



To the Honorable David Pryor, Governor and Members of the Seventieth General Assembly:

Submitted herewith is the Tenth Annual Report of the Executive Secretary of the Judicial Department of Arkansas. The Report includes court statistics for the year 1974 with comparative data for previous years. Although the workload of the Supreme Court declined slightly from the previous year, the total of 408 majority opinions written in 1974 averaged 58 per justice as against 59 per justice in 1973, substantially above the national average for states without an intermediate appellate court. Despite the heavy workload, the court remains current.

The workload in circuit and chancery courts continued to increase. In circuit courts total case filings were 14.7 percent over the 1973 level while chancery court workloads increased by 5.8 percent. Average caseload per circuit judge was 1,022 as compared to 892 in 1973 and the filings per chancellor in 1974 were 1,504 compared with 1,422 in 1973.

The cooperation of the General Assembly in funding the office of Criminal Justice Coordinator will be of great value to the court by continuing a project first begun with LEAA assistance. The Criminal Justice Coordinator performs a very vital task by handling preliminary procedures in connection with applications for post conviction relief.

Assignment of judges continues to be a most valuable asset in providing temporary relief in meeting the problem of docket congestion and in providing flexibility of administration.

It is hoped that the report herewith submitted will be of assistance to you in your further consideration of matters affecting the administration of justice in Arkansas.

FOREWORD

The Arkansas court system, established by the Constitution of 1874, still maintains separate courts of law and equity. Judges of courts of law are designated Circuit Judges and those of courts of equity are designated Chancellors. This report, covering all phases of the judicial system, carries statistics on these courts of general jurisdiction in separate divisions. Statistics concerning courts of limited jurisdiction are also included in this report. For the first time this report carries statistics on the five offices of Public Defender in this state.

A partial unification of the court system occurred in 1965 when the General Assembly passed Act 496 in which the Chief Justice was designated the administrative director of the Judicial Department and administrative head of the entire court system. Act 496 also provided for the appointment of an Executive Secretary, by the Chief Justice with the approval of the State Judicial Council, whose duties consist of assisting the Chief Justice in carrying out his administrative responsibilities.

One of the chief functions of the office is the collection, analysis, and publication of judicial statistics.

The statistics contained in this report are supplied through quarterly reports from the clerks of courts of general jurisdiction and semi-annual reports from courts of limited jurisdiction. Clerks of these courts are assisted from time to time by the staff members of the Judicial Department.

Analysis and planning are basic to any well-managed operation. Through the collection and dissemination of the data contained in this report, analysis and planning are expedited in the management of the Arkansas court system.

COURT ACTIVITY

Workload of the Supreme Court stabilized during 1974, changing only slightly from the

1973 level. Filings in courts of general jurisdiction rose to record levels, as did filings in courts of limited jurisdiction.

ADDITIONAL JUDGESHIPS AND CIRCUITS

The Seventeenth Chancery Circuit became effective on January 1, 1975. The Seventeenth Chancery Circuit is composed of Clark, Hempstead, Howard, Nevada, and Pike Counties, which were removed from the Sixth Chancery Circuit. No additional judgeships resulted from this division, as one of the two chancellors in the Sixth Chancery Circuit became the chancellor of the Seventeenth Chancery Circuit.

On January 1, 1975, an additional chancellor was added to the Twelfth Chancery Circuit, making a total of three chancellors in that circuit.

The Seventieth General Assembly has created additional judgeships in a judicial circuit and a chancery circuit. Act 78 of 1975 provided for an additional circuit judge in the Fourth Judicial Circuit, effective immediately upon the passage of the Act. The Governor has appointed Hon. John R. Lineberger as the Circuit Judge, Second Division, of the Fourth Judicial Circuit. Act 209 of 1975 provides there will be an additional chancellor added to the Thirteenth Chancery Circuit on January 1, 1977, with such chancellor being elected at the general election in November of 1976.

JUDICIAL COUNCIL

The State Judicial Council of Arkansas is a voluntary association of the Justices of the Supreme Court and judges of the circuit, chancery, and probate courts. The annual meeting date is the second Friday of October of each year unless changed by the Executive Committee at least 60 days prior thereto. Officers of the Council are:

Several matters were considered at the last annual meeting of the Council. Consideration was given to recent developments in judicial administration in the educational field. Two seminars were held during the annual meeting of the Council concerning "Drug Abuse" and "Current Problems in the Appellate Process". The Council also heard a progress report on the Criminal Code Revision Commission.

CONTINUING JUDICIAL EDUCATION

In an effort to improve and maintain professional competence in the State Judiciary, a Continuing Judicial Education Program has been developed by the Judicial Department for judges, prosecutors and court support personnel through a grant from the Arkansas Commission on Crime and Law Enforcement.


