

STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY 1977

OFFENSES

- 373,450 Index offenses were reported in New Jersey during 1977, a 6 percent decrease over 1976.
- Violent crime declined 2 percent; the second consecutive yearly decrease.
- Nonviolent crime decreased 6 percent.
- \$174 million of property was stolen during 1977.
- Robbery was the motive in 17 percent of all murders committed.
- Larceny, and breaking and entering, accounted for 82 percent of the state's serious crime.
- 39 percent of all Index offenses solved involved persons under 18 years of age; the largest juvenile involvement ever recorded.
- During the five-year period 1973 through 1977, Rural crime increased 51 percent, Suburban crime 42 percent, and Urban crime 13 percent.

ARRESTS

- 326,934 persons were arrested during 1977, a decline of 3 percent over 1976.
- Adults represented 80 percent of all violent crime arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 55 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests.
- Four of every 10 persons arrested for robbery were under 18 years of age.
- Six of every 10 persons arrested for breaking and entering were under 18 years of age.
- Persons under 30 years of age represented 93 percent of all drug abuse violation arrests.

POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

- 3,957 police officers were assaulted in the line of duty during the year 1977.
- Almost 22 percent of the municipal police officers were assaulted during the year 1977.

VICTIM SURVEY (August through December, 1977)

- The elderly (60 and over) were victims of 22 percent of all strong arm robberies.
- Twenty-five percent of all purse-snatching victims were 60 years of age or over.



THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

DEFINED

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System involves the uniform compilation, classification, and analysis of crime statistics reported by all police agencies of the state pursuant to guides and regulations prescribed by law.

The statute which established the Uniform Crime Reporting System (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq) empowers the Attorney General to collect, gather, assemble, and collate information which would be of assistance in the proper administration of criminal justice. The Attorney General and the New Jersey State Police (the agency designated by the Attorney General to establish the Uniform Crime Reporting System), in an attempt to achieve uniformity with the FBI reporting system and to establish a broad base fue the collection of data involving anti-social behavior, and other relevant information with respect thereto, have defined the word "crime" to include acts which technically within our State are not considered crimes. In this reporting system the word "crime" includes some "disorderly persons offenses." It also includes in a category entitled "all other offenses" violations of municipal ordinances. References to the relevant tables which set forth the Class I and Class II offenses contained in this report clearly indicate what is covered.

PURPOSE

Effective law enforcement requires the coordination of law enforcement activities within and among political subdivisions. Special attention must often be devoted to a selective and concentrated effort both areawide, as well as in terms of a specific pattern and type of criminal behavior. Selective and coordinated enforcement becomes possible only when the type and volume of crime can be analyzed on the basis of accurate information comprehensively developed and systematically collated.

Information revealing the location, frequency, and nature of crime is essential to this purpose. It is for these reasons that New Jersey's Uniform Crime Reporting System was developed.

DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law was enacted on May 16, 1966 and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the Attorney General of the State. After passage of the law, the Attorney General, as provided by the statute, designated the New Jersey State Police as the agency to collect, gather, assemble and collate information from the law enforcement jurisdictions within the state.

Prior to the enactment of the law, and at the request of Attorney General Arthur J. Sills, the New Jersey State Police conducted research and study of crime reporting systems then operational throughout the country. Study results established that adoption of a reporting program paralleling that of the federal system of Uniform Crime Reporting would be the soundest approach toward development of a state system. The obvious advantage found in the adoption of the federal system included the desirability of having compatible state and federal systems thereby allowing absorption of state crime data into the national level.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions made by this committee have proven invaluable and, indeed, insured the success of the program. This body continues to work closely with the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit of the New Jersey State Police to improve further the quality of reporting and to recommend additional program standards, policies and procedures.

During the development phase of the program a study of the federal and various state systems of crime reporting revealed the importance of a sound internal police records system, if accurate crime statistics were to be forthcoming. Upon recognition of this factor, the State Police revised completely their method of internal reporting in order to meet the requirements of the Federal System of Uniform Crime Reporting. This step not only hastened program development but also proved inveluable throughout the operational phase.

Education of contributors to the program in the areas of mechanics, methods and concepts must be a constant operational requirement, if continued system adherence and valid statistics are to be expected. This vital need is satisfied by the personal contact between the four state troopers assigned as field representatives to the program, and the contributors to the system.

The difficult and important task of maintaining close liaison is obvious when it is realized that services now are extended by the New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, through its Field Representatives, to the 603 law enforcement agencies of the state. Although each contributor to the program is supplied with the "Uniform Crime Reporting Guide" describing system procedures and mechanics, personnel changes within reporting departments and program refinements make the educational phase a continuing one.

As an adjunct to the program, the New Jersey State Police has offered its revised method of internal reporting to those police departments who wish to adopt it. In all cases of report adoption and record up-dating, assistance is rendered by the Field Representative who provides the necessary guidance and instruction. The personal contact between the Field Representative and the contributor not only serves as a rapid means to resolve areas of report error, but also provides the opportunity to discuss other areas of interest, thus providing an additional mutual communication link between municipal, county and state law enforcement agencies.

PROGRAM EVALUATION

The scope of mandatory crime reporting in New Jersey extends far beyond the stated purpose of the initial program. The compilation and publication of an annual report, which identifies and offers analysis of the extent and nature of crime on a state, regional, county and municipal level, may be considered an end in itself. However, practical application of such data must be made before the program can be judged substantive.

Police executives throughout the state are making increased use of this data in administrative, planning and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. During 1977 the State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit rendered operational assistance to municipal police agencies by providing individual analysis of statistics as they related to specific crime problems and for use in identifying necessary police manpower and equipment needs. Program requirements have also increased police efficiency in the areas of reporting and record keeping. Examples of program application, as discussed here, aid police in their day to day operations and contribute toward the constant effort of upgrading the quality of police services in the community.

The State Law Enforcement Planning Agency, which was established in August of 1968 to conform with the provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, has the responsibility of improving law enforcement throughout the state. Since its inception, in all of its determinations as to application of allocated funds, this agency has used analyzed crime data obtained through the Uniform Crime Reporting program. The establishment of crime rates on state, county and municipal levels with identification of specific crime problems allows the agency to construct priorities, formulate plans and implement these plans to the benefit of the state and all units of local government. This administrative application of such crime data illustrates the far reaching effect the program has on all efforts to combat crime in the state.

Since 1967, many states have studied the New Jersey system for adoption within their respective states. Several of these, presently have ongoing programs based on the New Jersey system and many more of the remaining states are in the process of implementing similar programs.

The element of compatibility of crime statistics between state and federal programs is vital, and evaluation must include consideration of the degree of that compatibility. The Uniform Crime Reporting Unit of the State Police has worked closely with the members of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who administer the National Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Invaluable aid and assistance has been given by the FBI which resulted in the New Jersey program being compatible with that of the national program. This compatibility allows absorption of state crime data into the national system without lengthy and costly conversion processes.

On January 1, 1969, the FBI, who have collected National Uniform Crime Reports in the states and counties since 1930, eliminated the direct collection of National Uniform Crime Reports from the police of New Jersey. This procedure change followed a two-year evaluation of the New Jersey program by the FBI and resulted in an agreement wherein uniform crime reports for each municipality of the state are now being submitted to the national program by the State Police. This working relationship, which was coordinated through the Chiefs of Police Association, State Police and the FBI, is a direct result of the interest and cooperation of the law enforcement agencies of the state in the Uniform Crime Reporting program.

FACTORS RELATED TO CRIME

It has long been noted there are numerous factors, environmental and others, which have an important bearing on the scope and intensity of crime. As an adjunct to the statistical compilation and analysis of crime reported herein, special attention is devoted to certain of these factors.

To understand further the nature and scope of crime in various sections of the state, a section entitled "Profiles of Incorporated Municipalities in New Jersey" appears in this publication as it did in the first annual report of 1967. The profile information set forth in the areas of population, density rates and population growth all relate to provisional 1976 population estimates. Urban, suburban, rural characterizations, and given land areas relate to the year 1977.

Factors considered within profiles are those which are out of police control, but which may affect a community's crime rate and which may vary from community to community. The presence of these factors are noted in order that the resulting crime statistics may be reviewed in a more fair and equitable manner. The effect of these factors on a community's crime rate is not easily determined, but they are set forth for the purpose of alerting the reader to their existence in varying degrees in all New Jersey communities.

REFINEMENT OF THE SYSTEM

The collection of meaningful data to supplement that which is normally collected is a vital element of the system. This supplemental information regarding crime and the criminal, enters the system by way of special surveys and samplings. Periodic collection of such information enables better identification of specific crime problems and those factors which contribute to them. Analysis of refined information and dissemination to contributors provides additional intelligence upon which more effective police action can be based.

Special statewide surveys taken in previous years have dealt with the important mobility factor of crime and the specific offense of robbery. The results of the mobility study served as an indicator of the effect the criminal mobility can have on the crime experience of the community and the contribution it makes toward police problems in the control of crime. Robbery analysis, based on that special survey, better identified the nature of the crime, its impact on society and the robbery perpetrator.

The collection of refined information relative to crime was continued in 1969 through a one month "Special Auto Theft Survey" conducted in August of that year. The auto theft problem, although not unique to New Jersey, has grown to major proportions and suggests serious consequences for the individual and the community. A statewide arrest survey on the vital issue of "Drug Abuse and Crime in New Jersey" was conducted during the month of August, 1970. For the first time a meaningful correlation was established between these two major problems. Complete results and analysis are contained in the publication "Drug Abuse and Crime in New Jersey" released June, 1971.

In 1971 crime statistics by urban, suburban and rural classifications were collated and analyzed for the first time since the beginning of the program in 1967. These statistics were presented in the 1971 publication and will be continued in all future publications.

Criminal mobility had been surveyed during the earlier stages of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, however, the mobility of criminals in the state had not been addressed since the advent of New Jerseys' extensive Federal Interstate Highway System. To investigate this concern, a sample survey of thirty-nine municipalities traversed by Interstates 80 and 280, for the period January through June, 1976, was performed. Analyses of the survey results validated the concern that Interstate roadways provide criminals with swift avenues to-and-from municipalities previously difficult to reach.

During the months of August through December 1977, the New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit conducted a statewide victim characteristics survey in order to gain a clearer picture of victimizations in the state. Until this survey was performed, victim oriented information was not available on a statewide basis. A brief summary of this survey is contained elsewhere in this publication.

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey, in its eleventh year of operation, is now recognized as an effective vehicle to increase the efficiency of police operations in every municipality of the state. The System was originally designed to fulfill the need for accurate crime statistics for use in police administration, planning and operations. In its current status it does answer these needs to a great degree, but has not yet reached full potential as an operational tool.

In August, 1974, the New Jersey State Police, Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, through the New Jersey Law Enforcement Planning Agency, was awarded a Discretionary Grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, U.S. Department of Justice. The funds are for the purpose of assisting in the expansion of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

Based on the current Uniform Crime Reports submitted by the police departments throughout the state, a monthly "feedback" report is disseminated to each contributor to the program. This "feedback" report presents an accurate account of the status of crime in each municipality of the state. The report contains information as to the type and time of criminal operations and crime targets, as well as the volume and trend of crime within each municipality. In addition to comparing the current month with the same month of last year, further analysis is done for a current cumulative monthly total compared to the same period of last year. A trend for two prior years within the same crime categories is also established.

In addition to Monthly Crime Trend Reports, the

Uniform Crime Reporting Unit updates and implements record-keeping systems for Criminal Justice agencies, upon request. To assist in this updating of reporting techniques, the Unit has written, published, and distributed a "Law Enforcement Internal Record Systems Guide" (LEIRS). The Unit also improved its capabilities to provide individual crime analyses for requesting Criminal Justice agencies.

COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit crime reports to the program. During the year 1977, offense and related supplementary information, as well as arrest and disposition data, were received from 480 full-time municipal police departments, 49 special part-time municipal police departments and the New Jersey State Police who provided the necessary information for the 38 municipalities without local police services.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest and disposition data were received for the state's 21 county prosecutors' and 21 sheriffs' offices, 2 county police departments and 8 county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement under the system, the 10 other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities were included. Also included are 11 college campus police departments reporting under a pilot program. This amounts to 603 law enforcement agencies reporting.

In the interest of satisfying a national, as well as a state need for uniformity, completeness, and accuracy in crime statistics, every report submitted under the system is prepared in triplicate by the contributor. One copy is retained by the contributor and the remaining copies are submitted to the State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, which in turn forwards a copy to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for inclusion in the National Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

METHOD

Reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur, rather than to the agency which may investigate, arrest or otherwise in some manner, dispose of the case. The clearance, in every case, is attributed to the municipality in which the offense occurred, even though the arresting agency may not be the department originally reporting the offense. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. The Uniform Crime Reporting Guide, which was revised during 1977, has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail and is complete with examples and illustrations. Field Representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

Municipal law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories:

- (1) Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter)
- (2) Forcible Rape
- (3) Robbery
- (4) Assault
- (5) Breaking and Entering
- (6) Larceny-Theft
- (7) Motor Vehicle Theft

This count is determined from a record of all criminal complaints received by the police from victims or other sources or discovered by the police during their operations. Complaints determined by police investigation to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. The number of "offenses known" in each crime category is reported without regard to whether anyone is arrested, stolen property is recovered, local prosecutive policy, or any other consideration. Municipal law enforcement agencies also report the total number of these crimes cleared by arrest. A separate category is made for crimes cleared by the arrest of persons under 18 years of age. Certain other analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, including, for example, total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted information is also collected by month.

