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MALE YOUTHFUL OFFENDERS ADMITTED TO WISCONSIN CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTIONS DURING THE FIRST YEAR OF THE PROGRAM (July 1, 1976 - June 30, 1977) - COMPARISONS WITH MALES POTENTIALLY ELIGIBLE FOR THE YOUTHFUL OFFENDER PROGRAM -

The Youthful Offender Act, Chapter 54 of the Wisconsin Statutes, became effective July 1, 1976. It was intended to serve persons who were under 21 at the time of commission of the felony for which they have been found guilty and for which the penalty would be imprisonment for less than life. A commitment under Chapter 54 is not a conviction of a felony and does not restrict future liberties such as voting, holding public office, or securing occupational licenses.

If an offender is under the age of 18 he may be committed to a juvenile institution or placed on juvenile regular or custody probation. If a person is over 16, the juvenile court may waive him to adult court where he would be tried and, if found guilty, determined to be a youthful offender or convicted and sentenced as an adult.

This study selects three groups of individuals admitted to correctional institutions during fiscal year 1977 who would potentially have been eligible for youthful offender dispositions:

- 1. Males first admitted to juvenile institutions at age 16 or 17.
- 2. Males first admitted to youthful offender institutions at age 16 through 20.
- 3. Males first admitted to adult institutions who were not adult probation violators at age 16 through 20.

There were no females admitted to institutions as youthful offenders during this fiscal year; therefore, female commitments are not included in this comparison.

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#### MALE FIRST ADMISSIONS TO INSTITUTIONS AT AGE 16 OR 17

The first three columns of each table list numbers of males who were age 16 or 17 upon admission to a correctional institution. There were 442 males first-admitted as juveniles, 18 admitted as youthful offenders, and 13 who were convicted as adults at age 16 or 17. Ninety-three percent of all males first-admitted at age 16 or 17 were committed to juvenile institutions. Over 98 percent of the age 16 new admissions were to juvenile facilities.

The most notable difference in disposition of 16-17 year old males seems to be attributable to the nature of the offense. More than half (53.8%) of those sentenced as adults, one-third of those committed as youthful offenders, and barely over one-tenth (11.7%) of those committed as juveniles had perpetrated violent offenses. About four-fifths of the juveniles, 55 percent of the youthful offenders, and 23 percent of the adults had committed crimes against property.

The seriousness of offense is reflected in the length of sentence. Those committed to juvenile institutions may be held only until they reach the age of majority at 18. The median number of months from admission to 18th birthday for 16-17 year old juveniles was 14.9 months. Less than four percent of these juveniles were within four months of their 18th birthday. Half of the 16-17 year old youthful offenders were within less than three months of reaching 18. The median number of months to age 18 of these youthful offenders was 3.0 months. Thirty-eight percent of the 16-17 year old adults were within 2 months of attaining age of majority. The median months to 18 for these younger adults was 5.5 months. It would appear that the closer an individual was to the age of majority, the more likely he was to be waived out of juvenile court.

The median length of sentence imposed on 16-17 year old males was 1.2 years for juveniles, 3.0 years for youthful offenders, and 5.5 years for adults.

Racial origin tables show 77.2 percent of those first admitted to juvenile institutions were "white" or "white, Mexican origin", as were 66.6 percent of the youthful offenders, and 46.1 percent of those admitted to adult institutions.

#### MALE FIRST ADMISSIONS TO INSTITUTIONS AT AGE 18-20

The fourth and fifth columns of each table enumerate characteristics of 61 males admitted to youthful offender institutions at age 18 through 20 and 188 males of the same age admitted to adult institutions who were not adult probation violators. Eighteen to twenty year old males were three times more likely to be committed to adult rather than youthful offender institutions.

Thirty percent of those committed as adults compared to less than ten percent of the youthful offenders had committed violent offenses. Over four-fifths of those designated as youthful offenders had committed property crimes.

The median length of sentence for 18-20 year olds was 2.7 years for youthful offenders and 3.9 years for adults. The longer sentences of adults are accounted for by the greater numbers of violent offenders.

Seventy-seven percent of the 18-20 year old youthful offender commitments to institutions were white. White males committed as adults represent 62.8 percent of their admissions.

# MALE FIRST ADMISSIONS TO INSTITUTIONS AT AGE 16-20 COMPARED WITH THOSE AGE 21 AND OVER

The last three columns represent all 79 admissions to youthful offender institutions during fiscal year 1977, the 201 males excluding adult probation violators first admitted to adult institutions at the same age (16-20), and the comparable adult admission group of 539 males over age 20.

About three-fourths of those admitted as youthful offenders, 61.7 percent of the same age group admitted as adults, and 60.1 percent of the adults over age 20 were white or white, Mexican origin. Slightly fewer youthful offenders than 16-20 year old adults were married (3.8% vs. 5.5%). Over one-quarter (26.3%) of the older adults were married. This appears to be purely an attribute of age.

The percentage of youthful offenders and adults of the same age group who had no previous felony convictions was nearly identical (84.8% vs. 84.1%), while only 36 percent of the age 21 and over adults had no previous felony convictions.

A greater percentage of youthful offenders had no previous penal experience (86.1%) than those age peers who received adult commitments (73.1%). Only 43.6 percent of the over 20 year old adults had no previous penal experience. This is probably a factor of age.

Seventy percent of the youthful offenders, sixty percent of the 16-20 year old adults, and 92.2 percent of the older adults had no juvenile institution experience.

Median grade completed of youthful offenders was 10.7 and of adults the same age was 11.2. Median grade of older adults was 11.3. The 16-17 year old juveniles had a median grade completion of 9.7, probably due to the greater numbers of admissions at age 16.

Achievement test scores should be viewed with caution as nearly 61 percent of the youthful offenders and 14 percent of the adults were not tested. Of those tested, youthful offenders scored three and one-half grades below the median grade completed, the median score being 7.1. Adults aged 16-20 tested a median of 8.2 and older adults tested at 8.6.

Twice as great a percentage of 16-20 year olds admitted as adults (31.9 percent) committed violent offenses as did those admitted as youthful offenders (15.2 percent). Twenty-nine percent of the adults over age 20 were violent offenders. Over three-fourths of all youthful offender admissions were for property offenses. A little over half (55.1 percent) the adults aged 16-20 and well under half (42.9 percent) of the older adults were property offenders.

Median length of sentence for all youthful offenders was 2.8 years. Similarly-aged adults received a median sentence of 4.0 years. Adults over age 20 had a 3.9 year median sentence.

Youthful offenders who were committed were more likely to have entered a plea of guilty (92.4 percent) and only 21.5 percent had received "concurrent" sentences. The adults aged 16-20 also had a high percentage of guilty pleas (89.0 percent), though 36.4 percent of all admissions received "concurrent" or "consecutive" sentences. Three-quarters of the older adults entered a plea of guilty and 36.1 percent of all admissions regardless of plea had "concurrent" or "consecutive" sentencing.

Milwaukee County committed 27.9 percent of all youthful offenders, 35.8 percent of similar aged adults, and 39.5 percent of the older adults.