During 1974, two seminars were held for circuit and chancery judges. In May an "Evidence Seminar" was held at the University of Arkansas Law School, Little Rock, Division. Forty-two circuit and chancery judges, three supreme court justices and five judgenominees attended. Assistance was provided by the National College of the State Judiciary, which provided panelists and detailed outlines.

A second seminar on Drug Abuse and Current Problems in the Appellate Process was held in October at the Folk Center in Mountain View. Thirty-four circuit and chancery judges, three judge-nominees, all seven Arkansas Supreme Court Justices and nine other guests including three ex-officio members representing the Arkansas Bar Association attended. With the exception of three, all circuit and chancery judges attended at least one of the in-state seminars.

In addition to the in-state seminars, the Continuing Judicial Education Program made possible attendance at out-of-state seminars by six circuit and chancery judges, seven prosecuting attorneys, and four Arkansas Supreme Court Law Clerks. A total of 21 circuit and chancery judges have now attended the National College of the State Judiciary's fourweek training session and six have attended graduate sessions of the National College.

Plans are now being made for the 1975 Continuing Judicial Education Program. They include a two day workshop for court reporters, two seminars for judges, a seminar for prosecuting attorneys and their deputies, and regional seminars covering the new Criminal Code. The program will again include attendance at selected out-of-state seminars by judges and prosecutors. Five judges have already made plans to attend either the basic four-week session or a graduate session of the National College of the State Judiciary during 1975.

As part of this program the Judicial Department began publication of a quarterly newsletter, Amicus Curiae, for all court personnel. While only three issues were published in 1974, four issues will be published in 1975. The function of the newsletter is to serve as a clearinghouse for useful information and report activities of the courts of Arkansas. Length has been increased from an initial six pages to the present length of fifteen.

THE SUPREME COURT

The Arkansas Supreme Court's total workload is measured in terms of the appeals, petitions, and motions (excluding those for extensions of time) of which final disposition is made during a calendar year. Workload is also measured in another fashion: total majority opinions written denominated into a per-Justice average.

A barometer for measuring the efficiency of the Court's operations in dealing with its workload is its currency, that is, whether all cases under submission are concluded prior to the summer recess. Over the years the Arkansas Supreme Court has compiled a somewhat remarkable record in remaining current. All indications are that this record will continue.

The total workload of the Court remained relatively stable in 1974 as compared with 1973, declining from 778 in 1973 to 774 in 1974.

Criminal appeals terminated in 1974 totaled 127, a decline of 12% from 144 in 1973. Civil appeals dispositions increased by 6% to 313 in 1974, up from 295 in 1973. In the aggregate, total appeals remain stable: 439 in 1973; 440 in 1974.

Total petitions terminated in 1974 (155) were up 17% over the 1973 level (132). The increase is primarily due to a 41% jump in criminal petitions, which rose from 49 in 1973 to 69 in 1974. Civil petitions in 1974 increased by 3 over the 1973 level, to 86.

Motions decided (excluding those for extensions of time) declined by 14% in 1974, down from 207 in 1973 to 179.

Justices of the Arkansas Supreme Court wrote an average of 58 opinions each in 1974, as compared with an average of 60 in 1973. Majority opinions totaled 408 in 1974 and 418 in 1973.

ten in 1974 and 16 in 1973; dissenting opinions, down from 47 in 1973 to 36 in 1974; per curiam opinions, 10 in 1974 and 7 in 1973; other written opinions (such as those dissenting in part and concurring in part), 9 in 1974 as compared to 6 in 1973.

The Court adopted a per curiam order (Rule 21) on September 3, 1974, which restricts publication of non-precedent opinions. As yet, its effect on opinions has not been measured, but it can be expected to reduce somewhat the length of written opinions.

All indications are that the Court's workload has slowed a bit in its enormous increase over the past decade, leveling off at a point well above what some might call a "breaking point". However, it is virtually impossible, due to the fluid status of the law and the conditions of society and government, to accurately predict what the future may hold for the seven members of the Arkansas Supreme Court.

SUPREME COURT BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

The Supreme Court, by constitutional authority, by statute, and by court order is responsible for and supervises the activities of several committees and one board; these are as follows:

State Board of Law Examiners

This Board prepares the questions for the Bar examinations conducted twice yearly, grades the papers of those taking the examination, and certifies to the court the names of those who pass. It also investigates and recommends applicants for admission by reciprocity.

Criminal Code Revision Commission

Following the passage of Act 400 of 1971, the Supreme Court jointly with the Attorney General established the Arkansas Criminal Code Revision Commission. Two Committees, one Procedural, the other Substantive, were then appointed. The Substantive Committee, appointed by the Attorney General, was charged with recommending a complete revision of the substantive criminal laws. The work of the Committee resulted in a new Criminal Code, Act 280 of 1975, which becomes effective January 1, 1976.

