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#### Letter of Transmittal

To Governor Joseph P. Teasdale, Members of the Missouri Legislature, and Citizens of the State of Missouri

On behalf of the Missouri Council on Criminal Justice, we are pleased to transmit its Annual Report for FY 1978. The report contains a brief summary of the programs and federal expenditures of the Council during the past year.

FY 1978 was an eventful year for the Council. Numerous program and operational changes occurred as the membership of the Council spent many voluntary hours deliberating better ways to utilize federal crime control funds in Missouri. We have made some improvements and others will be forthcoming as we continue our efforts to direct our limited financial resources into programs which will have a measurable impact on crime in Missouri.

The LEAA program cannot claim total credit if the crime rate declines, likewise it should not receive the total blame if crime flourishes. The causes and corrections of crime are complex. The proportion of the total criminal justice budget in Missouri which is contributed by LEAA is less than 3 percent. The dilemma

for the Council is to use the available resources in such a way to produce substantial improvements in the structure and operation of the criminal justice system.

The Council has responded to this challenge through the creation of many programs which, although initially experimental, have become an established and valued resource to the State. Some brief examples include regional crime laboratories, regional law enforcement training academies, group homes for delinquent youth, prosecutor investigating units, administrative support services to assist the judiciary, and adult corrections programs. These examples and others of a similar nature comprise the approximately 600 projects administered annually by the Council.

We greatly appreciate the support we have received during the past year and we look forward to your cooperation and assistance in the future in achieving our goal of continuing to insure that safety and security is provided to all Missourians.

## **Preface**

The Missouri Council on Criminal Justice (MCCJ) is the state planning agency in Missouri. MCCJ was created as required by Section 203(a) of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (P.L. 93-83), as amended.

MCCJ is responsible for the disbursement of the Federal LEAA funds made available to Missouri. Along with this responsibility, the Council has been given the charge and authority to develop each year a statewide comprehensive criminal justice plan. The end product of this plan is the establishment of priorities and the selection of the programs and projects to be funded.

One of the problems of operating in a system so diverse as the criminal justice area is keeping those involved informed of what is being done.

We have prepared this publication with the goal of answering questions often raised in four general areas.

- (1) What is MCCJ, and what services do we provide?
- (2) What were the priorities of the Council in FY 78?
- (3) How were the LEAA funds distributed in Missouri in FY 78 as compared to past years?
- (4) What is the frequency of crimes committed in Missouri?

We hope this report provides elected officials, agencies involved in the criminal justice system, and concerned citizens with a synopsis of the progress and accomplishments of MCCJ in FY 78.

We gratefully acknowledge the contributions by numerous criminal justice professionals and concerned citizens throughout the State of Missouri who operate the programs and projects mentioned.

Special attention is directed to members of the State Council who, although faced with program needs far exceeding available resources, spent long hours in developing a balanced approach to address the problems of crime in Missouri.

Regional Councils and their respective Service Area staffs contributed heavily by the development of local priorities and approaches to addressing crime and delinquency problems at the "grass roots" level.

# What is the Missouri Council on Criminal Justice?

The Missouri Council on Criminal Justice (MCCJ) is an agency within the Missouri Department of Public Safety. It is responsible to the Director of the Department of Public Safety and to a citizen advisory board also known as the Missouri Council on Criminal Justice. The citizen board is referred to as the State Council.

MCCJ is responsible for the planning and administration of all federal funds received by Missouri from the Crime Control Act of 1976 (LEAA funds) and the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974.

#### What does the Council do?

Each year the Council receives an allocation of federal funds from the Law Enforcement Assistance Agency (LEAA). The Council must prepare a plan of action, consistent with federal guidelines, for the expenditure of these funds. The plan includes a detailed list of priorities and eligible program areas for which grant applications from state or local public or non-public agencies may be submitted. The Council reviews and approves for funding the most promising of the applications received.

# How are members of the Council appointed?

Members of the State Council are appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the Director of Public Safety, except as provided by law.

# How does the Council determine who shall receive funding?

Three-fourths of all MCCJ funds must be expended at the local level. To assist the Council in determining the most effective expenditure of local funds, twentyone Regional Councils have been formed to assist in identifying local needs and recommending high priority projects. Local representation on the Council plays an integral part in assuring that a proper state/local balance is maintained. Local project recommendations and applications from state agencies are referred to standing committees representing the areas of police, courts, adult corrections, juvenile justice, and community crime prevention. Standing committees review projects for consistency with guidelines and regulations and determine if they address the priorities established by the Council. High priority projects are then presented to the Council for final review and approval.

