This annual report reflects a totally new approach to the Security Services Department's reporting system.

In previous years the Security Services Department reported only those incidents in which an officer was directly involved. The new reporting system receives, analyzes, and records all incidents. Previously, some types of incidents were reported to Area Offices, some to Security and some to local police agencies with little coordination in the reporting system. The Fiscal Year 1974-75 saw a major change in the reporting approach. All incidents were reported to the Security Department which, in turn, became the disseminator of information throughout the system, with teletype contact to the Superintendent's Office, the Area Superintendent's Office, and the Security Services Area Offices. Additionally, all incidents handled initially by local police agencies had copies referred to the Security Services Department for further investigation.

DECENTRALIZATION

During the 1974-75 Fiscal Year the Security Services Department was decentralized according to the recommendations of the Comprehensive Study of Security Services of September, 1973.

Five Area Security offices have been established in their respective areas with the remaining Area Security office moving to its new offices prior to the opening of the 1975-76 school year. The delay in physical decentralization was due to the unavailability of housing for Security Services.

JUVENILE OFFENDERS REFERRED TO THE DIVISION OF YOUTH SERVICES

As a result of action taken by officers of this department a total of seventeen hundred and seventy-six juvenile offenders were referred to the Division of Youth Services for disposition.

Under certain guidelines, security officers are allowed to use their discretion in the referral of juveniles to the Division of Youth Services. Criteria, such as severity of the offense, recent past involvement in illegal activities by the offender, attitude of the offender and his parents, and whether or not the victim elects to prosecute are some of the elements taken into consideration.

Charges brought against offenders are frequently resolved by personnel in the Division of Youth Services without a judicial hearing. Disposition of charges and results of trials are not normally communicated to this department by Division of Youth Services or the Judicial System.

COURT ATTENDANCE

Officers of this department have been subpoenaed to appear in court on seven hundred and fifty-two occasions. Two hundred and eighty-six of those were for juvenile court. The remaining four hundred and sixty-six subpoenaes were for various divisions of circuit court in reference to adult offenders.

EMPLOYEE APPLICANT BACKGROUND INVESTIGATIONS

A new procedure for handling employee applicant background investigations was initiated during this Fiscal Year.

The names of all persons who are being considered for employment in the Dade County School System are listed by the personnel office and submitted to the Security Services Department for criminal background record checks.

An IBM 2740 inquiry terminal, tied into the Dade County Public Safety Department automated records system was installed in October, 1974 for this purpose. Office personnel were trained in the operation of this terminal and in the interpretation of the information retrieved.

AUTOMATED ALARM SYSTEMS

As of the beginning of the 1974-75 Fiscal Year, one-hundred and ninety-three automated alarm units had been installed in one hundred and thirty-eight schools. At the close of this fiscal year an additional eighty-four Digital Alarm units had been installed. During the next two years all of the schools scheduled to be protected by automated Digital Alarm systems by this department will be completed. Older Tape Alarm systems will be replaced by Digital Alarm systems during this same period of time.

A Digital Alarm Receiver to monitor Fire Alarm Systems in the schools has recently been installed in the Security Services Department. It is projected that all schools in the system will have fire alarm systems installed within the next five years in compliance with State Regulation 6A-2.

In addition to the automated building alarm systems one panic alarm, two elevator alarms, and the rounds of the Gentral Maintenance watchman are monitored by the Security Services Department. Twenty-two additional elevator alarms will be added upon completion of new schools under construction.

All alarm systems are monitored twenty-four hours a day, three-hundred sixty-five days a year by Security Services. Alarm signals are responded to by either Security Services Department officers or officers of other police agencies.

PATROL DIVISION ACTIVITIES

The reporting structure of the Patrol Division of the Security Services Department was revised in March of 1975. The following representative activities of the division were recorded during the last four months of the fiscal year.

During this period of time, seventeen hundred and seven alarm signals were received. Security Service Department officers responded to fourteen hundred and fifty, Units of other police agencies responded when Security Services units were not available.

PLANT SECURITY REPORTS

Plant Security Reports are prepared and forwarded to the Security Services Department in all cases of vandalism, theft, building damage, property damage, illegal entry, accidental damage, fire and arson by the location suffering the loss.

During the 1974-75 Fiscal Year 9,396 Plant Security Reports were processed by the department. Requisitions for replacement of lost property are processed against these Plant Security Reports by this department.

RESTITUTION FOR DAMAGES

Letters requesting restitution for theft and damage of school property under the provisions of the Florida Parent Responsibility law were sent to 605 parents or guardians of offenders. Restitution in the amount of \$31,511.39 was requested. Payments in the amount of \$5.634.91 were received.

Accounts totaling \$38,494.65 were submitted as uncollectable. This figure represents an accumulation of Restitution Requested accounts through late 1973. All efforts by this office to collect from the persons responsible for these accounts were unsuccessful.

INTERN PROGRAM

During this year two institutes of higher learning, Biscayne College and Florida State University expressed a desire to have some of their criminal justice students serve an internship with this department.

Arrangements were made and one young man from Biscayne College has finished two hundred and sixty hours of internship with this department.

Another young man from Florida State University began his internship on June 23 and will intern with this department for a total of three hundred and sixty hours.

This type of cooperative venture is in our opinion a positive approach in our endeavor to recruit bright young people as prospective employees.

TRAINING

A total of 24 security service officer recruits attended the Southeast Florida Institute of Criminal Justice (Miami-Dade Community College, N.C.). This is in compliance with the minimum standards for police officers in the State of Florida. The training consists of 480 hours of classroom instruction and field experience per security officer for a total of 11,520 man hours.

In addition a total of four thousand three hundred and fifty-five and one-half hours (4355.5) were devoted to specialized training for security officers of this department. This training is a continuing effort to upgrade the ability to better deal with police functions in todays changing society by the officers of this department.

GLOSSARY

- ALARM SIGNAL Electronic signal transmitted to the Central Security Office when any unauthorized entry is made into an alarm protected area.
- ARREST Suspect(s) charged with specific offense.
- ASSIST OTHER AGENCY Requested assistance rendered to police agency.
- COMPLAINT A formal allegation against a party.
- EXCEPTIONALLY CLEARED A case may be shown as exceptionally cleared due to the refusal to prosecute by the victim(s). A case may be exceptionally cleared by warning and dismissing juvenile offenders.
- INCIDENT An occurrence with connotations of probable illegal activity.
- OFFICER INITIATED REPORT Officer uncovers a violation of the law while on duty initiates the first report of it.
- OPEN DOOR/OPEN WINDOW REPORT Officer discovers an unsecured school building.
- QRU ALARM Alarm signal received but investigation revealed no criminal act occurred.
- UNFOUNDED No basis for complaint.
- <u>UNIT</u> Police radio equipped vehicle. Portion of a automated alarm system.
- WARN AND DISMISS Juveniles who have committed a violation of the law but released without being formally charged.

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
