies or 63.5 percent, and the Southwest CHSR, 4,019 robberies or 21.3 percent. Together, 84.7 percent of all robberies occurred in these two regions. The least amount of robberies were recorded in the Central CHSR, 273 or 1.4 percent.

The Robbery Index Rate ranged from 297.5 in the Southeast CHSR to 26.3 in the Central CHSR.

However, the highest rate of clearances of robberies occurred in the Central CHSR, 41.0 percent. The lowest rate occurred in the Southwest CHSR, 21.4 percent.

The Southcentral CHSR showed the greatest increase in robberies from 1973 with a 36.1 percent jump during 1974. The Southwest CHSR had the smallest increase over 1973, 0.4 percent.

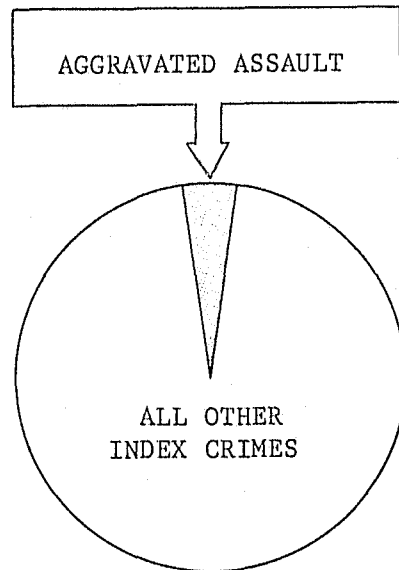

As outlined in the above table, \$5,772,683 in property was stolen during the 18,835 robberies reported in 1974, with an average value per robbery of \$306. The highest average value was \$3,767 stolen in bank robberies during 1974, even though these cases represented only 1.3 percent or 252 of all robberies.

Highway robberies in streets, alleys, etc. represented 54.1 percent of all robberies, and 28.5 percent of all value stolen or \$1,644,178, but had only an average value per robbery of \$161. The second highest type of robbery was commercial houses (except gas or service stations, chain stores, or banks) where 19.7 percent or 3,719 accounted for 20.3 percent of all value stolen, \$1,169,325.

DEFINITION: Aggravated assault is defined as an unlawful attack by one person upon another with the intent to inflict great bodily injury, usually accomplished by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or serious body harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury were the crime successfully completed. Attempted murders are included in this category.

VOLUME, RATE, AND NATURE

A total of 15,469 aggravated assaults were reported to Pennsylvania police departments during 1974, an average of 42 each day. Aggravated assaults totalled 4.3 percent of all Crime Index Offenses and 41.6 percent of all Violent Crimes.

Aggravated assaults were composed of 3,120 cases with firearms (20.2 percent), 3,903 cases with knife or cutting instruments (25.2 percent), 2,727 cases with other dangerous weapons (17.6 percent), and 5,719 cases by hands, fists, feet, etc. (37.0 percent).

The Crime Index Rate for aggravated assaults in 1974 was 128.3. The rate for the components of aggravated assaults were 25.9 for assaults with firearms, 32.4 for assaults with knife or cutting instrument, 22.6 for other dangerous weapons, and 47.4 for assaults by hands, feet, fists, etc.

TREND

Aggravated assaults increased 16.6 percent from 13,270 in 1973 to 15,469 in 1974. The Index Rate for aggravated assaults increased 15.9 percent from 110.7 in 1973 to 128.3 in 1974. While assaults with firearms increased 7.6 percent from 1973, assaults with knife or cutting instruments 9.1 percent over 1973, and assaults with dangerous weapons 4.5 percent over 1973, assaults with hands, fists, feet, etc., jumped 36.6 percent from 1973.

CLEARANCES

59.3 percent or 9,170 aggravated assaults were cleared in 1974. Clearance rates for the components of aggravated assault were 57.3 percent for assaults with firearms, 62.0 percent for assaults with knife or cutting instrument, 54.9 percent for assaults with other dangerous weapons, and 60.4 percent for assaults with hands, fist, feet, etc.

GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION

As outlined in the following table, the highest volume of aggravated assaults occurred in the Southeast CHSR, with 7,971 assaults or 51.5 percent, and in the Southwest CHSR, with 3,214 assaults or 20.8 percent. These two regions accounted for 72.3 percent of all aggravated assaults in 1974. The lowest number of aggravated assaults occurred in the Northwest CHSR, 653 or 4.2 percent.

The Aggravated Assault Rate ranged from 198.2 in the Southeast CHSR to 67.6 in the Northwest CHSR.

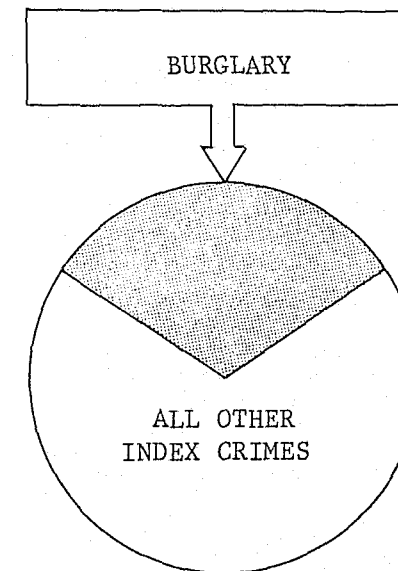

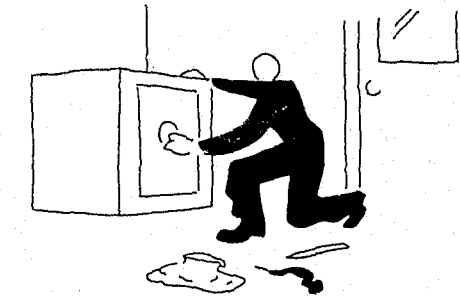

It is not necessary for force to be used to gain or attempt to gain entrance in order for the event to be classified as a burglary. Moreover, a loss does not have to occur in the case of an illegal entry for it to be counted.

VOLUME, RATE, AND NATURE

A total of 108,939 burglaries were reported to Pennsylvania police departments during 1974, an average of 298 each day. Burglary comprised 30.3 percent of all Index Crimes and 33.8 percent of all Property Crimes.

Forcible entry occurred in 82,178 cases or 75.4 percent of all burglaries. Unlawful entry without force accounted for 18,981 cases or 17.4 percent of all burglaries, and attempted forcible entry totaled 7,780 cases or 7.1 percent of all burglaries.

