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INTRODUCTION

INTRODUCTION

The Imperial County Narcotics Task Force has now been operational for twelve (12) months have^{ing} been initiated on 1 July 1973.

During this twelve (12) month period, two-hundred and forty-nine (249) narcotic and dangerous drug investigations have been conducted by the Narcotics Task Force Personnel, resulting in the arrest of three-hundred and sixty-seven (367) suspects on narcotic/dangerous drug charges. The seizure of one-million, nine-hundred ninety-four-thousand, eight-hundred and ninety dollars (1,994,890) worth of illicit narcotics/dangerous drugs has resulted from these arrests. These figures do not take into account the numerous other drug related offenses and crimes that have been solved or prevented due to these narcotic/dangerous drug investigations.

Through complete cooperation and assistance of the local Police Departments, other Narcotics Task Forces, State and Federal Agencies; a sound, workable, and effective narcotics/dangerous drug enforcement program was initiated and is being carried out.

During this twelve (12) month period, the Narcotics Task Force has become an integral and valuable part of the total law enforcement picture in our area. The personnel of the Narcotics Task are gaining more and more experience, and are becoming extremely familiar with the major local narcotic/dangerous drug dealers, and with local and regional methods used by the narcotic/dangerous drug dealers in their illicit operations.

The Narcotics Task Force now has the equipment available, or accessible through various channels, to conduct the necessary narcotic/dangerous drugs investigations; and to cooperate, coordinate, and assist local agencies in their investigations.

PROJECT OBJECTIVES

PROJECT OBJECTIVES

The Primary Objective of the project is to substantially reduce the trafficking of narcotic/dangerous drugs in our area, and to reduce the availability of the illicit narcotics/dangerous drugs in our area.

Although the primary objective of the project is the main concern to Law Enforcement, and the general public; there are other areas of concern that are extremely important in the overall narcotic/dangerous drug problem and are reflected as Secondary Objectives:

1. Increase the quality of arrests, and improve the ratio of convictions to arrests for illegal narcotic/dangerous drug offenses.
2. Increase coordination and cooperation to exchange information within each individual agency, and among local, State, and Federal Agencies to reduce illegal narcotic/dangerous drug offenses.
3. Develop an operational Narcotic Information Intelligence Network throughout the County of Imperial, involving the local agencies, that is compatible with State (California Narcotic Information Network) and Federal Narcotic Information Networks currently in operation.

4. Participate and coordinate, at all levels, in a comprehensive uniform narcotic/dangerous drug training program.
5. Create an impact on those crimes related to the sale and use of narcotics/dangerous drugs.
6. Cooperate with Health Care Delivery Services, local school systems, and service clubs in the area of drug abuse awareness and education.

The following project goals were initiated and implemented to fullfill the listed objectives:

1. The Imperial County Narcotics Task Force was organized with experienced investigators from the Imperial County Sheriff's Office. The Narcotics Task Force was specifically developed as a single, centralized unit to conduct narcotic/dangerous drug investigations within our area; and to coordinate, cooperate, and assist Local, State and Federal Agencies operating in our area. The Narcotics Task Force, as a centralized unit has been successful, to a large degree, in reducing the availability of narcotics/dangerous drugs on the street, through a cooperative effort.
2. The Imperial County Narcotics Task Force has increased the quality of arrests and improved the ratio of convictions to arrests for illegal narcotic/dangerous drug offenses. The Narcotics Task Force, to this point in time, has not

lost a single case in court. However, not all suspects have been convicted for the charge that they were arrested on due to "Plea Bargaining"; but all suspects have "Plea Bargained" to the satisfaction of the Narcotics Task Force.

3. The Imperial County Narcotics Task Force has increased the coordination and cooperation in the exchange of information within our area. The Narcotics Task, acting as an "information clearing house" receives information from Local, State, and Federal Agencies, screens the information, compiles the information, and disseminate the information to the appropriate agencies and participates in the resulting investigations.
4. The Imperial County Narcotics Task Force has initiated and developed an operational, and successful Narcotics Information Network. Information gathered by, and given to the Narcotics Task Force is compiled, and filed. This has proved invaluable as information is readily available on a need to know basis to involved agencies instead of being "in the Investigator's head". The Narcotics Task Force is now an active member in the California Narcotic Information Network. The Narcotic Task Force holds monthly meetings with

representatives of the local agencies and the Drug Enforcement Administration to exchange current information on current and ongoing investigations and any pertinent information concerning narcotic/dangerous drug violations/violators.