Other monthly report forms contain data such as the number of persons arrested for all criminal offenses with respect to age, sex and race of the offender. An accounting of persons formally charged and their dispositions is submitted on an annual basis, as well as police employee data.

In summary, the presentation of this report, "Crime in New Jersey," reflects the compilation of the seven serious "offenses known to police," arrests of persons under 18 years of age and 18 years of age and over, and the ultimate disposition of those persons charged. This data is then related to the State of New Jersey, by population groups, character, individual counties, and municipalities.

VERIFICATION PROCESSES

An obvious concern in the collection of crime statistics from 603 law enforcement agencies throughout the state is the uniformity of data received. Program aids such as guides and instructions do not necessarily guarantee the accuracy and correctness of the reports submitted by the contributors. Additional controls are therefore necessary.

Each report received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and, possibly more important, for reasonableness as to interpretation of offense classifications. Fluctuations from levels established by previous reports submitted by the contributor become suspect of inquiry as to reason for variations. Improper classification, changes in reporting procedures or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved by a personal visit by a Field Representative to the reporting agency. These personal contacts are invaluable to the accuracy of the system. Field Representatives are engaged in a constant educational effort and, as such, provide a vital link between the program and the reporter.

CLASSIFICATION OF OFFENSES

Uniformity in reporting under the New Jersey system is based upon the proper classification of offenses by police. The adoption of the federal system of reporting included the utilization of the offense classifications of that system. Law enforcement in this state has made accurate application of those classifications in the reports submitted to the program.

In view of the need for compatibility with the federal system, "offenses" under the program are not distinguished by designation of "high misdemeanors," violations of the Disorderly Persons Act or Municipal Ordinances. The explanation of offense classifications may vary slightly with those employed at the federal level because the language used is familiar to law enforcement in this state. However, the major categories of offense classification remain the same as those employed nationally.

OFFENSE CLASSIFICATIONS

(1) Homicide

 Murder—The unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought.
 General rule—Any death due to a fight, argument,

quarrel, assault or commission of a crime.

1b. Manslaughter—The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, without malice aforethought. General rule—The killing may result from the commission of an unlawful act or from a lawful act performed with gross negligence. Traffic deaths may be classified as such when due to gross negligence of someone other than the victim.

(2) Forcible Rape

- 2a. Rape by force-The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly against her will.
 - General rule—Forcible rape of a female, but excluding carnal abuse (Statutory Rape) or other sex offenses.
- 2b. Assault to rape—Attempts—All assaults and attempts to rape.
- (3) Robbery-The felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. Includes all attempts. General Rule-Robbery differs from larceny in that it is

aggrevated by the element of force or the threat of force.

- 3a. Firearm—All robberies and attempted robberies involving the use of any type of firearm. This includes revolvers, shotguns, rifles, zip guns, etc.
- 3b. Knife or Cutting Instrument—All robberies and attempted robberies involving the use of cutting or stabbing objects, such as a knife, razor, axe, glass, ice pick, etc.
- 3c. Other dangerous weapon—All robberies and attempted robberies when any other object or thing is used as a weapon. (Clubs, bricks, acid, explosives, etc.)
- 3d. Strong arm-All robberies and attempted robberies where no weapon is used but strong-arm tactics are employed. This is limited to personal weapons such as hands, fists, feet, etc.
- (4) Assaults—An assault is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do physical injury to another.

General rule—All assaults will be classified in the following categories, excluding assaults with intent to rob or rape.

- 4a. Gun-All assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of any type of firearms. (Revolvers, automatic pistols, shotguns, zip guns, rifles, pellet guns, etc.)
- 4b. Knife or cutting instrument—All assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of cutting or stabbing objects. (Knife, razor, hatchet, axe, cleaver, scissors, glass, broken bottle, dagger, ice pick, etc.)
- 4c. Other dangerous weapon-All assaults or attempted assaults when any other object or thing is used as a weapon. (Clubs, bricks, pick handles, bottles, explosives, acid, lye, poison, scalding water, burnings, etc.)
- 4d. Hands, fists, feet, etc.—Atrocious—Assaults which are of an atrocious nature when hands, fists, feet, etc. are used. To be classified as atrocious assault, the attack must result in serious personal injury.
- (5) Breaking and Entering—Unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny.

General rule—Any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any dwelling, house, attached structure, public building, shop, office, factory, storehouse, apartment, house trailer, warehouse, mill, barn, other building, ship or railroad car.

Note: For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, breaking, entering and larceny are classified only as breaking and entering, the larceny is excluded. Breaking and entering of a motor vehicle is classified as larceny.

- 5a. Forcible entry—All offenses where force of any kind is used to enter unlawfully a structure, with intent to steal or commit a felony. This includes entry by use of a master key, celluoid or other device that leaves no outward mark but is used to open a lock. Concealment inside a building, followed by the breaking out of the structure is also included.
- 5b. Unlawful entry-No force-Any unlawful entry without any evidence of forcible entry.
- 5c. Attempted forcible entry–When determined that forcible entry has been attempted.

(6) Larceny-Theft (Except motor vehicle theft)-The unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. General rule-All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larceny from motor vehicle, larcenies of motor vehicle parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, larcenies from buildings, and from coin operated machines. Any theft that is not a robbery or the result of breaking and entering is included. Embezzlement, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are excluded.

(7) Motor Vehicle Theft—The larceny or attempted larceny of a motor vehicle.

General rule—Thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as a motor vehicle in this state. Excludes where there is a lawful access to the vehicle, such as a family situation or unauthorized use of others with lawful access to the vehicle. (Chauffeur, employees, etc.)

- 7a. Autos-Includes the thefts of all sedans, station wagons, coupes, convertibles, and other similar motor vehicles which serve the sole purpose of transporting people from one place to another.
- 7b. Trucks and Buses-Includes those vehicles specifically designed to transport people on a commercial basis, and to transport cargo.
- 7c. Other vehicles—This category includes other motor vehicles such as snowmobiles, motorcycles, trailbikes, etc. Farm and construction equipment are not considered motor vehicle thefts.
- (8) Other Assaults—Not atrocious—Assaults and attempted assaults which are not of an atrocious nature and are simple and minor in nature.
- (9) Arson-Willful or malicious burning with or without intent to defraud. Include attempts.
- (10) Forgery and Counterfeiting—Making, altering, uttering, or possessing or attempts to make, alter, utter or possess with intent to defraud. Anything false which is made to appear true.
- (11) Fraud-Fraudulent conversion of another's money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks, except forgery and counterfeiting.
- (12) Embezzlement-Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property in trust to one's care, custody or control.
- (13) Stolen Property-Buying, receiving, possessing-Buying, receiving and possessing stolen property and attempts.
- (14) Malicious Mischief-Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.
- (15) Weapon: Carrying, possessing and etc.—All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers and attempts.
- (16) Prostitution and Commercialized Vice-Sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes.
- (17) Sex Offenses-Except forcible rape, prostitution and commercialized vice-Statutory rape, offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Also

include attempts.

- (18) Drug Abuse Violations-Offenses relating to narcotics and drugs, such as unlawful possession, sale or use. Does not include: Failing to register as user or federal offenses.
- (19) Gambling-Promoting, permitting, or engaging in gambling.
- (20) Offenses against Family and Children-Non support, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.
- (21) Driving under the Influence-Driving or operating any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.
- (22) Liquor Laws-State or local liquor law violations, except "drunkenness" and "driving under the influence." Excludes federal violations.
- (23) Drunkenness or Intoxication-Not reportable in New

Jersey.

- (24) Disorderly Conduct-Breach of the peace. (Disorderly persons.)
- (25) Failure to give Good Account-Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.
- (26) All other Offenses--All violations of state and local laws except classes 1-25.
- (27) Suspicion-Arrest for no specific offense and released without formal charges being placed.--Not reported in New Jersey.
- (28) Curfew and Loitering Laws (Juveniles)--Offenses relating to juveniles of local curfew or loitering ordinances, where such laws exist.
- (29) Runaways (Juveniles)—Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of local statutes as runaways.

CRIME FACTORS

Statistics gathered under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program are submitted by the law enforcement agencies of New Jersey and project a statewide view of crime. Awareness of the presence of certain crime factors, which may influence the resulting volume and type of statistics presented, is necessary if fair and equitable conclusions are to be drawn. These crime influencing factors are present, to some degree, in every community and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime experience of that community. Attempts at comparison of crime figures between communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community.

Crime, as an outgrowth of society, remains a social problem of grave concern and the police are limited in their role to its suppression and detection. As stated by the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Criminal Justice in their report *The Challenge* of Crime In a Free Society-(1967-Page 92)-"But the fact that the police deal daily with crime does not mean that they have unlimited power to prevent it, or reduce it, or deter it. The police did not create and cannot resolve the social conditions that stimulate crime. They did not start and cannot stop the convulsive social changes that are taking place in America. They do not enact the laws that they are required to enforce, nor do they dispose of the criminals they arrest. The police are only one part of the criminal justice system; the criminal justice system is only one part of the government; and the government is only one part of society. Insofar as crime is a social phenomenon, crime prevention is the responsibility of every part of society. The criminal process is limited to case by case operations, one criminal or one crime at a time." Set forth below are some of the conditions which will, by type and volume, affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.
- Economic status and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuters, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Educational, recreational, and religious characteristics. Effective strength of the police force.
- Standards governing appointments to the police force.
- Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.
- Attitudes of the public towards law enforcement problems.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW - 1977

As in the past, the New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit has been surveying police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their viewpoint concerning contributing crime factors. Increased abuse of drugs and alcohol, insufficient manpower, lenient courts, and seasonal population changes, are some of the general type responses received from many of the police agencies.

Many of the specific type responses concerning the increase or decrease of a particular crime, have been documented in earlier publications of "Crime in New Jersey," but these viewpoints are still valid and appear again below:

ROBBERY:

Increases

• Availability of new interstate roadways that provide a swift avenue to-and-from communities previously difficult to reach. This factor has also shown a relationship with breaking and enterings in suburban and rural areas.

Decreases

• The addition of highly visible scooter and foot patrols in high density crime areas; selective enforcement; stake out squads are assigned to target areas using analytical information derived by studying past robbery occurrences.

BREAKING AND ENTERING:

Increases

• Husband and wife both working; leaving homes more frequently unoccupied during the daylight hours.

• Unoccupied vacation homes being entered during the off-season. Many police administrators cite insufficient manpower to properly patrol these areas as a contributing factor.

• Little or no security measures initiated by the average citizen to protect his own property.

• Juvenile recidivists receiving no detention after they are arrested numerous times for being involved in breaking and enterings.

Decreases

• Crime prevention programs are being stressed in many communities as a means of decreasing crime. Programs as "Neighborhood Watch" and "Operation I.D." have proven to be successful as a deterrent to breaking and enterings, as well as other crimes.

• Increased patrols during probable times and location of residential and commercial breaking and enterings.

LARCENY:

Increases

• Larceny of auto parts and property contained inside motor vehicles is the most common type of larceny being reported to police in New Jersey. This is attributed to:

- Shortage of police manpower to adequately patrol parking lot areas.
- A lack of security provided by the various shopping malls in their own parking areas.
- Availability and visibility of the articles left in the vehicles.

• Shoplifting is a larceny that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their arrest policies do vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed towards prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent, an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to police.

Decreases

• Surveillance of shopping mall parking areas, utilizing motor scooters, bicycles and plain clothes foot patrols.

• Use of additional or improved lighting to prevent criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.

• Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in larceny from parked vehicles. These types of programs also help reduce bicycle thefts.

• Larceny of bicycles have decreased as a result of Safety and Security Programs implemented by police in the various schools. This includes the registration and marking of bicycles with special numbers.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT:

Decreases

• Motor vehicle thefts have been decreasing since 1972. Some of the programs that have contributed to these decreases include warning notices issued to persons leaving their vehicles unlocked, and/or taking keys that were left in vehicles and notifying the driver to recover them at Police Headquarters.

• Police also attributed some of the decreases to the rapid identification of reported stolen vehicles through the New Jersey Statewide Communication Information System; acting as a deterrent.

STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor & Industry, Division of Planning and Research, Office of Demographic and Economic Analysis. Provisional 1976 population estimates are used in this publication, and are calculated differently from previous estimation methods. This new method cannot be compared with population estimates previously found in "Crime in New Jersey," but may be compared to the population figures found in the 1970 census.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category:

Urban Center

Densely populated with extensive development

Urban-Suburban	Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more resi- dential areas
Urban Center-Rural	Densely populated core area but surrounded by rural areas
Suburban ,	Predominantly single family resi- dential, within a short distance of an urban area
Suburban-Rural	Rapidly developing area but still large tracts of open land available for development
Rural	Scattered small communities and iso- lated single family dwellings
Rural Center	High density core area with surround- ing municipalities rural
Rural Center-Rural	Small developed core area surrounded by rural areas

Certain other socio-economic factors, present in varying degrees in all communities, may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 977.3 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas of sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

Dramatic increases have occurred in specific counties and municipalities. The trend of this rapid growth in population of the suburb and rural areas has resulted in the loss of some city populations. Much of the loss has occurred from urban redevelopment or renewal programs, but to a great degree have been absorbed by the outlying suburbs or rural areas. An interesting note is the fact that the shift of the urban population to suburban or rural areas has caused a large number of these municipalities to be reclassified to an urban status.

The unique image New Jersey presents for consideration is not only the result of the many and varied factors within its own boundaries, but also the complex elements of the megalopolis of which it is a part.

NEW JERSEY CRIME INDEX - 1977

In this section, tabulations presented in tables and charts indicate the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime for the state as a whole, counties, character groups, population groups and individual municipalities. The Crime Index, consisting of seven serious offenses, is used as a measure. Offenses are counted as they become known to law enforcement agencies. Crime classifications used in the index are: murder, forcible rape, robbery, atrocious assault, breaking and entering, larceny and motor vehicle theft. In the past, larceny \$50 and over has been used as one of the Crime Index offenses. Effective January, 1973, total larceny-theft is being used instead of the larceny \$50 and over category. Larceny-theft is primarily a crime of opportunity and in most instances the value of the property taken is incidental to the actual criminal act.

Although the total number of criminal acts that occur are unknown, those that are reported to police provide the first means of a count. All crimes do not readily come to the attention of police nor are all crimes of sufficient importance to be significant in an index and further, not all important crimes occur with enough regularity to be meaningful in an index. With these considerations in mind, the above crimes were selected as a group to furnish some measure of the crime problem in New Jersey.

The volume of crime in a state, county or municipality is subject to those crime influencing factors set forth elsewhere in this publication. Crime rates are constructed from estimates of current permanent population. The important transient population factor, although present in every community in varying degrees, cannot be measured in all instances and therefore is not included in the establishment of a crime rate. The existence of this factor, however, should be considered when reviewing the tabulations presented in this section.

The establishment of the base year New Jersey Crime Index for 1967 provided a foundation which allows year to year comparison of like data to be made. Specific areas of comparison presented in this publication are in respect to variances of offense volumes, rates, clearances and related information. Fluctuations in arrest volumes, rates and supplementary arrest information are also included in the tabulations shown.

CRIME AND POPULATION

Crime rates relate the incidence of crime to population. More specifically, a crime rate should be considered as a count of victims. The risk of victimization arises from crime-population computations and provides a numerical result for consideration. Crime influencing factors, which are complex in nature and exist in varying degrees in all areas, are not incorporated in the determination of a crime rate.

STATE OFFENSE DATA

A total of 373,450 Crime Index offenses were reported to law enforcement agencies of New Jersey during Calendar Year 1977, a 6 percent decline in crime volumes over 1976. This figure represents the first decrease since 1972, and in volume is less than that of 1975. During the five-year period 1973-1977, however, Index offenses increased more than 24 percent.

The Crime Index offenses referred to here represent the most common problem to law enforcement and the municipality; they are serious crimes by their nature, volume or frequency of occurrence. Basically, they can be categorized as violent crimes, such as murder, forcible rape, robbery and atrocious assault, or nonviolent offenses such as breaking and entering, larceny and motor vehicle theft.

During 1977, the violent crime category decreased almost 2 percent when compared to 1976, and thus recorded the second consecutive yearly decrease. The 28,732 reported violent crimes accounted for 8 percent of the total Crime Index. Within this grouping, murder increased 7 percent, forcible rape increased 5 percent, robbery decreased 10 percent, and atrocious assault increased 7 percent over 1976. The five-year period, 1973-1977 disclosed an almost one percent decrease in the violent crime category.

The nonviolent or property type offenses totalled 344,718 crimes, a 6 percent decrease since 1976. This group represents 92 percent of the total Crime Index. Within the grouping, breaking and entering decreased 5 percent, larceny declined 8 percent and motor vehicle theft decreased less than one percent as compared to 1976. Upon analysis, the five-year period, 1973 through 1977, revealed that property crimes increased 27 percent.

A review of the distribution of offenses within the Index discloses that larceny accounted for 54 percent of the 1977 Index total, and breaking and entering accounted for 28 percent. Together, they are responsible for 82 percent of the state's serious crime. Robbery and atrocious assault, each accounted for 4 percent of the total Index, and represented the largest involvement in the viclent crime category.

The highest incidence of Index crimes were recorded during the months of August (36,687); and July (35,276), while the lowest frequency was recorded in January, with 23,534 offenses.

RATE

Crime rates are compiled by relating the incidence of crime to the resident population. Many other factors which may contribute to the volume and type of crime in a given jurisdiction are not shown here, but are presented in the Profile section of this publication.

In 1977, the crime rate was established at 5,089 victims for every 100,000 permanent inhabitants. This represents a 5 percent decrease over 1976, and a 25 percent increase since 1973. The 1977 rate for the violent crime group was established at 392 victims for every 100,000 inhabitants, a less than one percent decrease over 1976. Within this violent crime group, atrocious assault recorded the greatest involvement of victims, 185 for every 100,000 residents. The nonviolent crime rate decreased 5 percent over 1976, and resulted in a property crime rate of 4,697 per 100,000 inhabitants. Larceny contributed the most victims to the overall crime rate, 2,752 per 100,000 residents.

CLEARANCES

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a crime is cleared when police have identified the offender, have evidence to charge him and actually take him into custody. Solutions of crimes are also recorded in exceptional instances when some element beyond police control precludes formal charges being placed against the offender, such as the victim's refusal to prosecute or local prosecution is declined because the subject is being prosecuted elsewhere for a crime committed in another jurisdiction. The arrest of one person can clear several crimes or several persons may be arrested in the process of solving a single offense.

The police of New Jersey cleared or solved 17.2 percent of all Index offenses reported in 1977, a 4 percent increase over 1976. The violent crime group recorded a 47.9 percent solution rate, while the nonviolent or property group registered a 14.6 percent solution rate.

Considering individually the 1977 violent crime solution rate, it was determined that police were successful in solving 78 percent of the murders; 58 percent of the rapes; 25 percent of the robberies and 68 percent of the atrocious assaults. The nonviolent crime clearance rates were as follows: Breaking and entering 15 percent; larceny 16 percent and motor vehicle theft 8 percent.

The relatively high clearance rate for violent crimes as compared to nonviolent crimes, is in part attributable to the volume difference between the two. Nonviolent crime volume is much greater than that of violent crime, and police investigation of violent crime is usually more intense. The element of confrontation between victim and perpetrator, as well as witness identification of the perpetrator, contributes greatly to this higher solution rate.

JUVENILE CLEARANCES

A means of measuring the degree of criminal involvement in the young age group, is to identify the number of crimes in which they are the offenders. In 1977, almost 39 percent of all Crime Index offenses solved in New Jersey involved persons under 18 years of age, and represents the largest juvenile criminal involvement since the inception of the statewide Uniform Crime Reporting Program in 1967. During the past five years, this percentage has steadily increased from a 33 percent juvenile involvement. Violent crime solutions involving juveniles were recorded in almost 18 percent of the cases. Nonviolent crime clearances involved juveniles in 45 percent of the cases, and also has been steadily increasing since 1973.

The juvenile involvement in individual Index offenses during Calendar Year 1977, reflected the following: Murder 7 percent; rape 13 percent; robbery 25 percent; atrocious assault 15 percent; breaking and entering 47 percent; larceny 44 percent and motor vehicle theft 42 percent.

STOLEN AND RECOVERED PROPERTY VALUE

The total value of property stolen in New Jersey in 1977 increased 6 percent to \$174 million, from the \$165 million

reported in 1976. This dollar value represents the proceeds of all murders, forcible rapes, robberies, breaking and enterings, larcenies and motor vehicle thefts reported by New Jersey police during 1977. Motor vehicles accounted for 43 percent of stolen property; while miscellaneous property such as televisions, radios, bicycles, furniture, etc., accounted for almost 34 percent of the property stolen in 1977.

Police recovered 32 percent of the total value of property stolen in 1977, but the remaining unrecovered portion represents a loss of \$118 million to the victims. Almost 62 percent of the value of motor vehicles stolen in New Jersey during 1977 was recovered.







VIOLENT CRIME BY MONTH 1975 – 1976 – 1977






INDEX OFFENSES CLEARED BY ARREST OF ADULTS AND JUVENILES 1977

MURDER

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Traffic deaths, caused by the negligence of someone other than the victim, are not included here, but are counted under the manslaughter category. Attempts to kill and assaults to kill are scored as atrocious assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

VOLUME AND RATE

There were 407 murders reported in 1977 by the law enforcement agencies of New Jersey. Numerically, murders increased 26 over the 1976 total, with a trend increase of almost 7 percent. During the past five years, murders have decreased more than 25 percent.

Murder accounted for one-tenth of one percent of all Index offenses reported during the year. In 1977, there were 55 victims per 100,000 inhabitants; a rate increase of 8 percent when compared to 1976.

MURDER ANALYSIS

In all cases of murder, a supplementary report is submitted by the reporting law enforcement agency. Pertinent information including age, sex and race of victim, weapon used to commit the offense, and circumstances or motive which led to the crime, is among the data collected. Place of occurrence, relationship of victim to offender, day of week and whether the victim was killed by single or multiple offenders, are also included.

The supplementary data used in the analysis of reported murders is limited to the "known" facts of the case. It is understandable that unsolved murders, in most cases, prevent complete data availability for murder analysis.

The frequency of murder during 1977 was highest in the month of March, when 45 murders occurred. September recorded the lowest frequency with 24 murders reported. Murder by day of week disclosed Friday to be the highest day of occurrence, when 21 percent, or 87 of the murders occurred. The three day period of Thursday, Friday, and Saturday accounted for 52 percent of all murders reported.

In 1977, male victims accounted for 73 percent of the total murder victims. Further victim analysis by race disclosed that 51 percent were Negro and 48 percent were White. Analysis by age revealed that the 20-34 age group contained 34 percent of the total murder victims.

In the area of "known" perpetrators, the adult male-female ratio disclosed that adult males were identified as the perpetrators in 78 percent of all the murders solved, and the adult female was represented in 14 percent of the murders cleared. The remaining cleared murder cases were perpetrated by juvenile males in 8 percent of the instances, and female juveniles accounted for less than one percent of all murder clearances.

Additionally, 89 percent of all murders were committed by a single offender, with the remaining 11 percent perpetrated by multiple offenders. During 1977, firearms were used in 40 percent of the murders in which the weapon was identified. This degree of usage is the lowest recorded in recent years. Within the firearm category, handguns were the most predominant weapon used, with an 80 percent involvement. Cutting or stabbing instruments represented a 32 percent usage in murders. Other weapons, such as clubs, hammers, poison, arson, etc., were used in 13 percent of the cases, and the remaining 16 percent being attributed to the use of personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet.

Analysis of murder by location disclosed that 48 percent of the murders occurred in private residences. In most cases police are powerless to prevent this type of murder because of the private circumstances surrounding each occurrence. Although most murders do occur in residences, 29 percent of all murders reported did occur on the highways or streets of our state, and 5 percent took place in bars.

Further analysis disclosed that most murders, 79 percent, were committed by relatives or other persons acquainted with the victim. Members of the immediate family group were identified as the perpetrators in 22 percent of the murders, and 10 percent of the murders were that of spouse-killing-spouse.

The circumstances or motives for committing murder were gathered from cases where this type of information is "known" and made available for analysis. Altercations or quarrels between the victim and perpetrator accounted for 62 percent of all murders reported in 1977, the largest single category. Lovers quarrels and romantic triangle situations which resulted in murder, contributed 4 percent to this count, with money and drinking quarrels, revenge motives and quarrels of undetermined nature accounting for the remaining 58 percent.

"Felony" murders are defined under the program as those killings which are perpetrated during the commission of another crime. They are classified as rapes, robberies, sex crimes, breaking and enterings, arson and other felonious activities. This type of circumstance or motive accounted for 27 percent of the murders where the motive was known. Robbery accounted for 17 percent of all known murder circumstances.

Child abuse was responsible for 3 percent of all murders during the year and the specific circumstance of a child victim killed by a babysitter accounted for almost one percent.

The total value of property stolen resulting from all murders during the year increased 25 percent over 1976, and amounted to \$85,341.

CLEARANCES

The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing or solving 78 percent of the murders reported in 1977. This high solution rate, results from the victim-perpetrator relationship evident in this crime and is shared by police universally.

Those murders solved by arrest of persons under 18 years of age amounted to 7 percent of all the cases solved.