The Procedural Committee, appointed by the Supreme Court, was charged with preparation of procedural rules which may supplant many of those now in effect. The proposed rules have been submitted to the State Supreme Court for consideration.

Committee on Rules of Pleading, Practice, and Procedure

Act 38 of 1973 provides that the Supreme Court shall promulgate rules of pleading, practice, and procedure in civil cases which will supplant the present statutory Code of Civil Procedure. On May 20, 1974, the Court by per curiam order appointed the Committee to prepare for the Court's consideration rules governing pleading, practice, and procedure in civil cases in all courts of the state, and prescribing the time for and manner of taking appeals.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE COORDINATOR

In September of 1973 the Court, with funding provided by the Arkansas Commission on Crime and Law Enforcement, established the office of Criminal Justice Coordinator. The primary function of the office is to provide administrative and research relief for the Justices from the heavy workload caused by the deluge of post-conviction proceedings, either filed directly with the Court or coming up on appeal.

The basic duties and responsibilities of the Coordinator include the screening of petitions and motions relating to criminal cases, answering correspondence, and determining proper procedural steps to be taken in regard to such motions and petitions. The Coordinator prepares legal memoranda and synopses which effect economies in the amount of time each Justice must spend in consideration of post-conviction matters.

The Coordinator is presently engaged in preparing annotations of all Arkansas criminal appeals and post-conviction decisions, and is compiling a digest of Supreme Court Law Clerks' memoranda concerning criminal matters.

The State of Arkansas assumes full funding of the program on July 1, 1975.





GENERAL JURISDICTION COURTS

Trial courts of general jurisdiction in Arkansas are the circuit and chancery courts. Circuit courts are courts of law; chancery courts are courts of equity. The geographical area over which a circuit judge presides is referred to as a judicial circuit; chancellors preside over chancery circuits. In addition to presiding over chancery courts, chancellors preside over probate courts. In only three instances do judicial and chancery circuits embrace the same geographical boundaries.

Modern usage has often substituted the term "district" for "circuit", but Arkansas statutory provisions exclusively use the term "circuit" in reference to jurisdictional areas. Thus, for purposes of this report, only the term "circuit" will be used in describing jurisdictional areas.

15.5%, from 14,419 in 1973 to 16,653 in 1974.

In only one judicial circuit, the Third, were there fewer filings in 1974 than in 1973, but the decrease was by only seventeen cases. Filings increased in all other circuits led by the Sixth, with an increase of 1,226, and the Second, with 464 more cases filed during 1974 than 1973.

Table I reflects total circuit court filings statewide per year since 1964. Note that 1974 was a record year in terms of numerical increase in filings over the preceding year, and reflects the second-greatest percentage increase posted during the reporting period.

CASE FILINGS

Circuit Courts

Overall Circuit Court Filings statewide increased 14.7% in 1974, from 24,979 in 1973 to 28,642 in 1974. Capital cases showed a marked increase in 1974, up from 150 in 1973 to 233, a gain of 55.3%. Felony filings in 1974 climbed by 14.4%, from 6,540 in 1973 to 7,479. Misdemeanor filings were also up, from 3,870 in 1973 to 4,277 in 1974, an increase of 10.5%.

Chancery and Probate Courts

Total Chancery Court filings (excluding Probate) increased by 2,213 in 1974 over the 1973 level, up by 8.5%. Equity and domestic relations filings, by far the bulk of Chancery workload, rose by 11.5% and 7.1%, respectively. Reciprocal support cases "in" rose by 24.7% while those "out" increased by 6.6%.

Filings increased in all chancery circuits during 1974, most notably in the First and Tenth circuits, which posted gains of 597 and 354 cases, respectively. Only two chancery circuits reflected decreases, the Second and the Sixteenth, but the drops were slight.

Probate workload appears to have stabilized with total filings dropping by only 1.6%, from 9,717 in 1973 to 9,553 in 1974. Decedent estates filings were likewise stable, up by 1.5% over the 1973 level. Filings for adoptions showed the only marked change in 1974, decreasing by 10.5%. Other filings changed slightly: guardianship, down 4.9%, alcoholic and mental commitments, up 5.5%, and miscellaneous other filings, up 3.1%.

Probate filings declined in nine of the chancery circuits during 1974 with the Sixteenth reflecting the greatest decrease, falling by 25.3% from the 1973 level. Eight circuits posted slight gains in probate filings.

Tables II and III illustrate statewide chancery and probate filings since 1964. For the first time, chancery and probate filings are separated in this report. Since chancery filings are primarily equity, domestic relations, and reciprocal support cases and often require lengthy adjudication, and probate filings include many quasi-administrative matters such as decedent estates, commitments, guardianships, adoptions, small estates, ancillary proceedings, and so forth, it is felt that the nature of those types of filings necessitate this separation. Moreover, the Judicial Department maintains disposition records for probate courts only in regard to decedent estate cases due to the fact that, as a general rule, other probate matters do not usually require more than one year for final resolution.