#### How can agencies learn more about the priorities and programs of the State Council and, more specifically, how do they apply for assistance?

In January of each year, the State Council releases a program announcement for projects for the next fiscal year which begins on October 1. The program announcement contains a description of application procedures, eligible program areas, guideline requirements, and submission deadlines. A grant application handbook is also available which contains instructions and forms for the submission of grant requests. State and Service Area staff are available to assist interested agencies in the preparation and submission of grant applications.







# What services are provided by the MCCJ Staff?

#### **Planning and Program Development**

This activity involves the preparation and revision, when needed, of comprehensive plans based upon an evaluation of law enforcement and criminal justice problems and needs within the State of Missouri. Planning activities are carried out in conjunction with law enforcement and criminal justice agencies at all levels of government in Missouri and include the definition and development of specific programs within the comprehensive state plan and the establishment of priorities for law enforcement and criminal justice improvement. This unit reviews all grant applications to ensure compliance with program guidelines and descriptions developed by the Missouri Council on Criminal Justice and approved by the federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration. It provides information and technical assistance to potential grant recipients in the planning and program area.

#### Financial and Grants Administration

This unit is responsible for maintaining accurate accounting records of all funds received and awarded by the Missouri Council on Criminal Justice. This unit monitors progress and expenditures in the grants to state and local law enforcement and criminal justice agencies, local units of government and other recipients of LEAA grant funds. The unit also provides technical assistance and services to subgrantees in the area of fiscal and grants administration.

#### **Auditing**

This unit is responsible for financial auditing of subgrantee records to ensure the financial integrity of grant funds awarded and compliance with all applicable and federal laws and regulations.

#### Research and Evaluation

This unit is responsible for developing and testing a variety of methods of evaluating projects funded by the council. The unit assesses the overall impact of LEAA in Missouri and assists potential grant recipients in developing methods to facilitate evaluation of their projects. It provides assistance in the design and implementation of specialized data gathering studies needed in the preparation of the comprehensive state plan.

#### **Technical Assistance**

MCCJ staff are available to assist state and local criminal justice agencies through the application of modern technology. The Law Enforcement Assistance Council ccordinates a national technical assistance program which permits Missouri to locate and draw upon expertise from other areas. In addition, printed materials are available which describe successful programs conducted elsewhere.

# What is a Regional Council?

A Regional Council is a local body comprised of representatives appointed by the respective chief elected officials of the units of governments within the geographic area served. In most all instances the geographic boundaries of MCCJ regions are contiguous with the general purpose regional planning boundaries of the state. Once formed, the Regional Councils apply for recognition by the State Council to serve as the planning and administration body for that geographic area and enters into an agreement with the appropriate Service Area for the provision of staff services.

Based on a fund allocation formula, each Regional Council is given an annual budget upon which to plan criminal justice projects. The formula is comprised of two factors, population (85%) and high crime incidence (15%). Within the list of priorities established by the State Council, Regional Councils may recommend projects to be funded.

# What is a Service Area?

A Service Area is a geographic area comprised of one or more Regional Councils which is served by a single staff. Service Area staff are local employees and are selected by a nine member Executive Committee of representatives from each of the regions located in the area. The Executive Committee is also responsible for approving the annual administrative budget of the Service Area office. The Service Area Executive Committee has no authority to make decisions regarding the funding of action projects.





# Selected examples of progress in improving

# Law Enforcement Assistant Administration funds awarded to MCCJ

#### Types of Funds

The LEAA funds awarded to MCCJ are of different types and have various restrictions guiding the use of these funds. Following are the types of funds awarded:

#### Part B Funds

Part B funds are for the purpose of funding state and regional planning agencies. The function of these agencies is to develop and implement a statewide comprehensive plan for the improvement of law enforcement, and criminal justice throughout the state. Subgrants to regional planning units may be up to 100% which state agencies must be matched on a 90-10 basis. For more information, refer to the Crime Control Act of 1973, Section 201.