5. The Imperial County Narcotics Task Force is constantly participating in an ongoing training. Not only are the members of the Narcotics Task Force attending schools and seminars for additional training, but are participating in and training other officers in a comprehensive uniform narcotics/dangerous drug training program. Narcotics Task Force Personnel have instructed the Advanced Officer's Course in the field of narcotics/dangerous drugs, and have instructed officers attending the Basic Post Academy in the field of narcotics/dangerous drugs, as well as participation in an ongoing training program for Jailors and Patrolmen.
6. The Narcotic Task Force has undoubtedly created an impact on crimes related to the sale and use of narcotics/dangerous drugs. For example, the known addicts in one city in our area were concentrated on for approximately two (2) weeks, being arrested for "Under the Influence" and various other charges (11350 H&S Possession of Heroin, 11351 H&S Possession of Heroin for Sale),

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which resulted in a noticeable decrease in Petty Thefts (488 P.C.) and Burglaries (459 P.C.) in that area.

7. The Imperial County Narcotics Task Force has cooperated with the Health Care Delivery Services, the Local School Systems, and Service Clubs in our area in the field of drug abuse awareness and education by giving numerous talks to the various organizations whenever possible, upon their request.

ADMINISTRATION

ADMINISTRATION

The Imperial County Narcotics Task Force is administered by a Board of Directors composed of the Sheriff of Imperial County and the Chiefs of Police of the seven (7) Imperial County cities. In addition to the Board of Directors, a liason officer from each of the involved Police Departments, a representative of the District Attorney's Office, and a representative of the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration is assigned to coordinate with the Narcotics Task Force. 

PROJECT OPERATION

PROJECT OPERATION

Imperial County is unique in its environment due to the geographic location. Imperial County covers a total of four-thousand five-hundred ninety seven (4,597) square miles, predominantly a desert area. Imperial County is bordered on the West by another County, San Diego County, which is basically rugged mountains. Imperial County is bordered on the north by another County, Riverside County, which is both mountainous and desert in composition. Imperial County is bordered on the east by the State of Arizona (Sixty-four (64) square miles) which is basically a desert area, transversed by the Colorado River. Imperial County is bordered on the south by the International Border dividing the United States and Mexico. This Southern Boundary is approximately ninety (90) miles in length, including two major Ports of Entry, Calexico and Andrade, and two major Ports of Entry in close proximity; San Ysidro and San Luis, Arizona. The Mexican city of Mexicali, Mexico (Calexico Porty of Entry) has over five-hundred thousand (500,000) residents and Algodones (Andrade Port of Entry) has a population of over ten-thousand (10,000). Mexicali is considered a major "gateway" to the United States, and therefore, considered to be one of the major entrances of the illicit narcotics/dangerous drugs into California and the United States. Imperial County has numerous major highways transversing the County and leading to other areas. Interstate Highway #8 runs east and west and is a major route taken by illicit narcotic traffickers leaving Imperial County. State Highway 98 runs east and west and is another route taken by the narcotic/dangerous drug traffickers.

State Highways 86 and 111 run north and south and are both major routes taken by the narcotic/dangerous drug offenders. There are also State Highway 78 and S2 out of the County. It is easy to see why there has been a major narcotic/dangerous drug problem in this area. Traffickers from other areas come to our area to make their "connections" for the narcotic/dangerous drugs and take delivery in our area for transportation out of our area; or they make arrangements to "smuggle" the illicit narcotics and dangerous drugs into our area. The entire area is sparsely populated and difficult to patrol with sufficient personnel to shut off the large amounts of drugs and illegal contraband entering from Mexico. The United States Border Patrol, the Drug Enforcement Administration, and the Customs Patrol, do a remarkable job patrolling the area, using four-wheel drive vehicles and airplanes. In fact, the Drug Enforcement Administration has almost doubled their personnel in this area due to the major problem. The Customs Patrol, a new Federal Agency, has been initiated subsequent to the forming of the Narcotics Task Force, is patrolling the border. The Narcotics Task Force has coordinated and cooperated with these Federal Agencies in narcotics/dangerous drug investigations.