The Crime Index Rate for burglary was 903.9. This rate is an accumulation of 681.8 for forcible entry, 157.5 for unlawful entry without force, and 64.5 for attempted forcible entry.

TREND

Burglary climbed 18.3 percent to 108,939 in 1974, from 92,078 in 1973. The Crime Index Rate increased 17.6 percent to 903.9 in 1974, from 768.4 in 1973.

The components of burglary increased as follows over 1973: forcible entry, 19.1 percent; unlawful entry without force, 16.4 percent; and attempted forcible entry, 14.7 percent.

CLEARANCES

Burglary is a crime of stealth, a characteristic tending to make detection of the perpetrator more difficult. Only 18.7 percent of all burglaries in 1974 were cleared. Clearance for forcible entry was slightly higher, 20.0 percent. Unlawful entry without force was cleared in 16.9 percent of these cases, while attempted forcible entry was only cleared in 9.5 percent of such cases.

GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION

As outlined in the following table, 43,617 or 40.0 percent of all burglaries occurred in the Southeast CHSR, and 23,802 or 21.8 percent of all burglaries occurred in the Southwest CHSR. These two regions accounted for 61.8 percent of all burglaries. The least number of burglaries by CHSR was found in the Central CHSR, with 7,648 or 7.0 percent.

The Burglary Rates range from 1,084.7 in the Southeast CHSR to 735.7 in the Central CHSR.

The Southeast CHSR had the highest percent of clearance with 22.9 percent, and the Northeast CHSR, the lowest with 13.9 percent.

The Southcentral CHSR showed the largest increase over 1973 with a 32.4 percent jump, followed by 28.0 percent increase in the Central CHSR. The Northwest CHSR had the lowest increase over 1973, with a 14.2 percent gain.

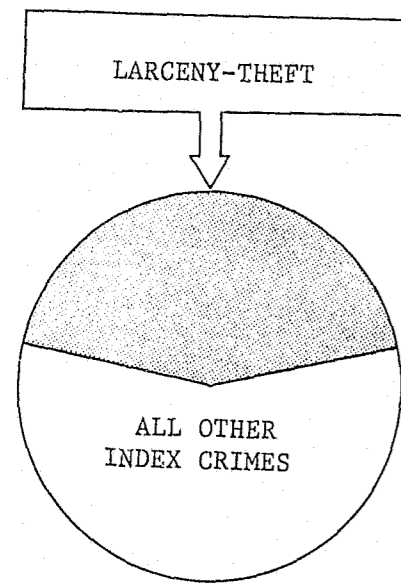

\$41,407,240 was stolen in burglaries during 1974, with an average value of \$380. Burglaries of residence-dwelling accounted for 56.4 percent or 61,397 of all burglaries with a total value amount of \$24,166,955 or 58.4 percent of all value stolen by burglaries in 1974, with an average value of \$394. The majority of residence burglaries occurred during the night, where 25.5 percent or 27,748 burglaries accounted for 26.2 percent or \$10,853,563 of all value stolen and average value of \$391 for each such burglary.

Nonresidence burglaries (stores, offices, factories, etc.) accounted for only 43.6 percent or 47,542 burglaries and 41.6 percent or \$17,240,285 of value stolen, with an average value of \$363 for each such burglary. The amount of night burglary of nonresidences was 30.1 percent of value stolen or \$12,448,619, with an average value \$365 for each of 34,100 such burglaries.

PENNSYLVANIA



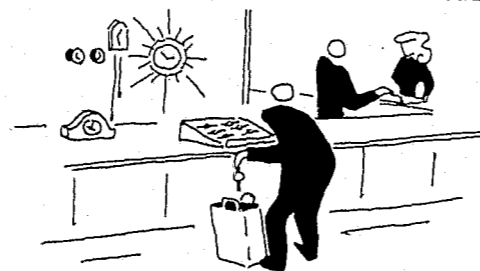

DEFINITION: Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles of value without the use of force, violence, or fraud. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, bicycle theft, etc. For the purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting, this offense category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery or worthless checks. Auto theft is a separate Index Crime and, therefore, is also excluded.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND

Larceny-theft was the most voluminous Crime Index category in Pennsylvania during 1974. A total of 168,734 larceny-thefts were reported to Pennsylvania police departments, an average of 462 each day. Larceny-theft represented 47.0 percent of all Crime Index Offenses, and 52.4 percent of all Property Crimes in 1974.

The Larceny-theft Crime Index for 1974, was 168,734, and a 30.0 percent increase over 129,810 in 1973. The rate per 100,000 for larceny-theft was 1,400.0 in 1974, a 29.3 percent increase from 1,083.3 in 1973.

CLEARANCES

The nature of larceny-theft, a crime of opportunity, sneak thievery, and petty unobserved thefts, makes it an extremely difficult offense for law enforcement officers to solve. Two elements, a lack of witnesses and a tremendous volume of this crime, works in the offender's favor. 19.6 percent or 33,031 larceny-thefts were cleared in 1974.

GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION

As outlined in the following table, 65,103 cases or 38.6 percent of all larceny-thefts occurred in the Southeast CHSR and 33,658 cases or 19.9 percent were reported in the Southwest CHSR. These two regions accounted for 58.3 percent of all larceny-thefts. The lowest volume was revealed in the Central CHSR, where only 12,284 or 7.3 percent larceny-thefts were totaled.

The Northwest CHSR had the highest rate of clearance, 22.8 percent, followed by the Southeast CHSR, 22.1 percent. The Northeast CHSR had the lowest rate of clearance for larceny-theft, 15.6 percent.

The Larceny-theft Rate ranged from 1,619.0 in the Southeast CHSR to 1,171.4 in the Southwest CHSR.

Larceny-theft jumped in the Central CHSR by 40.1 percent over 1973, followed closely with a 37.3 percent increase in the Southcentral CHSR. The smallest increase over 1973 was in the Southwest CHSR with a 25.7 percent gain.

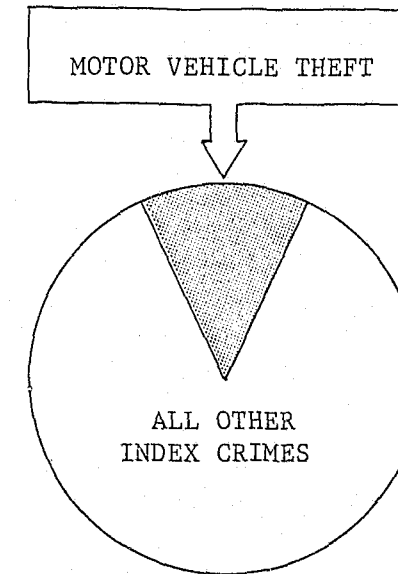
\$24,821,932 in property was stolen in the 168,734 larceny-thefts reported in 1974, an average value of \$147.