Although this separation requires that two factors must be taken into consideration in determining chancellors' caseloads, it facilitates accurate weighing of filings against terminations.

CASE DISPOSITIONS

Circuit Courts

Circuit court case terminations rose during 1974 by 10.73% over the 1973 level, which

likewise had increased by the same percentage over the 1972 level. A total of 25,639 cases received final disposition in circuit courts during 1974 as compared with 23,155 during 1973.

The Sixth and Fourth Judicial Circuits led all other circuits, terminating respectively 1,010 and 506 more cases this past year than the year preceding. Six circuits terminated fewer cases this past year than during 1973, among them the Fifth and the Thirteenth, with 503 and 194 fewer dispositions, respectively.

Table IV reflects circuit court terminations during the 1964-1974 period.

Chancery Courts

Chancery court terminations (excluding Probate) rose at a rate only .5% less than the rate of filings increase. A total of 25,512 chancery cases received final disposition during 1974, compared with 23,607 during 1973. Only three chancery circuits terminated fewer cases in 1974 than in 1973. All other chancery circuits increased the rate of case disposition, led by the First, with an increase of 832.

AGE OF CASES PENDING

Circuit Courts

As noted earlier in this section, disposition of cases in circuit courts rose during 1974 at a rate of over 10%. Although the rate of increase in filings exceeded that figure, the rise in the rate of termination made its mark on the age of cases awaiting final adjudication.

Total cases pending over two years of age in circuit courts statewide accounted for 12.8% of total cases pending, a decline of 1.1% from the percentage over two years old at 1973's end. Criminal cases pending over two years of age accounted for 8.4% of total criminal cases pending, as compared with 9.7% at the end of 1973. Civil cases pending over two years of age amounted to 14.9% of total civil cases pending statewide, compared with 15.9% at the end of 1973.

Seven judicial circuits reflected more than 10% of total cases pending over two years of age. Two circuits, the Ninth and the Twelfth, had no cases pending over two years of age.

Chancery Courts

Cases pending more than two years of age in chancery courts accounted for 31.7% of total cases awaiting final disposition. 41.8% of


all equity cases pending were over two years old; 27.2% of total domestic relations cases pending were over two years of age.


Although the statewide percentage of cases over two years old awaiting final adjudication accounts for nearly a third of total cases pending, it is noteworthy that Pulaski County alone accounts for 78.4% of total cases statewide over two years of age awaiting disposition. 83% of total equity cases pending statewide over two years of age are on Pulaski County chancery dockets, and 78.5% of total domestic relations cases pending over two years are Pulaski County's.

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Also worthy of note, however, is the fact that over 20% of all chancery court filings in the state are filed in Pulaski County, while that county and the three other counties comprising the First Chancery Circuit (White, Prairie, and Lonoke counties) are served by only 15% of the State's Chancellors (three judges plus a standing master).

Nine circuits had 10% or more of total cases pending over two years of age. Six had less than 5% of total cases pending in that category.

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PROSECUTING ATTORNEYS

Prosecuting attorneys are elected for two year terms by the voters of each judicial circuit. They must be citizens of the United States, learned in the law, and a resident of the circuit. Salaries are paid by the State. ^rn addition to his salary the prosecuting attorney is allowed a contingent expense paid by the counties within his circuit on pro rata basis.

It is the duty of the prosecuting attorney to commence and prosecute actions, both civil and criminal, in which the State or any county in his circuit may be concerned. He prosecutes all forfeited recognizances and actions for the recovery of debts, fines, forforfeitures or penalties accruing to the State in any county in his circuit. It is also incumbent on the prosecuting attorney to defend all suits brought against the state or any county in his circuit and to give his opinion to any sheriff, constable, justice of the peace or county court on any question of law in any criminal case or other matter in which the State or county is concerned, pending before such court or officer.

Deputy prosecuting attorneys are appointed by and serve under the direction of the prosecuting attorney. Deputies receive their remuneration from costs assessed in misdemeanor cases or from the County General Fund of the County in which they serve. In some instances, their compensation is derived from a combination of both sources, and in the metropolitan areas they are usually paid salaries.

Generally, prosecuting attorneys try felony cases in the circuit courts, while the work of the deputy consists largely of trying misdemeanor cases in municipal courts and justice of the peace courts, and of assisting the prosecuting attorney in the trial of felony cases in circuit court.

The problems of the office are numerous, particularly as a result of comparatively recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions and the necessity of close supervision of conduct toward prisoners from arrest to time of trial. For an effective administration of justice, it is essential that the prosecuting attorney and his deputies endeavor to work closely with other

law enforcement and judicial officers.