#### Part C Funds

Part C funds are available for a broad range of projects in the areas of police, courts, adult and juvenile corrections, and other related areas of the criminal justice system. These funds constitute the bulk of monies allocated under the Crime Control Act of 1973. The matching ratio is 90-10 except as otherwise provided by Council policy. The match for construction projects is on a 50-50 basis. More information may be found in Section 301 of the Crime Control Act.

#### Part E Funds

Part E funds are specifically for the improvement of adult and juvenile corrections programs and facilities and are to be used to supplement Part C funds. Any subgrant from these funds may be matched on a 90-10 basis except as otherwise provided by Council policy. For more information, refer to Section 453 of the Crime Control Act.

#### **JJDPA Funds**


JJDPA funds are specifically for the prevention and control of juvenile delinquency. Special requirements contained in Section 223(a)(12) and (13) of the JJDPA require that states place the highest priority in funding areas: (1) Programs which prevent juvenile offenders from coming into "regular contact" with adult offenders; and (2) programs which serve to prevent the institutionalization of juveniles who are charged with or who have committed offenses that would not be criminal if committed by an adult (status offense). To be eligible for funding, application must seek to accomplish one of these goals.

#### **Discretionary Funds**

Those monies which are not passed on to states as block grants but are retained at the federal level to be expended at federal discretion are known as discretionary funds. Applications which are innovative and of national scope are eligible for funding. For a detailed explanation, refer to LEAA Guidelines Manual M 4500.1B.

# Summary of Uniform Crime Reporting Program

From reading newspapers, watching news reports, and personal experiences, it is obvious that crime in the United States is a tremendous problem.

One of the efforts to deal with this problem was the passage of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968. An integral part of this Act is the mandate that each state shall prepare a comprehensive plan to improve the quality of law enforcement and criminal justice in their state. This plan is developed from a total integrated planning process which begins with the State Planning Agency's (SPA's) evaluation of state and local problems of law enforcement and criminal justice which leads to a statement of statewide priorities.

This appears to be a logical and straightforward approach. To accomplish this task we must know the facts about crime in Missouri.

Presently in Missouri the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program provides the only systematic record of reported and discovered crime in Missouri. The UCR program provides a view of crime based on police statistics contributed by local law enforcement agencies. In those areas where data is not submitted the probable volume of offenses is estimated and added to those reported.

Mixed feelings are expressed about the validity of UCR data. Some criminologists question the reliability of UCR data because they are based only on reported crime. The reasons given are that some crimes, such as homicide and car thefts, are almost always reported. Other types of crimes, such as rape, may go unreported in a large percentage of cases. Many other serious questions are raised. While UCR statistics are not a perfect measure of the number of crimes committed it is the best we have in Missouri at this time.

Recognizing the existing factors mentioned above, this section was prepared to inform the reader of the UCR data available for Missouri. The following pages contain the standardized definitions developed to provide an overview of crimes committed. These offenses, known as Crime Index offenses, are burglary, larceny-theft, aggravated assault, robbery, murder, forcible rape, and motor vehicle theft. Immediately following these definitions are the 1975 and 1976 trends identified in Missouri.

#### **Motor Vehicle Theft**

#### **DEFINITION**

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft is defined as the unlawful taking or stealing of a motor vehicle, including attempts. This definition excludes taking for temporary use by those persons having lawful access to the vehicle.

#### Burglary

#### DEFINITION

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program defines burglary as the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify the crime as a burglary. The offenses of burglary in this Program is broken down into three subclassifications: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is used, and attempted forcible entry.

#### Larceny-Theft

#### **DEFINITION**

Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles without the use of force, violence, or fraud. It includes crime such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc. In the Uniform Crime Reporting Program this crime category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft, of course, is excluded from this category for crime reporting purposes inasmuch as it is a separate Crime Index Offense.

#### **Aggravated Assault**

#### DEFINITION

Aggravated assault is the unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or serious bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

#### Robbery

#### **DEFINITION**

Robbery is the stealing or taking anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person, in his presence, by force or by threat of force. Assault to commit robbery and attempts are included. This is a violent crime and frequently results in injury to the victim.

#### Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter

#### DEFINITION

Murder is defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as the willful killing of another. The classification of this offense, as in all of the other Crime Index offenses, is based solely on police investigation as opposed to the determination of a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body.

Deaths caused by negligence, suicide, accident, or justifiable homicide are not included in the count for this offense classification. Attempts to murder or assaults to murder are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder.

#### Forcible Rape


#### **DEFINITION**