FORCIBLE RAPE


Forcible rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape

without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

VOLUME AND RATE

A total of 1,535 forcible rapes were reported to New Jersey police departments during 1977; an average of 4 each day. Numerically, the volume increased 72 over the 1976 total, resulting in a trend increase of 5 percent. In the past five years, rape has increased almost 11 percent and has accounted for four-tenths of one percent of the total Crime Index. In 1977, reported rapes represented 5 percent of all violent crime.

A crime rate equates the number of crimes per unit of population, and in its proper perspective, is a victim risk rate. In 1977, 21 out of every 100,000 persons in this state were reported forcible rape victims. The availability of the 1970 census population data allows for the calculation of a forcible rape rate based on the female population alone. For every 100,000 females in New Jersey, more than 41 were reported victims of this violent crime. The risk of becoming a victim of this crime has increased 6 percent since 1976.

ANALYSIS OF RAPE

The highest incidence of rape during the year was noted during the month of June, with August showing the second highest monthly volume, recording 177 and 162 offenses respectively.

Forcible rapes accounted for 71 percent of the total rape offenses reported, while the remaining 29 percent were attempts or assaults to rape. The victims of this violent crime, in many cases, are hesitant in reporting the offense to police due to fear and/or embarrassment of the victims, when the possibility of a court appearance confronts them, or the effect it may have on their reputation when the facts become known. Additionally, there is difficulty in establishing the act of force when there is the presence of a prior relationship between the victim and perpetrator. Due to the usual clandestine nature of this offense, it occurs most often out of reach of police patrols. The offense of forcible rape, because of the above factors, is probably the most underreported crime within the Crime Index, and crime counts in this publication are limited to the actual offenses established by police investigation. However, somewhat contributing to the reported increases of rape during the last two years, are the rape crisis centers which have been developed in some areas of the state, and the increased use of specially trained police personnel to handle rape victims.

CLEARANCES

During 1977, 58 percent of all forcible rapes reported were solved. Persons under 18 years of age accounted for 13 percent of all rape cases solved.

ROBBERY

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included. Effective January 1, 1974, the robbery subheadings were changed from armed and strong arm, to robbery by firearm, knife or cutting instrument, other dangerous weapon and strong arm (hands, fists, feet, etc.)

VOLUME AND RATE

During Calendar Year 1977, 13,218 robberies were reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state, placing the number of robberies below that recorded in 1971. When 1977 is compared to 1976, a trend decrease of 10 percent evolves; the largest decline within the Index. Robberies account for 4 percent of the Crime Index, and 46 percent of the violent crime total.

The rate of robbery in 1977 decreased 9 percent from 1976, with 180 victims for every 100,000 persons in the state. A 13 percent decrease in reported robbery offenses is shown for the period 1973 through 1977.

ANALYSIS OF ROBBERY

Supplementary information, which reveals the nature of robbery, is collected under the program in order to gain further insight regarding this violent crime. Idenfication of the most frequent "targets" for robbery is accomplished by classification of the type of location where the crime was perpetrated and whether or not the offender was armed.

The armed robber was responsible for 53 percent of all robberies committed during 1977, the lowest percentage since 1970. A further breakdown reveals that guns were used in 29 percent of all cases, knives 18 percent, and other dangerous weapons in 6 percent of the robberies reported. The remaining 47 percent were attributed to the unarmed confrontation of the victim by the perpetrator where tactics such as muggings, were employed.

The month of December recorded the highest month for robbery offenses, when 1,304 robberies were reported by police in the state. A total of 1,150 robberies occurred in October and 1,141 in January. April recorded the lowest number with 967, followed by May with 968.

Street robberies represented 57 percent of all robberies, and accounted for 36 percent of the property stolen during 1977. Robberies of persons in their homes recorded 12 percent of the total robberies, while robberies of business establishments other than gas stations, chain stores and banks registered an 11 percent involvement. Gas station and chain store robberies, each recorded a 5 percent involvement. Bank robberies accounted for a little more than one percent of the total robberies reported but, represented almost 16 percent of the total value of property stolen during robberies.


Numerically, gas station robberies recorded the only increase among the robbery categories, reporting an increase of 18 robberies over 1976, which represents a percentage increase of almost 3 percent.

The total value of property loss resulting from robberies reported during 1977, amounted to \$7.2 million, with an average value per robbery of \$547. Highway robberies or robberies occurring on streets reflected the largest total property loss, amounting to \$2.6 million. Bank robberies, the lowest rate of incidence, reflected the highest average loss, \$7,149 per occurrence.

The impact of this violent crime on the victim cannot be measured in terms of money or property value alone. As stated previously in the murder section of this publication,

Strong Arm (Hands, Fists, Feet, etc.) robbery was the motive for 17 percent of all murders committed in 1977. Numerically, there were 47 persons murdered as a result of robbery in 1977 and in the past five years a total of 305 persons were murdered as a direct consequence of this crime.

CLEARANCES

The police of New Jersey were successful in solving 25 percent of all robbery offenses reported to them in 1977. Persons under 18 years of age accounted for 25 percent of all the solved robbery cases, a slight increase from the 24 percent recorded in 1976.

ATROCIOUS ASSAULT

Atrocious Assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that any injury result when a gun, knife or other weapon is used, which would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

VOLUME AND RATE

There were 13,572 atrocious assaults reported during calendar year 1977. This volume represents an increase of 7 percent over 1976, the largest increase of any Index offense. During the five-year period 1973-1977, atrocious assaults increased 17 percent. Atrocious assaults represent 4 percent of all Index offenses, and more than 47 percent of the violent crime grouping.

In 1977, 185 persons out of every 100,000 in New Jersey were victims of atrocious assaults. This figure represents an increase of 8 percent over 1976, and a 17 percent increase over the past five years. August recorded the highest month, at 1,323 offenses.

WEAPON ANALYSIS IN ATROCIOUS ASSAULT

The use or attempted use of a dangerous weapon in an assault, or the serious injury inflicted by hands, fists or feet separates this Index offense from those assaults categorized as "simple" and not atrocious in nature. The victim of an actual assault of this type may suffer serious injury or permar ent disability. All assaults to kill and attempts to kill are also included in this area.

Other dangerous type weapons, such as bricks, clubs or tire irons, were determined to be the most frequently used weapons in atrocious assaults during 1977. These weapons accounted for 3C percent of the total atrocious assaults reported. Knives or other cutting instruments, and personal weapons, such as hands, fists, and feet, each accounted for 29 percent of all atrocious assaults. Firearms were used as a weapon in 13 percent of all atrocious assaults reported in 1977, the lowest firearm involvement recorded since 1967.

CLEARANCES

Solutions for atrocious assaults were made in 68 percent of all cases reported in 1977, a slight decrease when compared to 1976. This relatively high clearance rate follows that of other crimes against the person. Offenses solved by the arrest of persons under 18 years of age accounted for 15 percent of the total cases solved, with the remaining 85 percent involving adults 18 years of age and over.

BREAKING AND ENTERING

Under this program, breaking and entering is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

VOLUME AND RATE

A total of 105,264 breaking and enterings were reported by New Jersey law enforcement agencies during 1977, a decrease of 5 percent over 1976. Although breaking and enterings have decreased during the past two years, they still account for 28 percent of the Crime Index, and 31 percent of the nonviolent crime category. During the five-year period 1973 through 1977, this property type crime has increased almost 15 percent.

The 1977 crime rate for breaking and entering was 1,434 victims for each 100,000 inhabitants of the state. This victim rate is comprised of 1,112 victims per 100,000 for forcible entry, 168 per 100,000 for unlawful entry without force, and 154 victims per 100,000 population for attempted forcible entry.

ANALYSIS OF BREAKING AND ENTERING

For the second consecutive year, August, with 9,994 breaking and enterings, reflected the highest monthly frequency. July recorded the second highest monthly volume of 9,543, and January recorded the lowest frequency with 7,414 breaking and enterings reported.

Forcible entry was evident in 78 percent of all reported breaking and enterings in 1977, while 12 percent were cases of unlawful entry where no force was used, and the remaining 11 percent were attempts to forcibly enter. There has been no significant change in this distribution over the past several years,


In 63 out of every 100 offenses, a residence was the target of the perpetrator. The remaining 37 percent were targets of a nonresidential nature. Daytime breaking and enterings accounted for more than 50 percent of the "resident" crimes reported. It was also determined that 85 percent of the nonresidential offenses occurred at night, when business volume is at a low ebb.

During the year 1977, victims of breaking and enterings suffered an economic loss of \$50.5 million. The average dollar loss was reported at \$480 per offense. Breaking and enterings of residences accounted for \$34.3 million, with the remaining \$16.1 million loss attributed to nonresidences or commercial targets.

CLEARANCES

The volume of this offense presents the police with a serious enforcement problem which is made more difficult in some jurisdictions by the lack of sufficient personnel to act as a deterrent, or even to properly investigate and thus provide successful solutions to these crimes.

The police of New Jersey were successful in solving 15 percent of all breaking and entering offenses reported during 1977. Juveniles were involved in 47 percent of all such case solutions.

LARCENY-THEFT

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are not included.

VOLUME AND RATE

During 1977, there were 201,978 larcenies reported to the law enforcement agencies of the state reflecting a decrease of 8 percent over 1976, the largest decline shown of any Index offense. These larcenies account for 54 percent of the total Crime Index, and 59 percent of all the nonviolent crimes. Even though larcenies decreased during the past year, the five-year period of 1973 through 1977, reflects an increase of almost 48 percent.

The larceny crime rate for 1977 decreased to 2,752 offenses per 100,000 population, a 7 percent decrease although again, the five year period from 1973 records a more than 47 percent increase.

ANALYSIS OF LARCENY-THEFT

As in past years, larceny offenses were highest during the summer months of June, July and August. The month of July recorded 20,601 larcenies, an individual high for this peak summer period.

The identification of larceny by type disclosed that larcenies from motor vehicles, and larcenies of motor vehicle parts and accessories, as a group, represented 40 percent of all larcenies reported in 1977. When motor vehicle theft is added to this "motor vehicle" group, it is noted that almost 32 percent of all offenses within the Crime Index, involved motor vehicles.

When considering individual "types" of larceny, the category of stolen motor vehicle parts and accessories accounted for 24 percent of all larcenies reported. Thefts from motor vehicles, which usually occur from inside the vehicle, represented more than 16 percent, by distribution. Stolen bicycles, and larcenies from buildings, each represented 15 percent of the total larcenies reported in 1977. 1977.

A significant trend increase was noted in the category of pocket-picking, increasing almost 29 percent over 1976 figures, and accounting for a little more than one percent of the total larcenies. Thefts from motor vehicles recorded a decrease of 33 percent over 1976.

Victims of larcenies suffered a financial loss of \$40.9 million; the average value of goods and property stolen from these victims totalled at \$202 per incident.

Larceny from buildings recorded the highest dollar loss to its victims, totalling \$11.3 million, representing the largest average loss of \$355 for each individual victim.

CLEARANCES

The number of larceny offenses solved by police is affected by the very nature of the crime. The lack of

witnesses to these crimes, which are sometimes described as "sneak thievery" or "unobserved thefts," and the volumes involved add to the difficulties encountered by law enforcement in attempts toward solution.

In 1977, less than 16 percent of all larcenies reported to police were solved. Those larceny offenses cleared by the arrest of persons under 18 years of age accounted for 44 percent of the total cases cleared.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as a family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mo-peds, etc.).

VOLUME AND RATE

In 1977, a total of 37,476 motor vehicles were reported stolen to the police of New Jersey, a decrease of 12 offenses when compared to 1976. This offense has continued to decline for the past five years and now accounts for only 10 percent of the crime Index. During the five-year period 1973 through 1977, the number of motor vehicle thefts decreased by more than 10 percent, and is below the 39,943 thefts reported during calendar year 1970.

The 1977 rate for motor vehicle theft increased to 511 victims for each 100,000 inhabitants of the state. This victim rate is comprised of 447 victims per 100,000 population for automobiles, 24 per 100,000 for trucks and buses, and 40 victims per 100,000 for all other vehicles.

ANALYSIS OF MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

The crime of motor vehicle theft has been documented primarily as a crime of opportunity. In most cases, it's the youthful offender who finds the automobile easily accessible for his immediate transportation needs and usually the vehicle is ready to drive away or the ignition is easily compromised.

The highest incidence of auto theft during the year was recorded for the month of August, with November recording the second highest monthly volume, 3,440 and 3,338 respectively.

Further analysis revealed that automobiles accounted for 88 percent of all motor vehicles stolen, trucks and buses 5 percent, and other type vehicles almost 8 percent.

In 1977, stolen motor vehicle values reached \$75.6 million, and represented 43 percent of the value of all property stolen during the year. The average value of a stolen vehicle was \$2,017 at the time of the theft, and although police recovered 62 percent of the value of all stolen vehicles, the remaining unrecovered portion represents a loss of \$29.1 million to the victims. The loss figure

does not take into account the monetary loss resulting from damage to the vehicle or property.