The following are some of the Narcotic Task Force Activities during the Grant Year:

1. STREET BUY PROGRAMS:

- A. During the second (2nd) quarter, a "street buy" program was initiated in the cities of Brawley and El Centro, with the cooperation of the local agencies with a goal of arresting and prosecuting then (10) major narcotic/dangerous drug dealers in those cities.

Sixteen (16) cases resulted in the arrest and conviction of twenty-eight (28) suspects. The concentrated efforts of the Narcotics Task Force, combined with the local agencies, reduced the availability/access to narcotics (heroin) on the street to a great degree.

- B. During the third (3rd) quarter, a "street buy" program was initiated in the city of Imperial with the goal of arresting and prosecuting the five (5) major suppliers of illicit narcotics/dangerous drugs in that city. Three of these violators were arrested for sales to an undercover officer; one was arrested for possession for sale, and the fifth one was arrested for possession.
- C. During the third (3rd) quarter, a "street buy" program was initiated in the rural area of Palo Verde with the goal of arresting and prosecuting the seven (7) participants in the illicit narcotic/dangerous drug traffic in that area. Five of the seven participants were arrested and convicted; the other two (2) suspects were no longer in the area.
- D. During the fourth (4th) quarter, a "street buy" program was initiated throughout the County with the goal again to eliminate the major "street dealers". Since the narcotic/dangerous drug dealers in our area, without exception, want the money "fronted" (given to the dealer prior to the receipt of any narcotics/dangerous drugs) for any large quantity of narcotics/dangerous drugs to be taken with them to Mexico. Therefore,

the Narcotics Task Force has had to make purchases in smaller quantities (up to "spoons" of heroin), from the Suspects and then obtain arrest warrants. This program has resulted in the arrest of nine (9) of the so called major "street dealers".

2. PUBLIC EDUCATION:

3. RECRUITMENT AND TRAINING OF NARCOTIC TASK FORCE PERSONNEL:

A. All positions in the Narcotic Task Force were filled during the first quarter. All officers in the Narcotic Task Force attended the 110-Hour LEAA sponsored Narcotic School held at Cal Poly, Pomona, during the months of May and June 1973.

B. Five members of the Narcotics Task Force attended a 40-Hour Seminar on "addiction" and "under the influence" cases presented by the Orange County Sheriff's Office during the third quarter.

C. The Intelligence Officer has successfully completed the 80-Hour Intelligence Analyst School presented by the California Department of Justice during the third quarter.

D. During the fourth quarter, a Sergeant and a Deputy II attended the 80-Hour Narcotic Investigation's Course presented by the California Department of Justice.

4. ADVISORY BOARD:

During the first quarter, the first meeting of the Advisory Board was held on September 27, 1973. Subsequent meetings were held monthly on the fourth Thursday of each month.

5. COUNTY WIDE NARCOTIC INFORMATION NETWORK:

During the first quarter, a County Wide Narcotic Information Network was initiated, composed of representatives of the local Police Departments and the representatives of the Drug Enforcement Administration. The first meeting of the County Wide Information Network was held on September 10, 1973. Subsequent monthly meetings are held on the third Thursday of each month.

6. CENTRALIZED NARCOTIC RECORD SYSTEM:

A Centralized Narcotic Record System was initiated during the first quarter, and was constantly used throughout the year. Cross references using suspect's names, narcotic capabilities, associates, vehicles, "hangouts", and case numbers and arrests are currently being used.

7. AIRPLANE SURVEILLANCE:

During the second quarter, a Cessena Airplane was received by the Imperial County Sheriff's Office. The airplane has been used various times throughout the year for aerial surveillance. Due to the local terrain (rural and desert areas), the airplane has proved invaluable and has greatly enhanced the surveillance activities of the Narcotics Task Force.

8. NARCOTICS EVIDENCE VAULT:

During the second quarter, due to the increase amount of narcotic seizures by the Narcotics Task Force, the storage facilities used at that time, was initiated (too small in area). The Imperial County Board of Supervisors approved funding for the construction of a narcotics vault for the Imperial County Sheriff's Office. The narcotic vault is being used exclusively for the storage of seized narcotics.

