




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PREFACE

The Kansas Department of Corrections was providing institutional and community services to an average daily population of 5,881 clients on June 30, 1978. Those services will be continued in FY 1979 as follows:

- providing staff services to the Kansas district courts in the form of conducting pre-sentence investigations on convicted adult felons and supervising adult felony probationers, including those received through interstate compact;
- providing institutional care for those adult felons committed to the care and custody of the Secretary of Corrections, and female misdemeanants sentenced to more than thirty days of confinement;
- providing supervision of individuals granted parole by the Kansas Adult Authority and those received through the interstate compact;
- inspecting city and county jail facilities; and
- administering a community corrections grant program to assist communities in developing alternative rehabilitative services for juveniles and non-violent felony offenders.

These functions were altered by the 1978 Legislature. Effective July 1, 1979, staff services to the court system will be terminated; misdemeanant females will not be committed to the Kansas Correctional Institution for Women after January 1, 1979; and the community corrections grant program was authorized by the 1978 Legislature to be effective January 1, 1979.

In carrying out these responsibilities the Department of Corrections renders both short and long term responsibilities to the public. Short term protection is provided by means of supervision or incarceration and long range protection is provided through the "rehabilitation" of the offender so that he/she does not resort to unlawful activity after

the period of supervision or term of confinement has been completed.

The Department currently operates through three divisions: the Division of Institutional Services, the Division of Community Correctional Services, and the Division of Management Services. The Division of Institutional Services encompasses operation of the five adult correctional institutions including responsibility for inmate training programs, and the Toronto Honor Camp. The Division of Community Correctional Services encompasses the operation of work release facilities, the jail inspection program, probation and parole supervision, and administration of the community corrections grant program. After July 1, 1979, the probation supervision function and other staff services relating to pre-sentence investigations will be transferred to the court system. The Division of Management Services encompasses the Correctional Industries program, the functions of fiscal management, research and planning, personnel, and staff training.

This statistical report is the second effort of departmental personnel to assemble and publish statistical data concerning the inmate population and other workload data of the correctional system. Most of the charts and tables in this report were derived from a survey of all inmates confined on June 30, 1978.

This report is divided into seven sections. The titles of those sections should be self explanatory as to the data presented. One clarification is offered as follows: section D reflects the number of conviction occurrences while section E reflects the number of times those inmates have been incarcerated for those offenses.

The emphasis of the report is to provide a maximum amount of basic data concerning the inmate population. No attempt has been made to present an interpretation of the data. Should you have questions about the data, please contact the Research and Planning Section of the Department. It is hoped that this report will provide you a better understanding of the Kansas Department of Corrections and its client population.

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





Convictions Compared to Inmate Ages Resident Male Inmate Population on June 30, 1978






