After a night of 1.723 rejeases in calendar 1971, annual releases reached a low of 1.016 in 1874, then recovered slightly to 1.228 releases in 1975. A net decrease of 23 percent occurred in annual releases between 1971 and 1975. Both the rotal first and re-rejeased males and total first and re-rejeased ferales reflected about the same trends as for the combined sales female totals.

Adult Male First Releases

As may be noted in Table A, the 740 adult male first releases in 1974 were the annual low during the five-year period, with a high of 1,157 first-released males in 1971. There was a net decrease of 20 percent, from 1,157 in 1971 to 931 in 1975 (with a low of 740 male first releases out in 1974). The proportion of male first releases attributed to Milwaukee County fluctuated between a high of 45.9 percent in 1972 and a low of 38 percent in 1975.

After a slight increase in average (median) length of stay from 18.6 months in 1971 to 20.2 months in 1972, a gradual decline has taken place to 17.8 months in 1975. This reflects a net decline of 0.8 of one month over the five-year period.

Average (mean) lengths of stay ranged from just over four months to nearly six months higher than the median lengths of stay over the five-year period. This occurs because small numbers of offenders released have had much longer stays then the bulk of the first releases.

The proportion of male first releases with regular felony commitments increased rapidly from 86.8 percent in 1971 to 96 percent in 1972. This proportion has increased gradually since 1972 to 98.6 percent in 1975.

Adult Female First Releases

Beginning with 129 adult female first releases in 1971, this release group decreased by more than half, to 55 releases in 1974. They then recovered slightly to 64 releases annually in 1975. In 1975, 48 percent of the first-released adult females were committed from Milwaukee County. A high of nearly 58 percent of these releases were from that county in 1973.

During the five-year period median lengths of stay ranged between 9.3 months and 11.7 months for the first-released females. Table B shows that the mean lengths of stay were from 1.3 months to 4.9 months longer than the medians.

The table indicates considerable year-to-year variation in many of the remaining characteristics for first-released females. The trend toward an increased proportion of female first releases with regular felony commitments was similar to the trend displayed by male first releases. However, the female trend came to a more extreme percentage by ending at 100 percent for the 1975 first releases.

First Released and Re-Released Adult Males Compared

Trends during the past five years for selected characteristics of first and re-released adult males may be compared in Tables A and C. In Table C a downward trend may be noted for the percentage that male re-releases comprised of total male releases, from nearly 27 percent in 1971 to under 20 percent in 1975. Total males released decreased from 1,582 releases during 1971 to 1,160 releases in 1975, after a low of 915 releases in 1974.

Median stays of first-released males ranged from 0.1 month shorter to over five months longer than for the re-released males. The proportion of regular felony commitments increased sharply to over 96 percent in 1972 for the first-released males. The rise in the proportion of re-released males with regular felony commitments came in 1974 and reached the same level in 1975 as for the first-released males.

First and Re-Released Adult Females Compared

Five-year trends for selected characteristics for first and re-released adult females may be compared in Tables B and D. Wider year-to-year variations were revealed among the female re-releases (Table D) than for parallel characteristics for the first-released females (Table B). This can largely

be attributed to substantially smaller numbers annually of re-released females. The proportion of re-released females among total females released ranged from a low of nearly six percent to a high of 12 percent during the five-year span. Total numbers of females released annually (total of first and re-released females) dropped drastically from 141 in 1971 to less than half, or 61, by 1974.
