GENERAL REPORT AND SURVEY OF THE YEAR


The Territorial crime level indicated a satisfactory fall. Crime reports decreased by 31.8% compared with 1974. Generally all categories of crime showed a heartening reduction - offences against the person and property had an 11.9% and 23.5% decline respectively.

There was no external threat to the Territory during the period

The Capital Projects programme was virtually completed during the year although, furnishings for East and West End stations had still to be acquired. The installations of internal VHF communication was completed by Cable and Wireless (WI)Ltd - but this A/M system is not proving very satisfactory due to marked interference coupled with terrain difficulties. Plans had been drawn up at the year-end for a proposed alteration to the existing photographic dark room facilities which were found to be inadequate. It is also hoped to improve storage facilities for exhibits and lost and found property in 1976. Internal and external redecoration of stations on a self-help basis commenced at

The United Kingdom Government, through its Development Division in the Caribbean approved the sum of £16,455 (US \$34,554) for the provision of photographic, scenes of crime and other important equipment in November. During the year, kitchen equipment also provided by the United Kingdom, was taken on charge. The Force is most grateful for this

During the year the Force renovated an old Government car for use as a traffic patrol vehicle and installed a visual average speed computer



and recorder (Vascar). This is the first installation of such equipment in the Eastern Caribbean and is proving a deterrent to

The New Legislative Council was opened with formal ceremony on 23rd October. The Force provided a Guard of Honour.

The Chief of Police relinquished the duties of Keeper of the Prison in May, when H.M. Prison became a separate department of Government. At the year end Police were assisting in staffing the Prison pending

Tribute is paid to the keen and efficient application to duty in all fields, to the high level of morale maintained by members of the Force during the year, and to the Government and the Public who supported their

The Force was under command of Mr. Rex Jones throughout the year.

There were several courtesy visits by Naval units during the year, these included British American and French vessels. The Police operated joint patrolling activity. On-shore discipline was, in general, excellent

and reports minimal.

Inspections Of The Force

15. Mr. M. Mackenzie, Regional Police Adviser, visited the Force periodically during the year.




Building Programme

19 The Capital Estimates 1973 which allowed for building projects to be financed from United Kingdom Development Aid has been completed with the exception of the provision of furnishings for East and West End Stations, for which orders are being placed. Certain constructional defects in Police Headquarters and East End Station will require early attention.

Recruitment

21. Maintaining the policy of Government to encourage local recruitment, four male British Virgin Islanders were enlisted in 1975. At the end of the year local recruitment formed 46.6% of the total strength. The standard of local recruitment is very satisfactory Lectures are given to High School students on all aspects of policing with particular emphasis on the advantages of a police career.


Training

22. In-service training was undertaken during the year at Caribbean and United Kingdom centres. Neapon and specialist training is undertaken with Royal Marines during naval visits to the Territory. The Force continues to be grateful to the United Kingdom Government and the Government of Barbados for these training opportunities.

23. Inspector J. Payne, Royal Anguilla Police, was attached to this Force for a two months period from December in order to study administrative and practical Police procedures.

Crime

24. Preventative policing instituted by extensive night patrolling and the introduction of a duty officer system which includes night visits and checks on commercial centres, outlying stations and districts was a contributing factor to the fall in the overall orime report level by 31.8%. During the year, with the exception of Offences Against Public Order, where two cases of being armed with an offensive weapon increased the category by 33.3%, all crime categories showed a sharp reduction particularly in Offences Against The Person And Property which were reduced by 11.9% and 23.5% respectively. Breakings were reduced by 21.9% and although 75 cases were reported the majority were committed by escapees from H.M. Prison Road Town where general security provisions proved a serious problem inspite of every effort to improve the position. A total of six escapees from lawful custody were investigated during



the year. Cases to court resulting from breaking offences improved considerably - 29.3% against 15.3% in 1974, and additionally, at the end of 1975, there were 16 cases of breaking offences pending trial. True reports of simple larceny dropped by 33.1% compared to 1974. This offence which primarily affects the tourist occurs on beaches and in hotels. "Police advice to visitors" pamphlets have been extensively distributed to appropriate agencies to assist in prevention. In areas affected there is a positive public desire to assist the Police in bringing the offenders to justice. The detection rate in simple larceny improved in 1975 - 33% of true reports resulted

The advent of scenes of crime and photographic equipment will materially assist the investigation of crime. CID officers have attended overseas courses in the handling and usage of such equipment and in December, a further CID officer left for the United Kingdom to attend a

Reorganisation of the Criminal Records Office and statistical

There are indications that Government will be examining the need to extend the powers of the Magistrate which are at present limited to jurisdiction over offences, where the value of property stolen is below \$100.00. This is an unrealistic figure in an era of inflation. Increased powers to the lower Court would ensure a reduction in the number of preliminary enquiries and high court cases and would accelerate the

28. The Royal Virgin Islands Police Force was established on the 26th February 1967, as a result of constitutional changes in the Leeward Islands. Prior to that time Police in the Virgin Islands were part of the Antigua/Montserrat/Virgin Islands Police Force which in turn originated from the old Leeward Islands Police Force.

29. The 1952 Police Act provides for the establishment of the Force and lays down the powers and duties of Police. The latter are described as "the prevention and detection of crime and the repression of internal disturbance". The Police are also responsible for defence of the Territory against external aggression. Additionally, the Police are responsible for the following services:-



Housing

Single barrack accommodation was available for junior ranks and 39. Government provided subsidised accommodation for the Chief of Police and the S.P.Os i/c Virgin Gorda and East End. No progress was made towards planning police married quarters on the grounds of general financial restrictions.

Buildings (Other than housing)

No building projects were undertaken during the year. The Virgin 40. Gorda Station is adequate at the present time, but requires security fencing. Internal and external re-decoration of Headquarters and Stations on a self-help basis commenced in December.

Structural defects were found in Police Headquarters and East End 41. Station during the year and will require early attention. External drainage will have to be properly constructed if further flooding in heavy rains is to be avoided. Application for funds to put this work in hand has been made.

The dark room photographic facilities were found to be inadequate 42. and the redesign and provision of storage facilities has been planned by PWD Architects. Application to obtain funds for this work has already been made. Additionally there is a distinct need to improve storage facilities for exhibits and lost and found property - an estimate is awaited to convert one end of the Headquarters building using existing walls for this purpose. Funds will be applied for this conversion.

Clerical staff

One civilian clerk is included in the establishment at Force 43. Headquarters.







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67. One detective officer carries out basic classifications. The Force maintains its own Henry collection and scenes of crime section. Lack of scphisticated fingerprint equipment has hampered the progress of this important section, in the past but the position will improve as funds have now been provided by the United Kingdom Government to obtain such equipment. There are 391 sets of fingerprints filed.

Photographic Section

68. The Force has had no photographic equipment since its inception, although officers have received overseas training in its usage. The recent provision of funds by the United Kingdom Government to obtain the basic requirements will materially assist criminal investigation.

69. The dark room facilities were found to be inadequate requiring structural alteration with the provision of storage and working areas. A plan has been prepared by PND Architects and an application for funds to carry out the renovations has been made. Separate studio facilities will be established in existing office space.

75. No police supervision was imposed during 1975.


Law Enforcement Organisation - US Virgin Islands

This membership ensures mutual cooperation and exchange of information on major criminal activity affecting the two areas particularly in the field of narcotics. Regular meetings are held. The Force is represented in the Organisation by the Chief of Police.


Examination of Motor Vehicles

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
