

PREFACE

In June 1977 the Research and Planning Section staff of the Kansas Department of Corrections undertook the accumulation and assembly of information relating to the operation of the Kansas Department of Corrections and the adult felony offender in custody of the Secretary of Corrections. A preliminary Statistical Report dated July 1977 portraying that information was provided the Interim Corrections Committee for their use, and a finalized version of that report including completed Fiscal Year 1977 population data was published in October 1977.

Subsequent to that publication, additional efforts were expended to collect more detailed data concerning the nature of the inmate population with respect to types of crimes committed, the conviction records of those inmates confined, and what the predominant program needs of the inmate population are. That information is contained in this supplemental report to the Statistical Report dated October 1977.

The information contained within this supplemental report reflects a profile of the adult inmate population in custody of the Secretary of Corrections as of September 30, 1977.