Thefts from motor vehicles (except motor vehicle parts and accessories) represented the largest classification of larceny-theft in 1974, 18.6 percent or 31,308 larceny-thefts amounting to \$5,308,532 or 21.4 percent of all value stolen, with an average value of \$170. The 30,350 (18.0 percent) all other larceny-thefts accounted for the highest values of property stolen, \$7,388,307 (29.8 percent) and the highest average value, \$243.

The components of larceny-theft were 27,788 for larceny-theft over \$200 (16.5 percent) for a total value of \$17,127,440 (69.0 percent of all larceny-theft value), and an average of \$616; 62,514 for larceny-theft between \$50 and \$200 (37.1 percent) for a total value of \$6,049,643 (24.9 percent of all larceny-theft value) and an average of \$97; 78,432 for larceny-theft under \$50 (46.5 percent) for a total value of \$1,644,849 (6.6 percent of all larceny-theft value) and an average of \$21.

Under the old category of larceny-theft \$50 and over, and under \$50, the following picture emerges: larceny-theft \$50 and over totaled 90,302 or a 49.6 percent increase from 60,350 in 1973, and larceny-theft under \$50 totaled 78,432, or a 12.9 percent increase from 69,460 in 1973.

DEFINITION: Motor vehicle theft is defined as the stealing of a motor vehicle, or driving the vehicle without the owner's consent. Attempted motor vehicle thefts are included. Specifically excluded is the temporary use when the vehicle is actually returned by the user, and lawful access to the vehicle has been granted or can be assumed. This category includes theft of motor-driven vehicles, such as automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motor scooters, and snowmobiles.

VOLUME, RATE, AND NATURE

A total of 44,269 motor vehicle thefts were reported to Pennsylvania police departments during 1974, an average of 121 each day. Motor vehicle theft represented 12.3 percent of all Crime Index Offenses and 13.8 percent of all Property Crimes in 1974.

1974 is the first year that a breakdown of types of motor vehicle thefts is available. 40,096 or 90.8 percent of motor vehicle thefts were automobiles, 4.9 percent or 2,177 were trucks and buses, and 4.5 percent or 1,996 were all other types of motor vehicles.

The Motor Vehicle Theft Crime Rate in 1974 was 367.3, composed of 332.7 for automobiles, 18.1 for trucks and buses, and 16.6 for all other vehicles.

TREND

Motor Vehicle Theft increased only 1.8 percent from 43,473 in 1973 to 44,269 in 1974. The rate per 100,000 increased 1.2 percent to 367.3 in 1974 from 362.8 in 1973. These are the lowest changes over 1973 among 1974 Crime Index Offenses.

CLEARANCES

7,146 or 16.1 percent of all motor vehicles thefts were cleared in 1974. The clearance rate for the components of motor vehicle theft in 1974 were 16.6 percent or 6,653 for automobiles, 11.0 percent or 240 for trucks and buses, and 12.7 percent or 253 for all other vehicles. In general, motor vehicle theft had the lowest clearance rate of all the Crime Index Offenses.

GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION

As outlined in the following table, 24,451 or 55.2 percent of all motor vehicle thefts were reported in the Southeast CHSR, followed by 11,611 or 26.2 percent in the Southwest CHSR. These two regions accounted for 81.4 percent of all motor vehicle thefts in 1974. The lowest amount of motor vehicle thefts was totaled in the Central CHSR, 1,095 or 2.5 percent.

The Motor Vehicle Theft Rate ranged from 608.1 in the Southeast CHSR to 105.3 in the Central CHSR.

However, the Central CHSR led in clearances with 23.8 percent cleared, while the Southwest CHSR had by far the lowest clearance rate, 6.8 percent.

The Southcentral CHSR increase 17.6 percent over 1973, to register the largest gain in 1974, while the Southwest CHSR actually declined 0.4 percent from 1973.

RECOVERY RATE

27,982 stolen motor vehicles or 63.2 percent of all stolen motor vehicles in 1974 were recovered for the jurisdictions from which they were stolen. Local police recovered 21,798 motor vehicles or 77.9 percent locally and 6,184 or 22.1 percent of local motor vehicle thefts were recovered by other police jurisdictions.

PART II OFFENSES

Pennsylvania has one of the few state UCR Programs that collect Part II Offenses reported to the police and subsequent clearances. In 1974, 355,733 Part II Offenses were reported by Pennsylvania police agencies, an increase of 10.4 percent over the 1973 total of 322,122 (Table 1).

While there are nineteen distinct Part II Offenses in Pennsylvania, over 90 percent of these offenses reported in 1974, came from just eight categories. These eight offenses, summarized in the following table, can be considered then to be the "leaders" among Part II Offenses in terms of volume and rate per 100,000 population.

It has been found, contrary to thinking in some quarters, that Part II Offenses are not cleared on a one-to-one basis. A review of Table 1 will show, for example, that extremely high clearance rates (over 90 percent) were achieved for six Part II Offenses: stolen property, prostitution, gambling, driving under the influence, liquor law violations and drunkenness. On the other hand, a very low clearance rate (11.6 percent) was attained for vandalism, the largest volume Part II Offense.

DISTRIBUTION BY COUNTY OF PART II OFFENSES

The following table identifies the fifteen counties ranking highest in 1) Part II Offenses reported and 2) rate per 100,000 population.

The counties listed at the left of the above table accounted for 78.9 percent of all Part II Offenses reported in 1974. These fifteen counties were all urban. Ten of the fifteen counties with highest rate per 100,000 population shown on the right portion of the table were urban.

A review of Table 8, from which the above table was derived, will indicate variances in the Part II Rate per 100,000 population among the urban (SMSA) counties from 4,714.3 in Dauphin County and 4,707.8 in Philadelphia County to 1,479.3 in Carbon County. Similar variations occurred among rural counties, with a range from 4,122.1 in Lebanon County and 3,885.2 in Forest County to 995.9 in Juniata County and 764.0 in Potter County.

PART II OFFENSES BY COMMON HUMAN SERVICE REGION (CHSR)

The following table summarizes the distribution of reported Part II Offenses among the six Common Human Service Region in Pennsylvania.