The recovery of a vehicle does not clear or solve the offense, but does benefit the owner by return of his vehicle. In 1977, 65 percent of the vehicles stolen were recovered by police. This relatively high rate of recovery can be attributed to the fact that most vehicles are stolen for the purpose of transportation. However, in following the trend over the past several years, it was noted that the percentage of vehicles being recovered has diminished considerably from the 83 percent recovery rate reported in 1967 and suggests more professional involvement where vehicle serial numbers are obliterated or altered and the vehicle re-sold.

As previously mentioned, the analysis of motor vehicle theft alone does not completely measure the special problem caused by the availability of the motor vehicle as a target for larceny of motor vehicle parts, accessories, and larcenies from motor vehicles (from inside the vehicle). New Jersey, although 46th in physical size, is ranked about 8th nationally in total motor vehicle registrations, add to this the hundreds of thousands of motor vehicles which annually enter New Jersey from other states, then a true picture of motor vehicle volumes in the state emerges. During 1977 a total of 118,302 offenses involving motor vehicles were reported to police, this represented a loss of \$91 million to the victims.

CLEARANCES


Law enforcement agencies of New Jersey were successful in solving only 8 percent of all motor vehicle thefts reported to them during the year. This solution rate, the lowest of all Index offenses, reveals a slight decrease over the percentage reported in 1976.

Many factors contribute to this low 8 percent solution or clearance rate. One is the high degree of mobility present in this offense, which is pointed out by the fact that 43 percent of the recovered vehicles were located in other jurisdictions. Another is the carelessness of the vehicle operator, when the perpetrator merely opens the door of a vehicle, with the keys already in the ignition, and drives it away. To a potential witness, this appears to be a normal act, thereby adding to the difficulties encountered in police detection and apprehension.

In 1977, 42 percent of the motor vehicle theft cases cleared involved a person under the age of 18.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT VALUE



STATE ARREST DATA

STATE ARREST DATA

Under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, an arrest is counted each time a person is taken into custody, notified or cited. The number of charges placed against a person at the time of the arrest are not considered in the count. The same person may be arrested several times during the year for similar offenses, as in cases of disorderly conduct charges, and is counted each time he is arrested.

Arrest practices and emphasis do vary from place to place and within a municipality from time to time. For example, the volume of police arrests for certain unlawful acts such as loitering violations is particularly influenced by this irregularity in arrest practices. Conversely murder, robbery and other arrests for serious crimes are more likely the result of standard procedures. In either case, arrests are used as a measure of law enforcement activity, and within certain limitations it can gauge criminality.

When a person under 18 years of age commits an offense and the circumstances are such that if the offender were an adult an arrest would be made, then the arrest is counted. It must be remembered that arrest counts do not reflect the specific number of persons arrested since one person may be arrested several times during the year.

PERSONS ARRESTED

During 1977, law enforcement officers of the state reported a total of 326,934 arrests for all criminal acts; a 3 percent decrease as compared to 1976. This represents the second consecutive yearly decrease, and places the number of arrests for a calendar year below that of 1974. However, during the five-year period 1973-1977, total arrests increased almost 10 percent. When 1977 arrests are related to current population estimates for New Jersey, there are 45 arrests for every 1,000 persons in the state. This figure has almost remained constant since 1974.

Those persons arrested for serious Crime Index offenses during the year, make up 22 percent of the total arrest figure; the arrest of persons under 18 years of age accounted for 49 percent of the arrests of this type.

The juvenile arrest involvement was, as in prior years, greater in the nonviolent crime categories of breaking and entering, larceny and motor vehicle theft where such juvenile arrests represented 55 percent of that group's arrest total. 1977 figures indicate that almost 8 of every 10 persons arrested for violent crimes (murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault) were adults.

ARREST TRENDS

Decreases in arrest activity by police, were noted in many of the crime categories during the year. As previously stated, a decline of 3 percent in arrests for all criminal acts was recorded for the period 1976 through 1977. Arrests for Index offenses decreased more than one percent during the same period, however, again the five-year comparison 1973-1977 reveals an increase of 25 percent.

Arrest decreases within the individual Index offenses were recorded in all but two categories; atrocious assault increased 6 percent, while larceny-theft increased less than one percent. Listed below are the Index offense arrests that registered decreases:

Murder
Forcible Rape
Robbery
Breaking and Entering 3%
Motor Vehicle Theft

A review of some other relatively large percentage decreases in individual arrest categories, disclosed a 22 percent decline in arrests for gambling and a 12 percent decrease in failure to give good account arrests. A 58 percent reduction in drunkenness arrests was not considered as this offense is no longer reportable within the Uniform Crime Reporting System. New Jersey enacted and passed legislation in 1975 to decriminalize public drunkenness, and on February 9, 1976 Governor Brendan Byrne signed Bill A-613 decriminalizing public drunkenness in the State of New Jersey. The new law became fully implemented on May 9, 1977 and is referred to as the Alcoholism Treatment and Rehabilitation Act. (ATRA)

Significant increases were noted in a number of categories. Forgery and counterfeiting recorded the largest increase among arrests during the calendar year, advancing almost 32 percent. Arrests for prostitution and commercialized vice registered an increase of 27 percent, and arrests for runaways rose more than 15 percent.

Arrests for drug abuse violations reflected a 7 percent decrease over 1976. However, a review of the five-year period 1973-1977, discloses that the number of drug abuse violation arrests 's below the number reported during 1973. Further analysis reveals that 10 percent of these arrests were for the sale/manufacture of these drugs and the remaining 90 percent for their possession. More than 60 percent of the arrests for sale/manufacture, and 84 percent of the arrests for the possession of a drug, involved marijuana or hashish. A complete listing is presented below:

ARREST ANALYSIS BY AGE

During 1977, adult arrests decreased almost 4 percent, while juvenile arrests declined less than one percent. However, when the five-year period 1973-1977 is considered, adult arrests increased 7 percent, and juvenile arrests rose 13 percent.

Adult arrests for the violent crimes of murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault, decreased slightly less than one percent since 1976 while juvenile arrests for these same violent crimes declined almost 6 percent. When comparing the last five-year period, it was noted that juvenile arrests for violent crimes were up 15 percent, while adult arrests for the same category increased only 3 percent.

Adult arrests for the nonviolent crimes of breaking and entering, larceny and motor vehicle theft decreased 4 percent, while juvenile arrests for the same group of nonviolent crimes increased more than one percent. The five-year period 1973-1977 disclosed that adult arrests increased 33 percent, and juvenile arrests increased 29 percent for the nonviolent crime offenses of breaking and entering, larceny, and motor vehicle theft.

The arrest involvement of young age groups for 1977 disclosed that 14 percent of all persons arrested were under the age of 15. Persons under the age of 18 accounted for 37 percent of all persons arrested, with persons under 21 years of age accounting for 54 percent of all arrests. As a further indication regarding the degree of serious crime involvement of juveniles, it was noted that nearly 4 of every 10 persons arrested for robbery were under 18. More than 6 of every 10 persons arrested for breaking and entering were also in this young age group. A high juvenile involvement was also disclosed in motor vehicle theft arrests. Six of every 10 juveniles arrested were charged with motor vehicle theft, and in the larceny category, 5 of every 10 persons arrested were under the age of 18.

Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 60 percent of the total arrests for narcotic drug law violations. A further breakdown disclosed that 31 percent were in the age bracket 18 through 20 years of age, while 18 percent were 16 years of age or under. Additional analysis of arrests of persons 17 through 21 years of age, disclosed that these young persons contributed 50 percent to the total arrests for narcotic drug law violations in 1977; a slight increase over the 49 percent involvement recorded in 1976. As a part of this age group's involvement in drug offenses, it is noteworthy that 93 percent were under the age of 30.

A matter of serious concern is the criminal arrest involvement of the young age groups, however, adults still record the highest involvement in the total arrest picture. Arrest of those persons 18 years of age and over represent 63 percent of all arrests reported in 1977. Adult arrests for violent crimes comprised 80 percent of that group's total arrest figure, which includes arrests for murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault.

ARREST ANALYSIS BY SEX

During 1977, analysis of arrests by sex revealed that 83 percent of all persons arrested were male; a slight decrease over 1976.

Although female arrests represent only 17 percent of the total state arrest picture, since 1973 female arrests have increased almost 23 percent, while male arrests have increased 7 percent for the same period. A review of the

period 1976-1977, disclosed a 4 percent decrease in male arrests, and a 5 percent increase in female arrests.

The arrests for violent crimes disclosed that females accounted for 10 percent of the total arrests, which includes a 13 percent involvement in murder and an 18 percent involvement in atrocious assault arrests. In the nonviolent or property type crime category, arrest of females accounted for 21 percent of the total arrests recorded. Within this nonviolent group, female arrests for larceny recorded the largest involvement at 30 percent.

Although female arrests for drug abuse violations accounted for only 14 percent of the 1977 arrest total for that offense, arrest volumes for this offense increased 10 percent, when compared to 1976 figures. Male arrests increased 6 percent when compared to 1976. Further analysis of male/female percent distributions indicate that 56 percent of the persons arrested for being runaways were females, and 41 percent of the persons arrested for fraud were female.

During 1977, other specific arrest categories were analyzed and reflected that male arrests for forgery and counterfeiting increased 47 percent, prostitution and commercialized vice 19 percent, runaways 14 percent, and liquor laws 11 percent, when compared to 1976 arrests. Female arrests also increased in the following categories: Offenses against family and children 43 percent, prostitution and commercialized vice 32 percent, runaways 17 percent, and driving under the influence 14 percent.

ARREST ANALYSIS BY RACE

In 1977, analysis by race of those persons arrested for all criminal acts during the year, disclosed that 71 percent were White, 28 percent were Negro and the remaining one percent were of other races. The arrest involvement by race for the Crime Index offenses revealed that 59 percent of all those arrested were White, 40 percent were Negro, the remaining percentage being of other races.

Arrests for violent crimes within the Index (murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault) reflect that 53 percent were Negro, 46 percent White and the remaining distributed among other races. Since 1973, the involvement of Whites in violent crimes has increased from 38 percent to 46 percent recorded in 1977.

During 1977, arrests for nonviolent crimes of breaking and entering, larceny and motor vehicle theft, disclosed that 62 percent were White, 37 percent Negro and the remaining one percent being distributed among other races.





PERSONS CHARGED

The disposition made of those persons arrested and formally charged in a court of jurisdiction is of great interest to the police administrator. Knowledge as to the quality of the police investigation, case preparation and presentation, may be gained from the subsequent dispositions of those cases which reach the court level.

It must be recognized that not all persons who are arrested are turned over to the courts for prosecution. There are various reasons for this: Failure of the victim to cooperate or appear at time of trial, as victims of rape, is one reason for failure to prosecute effectively those persons arrested; lack of sufficient evidence to support a charge and evidence obtained which discloses the arrested person did not commit the offense, are additional reasons for an arrested person not being brought to trial. For example: More than 46 percent of all juveniles arrested were handled by the individual law enforcement agencies, without a formal charge against them or referring them to juvenile authorities. Police methods in handling juveniles differ throughout the state, but in this section all tables concerning juveniles refer to those who were arrested and turned over to juvenile authorities in connection with specific criminal offenses.

During 1977, 85 percent of all persons arrested for Crime Index offenses were turned over to the courts. The adults charged with Crime Index offenses were found guilty by the courts in 74 percent of all cases presented.

An analysis of individual Index offenses determined that 27 percent of the murder defendants were either acquitted or their cases dismissed at some prosecutive stage. Forcible rape recorded the highest rate of acquittal or dismissal with a 59 percent rate. Atrocious assault second, with 44 percent of the defendants being acquitted or their cases dismissed.

A review of all crime categories disclosed that convictions were high in the following offense categories:

Offenses involving alcoholic beverages recorded the highest conviction rates, with driving under the influence at 92 percent, liquor laws 89 percent and drunkenness 87 percent. Persons charged for offenses against family and children, which includes desertion and nonsupport, were found guilty in 84 percent of the cases presented. Gambling convictions were reported at 80 percent.

Of those persons charged with Crime Index offenses whose cases reached the court level, 7 percent were found guilty of a lesser crime and 26 percent were acquitted or dismissed. The highest percentage of persons found guilty on the original charge in 1977, as compared to those found guilty of a lesser offense, was in the larceny-theft category where 96 percent of all guilty defendants were convicted as charged. This was followed by robbery, where 88 percent of the defendants were found guilty of the original charge.

Disposition data for 1977 disclosed that acquittals or dismissals were greater in the violent crimes of murder, rape, robbery, and atrocious assault, than in the nonviolent crimes of breaking and entering, larceny, and motor vehicle theft. Dismissal or acquittal for the violent crimes was reported at 29 percent for 1977. The dismissal or acquittal rate for those crimes of a nonviolent nature was 20 percent for the same period.

The above data discloses the results of cases after police have arrested and formally charged the adult offender. The remaining cases pending court action, or undecided at the year's end, are classified as pending and are carried from year-to-year until a disposition is furnished by a court of jurisdiction. For the year ending 1977, 74,973 cases remain pending according to information supplied police by the various courts of New Jersey.

