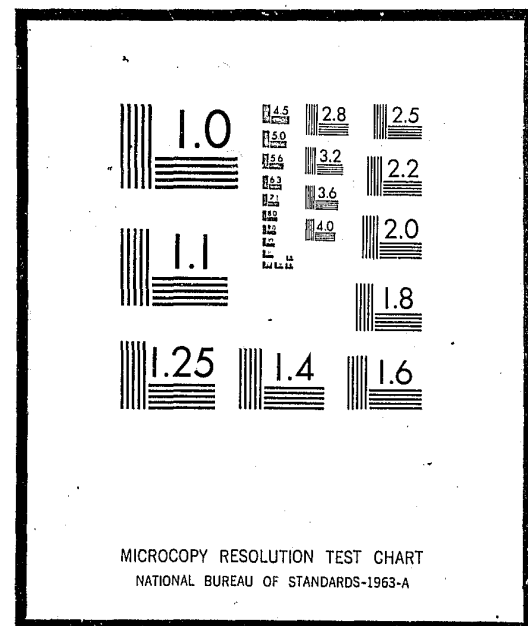

- III. The software is currently being developed for disc storage of pertinent information on the permanent files of the OMI within the University computer facility. A research facility for affiliation with the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena is currently in preparation. Such affiliation will enable computer development of investigation and examination reports together with source documents for referral of information back to reporting agencies.
- IV. The Office of the Medical Investigator, in conjunction with the Department of Pathology, offers a regular one week seminar in early summer entitled "The Medicolegal Investigation of Death." This course offers two academic credits within the University of New Mexico and is offered to District and Deputy Medical Investigators (physicians and non-physicians), members of the law enforcement community and attorneys representing either the prosecution or defense and interested members of the bar. In addition the program offers a two day in-depth seminar in specific facets of medicolegal death investigation at monthly intervals. These are repeated in six different locations throughout New Mexico before commencement of a new series. Certificates are offered to those not formally matriculating in the summer seminar, if the candidate has satisfactorily completed a written and practical examination.
- V. The program has currently available only the capability for gathering of criminalistic evidence and referring it to appropriate laboratories except for evidence obtained from the exterior or within the bodies of deceased persons including bacteriology, serology and toxicology.
- VI. This program will share a 3 million dollar facility with the Scientific laboratory system. This facility, one of the most modern of its type in the nation, is located on the north campus of the University of New Mexico and will include modern examination suites, teletype communications capability with the law enforcement communications together with appropriate classrooms and laboratories for teaching small groups of technicians and investigators. Within the facility there is dedicated space for subsequent improvement and subsequent improvement and development of an on-going research program in the forensic and environmental sciences. A memorial urging the development of such research, training and education programs has been introduced into the current session of the Legislature.