Almost half of all Part II Offenses - 160,062, or 45.0 percent - were reported from the Southeast CHSR. The smallest proportion, 20,217 (5.7 percent), occurred in the Central CHSR.

The biggest percent change from 1973, in reported Part II Offenses, occurred in the Southcentral CHSR (24.1 percent). The Central CHSR had the smallest increase (3.7 percent).

Clearance rates for Part II Offenses ranged from 74.1 percent in the Southeast CHSR to 47.8 percent in the Northeast CHSR.

Similar to the ranges for Crime Index, Offenses, Part II Offense Rates varied from 3,980.5 in the Southeast CHSR, made up of Philadelphia and its suburban counties, to 1,944.7 in the Central CHSR, part of Pennsylvania's Appalachia.

PART II OFFENSES BY STANDARD METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA (SMSA)

An inspection of Table 4 will indicate a range in Part II Offense Rates for 100,000 population from 3,973.4 in the Philadelphia SMSA, 3,320.3 in the Harrisburg SMSA, and 3,096.0 in the Allentown-Bethlehem-Easton SMSA to a low of 1,740.6 in the Johnstown SMSA.

The core cities within the SMSA's averaged almost double the Part II Offense Rates of their suburban areas; 4,598.4 against 2,392.7. Some extreme examples are Johnstown at 5,422.0, or 5 times its suburban rate of 1,080.4; Harrisburg, 9,843.9 against 2,177.2, or 4 1/2 times; Lancaster 5,459.8 against 1,748.4, or more than 3 times; and Reading 3,138.7 against 1,231.4, or 2 1/2 times.

VANDALISM

The most frequently reported Part II Offense in 1974 was vandalism. The 101,605 acts of vandalism reported in 1974, represented nearly thirty percent of all Part II Offenses.

Reported offenses of vandalism in 1974, were up 35.4 percent over 1973. The only Part II Offense showing a larger increase than vandalism between the two years was liquor law violations. The reported total in 1974, for this latter offense, however, was only about one-fourth that for vandalism.

Most acts of vandalism are committed by juveniles. In 1974, 77.9 percent of the individuals arrested for vandalism in Pennsylvania were under the age of eighteen.

While vandalism is the most frequent Part II Offense reported in Pennsylvania, its clearance rate among Part II Offenses is by far the lowest. Only 11.6 percent of reported offenses of vandalism in 1974, were cleared.

Vandalism is an offense which covers a wide range of malicious behavior directed at property. No dollar value can be determined for the property destroyed or damaged by acts of vandalism because the Pennsylvania UCR Program does not collect this kind of data. However, with a reported total of over 100,000 offenses in 1974, the dollar loss must certainly be immense.

The following table summarizes reported offenses of vandalism in 1974 by Common Human Service Region.

Almost a third of acts of vandalism - 31,968 or 31.5 percent - were reported from the Southeast CHSR. Only 7,234 offense of vandalism, or 7.1 percent of the State total occurred in the Central CHSR.

Increases in reported vandalism offenses of about fifty percent were recorded for two of the Common Human Service Regions, Northeast (50.7 percent) and Southeast (50.4 percent). The smallest change from 1973, an increase of 21.0 percent, occurred in the Southwest CHSR.

The statewide vandalism rate per 100,000 population was 843.0 in 1974. Rates in the Common Human Service Regions varied from 1,015.3 in the Northeast CHSR to 695.9 in the Central CHSR.

Clearance rates for all Common Human Service Regions were low. The range was from 18.4 percent in the Northwest CHSR to 8.7 percent in the Southwest CHSR.

DRUNKENNESS

A total of 51,336 offenses of drunkenness were reported in 1974, 14.4 percent of the state total for Part II Offenses. Only vandalism and all other offenses, the latter a catch-all for offenses not included in the other Part II categories, outranked it in Part II Offense volume in 1974. However, unlike vandalism and all other offenses, both of which increased markedly over 1973, reported drunkenness offenses decreased 1.9 percent from the previous year.

The ten counties in Pennsylvania ranking highest in 1974, in reported offenses of drunkenness are shown in the following table. Seven of the counties, it should be noted, contained SMSA core cities.

A total of 42,667 offenses of drunkenness, more than four-fifths (83.1 percent) of the state total were reported from the counties of Philadelphia and Allegheny. Philadelphia County alone accounted for 32,637 of these offenses, almost two-thirds of the total (63.6 percent). After Philadelphia and Allegheny, drunkenness offenses in the remaining eight highest ranking counties declined sharply. None of the eight individual county totals was more than 1.3 percent of the state total and their total of 3,874 was only 7.5 percent of all offenses of drunkenness reported in Pennsylvania in 1974.

The statewide drunkenness offense rate per 100,000 population was 425.9 in 1974. Rates in the fifty-nine counties which reported offenses of drunkenness varied from 1,691.1 in Philadelphia to 3.2 in Snyder. Eight of Pennsylvania's sixty-seven counties did not report any drunkenness offenses.

In Pennsylvania as a whole, 99.1 percent of offenses of drunkenness were cleared. This was the highest clearance rate for any Part II Offense. Individual clearance rates in the fifty-nine counties reporting this offense ran from 100.0 in twenty-two of the counties to 25.0 percent in Carbon County.

Drunkenness accounted for 14.4 percent of all Part II Offenses reported in Pennsylvania. Among counties reporting this offense, it comprised 35.9 percent of Philadelphia's to 0.4 percent of Lycoming's and Snyder's Part II Offenses.

LIQUOR LAW VIOLATIONS

A total of 26,261 liquor law violations were reported in 1974, an increase of 48.6 percent over the 1973 total. Liquor law violations are akin to those of narcotic drug laws, in that both are essentially youth-oriented offenses. Most liquor law violations in reality are instances of drinking by youths under the age of twenty-one.

The ten Pennsylvania counties ranking highest in reported liquor law violations in 1974 are shown in the following table. It should be noted that all of these ten counties are urban in character.

The ten counties in the preceding table reported a total of 16,729 liquor law violations, almost two-thirds of the state total (63.7 percent).

The liquor law violation offense rate for all of Pennsylvania was 217.9 in 1974. The individual county rate ranged from 513.9 in Delaware and 498.1 in Carbon to 6.6 in Wayne.

In 1974 the statewide liquor law clearance rate was 96.8 percent. Clearance rates for this offense among Pennsylvania's sixty-seven counties ran from 124.1 percent in Clinton and 114.7 percent in Greene to 84.6 in Potter.