A final review of all crime categories discloses that 26 percent of all adults tried by the courts were either acquitted or their cases were dismissed at some prosecutive level. Persons of young age groups who were referred to Juvenile Court represented 20 percent of the total persons formally charged in all crime categories.

CRIME STATISTICS BY COUNTY

ATLANTIC COUNTY

OFFENSES

During the year 1977, a total of 12,218 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of Atlantic County, representing a 6 percent increase over 1976. Violent crimes decreased 5 percent, while nonviolent crimes increased 7 percent.

Further analysis revealed that larceny comprised 52 percent, and breaking and entering 33 percent of the Crime Index. These combined offenses accounted for 85 percent of the county's serious crime. The majority of all breaking and enterings occurred during the nighttime hours, with private residences being the primary target. Analysis of the larceny offenses revealed that larceny of bicycles, and thefts from buildings, individually accounted for 22 percent of the total larceny category.

Volumewise, the month of August recorded the highest frequency of Index Crimes, while January recorded the lowest.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Law enforcement agencies of Atlantic county arrested 12,729 persons during 1977, a decrease of almost 10 percent as compared to 1976. Adult arrests decreased 10 percent and juvenile arrests declined 9 percent. These arrests contributed to the 21 percent Crime Index solution rate, one of the highest among New Jersey's counties.

BERGEN COUNTY

OFFENSES

A total of 36,129 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of Bergen County during 1977, revealing a 9 percent decline over 1976. Within the Index, the crimes of murder, forcible rape, robbery, and atrocious assault diminished less than one percent, and the nonviolent offenses of breaking and entering, larceny, and motor vehicle theft decreased more than 9 percent.

Volumewise, larceny offenses accounted for 63 percent of Bergen county's serious crime. Larcenies from motor vehicle, and motor vehicle parts and accessories, accounted for 45 percent of the total larcenies recorded. Further study revealed that most breaking and onterings occurred during the hours of darkness, in private residences. Collectively, larceny and breaking and entering are responsible for 88 percent of all Index offenses in Bergen county.

The month of August recorded the highest frequency of Index offenses while January recorded the lowest.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

During calendar year 1977, police in Bergen County arrested 27,095 persons, representing a decrease of almost 2 percent when a comparison is made to 1976. Arrests of persons 18 years of age and older declined 4 percent, and arrests of juveniles increased 2 percent.

Law enforcement agencies of the county solved a little more than 13 percent of all the Crime Index offenses reported to them during 1977.

BURLINGTON COUNTY

OFFENSES

The police of Burlington County reported 12,636 Crime Index offenses during the year 1977. When compared to 1976, this serious crime measurement represents a 2 percent decrease. However, though the number of Index Crimes declined, violent crime increased almost 4 percent, while nonviolent crime lessened by 3 percent.

Examination of individual Index offenses disclosed that larceny accounted for 58 percent of the county's Crime Index. Most larcenies, over 24 percent, were those of bicycles, and 21 percent were in the category of motor vehicle parts and accessories. Breaking and entering contributed an additional 30 percent to the Crime Index. Similar to many other counties, the majority of the breaking and enterings occurred to residential dwellings during the hours of darkness. Altogether, larceny, and breaking and entering, represented 88 percent of Burlington County's entire Crime Index.

Index crime frequency was at its highest during the summer month of August, and lowest during the winter month of January.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

The law enforcement agencies of Burlington County arrested 15,238 persons during 1977, an increase of 7 percent over 1976. Adult arrests included in this total, increased 6 percent, and juvenile arrests revealed a 12 percent advance over last year.

Burlington County law enforcement agencies solved almost 21 percent of the Index offenses reported to them in 1977; a substantial increase over the 18 percent solution rate reported in 1976.

CAMDEN COUNTY

OFFENSES

Camden County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 27,494 Index offenses in 1977, a 3 percent decrease over the previous recorded year. Violent crime increased 14 percent, and nonviolent crime decl'ned 5 percent.

Review of the Index offenses revealed that collectively, breaking and entering, and larceny, amounted to 80 percent of the county's serious crime total. Further review disclosed that larceny of motor vehicle parts, and larcenies of bicycles, accounted for more than 42 percent of the larceny problem. The majority of the breaking and enterings occur during the nighttime, with private residences the primary target.

August recorded the highest monthly number of Index crimes, while January registered the lowest.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Police of this county arrested 20,808 persons during the year, representing a decrease of almost 4 percent. Individually, adult arrests decreased 2 percent, and juvenile arrests declined more than 8 percent.

More than 16 percent of the Index crimes were solved during 1977, a significant decrease when compared to the 19 percent solution rate of 1976.

CAPE MAY COUNTY

OFFENSES

During 1977, 4,888 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of Cape May County. When this number is compared to 1976, an 11 percent reduction in serious crime evolves. Violent crime increased less than one percent, and the nonviolent property type crimes declined more than 11 percent.

Further analysis revealed that larceny comprised 61 percent, and breaking and entering 31 percent of the Crime Index. Together, these offenses accounted for 92 percent of the county's serious crime. The majority of the breaking and enterings occurred during the nighttime hours, with commercial establishments the chief target. Analysis of the larceny offenses, revealed that the thefts of bicycles accounted for 30 percent of the total larceny category.

Numerically, August recorded the highest frequency of Index crimes, while January recorded the lowest.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Law enforcement agencies of the county arrested 7,922 persons during 1977, a decrease of almost 14 percent when compared to 1976. Adult arrests decreased 15 percent, and juvenile arrests declined 10 percent.

Police of Cape May County were able to solve almost 18 percent of the Index offenses reported to them. This solution rate is slightly lower than the 19 percent solution rate reported in 1976.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY

OFFENSES

A total of 7,221 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of Cumberland County during 1977. When contrasted to the previous year, a 3 percent increase is disclosed. Within the Crime Index, violent crime decreased 5 percent over 1976, and the nonviolent crime category of breaking and entering, larceny, and motor vehicle theft increased almost 4 percent.

Volumewise, larceny offenses accounted for 60 percent of the county's serious crime problem. Larcenies of bicycles were responsible for almost 25 percent of the total larceny classification. Thefts from motor vehicles, motor vehicle parts and accessories, and the aforementioned bicycles were responsible for 58 percent of all larcenies in the county. Further study revealed that most breaking and enterings occurred during the hours of darkness, with places of residence being the primary target. Collectively, larceny, and breaking and entering, accounted for 89 percent of the county's Crime Index offenses. The month of June recorded the highest frequency of Index offenses, and January reported the lowest volume.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

During calendar year 1977, the police in Cumberland County arrested 8,816 persons, representing a decrease of almost 8 percent when a comparison is made to 1976. Arrests of persons 18 years of age and older declined 11 percent, and arrests of persons under the age of 18 indicated no change over the previous year.

Law enforcement agencies of Cumberland County solved almost 23 percent of all the Crime Index offenses reported during the year. This represents one of the highest solution rates recorded in the state during 1977.

ESSEX COUNTY

OFFENSES

The police of highly urbanized Essex County reported a total of 57,910 Crime Index offenses during the year 1977, the largest number of Index offenses for any of the counties. However, when compared to the previous year, an 8 percent decrease is disclosed. Violent crime decreased 7 percent, and nonviolent crime lessened by 3 percent over 1976.

Examination of individual Index offenses disclosed that larceny accounted for 43 percent of the county's Crime Index. Most larcenies, 22 percent, we'e those of motor vehicle parts and accessories, and 21 percent were from buildings. Brecking and entering contributed an additional 28 percent to the Crime Index. Unlike many of the other counties, the majority of the breaking and enterings occurred to nonresidential dwellings, during the hours of darkness. Altogether, larceny, and breaking and entering, represented a substantial portion of Essex County's Index crimes; over 71 percent.

Index crime frequency was largest during the summer month of August, and smallest during the winter month of January.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Arrests by the law enforcement agencies of Essex County decreased 2 percent, to 41,374 persons during 1977. Included in the county totals were adult arrests which declined 5 percent, and juvenile arrests, which advanced 4 percent over the previous year.

Essex County law enforcement agencies solved 18 percent of the Index offenses reported to them during 1977.

GLOUCESTER COUNTY

OFFENSES

Gloucester County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 10,208 Index offenses in 1977, representing less than a one percent increase over 1976. Violent crime advanced 14 percent, and nonviolent crime decreased less than one percent.

A review of the Index offenses revealed that collectively, breaking and entering, and larceny, amounted to 89 percent of the county's serious crime total. Further analysis disclosed that larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories, accounted for 27 percent of the larceny problem. Breaking and enterings were found to be occurring to residential dwellings during the nighttime hours.

March recorded the highest monthly number of Index crimes, while January registered the lowest number.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Police of this county arrested 8,990 persons during the year, a decrease of 2 percent when compared to 1976. Individually, adult arrests decreased 4 percent, while juvenile arrests increased almost 2 percent.

Crimes reported to Gloucester County police agencies were solved at an 18 percent rate, a rise over the 16 percent recorded during 1976.

HUDSON COUNTY

OFFENSES

During the year 1977, a total of 29,164 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of Hudson County, representing an 11 percent reduction over 1976. Violent crime declined 9 percent, and nonviolent property type crime decreased almost 11 percent.

Further analysis revealed that larceny accounted for 39 percent, and breaking and entering, 31 percent of the total Crime Index. Together, these two offenses represent 70 percent of the county's serious crime. The majority of the breaking and enterings occurred during the nighttime linurs, with nonresidential type dwellings the main target. Analysis of the larceny offense revealed that thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, and from motor vehicles (inside the vehicle) accounted for 54 percent of the total larceny category.

Numerically, July recorded the highest frequency of Index crimes, while February recorded the lowest number of offenses.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Law enforcement agencies of the county arrested 20,191 persons during 1977, a decrease of almost 12 percent as contrasted to 1976. Individually, adult arrests decreased 11 percent, and juvenile arrests declined more than 13 percent.

Police of Hudson County were able to solve more than 12 percent of the Index offenses reported to them in 1977. This solution rate is slightly higher than the solution rate reported during 1976.

HUNTERDON COUNTY

OFFENSES

A total of 1,626 C-imc Index offenses were reported to the police of Hunterdon County during 1977; the lowest volume of any county. When this total is compared to 1976, a 3 percent decline is disclosed. Within the Index, the violent crime category of murder, forcible rape, robbery, and atrocious assault increased almost 30 percent (from 61 to 79 offenses), and the nonviolent crime category of breaking and entering, larceny, and motor vehicle theft declined 4 percent.

Volumewise, larceny offenses represented 53 percent of the county's serious crime. Larcenies categorized as "all other", and "from building", were responsible for 55 percent of the entire larceny category. Further scrutiny of the property crimes revealed that most breaking and enterings occurred during the nighttime hours, with nonresidential type dwellings the favorite target. Collectively, larceny, and breaking and entering, were responsible for 90 percent of the county's Crime Index offenses.

The month of June recorded the highest frequency of Index offenses, and April the lowest volume.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

During calendar year 1977, the police of Hunterdon County arrested 2,311 persons. This represents an increase of almost 4 percent when a comparison is made to 1976. Arrests of persons 18 years of age and older advanced 6 percent, and arrests of persons under the age of 18 declined one percent.

The law enforcement agencies of the county solved more than 25 percent of all the Crime Index offenses reported to them during 1977. This solution rate is the highest recorded among all counties.

MERCER COUNTY

OFFENSES

The police of Mercer County reported 19,412 Crime Index offenses during the year 1977. When compared to 1976, the Crime Index disclosed a 4 percent decrease. Both violent, and nonviolent crime counts declined 4 percent during the same period.

Further investigation of individual Index offenses disclosed that larceny accounted for 54 percent of the county's total Index. Most larcenies, 27 percent, were those of motor vehicle parts and accessories, 16 percent were from motor vehicles, and 15 percent were categorized from buildings. Breaking and entering contributed an additional 29 percent to the Crime Index. The majority of the breaking and enterings occurred to nonresidential dwellings, during the hours of darkness. Altogether, larceny, and breaking and entering, represented 83 percent of Mercer County's Index crimes.

Index crime frequency was largest during the month of May, and at its lowest during the winter month of January.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Arrests by the law enforcement agencies of Mercer County decreased one percent, to 15,686 persons in 1977. Included in the county totals were adult arrests which increased 3 percent, and juvenile arrests, which declined more than 7 percent.

Mercer county law enforcement agencies solved 18 percent of the Index offenses reported to them during 1977.

MIDDLESEX COUNTY

OFFENSES

Middlesex County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 29,098 Index offenses, representing a 6 percent decrease during 1977. However, violent crime increased one percent, and nonviolent crime declined 4 percent over 1976.

A review of the Index offenses revealed that collectively, breaking and entering, and larceny, accounted for 86 percent of the county's serious crime total. Further investigation disclosed that larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories, accounted for 25 percent, and thefts from buildings 19 percent of the total larceny situation. Most breaking and enterings were found to be occurring to residential type dwellings during the daylight hours.

August recorded the highest monthly number of Index crimes, while January registered the lowest number.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Police of this county arrested 23,754 persons during the year, and when compared to 1976, a decrease of 3 percent evolves. Individually, adult arrests decreased 8 percent, and juvenile arrests increased 5 percent.