The Prosecuting Attorneys' Association is an active group and meets at the call of the President. Officers and Board Members are elected for a term of one year.

The following open letter from the Honorable Beryl Anthony, Jr, of the Thirteenth Judicial Circuit, President of the Association, best sums up the past accomplishments and future goals of the Arkansas Prosecuting Attornevs' Association:

The Prosecuting Attorneys' Association has been extremely active in the last year. The formulation of a new Substantive Criminal Law Code forced the Association to become involved in order to oversee the proposed changes. Several prosecuting attorneys spent many voluntary hours working with the Revision Commission and Legislature working out compromises and changes in the proposed code. The final document incorporates a major percentage of our requested changes. Our work has just begun. We must now set up workshops around the state to educate all the prosecutors and their deputies as to the contents of the new Substantive Criminal Code which has been passed by the Arkansas State Legislature.

In addition to the Substantive Criminal Code, there has also been formulated a new proposed Procedural Code. The same prosecuting attorneys spent many voluntary hours overseeing the work of the Revision Committee on this matter. Presently the proposed Procedural Code is pending before the Arkansas Supreme Court. We have prepared briefs and have filed with the Arkansas Supreme Court, making known what changes we desire.

One major accomplishment in 1974 was the incorporation of our Association as a non-profit corporation under the laws of the State of Arkansas. We adopted By-Laws and now govern ourselves by a Board of Directors consisting of the three (3) officers plus four (4) other prosecuting attorneys. Both the officers and

the directors serve for a term of one (1) year. The seven (7) member board will govern the day to day business activities of the Prosecuting Attorneys' Association.

The accomplishment of which I am personally the proudest is the employment of a full-time Prosecutor Coordinator. This action fulfills two years of efforts toward that goal. The funds were made available through an LEAA Grant. Our long range goal is to have the Legislature make this a permanent position through enabling legislation and appropriation of funds in 1977. The birth of the Prosecutor Coordinator brings new life to the Prosecuting

PUBLIC DEFENDERS

Included for the first time in this report are the activities of the five offices of Public Defender. Established as pilot projects through federal grants from the Arkansas Commission on Crime and Law Enforcement, the offices are located in Little Rock, Fort Smith, Fayetteville, Harrison, and Blytheville.

The offices were created following a line of United States Supreme Court decisions to the effect that an accused must be provided counsel if he cannot afford to retain an attorney. Courts without Public Defender systems in their jurisdictions generally appoint counsel for indigents on a case-by-case basis, drawing upon a roster of practicing attorneys in the county in which the court presides, with each member of the bar taking assignments on a rotating basis.

The appointed-counsel system oftentimes has resulted in appointment of recent law school graduates or attorneys not usually engaged in the practice of criminal law to

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represent indigent defendants; this system has sometimes resulted in appeals brought on the grounds of denial of effective counsel. The Public Defender programs are designed not only to eliminate these types of problems but also to expedite processing of criminal cases, During the Seventieth General Assembly early in 1975 two bills were introduced which were directed at public defender programs. HB438 (Act 996) was passed and signed into law during the Assembly, and provides for establishment of a public defender system in a judicial circuit by petition to the governor by a majority of the legislators from that circuit.

The Public Defender pilot projects have won the praise of prosecutors, judges, newspapers and the general public for their role in effectuating competent and expedient handling of criminal matters. The following page presents a brief but enlightening summary of the activities of the five Public Defenders.

CLERKS OF THE COURTS

The two categories of clerks for the Arkansas trial courts of general jurisdiction are:

1. Circuit and Chancery Court Clerks

2. County and Probate Court Clerks

The circuit clerks and the county clerks are elected by the voters of each county for a term of two years.

The elected circuit clerks are also designated as the clerks of the chancery courts. Sec. 22-441, Ark. Stats. Ann. However, this provision of the law does not apply to Pulaski County, in which the chancery court clerk is appointed by the chancellors. Sec. 23-326, Ark, Stats, Ann.

The circuit clerks and county clerks are permitted to appoint one or more deputy clerks with the approval of the county court. Secs. 23-309, 23-402 and 403, Ark. Stats. Ann.

As clerks of trial courts, all perform the duties incidental to the office, such as:

1. Filing and maintaining all legal documents pertaining to the cases.

2. Preparing and maintaining the docket books.

- the parties or the court.
- 4. Filing with the Judicial Department reports reflecting the number and types of cases being filed in the court, plus other information requested by the department.

The circuit clerks and county clerks are further responsible for the performance of duties not connected with trial court functions. The circuit clerk is also the ex-officio recorder of the county, and, as such, records and indexes all documents affecting the title to real estate within the county, and maintains files and records on all security transactions under the Uniform Commercial Code, except those transactions filed solely in the Secretary of State's office. The county clerk prepares the county property tax books, collects the delinquent property taxes, maintains the voter registration records, and issues and records marriage licenses.