Liquor law violations comprised 7.4 percent of all Part II Offenses reported in Pennsylvania in 1974. This offense made up 33.1 percent of Carbon County's Part II Offenses, but only 0.6 percent of Wayne County's.

NARCOTIC DRUG LAW VIOLATIONS

In 1974, narcotic drug law violations totalled 19,050, an increase of 13.1 percent over 1973. Almost three-fourths (73.1 percent) of these offenses involved marijuana. The balance was distributed among opium or cocaine, 2,215 (11.6 percent); dangerous non-narcotic drugs, 1,497 (7.9 percent); and synthetic narcotics, 1,404 (7.4 percent). While narcotic drug law violations made up only a small proportion (5.4 percent) of Part II Offenses, they are considered separately because of special public interest and general publicity.

The following table identifies the Pennsylvania counties which reported more than 200 narcotic drug law violations in 1974. Of note is that all of the sixteen counties reporting more than 200 drug law violations were urban counties found within Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas. These sixteen counties as a group contributed 86 percent of all 1974 narcotic drug law violations reported in Pennsylvania.

The total narcotic drug violation rate for Pennsylvania in 1974 was 158.1 per 100,000 population. The rate per 100,000 population ranged from 317.6 in Philadelphia County and 222.5 in Erie County to 6.1 in Montour County.

Nearly 90 percent of all reported narcotic drug law violations were cleared. Clearance percents by county ranged from 200.0 in Montour County and 112.5 in Forest County to 42.9 in Potter County and 37.5 in Pike County. One county, Cameron, reported narcotic drug law offenses but no clearances.

As mentioned, narcotic drug law violations made up only 5.4 percent of Pennsylvania's Part II Offense total in 1974. By individual county, these figures ranged from 8.0 percent of Lackawanna's to 0.6 percent of Montour's.

PERSONS ARRESTED

Arrests are primarily a measure of police activity in relation to the criminal offenses taking place within a community. Arrest practices, policies, and enforcement emphasis will vary from place to place and from time to time within a community. Arrests do, however, provide a useful index to indicate involvement in criminal acts by the age, sex, and race of the perpetrators, especially for those crimes which have a high solution rate.

A grand total of 369,226 persons were arrested in 1974, a rate of 3,063.4 per 100,000. 320,430 or 86.8 percent were males, and 48,796 or 13.2 percent were females. Arrests of persons aged 17 and under were a high 43.2 percent of 159,607, in comparison with the latest available national rate of 26.4 percent. Persons under 25 who were arrested totaled 265,434 or 71.9 percent of all arrests in 1974. Percents and number by race are as follows: White, 245,985 or 66.6 percent; Negro, 119,804 or 32.4 percent; and all other races, 3,437 or 0.9 percent. Juvenile arrests were disposed of in the following manner: 57.7 percent were handled within the arresting department and released; 28.0 percent were referred to Juvenile Court or the Juvenile Probation Department; 0.6 percent were referred to a local welfare agency; 0.6 percent were referred to other police agencies; and 13.1 percent were referred to criminal courts, usually the District Magistrate level, for summary or petty offenses such as liquor law violations (teenage drinking).

17,150 persons were arrested for Violent Crimes, a rate of 142.3 per 100,000. 15,790 or 92.1 percent were males, and 1,360 or 7.9 percent were females. Juveniles represented 30.5 percent or 5,233 of those arrested for Violent Crimes, and those arrested under 25 comprised 11,683 or 68.1 percent. Distribution by race is as follows: White, 6,794 or 39.6 percent; Negro, 10,054 or 58.6 percent; and all other races, 302 or 1.8 percent.

Property Crime resulted in 64,879 arrests, a rate of 538.3 per 100,000. Males accounted for 59,385 or 91.5 percent of these violators, and females, 5,494 or 8.5 percent. Of particular interest, was the fact that those under 18 represented a majority of Property Crimes arrests: 34,444 or 53.1 percent; those under 25 represented 93.1 percent or 60,372 of all Property Crime arrests. Racial distribution was as follows: White, 44,348 or 68.4 percent; Negro, 19,755 or 30.4 percent; and all other races, 776 or 1.2 percent.

Part I Offenses represented 22.3 percent of all arrests, or 82,286 for a rate per 100,000 of 682.7. Male violators consisted of 70,507 or 86.6 percent, and female, 11,779 or 13.3 percent. Juveniles tallied 39,703 or 48.3 percent, and persons under 25, 65,631 or 79.8 percent. Racial distribution was: White, 51,382 or 62.4 percent; Negro, 29,826 or 36.3 percent; all other races, 1,078 or 1.3 percent.

Part II Offenses accounted for 77.6 percent of all arrests, or 286,940 for a rate of 2,380.7 per 100,000. Males composed 87.1 percent of sexual distribution or 249,923; females, 37,017 or 12.9 percent. Juveniles totaled 119,904 or 41.7 percent; all persons under 25, 199,803 or 69.6 percent. The following racial distribution for Part II Offenses was achieved: White, 194,603 or 67.8 percent; Negro, 89,978 or 31.4 percent; and all other races, 2,359 or 0.8 percent.

ARRESTS BY POPULATION RATE PER 100,000

The leading offenses for which arrests were reported were drunkenness, 50,295 or 417.3 per 100,000; followed by disorderly conduct, 41,807 or 404.9; curfew violations (juvenile only), 40,904 or 339.4; larceny-theft, 37,754 or 313.2; and liquor law violations, 36,783 or 305.2.

ARRESTS BY SEX

Except for two categories, male violators were predominately high in percents over females. Females composed 65.0 percent or 972 of all prostitution-commercial vice arrests, and 53.8 percent or 3,951 of all juvenile runaways taken into custody. High percents for females occurred for the following offenses: fraud, 30.4 percent; numbers and lotteries, 28.4 percent; forgery and counterfeiting, 25.7 percent; larceny-theft, 24.3 percent; and offenses against the family, 23.7 percent.

ARRESTS OF YOUTHS/YOUNG ADULTS

Juveniles accounted for a majority of crimes for the following offenses: vandalism, 77.9 percent; arson, 61.9 percent; motor vehicle theft, 58.5 percent; burglary, 53.7 percent; all other offenses, 53.2 percent; and larceny-theft, 51.9 percent. In addition to these offenses, curfew violations and runaways are strictly juvenile offenses. These two offenses accounted for 30.2 percent of all juveniles arrested.