Crimes reported to Middlesex County police agencies were solved at a rate of almost 17 percent, a rise over the 16 percent rate recorded during 1976.

MONMOUTH COUNTY

OFFENSES

During the year 1977, a total of 24,778 Crime Index offenses were reported to the Monmouth County law enforcement agencies. This represents a 4 percent decline over the 25,748 Index offenses reported in 1976. Violent crime increased slightly less than one percent, and nonviolent crime decreased 4 percent.

Additional analysis revealed that larceny constituted 62 percent, and breaking and entering 28 percent of the Crime Index. Together they accounted for 90 percent of the county's serious crime. The majority of the breaking and enterings occurred during the nighttime hours, with private residences being the primary target. Analysis of the larceny offense revealed that larceny of bicycles, and larcenies of motor vehicle parts and accessories, each accounted for 20 percent of the total larceny category.

Volumewise, the summer month of August reported the highest number of Index crimes, while the winter month of January recorded the lowest number.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Law enforcement agencies of the county arrested 22,958 persons during 1977, indicating a decrease of 5 percent compared with 1976. Adult arrests declined 8 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased almost one percent.

Monmouth County law enforcement agencies solved slightly more than 18 of every 1.00 Index offenses reported to them during the year. This represents a slight increase over the rate recorded in 1976.

MORRIS COUNTY

OFFENSES

A total of 15,773 Index offenses were reported to the police of Morris County during 1977, and when compared to 1976, a 5 percent decline is disclosed. Within the Index, the violent crime grouping of murder, forcible rape, robbery, and atrocious assault advanced 18 percent, and the nonviolent property crime grouping of breaking and entering, larceny and motor vehicle theft decreased a little more than 5 percent.

Volumewise, larceny offenses accounted for 64 percent of the county's serious crime. Larcenies of motor vehicle parts and accessories, and thefts classified as "all other", were responsible for 50 percent of the total larcenies. Further study disclosed that most breaking and enterings occurred in nonresidential dwellings during the hours of darkness. Collectively, larceny, and breaking and entering are responsible for 92 percent of the county's Crime Index offenses.

The month of August recorded the highest frequency of Index offense occurrence. January reported the lowest volume.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

During calendar year 1977, police in Morris County arrested 16,020 persons, representing a 3 percent trend decrease when a comparison is made to 1976. Arrests of persons 18 years of age and older increased one percent, and arrests of juveniles decreased almost 8 percent.

Law enforcement agencies of the county solved 17 percent of all the Crime Index offenses reported to them during the year 1977.

OCEAN COUNTY

OFFENSES

The police of Ocean County reported 16,323 Crime Index offenses during the year 1977. When compared to 1976, this serious crime measurement represents a 5 percent trend increase. Violent crime increased 26 percent, and nonviolent property type crime increased 4 percent.

Examination of individual Index offenses disclosed that larceny accounted for 61 percent of the county's Crime Index. Most larcenies, 27 percent, were categorized as "all other", and 21 percent were that of motor vehicle parts and accessories. Breaking and entering contributed an additional 30 percent to the Crime Index. Many of the municipalities situated in Ocean County are shore oriented communities and contain many unoccupied vacation homes during much of the year. A determination as to when entries occurred during this time frame was rather difficult, accordingly, police of Ocean County reported that the majority of the breaking and enterings occurred to residential dwellings, during an unknown time of day or night. Altogether, breaking and entering, and larceny, represent a substantial portion, 91 percent, of Ocean County's Index crimes.

As would be expected in this resort oriented county, crime volume was highest during the summer month of _August, and lowest during the winter month of January.

ARRES IS/CLEARANCES

Arrests by the law enforcement agencies of Ocean County recorded the largest trend increase of any county. Arrests increased almost 13 percent to 17,144 persons during calendar year 1977. Included in the county total was a 4 percent increase in adult arrests, and a 28 percent increase in juvenile arrests.

Ocean County law enforcement agencies solved almost 20 percent of the Index offenses reported to them during the year; a substantial increase over the 17 percent solution rate recorded in 1976.

PASSAIC COUNTY

OFFENSES

Passaic County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 27,163 Index offenses in 1977, representing a trend decrease of 8 percent during the year. Violent crime decreased more than one percent, and non-violent crime declined 9 percent.

Review of the Index offenses revealed that collectively, breaking and entering, and larceny, amounted to 77 percent of the county's serious crime total. Further review disclosed that larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories, and larcenies from within motor vehicles, accounted for 50 percent of the larceny category. The majority of the breaking and enterings occurred to residential dwellings, during the daylight hours of 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

April recorded the highest monthly number of Index crimes, while January registered the lowest number.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Police of this county arrested 21,592 persons during the year, representing a decrease of 2 percent. Individually, adult arrests decreased 3 percent, and juvenile arrests declined almost 2 percent.

More than 20 out of every 100 Index crimes were solved cluring the year, representing a slight increase over calendar year 1976.

SALEM COUNTY

OFFENSES

During the year 1977, a total of 2,123 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of Salem County, and this represents a 3 percent reduction over 1976. Although the number of Index crimes declined, violent crime increased 25 percent (from 109 to 136 offenses). Nonviolent property type crime decreased 5 percent.

Further analysis revealed that larceny accounted for 54 percent, and breaking and entering, 34 percent of the Crime Index. Together, they represent 88 percent of the county's serious crime. The majority of the breaking and enterings occurred during the nighttime hours, with residential type dwellings the most common target. Analysis of the larceny offense revealed that thefts of bicycles, and larcenies described as "all other" accounted for 46 percent of the total larceny category.

Numerically, the spring month of May recorded the highest frequency of Index crimes, while the winter month of January recorded the lowest number of offenses in Salem County.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Law enforcement agencies in the county arrested 3,814 persons during 1977, a decrease of 3 percent as contrasted to 1976. Individually, adult arrests decreased 6 percent, and juvenile arrests increased more than 9 percent.

Police of Salem County were able to solve 19 percent of the Index offenses reported in 1977. This solution rate is almost the same as the previous year.

SOMERSET COUNTY

OFFENSES

A total of 7,707 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of Somerset County during 1977. When this total is compared to 1976, a 7 percent decline is disclosed. Within the Index, the violent crime category increased almost one percent, and the nonviolent property crime category decreased 7 percent.

Volumewise, larceny offenses represented 65 percent of the county's serious crime. Larcenies categorized as thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories were responsible for 25 percent of the total larceny classification. Further scrutiny of the property crimes revealed that most breaking and enterings occurred during the nighttime hours, with residential type dwellings the most popular target. Collectively, larceny, and breaking and entering, are responsible for 90 percent of the county's Crime Index offenses.

The month of August recorded the highest frequency of Index offenses, and January the lowest volume.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

During calendar year 1977, the police of Somerset County arrested 7,832 persons for criminal offenses. This represents a slight increase, less than one percent, when a comparison is made to 1976. Arrests of persons 18 years of age and older, declined one percent, and arrests of persons under the age of 18 increased almost 4 percent.

The law enforcement officers of the county solved 16 percent of the Index offenses that were known to them. This solution rate is slightly lower than the solution rate reported during 1976.

SUSSEX COUNTY

OFFENSES

The police of Sussex County reported 3,837 Crime Index offenses during the year 1977. When compared to 1976, the Crime Index disclosed a 2 percent trend decrease. Violent crime counts increased 29 percent (from 123 to 159 offenses), and nonviolent crime declined 3 percent during the same period.

Further investigation of individual Index offenses disclosed that larceny accounted for 58 percent of the county's total Index. Most larcenies, 38 percent, were those categorized as "all other", and 21 percent were that of motor vehicle parts and accessories. Included in the "all other" larceny category were thefts of skiis from a major resort area located in Sussex County. Breaking and entering contributed an additional 34 percent to the total Index, with residential dwellings being the most popular target. Difficulty in determining time of occurrence was encountered by the investigating agencies because of the many vacation homes located in Sussex County and remain unoccupied during much of the year. Altogether, larceny, and breaking and entering, represented 91 percent of Sussex County's Index Crimes.

Index crime frequency was largest during the month of January, and at its lowest during the month of May.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Arrests by the law enforcement agencies of Sussex County decreased 2 percent, to 3,686 persons in 1977. Included in the county totals were adult arrests which declined 7 percent, and juvenile arrests, which increased 9 percent.

Sussex County law enforcement officers were able to solve 19 percent of the Index offenses reported to them during the year.

UNION COUNTY

OFFENSES

Union County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 25,141 Index offenses during the year, representing a decrease of 11 percent over 1976. Violent crime declined fractionally, while non-violent crime dropped almost 12 percent.

A review of the Index offenses revealed that collectively, breaking and entering, and larceny accounted for 82 percent of the county's serious crime total. Further investigation disclosed that larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories accounted for 22 percent, and thefts of bicycles, 20 percent of the larceny problem. Breaking and enterings were found to be occurring to nonresidential type dwellings during the hours of darkness.

June recorded the highest monthly number of Index crimes, while January registered the lowest number.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Police of this county arrested 21,164 persons during the

year for all criminal offenses. When compared to the 21,851 arrests reported during 1976, a 3 percent decrease evolves. Individually, adult arrests declined 2 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 4 percent.

Crimes reported to Union County police agencies were solved at a rate of almost 17 percent, an increase over the 15 percent recorded during 1976.

WARREN COUNTY

OFFENSES

During the year 1977, a total of 2,600 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of Warren County, representing a decrease of 7 percent over 1976. Violent crime increased 7 percent and nonviolent property type crime declined almost 8 percent.

Further analysis revealed that larceny accounted for 57 percent, and breaking and entering 33 percent of the Crime Index. Together these property crimes represent 91 percent of the county's serious crime. The majority of the breaking and enterings occurred during the nighttime hours, with nonresidential type dwellings the main target. Analysis of the larceny offense revealed that thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, thefts categorized as "all other", and larcenies from buildings accounted for 60 percent of the total larceny grouping.

Numerically, the summer month of August reported the highest frequency of Index crimes, while the winter month of January reported the lowest number of offenses.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

Law enforcement agencies of the county arrested 3,635 persons during 1977, a decrease of 7 percent as contrasted to 1976. Individually, adult arrests decreased 4 percent, and juvenile arrests declined 14 percent.

Police of Warren County were able to solve 23 percent of the Index offenses that were known to them during the year.

URBAN SUBURBAN RURAL CRIME STATISTICS

FIVE YEAR COMPARISON URBAN-SUBURBAN-RURAL

The five-year period 1973 through 1977 was analyzed, and the results disclosed a considerable percentage increase in the Rural and Suburban groups. The Rural communities experienced the highest increase, advancing more than 51 percent, municipalities of Suburban character recorded the next highest increase, up 42 percent, and the Urban communities increased 13 percent. Rural communities recorded the largest percentage increase in both violent and nonviolent crimes, up 41 percent and 52 percent respectively.

During the five-year period, 1973-1977, larceny-theft recorded the highest individual Index Crime increase in each of the areas. Larcenies in Rural areas increased 77 percent, Suburban areas 53 percent, and Urban areas 38 percent. Percent changes for each of the Index offenses by Urban, Suburban, and Rural areas are listed below:

URBAN-SUBURBAN-RURAL CRIME

URBAN

Urban communities disclosed an 11 percent decrease in their crime Index during 1977. Violent crime declined 5 percent, and nonviolent crime decreased 11 percent. This group accounted for 56 percent of the total crime reported in the state; a distribution that has been steadily decreasing since 1972. Although this distribution has been abating, the Urban group recorded more than 77 percent of the violent crime total. Significant decreases were noted in the offenses of larceny, and robbery, both declining 14 percent, and 13 percent, respectively. Murder increased 8 percent and atrocious assault advanced 5 percent.

SUBURBAN

The Suburban municipalities of New Jersey recorded a Crime Index increase of less than one percent during Calendar Year 1977. Violent crime increased 14 percent, and nonviolent crime less than one percent. This group accounted for 37 percent of the total crime reported in the state, an increase from the 35 percent recorded in 1976. Significant increases were noted in the offenses of forcible rape, and atrocious assault, both increasing 18 percent, and inotor vehicle theft increasing 16 percent. Decreases were recorded in the offenses of murder, diminishing more than 21 percent, and larceny which declined at a 2 percent rate.

RURAL

During 1977, the Crime Index in Rural communities of the state increased 4 percent, with violent crime increasing more than 6 percent, and nonviolent crime rising 4 percent. These areas comprise almost 7 percent of the state's serious crime. All of the Index offenses registered increases for the year, but, the most significant increases were noted in murder, increasing 100 percent (from 17 to 34 offenses), and robbery, advancing 10 percent.

VICTIM SURVEY

In recent years, state law enforcement officials have become increasingly concerned with the specific types of crimes directed against the citizenry of New Jersey. By way of response to this concern, the State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, in cooperation with the State Law Enforcement Planning Agency (SLEPA) and with the full support of the New Jersey Association of Chiefs of Police Advisory Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting, conducted a victim survey during the months of August through December, 1977. This survey is the first effort made, statewide, toward establishing a correlation between the number and type of offenses committed and the age, sex and race of those who have been victimized.