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And these People thought it a prodigious Defect of Policy among us, when I told them that our Laws were enforced only by Penalties, without any Mention of Reward. It is upon this account that the Image of Justice, in their Courts of Judicature, is formed with six Eyes, two before, as many behind, and on each Side one, to signify Circumspection; with a Bag of Gold open in her right Hand, and a Sword sheathed in her left, to shew she is more disposed to reward than to punish.

LIMITED JURISDICTION COURTS

Trial courts of limited jurisdiction in Arkansas are County Courts, Courts of Common Pleas, Municipal Courts, City Courts, and Justice of the Peace Courts. These courts are the only courts most Arkansans ever see in action, and they form the basis for much of the public's impression of the administration of justice in this State.

It is estimated that at least 80 percent of the work of these courts, with the exception of the County Courts and the Courts of Common Pleas, is devoted to traffic violations.

The Arkansas Judicial Department has been able to provide assistance to these courts through two federally funded programs: the Governor's Office of Coordinator of Public Safety and the Arkansas Commission on Crime and Law Enforcement, Mr. A. Brooks Griffith, Coordinator of Public Safety, Mr. Ray Biggerstaff, Director of the Arkansas Commission on Crime and Law Enforcement, and their staffs are commended for their cooperation.

CONTINUING JUDICIAL EDUCATION

The Municipal Judges' Council and the Arkansas Judicial Department with the cooperation of the Governor's Office of Coordinator of Public Safety sponsored four in-state seminars for the judges and support personnel of Arkansas Municipal Courts. Three of these seminars were regional while one was held in conjunction with the Annual Meeting of the Municipal Judges' Council.

The three regional seminars were held in Pine Bluff, Arkadelphia, and Forrest City, with the Municipal Court Judges of these cities - Charles Goldberger of Pine Bluff, J. Hugh Lookadoo and then Municipal Court Judge-nominee B. W. Sanders of Arkadelphia, and Henry Wilkinson of Forrest City - serving as hosts.

The programs for these seminars were basically the same. The morning sessions dealt with discussions of evidentiary problems led by Mr. Ken Gould, assistant professor of law at the Little Rock Division of the University of Arkansas Law School. The discussions centered around a video tape which presented various evidentiary problems in the context of a staged criminal proceeding. The tape was supplied by the American Academy of Judicial Education.

The afternoon sessions involved discussions of problems related to search and seizure. The Hon, Olmon H. Hargraves, then Deputy Attorney General and now Judge of the First Division of the First Judicial Circuit, led the discussions in Pine Bluff and Arkadelphia. The Hon. Henry Wilkinson led the discussion at Forrest City.

Luncheon speakers were: Pine Bluff – Dalton Jennings, Director of the Pulaski County Alcohol Safety Action Project (ASAP); Arkadelphia – Municipal Court Judge Dean Morley, President of the Municipal Judges' Council; Forrest City – Arkansas Supreme Court Justice John Fogleman.

The annual Meeting of the Municipal Judges' Council was held in Little Rock on November 8 and 9, 1974. The majority of the Judges' time was devoted to a discussion of the Revised Criminal Code. The Municipal Court Judges were the first group to discuss the Code in detail with the Criminal Code Revision Commission. Members of the Commission present were Jack Lessenberry, Wil-

liam P. Thompson, Frank Newell, Jack Holt, Jr., Senator Morrell Gathright, and Circuit Judge Harrell Simpson.

The meeting also featured addresses by former Governor Sid McMath, Attorney General Jim Guy Tucker, and Chief Justice Carleton Harris. All three of the speakers noted the vast improvement in our Municipal Court System over the years and encouraged the Judges to continue in their efforts toward self-improvement.

COUNTY COURTS

County Courts were created under Arkansas Const. Art. VII, Sec. 1. The county court is presided over by one judge who is primarily the business manager of the county, but who also exercises certain judicial functions.

Ark. Stat. Ann. Sec. 22-601 provides that the county court of each county in this State shall have the following powers and jurisdiction: exclusive original jurisdiction in all matters relating to county taxes, in all matters relating to roads, the appointment of viewers. reviewers and overseers of roads; to order the erection of bridges, and direct the repairing of same; to superintend all ferries, paupers. bastardy cases, vagrants and the apprenticeship of minors; to fix the places of holding elections; to audit, settle and direct the payment of all demands against the county; to have the control and management of all the property, real and personal, for the use of the county; to have full power and authority to purchase or receive by donation, any property, real or personal, for the use of the county. and to cause to be erected all buildings and all repairs necessary for the use of the county; to sell and cause to be conveyed any real estate or personal property belonging to the county, and appropriate the proceeds of such sale for the use of the county; to disburse money for county purposes, and all other cases that may be necessary to the internal improvement and local concerns of the respective counties.