Percents of arrests for all persons 24 years and under are predominately high. Particularly high percents for the following offenses were recorded: liquor law violations, 94.2 percent; vandalism, 94.3 percent; motor vehicle theft, 88.2 percent; marijuana, 87.9 percent; burglary, 86.4 percent; synthetic drugs, 83.5 percent; other drugs, 83.4 percent; larceny-theft, 80.2 percent; and armed robbery, 79.9 percent.

ARRESTS BY RACE

White arrestees predominated in the majority of offenses for which data were collected for 1974. High percents of White arrestees occurred in the following offenses: liquor law violations, 96.6 percent; negligent manslaughter, 93.4 percent; runaways, 92.7 percent; synthetic drugs, 92.0 percent; vandalism, 89.4 percent; offenses against the family, 87.8 percent; bookmaking, 85.0 percent; fraud, 80.6 percent; other drugs, 79.1 percent; and marijuana, 78.9 percent.

Negro arrestees had high percents in the following offenses: robbery, 73.6 percent; prostitution-commercial vice, 73.2 percent; numbers and lotteries, 71.6 percent; murder, 65.5 percent; weapons, 61.8 percent; juvenile curfew violations, 60.0 percent; rape, 58.7 percent; heroin narcotic violations, 57.9 percent; and all other types of gambling, 53.9 percent.

PERSONS CHARGED

The disposition made of persons arrested and formally charged in a court of jurisdiction is important to the law enforcement administrator in evaluating the quality of police investigation, case preparation and court presentation.

A review of Table 11 will reveal that court dispositions do not equal the total persons charged. This is the result of reported disposition of persons charged in prior years and pending disposition of persons charged in 1974. Court disposition was reached for 83.8 percent of the persons charged.

In 1974, 52.1 percent of the persons prosecuted as adults for Crime Index Offenses were found guilty as charged. An additional 9.4 percent were found guilty of a lesser offense. Young persons referred to juvenile court jurisdiction accounted for 39.0 percent of the persons processed for Crime Index Offenses. High rates of juvenile referrals were recorded for burglary (47.9 percent) and motor vehicle theft (53.9 percent).

The highest conviction rates were reported for liquor law violations (94.8 percent) and disorderly conduct (93.4 percent). The highest rates for acquittal or dismissal were reported for prostitution (87.5 percent) and drunkenness (83.9 percent). The high acquittal rate for prostitution was confined to one area of the State, however, this area reported more than 80 percent of the total dispositions for this offense. The high acquittal rate for drunkenness was the result of the practice in some areas of arresting persons for drunkenness for their own safety and releasing them when they regain their sobriety.

A great difference was noted in the acquittal rates for Violent Crimes and Property Crimes. The acquittal rate for Violent Crimes was 38.0 percent, whereas the rate for Property Crimes was only 17.5 percent.

A final review of all crime categories discloses that 46.1 percent of all adults tried by the courts were acquitted or their cases dismissed. Young persons referred to juvenile court jurisdiction represented 16.2 percent of the total persons formally charged in all crime categories. In addition, juveniles referred to criminal or adult court accounted for 7.4 percent of the total persons charged. Overall, juveniles represented 23.6 percent of the persons prosecuted.

LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEE DATA

FULL-TIME LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL

Questionnaires returned from 710 local police departments and the Pennsylvania State Police indicated a total of 25,894 full-time law enforcement employees in Pennsylvania as of October 31, 1974 (See table below). Full-time police officers made up 88 percent and civilian employees of police departments 12 percent of this total. Statewide there were 2.15 full-time employees - 1.90 officers and 0.25 civilian police employees - per 1,000 population.

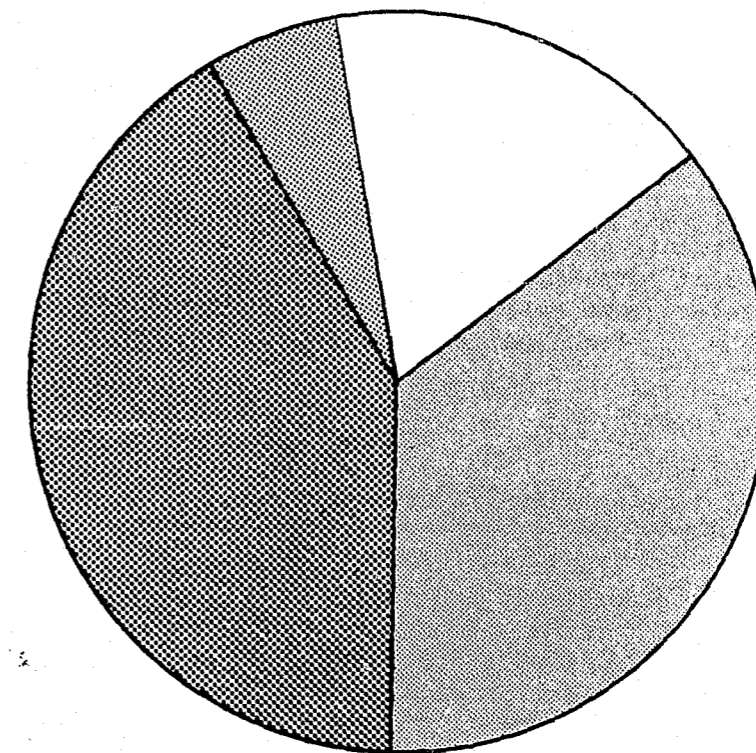
Local police jurisdictions (State total less Penna. State Police) accounted for 21,339 full-time law enforcement employees, or 82 percent of the State total (Figure L). Eighty-nine percent of these 21,339 local agency employees were full-time officers and 11 percent were civilians. The Pennsylvania State Police employed 4,555 full-time law enforcement personnel, 18 percent of the Pennsylvania total. Eighty-four percent of the State Police complement were police officers, with the remaining 16 percent civilian employees.

The greatest concentration of full-time law enforcement employees occurred in the city of Philadelphia. This city alone employed 9,247 full-time law enforcement personnel, 36 percent of the State total. Philadelphia's ratio of 4.80 full-time police employees per 1,000 population was the highest of all the local jurisdictions.

Ninety-four percent of the Commonwealth's reported 25,894 full-time law enforcement personnel were males, while only 6 percent were females (See following table). Less than 1 percent of Pennsylvania full-time officers, but nearly half of the civilian employees (45 percent) were females.