The information collected during this survey period was a modification of offense data not previously available on a statewide basis, and included the Index crimes of murder, rape, robbery, atrocious assault, breaking and entering, larceny and motor vehicle theft. Also included were the age, sex, and race of the victims, the type of offensive weapon used, and the day of the week the offense occurred.

In certain crimes such as breaking and entering and larceny-theft, only one victim was counted when the property in question was jointly owned. In motor vehicle thefts, the last authorized person in control of the vehicle was considered the victim, regardless of ownership.

For the purpose of this study, the elderly have been defined as those persons 60 years of age and over. While the

survey did not gather statistics on many other of the offenses our senior citizens fall prey to, i.e., frauds, bunco offenses, (schemes and swindling games), harrassment and vandalism, sufficient data was collected to clearly show that the elderly were represented as victims in 16.5 percent of all robberies, 14.7 percent of all breaking and enterings, and 11.3 percent of all murders. In addition, senior citizens were victims in 22.0 percent of all strong arm robberies (muggings, physical force, etc.) and 24.9 percent of all purse snatchings.

Although senior citizens comprise only 15 percent of the total state population, their presence as crime victims is disproportionate as indicated above.

The 1975 population estimates for 60 years of age and over were obtained from the Department of Community Affairs, Division of Aging, and are the most recent figures available.

Those persons who comprise a group at the other end of the spectrum, age 17 and under, were victimized in 13.5 percent of the murders, 35.6 percent of all reported rapes, 12.1 percent of robberies and 17.9 percent of atrocious assaults, all of these crimes are classified in the violent crime category. In the nonviolent crime of larceny, 14.4 percent of all victims were under 18 years of age.

The tables which follow, provide additional data for the consideration of the reader as it relates to crime and the victim.



OFFENSES BY POPULATION GROUPS

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicted by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

The 1977 offense data provided in this section is shown as it relates to the incorporated New Jersey municipality in which the offense occurred and is based on the individual contribution of crime statistics by the respective police jurisdictions of the state.

The isolation of offenses by place of occurrence, as shown in the table, makes possible the projection of a more accurate statistical picture of the individual community's crime experience. Additionally, this approach has provided a sound base for offense computation and analysis by county, character, population group and state. This application has been made, in varying forms, in all of the preceding offense information shown.

The statistical tables which follow offer numerical

counts of all Index offenses reported during 1977. Tables also include, for the purpose of reference, individual municipal counts as reported during 1976. Also included are columns which relate incidence of crime to the resident population.

It is important to remember, in reviewing these tables, that the extent and fluctuation of crime in a given municipality may be subject to the many complex factors set forth elsewhere in this publication. Conclusions drawn from direct comparisons between municipal offense volumes should not be made without first considering the crime contributing factors present in each of the municipalities.

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength, distributions, assaults against law enforcement officers and circumstances surrounding the killings of police officers are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, municipal and college police departments of the state are shown in tables following the narrative portion of this section.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be a subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population, differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section relate to reported police employee strength and should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality. Such determinations should be made after objectively evaluating the individual need for police services based on the above factors.

TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

During 1977, there were 33,771 persons (including civilian personnel) reported to be employed full-time by police agencies in New Jersey. Although this number represents an increase of only 4 percent when compared to 1976, a 26 percent increase is reflected when a five year comparison is made back to 1973. Males accounted for more than 84 percent of the police employees.

A total of 25,114 police officers were employed in the state during 1977, a 2 percent increase over 1976. Five hundred and sixty five, or 2 percent of the police officers were females; which represents a 21 percent increase over 1976.

There were 8,657 civilian police personnel employed in the state during the calendar year 1977, an increase of almost 8 percent over the previous year. Females accounted for 54 percent and males accounted for the remaining 46 percent of the civilian total of police employees.

MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

In 1977, the number of municipal police employees (including civilian personnel) in New Jersey increased almost 3 percent to 19,762 employees from the 19,250 employees recorded in 1976. When individual county volumes are considered, all but three counties revealed increases when compared to the previous year. The largest percentage increases were reported in Ocean County, up 14 percent, and Salem County, up 9 percent (from 100 to 109). Percentage decreases were noted in Bergen County, down 3 percent, Hudson County, down 2 percent, while Union County decreased less than one percent. Essex County reported the largest volume increase, with an additional 112 police employees, while Bergen County declined 55 police employees during 1977.

MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEE RATES

The number of municipal police employees (including civilian personnel) for every 1,000 inhabitants of New Jersey, was reported at 2.7 per 1,000 during the year 1977. A 4 percent increase over 1976, and a 13 percent increase since 1973; a relatively small increase when considering the ever-increasing demands for police services placed upon the law enforcement agencies of the state.

As in 1976, Cape May County recorded the highest police employee rate, 4.5 per 1,000 population, followed by Atlantic County, which registered an employee rate of 4.1 per 1,000 inhabitants. These relatively high police employee rates are caused by the large influx of the summer seasonal residents, which are not included in the year-round population estimates. The more densely populated Essex and Hudson Counties recorded employee rates of 3.7 and 3.6 per 1,000 population respectively. The counties located in the rural Northwest area of the state, recorded the lowest police employee rates per 1,000 population; Hunterdon County, 1.1, Sussex and Warren County 1.4.

MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. This current upward trend in employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties, is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommend the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related services.

In 1977, this increasing trend continued, and almost 14 percent of all police employees were civilians; a 14 percent increase over 1976, and a 24 percent increase during the five-year period 1973-1977. Within counties, the percentage distribution of civilian municipal employees varied from a high of 23 percent in Atlantic County, to a low of 6 percent in Hunterdon County.

MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

The number of full-time municipal police officers in New Jersey was tabulated at 17,098, a less than one percent increase over the 16,971 reported in 1976.

Volumewise, only 75 additional municipal police officers have been added in the state since 1975. Analysis of county volumes disclosed that Essex County recorded the largest number of police officers employing 3,244, and the lowest number of full-time officers, 90, were employed in rural Hunterdon County.

In 1977, the number of full-time municipal police

officers for each 1,000 persons of the state was recorded at 2.3; no change when compared to 1976. Since 1973, the police officer rate per 1,000 inhabitants has increased less than 5 percent.

Counties reporting the largest number of full-time municipal police officers per 1,000 population were: Cape May, 3.5, Essex, 3.3, and Hudson 3.3. The smallest number of police officers per 1,000 inhabitants were found to be in Hunterdon and Warren Counties, 1.1, and Sussex County, 1.2.

The police employee rates for 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality or jurisdiction should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are seasonal populations, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement officers vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county. County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors's officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

The various county law enforcement agencies of the state employed a total of 4,792 full-time police employees during the year 1977. This figure represents a 5 percent increase over 1976.

The full-time civilian employees accounted for 25 percent of the total police employees reported by county law enforcement agencies during 1977. The remaining 75 percent were sworn personnel.

STATE POLICE

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon requests, police services, to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

The Division of State Police employed a total of 2,537 persons during the year 1977. Of these, 32 percent or 810 were civilians, with the remaining 1,727 being sworn personnel. The total number of State Police employees increased almost 3 percent. Included in this increase was a rise of 3 percent in civilian personnel, and a 2 percent increase in sworn personnel.

OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

In 1976, there were ten state agencies (excluding State

Police) with law enforcement responsibilities who reported police employee data to the System. Together these agencies reported a total of 6,680 full-time police employees. Included in this total are 4,002 civilians and 2,678 sworn personnel.

No rates were computed here, due to the variations in the types of police services rendered and their statewide jurisdiction.

POLICE KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and a serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern for, in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information:

POLICE KILLED

During 1977, there were no police officers killed in the line of duty in New Jersey as a result of criminal action directed against them. However, 13 police officers lost their lives in the line of duty during the five-year period 1973-1977.

Analysis of these murders discloses that 4 officers were slain attempting to halt crimes in progress, 3 were murdered while investigating suspicious persons, 3 were killed by mentally deranged persons and the remaining officers were either killed while making traffic stops, or by ambush. Further analysis revealed that 11 of the officers, or 85 percent, were shot and killed with a handgun, and 2 officers were stabbed to death. Seventy percent of the perpetrators were males between the ages of 17 and 25.





ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS


Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator. They reveal many facts when attempting to evaluate the causes of this type of criminal activity. There are many factors which contribute to police assaults, but circumstances vary from place to place, and it is rather difficult to speculate on the reasons for these assaults. events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults must consider the unique variables present in each jurisdiction.

During 1977, there were 3,957 police officers assaulted in New Jersey. When compared to 1976 figures, police assaults rose by almost 2 percent. The five-year period 1973-1977 disclosed an increase of more than 29 percent.

No police assault rates are computed for total police officers assaulted, because of the broad field of services performed by many state and county police agencies.

ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

Municipal police officers of the state were victims of 3,732 cases of assault during 1977, a 2 percent increase over such cases reported for the year 1976. Since 1973, assaults on municipal police officers have increased 31 percent.

While every police officer who is assaulted does not suffer personal injury, 30 percent of those assaulted during 1977 did sustain physical injury to one degree or another. The assaults resulting in physical injury to the officer are frequently followed by loss of duty time by the officer.

Although the trend and rate of municipal police assaults during 1977 increased by the smallest amount ever recorded, 2 percent, the rate of municipal police assaults in the state for 1977 reached an all-time high of 21.8 assaults for every 100 municipal police officers. Since 1973, the police assault rate has increased 23 percent.

Assault and injury rates are shown by population groups in table form for the purpose of projecting the comparative assault experience of police in communities of varying populations. Analysis of these statistics indicate that during 1977, police officers of municipalities with jurisdictions of less than 2,000 population, experienced a more than 52 percent probability of being criminally assaulted while performing police services.

OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following state and county law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately, and are not included when computing municipal assault rates. The services performed, in most cases by these agencies, vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies, thus requiring their separation.

County police officers, which includes county police, county park police, sheriff's and prosecutor's offices, reported a total of 130 sworn personnel assaulted during the year 1977. A total of 62 officers received some type of injury as a result of the attack on their person.

The New Jersey State Police reported a total of 63 troopers assaulted during the year 1977; of these, 19 received physical injury.

Other state agencies with police powers, reported a total of 32 sworn personnel being assaulted during the year; of these, 14 received physical injury.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

The following analyses deal with weapons used against police officers, "type of service being performed when assaulted, times of assaults and police assault cases solved.

WEAPONS USED

In 1977, personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 92 percent of all assaults on police officers in the state. Other dangerous weapons, such as clubs, bricks, jack handles, etc. were used in 5 percent of all cases of police assault. Firearms and knives each accounted for a little more than 1 percent involvement. The five-year period 1973-1977 has disclosed very little change in the weapon usage during that period.

TYPE OF ACTIVITY

The police services performed by law enforcement agencies vary widely in both criminal and noncriminal activities. The services performed are governed by the nature of the demands for this service. Analysis by the type of service being rendered when the police officer was assaulted, provides an indication as to the degree of jeopardy a police officer is placed when responding to a given situation.

During 1977, those police officers responding to disturbance calls, which includes family disputes and tavern disorders, again accounted for most of the police officer assault situations. More than 29 percent of all police assault cases fell into this category. Police officers attempting to effect an arrest accounted for 22 percent of the assaults in 1977. The police officers assaulted who were engaged in the handling or transporting of prisoners, or during traffic stops each accounted for 12 percent of the total police assault problem. Investigation of suspicious persons by police officers attributed 9 percent. The remaining police assaults by type of activity is shown graphically by percent distribution in a chart following this section.

TIME OF POLICE ASSAULTS

The analysis of police officers assaulted by time of day disclosed very little change over 1976. In fact, the time of day percent distribution of police assaults has not changed to any great degree since collection of such information was initiated in 1972.

The four-hour period, 8:00 p.m. to midnight, accounted for more than 34 percent of the assaults on police officers in 1977. The assaults during this four-hour period were divided almost evenly between the two-hour periods of 8:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. and 10:00 p.m. to midnight. The eight-hour period, 8:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m., accounted for 62 percent of the assaults on police in 1977. Additional time periods of police assaults are shown in a chart following this section.

CLEARANCES AND ARRESTS

The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing by arrest, 99 percent of the assaults directed against them. Assaults against officers attempting to perform their duty would tend to indicate the disrespectful attitude of the perpetrators involved, even though almost immediate apprehension exists.

Although an assault upon a police officer is a high misdemeanor in New Jersey, police charged only 31 percent of the persons arrested with this serious crime. The remainder were charged under the less severe misdemeanor or nonindictable section of the law. Juveniles accounted for 12 percent of those arrested. Numerically, those arrested

for the indictable offense numbered 1,149, those persons charged with the nonindictable offense reached 2,187 and the juveniles arrested for assaulting police officers totaled 434.

1977 FULL TIME MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED IN LINE OF DUTY – BY POPULATION GROUP






WEAPONS USED IN ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS – 1977
