I. INTRODUCTION

This report was prepared in response to a request for technical assistance from the Bismarck, North Dakota, Police Department in connection with an examination of its records system in order to set up a plan of action for phased change starting with immediate action and extending to an eventual conversion to an automated system. After reviewing and analyzing the department's records and reporting procedures during the first part of the on-site visit, the consultant met with the Chief of Police and the Commissioners of Public Safety to discus the focus of the project. It was determined that because the current system 1) was so inadequate, 2) did not meet the department's needs, and 3) was not compatible with planned data processing applications, this study of the records system should be a broadbased as possible, leaving in-depth recommendations to be made in conjunction with the move to the new police building which is to be constructed within the next 18 months. Changes to be proposed at this time are thus largely rudimentary and will seek to pin-point the department's basic records problem.

II. ANALYSIS OF THE PROBLEM

The capital of North Dakota, Bismarck is a rapidly developing city. Its estimated population of 41,500 represents a rate of increase of more than 50 per cent since 1960, and much of this development has taken place within the last few years. In addition to the agricultural activity of the area, oil fields have been developed, and there has been a great effort started in coal gasefication, exploiting large areas being strip-mined. The many additional millions of dollars to be spent will increase the pressure to expand on Bismarck, and the atmosphere in and around the city is one of progress, as it appears that Bismarck will at least double in size by 1985. It will take a dynamic city administration to keep pace with these pressures, and many of the city departments have kept pace and are delivering the required services while planning for the future. The police department has not been among those departments.

The goal of the city commissioners late in 1976 when they set out to replace the retiring Chief of Police was to conduct a nationwide search for someone capable of bringing the police department into the mainstream of the city's expansion and progress. When Dr. Vern L. Folley was selected to assumed the position at the end of the year, he found that he had inherited a number of problems. His first priority was a reorganization of the department to give it a workable table of organization staffed with young, capable people. Improving communications was next on the priority list, and with LEAA assistance, Chief Folley arranged for a study of the communications system to be conducted. When he prepared his first budget, he discovered there were no available records that would enable him to determine the magnitude of the workload confronting the department. He could not answer the simple question of how many calls for service were received or answered during any given period of time, since only calls which the commander on duty perceived as being important were written up; others were answered but no report was made. The only way to determine where and when calls for service were originating was to listen to the tape recordings made of all telephone calls and radio dispatches. technical assistance project dealing with records resulted from Chief Folley's third priority.

The new law enforcement building presents a further complication, in that it will house not only the Bismarck Police Department but the Burleigh County Sheriff's Department and the district office of the North Dakota Highway Patrol as well, and a centralized approach to communications, records, and other functions is planned. Such an approach lends itself to computerization, and it became apparent to the consultant and those in Bismarck with whom he talked that the new building should include a computer system that would handle the records as well as computer-assisted dispatching.

III. FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS

The Bismarck Police Department over the years has taken the traditional approach of developing a new form whenever a new problem appears. The result is that the department is currently using 22 basic report forms, most of which involve the street police officer. Several forms must be used in order for the records bureau personnel to locate a report once it has been filed, and retrieving pertinent information on a specific situation or incident is a laborious and time-consuming procedure.

As new forms have been developed, redundacy has been created and continuity ignored. With the exception of a minor innovation involving a 3x5 time control card, designed to determine how much time elapsed in dispatching procedures, no revision of records control has taken place since February, 1974, at which time the North Dakota Bureau of Criminal Investigation designed a report form to provide a uniform approach to the reporting of incidents by all police agencies within the state. The Bismarck Police Department cooperated and adopted the Investigation Report which heads the list of 22 report forms that follows:

The foregoing forms, samples of which are included as Appendix A to this report, provide—if properly used—for adequate reporting of incidents handled by Bismarck police officers. They do not provide for an orderly

retrieval process. For example, the only control numbers used are assigned by records personnel to documents controlled by the court such as traffic citations, once they reach the records bureau. There it is sometimes necessary to consult two or more files or logs in order to locate all pertinent information on a single business, person, or location.

In the communications area, a running account known as the sergeant's log is maintained. Every incident requiring police action is noted in this log, which consists of ordinary 8 1/2"xll" paper. These notations are extremely brief and contain only enough information to comply with Federal Communications Commission requirements. The log is made available to representatives of the press each day as a record of activity over the preceding 24 hours. To learn what actually happened with regard to an incident, however, it is necessary to either contact the officer involved or to seek out any reports that might have been written. One other source of information is the recording device whose 24-hour capacity tape is connected to both the police radio and telephone, recording all calls, conversations, and dispatches. These tapes are held for 30 days, then erased and reused.

All complaints coming into the department that involve a classified crime result in at least a superficial report of the incident, whether the source is a walk-in, a sighting, or a response to a telephone call. Such cases on which a preliminary report is made automatically go to the criminal investigation section for followup, regardless of the offense. As a result, this section is overburdened with minutiae. It has little or no hope of solving the unsolvable, which create an inflated case load, detract from investigative effectiveness, and make for unfavorable public reaction because, under the circumstances, adequate attention is not paid to those cases which could possibly be closed by arrest and recovery.