The fifteen Pennsylvania local police departments with the greatest numbers of full-time law enforcement employees are identified in the following table. In the aggregate, these 15 jurisdictions contributed 61 percent of both the 21,339 full-time law enforcement employees and the 19,025 full-time police officers employed by the 710 local police departments reporting in the Pennsylvania UCR system.

On a geographic basis, 70 percent of the Commonwealth's 25,894 full-time police employees and nearly the same proportion (71 percent) of its 22,852 full-time police officers were located in just 15 of the sixty-seven counties in Pennsylvania (See following table). When only local police department employees are considered, these 15 counties accounted for more than four-fifths (85 percent) of both the 21,339 full-time employees and the 19,025 full-time police officers. Eleven of these 15 counties contained at least one local police department which ranked among the top 15 in police employment as shown in the preceding table.

DEATHS OF AND ASSAULTS ON
PENNSYLVANIA LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

In 1974, four Pennsylvania Law enforcement officers (one each from the cities of Chester, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and the Monroe County Sheriff's Office) were feloniously killed while performing their official duties. This is twice the number feloniously killed in 1973. Over the ten-year period 1965-1974 inclusive, 31 Pennsylvania police officers have been murdered in the line of duty.

Pennsylvania's law enforcement agencies reported a total of 3,368 assaults on police officers in 1974 (Table 12), an 11 percent increase over 1973. This was the equivalent of 14.7 assaults per 100 full-time officers. The highest assault rates, 24.5 and 22.5, were experienced by the State's two larger cities, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. These two jurisdictions accounted by themselves for 70 percent of the reported assaults. At the other end of the scale, the rate for the Pennsylvania State Police was only 2.4 assaults per 100 full-time officers.

Injuries were sustained by 42 percent of the Pennsylvania law enforcement officers assaulted in 1974. More than one half (53 percent) of the assaults occurring in municipalities of 50,000 - 250,000 population size resulted in injury to some extent to the officers involved. In contrast, only about one Pennsylvania State Policeman in three (32 percent) assaulted was injured.

In the entire State in 1974, there were 1,426 assaults with injury reported, for a rate of 6.2 per 100 full-time officers. Again, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh had the highest rates, 10.2 and 9.0 respectively, and the Pennsylvania State Police the lowest, 0.8 assaults with injury per 100 full-time officers.

Statewide in 1974, 96 percent of the assaults on police officers were cleared by arrests. Clearance rates, by population group, range from 81 percent for municipalities under 5,000 population to 99 percent for the City of Philadelphia. Six of the nine population groups had clearance rates of 90 percent or higher.

Personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.) were employed in 89 percent of the assaults on Pennsylvania police officers in 1974 (Table 13, Figure M). Six percent of the assaults were committed with dangerous weapons other than firearms or cutting instruments, while firearms and knives or other cutting instruments were the weapons of commission in three percent and two percent of the attacks, respectively.

Assaults with deadly weapons other than firearms or cutting instruments produced the highest rate of personal injury. Sixty-two percent of the officers attacked with these weapons were injured (Table 14). Assaults with knives or other cutting instruments resulted in injury 59 percent of the time. When personal weapons or firearms were used, the respective injury rates were 41 and 37 percent.

More than a third of the assaults (35 percent) happened while officers were attempting other arrests* (Table 15). An additional 30 percent were committed on officers responding to disturbance calls. Officers engaged in the handling, transporting, or custody of prisoners were the victims in 16 percent of the assaults.

* At the time of assault, the officer was making or attempting to make an arrest for an offense other than disturbance call, burglary, robbery, civil disorder or traffic.