9. COMMUNICATION WITH THE MEMBERS OF THE JUDICIAL SYSTEM:

During the second quarter, effort was made by Narcotics Task Force Personnel on improving the relations between members of the Judicial System and the Narcotics Task Force. Familiarizing them with goals, problems, and methods of operation of the Narcotics Task Force, resulted in an open-line of communication between the Narcotics Task Force and members of the Judicial System. Judges, Parole Officers, Probation Officers, Public Defenders, etc., feel free to call on the Narcotics Task Force for assistance at any time. The Narcotics Task Force can in turn, call on them at any time for their respective services.

10. CONTACT WITH LOCAL HOTELS AND MOTELS

- A. Due to our close proximity to the Mexican Border, one of the Narcotics Task Force's problems is narcotic traffickers from other parts of the country, coming into our area to make arrangements with narcotic traffickers in Mexico. They check into a local hotel/motel while making their arrangements to have their illicit narcotics delivered into our area to be transported to their part of the country.
- B. During the second quarter, contact was made by Narcotics Task Force Personnel, in conjunction with Drug Enforcement Administration Personnel, with the local motels/hotels. The motel/hotel Personnel were requested to notify the Narcotics Task Force Personnel of certain suspicious individuals, meeting a certain criteria checking into their establishments. Investigations were then initiated by Narcotics Task Force Personnel. This program has resulted in a substantial amount of illicit narcotic seizures and apprehension of the suspects involved.

11. INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS:

During the second quarter, liason with the Federal Authorities in Mexico, as well as with the Judicial Police in Mexico by the Narcotics Task Force, has resulted in the arrest of known narcotic violators in Mexico. Investigations in our area by the Narcotics Task Force, have resulted in the determination of where the local Narcotic Traffickers were obtaining their illicit narcotics in Mexico. A com-

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binced effort by the Narcotics Task Force, the Drug Enforcement Administration, and the Mexican Authorities, has led to the arrest of several of these known narcotic violators, and the seizure of their narcotics by the Mexican Authorities.

12. HASH OIL SEIZURE:

- A. During the third quarter, information was received that a quantity of hash oil was being imported into our area from Mexicali, Mexico. An investigation was initiated which led to the arrest of the importer/seller for sales. This arrest resulted in the seizure of seven (7) ounces of the hash oil. During the investigation, this importer/seller was found to be the major source of illicit narcotics to the "school age" youth in the El Centro area.
- B. This investigation is still continuing with the goal of "knocking off" the laboratory in Mexico that is manufacturing the hash oil. This is cooperative effort with the Narcotics Task Force, the Drug Enforcement Administration, and the Federal Officials in Mexico.

13. MAJOR HEROIN SEIZURE:

During the third quarter, an investigation was initiated by the Narcotics Task Force, with the cooperation of the United States Customs Bureau and the Drug Enforcement Administration which resulted in the seizure of five-hundred twelve (512) grams of heroin. As a result of this investigation, suspects were also arrested in the Los Angeles, California area, two (2) arrests, and in Chicago, Illinois, five (5) arrests.

14. SELECTIVE AREA ENFORCEMENT:

During the fourth quarter, undercover operations were instituted on major holidays in the recreational areas of our area to combat the increasing number of narcotic violations and narcotic-related injuries and deaths. In addition to the arrest and prosecution of eleven (11) for sales of narcotics (minor quantities), numerous other violations of not only the Health and Safety Code, but of the B&P, Vehicle, and Penal Code, were observed and pointed out to uniformed patrolmen. The secondary outcome of these operations, were that no one was killed, nor were there any injuries where the personnel was operating, compared to three (3) deaths and numerous injuries last year.

15. STATEWIDE NARCOTIC THEFT RING:

During the fourth quarter, a combined effort coordinated through the Narcotics Task Force involving Drug Enforcement Administration, United States Customs Patrol, El Centro Police Department, Calexico Police Department, and the Santa Barbara Narcotics Task Force, using both intellegence and manpower, resulted in the arrest of a major international narcotics dealer with one-hundred and seventy (170) pounds of marijuana. This suspect is capable and has delivered a ton of marijuana previously. Subsequent arrests and seizures of narcotics of other members in this ring, have been accomplished with more arrests pending. The narcotics ring steals heavy equipment in Tulare, San Luis Obispo, and Santa Barbara County, which they bring to the suspect in Imperial County

to exchange for narcotics.