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The county judge is elected by the qualified electors of the county for the term of two years. Ark. Const. Art. VII, Sec. 29, requires that a county judge be at least twentyfive years of age, a citizen of the United

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ment of referees. For the first time in recent years there was a drop in total juvenile filings during 1974. It is noteworthy that Pulaski County alone accounted for roughly three-fourths of the total decrease statewide last year.

States, a man of upright character, of good business education, and a resident of the State for two years before his election, and a resident of the county at the time of his election and during his continuance in office.

The county judge functions as a trial judge primarily in juvenile and bastardy cases. While the case load for most county judges in these types of cases is relatively small, a gradual increase is noted over the last several years, and in the heavily populated counties the number of juvenile cases has risen to the extent that the case load has encouraged the appoint-

JUVENILE COURT REFEREES

Beginning in 1927, Act 177 authorized the appointment of a Referee by the Judge of the Juvenile Court (County Judge), in those counties having a population of 50,000 or more. Because of this population requirement, only five counties were eligible under the law. Between 1927 and 1969, County Judges in three counties (Pulaski, Mississippi, and Washington) appointed referees to handle juvenile cases.

In 1969 the Arkansas legislature, by Act 404, eliminated the population requirement and provided that all Juvenile Courts could appoint. Referees with the power to hear and decide cases involving juveniles up to age sixteen. A hiatus in the law resulted as to juveniles over sixteen but under eighteen years of age, but was remedied in 1973 with the passage of Act 537 authorizing Referees to hear all juvenile cases up to the age of eighteen.

Act 451 of 1975 superseded all previous legislation relating to juveniles by creating a new juvenile code. The new code's purpose is best described in the Act itself:

[I] n cases of delinquency of juveniles in need of supervision, as far as practicable, the juvenile shall be treated not as a criminal, but as misdirected, misguided, and in need of aid, encouragement, assistance and counseling, and if such juvenile cannot be properly cared for and

corrected in his own home with the assistance and help of a probation officer or other persons designated by the juvenile court, that he be placed in a suitable home, agency, institution, or other facility where he may be helped, educated, and equipped for useful citizenship.

"A juvenile" in the new code is defined as any person who has not yet reached his eighteenth birthday, thus leaving no definitive problems open as to the class about which the Act is concerned.

The new code places jurisdiction over a juvenile in the Juvenile Court presided over by the County Judge or, at his discretion, he may appoint a referee who serves at the judge's pleasure. A referee so designated is empowered with the same authority as the County Judge when acting as Judge of the Juvenile Court.

Every Juvenile Referee appointed after July 1, 1975 must be an attorney licensed to practice law in the State of Arkansas. However, all those presently serving as Juvenile Referees who are not attorneys may be reappointed to their positions.

Act 451 further provides that each Prosecuting Attorney or his deputy, when so requested by the Juvenile Court, shall prosecute juvenile cases. Moreover, the Act empowers a juvenile judge to appoint defense counsel in appropriate cases. County Judges are also given the power to designate probation officers for a Juvenile Court.

The Juvenile Court Judge may, at his discretion, transfer a criminal violation committed by a juvenile to any other court having jurisdiction over the matter.

The new code provides that a juvenile, while incarcerated awaiting trial, shall not be confined in a cell with adult convicts and that any juvenile taken into custody is entitled to bond within the discretion of the judge having jurisdiction over the matter.

Appeals from a decision of a Juvenile Referee to the County Judge is a matter of right in all cases. The appeal is heard de novo by the County Judge. Appeals from a decision of a County Judge to Circuit Court are likewise matters of right and are to be heard de novo.

The use of Juvenile Court Referees has been initiated in 27 counties, not only for the purpose of handling the large juvenile court caseloads in the counties where such exist, but also to provide experienced and capable personnel for the Juvenile Courts. Juvenile problems in our modern society are varied and complex. This fact, coupled with the fact that a juvenile proceeding is a type of judicial hearing, makes it desirable that Juvenile Courts be administered by legally trained persons experienced in juvenile law and familiar with juvenile problems. Even through a county may not presently have a heavy caseload in the juvenile area, the appointment of a qualified referee by the County Judge can provide this capable administration for the Juvenile Court.

The use of the referee in Juvenile Courts provides at least three advantages:

- 1. Through the proper selection of the referee, the services of a person trained and experienced in the field of law, juvenile relations, or both may be utilized.
- 2. The workload of the County Judge is reduced somewhat by the delegation of this responsibility.
- 3. The workload of some Circuit and Municipal Judges who have been trying juvenile cases can also be relieved by shifting these matters to the referee.