OFFICERS BY TYPE OF WEAPON USED

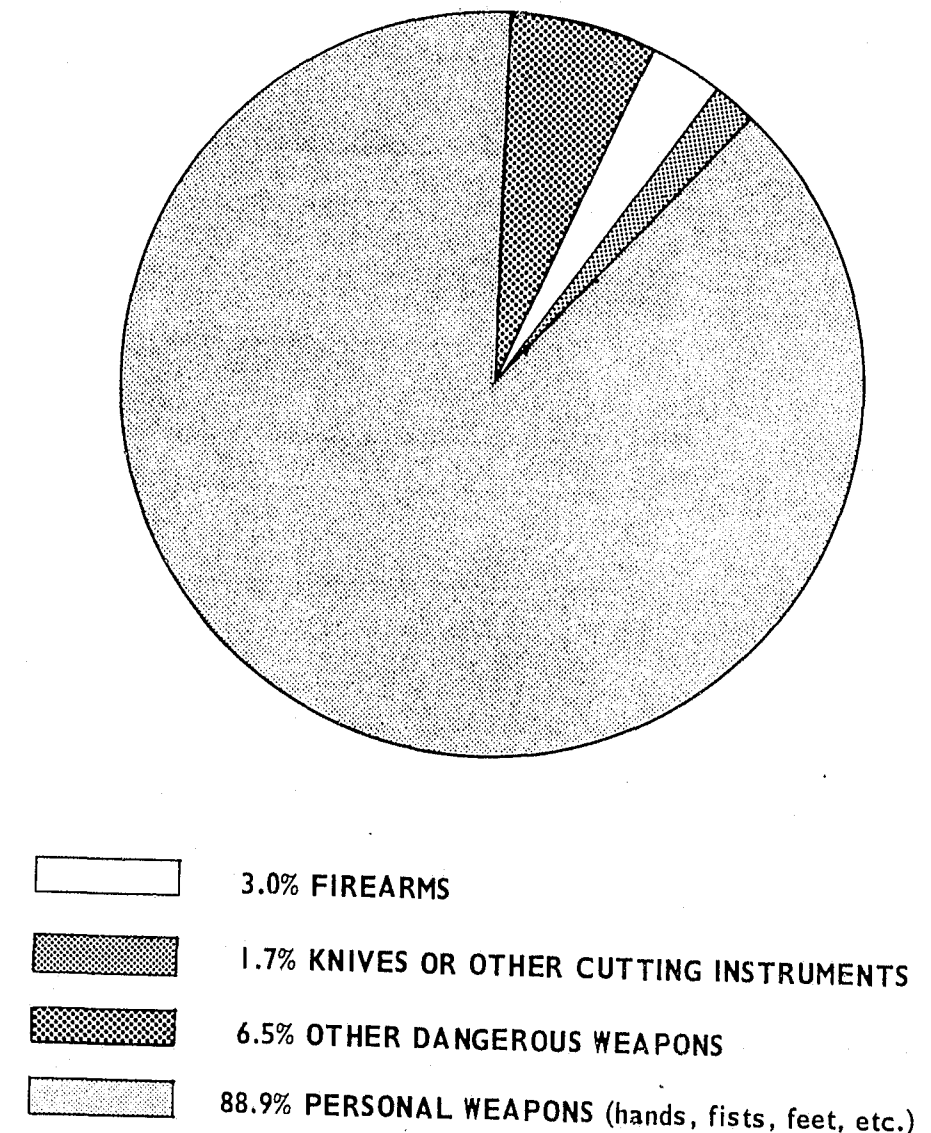

 BY MONTH OF YEAR

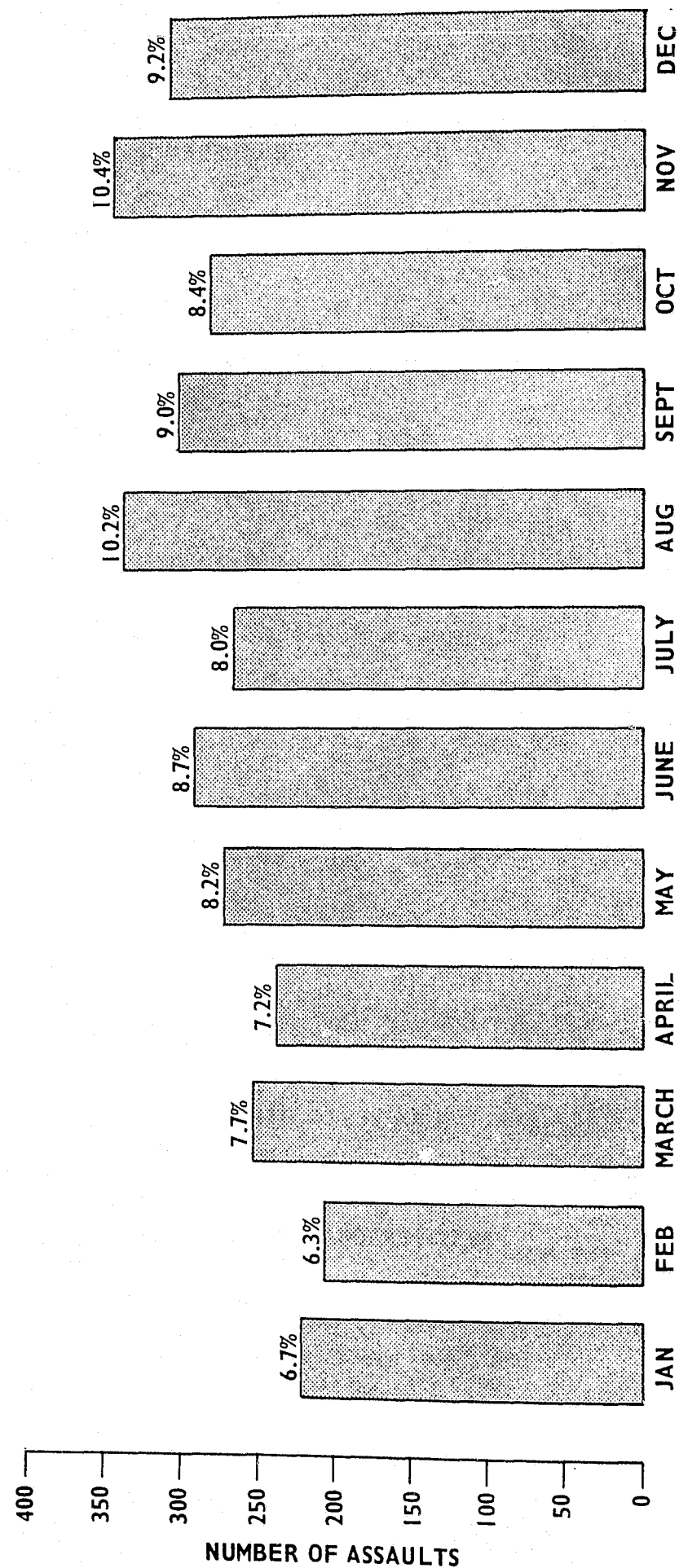

Thirty-seven percent of the 2,994 assaults with personal weapons took place while officers were attempting other arrests, 29 percent during responses to disturbance calls, and 18 percent while handling or transporting prisoners. Nearly a third (31 percent) of the assaults with other dangerous weapons were committed while officers were responding to disturbance calls. Forty-two percent of firearms assaults occurred while officers were responding to disturbance calls. Over half (59 percent) of assaults with knives or other cutting instruments happened during responses to disturbance calls.

As mentioned earlier, 96 percent of the reported 3,368 assaults on Pennsylvania police officers were cleared by arrest. Clearance rates of 97 percent were reported for the following three types of police activity: responding to disturbance calls, attempting other arrests, and handling or transporting prisoners (Table 16).

Personal weapons, predominantly, were employed in the assaults which took place during most types of police activity (Table 17). Personal weapons were used to commit 98 percent of the assaults on officers while they were handling or transporting prisoners, 94 percent while attempting other arrests, and 87 percent during burglaries in progress or pursuing burglary suspects. The single exception to the prevailing use of personal weapons occurred during ambushes of policemen, when 44 percent of the weapons used were firearms.

Almost 90 percent of the police officers were assigned to vehicle patrols at the time of assault (Table 18), either in a two-man (49 percent) or one-man vehicle (39 percent). Four percent of the officers were on a detective or special assignment, and 8 percent were on other types of assignment.

Nearly a third (30 percent) of the assaults on officers assigned to two-man vehicles were made while the officers were attempting their arrests, 28 percent during responses to disturbance calls, and 26 percent while handling or transporting prisoners (Table 19). Almost 80 percent of the attacks on officers patrolling in one-man vehicles happened while they were either attempting other arrests (41 percent) or responding to disturbance calls (37 percent). Twenty-nine percent of the assaults on officers on other assignments occurred when they were attempting other arrests, and 18 percent were committed during the handling or transporting of prisoners. The largest portion (42 percent) of assaults on officers on detective or special assignment took place while they were attempting other arrests.

More assaults, 351, occurred in November than in any other month (Figure N). Assaults were least frequent in the month of February, when 212 were reported.

Almost half (47 percent) of the reported assaults on Pennsylvania police officers in 1974 were committed between the hours of 8:01 P.M. and 2:00 A.M. (Table 20). About one in six (16.5 percent) occurred during the two-hour period 10:01 P.M. to 12:00 midnight.
