

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PREFACE

The information in the following annual statistical report was compiled by the Department of Corrections, Bureau of Management Information. All questions, remarks or requests relating to the report should be directed to this agency.

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
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REPORT OF FELON ESCAPES DURING THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1975

The data compiled in this statistical report of escapes occurring in fiscal year 1975 were extracted from the felon files maintained by the Bureau of Records, Division of Adult Services, Department of Corrections.

Number of Escapes:

There were 305 felon escapes from the Virginia Penal System during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1975. This was a marked decrease of 40.5 percent from the 513 escapes occurring in the previous fiscal year. Fiscal year 1975 was the first year to experience a decrease in escapes since fiscal 1967. The average number of escapes per year during the past ten years was 233.

Race and Sex:

Of the escapees, 192 or 63.0 percent were white males and 109 or 35.7 percent were non-white males. Three white females (1.0 percent) and one non-white female (0.3 percent) escaped during the fiscal year. This compares to the total felon population on June 30, 1975 of 40.1 percent white males, 56.2 percent non-white males, 1.3 percent white females, and 2.4 percent non-white females. The proportion of white males to all escapees has increased from last year when 57.9 percent of all escapees were white males.

Month Escaped, Time of Day Escaped and Assignment:

The largest number of escapes during the fiscal year occurred during the month of July, with 55 escapes, or 18.0 percent of the total. During the past five fiscal years, the month in which the largest number of escapes occurred has been either June or July. Slightly more than half of all escapes took place between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. (160 or 52.5 percent). The largest portion of escapes (124 or 40.7 percent) were from inside a correctional unit or institution, while 82 escapes (26.9 percent) were from highway work gangs. After increasing from fiscal 1973 to fiscal 1974 (70 escapes, or 18.8 percent, to 120 escapes, or 23.4 percent) escapes while on furlough sharply decreased to 13.8 percent (42 escapes) of the total during fiscal 1975.

Parole Status:

About one-third of the escapees (111 or 36.4 percent) were not yet eligible for parole at the time of their escape; 41 or 13.5 percent had been denied parole within a three month period prior to escape; and 22 escapees (7.2 percent) were parole violators.

Length of Sentence:

The most frequent length of sentence for escapees falls in the category of six years but less than ten years, with 81 or 26.6 percent, as compared to 16.0 percent of the total felon population. Forty-one escapees or 13.4 percent were serving sentences of twenty years or more, with 21.4 percent of the total felon population serving such sentences. There were eight escapees who were serving life sentences (2.6 percent).

Time Served Prior to Escape:

Of the escapes, 22.0 percent occurred during the prisoner's first year of confinement, and 53.8 percent took place within the first two years.

Time Left to Serve at Time of Escape:

At the time of escape, 159 or 52.1 percent had less than three years remaining to be served. Of these 44 (14.4 percent) had less than one year to serve and 107 (35.1 percent) had less than two years. Forty-eight escapees, or 15.7 percent, had detainers or were to be tried for other offenses.

Age of Escapees:

The median age of escapees was 25 years. One hundred forty-six escapees or 47.9 percent were under the age of 25, and 71.8 percent were under age 30.

Previous Record:

Prior felony sentences had been served by 54.1 percent of the 305 escapees; another 28.2 percent had an adult record but had not served a sentence in a state penal institution. Escapees with juvenile records comprised 64.6 percent of the total, while only 7.5 percent exhibited no previous criminal record.

Prior Escapes:

Escapees with a history of one or more prior escapes numbered 85, or 27.9 percent of all escapees. The percentage of repeat escapees has decreased for the last two fiscal years.

Offense:

Approximately one-half of all escapees (156 or 51.1 percent) were serving sentences for offenses against property, whereas the most frequent offense category among the total felon population on June 30, 1975 was crimes against persons (54.9 percent).

Marital Status:

More than half of the escapees were single (52.5 percent) and about one-fourth were married (26.9 percent). This compares with the total felon population in which 56.4 percent were single and 21.4 percent were married.

Military Service and AWOL Record:

Of the 86 escapees (28.2 percent) with a record of military service, 57.0 percent had a history of being AWOL one or more times.

Custody Status:

As in the previous three fiscal years, more than half the escapees had been given trusty status (197 or 64.6 percent).

Education and Intelligence:

An educational level of the fifth grade or higher was reported for 212 escapees, or 74.4 percent of those escapees who had been tested. An I.Q. of ninety (normal) or above was reported for 69.5 percent of those felons who escaped, as compared to 61.4 percent for the total felon population.

Institution

Inmates assigned to the Correctional Field Units at the time of their escape accounted for 76.1 percent of all felon escapes, whereas on June 30, 1975 approximately 40 percent of the felon population was housed in the Field Units. Among the major institutions, Bland Correctional Center experienced the largest number of escapes, with 15.

Time Escapee Remained Free:

Within 24 hours, 102 or 33.4 percent of those who escaped were recaptured or surrendered; 63.0 percent of all escapees remained free less than thirty days. On June 30, 1975, 59 felons who had escaped during fiscal year 1975 remained at large (19.3 percent).

Crimes Committed While at Large:

Of the 37 known %nstances in which crimes were committed by escapees while at large, auto theft was the offense in 23 cases (62.2 percent of the crimes committed).

Status of Parents:

For 28.2 percent of the escapees (86), one parent was dead; another 28.2 percent (86) and parents married, living together. All categories reflect parental status at the time the escapee was originally committed.

Personal Habits:

There were 96 escapees (31.5 percent) who were classified as heavy drinkers, with no other drug use known. An additional 76 escapees (24.9 percent) had known histories of alcohol and drug use, and 50 escapees (16.4 percent) had been drug addicts.

Employment History:

Prior to confinement for their felony offense, 47.5 percent of the escapees were steady workers, and 19.3 percent worked intermittently (less than 6 months' employment in the 12 months prior to arrest).

Day of Week Escaped:

Escapes on Sunday were the most frequent in fiscal year 1975, with 62 (20.3 percent). Monday escapes were most prevalent in the two previous years (22.6 percent in fiscal 1974 and 21.5 percent in fiscal 1973).