However important such results seem, they are minor in comparison to the effects of the lack of management information. For the proper preparation of budget requests, deployment of personnel, meeting shifting trends in calls for service, and keeping in touch with the dynamics of the community, certain planning and management information must be available. Such is not the case for the Chief of Police of Bismarck and his staff. Their planning and their response to requests must be based on memory, on intuition, or all too often on the volume of unreasonable demands made by a vociferous minority or neighborhood. At such times, the department is defengeless because of its lack of data on which to base a response or a plan.

On the horizon is the new law enforcement building, whose site has been secured, whose architectural design is in the working drawing stage, and whose completion is anticipated within 18 months. Among the modern innovations to be included in the new building are both a computerized records system and computer-aided dispatch (CAD). These developments will dictate a redesign of the department's record-keeping approach, under which present records will be microfilmed and made available through data-processing techniques.

In the meantime, a complete revision of all forms and procedures in order to make them viable while retaining the manual approach would be both time-consuming and expensive. The best that could be expected would be about one year's use of the new manual system before it would be converted to the data processing system to be incorporated in the new building. Thus the recommendations that follow will address only those fundamental controls needed to provide immediate access to information essential to management decision-making and necessary for compliance with state and Federal requirements.

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

As part of the move to the new building, it is anticipated that the records and communications systems of the Bismarck Police Department and the Burleigh County Sheriff's Department will be consolidated. From this consolidation should evolve an information management system that will serve both the managerial functions and the hour-by-hour operations of the line services. Recognizing that the interim revision of records procedures for one of these departments at this time would represent a fragmented and costly approach, the following general recommendation for a long-range plan of action is made: The services of a qualified data processing organization should be secured as soon as feasible to analyze the future needs of the departments concerned with the goal of combining their present records and communications procedures into a single new program that will be adaptable to data processing and computer-aided dispatch. In addition, the following specific recommendations, both short and long range are proposed:

- 1. A geographical location control system should be instituted that would pinpoint the location of every call for service, reported crime, or on-site activity of the departments. Commonly referred to as geocoding, it involves dividing the jurisdiction into manageable areas consisting of from 1/10 to 1/4 of a square mile and assigning each area a control number. Because of the probable consolidation of the police and Sheriff's departments, the entire county should be geocoded.
- 2. To provide the departments with the information on manpower distribution needed for proactive policing, it is recommended that a "168-hour clock" be implemented. A week includes 168 hours in its seven 24-hour days; in the police service, each day is broken down into three 8-hour shifts (or watches). Each of these hours should be broken down into quarter-hour segments, and each incident involving police service should be noted within the applicable segment of the clock, thereby pinpointing each day's calls for service by the quarter-hour. This control device should be maintained by the dispatcher. Because the police workload could fluctuate according to each of Bismarck's four distinct seasons, it is recommended that a full year's experience be compiled before relying on this data to reassign personnel by hour or area.
- 3. The present procedure of maintaining a sergeant's log should be discontinued. It is redundant with regard to fulfilling FCC requirements for a 30-day record of radio communications, which are being tape recorded.

- 4. Every call for police service by telephone, walk-in complaint, or mail as well as every on-site action by an officer on the street should be recorded and adequate history maintained and made readily retrievable for future use. Such a procedure can start with a complaint card that contains a minimum of information and that is controlled by a system of inviolable sequential numbers. This time control card currently in use is close to this concept but falls short with regard to volume control. The recommended dispatch or complaint control card should be designed to fit on what is commonly referred to an IBM card.
- 5. It is recommended that a system of volume control or complaint control numbering be instituted immediately. At 0001 hours on January 1 of each year, the numbers would start with a 1 plus the last two numbers of the year; 1-78 would thus be the first complaint acted on in 1978. All police actions must bear this control number, and the procedure must be inviolable in that all numbers are accounted for. In the event no action is necessary or the complaint proves unfounded, this fact must be recorded in order to maintain the integrity of the number control system and give a true picture of the magnitude of service.
- 6. It is recommended that copies of all dispatch cards be made available to the press.
- 7. At present there is no positive way of determining exact times of receipt of complaints, of dispatch, arrival, or back in service. The attempt to note such times in long hand is of questionable value. It is therefore recommended that a time stamp clock be secured and used to record pertinent times on the IBM time control card. Examples of times to be stamped are the time the complaint is received, time the dispatch is made, time the unit arrives at the scene, and time it is cleared for service.
- 8. The present 22 report forms shown in Appendix A are more than sufficient, and revision and consolidation are in order in some areas, e.g., the time control card. The monthly activity sheet should be revised, since it is confusing in some areas and redundant in others. Most police departments using an activity report want a daily accounting, and in no instance should an activity account report extend beyond one week. The vehicle inventory impoundment report and the motor vehicle theft report are overlapping and could be consolidated.
- 9. The present system of microfilming should be continued.

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