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

COURTS OF COMMON PLEAS

Courts of common pleas have been established in various counties by special acts. Presently, there are thirteen such courts existing in the state. These courts are authorized by Article 7, Section 32 of the present Constitution, which reads as follows:

The General Assembly may authorize the judge of the county court of any one or more counties to hold severally a quarterly court of common pleas in their respective counties, which shall be a court of record with such jurisdiction in matters of contract and other civil matters not involving title to real estate as may be vested in such court.

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Jurisdiction of courts of common pleas is generally limited to civil actions in which the amount in controversy does not exceed \$1,000. These counties are presided over by the county judge and appeal may be taken to the circuit court where trials are de novo. The courts exist in the following counties: Ashley, Chicot, Crittenden, Cross, Desha, Drew, Garland, Lee, Lonoke, Madison, Mississippi, Nevada, and Prairie.

Filings in Courts of Common Pleas have been rather stable in the past, with very little change in the over-all number of filings from year to year. In 1974, however, a substantial increase occurred. Common Pleas filings rose from 248 cases in 1973 to 367 in 1974, an increase of 47.9%.

MUNICIPAL COURTS

Municipal courts constitute the principal courts of limited jurisdiction. The courts are authorized in cities of 2,400 persons or more and a city of less than 2,400 may establish a municipal court if it is the county seat or is located in a county that did not have an established municipal court prior to March 7, 1973. The courts' subject matter jurisdiction is basically the same as that of justices of the peace. Territorially, the court has countywide jurisdiction except in those counties having two county seats.

It is the only court of limited jurisdiction in which the judge is required to be an ettorney. He is required to have practiced law for six years except in cities of less than 15,000 in which any licensed, practicing at-

torney is eligible. He must be at least 25 years of age, of good moral character, and a resident of Arkansas for at least two years. Salaries range from \$2,400 to \$24,500 per annum and are set by the legislature. In most cases, the court budgets are financed equally by the city and the county. Judges are allowed to practice law with the exception of those in Little Rock and Pine Bluff.

Presently, five counties do not have a municipal court. These counties are: Calhoun, Franklin, Little River, Newton and Yell,

These courts handle the bulk of all misdemeanors, ordinance violations, and small claims. Eighty-three courts handled 450,498 cases, assessed \$7,417,830 in fines and collected \$10,782,865 from fines, fees and costs.



ses in Ma ing CITY COURTS

Mayors of towns and second-class cities are vested with judicial powers of justices of the peace and, at least in second-class cities, have exclusive jurisdiction of violations of city ordinances. Formerly called "Mayors' Courts", these courts were designated "City Courts" by Act 153 of 1971.

There are no special gualifications for holding city court other than being mayor and thus, the mayor is given broad powers to al-

POLICE COURTS

Police courts were first created by Act No. 1 of 1875 for cities of the first class and since 1949 have been permitted for cities of the second class at the option of the city council. These courts serve a similar function and have jurisdictions similar to that of city courts, but the police court judge is elected as a judge rather than as an administrative officer and

ex-officio judge. They are not, however, required to have any particular qualifications for the office. As in the case of city courts, jury trial is prohibited in prosecutions for violations of city ordinances. Police courts are automatically abolished by the creation of a municipal court. Their reports are included in city court statistics.

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low someone else to hold court for him, or in case of absence or incapacity, the recorder is authorized to perform the functions of magistrate.

Unlike justice of the peace courts, there is no right to a jury trial. Judges of mayors' courts are compensated from the general fund of the city for the trial of criminal cases, but remuneration may not be based upon convictions.

JUSTICE OF THE PEACE COURTS

The justices of the peace are both judicial and, through their function on the county quorum court, legislative officers. Their jurisdiction as judicial officers is, basically, to hear misdemeanor cases and civil cases when the amount in controversy does not exceed three hundred dollars.

Justices of the peace have in the past been elected by popular vote on a township basis, one justice for every 200 electors but at least two for each township. Amendment 55 to the Arkansas Constitution, adopted November 5, 1974 and effective except for Sections 1 and 4 on that date, changes the number of justices of the peace who may serve on the Quorum Court and their manner of election. Section 2 (a) of that amendment provides: "No county's Quorum Court shall be comprised of fewer than nine (9) justices of the peace, nor comprised of more than fifteen (15) justices of the peace. The number of justices of the peace that comprise a county's Quorum Court shall be determined by law. The county's Election Commission shall, after each decennial census, divide the county into convenient and single member districts so that the Quorum Court shall be based upon the inhabitants of the county with each member representing, as nearly as practicable, an equal number thereof."

Compensation of justices for their judicial functions has been on a fee basis for the last one hundred years, but this was held unconstitutional in criminal cases where the payment of the fee depended on a conviction. Legislation has been passed authorizing the County Quorum Court to provide compensation in those cases. FINES (IN DOLLARS)
